A bright sun bathed Atlanta after an early morning low of 21 degrees. A low of 10 degrees two days ago set an all-time low record for the date.

**Both Seminole College Sites Still In Running** As Deseret Location Appears Eliminated

Chairman Baya Harrison, of St. Petersburg, also "squelched" continued reports that the board was considering other sites in the two-county

area when he announced at the outset of the meeting: "We are not in any manper looking toward any other than the four sites already chosen for consideration. We intend to concentrate every effort on the sites now under study. However, if they prove to be impractical then we will open the door and start all over again in the


