The state levies an excise tax of six cents a gallon on beer, 40 cents a gallon on wine and champagne and 30 cents a gallon on liquor. Revenue was estimated at \$2,500,000 annually, to go into the state's general operating expense fund.

Municipalities, under terms of the bill, have authority to regulate the places where liquor stores or drinking establishments may be located, and to regulate the hours of operation of such places. Proposals to write into the general bill a section that sale would not be permitted on Sunday, or within 200 yards of any church or public school, were defeated.

Frost said the bill was "designed to promote temperance, by eliminating the speakeasy and the bootlegger."

The state's excise tax would be collected by a system of stamps. The stamps would be sold only to licensed wholesale distributors,

and they would be required to affix a stamp to each bottle. For beer selling—without the stamp on the bottles would be subject to arrest and fine or imprisonment as now provided.

A licensed wholesaler could sell only to licensed retailers, and violation of this provision would be cause for revoking his license. False statements in making reports would be punishable by fine up to \$5000 or imprisonment up to five years.

Biggest and Fastest Ship

Size, speed and magnificence are the criteria for the modern trans-Atlantic liner in the ever-racing race of steamship competition to take the shortest way from each other. The big ribbon is headed around and around between the various competing countries in a sort of revolving system as first one and then the other produces the largest, the fastest or the most stupendous.

Germany, with the *Ludwig* and *Europa*, took the speed honors away from Britain which for twenty years dominated this feature with its swift *Maudslayi*. In size, England still leads because the *Mauretania* and *Berengaria* surpassed the two German ships in 1910, and to Germany's speed and supremacy was soon challenged by Italy's two super ships, the *Bix* and *Conte di Savoia*, the France now holding the record for an Atlantic crossing.

But France decided not to be outdone and so she planned to build a ship which would take all the honors in one sweep. Her answer to the challenge of other nations is the *Normandie*, the world's largest ship, the most magnificently decorated and furnished, and reputedly the fastest passenger vessel ever to cross the water, although she has not yet proved that fact.

Her size? She weighs 72,280 tons. She is over 1000 feet long. She has a swimming pool 80 feet in length. Her skin deck, classed as an observation deck, is over a mile long. She has a theater with a seating capacity of 400 persons. She draws forty feet of water and each one of her four propellers has a diameter equal to the height of a two-story house.

On her first venture into the open sea, she quickly out-distanced an accompanying destroyer, always with newspaper men to report the gala occasion. The *Normandie* was seen soon of sight as she plowed through a heavy sea with a headwind on a high sea.

Larger and larger, faster and faster, and always more magnificent, these are the qualities which naval architects, engineers and decorators are striving to attain. One step to wonder where it will end. It seems incredible that any future ship will be able to surpass the present super liners.
