Rinker-Stenstrom Field

The Sanford City Commission has unanimously approved the naming of the baseball field at Sanford Memorial Stadium, in honor of Wes Rinker and Julian Stenstrom, both considered driving forces in bringing baseball, at all levels, to the Sanford area.

Stenstrom, noted for many sports stories including those on the pages of the *Sanford Herald*, passed away in May, 1994 and Rinker died in November of this past year. It was stressed that Stenstrom would have objected to having the stadium name changed, as it was named in honor of fallen service personnel.

Rather than the stadium, the baseball field inside the stadium was given the new name. While the agendized request to the Sanford City Commission was to name the field the "Stenstrom-Rinker Field," in making the motion to approve the request, Commissioner Whitey Eckstein turned the names around, and called for the renaming to "Rinker-Stenstrom Field." The request was approved unanimously.

Lotto rollover

No one picked all six numbers Saturday in the Florida Lotto, so the jackpot estimate will roll over to approximately \$17 million for next Saturday.

Even though no one matched all six numbers, there were over 189,000 players who will receive cash for selecting five or less numbers. 153 players picked five numbers, and will receive \$1,768.50 each.

The numbers pulled Saturday, May 10, were 6-12-13-15-41-47.

It's a boy

It happened just in time for Mother's Day. A baby boy was born, 217 pounds seven ounces, 38 inches high and 44 inches long at birth. They are calling him Doc. The Ringling Brothers Circus and the Center for Elephant Conservation have announced the calf was born on May 8, while the circus was in Vienna, Va. The baby will be returned to the Central Florida area Center for Elephant Conservation, a \$5 million breeding and retirement facility. There are presently 27 baby elephants at the facility.

The classes will be held at the Red Cross Seminole Service Center, 705 W. SR-434, Longwood.



It's not a game

Feds favor lottery to decide where your child goes to elementary school

SANFORD — So, you think the Florida Lottery is doing a disservice to education in this state?

There are some who think the U.S. Department of Justice's new Seminole County lottery is even worse.

It's not a game, Seminole County school board member Bob Goff says, but it's becoming a deadly roll of the dice with education in this community.

While the school district has already designed the "controlled choice" program for elementary school students which they felt would help get them out from under the 1970 court-ordered desegregation order, a justice department consultant has designed a new system.

Len Stevens favors a lottery to decide where students will attend school.

Under controlled choice, six of the school district's elementary schools have been divided into two clustered zones which are designed to achieve a racial balance.

Stevens thinks the lottery system will put a better mix into the district schools.

"They're putting a stick in the beehive and stirring it up," Goff said. "They don't even care about the racial issue any more. This isn't

How far away can you drink and pray?

SANFORD — A new Sanford ordinance pertaining to alcoholic beverage sales has still not received final approval.

Attempts are being made to change the distance requirements between establishments serving alcohol and churches, schools, and between each other. Commissioners have discussed various concepts during at least five work sessions.

Finally, the proposal was approved on first reading, but without

specific distances on the document. They were to be added later following the city attorney's review.

The distances finally determined were 500 feet between similar establishments, 1,250 feet between alcohol-sales establishments and churches or schools.

With Commissioner Kerry Lyons fighting against the reductions at all points, the ordinance, with added distances, was finally approved on first reading at the April 28 commission meeting on a four to one vote.



Louis was hero outside the ring

There are less than four dozen people buried in Arlington National Cemetery outside Washington, D.C., who were not military veterans. Today is the birth anniversary of the 39th person for which a presidential exception was granted.

Joe Louis, the "Brown Bomber" was born on May 13, 1914. He was world heavyweight boxing champ from 1937 to 1949.

What history doesn't say about him however, should be brought up. Often, we hope our sports heroes would conduct themselves in such a manner as to be a role model for the younger generations.

This is nothing new. Back in the late '30s and early '40s, there were many youngsters who wanted to be just like "The Champ." But they looked only at

his boxing prowess. Not too many people knew what went on outside the ring, other than his connection with persons considered to be gangsters, reported heavily by the media.

Joe however, had an 80-acre farm just outside the northern city limits of Detroit, and not too far from where I grew up. What was seldom made public was that he turned the farm into what we might call today, a summer camp.

Paying for everything himself, each summer, Joe would bring 20 or 30 youngsters from the ghettos of Detroit out to the farm. They were often orphans. He would provide a few weeks of outdoor life for them, the likes of which many may never have had before. Often, he even bought them clothing. Each summer, there may have been 100 or more youngsters going to the champ's farm.

Gangsters? Yes, there were a few, but many of them had compassion for the downtrodden, and they often helped Joe finance his work with these youngsters.

Talk about sports heroes, regardless of how some may portray him, Joe Louis was an outstanding human being.

Jeff Berlinicke tells me Detroit has paid tribute to Joe Louis by naming a downtown sports

arena) in his honor.

I've always wanted to make these comments, and seeing as how there is little other history with which to fill this column today, I thought it may be appropriate.

In other historical items, Pope John Paul II was shot twice at close range on May 13, 1981 while riding in an automobile at St. Peter's Square in Rome. The Pope was pronounced fully recovered in three months, and on several times, visited the person convicted of firing the shots, and prayed with him.

The United States declared war on Mexico on this date in 1848, even though fighting had taken place for three months.

In today's birthdays, actress Bea Arthur (*Maude & The Golden Girls*) turns 71; basketball player Dennis Rodman is 36; and singer Stevie Wonder (real name, Steveland Morris Hardaway) turns 48.



Having a real breakdown

Breakdown (R): Steven Spielberg directed a film early in his career called *Duel*. He took a young Dennis Weaver and put him on the lone roads of the Midwest where a demonic truck harassed him throughout the picture. Now in the movie *Breakdown* those same desolate roads of the Midwest are the set of this thriller that turns out to be a testament for vigilantism.

Caught in this unflattering movie for their careers, Kurt Russell (*Escape from L.A.*) and Kathleen Quinlan (*Apollo 13*) star as a couple leaving behind an unsuccessful life in Massachusetts looking for a new beginning in San Diego. Their vehicle breaks down on a seldom-traveled stretch of Midwest road and they find themselves stranded until a "helpful" trucker (J.T. Walsh) comes along.

The trucker offers them a ride which the wife takes to call a tow truck. The husband is able to get the vehicle started and so he goes to meet his wife at a designated location.

When he gets there, he finds that neither she nor the truck driver have been there. In fact, no one at the diner, where she is supposed to be, has seen her nor knows anything about her. So starts the series of events that lead from an initially good thriller to a violent, deplorable show of vigilantism. Written -- with the aid of Sam

Montgomery -- and directed by Jonathan Mostow (Cable T.V.'s *Flight of Black Angel*), *Breakdown* does a good job of getting the audience engrossed with the first half, but then the violence begins and that is where I had the most trouble. *Breakdown* is hardly any better than an earlier, similar film called, *The Vanishing*. If I wanted a movie on retribution I could have watched *Death Wish* or something along those lines. Here I was expecting an exciting thriller. Instead I got routine violence.

It made me sick as audience members whooped and hollered when the bad guys eventually got theirs.

Breakdown should make money. It is manipulative and exploitative, which should win over an audience. However, I should praise the fact that the movie puts its characters in a situation that all of us can identify with. Then it elates the audience with "an eye for an eye" mentality. That was enough to turn my stomach. Two stars (out of four).



This Monday, Mayor Larry Dale noted that a study of Land Development Regulations (LDRs) had determined a conflict between the LDR codes already in existence, and the proposed ordinance. "If we pass this as it is," he said, "we will have created conflicting rules covering the same matters, and that would only lead us into trouble."

Dale said the LDR codes had, in some cases, different rules for establishments which served only beer or beer and wine, with those that served alcohol, while the proposed ordinance makes no difference. He said the basic difference involved what establishments would or would not be grandfathered-in if the proposed ordinance passed.

"We either have to change this ordinance or change the LDR," he said.

City Manager Bill Simmons suggested with the modifications required to be made at this point, the commission should consider bringing the ordinance back again for another first reading (Monday night), make appropriate changes, then have it prepared for second and final reading at the next commission meeting.

City Attorney Bill Colbert cautioned that the legal requirements for advertising specified 10 days and the next commission meeting is May 19, which doesn't allow sufficient time.

"I don't care what we do," said Commissioner Brady Lessard. "I just want to do whatever necessary to get this approved. I'm not sure what the differences in the grandfathering might be, but I'm tired of having it come back time after time. Let's take some action."

"You mean you don't want to know?" responded Commissioner Kerry Lyons.

"I'm going to say something now which some of you might not like," Lyons continued. "We all know why this ordinance

Before the interchange, we must deal with I-4 traffic

We hesitate to say this, but perhaps it's not time to plan for another Interstate-4 interchange. The latest one is from CR-46A (West 25th Street).

That specific interchange has been in the rumor state for at least 20 years or more, and now people say they're ready to start flinging dirt.

We see it as no more than building a swimming beach alongside a polluted lake. What good will it do us if it's not usable?

Don't get this wrong. We are not against the interchange. We agree that it could be vital to the continuing economy of the surrounding area. Even the airport will benefit with another roadway leading to the superhighway.

The interstate system is supposed to provide people with a rapid highway, unrestricted by stoplights or crossings. Yes, there are no stoplights on I-4.

But when it comes to the word "restricted," we must say, whoa, wait a minute.

Sunday afternoon I-4 near Lake Monroe was at a standstill for hours. Early Monday morning, the same area was at a standstill because of an accident on I-4 near W. SR-46 (West First Street).

These are only two instances within the

past few days. If we looked at the past month or thus far this year, we would find that using I-4 as a throughway is a risky business.

And we're not even talking about the area from Longwood to Lake Mary which seems as though it is always under construction causing nighttime delays.

We're talking about I-4, from Lake Mary to Daytona Beach. One accident, even a minor one, can delay traffic for hours. There simply are not enough lanes to handle the traffic.

So what are we going to do? Build more access roads. Why not insist, yes, demand, that the state look at I-4 and do whatever it takes to get it back into the usable highway it once was, shortly after it opened, shortly before it became the busiest tourist-attraction entrance in the world.

We've outgrown I-4. There should be no question.

Likewise, with some intelligent planning, a widening project could be undertaken without blocking off half the highway for months, years at a time.

Let's start putting our highway money to work in widening I-4. Unless this happens, and happens soon, all we are going to have is one of the longest rest stops in the nation.

about education. It isn't about race. It's about mixing things up in this school district.

Supt. Paul Hagerty scoffed at Goff's allegations.

"The justice department is just beginning to mesh with state statutes regarding controlled choice," he said. "The so-called lottery is just being suggested to be put in use for when more students want to attend one school than there are openings."

According to Hagerty, the lottery and the controlled choice plans are both just options. All plans are subject to court approval.

Goff said none of the school board members were informed about Stevens' suggestion. Despite a justice department visit with some members of the staff, Goff said, the board was

left in the dark about the consultant until this morning.

"Hagerty hasn't bothered to share any of this information with any of us," Goff said. "No e-mail. No voice mail. Nothing."

Steven's suggestion is that students be allowed to enter their names into a lottery to decide which school they will attend rather than be limited to their neighborhood schools or their cluster.

The controlled cluster concept has already been approved by a federal court. The justice department would have to go against that consent decree in order to implement their new plan.

The result, Goff noted, would be an educational and transportation nightmare. Statistically speaking, the youngsters in a single neighborhood could wind up atten-

ding 31 different elementary schools. There would be 31 buses in an out of the neighborhood just on the elementary school run, he explained.

"It's time to take this mess to court," Goff said. "This is out of hand."

The changes came about after the school district hoped to get out from under the court order. Rather than fight, however, the district agreed to negotiate with the justice department and find an agreeable plan.

"And what the justice department found was a unique combination of an attorney who hates litigation with a passion, a superintendent who thinks busing is the greatest thing in the world and a school board who are sheep who will not look at what their constituents want or what the national trends are," Goff said. "They saw this unique

keeps coming back. It's all because of these people out here." Lyons pointed to several rows of people in the audience, representing Stoooges, a business which has, several times, requested reconsideration of the distance requirements from churches. "We all know that they are pushing us to reduce the setbacks so they can get an alcoholic beverage license. Otherwise, why else are we working so hard on this," he continued. "That comment was uncalled for," responded Leasard. "You don't have anything on which to base that comment."

Mayor Dale added that he also took offense to Lyon's suggestions. "What we have here is an ordinance that is more restrictive," he said. "We aren't trying to make anything easier, we're actually trying to make our rules stronger. But this matter has absolutely no connection with Stoooges."

The ordinance was read once again by the city attorney, as a first reading, and the matter was passed by a four to one vote, with Lyons remaining against the suggestion.

At the conclusion of the discussion, approximately 20 persons, many wearing T-shirts identifying them as connected with Stoooges, left the commission chambers.

It is expected, that with a further study of L.D.L. requirements on grandfathering, and new additions to the present proposed ordinance, it may be back for second and final reading and approval, at the June 9 meeting of the City Commission.

Simple practices needed for good fruit production

Citrus trees need very little care once established in your yard, but a few simple practices are necessary for good fruit production. Citrus is a subtropical fruit tree and therefore limited to areas not affected by freezing temperatures. Some of the most important things to remember are that citrus trees grow best in full sunlight, they need a well drained soil and should never be mulched.

Varieties: Many different types of citrus can be grown in Florida. Oranges, grapefruit and tangerines are the most popular types of citrus grown in Central Florida. Several varieties are available for planting and selection of varieties is largely a matter of personal choice, people grow what they prefer to eat. There are sweet oranges which bear fruit early in the season, some are mid-

season varieties and others mature late in the season. Fruits of some new varieties have an attractive red color flesh which is appealing to many homegrowers. A very important consideration for selecting a citrus variety is sensitivity to cold. Remember, citrus trees should be purchased from a reputable source as a budded tree on a well selected rootstock.

Fertilization: For good fruit production, a good fertilizer program is necessary. The amount of fertilizer to use will depend on the size of the tree and the expected fruit production. It is recommended that a special citrus fertilizer that contains minor elements such as magnesium, manganese, zinc and boron, be used to fertilize your trees. If a citrus fertilizer is not available, a 6-6-6 or an 8-8-8 general fertilizer

can be used. Some nutrient deficiency symptoms may appear during the growth of the trees, they can be corrected by using a complete nutritional spray, sold in most garden stores, which contains all the necessary elements needed by the plants. Fertilizer applications should be made between the months of February to October. As a general rule, citrus trees should be fertilized three or four times a year. A method suggested is to measure the

circumference of the trunk at the soil level and apply a pound of fertilizer per each inch of its circumference per year. For instance: if the trunk circumference measures 4 inches, apply one pound of fertilizer four times a year to total found pounds per year. Spread the fertilizer uniformly over the area from about one foot from the trunk to three feet past the "drip line" of the tree. A fully-grown tree should receive about 6-8 pounds of fertilizer 3 times a year for a total of 18-24 pounds of fertilizer per year.

Irrigation: Citrus should receive between 3/4 to one inch of water per week. If rainfall does not cover those requirements, the difference should be provided by irrigation. Adequate soil moisture is more critical during the period of tree establishment and fruit development.

Pruning: Citrus trees can be pruned from March through July. Pruning is not recom-

mended except to remove diseased branches or remove water sprouts or suckers.

Weed Control: Weeds should be removed from under the tree canopy, because weeds promote accumulation of humidity around the trunk and roots and consequently predisposes the tree to infections by fungi that may injure or even kill the trees. This can be done mechanically by mowing, or preferably by using an herbicide that will kill the weeds and will not injure the trees.

Pest and Disease Control: There are very many insect and disease problems that occur in citrus and some of them can be very serious. Natural biological control is usually sufficient to keep those problems at very low levels. For dooryard citrus trees it is recommended that soap insecticides or oil sprays be used to control common pest problems. Some diseases that affect the leaves or fruits such as greasy spot or

melanoses can be controlled by using a copper fungicide. Make sure that you identify the problem correctly so that adequate controls can be used. The citrus leafminer, a new pest of citrus trees, can be controlled by spraying 1-2 tablespoons of oil per gallon of water when new leaves are forming because the insect attacks only new leaves. Trees older than five years old can tolerate more damage from this insect than younger trees and in many instances they do not need to be sprayed to control the leafminer. Avoid the use of highly residual insecticides because these insecticides upset the biological or natural control.

Coach Ike didn't have any timeouts

America's current obsession - hiring peerless basketball coaches - has created a monstrous stir from sea to shining sea. Is this fellow Rick Pitino really worth \$70 million to the Boston Celtics? Do the Orlando Magic really need Phil Jackson?

Does it take a genius to get five men wearing short-pants and sneakers to run up and down a hardwood floor and put a rubber ball in a cylinder 10 feet from the ground? Sounds like an awfully easy job - especially if one of the five players is Michael Jordan.

John Gabriel, the general manager of your Orlando Magic, said the other day that there is "no one perfect coach out there" and that finding the right coach is "a very complicated process." Slippery John ought to know. He's canned one coach and has a noose around the neck of another in a matter of months.

Fifty-plus years ago when this country was at war in Europe and the Pacific its leaders were men named Eisenhower, Bradley, MacArthur, Patton, Nimitz and Halsey. Peacetime America of the 1990s will be known for its hardwood generals - guys like Pitino and Jackson, Knight and Krzyzewski, Riley and Smith, Wilkins and Brown, Karl and Sloan, Carlesimo and Cremins.

Our lives truly depended on the decisions Dwight Eisenhower made, and now they apparently revolve around the decisions Phil Jackson has or will make. Poor, poor Ike, he never had a chance to call for a 20-second time out to beat Hitler's Team Germany. There were bombs but no halftimes. General Ike coached in a real war.

It's okay to pay our respects to great basketball coaches. To honor John Wooden for all those NCAA titles at UCLA or blow smoke up the sweats of Celtic patriarch Red Auerbach. We can even take a seat to Bobby Knight. But haven't we gone a little too far when a town's top priority is getting itself the perfect basketball coach?

Your Orlando Sentinel took a poll a week ago, and its royal readers responded that they wanted Zen master Phil Jackson hired and Richie Adubato fired as Magic coach. How charming.

Incredibly, Jackson means more to society than we could ever imagine.

If Jackson leaves the Bulls, Michael Jordan is leaving, too. That's what his attorney said in an ESPN interview. "We already have a sense of being together and finishing together and maintaining our success until we can't maintain our success anymore," Jordan said. "To start that all over again is like getting divorced and getting remarried."

Yep, the greatest player in the universe, is going to stay home with his wife and his kids if His Coach leaves. Respects the man that much, appreciates what the guy has done for him. Says it was an education playing for Jackson.

Amazing, Mike said, how one man has been able to blend so many different talents, so many personalities and yet have one focus. Mike topped all this off by fusing Jackson "doesn't get the credit he deserves."

How much more credit can we give this or any coach?

QUICK, we all need a 20-second time out. **OVERTIME** - Years ago when I took my made my first moves toward a basket, I was coached by a man named Owen Gould. I was a sixth-grader at St. Agnes School in Cherrydale, Va. On the team's first day of practice, three classmates who were new to the game were embarrassed to leave the locker room.

Having never worn athletic supporters, they weren't sure how they went on.

Two got the hang of things but the third ran onto the court with his supporter pulled down over his ears.

I don't know how much salary the school paid Coach Gould, but whatever it was it wasn't enough.
