## Physician Is With Cruel Death Of Wife

## LATEST LEAGUE PROBLEM STIRS ENGLISH PEOPLE

## Chamberlain Attitude On In- creasing Membership Of League Council Is Awaited With Great Deal of Interest

LONDON, Mar. 1.—(AP)—The British public still is astir over what is to be the attitude of Sir Austen Chamberlain, the British Foreign Secretary, with regard to increasing the membership of the League of Nations after Germany has elected a member of the League. The interest of Great Britain is acute, because of the fact that Germany is opposed to any further new members of the League aside from herself.

Sir Austen is continuing to maintain silence with regard to his purposes when the League council meets at Geneva, and, also, how far he may have committed himself to the French view in admission of Poland, Spain and Brazil to permit seats on the council. The opinion prevails that if any understanding has been reached for the enlargement of the council Germany should have been apprised of the fact.

Prior to next Friday, when the council meets, it is understood that Premier Baldwin will endeavor to relieve the tension by a statement which will allay rumors that a cabinet crisis exists, but it is considered doubtful if he will definitely indicate the British policy. Another British cabinet meeting will be held probably Wednesday, before final instructions are given to the British delegation to Geneva.

There was no developments over night leading to verify Sir Austen's rumors of readiness to resign the foreign secretaryship. If his views cannot be harmonized with those of his colleagues, The Daily Mail says he has been invited to address a meeting of the League of Nations Parliamentary Committee before an announcement is made in the House of Commons, but it is not stated whether he has accepted.

The opinion of a large section of the British public is that a debate should be avoided if possible, lest it increase the dangers of the situation, but the holding of a debate is likely to depend upon the character of the ministerial statement.

It is thought that Premier Baldwin will frame his statement in such a way as to avert a discussion in the House as he is thought alive to the delicacy of the situation.

Meanwhile, according to the current issue of the Daily Express at Prague, the little entente, embracing the Balkan nations, has declared its support of Poland's claim for a permanent seat in the council. The nations can't govern world, Foreign minister Benes of Czechoslovakia, is quoted by the correspondent as saying in an interview:

"The world cannot be governed forever by 10 nations; it would begin to be of interest if the council enlarged to include representatives of every country in the world."

The same correspondent quotes President Masaryk of Czechoslovakia, as saying, "I am entirely in favor of the plan to enlarge the council."

The writers represent these declarations as made in behalf of the little entente and adds:

"They complete the united front of Slav and Latin Europe for expansion of the council, and the Anglo-Saxon and Germanic powers of the North."

## Alcohol Production To Be Curtailed

NEW YORK, Mar. 1.—(AP)—John A. Foster, recently appointed to take charge of the supervision of the alcohol industry throughout the country said today he plans a sweeping cut in the output of alcohol manufactured under government permit. It is his aim, he said, to reduce the present output from 6,900,000 gallons to 2,000,000 a year.

## Wm. W. Crapo, "First Citizen of New Bedford, Mass., Is Claimed By Death

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., Mar. 1.—(AP)—William W. Crapo known as the "first citizen of New Bedford," because of his long connection with public affairs in this city, died last night at the age of 85 years.

Among the many famous cases in which he was engaged during his career was a lawyer was the preparation and collection of the "Alabama claims" arising out of the destruction of many New Bedford ships during the Civil War by the Confederate cruiser Alabama.

He was prominent in the development of the cotton manufacturing industry in New Bedford and served as a senator and president of several mills for many years.

## WIFE MURDERER IS SENTENCED TO PRISON FOR LIFE

Jury Deliberates Into Sunday To Return Verdict of Guilt In Case of Victor Holmes Of Beattyville, Ky.

BETTSVILLE, Ky., Mar. 1.—(AP)—A jury deliberated into Sunday, a rare custom in this state, to return a verdict of guilty murder in the case of Victor A. Holmes, for the murder of his wife, Mrs. Louise Holmes, and their children. His wife and one child, Titus, were instantly killed, while the second child survived, though being seriously injured. A hearing for a new trial will be held today. Holmes' attorney announced, and if this fails an appeal will be taken.

The jury decided that Holmes deliberately shot over a 200-foot cliff an automobile in which were seated his wife, Mrs. Louise Holmes, and their children. His wife and one child, Titus, were instantly killed, while the second child survived, though being seriously injured. A hearing for a new trial will be held today. Holmes' attorney announced, and if this fails an appeal will be taken.

A chain of circumstances which evidence was presented by the prosecution as these are not yet witnesses to the tragedy. Holmes told of driving his car over a ridge several miles from here, and said the road became slippery so he went to adjust his chains. He later the brakes slipped as his wife was backing the car, and it dropped over the precipice.

The first word of the occurrence was told by Holmes to farmers living near the precipice where he went for help.

Several days after this tragedy, however, Holmes was placed under arrest. In his first trial last fall which resulted in a mistrial, 10 of the jury were said to favor Holmes, and the remaining two the other death. The jury's decision is said to have been quite a surprise to the residents of the community, in view of the first trial.

Holmes, who is unmarried, and a war veteran, met his wife during the war while in a hospital. He is at present suffering with influenza and had to be revived before he was brought into court Saturday. He accepted the verdict without any apparent emotion.

## Two Women To Be In MacMillan Expedition To The Arctic Region

WISCONSSETT, Minn., (AP) Mar. 1.—Two women will have the Arctic waste when Commander Donald B. MacMillan leads his next expedition into the frozen north. They are Mrs. Rowy B. Metcalf, of Providence, R. I., and Miss Maude Fisher, of New York.

The new vessel will measure 80 feet over all and will be similar in construction to MacMillan's schooner Bowdoin which has scattered several trips into arctic waters.

## Sentiment In Favor Of Tyrolese Active

In Vienna an immense crowd of Tyrolese manifestants sought to deliver a resolution ensuring freedom of movement for Tyrolese, but was scattered by the police.

## ENGLISHMAN TO DEVOTE FORTUNE TO CHURCH WORK

NEW YORK, Mar. 1.—(AP)—Sir Henry Lunn, prominent layman of the Protestant church in England, who announced a fortune after retiring as a medical missionary in India, has put into practice his belief that surplus wealth acquired by big business men should be devoted to the betterment of mankind.

The World Alliance for International Friendship through the Churches Sunday announced that he had turned over most of his vast properties to trustees who will administer the revenues for religious and social work, including international peace.

The exact value of the properties was not given, but the announcement said they total millions. They include the enterprises conducted by Sir Henry Lunn, Ltd., of London. This firm operates a tourist business in Europe, and owns many large hotels in Switzerland and other parts of Europe.

The funds accruing from the business will be administered by the Lunn Foundation for the benefit of the movements which Sir Henry has supported during the past ten years. He is a leader in the church unity movement and is now touring this country in behalf of that church.

The only property not decided to be trustees of the foundation was a trust fund created for members of his family. Upon death, each beneficiary's share will go to the trustees.

Sir Henry, in a letter to a friend whom he asked to become a trustee of the Lunn Foundation wrote:

"I have always held that the end of a large business is entitled to a reasonable remuneration for his work, and that he is trustee for all beyond that sum. In a complex civilization like ours, where rewards of commercial success are very great, the primitive idea of tithe has become an antiquated and an absurdity, and no system of proportional giving can satisfy the demands of justice, where the income is often many times that of a prime minister or president of a state.

"You will, therefore, understand me when I tell you that, preparatory to the important engagements which I have undertaken to fulfill on my journey round the world, I have definitely decided to divest myself of all my property and form an incorporated society which will provide the necessary funds for continuing the future publication of The Review of the Churches, issued to the clergy of all communions as it now is, at a heavy loss, to support all movements for church unity and international peace, and further other religious and social ends.

"You will appreciate the relief it will be to me, as I start out to visit the leading cities of the United States and the capitals of our dominions, to know that the question of financial gain from business developments has entirely passed out of my life."

The South's weekly toll from automobile, railway train, trolley and motorcycle accidents last week was 63 dead and 320 injured, it was revealed by a survey conducted by the Associated Press today.

Florida led the 11 states in which the survey was conducted both in deaths and injuries, the former being 16 and the latter 80.

Mississippi brought up at the bottom of the list with no deaths and only three injuries recorded.

The outstanding accidents of the week were recorded in Georgia. On Friday night, the chief of police with another policeman were chasing a speaker at Hapeville, near Atlanta, when the policeman and his car crashed into a moving car. The chief is in a serious condition at an Atlanta hospital.

Last night a mother and four children were killed and the father and a son seriously hurt when a Seaboard Air Line train crashed into their automobile at Elberton, Ga.

### G. O. P. Planning To Hold Party Primary In Texas First Time In History

DALLAS, Tex., Feb. 28. (AP)—Peculiar quirks of the Texas primary law are giving trouble to the Republican party which, for the first time in its history, is planning to hold a party primary in this state. The first primary is next July.

The law requires that any party polling 100,000 or more votes for governor shall hold a primary. In the last general election, George C. Butler, Republican candidate for governor against Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, received 300,000 votes, three times the vote ever polled by a Republican candidate.

A dispute has arisen as to which party is to have the use of the ballot boxes, voting booths, and guard rails. The law provides that these supplies MAY be used by THE party casting 100,000 votes in the last preceding general election.

**Confusion Reigns**

A formal demand from the Republicans for the supplies placed county commissioners' courts in a quandary. Some counties have met the situation by purchasing double sets of boxes, booths, and guard rails, while others have attempted to evade the demand.

One of the chief differences between the Texas law and the primary laws of other states is that the former does not provide for a joint primary. If more than one party comes under its provisions, the parties hold separate primaries on the same day at different polling places.

The Democratic party is the only one which has ever functioned under this law, and Republicans are charging that it is a Democratic law, made by Democrats for Democrats.

The law is being interpreted by the state, with the same officials at the general election and in which voters of both parties participate, using ballots of different color and design. The Texas law provides for partisan primaries, conducted separately. Each has election officials selected by the party county chairman and with no official responsibility to the state for safeguarding the primary or protecting the count other than a possible appeal to the courts after the primary is over.

**Financing Primaries**

The primaries are financed by the candidates, the chief burden falling on candidates for county and precinct offices. These candidates are assessed on the basis of the pay attached to the office they seek. Candidates for state and district offices are assessed about \$100 each.

The Republicans declare that this is in effect purchasing the office, and that it is a peculiar hardship on them, because it is almost impossible to induce a candidate to contribute to a hopeless cause. Heretofore a Republican candidacy in Texas has been an empty honor, with here and there an exception.

The law provides that every hour an election judge must go to the door of the polling place and announce in a loud voice the number of ballots cast up to that time. It forbids anyone to transport voters to the polls in any vehicle except cripplés and those otherwise disabled.

The monument will be erected at a cost of \$25,000, a special appropriation of that sum having been made for that purpose by the last state legislature.

NEW YORK, Mar. 1. (AP)—Organization of a national women's club for practical support of good plays, is proposed in a letter to the Federation of Women's Clubs by Channing Pollock, the playwright, who is urging "real drama" in the American theater.

Under his plan, the club would actually finance the production of several plays annually, each of which would be carried by the original companies to the supporting cities.

"The idea in question is that every woman's club in America should stand back of an organization which could be the child of the Federation of Women's Clubs," Mr. Pollock said. "Every member would pay dues of ten dollars a year and in return would receive four tickets a year to the club's own production."

**Operating Plan**

"If each ten-dollar member goes for overhead expenses, the organization can, the author says, for the taking, the play could be carried by a committee of clean-minded, intelligent persons. They would be asked to contribute as an organization and not for the sake of the play, which would be a high in the most successful of a long line."

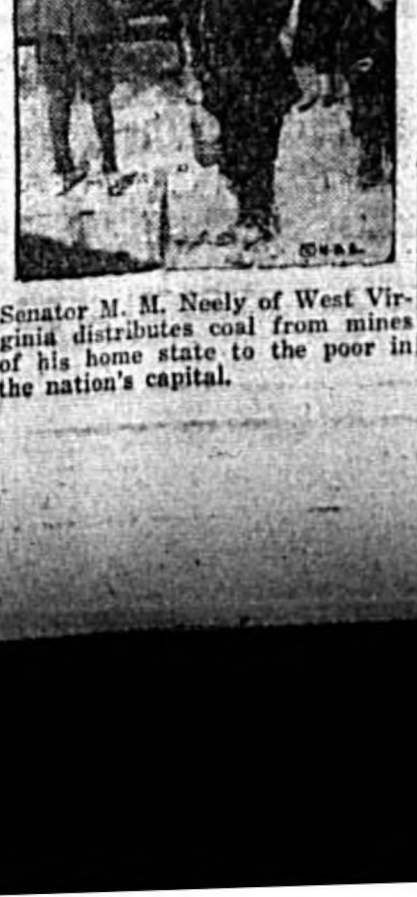

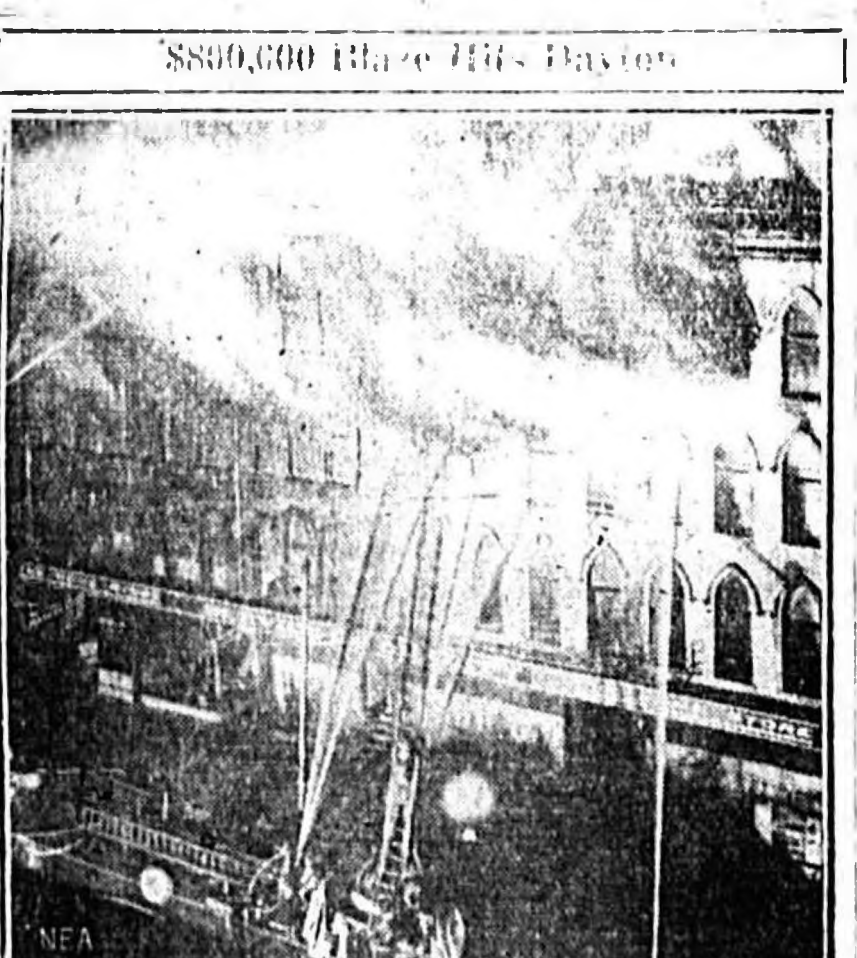

## Johnny Farrell Captures Tampa Tourney; Beats Cruickshank In Play-Off

TAMPA, Fla., Mar. 1.—(AP)—Johnny Farrell, Tampa, won the Florida open golf championship here Sunday by scoring one stroke less than Bobby Cruickshank in their 18-hole play-off. Farrell's score was 72 and his Chicago opponent took 73.

Each had a total of 236 at the conclusion of the 72-hole regular game Saturday. It was then agreed to play off the tie this morning.

That Johnny Farrell was a dangerous contender was indicated by the first three holes of play. Johnny had a par and two birdies for the three holes, and before the match was well started had the lead which ultimately won him the title.

Hole No. 1 was halved in par figures of 5, when each reached the green in three and took the customary two putts. Cruickshank's drive and brassie second netted him 500 yards on this hole. On number two, Farrell's approach second shot fell 20 feet short of the cup, while Cruickshank's rested only four feet from the pin. Farrell rolled his ball those 20 feet and sank his putt for a birdie three. Cruickshank was 20 feet away on the green and required two putts for a four.

The short fourth was halved in par three's but Cruickshank evened the medal score on the fifth, when he sent a long brassie second to the edge of the green, chipping to within two inches of the cup in three and sank his putt for a birdie four. Cruickshank went one stroke behind again, on the sixth, when he took one over par. A chipped stroke—a chip of only a few yards—gave him a five while Farrell was taking his par four.

The dog-leg seventh proved troublesome for the drivers of both the golfers, and their recoveries cost them each a five for the hole, one over par. On the eighth, Farrell was one over par while Cruickshank had a par, and par figures for both on the ninth had them all square at the end of the first nine.

On the tenth, Cruickshank began to falter. His second shot hit a groove, and his attempted recovery landed him in a bog along the edge of the green. He chipped out to his fourth and sank his five. Meanwhile, Farrell was driving 220 yards, reaching the edge of the green with his brassie and sinking his second putt.

Number 12 was halved with par for both but Cruickshank went four behind on the thirteenth. He missed a putt for the half and, until today,

## New Rules Allow Balloons Right Of Way Over Airplane

DAYTON, O., March 1.—(AP)—New traffic rules for flyers and balloonists devised and compiled by the Aeronautic Safety Code of the Federal Aviation Administration and the American Engineering Standards Committee are being studied by McCook and Wilbur Wright field officers here. The code represents five years' work.

Under the rules, balloons receive the right of way in the air over airplanes and dirigibles. The balloon corresponds in the air to the sailing vessel at sea. Dirigibles, like auxiliary water craft, have the right of way over planes, which correspond to steam craft.

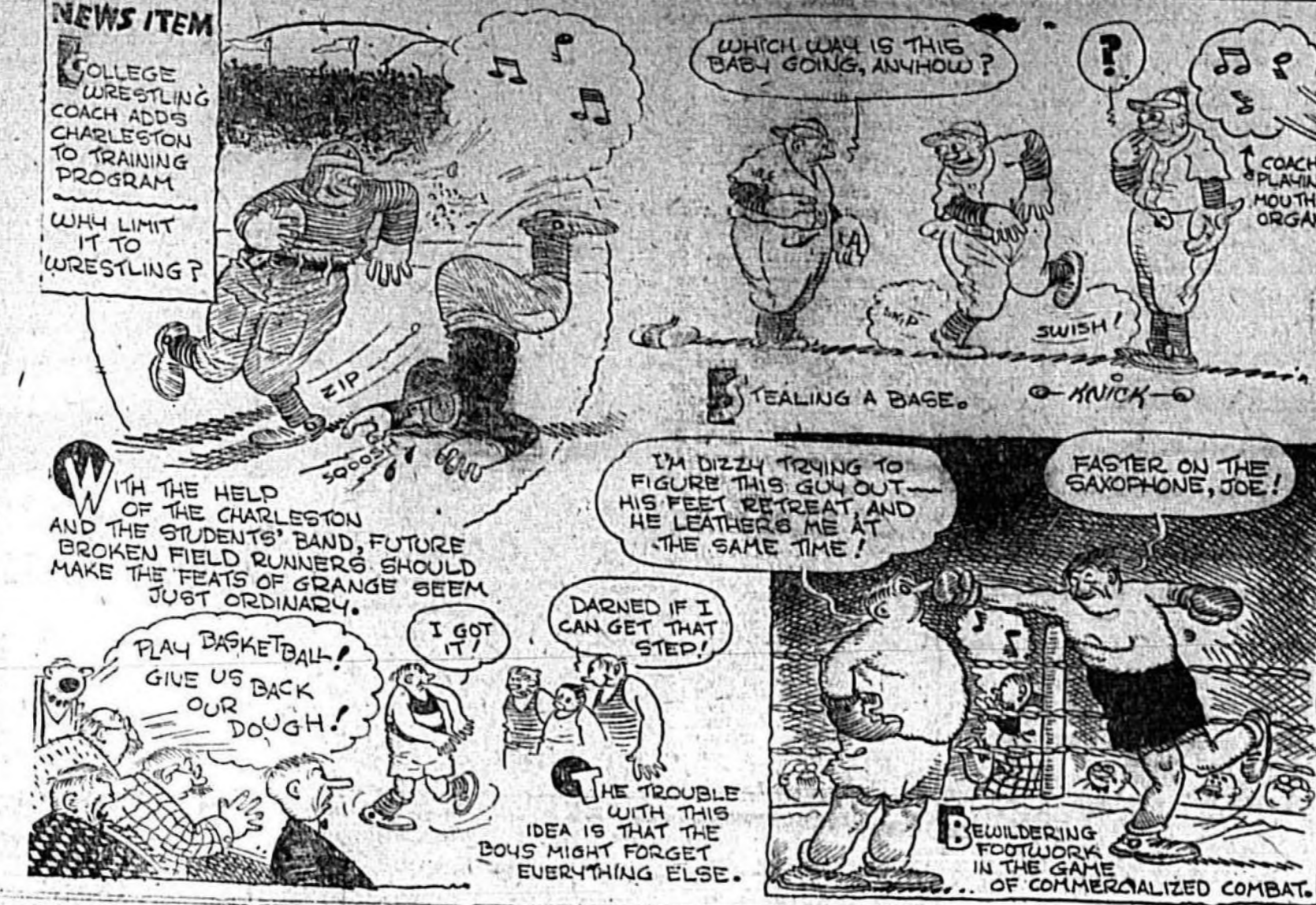

SARASOTA, Fla., Mar. 1.—(AP)—Walter Hagen, representing the Professional Golfers' Association, defeated Bobby Jones, national amateur champion, eight up in the first 36 holes of their match Sunday.

The contest here was the start of a 72-hole amateur tournament unofficially the best golf in the United States.

In the morning Hagen was 2 up at the end of the first nine. At the end of 18 holes he was three up. Both players were rather unsteady, but the professional established his lead through superior putting on the greens.

Hagen's score of 71 was par for the course.

Jones completed the morning run for a card of 75.

The players were repeatedly off the fairway with their tee shots and neither had shown his usual form at the close of the first 18.

During the afternoon round Hagen steadied and gained five more holes on his Atlanta opponent. Hagen is at Pasadena course, St. Petersburg. Hagen won the first, fifth, ninth, 13th, 16th and 19th holes. Jones won the seventh, twelfth and seventeenth.

The afternoon play was spectacular. Hagen continued his morning advantage by winning the 19th hole with a par four. Jones took the next after Hagen failed to reach the green in three. On the par five 25th hole, Hagen played a 200-yard iron shot dead to the pin and when Jones missed a 15-foot putt by a fraction of an inch, Hagen's lead was increased to six up.

After Jones, on the par three 31st hole had run down a shot from off the green to win, Hagen came back in the 32nd par four hole and sank a 20-foot putt for a birdie three to win the match. They halved the next three holes, the par five 35th in birdie fours and came to the 36th green with Hagen seven up. Here Hagen smashed the ball with a sweeping hook off the fairway. Jones' drive also pulled into the rough.

Hagen took a braggie and lifted the ball over the trees between him and the green and sent it 200 yards almost pin-high, but slightly to the right.

Jones' second landed in a trap at the left of the green and he played it out past the cup by 15

## Tulane Coach Entered College With No Record In High School Athletics

NEW ORLEANS, Mar. 1.—(AP)—Clark Shaughnessy, head football coach at Tulane University, which went through the 1925 season without defeat, is one of the small group of athletes who had no athletic training before entering college.

Shaughnessy went from his birth place in St. Cloud, Minn., to the University of Minnesota. At Minnesota, "Doc" Williams did not overlook him when he weighed 100 pounds and could run.

Shaughnessy came out for the team to find out what it was all about.

Who was the first to play Michigan was posted and Shaughnessy decided that he was an added starter when he saw his name at the bottom, written in pencil. He played every position on the team except center, making his most sensational record at fullback.

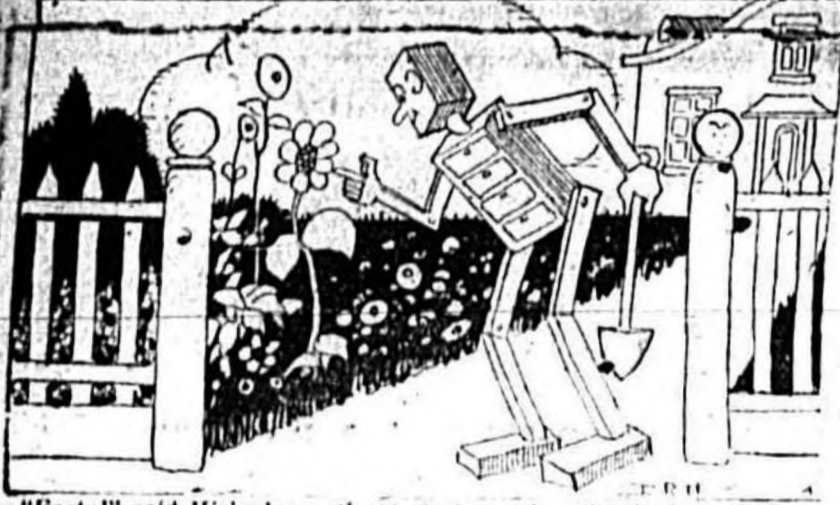

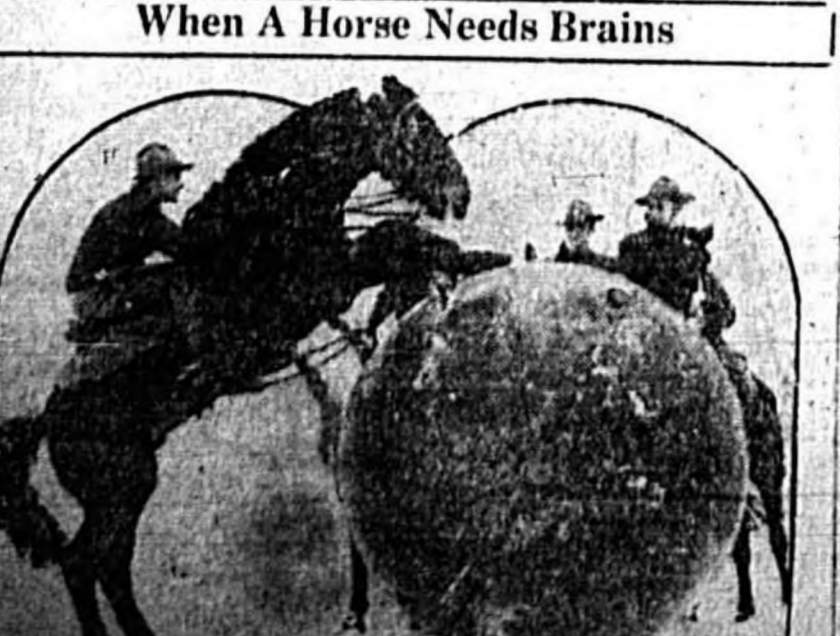

Lad Is Discovered By Vachel Lindsay In Washington Hotel Dining Room; Poems Being Published In Book

WASHINGTON, Mar. 1. (AP)—Vachel Lindsay, American lyric writer, was dining at a local hotel before his lecture on American poetry when a young negro bus-boy came up to him and put some sheets of paper on the table, as he cleared away the plates. That was how Lindsay came to know Langston Hughes, whom Carl Van Vechten ranks with the best of the younger American poets. "I could not then talk to Lindsay of the house that bus-boys say," said Hughes, "because it is just not hold conversation with the guests. I did whisper to him that I liked his poetry and hoped he would think well of mine." To his great surprise, Hughes learned from the newspapers next morning that Lindsay not only liked his work but also found it good enough to read with the verses of other American poets. Some of these poems appear in "The Weary Blues," which Knopf has published for Hughes. The negro poet first began to appear in magazines and then won the first and third prizes in a contest held by a negro magazine for the best negro poem of the year. Hughes is no longer rustling dishes. He received a scholarship to Lincoln College, where he will continue his education with his writing.

### Silk Cargoes From The Orient Receive As Much Care As Do Gold Shipments

SEATTLE, Mar. 1. (AP)—Silk cargoes with values running into war-debt figures characterize their movement from the Far East to Atlantic seaboard manufacturing centers. In two weeks this year more than \$29,000,000 worth of this commodity was unloaded here and dispatched east by express train. In 1925, Seattle was the port of entry for \$230,000,000 worth. It is handled with a care scarcely less than that shown in the transportation of gold.

made public, the policies reading that the rate is "as per other agreement." The reason for the secrecy is another secret of the trade.

Liability of the carriers runs about five cents on the hundred dollars of value, which is in itself a considerable item as silk averages \$1,000 a bale, and the liability charge like the insurance, is on a time basis.

When insurance and carrier liability are added to the cost involved in a cargo of silk ranging from \$1,000,000 to more than \$10,000,000, expeditious transportation becomes an economy rather than an expense. Interest charges reach \$1,000 to \$1,500 a day.

The Arabia Maru has set the record for a single cargo, docking with 10,124 bales of raw silk and 100 tons of manufactured silk or a total value of \$11,000,000. This was rushed to mills in Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New England on two special trains consisting of 25 cars. Sixteen engines, two of them electric, were used to haul the shipments to Chicago, where it was transferred for shipment on east.

Now Stop Trains The special trains run on schedules calling for no stops except to change engines at junction points or through mechanical necessity.

Speed records for overland transportation of silk is claimed by the Great Northern Railway, which hauled 18 cars of raw silk and one passenger coach from Seattle to St. Paul in 52 hours and 35 minutes. The same train returning made the return trip in 47 hours and 10 minutes, being favored by the grades, westward bound. The time for the 3,571 miles was 99 hours 45 minutes.

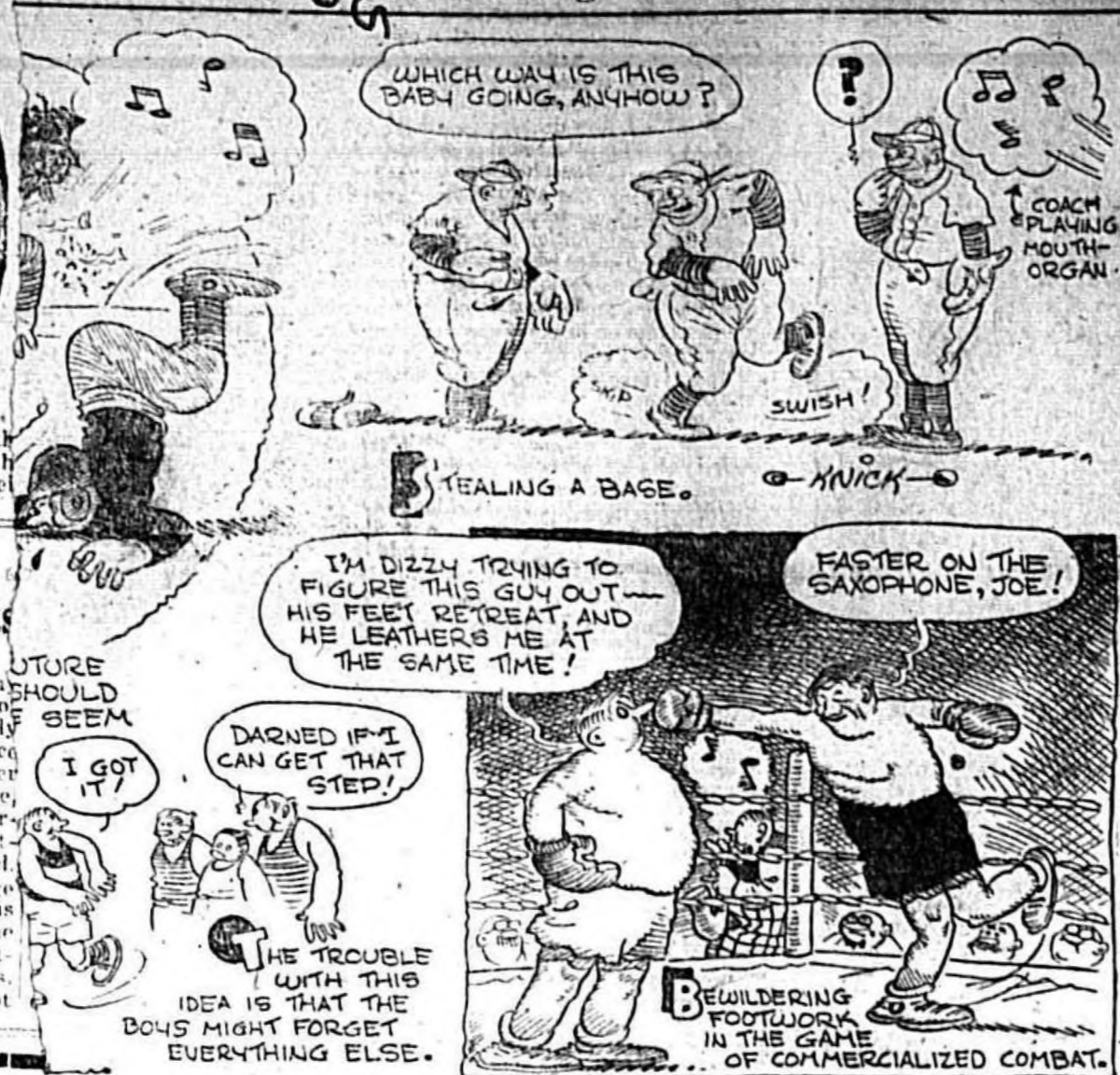

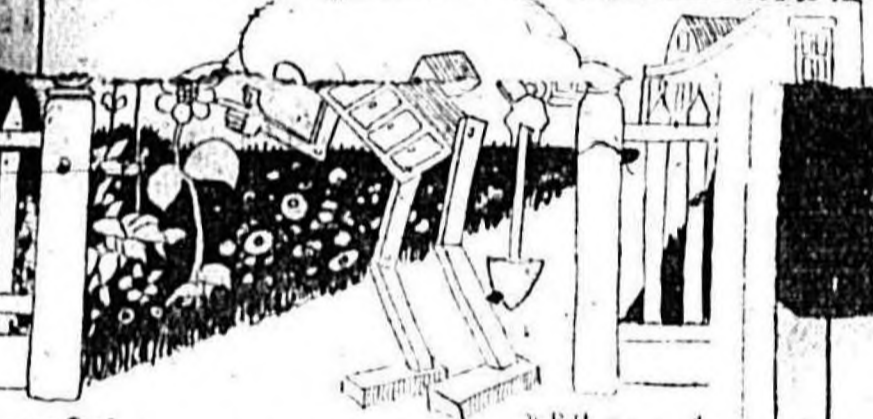

Silk Cargoes From The Orient Receive As Much Care As Do Gold Shipments

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made public, the police reading that the rate is "as per other agreement." The reason for the secrecy is another secret of the trade.

Liability of the carriers runs about five cents on the hundred dollars of value, which is in itself a considerable item as silk averages \$1,000 a bale, and the liability charge like the insurance, is on a time basis.

When insurance and carrier liability are added to the cost involved in a cargo of silk ranging from \$1,000,000 to more than \$10,000,000, expeditious transportation becomes an economy rather than an expense. Interest charges reach \$1,000 to \$1,500 a day.

The Arabia Maru has set the record for a single cargo, docking with 10,124 bales of raw silk and 100 tons of manufactured silk or a total value of \$11,000,000. This was rushed to mills in Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New England on two special trains consisting of 25 cars. Sixteen engines, two of them electric, were used to haul the shipments to Chicago, where it was transferred for shipment on east.

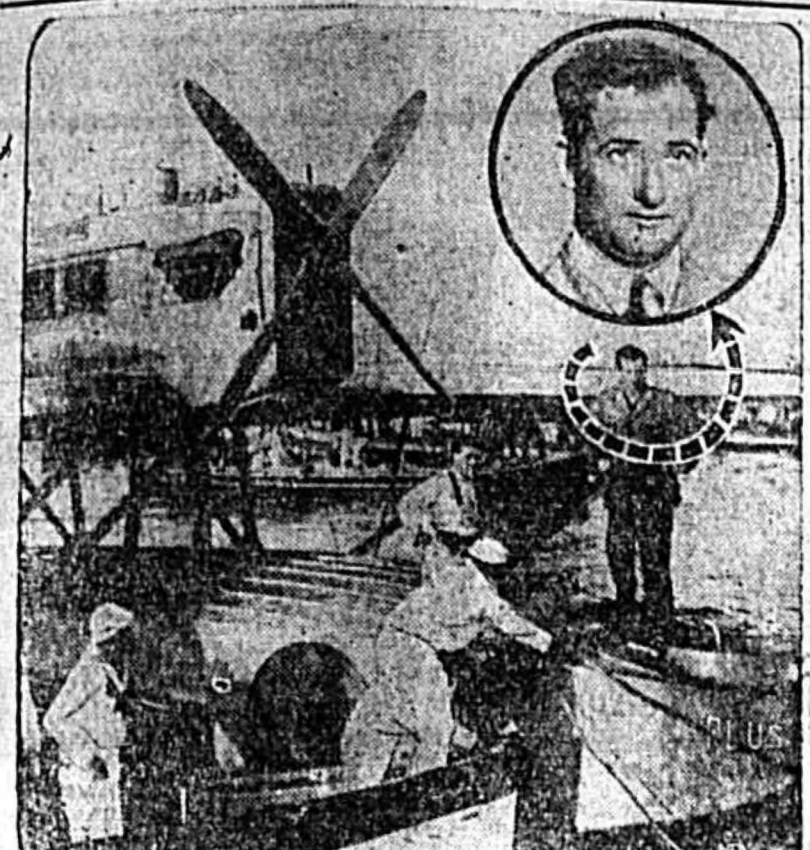
