No claus for alarm over UFO sighting

SANFORD — In the light of tonight's full moon, there may be a number of sightings of what could be considered by some as a UFO after sunset. Officials, however, say that there is no cause for alarm.

This is a situation which has occurred on a regular basis in late December of each year, and has not been known to result in any difficulties or pose any danger to residents.

The object, which may appear to be rapidly moving in the night skies between sundown this evening and sun up tomorrow morning, generally resembles a sleigh pulled by eight reindeer.

The size of the objects being reported remains undetermined. Some people have said they were "my reindeer," while others say they were normal size. To date, no reports have indicated any saucer-shaped craft, but rather a more rectangular vehicle with runner-like landing gear.

Several times in the past, when there has been fog over Central Florida, sightings have reported nine reindeer rather than eight. In these cases, the head of the train has a blinking red light attached to its foresection which apparently serves as a warning beacon for aircraft which may be in the sky at the time.

The federal government has reportedly alerted all of its military bases regarding the situation and has issued instructions not to treat these expected sightings as any threat to the security.

Russian exchange student is home with local family

LAKE MARY — It's not necessarily the major headlines that tell us the most about what's happening in our world, sometimes the smaller news items speak much more eloquently of what is going on.

And so it is with this little story about Christmas in Lake Mary.

It concerns 17-year-old Dmitry (Dima) Zinkevich and his loving American family - Pam and Dave Glassburne and their 13-year-old daughter, Laura.

After reading about Dima in this newspaper, the Glassburnes contacted Anne T. Ruddell, the Central Florida regional administrator of the International Cultural Exchange student program.

Ruddell was disappointed that no one was willing to accept Dima because he had Cerebral Palsy.

"If only they knew what a fine, loving boy he is," Ruddell said.

The Glassburnes knew from the start.

"We dread the day when we will lose Dima," Pam Glassburne said on Christmas Eve. "He is a wonderful addition to our family - we could not have hand-picked anyone who fit in better, anyone we could have loved any more."

Every day is better than the next. We believe he is experiencing a most joyful Christmas with us. Years with us. It's our hope that for us with him here, Dima and Laura have brought us closer together, brother and sister, and we know they are no different.

It's wonderful seeing Dima prepare for Christmas. He doesn't where he was born and the religion, persecution. Dima has a love of Christmas. He's really looking forward to this one. He couldn't get over it that he could have a Christmas want list. His No. 1 item is a portable CD player. He is the feeling well.

Dave Glassburne is happy to find out what happened and how soon after Dima came to live with the family.

Glassburne was moving the table in the yard.

Dima, watching from a few yards away, asked if he could take over.

"I will help you from the ground," he told Glassburne.

Lovingly, Glassburne allowed Dima to take over.

Dima attends classes at Lynn High School, and gets a job each morning with Rob Yapp, a neighbor of the Glassburnes who is a teacher at Lynn.

Dima recently won a trophy.

Winners light up Lake Mary

LAKE MARY — If you are out and about this Christmas eve, take time to take in the light displays around town.

The Lake Mary Community Improvement Association has once again identified the best decorated homes in the city, as part of the annual Christmas lighting contest.

The "Best Overall" winner is the Mahaffey residence, at 217 Main Rd., off of South Country Club Road. The "Best Traditional" winner is the D'Amico residence, at 241 N. First St., in downtown Lake Mary, off East Wilbur Avenue. The "Best Joyful" winner is the Williams residence, at 811 Magnolia Lane, in Cardinal Oaks Cove.

The "Best Religious" display winner is the Vorostichk residence, at 522 Stephanie Ct., in Cardinal Oaks. A special recognition award was given to the home at 555 Shady Oaks Cir., a runner-up in the "Best Religious" category.

The winner of the "Whole

Block" category is the residence of Benarac's and their neighbors in the Woodfield subdivision. Sheila Sawyer, president of the CIA, said that a special recognition was also given to the entire subdivision of the Hills of Lake Mary. Sawyer said that this subdivision has consistently, over the years, been a "must see" area for Christmas lights. Several residences in the neighborhood have won awards and Sawyer said she encourages more homeowners to register their homes for judging by the community group.

Early in December, all residents of the city are notified, via the city newsletter, of the categories and rules surrounding the contest. Homeowners and business owners may register their homes or businesses for consideration. In some cases, unregistered homes are chosen as winners as well.

This year, there were no businesses registered, according to Sawyer, except for a special request from city manager John Litton, that the city hall be considered.

The building and grounds have been decorated since the first of the month and Central Park has been the site of several holiday events this year. In addition, the pond in the park shines with a new lighted fountain, a gift to the city from the CIA.

For all of the work done by the

city staff, to prepare this landmark, the CIA decided to give a special recognition to the Lake Mary City Hall.

The winning homes are identified with a yard sign, and they should remain lighted until New Year's Day, giving residents ample time to take in the sights.

Gore's contacts

WASHINGTON — In seeking a White House meeting between Vice President Al Gore and the leader of a Taiwanese Buddhist sect, a Democratic fund-raiser reminded Gore's office of his previous visits with the leader and group members, a document shows.

John Huang set up the meeting in March, a month before Gore attended a controversial fund-raiser at a Buddhist temple in California, which Huang organized. In a memo to a Gore aide, Huang noted that Gore as a senator had met with the Buddhist leader in 1990 in Taiwan and as vice president with some of his followers in 1993 and 1996 in Los Angeles.

The memo, which was among thousands of pages of documents that the Democratic National Committee recently turned over to congressional investigators, suggests that Gore had more extensive contacts with the Buddhist group than previously acknowledged.

Medical marijuana

WASHINGTON — Doctors in Arizona and California who prescribe marijuana for medical use under new state laws may become the targets of stiff penalties by the federal government.

Officials in the drug-fighting federal agencies said Monday that a new plan for federal responses to state laws that permit medical use of marijuana calls for strict enforcement of federal law, including provisions that forbid doctors from prescribing illegal drugs.

"The DEA has the power to take away a doctor's right to prescribe legal narcotics if that privilege is abused," said Drug Enforcement Administration spokeswoman Catherine Shaw. She said that power also could be exercised against doctors who prescribe marijuana, an illegal drug.

Switching roles

WASHINGTON — Democrats and Republicans soon may switch roles in the politically charged ethics investigation of House Speaker Newt Gingrich. This time, Republicans will be shrieking about unconscionable delays.

Democrats are moving to foil Republican plans to quickly end the lengthy case on Jan. 7, when the 106th Congress convenes, party leadership aides said Monday.

GOP leaders want a vote that day to reprimand Gingrich, who on Saturday admitted rules violations, followed by a vote to re-elect him as speaker. But first, the House ethics committee must conduct a hearing and then recommend a penalty.

"We are not interested in having an expedited penalty phase," said a key Democratic leadership aide, willing to discuss the case only on condition of anonymity.

The Democrats blame Republicans for waiting nearly all of 1996 before hiring an outside counsel to probe the financing of the college course Gingrich taught from 1993 to 1996; and for inaction all this year on a separate complaint, accusing the speaker of campaign finance violations.



Restoring Citadel to former glory

HUE, Vietnam — Tran Van Luc hops confidently across the rickety wooden scaffold lashed 50 feet up on the roof of the Imperial Theater.

Using a hammer, he smashes a green beer bottle and then carefully picks out a large, jagged shard and fits it into wet cement to form part of a swirling rooftop mosaic.

"We use the Chinese beer bottles for leaves, because the color looks natural," Luc says, gazing out across the great Citadel of the Vietnamese emperors, a huge complex of classical Chinese-style buildings that have been decaying since suffering through one of the Vietnam War's biggest battles.

But now that Vietnam's communist regime has opened up to the rest of the world, international aid is coming in to help restore the Citadel to its former glory.

"The Citadel is only 200 years old, but it sums up more than 2,000 years of Vietnamese history," says Thai Cong Nguyen, director of the Monuments and Conservation Committee of Hue, a coastal city about 350 miles south of Vietnam's capital, Hanoi.

ORLANDO — Anthony Hunt scored 24 points to lead Youngstown State to an 83-74 victory over Central Florida at the U.C.F. Arena on Monday night. Hunt, who had just six points in the opening period, sparked Youngstown's second-half run with a 3-pointer just 30 seconds into the period. He capped it with a 3-for-3 performance from the free-throw in the final minute to secure the win for Youngstown State (3-5). Both teams shot poorly from the floor in the first half, connecting just over 30 percent. But Central Florida (3-5) cut an early Youngstown State lead with a 12-7 run to finish the half, though the home team trailed 38-37. 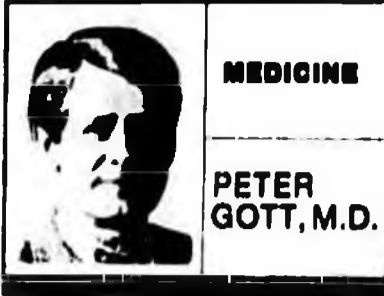

Lyme disease may worsen with time



DEAR DR. GOTT: My son was diagnosed with Lyme disease almost two years ago. He was treated with several prolonged courses of oral antibiotics. After thinking he was cured, he is now experiencing more fever, headache and joint pains. Weren't the antibiotics enough?

DEAR READER: Lyme disease, a bacterial infection spread by the bite of the deer tick (or Lone Star tick in the Southwest), initially causes joint pains and flu-like symptoms, with or without a rash. If treated adequately at this stage (with oral antibiotics), patients recover completely, as a rule.

However, some treated patients — and many undiagnosed and untreated individuals — may progress to the second stage of the disease, characterized by fatigue, malaise, severe arthritis, headache, Bell's palsy (weakness on one side of the face), heart inflammation, and other complications.

Second-stage Lyme disease is puzzling, because it may appear months after the tick bite and is difficult to cure. Treatment ordinarily consists of several weeks of intravenous antibiotic therapy.

Chronic or third-stage Lyme disease — marked by exhaustion, brain inflammation and other serious consequences — is incurable by present techniques.

Without knowing more specifics, I cannot speak with certainty, but I believe that your son may be a treatment-failure that has progressed to the second stage. He needs further blood tests, a cardiogram, and — perhaps — a spinal tap. If the tests confirm Lyme disease, he should have a prolonged course of IV antibiotics.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Which vitamins are harmful if taken in amounts exceeding the Recommended Dietary Allowance?

DEAR READER: Vitamins are trace substances necessary for proper functioning. The RDA is merely a guide that indicates the minimal quantities necessary for good health.

Most vitamins are safe when consumed in amounts even two or three times the RDA. However, so-called "mega doses" above this amount can cause ill health, such as liver inflammation, depending on the vitamin and the magnitude of the dose.

As a general rule, the most troublesome are the fat-soluble vitamins (A, D, E, K) because they are stored in the body's fat cells and can build up to toxic levels.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My 43-year-old son was recently diagnosed with sclerosing cholangitis. Although he has no ill effects at this time, what can we expect in the future?

DEAR READER: Primary sclerosing cholangitis is marked by chronic

affects young men and is often associated with inflammatory bowel disorders, especially ulcerative colitis. The affliction is marked by progressive fatigue, itching and jaundice. The diagnosis is made by special X-ray tests and liver biopsy.

Because symptoms may not develop for up to 10 years, many liver specialists advise only close monitoring with blood tests once or twice a year. Symptoms and complications (such as bacterial infection) are treated as they appear. There is no cure, but patients with PSC are excellent candidates for liver transplants when their own livers begin seriously to malfunction.

At this point, your son is free of symptoms and needs no aggressive therapy. He should follow the recommendations of his gastroenterologist.

WIN AT BRIDGE

An early move

Marianne Moore wrote, "I wonder what Adam and Eve think of it by this time." What was "it"?

In bridge, many deals are settled by the time we have got past Adam and Eve: the first two tricks. That is why one should always form a plan of campaign before playing from the dummy at trick one.

What would be your approach in this six-spade contract? West leads the heart king.

The bidding is difficult. Six spades is an excellent contract, with 12 top tricks — if played correctly! But West's pre-emptive bid took up valuable bidding space. However, this pair had discussed these situations after the strong, artificial and forcing two clubs. North's pass showed some value. (He would double with nothing.) This persuaded South to jump to five spades. And North, with his top trump honor and singleton heart, was happy to raise.

Sudly, South's play didn't match the bidding. After winning the first trick with the heart ace, he ruffed a heart with dummy's spade five. Gleefully, East overruffed and returned a trump. Now South had to lose a heart trick at the end, one down.

As I'm sure you've all seen, if South just ruffs the heart at trick two with dummy's spade ace, the slam is safe. South's 12 tricks are seven spades, one heart, two diamonds, one club and one heart ruff in the dummy. South greedily tried for an overtrick, worth 30 points, and ended up losing his slam, worth 1430 (duplicate and Chicago scoring!).
