2+2 Florida Prepaid College Scholarship. They will attend a two-year community college and then two years at a four-

year university.

Fernando chose to start at Valencia Community College in Orlando. He said he wants to major in history and education at the University of Central Florida in Orlando or Florida State University in Tallahassee.

Watching Fernando and his peers were nine eighth-graders selected to sign a contract to begin the program. Together the eighth-graders stood and vowed, among other things, to maintain a 2.5 grade point average or higher, remain drug and crime free and meet weekly with a mentor.

Lisa Reineck said nine was a low number of participants starting the program. The reason is not lack of interest, she said, but the fact that costs for college keep increasing.

"The cost of a scholarship is over \$10,000," said Reineck, program coordinator. She added that the state pays for half.

The evening began with a dinner provided by Outback Steakhouse for everyone involved in the Take Stock program.

Mentor Helen Bernstein sat with her student Dlse Hirmiz. Bernstein said she has volunteered for more than 18 years with Seminole County schools, but the one program she is most

proud to mention is Take Stock in Children.

"I would absolutely do it again," Bernstein said.

Like all the mentors and students in the program, Bernstein meets for about 45 minutes every week to talk about grades, college prep courses and happenings in the young person's

"I feel like I'm a good female role model," Bernstein said, adding, "I'm careful of my boundaries." She doesn't take the place of a parent in other words, she said.

In the beginning, Bernstein said it was somewhat frustrating if Dlse didn't show up for meetings. As Dise matured the frustrations evaporated and now Dlse carries a 3.5 to 3.7 grade point average. She said she looks forward to studying dentistry in the near future.

Eighth-grader Coral Bryan does not know who her mentor will be yet. The South Seminole Middle School student is shy when asked about the program she just signed on to.

"She's not shy about her education," said her teacher Jo Ann Carty. "She is a good student who isn't afraid to ask questions and who gets along very well with her peers."





home with four siblings. After graduating high school in 1979 and working for a few years, he decided to attend the Salvation Army Training College to become an officer.

Capt. Reckline leaving Sanford Salvation Army

"I feel that what I'm doing now is what I was called to do a long time ago," he said. "Growing up I didn't have a whole lot. I've always wanted to help people avoid the same situation.

Reckline met his wife in 1981 at a Salvation Army camp in

West Virginia. They married in 1982, and have two children. They are both ministers at the Salvation Army church in Seminole County. Other family

members are involved with the organization - Reckline's brother is a captain in Texas, and his brother-in-law is a major in

Reckline and his wife were first stationed in St. Petersburg, then went on to direct offices in Orange Park, Miami, Brooksville and Ft. Pierce before coming to Sanford. The structure of the Salvation Army is much like the military.

"You're told where you're going and when," he said.

Reckline said when he came to Seminole County, his focus was on "what needed to be done for the Salvation Army in this area to enhance the current

programs that are taking place." The local division offers programs for food, housing, utilities, financial aid, youth activities, community camps, courtordered supervised visitations and state-wide disaster assistance. Last year, the division helped 4,546 people with servic-es such as food, prescriptions and after-school programs for children and provided 1,200 people with clothes, toys and food during the holiday season.

Reckline said he will miss the employees, church members and the advisory board for the organization, made up of leaders and residents from the county "who believe in the mission of the Salvation Army and want to help out."

"When we first arrived here we were welcomed and it's been a very enjoyable experience," he said. "I appreciate the support from the community and I hope that they will continue supporting the Salvation

In Key West, Reckline and his wife will be responsible for the day-to-day operations of the organization, along with overseeing five thrift stores in the "It's going to be a new adventure," he said. "The thrift stores in Monroe County are

very successful, we want to make sure that we will keep them going." For Reckline and his family,

prior bank heist.

Shortly after the incident, Deputy Devin Lucius noticed Trainor's vehicle in the parking lot of the Burger King on State Road 434 near Markham Woods Road.

Olson said the "relatively new deputy" approached the vehicle and Trainor was somewhat complying with his commands until the deputy went to handcuff him. As Trainor was freeing himself from the deputy's grasp, Lucius fired a taser at him that didn't make a direct hit. The deputy reported: "the suspect lost his balance and fell. The suspect immediately stood up and charged at me. I struck the suspect in the chest with my open



chest his hands. Justice was nearby waiting

in the fast food drive-thru line for a cup of coffee when he saw the action unfold. "He was just interested in

getting out of there and running for his life," Justice said of the bank robber.

Justice, a general manager of a food safety company in Orlando, said he's never been a law enforcement officer before, but he didn't like what he was seeing.

"More than anything else I think it was ticking me off that this guy was fighting with the deputy and didn't have the respect," he said.

Then before he knew it,

Justice was running across State Road 434 along with the deputy toward Petty's Meats.

"I don't know what I was thinking," he said. "The only thing I was thinking to myself is 'I don't see a gun in his hand and we probably can take this

guy."
"I'm faster than I think,"

Justice admits some of his adrenaline may have been from the recent long hours he's been working to prepare the company's annual budget.

"I took out some of my budget frustration on him, but that's OK," he quipped.
"I would probably do it again because I didn't want

the deputy getting hurt," he added. "I really don't have a bad temper or anything like that. My wife tells me I'm going to get killed one of these days. I've confronted shoplifters in stores before. I'm not one to cause troubles, but I don't like people being taken advantage of or done wrong."


After nine innings the scoreboard said that Team 2 (Home) won the game 14-0, but that was an anomaly as the contest was much more competitive than that.



BERGMAN A-SUN COACH-OF-THE-YEAR UCF junior pitcher Matt Fox was named the 2004 Atlantic Sun Pitcher-of-the-Year while UCF head coach Jay Bergman was named the 2004 Atlantic Sun Coach-of-the-Year, the conference office announced Tuesday. In addition, six other UCF players garnered A-Sun First Team, Second Team or Freshmen Team honors.

Joining Fox on the A-Sun All-Conference First Team include sophomore pitcher Kyle Bono and junior outfielders Dee Brown and Clay Timpner. Junior shortstop Chandler Rose was chosen to the A-Sun All-Conference Second Team while freshmen RHP Taylor Meier and infielder Matt Ray garnered A-Sun All-Freshmen Team accolades.

Fox was chosen as the A-Sun's Pitcher-of-the-Year in the first year the conference has offered the award. A three-time A-Sun Pitcher-of-the-Week in 2004, Fox leads UCF with a 12-2 record and 1.84 ERA. In 98.0 innings, Fox has 112 strikeouts (fifth in UCF single-season history) and his 12 wins are tied for third in single-season history.

Magic Johnson, NASCAR team up for diversity

Former basketball player joins in diversity effort

Concord, N.C. n an effort to diversify a sport that has been predominantly white. NASCAR has reached out to a former Los Angeles Lakers basketball player for help.

Earvin "Magic" Johnson has agreed to co-chair the new Executive Steering Committee for Diversity and will volunteer his time to convince minorities to participate.

His goal, and NASCAR's, is to have minority participation at every level, including drivers, mechanics, team owners, track workers and fans. "I'm giving my time because I want

to see more minorities in this sport," Johnson said last week at NASCAR's Research and Development Center. "I want to touch more minorities to let them know [NASCAR] is great." Johnson, who became a successful businessman after retiring from the

NBA in 1991, said he's exploring the possibility of purchasing a race team, but he needs more time for research. He said he will be a hands-on diversity

"Whether I'm an owner or not, if I can touch lives and make sure minorities can come up in this sport somehow. then I've done what I wanted to do," he said. "Do I know it's going to take a lot of hard work? Yes. Do I know it's going to take some time? Yes. But I'm patient. I'm here for the long haul." For most of its 55-year history,

Diversity program. A 2002 ESPN/Chilton poll found that 25 percent of NASCAR fans are nonwhite. Statistics compiled by NASCAR show that it has been the fastest growing sport among African-Americans and Hispanics during the past seven years. African-American fans have increased 18 percent - approximately two million people — since 1995. Hispanic fans have increased 38 percent — approximately three million people - since 1996.

Johnson said he's aware NASCAR has some fans, including those who fly Confederate battle flags at races, who might not be open to an influx of minorities. But he doesn't see a major problem. "I can't control what happens with

flags," he said. "I can't control what people want to put in their cars. The only thing I can control is making sure these programs are run in the correct manner and make sure minorities are touched in the right way

"There are some things that have been going on in NASCAR for years. I can't change that. I'm not here to change NASCAR. I'm just here to try to involve more minorities in the sport of NASCAR."

Sheriff's office finds medical files in garbage

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is in possession of files that were found in a dumpster outside of an Altamonte Springs area physician's office.

According to the law enforcement personnel who investigated, the documents appear to contain social security numbers, credit card and billing information, personal information, as well as treatment information.

The records were found in a dumpster outside of the office of Dr. Parviz Brauman (aka Brahman), 100 Lake Shore Drive, Altamonte Springs. The doctor is reportedly in the process of being evicted from the property for reported non-payment of rent.

The records were discovered Thursday morning by an employee of a dental office, which shares space in the building with the doctor's office. Deputies responded, documented the case, and took the records for safekeeping.

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is now looking into whether a theft complaint, filed on May 21, has any connection to the discovery of these records. In that case, reported last Friday, Brauman alleged that somebody broke into his office and stole patient files. Further investigation revealed another employee was in possession of the records. According to the incident report, the employee said they were allegedly ordered to dispose of them by the doctor, but put them into storage instead.

The sheriff's office will be in contact with the State Attorney's Office as to appropriate criminal sanctions, if any, that apply to this case. A special line set up to handle inquiries about patient records found in the dumpster is 407-665-6663. If the line is busy, or for after hours inquires, callers will be asked to leave their contact information and a staff member will call back.

community southeast portion of the county in October of 1992, the Oviedo-based bus line primarily serves the University of Central Florida, Oviedo Marketplace mall and the neighborhood of Alafaya missioners considered eliminating the route this month when the city of Oviedo refused to pay nearly half of the \$80,000 needed to continue the service.

Although the Oviedo City Council agreed to fund the remaining portion of the route this month, Maloy said changes are needed to increase the viability of the route that has shown only a slight increase in ridership since its inception.

When Link 47 began it was

servicing about 3,500 passengers a month, and as of February 2004 only about 4,500 passengers used

"It's still one of the lowest performing routes in the whole system," Maloy said. "One of the problems is it doesn't go to where there is a high density of people.

"To me it's on life support and it never seems to take off," he

YMCA Safe Start program teaches children water survival skills

LAKE MARY — The story is the same, but it's the ending that is different.

On a cold January day in Sanford, Cally Dawber walked into her backyard pool area, with her 2-year-old son Grayson pedaling his tricycle. As Grayson pedaled on, Dawber turned away from the pool to lock the gate behind them. She then heard a splash. She whirled

Grayson and his tricycle had fallen into

By the time Dawber got to the edge of the pool, Grayson had swum out from under his tricycle and grabbed onto the

side of the pool. Had Grayson not been taught how to react while unaided in the water, his story probably would have ended in another tragic drowning.

Drowning deaths in Florida are the highest in the nation, according to the Florida Department of Health. In 2002, almost 2,700 children 14 years old and under were treated in emergency rooms

for drowning related inddents, accordto the National SAFE KIDS Campaign.

Fortunately Grayson and his family, the instructors at the Seminole YMCA's Safe Start program had prepared him for just this kind of emergency.

Safe

Start program teaches children ages one to four how to swim through the water, roll onto their backs into a floating position, flip themselves back over and swim to safety. The program is a 6-week course, consisting of daily 10-minute sessions, five days a week. Children are taught to survive in the water while wearing bathing suits and normal clothes, as most

Airport snags federal grant

SANFORD — The Sanford Airport Authority will add \$1.1 million in security enhancements thanks to a federal grant.

The U.S. Department of Transportation grant was announced by Sen. Bill Nelson of Florida.
