

Real Income Of American Public Declines 2 Cents

NEW YORK—The "real" income of the American public, as measured by the Federal Reserve Board's index of prices paid for goods and services, declined 2 cents last week, according to the report of the Federal Reserve Board today.

The index, which is based on the prices paid for a basket of goods and services, fell from 134.53 last week to 134.51 this week. This is the lowest point since the index was first published in 1937.

The decline was due to a fall in the prices of food and clothing, which together with other necessities, made up 75 percent of the index. The prices of other goods and services, such as housing and transportation, were relatively stable.

The Federal Reserve Board said that the decline in the index was a reflection of the fact that the government has been successful in controlling inflation. It said that the index is a good measure of the purchasing power of the average American family.

NOTICE TO MEAT PRODUCERS AND DEALERS IN MEATS AND MEAT PRODUCTS

Beginning Thursday, May 10, the City Meat Inspector will be at the automobile shed in back of the City Hall between the hours of 1:00 P.M. and 6:00 P.M. on Monday and Thursday of each week for the purpose of inspecting meats offered for sale in the City of Sanford.

From and after the above date it shall be unlawful for any person to keep in his place of business within the City for the purpose of sale or for storage, any meat, beef, pork, lamb, veal, or any other meat or meat products unless the same has been passed on and bears the stamp of inspection provided for by the laws of the United States governing interstate shipments of meats, or the State of Florida Inspected and Passed Stamp, or the City of Sanford Inspected and Passed Stamp, or any other City's Inspection and Passed Stamp, the inspection of which city prior to the offering of such stamp is of equal efficiency to that of the City of Sanford.

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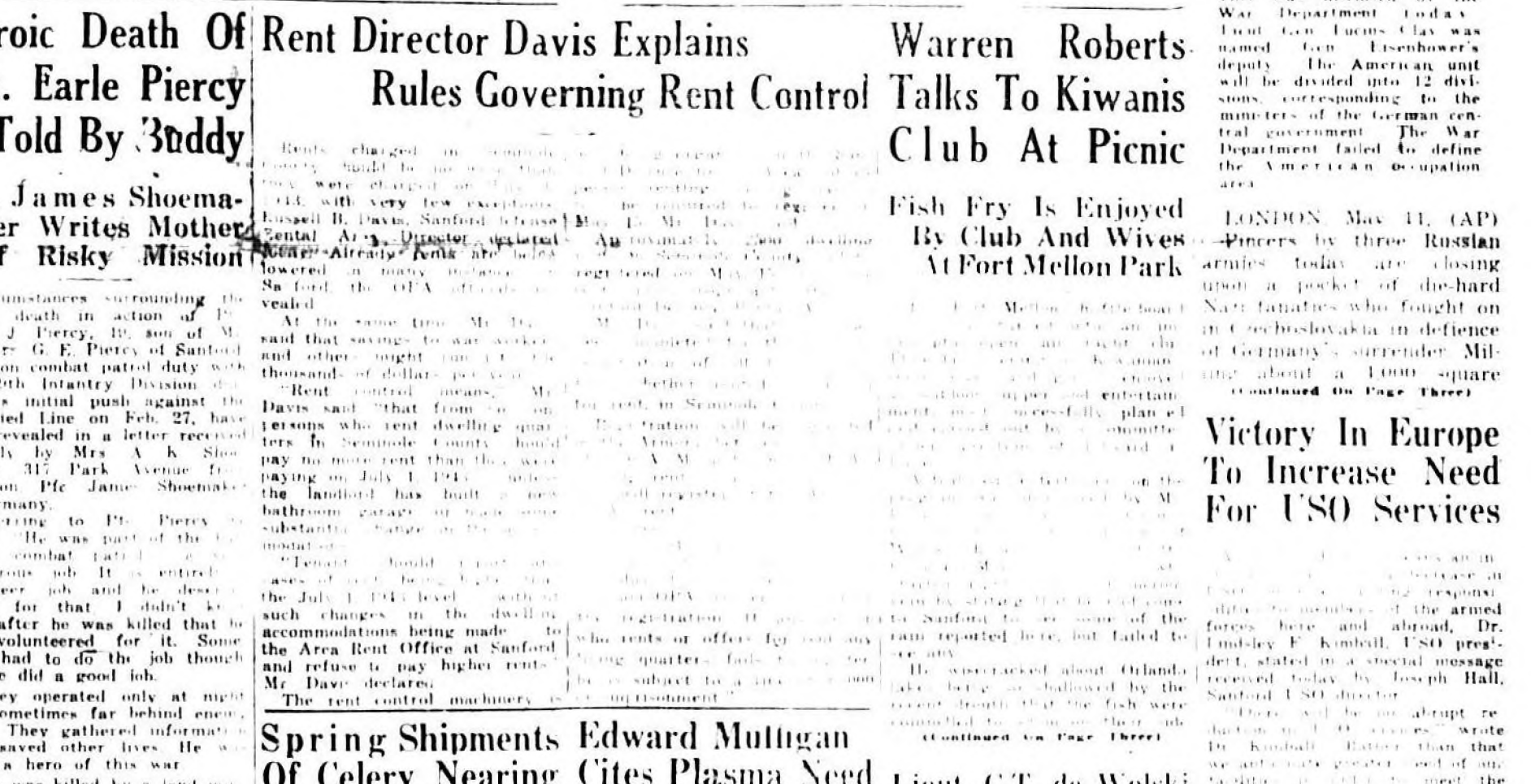

To Florida's Shame

Required reading for every citizen of Florida should be the report of Governor Caldwell's special investigator, Mrs. Ellen Whiteside, on the Florida Farm Colony for epileptic and feeble-minded children at Gainesville. She spent five weeks studying conditions at the institution established in 1921 for the purpose of training mentally deficient children and providing custodial care for those who couldn't be trained.

One of the most astounding revelations in Mrs. Whiteside's report is that the average age of those confined to this "children's home" is 25 and that most of them have been there at least 13 years. At present there are 504 patients at the institution but since 1932 some 601 applications have been rejected or kept pending due to lack of accommodations. There are now 155 applications from children for whom there is no room.

Of the institution itself, Mrs. Whiteside says, "Plaster has fallen, ceilings sag and the dirty grey paint has peeled away. The buildings are infested with rats and there are bed bugs in the beds, the walls and ceilings. In one ward, with bed space for 40, there are 61 distorted whimpering patients. The other wards likewise are crowded and there are inadequate bath room facilities.

"There is a critical shortage of attendants", she continues. "The caliber of those who are working is questionable. One, at least, is a former patient of the institution—an 18-year old moron who is in sole charge of the 31 'better' little boys during the day. Another is a stern heavy set woman of 54 with only a second grade education. She has charge of 61 low grade girls. It was on this ward that a helpless idiot girl was recently placed by another patient in a tub of boiling water."

This, in spite of the fact that most of those people could be cured of their illness if properly treated. This, in spite of the fact that failure to cure them keeps others out who need treatment! And all this, in the year of our Lord, 1945! This in America, after 12 years of humanitarian government! This in Florida, where the State boasts of not having a single dollar of indebtedness!

He Won The War

Who won the war? Perhaps Victor Delebeley, Belgian Minister of Education and a delegate to San Francisco. He invented the V-for-Victory sign that throughout Europe's dark years kept up the morale of the conquered. Learning that Belgian children were scribbling RAF in public places to annoy the Germans, he felt that three letters took too long to write and made it harder to escape. He then hit on "V" for "victoire" in French and "vrijheid" (freedom) in Flemish, the two languages of Belgium. The fact that it also stood for "victory" in English was incidental.

The first broadcast of the V-sign, on Jan. 14, 1941, suggested that everyone chalk it as often as possible all over the country. The idea spread from Belgium to France and throughout the world. Its greatest popularizer was Churchill, who turned it into the famous two-finger gesture.

There is no estimating the heartening effect upon a Belgian, French or Dutch slave of the Nazi, who, trudging to his day's forced labor, found on the sidewalks an indication that friends were near, and that the Nazis had been unable to prevent the sending of the message. Without some such sign European morale might have collapsed completely, and Gen. Eisenhower would have found no Partisans to ease the Allied advance.

Predicting Weather

"June 30th will be a good day for the church picnic. It's not going to rain then." Such long-range forecasts should be perfectly possible, according to Dr. Charles G. Abbot of the Smithsonian Institute at Washington, who has been foretelling the weather by observing the variations in the sun's heat. Not the heat received on earth, which anyone can measure, but what actually leaves the sun, which has variations too minute for anyone but Dr. Abbot to record.

Not only the weather of the next few months, but that of years to come, falls within his sphere of prophecy. The years 1975 and 2050 will, he says, bring such intense drought as to lower materially the level of the Great Lakes. Our grandchildren had better be prepared.

Weather has usually been something that caught the world unawares. It should be possible to be better prepared for it, and indeed meteorology has made immense gains in the last few years. If Dr. Abbot is on the right track mankind will call him blessed.

Despite the attendant commercial promotion that surrounds the occasion, MOTHER is grateful for even this slight recognition, this brief few hours of more or less synthetic consideration. Thanks to the sincere and unselfish effort of Mrs. Alma Allen of Oklawaha, Florida, who a number of years ago inaugurated her "Adopt-a-Mother" plan, every day has become "Mother's Day" to a greater army of men and women, who at her suggestion, began making investments in the form of unselfish service to others.

I've told the story before, but it bears repeating, and as our thoughts are directed to the subject at this particular time, it seems fitting that I tell it again. It all started a few years ago when Mrs. Allen learned of a lonely aged woman in her own community, who found herself at the sunset of life, forgotten and neglected. Through years of toil and self-sacrifice she had maintained a home, cared for a family and watched them go out into the world and be forever lost to her. Solitary children, concerned with their own affairs, neglected her. It seemed that nobody cared. She was too proud to ask for assistance or appeal for recognition. She only wanted to die.

It was a pitiful case, but no different than countless thousands of others. Because of her lonely and neglected condition, this woman fell prey to herself in her shall, she went no-

where, resented intrusion. But Alma Allen wanted to help her, so she did an unusual thing. She ADOPTEd her—but was careful not to let the unfortunate soul know that she had been ADOPTEd. That was Mrs. Allen's own, private, personal secret.

She found occasion to visit the woman, not to extend supercilious sympathy but to ask for help and advice on some trivial matter. This was an unusual approach and the woman responded. Member Of Old New York Family Dies In Action

MOUNT KISCO, N.Y., May (Special)—First Lieut. Augustus Van Cortlandt 3d, member of the family which for more than 300 years has occupied a prominent

place in New York life, died April 22 in a European Army hospital of wounds received in battle in Germany, the War Department has notified his father, Augustus Van Cortlandt, Jr., his farm, Grand Hill, Lieut. Kennedy Risked Peace Deal To Scoop Story

Eisenhower Was Put In Position Of Breaking Word To Stalin

PARIS, May 11.—Gen. Eisenhower today authorized a statement that Edward Kennedy of the Associated Press imperiled peace negotiations between the Russians and the Germans by sending an unauthorized dispatch on the German surrender at Reims. The statement was made by Brig. Gen. Frank Allen, press relations chief at Allied supreme headquarters, who accused Kennedy of a deliberate violation of good faith and security "definitely involving possible loss of American and Allied lives." It said that Kennedy's action put Eisenhower in the position of having broken his word to the Russians. Eisenhower had promised the Russians that the news would not be released until they were satisfied that the surrender was genuine on all fronts. SHAEF also announced that Robert Lunnelle, managing executive for the Associated Press in the United Kingdom, had been suspended as an accredited correspondent at SHAEF for relaying a flash on Kennedy's dispatch. Suspensions against Kennedy and Morton Gulbrund of the Paris AP staff remained in effect. Allen's Statement Following is the text of Allen's statement: "The following facts are pertinent to the widely publicized incident in which the Associated Press is alleged to have obtained a scoop. "In anticipation of some offer by the German high command to surrender its forces I applied to the supreme commander for authority to have any meeting between representatives of the German high command and our own forces covered by accredited representatives of the press. "The supreme commander informed me that the negotiations initiated by the Germans were of the utmost secrecy, particularly because of the great difficulty, due to distance, of exactly coordinating action of this kind with the Russian army so that any unconditional surrender could be made simultaneously on both the eastern and western fronts. "The need for secrecy was emphasized by the fact that the Germans were then desperately trying through propaganda and false statements to create misunderstandings between the Russian forces and the Allies on the eastern front and even broadcast as late as May 6 that they intended to begin negotiations with the Allies so as to gain time and strength for battle with the Russian forces. "Due to the desire of the supreme commander to obtain a surrender at the earliest possible moment so as to save Allied lives on both fronts, he requested authority from the Russian high command to act initially in accepting an unconditional surrender on all fronts so as to bring the whole matter speedily to a head. "The understanding was that he would observe the greatest secrecy in any negotiations with the German high command, to accept nothing less than simultaneous unconditional surrender on both fronts and particularly to make no announcement of any kind until the Russian high command could be satisfied through wise and more formal contact with the German high command but the surrender was genuine on all fronts and did not represent merely an additional attempt by the Germans to gain advantage at the expense of the Russians. "Because of these considerations, which clearly involved security and the saving of American lives, the supreme commander was doubtful of the propriety of permitting the presence of any individual at the meetings except those who had official duties in connection therewith. "I invited "In the current representations of the division that no newspaperman would release any information concerning the proceedings until authorized to do so, I always allowed me to invite a pool of 17 pressmen to witness the proceedings. "The story therefore was not obtained by press representatives in the ordinary course of their activities within this theater. It was obtained by the courtesy of SHAEF headquarters and through my promise, which was based upon past relationships with the press in this theater of war. "To assure that all invited representatives of the press would understand these conditions I personally briefed correspondents of the impending ceremonies incident to the signing of the unconditional surrender past and stated to them: "This story is off the record until the respective heads of the Allied governments announce the fact to the world. "I therefore pledge each and every one of you on your honor not to communicate the result of this conference or of the fact of its existence until it is released by SHAEF. "Fact Confirmed "These words and the fact that Mr. Kennedy heard them have been confirmed by all others in the same group. Moreover all observed this pledge except Mr. Kennedy of the Associated Press who used unauthorized channels of communications in order to commit his deliberate violation. "The supreme commander has asked me to express to all other newsmen in this theater his great regret that with this single exception he confidence in the press has never once been violated in his experience of almost three years as a theater commander. He regrets so because of this observance of his confidence in this instance they and their organizations have suffered professionally. 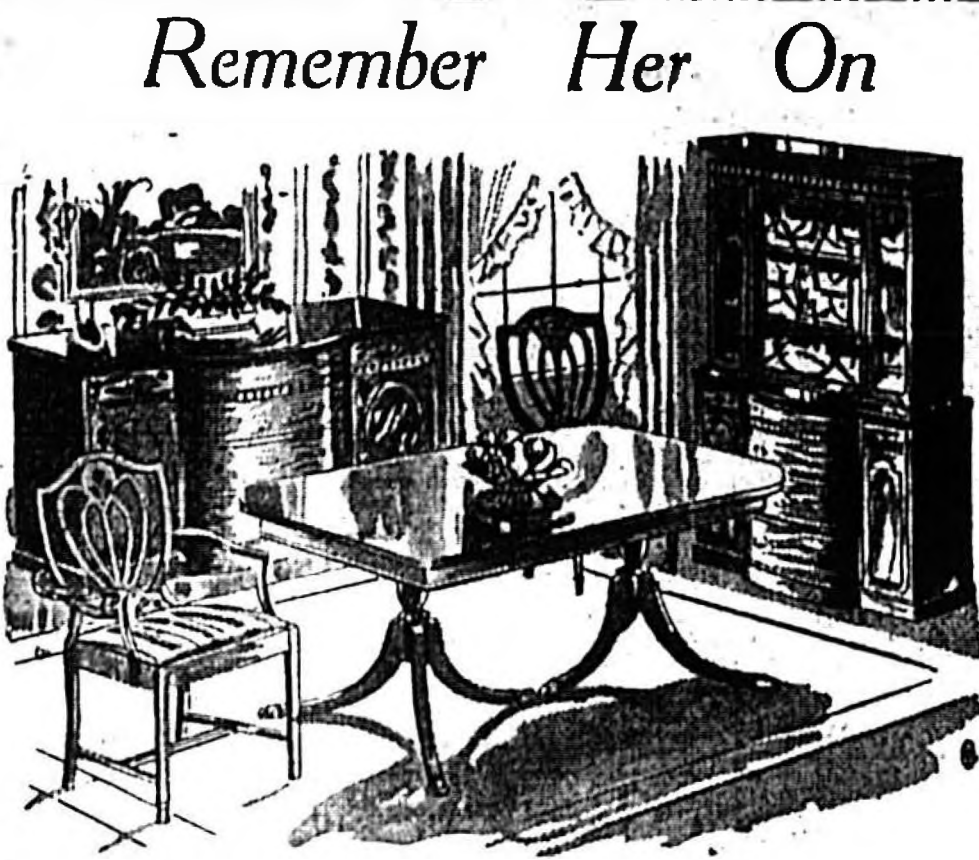

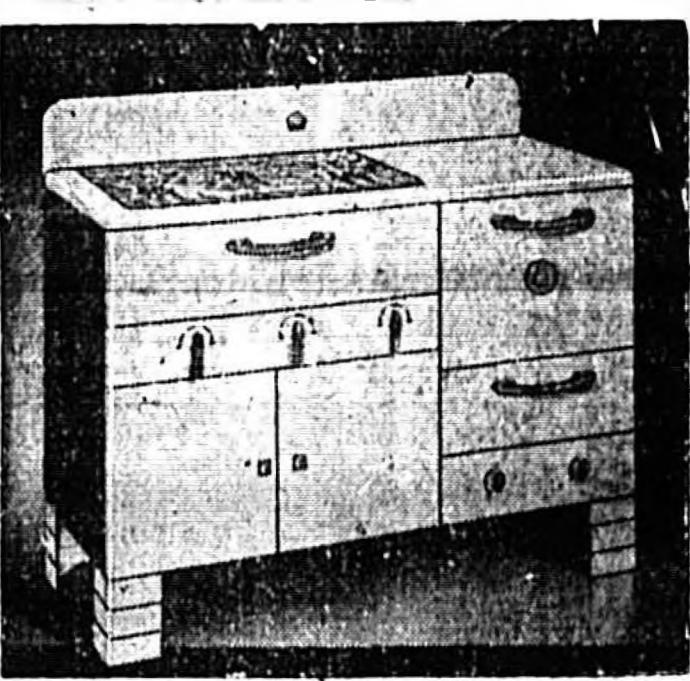

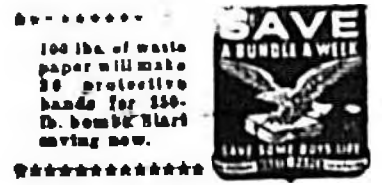

Russians Root Out last Nazis On Continent

Churchill Promises Britain Will Fight Side By Side With U.S. Against Japs

WASHINGTON, May 14, (AP)—British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden today arranged an afternoon appointment at the White House amid reports of a possible early "peace in Europe" meeting of the Big Three. London reports said Eden expected to discuss with President Truman the possible date and site of a meeting of Truman, Churchill and Stalin. There was no comment on these reports at the White House. Chinese Foreign Minister Hoang also planned to see President Truman.

PARIS, May 14, (AP)—General Eisenhower said today he regrets instances in which senior officers treated captured Nazi and high German officials as "friendly enemy" in direct violation of his orders. The statement followed British and American press criticism on the treatment of Reichsmarshal Goering by the Seventh Army.

(By Associated Press) Four Russian armies today routed the last fanatical Germans from isolated pockets in Austria and Czechoslovakia. Moscow announced 1,060,000 Nazis have been rounded up since Germany's surrender for a total of 2,860,000 captured or killed since the Russians' final offensive began on Jan. 18.

Spring Vegetable Season In Florida Passes Its Peak

JACKSONVILLE, May 14, (Special)—Last week Florida's spring vegetable season passed its peak and will now go into a steady decline until market returns today. "Tomato shipments at Palmto will probably and this week," he continued. During the first nine days of this month our market there handled 18,780 bushels which brought \$45,886.00. The market will be open all this week, and a large number of buyers are expected to be on hand.

"Plant City passed the peak of its shipments last week with 53,564 packages passing through the market. Field peas continued to lead with 18,546 bushels, peppers second with 14,519 bushels, and tomatoes came third with 12,387 crates. The movement will go into a decided wane now due to continued dry weather."

Wachula is still having strong movement of tomatoes, although the peak has been passed. Volume is holding up remarkably well in view of the dry weather but is liable to break sharply downward soon. Quality is excellent carrying quite a premium and prices are satisfactory. Pepper is the only other commodity being shipped in volume worth mentioning.

"Sanford is still doing a small amount of business and expects a light volume of beans, field peas, beans, eggplants, corn, peppers, potatoes, tomatoes, and possibly melons this week."

"Fort Pierce is very quiet. A few tomatoes continue coming in, but all other produce is gone."

"Palmetto movement continues with light volume of eggplants, peppers and okra the only commodities moving."

"Tampa is also reaching the end of its battle with volume dropped down to 8 to 10 carloads per day last week and will be much smaller this week. Peppers and eggplants are the only commodities moving in volume. Quality is poor and prices are low. Shipments through May 8 were 149 cars above the 1944-45 season."

"Our livestock market at Jay continued to be quiet with cattle for \$1.74.00 and 80 head of hogs for \$13.00.00 last Tuesday."

Instructions Given For Registering Rental Quarters

Landlords Must Register At Sanford Armory Tomorrow

One thousand more Tax Receipts have been issued for taxes for the year 1944 than for the same period the previous year. This increase is due to the fact that the County Tax Collector, Jno. D. Jinkins, who explains that this means 1,000 more persons are paying taxes on property in Seminole County than heretofore.

The total amount of County and School taxes assessed in Seminole County for the year 1944 is \$242,957.74, he said and is divided as follows:

The names of more than 3,000 price violators have been turned over to the Bureau of International Revenue and more are to be added, the OPA said.

Following needs of liberated peoples, plus the growing threat of black markets, are putting the war's heaviest strains on the rationing and price control system.

Many officials are frankly worried. Some fear the curbs may not be able to meet the tests as European necessities cut further into American supplies. Some predict more drastic control measures will be required. A few go so far as to say it may become necessary for the government to take over the food distribution system.

Week-end developments point up the increasing pressure.

President Truman in a letter to food for Freedom, Inc., said we must and can find a way "to share American food with starving peoples."

The currently signaling what that way is, OPA boosted the point value of salad and cooking fats from 6 to 10 points a pound, following up a recent official report that this rationing "must be strangled to economize the use of fats and oils if any real contribution is to be made to a pressing world shortage problem."

Other Ration Moves
The fat ration cut is only the latest of numerous moves in the rationing program.

The 900 carrier planes bombed and strafed southern Okinawa and half hour.

Florida Post-War Construction Is Near 140 Million

FLORIDA'S post-war construction program is now in the final stages of planning. The state's total construction volume was private during 1942 and 1943. The following year, private construction rose to 14.1 percent. The first three months of 1945 credit private construction with 43 percent, or \$8,076,000, of all contract awards during the period. Awards for public construction reached \$10,167,000 in the first quarter, 1945. This total covered \$6,391,000 for public engineering projects \$2,606,000 for roads, streets and bridges and \$1,170,000 for public buildings.

Due to the large volume of building for the armed forces in Florida in 1944, total construction awards in the first quarter of 1945 were 30 per cent below the corresponding period, 1944.
