## PERSONNEL OF CREDIT GROUP IS COMPLETED

Means Of Hurrying Action Of Corporation Speeded At Meeting Held With Hoover

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—(A.P.)—The directorate of the two billion dollar Reconstruction Finance Corporation was completed yesterday with the selection by President Hoover of Wilson McCarthy, of Salt Lake City.

"McCarthy is a Democrat, as required for the seventh post, and was proposed to the President by members of his party with the endorsement also of Republican leaders. He is a lawyer and also a banker."

Means of "speeding the action of the corporation" were discussed with President Hoover at a White House luncheon conference attended by other officials of the corporation.

The board is ready to operate but the three appointed directors confirmed Thursday by the Senate—Charles G. Dawes, Harvey C. Couch and Jesse Jones—cannot be sworn until next Wednesday. Their papers of commission must wait in the Senate three "legislative" days.

During the day, Senate Democrats got behind the next piece of emergency legislation—the Glass bill intended to aid depositors of closed banks and revise the banking law.

Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, the party leader, announced after a meeting of the Democratic steering committee that the group favored getting to work on this legislation as soon as such modifications as may be necessary are completed.

President Hoover Thursday arranged for Senator Glass, Democrat, Virginia, author of the measure, and Walcott, Republican, Connecticut, to confer with treasury and federal reserve experts on modifications.

The Democrats also studied the La Follette-Costigan \$375,000,000 direct federal aid bill which is opposed by the administration. A committee was named to consider this controversial legislation. Robinson said a motion to recommit the measure would be made if the bill is brought up on Monday.

Undersecretary Mills took the place of Secretary Mellon at the Hoover conference of the corporation board. Mellon and Eugene Meyer, governor of the federal reserve bank, and Commissioner Bester of the farm loan bureau, are ex-officio members of the corporation board.

The directors are going ahead with all preliminary arrangements but it is not likely that any funds will be loaned by the corporation before Dawes, the president of the board, and Jones and Couch are sworn.

## Curley Avers He Expects Smith To Name Roosevelt

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 30.—(A.P.)—Peter James M. Curley of Boston, one of Alfred E. Smith's supporters in 1928, said yesterday he expected Mr. Smith to nominate Governor Roosevelt for the presidency at the Democratic convention in Chicago next June.

He added: "It would be the greatest and keenest thing for Smith, who was twice nominated by Roosevelt, to either nominate Roosevelt or second his nomination." The Boston mayor called upon Governor Roosevelt and told him Massachusetts would send a solid Roosevelt delegation to the convention, and he expected the New York governor to have all the New England delegates.

## RELATIVES TOLD MEN IN U-BOAT CAN'T BE ALIVE

Funeral Services For Victims To Be Held Above Fatal Spot

PORLTAND, England, Jan. 30.—The British admiralty, acting on reports from salvage crews that have swept the ocean floor for miles in the vicinity of the lost submarine M-2, yesterday informed relatives of the 60 missing men that they must abandon all hope of ever taking it or hearing it again. ## RAIL WORKERS ACCEPT PART OF WAGE CUT

However, Presidents Of Roads Still Hold To Their Demand Of Ten Percent Slash

CHICAGO, Jan. 30.—(A.P.)—A million and a half railroad workers volunteered yesterday to accept six and one-half percent less pay one year, and they promptly were turned down.

The committee of nine railroad presidents, representing nearly every major road in the country and holding its stand in a proposed 10 percent wage reduction, rejected each of four counters made by the brotherhoods and unions in the ninth session of the negotiations on railway wages.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—(A.P.)—On the heels of vigorous protests by the United States and Great Britain today as the result of China and Japan's strengthened military alliance, the Chinese government today ordered its Asiatic fleet to stand ready to protect American lives in strife-torn China.

"Our fleet," Admiral Miller said, "will be ready to evacuate our nationals if we get them in danger. When trouble comes, we will go in and take care of it as necessary." The fleet is composed of 10 ships.

Many American Firms Operate In Shanghai Areas

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—(A.P.)—American business has been entrenched in Shanghai since the port was opened to foreign trade in 1843. It has grown until now there are 241 American firms there. American rights in Shanghai are tangled in a knot of international agreements.

The international settlement consists of 5384 acres on the outskirts of the city. It belongs to the municipal council of Shanghai, appointed to foreign countries against the international settlement being used as a base of operations by the Japanese.

At present one American, two Japanese, are British and five Chinese compose it.

The French concession is now governed by a group elected by residents.

The Chinese city has its own government.

The American participation in the government of Shanghai has been regular since 1899, but the greater portion of the burden has fallen on the British. American civilians in the city are estimated to number 3600. The United States military force totals 1261 men.

In 1930, the total American trade with Shanghai amounted to \$20,253,534. This was composed of \$11,625,717 in exports from the city—28 percent of Shanghai's total—and \$78,627,837 in imports, 25 percent of the total.

The population of the international settlement is 1,007,000. Latest reports said 25,450 Japanese live in the settlement, 9300 British and 3600 Americans. There are 1775 French citizens in the French concession.

## "Defend China", Kai Shek Urges As Nation Prepares For War With Japs; U.S. Asiatic Battle Fleet Gets Orders

Navy Orders Asiatic Force To Be Ready To Protect Lives Of All U.S. Citizens

Action Comes On Heels Of Protest

Marines Arrest Dozen Armed Japs Caught In American Area

TOKYO, Jan. 30.—(A.P.)—Japanese forbade the sending of Japanese troops over the line from the Harbin and Suiyuan lines over the northeast terminus of the South Manchurian Railway at Changchun to the east portion of Shanghai.

A government statement again accused foreign powers which Japan would not give up their interests in the international settlement of Shanghai and was ordered to withdraw from the city.

In this connection, a Tokyo news agency dispatch from Changchun reported that the Japanese would begin operations on the Changchun-Harbin branch to conduct the passive resistance of Chinese and Russian economic labor, industrial employees of the railroad by Great Britain and the United States.

The Japanese government still adhered to the Chinese East Manchurian jointly owned by Russia and China, responsible for the movement of coal from the coal fields toward Harbin. Manchuria, where two Chinese armies are fighting, official sources said.


