# JOHN D. JR. IS NOW OPPOSED

### Staunch Advocate Of Temperance Says He Has ChangedHis Mind AboutDryLaw

NEW YORK, June 7. -(A.P.) - John D. Rockefeller, Jr., lifelong and staunch advocate of temperance, last night branded the Eighteenth Amendment a failure and urged that it be repealed.
He expressed an earnest hope

that a repeal plank, providing ratification by sta conventions, would be incorporated in toth the Republican and Democratic platforms, "thus taking the question out of the field of parisan politics."

"When the Eighteenth Amen ment was passed," he said, "I earnestly hoped, with a host of George A. DeCottes, J. J. Parrish, advocates of temperance, that it would be generally supported by public opinion and thus the day be hastened when the value to society of men with minds and bodies free from the undermining effects of alcohol would be generally realized.

"That this has not been the result. . I have signly and relunctantly come to believe."

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
