The old year ticked down to an extra "leap second" New Year's Eve before the ringing in of

In New York, the sky filled with fireworks and the throng of celebrants cheered as the Big Apple reached the end of its descent in Times Square after a countdown televised coast to coast. The apple, 6 feet in diameter and glowing with 180 red lightbulbs, descended above a -news zippera revolving strip of lights that give headlines of paused at one second on its downward trip. The "leap second" is inserted every three years to make up for the Earth's uregular rotation and keep clocks accurate

In Washington, D.C., some 150,000 revelets gathered outside the Post Office Pavillion to watch a giant neon postage stamp lowered.

In Chicago nearly 4,000 revelers watched 25,000 balloons fly into the sky near Offare International Airport at the stroke of midnight

The county and city pesented arguments for the second consecutive day Wednesday, this time concerning a piece of property south of SR 46. between Airport Boulevard and Bevier Road and north of Jewett Lane

The property was annexed last May at the request of the Marley Conway Cooper and Siegler families, according to Donna McIntosli-

211 Seminole Lottery Outlets Approved

Convenience stores, groceries and a multitude of other Seminole County merchants are among 13,387 retail outlets certified Thursday to sell lottery tickets.

Evidence is accumulating within the stores as portions of the equipment and promotional signs are arriving daily. And the anxiety of the customers becomes evident as pennics and nickles are being dropped into the plastic containers which will contain the tickets beginning Jan. 12.

Lottery officials have approved 211 outlets within Seminole County.

Those retailers have all passed extensive background checks the Lottery, including reviews for criminal records, overdue taxes and bad credit ratings.

Each business operator needs only to sign a contract to begin selling the tickets when the

"This charter group of retailers exceeds the estimates, as other businesses clear the screening process," Lottery Secretary Rebecca Paul said. "With this excellent group of retailers. even more dollars to enhance public education."

Legislative committees planning the lottery last spring had predicted only about 10,000 retailers would apply and qualify to sell tickets

Dade County led the state with the most retailers, with 2.212 County was a distant second with 1.567, followed by Palm Beach with 968, Pinellas with

944, Hillsborough with 724, and who win \$5,000 will have to

Orange with 614.

Retailers include virtually every type of business, including convenience stores, newstands. liquor stores and barber shops. Each of the state's 57 counties had retailers approved. Lafayette. County had the fewest with three.

The stores will sell instant winner tickets to the lottery's "Millionaire" game for \$1 each. The retailer will keep 5 percent of his ticket sales.

Players scratch a small latex patch off the silver, green and pink cards to reveal two rows of three numbers or words. If any three of those six match, the player wins.

A player can win a free ticket, \$2, \$5, \$25 or \$50, to be paid by the retailer on the spot. Players

claim their prize at one of the lottery's 13 district offices.

If a ticket shows the word "entry" three times, the player will qualify for the really big prizes. That person will be eligible for prizes of \$10,000. \$15,000, \$25,000. \$50,000, or \$1 million.

The lottery department printed 250 million "Millionaire" game tickets. When those tickets sell out in a projected 10-12 weeks, a new instant winner game will be started.

The lottery is expected to pull in some \$413 million in sales during the final six months of the 1987-88 fiscal year. About one-third of that, some \$145 million, is slated to go towards improving Florida's educational



Armored Car Plunges Into Canal, One Of Two Brink's Guards Dies

ST. CLOUD, Fla. (UPI) - A Brink's Inc. armored truck plunged off a highway into a large flood canal Thursday. submerging the vehicle for about 30 minutes and killing one of two guards aboard, officials said.

Lisa Ann Wood, 32, of Kissimmee died at Orlando Regional Medical Center/St. Cloud about four hours after the accident, a hospital spokeswoman said. Cause of death had not been determined, she said.

The other guard, Forest Dale Glenn, 41, of Orlando was In critical condition at Humana Hospital Kissimmee, a hospital spokeswoman said.

Johnson said the accident occurred on U.S. Highway 192, one-half mile west of St. Cloud shortly after 9 a.m. at a 100-foot long bridge over a flood control canal some 30 feet wide at the water's surface.

Court Rules On Executing Insane

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - The Supreme Court Thursday issued a new permanent rule setting the procedure Florida will follow when deciding if a condemned prisoner is mentally competent to be executed.

The rule is similar to a temporary rule that has been in place since last year, when the U.S. Supreme Court ordered the state to change its mental competency procedures. The U.S. Supreme Court issued that order in blocking the scheduled execution of mentally incompetant death row

Under Florida law, the governor determines whether a condemned person is competent when defense lawyers claim insanity. In most cases, the governor appoints a three-member panel of psychiatrists to make that determi-

If the governor then certifies the condemned prisoner sane, the defense can challenge his certification in court. Under the old rule, the court would review only the procedures followed by the governor in deciding whether to uphold his decision.

Under the new rule, which took effect when the court issued it Thursday, a judge can order an entirely new evidentiary hearing on the defendant's sanity rather than simply reviewing the governor's action.

Potentially Fatal Tranquilizer Laces Medicine

Deadly Cough Syrup Recalled

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The maker of five brands of cough syrup has issued a nationwide recall because a manufacturing mixup put a potent and potentially fatal tranquilizer into many cough medicine bottles. the government says.

My-K Laboratories of Morton Grove and Skokie, Ill., issued the recall for the non-prescription medicine bearing lot number 15718 with the expiration date December 1988, the Food and Drug Administration said

A manufacturing mix-up oral solution, a clear, colorless, caused the tranquilizer to be packaged in the cough syrup bottles, the agency said, and taken as a cold medicine, the tranquilizer could prove fatal. especially to a child.

"The mix-up was detected when a 6-year-old became lethargic after taking the cold medicine and was taken to the clinic at Fort Bragg, N.C., and then to the University of North Carolina Medical Center. The boy is recovering." the FDA said. The tranquilizer is haloperidol

odorless liquid. The cough syrup is a yellow liquid with a lemon fragrance containing triprolidine hydrochloridand pseudoephedrine hydrochloride. The medicine is distributed as:

-Myfed Syrup, to military as well as to civilian stores.

-Life-Line Trifed Syrup, by Life-Line Pharmaceuticals of Hayward, Calif.

-URL Uni-Fed Syrup. by United Research Laboratories of Philadelphia.

-Walgreen Wal-Act Syrup, by

Walgreen Co., of Deerfield, Ill. -Osco Aphedrid Syrup, by Osco Drug Inc. of Oak Brook, Ill.

About 105,000 white, 4-ounce, plastic bottles of the cold medicine have been distributed nationwide, the FDA said, but it is not known how many may contain the wrong drug.

FDA Commissioner Frank Young urged that cold medicines purchased within the past year be checked and if they have the 15718 lot number of the recalled brands they should not be used but promptly returned.

A Lesson For Stock Traders

Ivan Boesky, convicted of insider stock trading, will have time to observe Wall Street from inside a jail cell. Boesky has been sentenced to three years in federal prison. His crime was defined as conspiring to file false stock trading records.

But Boesky's real crime was far broader and more dangerous. It was buying insider information and using that information to anticipate huge corporate takeover bids. By buying early, before outsiders knew of the takeover attempt, Boesky was able to ride rising stock prices to new height -and then to cash in.

The profits were unbelievable. For \$700,000, Boesky bought information from Martin A. Siegel that Boesky turned into \$30 million profit. From Dennis B. Levine, Boesky bought information that made him \$50 million richer.

Not bad for a boy from Detroit. Boesky amassed hundreds of millions of dollars on Wall Street. He bought a mansion, limousines and other trappings of wealth. He became a major contributor to charities with his Ill-gotten money. Boesky wielded immense power, working from a computer console with phones ringing and fortunes riding on his wheeling-dealing.

Insider trading fed a fever of takeovers that threatened major corporations. The wild fluctuations in stock values made millions for profiteers, but meant layoffs for workers, as businesses were spun off in corporate at-

tempts to save themselves.

The boom on Wall Street renewed confidence in capitalist free enterprise, bringing many small investors into the market. But corruption began undermining the stability of the market, as outsiders found themselves manipulated by insiders. The Oct. 19 crash was, in some measure, heightened by the lack of confidence provoked by revelations of high-level abuse. The bull market had horns of corruption that gored many an investor.

When nabbed by the feds, Boesky turned informer. He implicated 14 associates in five major brokerage houses and is still being questioned by authorities investigating corruption on Wall Street. He paid an unprecedented \$100 million to settle civil charges against him. A prosecutor described him as 'contrite, humbled, repentant and profoundly changed."

We can hope that Boesky's prison sentence will send a message to Wall Street traders that white-collar crime will be punished. The central marketplace of world capitalism must be protected from within. It's time to slam the prison door on the era of greed and corruption symbolized by Ivan Boesky.

Hypocrisy

The Sandinista government, which says neither foreign nor foreign-backed troops should be on Nicaraguan soil, abstained from voting on the recent United Nations General Assembly resolution urging withdrawal of Soviet troops from Afghanistan.

Earlier this year. Miguel d'Escoto, Nicaragua's foreign minister and former director of Orbis Press, publishing house of the Maryknoll religious order, received the Lenin Peace Prize in Moscow. He said-or rather, gushed—at that time:

"I believe the Soviet Union is a great torch which emits hope for the preservation of peace on our planet. Always in the vanguard of the overall struggle for peace, the Soviet Union has become the personification of ethical and moral norms in international relations. I admire the revolutionary principles and consistency of the foreign policy of the Communist Party of the fraternal Soviet

You'd think he'd been talking about Mother Teresa rather than one of this century's worst despotisms.

Deficit Hocus Pocus

LOS ANGELES (NEA)-Here's another disconcerting example of your tax dollars at work-but this one is especially bizarre.

President Reagan's appointees at the Energy Department want to sell the underground crude oil reserves the federal government owns in California and in Wyoming.

Then, they want to use the estimated \$4 billion in proceeds from those sales to buy crude oil. which they will store underground in Louisiana and Texas.

If the logic of this escapes you.

that's probably because you don't understand the blue-smoke-andmirrors techniques that Congress and the executive branch use as a substitute for management.

Their desperate attempts to obfuscate the huge federal deficit have produced the government's version of the three-card monte that con men use to confound suckers on big-city streets.

At the conclusion of the most recent fiscal year, for example, the government boasted of a \$2 billion cut in federal expenditures produced by a late reduction in the military budget.

How was it accomplished? The Defense Department's regular pay checks were scheduled to be dated and issued on Sept. 30, the last day of the 1987 fiscal year. The 'savings" were achieved through a one-day postponement that pushed the expenditures into the 1988 fiscal year.

Over the years, uncounted billions of dollars worth of government transactions have been shunted into assorted "off-budget" categories that technically-but only technically-are not part of the unified federal budget.

There are off-budget trust funds for everything from Social Security to airport construction and offbudget loan guarantee funds for students, farmers, home owners and others.

Nowhere is there a greater concentration of financial gimmickry than in the omnibus appropriations and deficit reduction measures that Congress approved just before it adjourned in late December and Reagan then signed into law.

Those laws mandate some genuine savings, to the extent that they impose restraint on the future expansion of agricultural subsidies. medical care reimbursement and other fast-growing components of the federal budget.

More than \$1 billion of the reductions promised during the next two years, however, are to be achieved by delaying or deferring expenditures.

Bill Limits Liability

WASHINGTON (NEA) - U.S. industries, stung by hundred of millions of dollars in judgments against them in product liability lawsuits. are demanding new legal protections from Congress and state legislatures.

The Uniform Product Safety Act of 1987 - potentially the most important of such liability legislation - is pending in the House of Representatives. This bill would limit the grounds on which a manufacturer could be sued for a defective product and restrict the amount a plaintiff could collect.

If passed, the bill would establish four types of product liability actions: construction defects, design defects, warranty violations and inadequate warnings. It would set standards for each type of claim and limit the amounts that could be recovered under each type.

Further, the bill would stipulate that manufacturers are not liable if their products are operated by someone under the influence of drugs or alcohol. It would also exempt manufacturers of prescription drugs and medical devices if, at the time of manufacture, their products were approved by the Food and Drug Administration. It would set up a mediation process and panels of arbitrators to hear cases instead of allowing suits in court

The bill's major provision would set up a common defense in product liability cases stating that a manufacturer could not be held liable if his product met current federally mandated safety standards, if the manufacture "did not know and could not reasonably know" that the product was defective, or if "no practical and technically feasible alternative design" was available. The latter is known as the 'state-of-the-art" defense,

The debate in Congress over a product liability limitation law is an old one. Various bills have been pending since 1981, but real movement toward passage started only after 300 companies, trade

associations and professional groups formed the American Tort Reform Association and put huge amounts of money behind a lobbying effort.

The Reagan administration has also entered the debate - on the manufacturers' side. A Justice Department Task Force examining the issue has proposed a series of recommendations, including a \$100,000 limit on pain and sufferthe claims and a new formula that would cut lawyers' fees by half.

Manufacturers say they need some common federal standard that will allow them to manufacture products to be sold in all 50 states. But consumer groups and lawyers associations representing plaintiffs say the proposed law is not about uniform standards. They claim the law would give companies new defenses against lawsuits, allowing them to market more unsafe products and avoid legal responsibility for manufacturing defective products that cause injury.

Proponents of the legislation claim it is actually pro-consumer because, through its mediation system, consumers could autokly collect for real damages and would not have to pay huge legal fees. They also claim that fear of product hability suits is making drug makers reluctant to market new lifesaving medicines.

Consumer groups scott at these arguments. Ralph Nader has called the bill "the most anti-consumer piece of legislation I have ever seen." Consumer advocates argue that if the bill had been law in the past, claimants would not have been able to collect for the defective Dalkon Shield IUD device, detective automobile designs like the Ford Pinto with its exploding gas tanks. or defective drugs like DES.

A highly pro-industry version of the bill has been approved in subcommittee. Its sponsors premier that some changes demanded by consumer groups will be made in the full committee

Back Pain Exercise

UPI Feature Writer MIAMI (UPI) - Dr. David Lehrman has some advice for the 75 million Americans with chronic aching backs: Get up off that operating table, stand up straight and start exercising those lazy

This is clearly not what you would expect to hear from a back surgeon.

Although Lehrman is chief of orthopedic surgery at St. Francis Hospital, Miami Beach, he is convinced that back surgery is inappropriate for 98 percent of back pain sufferers and that education and exercise will usually work better.

People just don't understand their backs, he laments.

The back supports the weight of the entire upper part of the body and forms the pivot for all human movement. It is basically a stack of bones joined together by clastic fibrous discs.

disc gets clobbered in some form. It can tear, crack, puncture, crush. You do bad things because of the way you sit, bend and carry things," said Lehrman. Lehrman used to recommend traditional treatments, like bed rest.

"The disc is the bottom line. The

medication, X-rays and surgery, but found this approach usually turned into a victous cycle of diagnosis and Eighty percent of patients

experiencing their first acute back pain get better in 90 days with or without treatment, but the pain almost always returns, he said. "You go back to the doctor. The

doctor prescribes bed rest, pills," Lehrman said, or would perhaps "put you in the hospital for two or three weeks, run up all that money If you do all that and continue to hurt, you become a bane in his existance

"He sends you to a psychiatrist. He finds something - we're all neurotic in some way - and by then the patient is depressed and frustrated because he's been in pain for six weeks. The psychiatrist reinforces that: He puts him on pills. he gets drowsy, can't work and still has back pain.

"If you're really lucky there's a positive finding and something to cut and it works," Lehrman said. Patients who don't improve with surgery may be left "permanently maimed and suffering. They've got a scar and their back still hurts.

Lehrman was converted to exercise therapy when his wife *Anda cured her disabling back pain that way, avoiding the surgery her doctors had recommended.

Hatred Boils In Mideast Valley

WASHINGTON-Even as this is written, revolutionary zealots are plotting acts of terrorism against Americans. They have been enlisted in an underground war against the United States by Iran's Ayatollah Khomeint. He has ordered his terrorist legions to strike back at the "Great Satan," as he describes America, for sending a naval force into the Persian Gulf.

This message was addressed to us and delivered to our associate Barbara Newman by Hussein Musawi, the terrorist operations chief in the terrorist stronghold of Baalbek, Lebanon. Two newsmen have already been grabbed by terrorists in Lebanon. Yet Newman. traveling with a trigger-ready escort of bodyguards arranged by a Lebanese warlord, recently visited Baalbek itself.

She has kept in touch with the warlord. Ellie Hobeika, whose own headquarters is located in

Lebanon's forbidden Bekaa Valley. not far from Baalbek. The message from the terrorist stronghold has been confirmed by intelligence sources. They agree that Khomeini's terrorists are preparing to strike against U.S. targets in the Mideast. Europe and perhaps America itself.

He has become an agitating force sweeping across Shiite villages, the amplified voice of their frustrations and yearnings, the symbol of shames avenged and foreigners defied.

His trained terrorists operate under various names to confuse their adversaries and to accommodate rival clans. In Lebanon, the motley terrorist bands are governed by a secret body called the Council of Lebanon, made up of Shrite mullahs, revolutionary guards and terrorist chiefs. The operational orders, like commands from on high, come from Iran.

The dominant terrorist group is Hezbollah, the "Party of God." From former terrorists who lost their enthusiasm for suicide missions. Newman learned that Hezbollah's security chief. Imad-Mughnyah, has custody of most foreign hostages. They are held in basement cells in the Sheikh Abdullah barracks.

One exception is Anglican envoy Terry Waite, who flew to Lebanon on a mercy mission to negotiate the hostages' release and is now himself a prize hostage. He's reportedly still alive, though in poor health, under close guard in the Shitte section of Beirut. Newman was told he'll be among the last to be released, because the terrorists are angry at Britain. Apparently they also believe their own propaganda: that he's a CIA spy.

Planes Crash In Ice, Snow; Five Killed But Four Survive

By United Press International

Ice may have caused a plane to crash at the Burlington. Vt., airport, killing two people and critically injuring three children, and searchers found three bodies and one survivor in the wreckage of a plane in snowy Oregon.

A small plane believed to be carrying five members of a family crashed while trying to land Thursday at Burlington International Airport. An airport official said the pilot of the single-engine Piper Arrow radioed the airport saying the plane's wings were leing up and requesting permission to make an emergency landing.

Authorities said all five victims had been identified, but their names were withheld until relatives could be notified. Authorities said all five victims were believed to be members of the same family.

Near Scotts Mills, Ore., Thursday, searchers found the wreckage of a small plane that crashed with four people aboard in the snow-covered foothills of the Cascades on a flight from San Francisco.

Timothy Edmon, 17, of Lewisburg, W. Va., was the only survivor, said Jerry Eames of the state Aeronautics Division. Edmon was taken by helicopter to the Oregon Health Sciences University Hospital, where he was reported in critical condition. He underwent surgery for two broken legs.

Killer's Wife Planned To Leave

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (UPI) - A family friend said the wife of accused killer Ronald Gene Simmons intended to run away with their children, and police were investigating whether the worst family mass murder in U.S. history was carried out to stop her.

Nine of Simmons' 16 victims were buried in four separate ceremonies around Arkansas Thursday, and the state medical examiner released a preliminary autopsy report on the 14 relatives killed in the rampage.

The report showed all six of the adult relatives were shot to death and the eight teenagers and children were strangled or smothered, said prosecuting attorney John

Simmons, 47, held without bond on two capital murder charges, was moved Wednesday from the county jail in Russellville, site of the killings 50 miles north of Little Rock in the Ozark mountains, to a unit of the Arkansas State Hospital for the criminally insane for a monthlong

Betty Ford Continues To Improve

RANCHO MIRAGE, Calif. (UPI) - Former first lady Betty Ford, whose incision from an open-heart operation six weeks ago had reopened, was "doing well" after surgery to close the wound, hospital officials said.

"She really looks good. I'm really relieved," family spokesman Bob Barrett said Thursday, quoting former President Gerald Ford. Barrett said Ford visited his wife for 40 nifrutes early Thursday, following two hours of surgery that began Wednesday night.

Eisenhower Medical Center spokesman Michael McFadden said the surgery was necessary because an ncision that was made during Mrs. Ford's masectomy in 1974 and reopened during the bypass was healing poorly.

"She's doing well." McFadden said early Thursday "She's back in the cardiac surgical unit. She's in

Barrett said the former first lady was "going to be watched very closely for 48 hours.'

Mrs. Ford, 69, had open heart surgery last month. She was readmitted to the hospital about 8:30 p.m. Tuesday, arriving in an ambulance with her husband.

AIDS Can Be Transmitted By Single Encounter

CHICAGO (UPI) - Although some medical authorities have sold chances of contracting an AIDS virus infection after one sexual encounter with a virus carrier are low, new research indicates it can happen, government researchers reported Thursday.

Scientists from the Centers for Disease Control were puzzled by the findings, which they said suggested that sexual behavior alone does not explain heterosexual transmission of HIV, the virus that causes acquired immune deficiency syndrome.

"There's three basic possibilities," said Dr. Harold Jaffe, of the A mta-based CDC. "There may be some people who are more infectious than others. There may be strains of the virus that are more infectious. Or there may be people who for whatever reason are more susceptible to infection.

"But regardless, the public health message remains the same," he emphasized. "The study shows that heterosexual transmission of HIV does occur. that it can occur in both directions, and that it can occur with only one sexual contact."

Jaffe and his colleagues, reporting in the Journal of the American Medical Association. based their findings on an ongoing study of 106 families of patients who became infected with HIV through blood transfusions. The patients in the study had been infected an average of 31 months.

In 80 of the families, the infected person reported having sex with his or her spouse; two of 25 husbands and 10 of 55 wives subsequently became in-

One infected woman had only a single sexual encounter with her husband, and another had only eight, yet 11 women remained uninfected after more than 200 sexual encounters with their husbands. The uninfected wives actually averaged more sexual contacts than the injected

There were no significant differences in terms of type of sexual contact or methods of contraception, including use of condoms. No other AIDS risk

Atmospheric Ozone Level Is Decreasing, New Study Says

protecting Earth from harmful ultraviolet light diminished 5 percent over the last eight years. but it is unclear whether the drop is the result of pollution or natural phenomena, a scientist

reported Thursday. A long-term study using satellite data showed ozone depletion is not confined to the so-called ozone hole that appears over Antarctica in the southern hemisphere's springtime, but affects the entire stratosphere, said Kenneth Bowman.

"At the present time we aren't able to sort out whether the change is a natural fluctuation or whether it might the result of some kind of human effects or chemistry on the stratosphere." said Bowman, an assistant professor in the department of atmospheric sciences at the University of Illinois at Urbana-

Champaign. The ozone hole, in which ozone content of the Antarctic stratosphere declines by 30 percent to 40 percent in September through November, has

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The been linked by scientific study to atmospheric cushion of ozone air pollutants called chlorofluorocarbons.

These chemicals are employed in a wide variety of manufactured products and processes. They are used as refrigerants in air conditioning systems, refrigerators and freezers and in the making of foam containers for fast foods.

Bowman said the global ozone decrease is "rather large. It's about the same size as the decrease the computer models predicted would result from chlorofluorocarbons, but it's happened much faster than the models would suggest.

"It may suggest there are errors and uncertainties in the models that need to be improved, which is no surprise to scientists.

Scientists estimated in the 1960s atmospheric ozone grew roughly 4 percent, Bowman

Atmospheric ozone in the satellite age reached a maximum around 1970, diminished, and then reached a similar peak in 1979, he said

"Since then, it's been downhill pretty dramatically," he said. The data Bowman used for his

report, published in the journal Science, covered the years 1979 to 1986. "Over this period, eight years, the decrease has been about 5 percent," he said.

Ozone content seemed to begin increasing in 1986, indicating an upward trend may be in the making, but data not included in the published paper showed 1987 levels were down again, even lower than 1985, Bowman said.

It's going to be very important to continue making ozone measurements over next few years." he said.

Ozone, though a pollutant at ground level, filters out harmful ultraviolet light from the sun and thus serves as a partial shield against skin cancer. What implication the fluctuations have for the incidence of this disease is under investigation.

Although others have also documented declines in global ozone, Bowman said his was the first to chart trends over eight

Pre-Dawn Bangkok Hotel Fire Kills 13 Foreign Tourists

BANGKOK. Thailand (UPI) - Fire possibly started by a discarded cirgarette during a New Year's Eve party gutted a 218 room Bangkok hotel before dawn today, killing 13 foreign tourists, including one American, and injuring 78 others, police said.

Police said 13 bodies had been recovered, including that of a woman who fell 100 feet to her death from a helicopter plucking people from the roof of the nine-story First Hotel in mid-town Bangkok.

Fire officials said the fire safety system in the hotel was inadequate, even for a small blaze, and survivors said they did not hear any alarm or see any extinguishers.

U.S. Protests Ochoa's Release

BOGOTA, Colombia (UPI) - The Colombian government, under fire from the United States for releasing reputed drug baron Jorge Luis Ochoa from jail, fired two prison officials and pressed its search to recapture him.

Foreign Ministry officials Thursday confirmed receipt of a protest note from the State Department describing Ochoa's release Wednesday as "repugnant." The alleged billionaire cocaine kingpin has long been sought by the United States on drug smuggling charges.

Study Shows Criminals Are Serving More Time

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The parole during 1984 the total average criminal released from prison in 1984 served less than half his court-ordered sentence, an average of five years for but those entering prison in 33 states that same year could expect to spend longer, a government report says.

According to the report released Wednesday by the Justice Department's Bureau of Justice Statistics, the average term for those going into prison in 1984 was expected to jump to one year and 11 months while violent offenders could count on almost three years.

The study said the average prison term served by the 159,000 people released in 1984 - 94 percent of them male -

was one year and five months. The sentences ranged from an average of 6.5 years for murder and manslaughter to one year and four months for drug trafficking. The median time served for rape was three years and eight months for robbery, 25 years, and burglary, one year and five months.

Men, the study said, generally served longer than women for each offense, but in all cases. most served only half their

original sentences. "Most offenders released from prison that year had served a little less than one half of their court-ordered maximum sentences," said bureau director Steven Schlesinger, "The median time served was 45 percent of their maximum sentences."

The statistics surveyed the time prisoners in 33 states. about 76 percent of all those released that year, served behind bars, and said the jail and prison time accounted for about threefifths of the total time served. and the other two fifths was spent on parole.

The median time served for those released for their first time in 1984 was two months less than the year before, it said.

The report showed that those who had been incarcerated before for felonies served somewhat longer than those with no prior record. For violent offenders, it said, the difference was six months; for property offenders it was three months and for drug

convictions, one month. For people discharged from

amount of jail, prison and parole time served was estimated to be violent crimes, 3.5 years for drug offenses and three years and one month for property crimes

The study said corrections officials estimated that people entering prison in 1984, however, might spend more time behind bars, expecting a median term of about two years. Those imprisoned for murder or manslaughter would serve 15 months, rapists four years and robbers two years and 11

months, it said Among those released from prison in 1984, 94 percent were male, and more than two thirds had not completed high school. Their average age was 28, and about 54 percent were white and 45 percent black.

Among those discharged from parole during the year, about 75 percent of the men and 84. percent of the women had completed full parole terms, the study said



Mira, O'Neill Will Not Partake In Orange Bowl

MIAMI (UPI) - Suspended Miami players George Mira Jr. and John O'Neill failed Thursday in their penultimate bid to partake in the Orange Bowl, with the game that will decide the national title 24 hours away.

The NCAA denied a request to reinstate the two players for Friday night's game between No. 1 Oklahoma and No. 2 Miami. A circuit-court hearing on the matter was recessed until 9 a.m. EST Friday, however, as the players sought a final avenue to compete.

Mira, a starting linebacker, and O'Neill, a starting tackle, were suspended last week for failing a Dec. 11 NCAA drug test, showing diuretics in their systems. Diuretics help remove body fluids and are believed to hide steroids.

A day-long hearing before Dade County Circuit Judge Michael Salmon was interrupted for 90 minutes for a telephone call including the players' representatives, university officils and the 12-member NCAA executive committee. The committee then decided to deny the appeal.

The players' lawyers are attempting to show the players had a medical history of diuretic use and they would receive no advantage in the Orange Bowl from using the drugs earlier in The NCAA said the two players "did not

provide any convincing evidence that such a medical history existed.

"We've got a couple of holes to fill, but we've had to replace people all year long." Auburn Coach Pat Dye said. "We've just got to close ranks and keep on marching."

No. 6 Auburn. 9-1-1, has lost two key players. All-America tackle Tracy Rocker had knee surgery in November, ending his college career. Kevin Porter, an All-Southeastern Conference cornerback, is ineligible for signing with an agent.

Auburn still has roadocks to throw at No. 4 Syracuse, 11-0-0 and one of only three unbeaten and untied major teams. Two of the most formidable players are All-America linebacker Aundray Bruce and linebacker Kurt

Syracuse revolves around All-America quarterback Don McPherson, who passed for 2.341 yards and 22 touchdowns and ran for 5 other TDs.





Don't Be Hasty In Pruning Cold-Damaged Plants

If we get some freezing temperatures this winter, don't be too hasty in pruning colddamaged plants such as hibiscus, allamanda, poinsettia, citrus, philodendrons and other cold-sensitive plants. The extent of cold damage in many instances cannot be distinctly determined until growth starts in spring.

By pruning now, you may cut off live wood. Also, the leaves and stems that are dead afford some protection to those not yet damaged. If you prune this out, later freezes may do more damage than what would have been done if the dead parts were left on the plant. If you do prime now, coverthe rest of the plant during freezing weather to

Although the entire top of some plants may have been killed by freezing, these plants may send up new shoots from the undamaged roots next spring. So don't write the plant off until the warm weather arrives and the plants have a chance to grow again.

Frozen banana stalks and bird of paradise stems may be removed as soon as you can

determine how much is flead. Banana stalks become brown and soft when frozen. New shoots will appear from the ground next spring. With the bird of paradise there is no true stem, only leaf

stalks. These will turn brown soon after freezing.

You may remove them or leave them on for protecting the root system until spring. It is very doubtful that bird of paradise plants which were killed back to the ground will flower next spring or summer. Following a freeze, it generally takes from 12 to 15 months for the plants to flower

again. Freeze damage to citrus is not as easy to

determine in its severity since damage to the trunk may not show up for several months following the cold weather. There are some trees in our area that are still showing damages from the severe freezes that we had years ago. Citrus trees should be pruned as soon as possible after the extent of the damage is determined. As a rule of thumb, you will know where the damage is after the second flush of growth following the

It often takes this long for freeze damage to the trunk to show up in the growth of the plant. In citrus, it is possible to have limited damage to the foliage and severe damage to the trunk. Remember, too, that most citrus is grafted and if the tree is killed back below where the graft is made. the new shoots will again have to be grafted or else you will only get small, poor quality fruit from the rootstock. So, if your citrus is killed back to the ground it will probably not grow back to produce the kind of fruit that it used to produce.

Freeze damage to azaleas may be to the flower buds and stems. Flower bud damage will show up at blooming time as little or no flowers. Stem

damage causes dieback or death of branches in late spring or early summer. Dead azalea branches should be pruned out as they occur.

Camellia damage is probably confined to flower buds and leaf burn. Cold damaged flower buds will either drop from the plant or only partially open with a brown center. Leaf damage on camellias will not be longlasting. As new leaves come out in the spring, the old damaged ones will drop from the plant.

The best protection against extensive cold damage is to keep plants as healthy as possible and provide as much protection as you can during cold weather. However, if all your efforts fail and you lose a plant, don't become discouraged From a landscape standpoint it is better to mix the hardy and tropical or tender plants so that the loss of a few tropicals will not destroy the effect of the entire landscape when some losses occur. If you are interested in planting only hardy plants in your landscaping. there are selection guides available at the Agriculture Center to help you choose the best plant for your location.

For 99th Time, Thousands See The Tournament of Roses Parade

Temperatures in he 30s did little to chill the enthusiasm of the isands of revelers who welcomed the New Year camped out along the route of the 99th Tournament of Roses parade.

The early-birds nestled in folding chairs and sleeping bags to grab choice viewing spots before the full crowd of 1 million showed up for today's parade. and the streets of Pasadena turned into a miles-long New Years Eve party.

Undaunted by overnight lows in the mid-30s, the spectators began crowding the parade route Wednesday and thousands more filled the sidewalks late Thursday to await the the morning's floral extravaganza.

Although fans were legally prohibited from camping on the city's sidewalks before noon Thursday, police in most cases looked the other way and let the early-birds remain. By Thursday night, speciators with sleeping bags, folding chairs and barbecue cookers lined Colorado Boulevard, the parade's main

"There are several thousand (campers) out there." Pasadena police spokeswoman Mary Schander said Thursday night.

By 2:30 a.m. today, police had arrested 254 people, most for public drunkeness, Schander said. Last year, more than 400 were arrested before the parade ended.

The National Weather Service predicted high clouds with temperatures in the high 40s for parade-time. By kickoff time for the Rose Bowl match between the University of Southern California and Michigan State temperatures were expected to be near 60.

Rain has fallen on the parade only seven times in its long history. Forecasters predicted some moisture north of the area today but no rain in Pasadena.

The coldest December in Southern California history initially held down the pool of volunteer float decorators and spawned fears that a flower shortage would force builders of many of the 60 floats - each requires more than 100,000 flowers — to fill the breach with fruits and vegetables

But after organizers put out a public call, the number of volunteers more than doubled to 2,500 Wednesday, when they began putting the finishing touches on the floats.

events for the parade, said the threatened flower shortage was exaggerated since most float builders get their flowers from suppliers who grow them indoors or outside the area.

This will never turn into the Vegetable Parade," Walleck said. 'The Tournament of Roses is a floral procession."

The two-hour parade covers a 5.5-mile route through a city whose population of 130,000 increases nearly tenfold on New Year's Day.

This year's theme is "Thanks for Communications," a tribute to the news media, which have transformed what was an ambitious community social into one of the most watched annual events in the world.

The parade and ensuing 74th Rose Bowl was to be viewed by a projected worldwide TV audience of 300 million in 40 nations. In addition to the floral smorgasbord on floats, 22 marching bands and 275 horses and riders participated.

This year's grand marshal is Academy Award-winning actor Gregory Peck, riding in a 1931 Bugatti Royale, worth an estimated \$8.1 million, with his French-born wife of 32 years, Veronique.

It's been said that the only thing that separates the men from the boys is the price of their

But that can't be true when they are playing with the sa toys.

Men who continue to build plastic models, such as those they made as boys and those that their own youngsters might build. bring a degree of seriousness and adult skills when approaching what might seem child's play.

Robert O'Connor, 34, of Deltona, has returned to one of his boyhood habies and, over the past eight years, has been building plastic models. His favorite subject is modern military armor and attack helicopters and he says that he isn't the only adult interested in this pastime.

It's a hobby, O'Connor said, which for most adults becomes one of historical research as well as use of refined techniques and tools to create exact mini-size duplicates of whatever type subject the modeler fancies, which is usually a mode of

transportation.

For some, the pursuit of the history and detail behind a model, and the execution of its design becomes an obsession, O'Connor said.

It's not nearly as costly and doesn't require the same type of skills needed to acquire and restore the real thing. That's something, O'Connor said, he

isn't prepared to pursue, so he is

happy as a model maker. For him it's just a relaxing hobby on which he might spend one or two hours each evening.

Or he might become frustrated with his model and set it aside for three or four weeks, he said.

Many adult modelers work from the same basic plastic kits as children do and which are available to both at hobby shops. The cost of a kit can range from about \$2 to about \$150. But the end results depend on the time and effort expended by the modeler, who will generally end up with a model valued at \$50 or more.

But O'Connor and fellow modeler Raiph Salerno, who specializes in models of World War II armor and artillery, said that the adult modeler pushes the basics beyond the limits of the kits and adds details that may have even been left out of the kit. The modeler may know the item he is working on even better than the kit maker, and may, O'Connor said, end up correcting errors in the kit maker's design.

Some modelers also make their models from "scratch." O'Connor said he invested three years in research and development of a "scratch" model of a contemporary Swedish S Tank, which is not available in kit form.

"I did it just because it's different. I've got the only one in the world. It's true," O'Connor

said. He said he wouldn't part with that tank, although some modelers do sell their products.

O'Connor said he felt pushed to complete that tank to meet a show deadline. "You have to put it in perspective. It should be relaxing and a pleasure. If it becomes anything beyond that some guys become obsessed and go into it heart and soul. I don't. I enjoy it, but if it interfered with my work or homelife, no. I enjoy it and want to continue it as something pleasant. It reduces stress to work on a model, so it shouldn't create stress."

Salerno, 48, of Altamonte Springs, also returned to his childhood hobby of building models about eight years ago. He said that he and O'Connor, as well as other adult hobbyists, are well equipped to produce perfect plastic replicas of the vehicles, ships, weapons and other large-scale machines. These hobbyists come from all walks of life, with many having past links to military service or

aircraft-oriented work.

Salerno has completed about 100 model kits over the last eight years and has a stash of 150 yet to be built. He said that he and O'Connor both have extensive supplies of model paints, plus an airbrush system to apply the paint.

O'Connor, during that same time period has completed about 125 models, with only his Swedish S Tank having been made from

Once Salerno starts putting together a model he might work 16 hours during a weekend. He said he doen't like to work on his hobby for one or two hours each evening. He prefers spending fewer, but longer periods making

Modelers, Salerno said, work with miniature versions of most tools as well as with a Dremel kit — "virtually any tool you can think of, drills, saws, knives. One member of our club has a miniature lathe."

Both Salerno and O'Connor. along with about 40 other Central Florida hobbyists belong to the International Plastic Modelers' Society. That club, with annual local dues of \$10 a year and national dues of \$25 a year, meets the third Monday of each month at the Aloma United Methodist Church, State Road 436 at Aloma Avenue, Winter Park. The meetings start at 7 p.m.

O'Connor, who is vice president of the club, said it's one of about 100 chapters in the nation and members and other modelers meet at competitions where their work is judged and compared. The local chapter is planning to sponsor its second such convention in October, and it is expected to draw 100 entrants who will show a total of 200 to 300 models of various types.

When it comes to their hobby, modelers think small, and O'Conner said they have to have patience, a sharp eye and a steady hand.

Accomplished Aussie

'Dynasty' Welcomes James Healey

HOLLYWOOD (NEA) - Nobody can say James Healey hasn't paid his dues.

The 35-year-old Dublinborn. Australian-bred actor. who plays Joan Collins' new husband on "Dynasty," has taken a lot of knocks literally - on his way to stardom.

In college, Healey's drama teacher told him he'd never make it as an actor and kicked him out of the program. The exact term the teacher used to describe Healey's talent was "industrial waste."

To earn a ticket to acting school in London. Healey worked in a nickel mine in western Australia, where the mining company charged the workers exorbitant prices for food and laundry. To earn extra money for air fare. Healey tried amateur boxing and got beat up by his opponent - and the angry spectators.

After Healey finally reached London, his suitcase and money were stolen on his first night in town, and he ended up sleeping in Hyde Park. Healey promptly came down with pneumonia.

The prestigious Royal Academy of Dramatic Art accepted the struggling thespian. and he got to play all the classic roles, from Shakespeare to Moliere.

So when he was offered the starring role in a low-budget sci-fi thriller back home in Australia in 1979, Healey turned it down. He loved Shakespeare's language: the lead in the Australian film had less than a dozen lines of

The name of the film was 'Mad Max," and it turned fellow Aussie Mel Gibson into an international superstar.

Healey says he doesn't regret his decision, although at times during his lean years he will confess to some second thoughts.

Waiting for the tube (in London), freezing to death -1had bronchitis - I'd look up and see 'Mad Max' on a billboard and wonder if I had made a mistake.

"But I don't really regret my choices. If I had done 'Max.' which was really only 10 lines and a lot of sweating in the desert, I would have had to turn down 'Hamlet. 'Macbeth,' 'King Lear' and 'Long Day's Journey Into Night.

In 1985, Healey moved to the United States at the urging of his American-born girlfriend, Constance Landsburg, who he says is a big star in Australia.

"She gave up everything to move with me," he says. "I was terrified of coming here. with no agent and \$52 in my pocket. I was terrified of ending up on skid row like I did in London."

Healey's fear was unfounded. American TV producers love a British accent. and Healey, after years of starving in London, found himself on the daytime soap "The Young and the Restless" within three weeks of his arrival here. Universal then put him under contract and cast him in a pilot, which it failed to sell to a network.

Despite his love of classical

theater, Healey didn't hesitate when he was offered the part of Sean Rowan, Alexis Carrington's lover on "Dynasty."

Who wouldn't give his right hand to play opposite Joan Collins?" he asks.

"On the set, she treats me like I'm Laurence Olivier. I owe Joan a lot. She had casting approval.

"I remember when I worked in the mines, I'd watch TV and see all these Americans with fancy cars in luxurious settings and say, "That's the life!" And then after all these years to find yourself in bed with one of those people" on the set.

With refreshing honesty, Healey volunteers another reason for abandoning the theater's Bard for TV's bawd.

"I've been acting for 14 years, since I was a kid, and Shakespeare doesn't pay the rent. Shakespeare has never paid anybody's rent. I'll be 36 in June, and there comes a time when you have to go out there and get some security.



The movie, which began filming earlier this month. features Willis as a New York City cop trapped in a Los Angeles high rise office tower seized by terrorists on Christmas Eve.

"Die Hard" will be produced by Lawrence Gordon and Joel Silver and directed by John McTiernan, the same trio who produced last summer's \$55 million hit, "Predator." Willis made his feature film debut last spring in "Blind Date."

NEW YORK (UPI) - Even some of Linda Ronstadt's most devoted fans have reacted with surprise to her latest album. "Canciones de mi Padre," a collection of Mexican folk songs.

People seem to find it hard to believe that the pristinevotced singer, fresh from a series of Jush Nelson Riddlearranged albums featuring classic pre-rock pop songs. chose to make a Spanishlanguage record backed by a mariachi orchestra.

But this is the record Ronstadt has always wanted to make, a tribute to a childhood spent listening to her father playing these songs and joining in family songlests with her brothers and sister.

"All of my records have been egitimate expressions of my personality," Ronstadt said during a rehearsal break of her recent "Saturday Night Live" appearance, "but this is the part of me that incorporates all the facets. It's the anchor,

"People say to me this is such a departure from rock 'n' roll. But rock in roll was the departure for me. That was hard to learn. I didn't hear that until I was about six or seven. so that came relatively late to

Ronstadt remembered her father singing many of the songs on "Canciones de mi-Padre," accompanying himself on a battered upright plano in the living room of their Artzona home.

'On Sunday afternoons, it was my father's mind with the piano, he was thinking, he was relaxing and he would play these songs, everything in the key of C. He had the best voice in the family," she said.

Music was a family legacy. Ronstadt's grandfather once led a martachi orchestra in Tucson, "His main instrument was the flute," she said. "but he also played guitar and taught my father, who in turn taught us to play guitar.

Music was always there in cay childhood if I heard something I was drawn to it. When you're a little kid you can't gointo a bar where the martachis play, but the bars all had open doors and you could follow down the street listening to them, or hear through the walls." Ronstadt also recalled the family outings her father organized that would turn into musical adventures. "My dad has a great big voice," she said, "and he knows all these songs and he loves to sing with mariachis, so wherever we were, the mariachis were there and my dad would sing with them. We always listened."

The family excursions also helped her develop a deep understanding of Mexican culture.

'There's a tribe of Indians that live in the mountains of

Mexico near Guadalajara." she recalled, "and we'd drive through that high mountain pass. They play a flute with a little drum that hangs from the end that they play with the little finger, to keep the time.

"You hear a melody being played ... and the drum is playing this little accent, and the accent is the same rhythmic accent that you hear the bass play in the martachi guitarron.

The music was always just there. It didn't occur to me that other people didn't latch onto it like I did until I grew up. Everyone in my family reacted the same way, they all played and sang."

The new record is her way of reliving those memories. "We've been talking about this for 20 years," she said. "It's something I always wanted to

"My father found this article that he had saved from when I was about 22, right after 'Different Drum' came out. The writer asked me what was my goal as a singer, and I said. To be the world's greatest Mexican singer.' He asked me who my major influence was and I told him Lola Beltran. because she was the major influence on my singing, as a pop artist she influenced me

She is the person that I made the most conscious effort to imitate when I was trying to be a singer. I always wanted to learn the songs she sang. My father was a fan of hers and he introduced me to her records."

Now Ronstadt performs in front of the same musicians who back her idol. She had some difficulty mastering the Mexican vocal discipline, but her childhood dream kept her going.

"I knew it to sing along with it in terms of family singing. which is not quite the same as standing in front of the greatest mariachi band in the world, singing the lead, but it's a knowledge and awareness of it and a very deep feeling for it from the time that I was born.

"Armed with that I was able to sit down for three years and work with the mariachis and listen to records and do everything that I could to refine my knowledge of it and make it presentable.

"Three years ago I set my clock and said get learning. started getting the songs, learning the lyries, you can't just go down ... and find sheet music to a folk song that a handful of ranchers know. So I'd find them here and there. my father knew some of the

Developing the vocal technique without being fluent in Spanish was a timeconsuming process. "It would take me 15 to 30 hours to learn a song," she explained, just to sit down with my tape. player and go over it and over

it and over it until the muscles in my mouth knew what to do.

"I taped all of my father's records for research, I'd sit on my exercycle in the gym. every day I do this hour on the bike, and I'd listen to this music, completely engrossed in it, understanding the rhythms, getting into the accents, just letting the flow of it get into my veins so that it's natural. That's how I studied

Even though she had the emotional background to sing these songs, she still had to work hard on the technical aspects. "The feeling is automatic, that's your dream. The hard thing is getting your muscles to express it automatically, and that's what you have to practice. It's hard for me to roll an 'r' after the 's." I learned to drop the 's' like the Cubans do.'

The next task was testing the material in performances.

"I started about three years ago playing the mariachifestivals in Tucson and Los Angeles and San Antonio in order to meet the musicians and find somebody to help me produce the record," she said.

Her maestro turned out to be the great Ruben Fuentes. "He's the godfather of music in Mexico," Ronstadt said. "He was the only guy to get and the Martachi Vargas were the band. The four great martachibands all did it together as kind of a joint project.

"Ruben was the partner of the son of the man who founded this band, Martachi Vargas, in the 19th century. He was the guy who took these real raw, folky traditional things and organized them without compromising their tolkloric authenticity. He's really responsible for establishing the tradition of the martachi as we know it
