Recent Senate disclosures reveal that most of the American airforce is already obsolete in the light of recent European developments, that the Navy is inadequate to meet threats in two oceans at once...

Superior even to the air power of these nations is their propaganda departments and their espionage service which enable them to conquer from within before firing a single shot.

In this country we have long felt that the width of the Atlantic and Pacific oceans makes us immune to conquest from abroad. But if the ruling authorities of large ports like New York or San Francisco surrender the keys to the city to the German commanders...

Perhaps the Dies Investigating Committee can prevent anything like that happening here. At any rate it would seem to be a good idea to keep them on the job.

Marriage Without Money

Money is not an important factor in marriage, and in fact marital happiness seems to work in inverse ratio to wealth, according to Dr. Paul Popenoe, founder and director of the Institute of Family Relations...

Our work has revealed the surprising extent to which money is falsely blamed for marriage problems. Dr. Popenoe states in a signed article in The American Magazine: "About 8,000 men and women in the United States are being married on every weekday this year...

Declaring that of the quarter million persons who have sought direct advice from the Institute in the past ten years, not one has yet been divorced, Dr. Popenoe explains the relation of marriage to money as follows: "No sound marriage was ever destroyed by financial worries. On the contrary, hard times often strengthen the family, bring husband and wife closer together...

There are two conclusive arguments that prove the point. The first is the divorce record, which shows divorces steadily declining in the depression years and increasing as prosperity returns. The second is that half the families in America are getting along this year on gross incomes of less than \$100 a month.

Advising young people not to let lack of money keep them from marrying, as long as they are sincerely in love, old enough to know what they are doing, understand what marriage means and are free to enter into it, Dr. Popenoe says: "Money doesn't really become an issue until a couple is engaged. Then, sometimes, it is so frightening that they wish they weren't engaged because they are very much in love and happiness is so near, yet unobtainable...

### Overtime Pay For Citrus Workers Costing Growers

WASHINGTON, May 12.—Wage-hour authorities, studying the effect of minimum wage and maximum hour legislation on fruit farmers' income, were told yesterday that the law requiring overtime pay for citrus packing plant workers was costing Florida citrus growers at least \$300,000 a year.

The estimate was made by John S. Levin, Orlando, speaking for growers and shippers of the state during a wage-hour hearing on complaints against the limitations in the area of citrus production. Levin said that production rate-defining houses and non-exempt citrus packing houses.

The wage-hour rule, under five and a half hours, limits the number of hours a worker can play in packing houses in rural areas or towns under 2,500 population which draw their fruit from within a radius of 10 miles.

Citrus industry spokesmen from California, Texas and Florida have attacked the rule as unreasonable and discriminatory, contending that all the factors compete under similar conditions in the same market, and that the exemption gives a small portion of the growers a cost advantage over those com-

## Nazis Say They Have Sunk English Warship

### 25-Day Blitzkrieg Has Given Invaders Control Of Two-Thirds Of Norse Peninsula

### Norwegians Ask For Armistice

### Italy Says She Will Fight If Naval Forces Attack Nation

A 30,000-ton British battleship was reported today by Germany to have been sunk off the Norwegian coast by diving Nazi bombing planes. The German claim, unconfirmed immediately from other sources, capped a 25-day blitzkrieg which has brought almost two-thirds of Norway under German sway, and ousted Allied expeditionary forces from all but the northernmost region.

Organized Norwegian resistance collapsed in wake of the Allied withdrawal which cost Britain not only strategically important southern Norway but aroused a storm of bitter domestic criticism against the Chamberlain government.

The Germans said nothing but debris could be seen a few minutes after German bombers scored a direct hit near the battleship's forward turret. There was no commotion from the British on the claim.

One authoritative London source said Britain would continue fighting for Norway with the greatest vigor.

Norway's exact military command asked the Government for an armistice, and accused the Allies of "unprovoked aggression" in withdrawing without due notice of their retreat.

Europe was watching the Mediterranean as a possible theatre of new wars. Both the Allies and Italy were reinforcing their positions. Authoritative Rome circles warned that Italy would fight off any attempted attack from Allied naval forces.

BERLIN, May 4.—(AP)—Germany boasted of full preparation last night to resist any stroke by Britain to offset her catastrophic defeat in Norway.

Alert for action they said must come from the British in an effort to revive their prestige. Germans said they are prepared, come what may, to meet any new theater of war while keeping up operations quickly in Norway. They predicted this task would be finished in less than two weeks except for the beleaguered northern part of Norway.

Attention mainly was riveted on the Mediterranean as the possible scene of British action following Prime Minister Chamberlain's announcement Thursday of the concentration of British troops in France.

French battle fleet at Alexandria. Authorized sources emphasized, however, that it is up to Premier Mussolini of Italy to decide what to do about the Mediterranean situation.

Whatever his decision, it was said, Germany then will fulfill her obligations.

Germany asserted their attention also was directed unambiguously toward the Netherlands, Belgium and Scandinavia as possible places for British action.

In this atmosphere Germans said their motto for whatever British strike, we will strike back doubly hard.

At almost the same hour that authorized spokesmen boasted of German preparations, Adolf Hitler, in a field broadcast, declared that Germany would not allow any British expeditionary force to land in Norway.


