Progress in Southeast

Columbus, Ga., Feb. 16 The Industrial Index says in its issue for this week: "Of much importance is the continual increase in the substantial development of large acreages and of suburban sections in the southeast. A company of Pittsburgh, Pa., has purchased a tract of 17,000 acres in Mobile county, Alabama, and has begun to prepare for immediate development. 7,000 acres will be planted in oranges and pecans, and it is expected to grow 10,000 bushels of potatoes this year for the early market. A Jacksonville, Fla., company has purchased a tract of 400 acres adjoining the city of Savannah and will develop it as a residence section. Investors of Philadelphia, Pa., purchased a beach property of 450 acres at Miami, Fla., at a stated price of about \$150,000, and will develop it along unique lines, the property having a fine frontage of one mile. These illustrate the investments that are being made in acreages and in suburban tracts in the southeast, though in many instances farm tracts are being bought with the purpose of dividing into small acreages for colonists. Growth in the volume of construction operations in the southeast continues steadily. A substantial plant is being prepared for a \$250,000 cotton compress and warehouse system to be built in August, Ga. Jefferson Davis parish, Louisiana, has awarded a contract for the construction of a courthouse to cost \$80,000. A total of 16 corporations have been formed in the week with minimum capital stocks aggregating \$874,000. Titlow, Ga., will vote upon the purchase of \$20,000 of paving school and waterworks construction bonds and American, Ga., on \$30,000 of improvement bonds. Laurel, Miss., will issue \$25,000 worth of bonds. Among the items of construction work to be done, as reported this week are: Apartment house, Augusta, Ga.; bridges, Jacksonville, Fla.; Chickasaw county, Ala.; Forsyth and Hill counties, Ga.; church building, Brookhaven, Miss.; Lufkin, Ga.; and Tusculum, Ala.; courthouse, Harrison, Miss.; factory building, Georgia, Ala.; parking, Bartow, Fla.; roads, Wilcox county, Ala.; Hind county, Miss.; school buildings, Anniston and Chatham, Ala.; Charlesdale, Miss.; Ft. Myers, Fla.; and Greenville and Ridge Springs, S. C.; sewers, Alexander City and Birmingham, Ala.; and Laurel, Miss.; tract improvement, Columbus, Ga.; theater building, Miami, Fla.; cotton compress, McDonough, Ga.; factory, Gulfport, Fla.; brick and lumber plants, West Point, Miss.; knitting mill, Bowersville, S. C.; screen factory, East Point, Ga.; lumber plant, Point Washington, Fla.; and Stokes, S. C.; wood working plant, Zolfo, Fla.; dairy, Savannah, Ga."

COLD HELPED CELERY

South Florida Growers Not Injured By Weather

The official temperatures recorded at the weather bureau last night were not quite as low for Tampa as those of Monday night though heavier frost was recorded and reports from various sections of damage to Irish potatoes, beans and tomatoes have come in. The temperature at Eufras went down to 30 degrees which is unusually cold for that section. The coldest snap of the winter was passed with little damage done.

Local frozing temperatures were reported in the vicinity of Tampa and one man brought a tin can to the Times office which he had left on his porch, containing water, and this morning an eighth of an inch of ice was frozen across the top.

No reports have come in of damage to crops or livestock, but celery growers were heated by the frost. Tampa Times.

clear and warmer with a minimum temperature not lower than 40 degrees and warmer weather for Thursday. Frost is expected for tonight but anything that escaped Monday's and Tuesday's cold snap are not likely to be damaged.

Frost was much heavier in the trucking sections near the city than in the city itself, it is stated by growers, and considerable damage was done. Beans, tomatoes, peppers and nearly all truck except celery was badly "burned" by the frost and in many cases entirely killed. Celery was not hurt or but slightly and many truck growers figure that the gain in the value of celery will perhaps offset the loss on other truck, which will be of little consolation to the man who has no celery, however.

Due to many conditions the temperature is generally higher in the city than near it. This is thought to be due to the smoke which forms in the city and prevents frost and the diffusion of heat during the night by the brick streets and buildings that have been taking it during the day. At any rate it is certain that lower temperatures are always recorded in the country than in the city.

Celery growers reported that this product would be greatly enhanced in value because of the fact that it is about the only truck left undamaged by the frost. Tampa Times.

Matland Inn Destroyed

Firemen rescued from all parts of the country are being temporarily sheltered in private houses, five buildings have been destroyed, and loss estimated at from twenty to thirty thousand dollars are the results of two separate outbreaks at M. and Matland in the city Wednesday.

land Inn, and two cottages operated in connection, and occupied by guests of the Inn, and for a time threatening to destroy another cottage on the grounds, the Episcopal rectory, and the residence of Miss L. R. Baker.

Only heroic work by the amateur fire fighters prevented the destruction of these buildings. The Inn and the two cottages were totally destroyed.

Although no lives were lost, there were a number of very narrow escapes several guests among them two elderly ladies who were rescued from the third floor, and the same stricken guests imperilled their lives in dashing through the flames to get out so quickly did the fire envelop the wooden structure.

Absolutely nothing from the Inn was saved except a few pieces of worthless glassware from the kitchen. All of the baggage, clothes and personal belongings of the guests perished, save what they happened to have on them at the time of the outbreak of the fire. It is said that thousands of dollars in jewelry and other valuables were lost. One party with twelve trunks lost everything.

The fire originated in a defective flue in the basement and spread quickly to all parts of the building the roof collapsing just one hour from the beginning of the fire.

The building is a complete loss as the \$10,000 insurance, which expired one month ago, had not been renewed. Tampa Times.



The temperature at Euclid went down to 30 degrees, which is unusually cold for that section. The coldest snap of the winter was passed with little damage done.

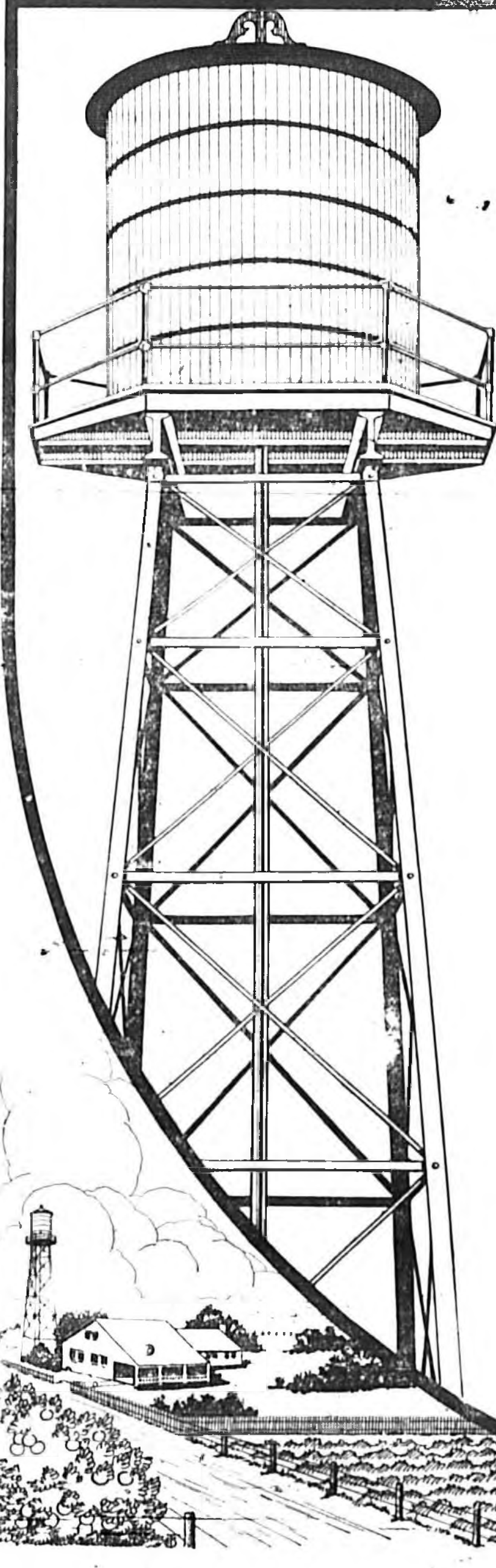

which basis it is now suggested that you agree upon for the 1916 assessment greater uniformity and better equalization of tax assessments in all parts of the state will be brought about.

In view of the fact that we have certain fixed millages that cannot be reduced except by the legislature and a constitutional amendment, to raise the 1916 assessment to a basis double that of last year would necessarily mean a large increase in the amount of taxes that the tax assessors would have to pay. The increase on account of the one mill state school tax and the one-half mill state school tax which I have no authority to reduce would be four hundred and fifty thousand dollars in these two funds alone. This would represent the increase in state taxes while there would also be a considerable increase in some features of the county taxes. Considering all the conditions I do not think the taxpayers of the state should be subjected to such decided raise in taxes, which would certainly amount to not less than half a million dollars increase and probably as much as a million dollars or more increase in state and county taxes over what was paid last year and it was to prevent this unnecessary increase in taxation that I took this matter up with the state tax commission and am now bringing the same to your attention.
