Rinker-Stenstrom Field

The Sanford City Commission has unanimously approved the naming of the baseball field at Sanford Memorial Stadium, in honor of Wes Rinker and Julian Stenstrom, both considered driving forces in bringing baseball, at all levels, to the Sanford area.

Stenstrom, noted for many sports stories including those on the pages of the Sanford Herald, passed away in May, 1994 and Rinker died in November of this past year. It was stressed that Stenstrom would have objected to having the stadium name changed, as it was named in honor of fallen service personnel.

Rather than the stadium, the baseball field inside the stadium was given the new name. While the agendized request to the Sanford City Commission was to name the field the 'Stenstrom-Rinker Field." in making the motion to approve the request. Commissioner Whitey Eckstein turned the names around, and called for the renaming to "Rinker-Stenstrom Field." The request was approved unanimously.

The classes will be held at the Red Cross Seminole Service Center, 705 W. SR-434. Longwood.



SANFORD - A new Santord or dinance pertaining to alcoholic beverage sales has still not received final approval.

Attempts are being made to change the distance requirements between establishments serving alcohol and churches, schools, and between each other. Commissioners have discussed various concepts

during at least five work sessions. Finally, the proposal was approved on first reading, but without

specific distances on the document. They were to be added later following the city attorney's review.

The distances finally determined were 500 feet between similar establishments, 1.250 feet between alcohol-sales establishments and churches or schools.

With Commissioner Kerry Lyons fighting against the reductions at all points, the ordinance, with added distances, was finally approved on first reading at the April 28 commission meeting on a four to one

There are less than four dozen people buried in Ariington National Cemetery outside Washington. D.C., who were not military veterans. Today is the birth anniversary of the 39th person for which a presidential exception was granted.

Joe Louis, the "Brown Bomber" was born on May 13, 1914'. He was world heavyweight boxing champ from 1937 to 1949.

What history doesn't say about him however, should be brought up. Often, we hope our sports heros would conduct themselves in such a manner as to be a role model for the younger generations.

This is nothing new. Back in the late '30s and early '40s. there were many youngsters who wanted to be just like "The Champ." But they looked only at

his boxing prowess. Not too arena) in his honor, many people knew what went on I've always want outside the ring, other than his connection with persons considered to be gangaters, reported heavily by the media.

Joe however, had an 80-acre farm just outside the northern city limits of Detroit, and not too far from where I grew up. What was seldom made public was that he turned the farm into what we might call today, a summer camp.

Paying for everything himself. each summer. Joe would bring 20 or 30 youngsters from the ghettos of Detroit out to the farm. They were often orphans. He would provide a few weeks of outdoor life for them, the likes of which many may never have had before. Often, he even bought them clothing. Each summer, there may have been 100 or more youngsters going to the champ's farm.

Gangaters? Yes, there were a few, but many of them had compassion for the downtrodden, and they often helped Joe finance his work with these youngsters.

Talk about sports heros. regardless of how some may portray him. Joe Lewis was an outstanding human being.



Before the interchange, we must deal with I-4 traffic

We hesitate to say this, but perhaps it's not time to plan for another interstate-4 Interchange. The latest one is from CR-46A (West 25th Street).

That specific interchange has been in the frumor state for at least 20 years or more, and now people say they're ready to start flinging dirt.

We see it as no more than building a swimming beach alongside a polluted lake. What good will it do us if it's not usable?

Don't get this wrong. We are not against the interchange. We agree that it could be vital to the continuing economy of the surrounding area. Even the airport will benefit with another roadway leading to the superhighway.

The interstate system is supposed to provide people with a rapid highway. unrestricted by stoplights or crossings. Yes. there are no stoplights on I-4.

But when it comes to the word "restricted." we must say, whoa, wait a minute.

Sunday afternoon 1-4 near Lake Monroe was at a standstill for hours. Early Monday morning, the same area was at a standstill because of an accident on I-4 near W. SR-46 (West First Street).

These are only two instances within the

past few days. If we looked at the past month or thus far this year, we would find that using I-4 as a throughway is a risky busi-

And we're not even talking about the area from Longwood to Lake Mary which seems as though it is always under construction causing nighttime delays.

We're talking about I-4, from Lake Mary to Daytona Beach. One accident, even a minor one, can delay traffic for hours. There simply are not enough lanes to handle the traffic.

So what are we going to do? Build more access roads. Why not insist, yes, demand, that the state look at 1-4 and do whatever It takes to get it back into the usable highway it once was, shortly after it opened, shortly before it became the busiest tourist-attraction entrance in the world.

We've outgrown 1-4. There should be no

Likewise, with some intelligent planning, a widening project could be undertaken without blocking off half the highway for months, years at a time.

Let's start putting our highway money to work in widening 1-4. Unless this happens, and happens soon, all we are going to have is one of the longest rest stops in the nation.





Simple practices needed for

Citrus trees need very little care once established in your yard, but a few simple practices are necessary for good fruit production. Citrus is a subtropical fruit tree and therefore limited to areas not affected by freezing temperatures. Some of the most important things to remember are that citrus trees grow best in full sunlight, they need a well drained soil and should never be mulched.

Varieties: Many different types of citrus can be grown in Florida. Oranges, grapefruit and tangerines are the most popular types of citrus grown in Central Florida. Several varieties are available for planting and selection of varieties is largely a matter of personal choice, people grow what they prefer to eat. There are sweet oranges which bear fruit early in the season, some are mid-

season varieties and others mature late in the season. Fruits of some new varieties have an attractive red color flesh which is appealing to many homegrowers. A very important consideration for selecting a citrus variety is sensitivity to cold. Remember, citrus trees should be purchased from a reputable source as a budded tree on a well selected rootstock.

Pertilisation: For good fruit production, a good fertilizer program is necessary. The amount of fertilizer to use will depend on the size of the tree and the expected fruit production. It is recommended that a special citrus fertilizer that contains minor elements such as magnestum, manganese. zine and boron, be used to fertilize your trees. If a citrus fertilizer is not available, a 6-6-6 or an 8-8-8 general fertilizer



can be used. Some nutrient deficiency symptoms may appear during the growth of the trees, they can be corrected by using a complete nutritional spray, sold in most garden stores, which contains all the necessary elements needed by the plants. Fertilizer applications should be made between the months of February to October. As a general rule, citrus trees should be fertilized three or four times a year. A method suggested is to measure the

circumference of the trunk at the soil level and apply a pound of fertilizer per each inch of its circumference per year. For instance: if the trunk circumference measures inches, apply one pound of fertilizer four times a year to total found pounds per year. Spread the fertilizer uniformly over the area from about one foot from the trunk to three feet past the "drip line" of the tree. A fullygrown tree should receive about 6-8 pounds of fertilizer 3 times a year for a total of 18-24

pounds of fertilizer per year. Irrigation: Citrus should receive between 3/4 to one inch of water per week. If rainfall does not cover those requirements, the difference should be provided by trrigation. Adequate soil moisture is more critical during the period of tree establishment and fruit development.

Pruning: Citrus trees can be pruned from March through July. Pruning is not recommended except to remove diseased branches or remove water sprouts or suckers. Weed Control: Weeds should be removed from under the tree

canopy, because weeks promote accumulation of humidity around the trunk and roots and consequently predisposes the tree to infections by fungi that may injure or even kill the trees. This can be done mechanically by mowing, or preferably by using an herbicide that will kill the weeks and will not injure the trees. Pest and Disease Control:

There are very many insect and disease problems that occur in citrus and some of them can be very serious. Natural biological control is usually sufficient to keep those problems at very low levels. For dooryard citrus trees it is recommended that soap insecticides or oil sprays be used to control common pest problems. Some diseases that affect the leaves or fruits such as greasy spot or

melanoses can be controlled by using a copper fungicide. Make sure that you identify the problem correctly so that adequate controls can be used. The citrus leafminer, a new pest of citrus trees, can be controlled by spraying 1-2 tablespoons of oil per gallon of water when new leaves are forming because the insect attacks only new leaves. Trees older than five years old can tolerate more damage from this insect than younger trees and in many instances they do not need to be sprayed to control the leafminer. Avoid the use of highly residual insecticides because these insecticides upset the biological or natural con-



by Chic Young When is a cold contagious?

the flu most contagious, at the onset infected. or the peak of the disease?

DEAR READER: Virus infections of the types you mention are most contagious a day or two BEFORE symptoms begin and during the time that symptoms worsen, usually three or four days. It is during this crucial period when a patient is shedding the most virus particles into nasal and lung secretions.

Once the disease has peaked, the level of infectivity progressively falls. Thus, once a person begins to feel better - even though he may still have aches, pains, a runny nose, and cough he is no longer particularly contagious.

The beginning of the illness, when a person suspects he is getting sick, is believed by many authorities to be the most contagious phase; it is at this time that we must be most careful to avoid spreading the viruses through annezing, coughing or direct contact.

DEAR DR. GOTT: What can I do for post-herpetic neuralgia? Ever since I had shingles six months ago, I've experienced severe, shock like pains that I cannot control with non-prescription pain relievers.

DEAR READER: This dreaded complication of shingles affects about 10 percent of people who have had the infection. The pain is chronic and, to say the least, difficult to control.

Many authorities advise prescription pain pills (codeine, Darvon, Ultram and others), in some instances, patients can be helped by acupuncture, biofeedback, electrical nerve stimulation, hypnosis, and antidepressant medication.

Consult your doctor about these options. If they are ineffective, ask your family physician to refer you to a pain clinic Such facilities are usually available in large, teaching hospitals.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have an 89year old friend who is bothered by painless, hard lumps, like cysts, that have appeared around the opening of her vagina. Should she see a doctor?

DEAR READER: Bumps of any sort are usually a red flag for doctors and should be examined. Albeit unlikely, your friend could have malignant growths in the vaginal labia

More probably, she has simply developed harmless, but annoying. cysts in the labial skin. After examining her, a physician should be able to reassure her that these cysts, which are common, need no treatment

DEAR DR. GOTT: When is a cold or unless they become red, painful and

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've been told that folic acid will lower my cholesterol. I'm already on a prescription drug for this purpose. Do I need the folic acid?

DEAR READER: This vitamin. which is necessary for normal metabolism, has not been shown to lower cholesterol. Moreover, it is plentiful in many foods, including leafy vegetables, peas and oranges. Therefore, I do not believe that you need additional folic acid supplements.

On the other hand, nlacin — also a vitamin - may reduce the level of blood cholesterol.

Consequently, if your cholesterol medicine is not completely effective in lowering your serum cholesterol, your physician might consider niacin supplements.

Remember that the cornerstone of



cholesterol-lowering therapy is a prudent diet with minimal animal fat, eggs and whole milk products.

Play like a ferry

A ferry plows back and forth across a stretch of water. The aquatic furrow might be narrow, like the Hudson River between New Jersey and Manhattan, or very wide, like the Atlantic Ocean. However, to call a ship like the QE1 a ferry is perhaps unflat-

There is a declarer play technique that resembles a ferry. It is highlighted in this grand slam contract. How would you play in seven spades? West leads the club ace.

Four clubs was a splinter bid, showing at least game values in spades with at most one club. After three cuebids. North jumped to the grand slam, confident South had the trump ace to justify his strong bidding.

After ruffing the first trick in the


dummy, South could have ruffed three more clubs in the dummy, using the heart king, diamond ace and a heart ruff as hand entries. (The fifth clubdisappears on dummy's heart ace.) However, declarer decided to play a variation on this theme, a crossruff. And South knew the correct technique. Before ferrying back and forth between the two hands. South cashed his side suit tricks

So, declarer played a heart to his king, cashed the diamond ace, led a diamond to dummy's king, and took the heart ace, discarding a club from hand.

Then South tabled his cards, "I am about to embark on a high-trump crossruff," he explained. "I will ruff dummy's five remaining red-suit cards in hand and my last three clubs in the dummy. Who has to underruff the greater number of times?"

"I do," replied East, "four times."
