Sanford offers to sell city hall

Plan may keep Seminole County Courthouse down town

SANFORD - "Sanford is at the right place, at the right time, with the right people," said Mayor Larry Dale. The mayor expounded on the progress expected in the city this morning before a group of 30 members of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce and guests.

The meeting was a roundtable gathering sponsored by the Economic and Small Business Deunanimously to offer to sell the city hall to the

velopment Committee of the chamber.

Probably one of the most surprising items regarding the future however, was brought out near the conclusion of the mayor's address when he announced the city has, in writing, offered to sell city hall to the county.

The announcement came in response to a question regarding the long-time plans to expand the county court house in the downtown area. The members of the commission have agreed unanimously to offer to sell the city hall to the

county," Dale said. "I have just sent letters making that offer to each county commissioner. We'll give them a good deal, and with the land the city owns in that area, it will allow the county to have sufficient area for the new court house."

County Commissioner Daryl McLain, in attendance at the gathering, said he had not yet received a copy of the letter.

Mayor Dale said if the county purchased the city hall, the city might investigate the possibil-

Ity of a new city hall on French Avenue near 18th Street, where the city owns ten acres of land across from Sanford Middle School. Dale said it would be an ideal place, allowing the city hall to be in a more central location.

"We're pushing for this to happen," he said.

Dale opened his comments with a report on
the lakefront development. "We have problems
that should have been solved years ago," he said.

Grand jury charges 30 in scam

TALLAHASSEE - A statewide grand jury indictment unsealed Wednesday charges 30 people and a company with offices across Florida in a little-known but pervasive car insurance scam known as "aliding." a practice officials say costs consumers millions of dollars each year.

The practice typically involves charging for coverage or insurance products consumers didn't want or didn't ask for according to Florida Treasurer and Insurance Commissioner Bill Nelson. It got its name because agents sometimes slide forms for unwanted products into a stack of insurance documents customers need to sign in a hurry.

Wednesday's indictments of 29 insurance agencies along with the owner of Amscot Insurance Agency and the agency itself, said Nelson, "sends a clear message" to other agents and organizations that Florida will not tolerate sliding extras on auto insurance."

Nelson said the grand jury, under Statewide Prosecutor Melanie Ann Hines, is still looking at evidence gathered by state insurance/fraud investigators on as many as 48 other insurance sales offices throughout the state.

Maloy responds to 'blatant falsehoods'

Adams: 'If you can't stand the heat, get out of the kitchen'

SEMINOLE COUNTY County Commissioner Grant
Maloy has responded today to
what he says are "blatant
falsehoods" made by Commisstoner Win Adams in a recent
column in the Seminole Herald.

Maloy said that the personal attack by Adams necessitated a response because he found it "embarrassing to see politics reach a new low in Seminole County, for it is the people who suffer.

"I have never 'attempted to smear the reputation of the attorney hired' to fight adult entertainment as you claim." Maloy said. "It was you, Win, who printed that this attorney (Ken Wright) was linked to a prominent local topless bar during your 1994 campaign when he was helping your opponent.

"Obviously your (Adams") opinion has changed now that

he (Wright) has become one of your main fund-raisers," Maloy said.

Adams said Monday that while he had printed an information sheet that Wright was linked to a bar, he did not distribute this sheet. "I decided that it was wrong, and I did not permit it." Adams said.

"Grant needs to grow up."
Adams said. "He has accused me of taking bribes and breaking the sunshine law all over this Shutts & Bowen scenario. He likes to dish it out but doesn't like to take it. Well, this is a two way street."

Maloy said that he has for the record "strongly criticized" that Wright's firm was hired without any bid process and while the county had free legal help on board. "Now the taxpayers are out \$200,000." Maloy said.

"Instead of strongly regulating adult entertainment,

Lake Mary to discuss government TV channel

LAKE MARY - The Lake Mary City Commission will discuss a proposed local government access television channel Thursday. The matter is to be brought before all government entities in Seminole County at the recommendation of the Council of Local Governments (CALNO).

A presentation on the proposal is to be made by Winter Springs City Commissioner Cindy Gennell, who is chairman of CALNO.

A resolution was adopted in May of last year, authorizing CALNO to compile an interiocal agreement regarding the proposal.

If approved jointly, the cable channel would be designed to provide viewers with various government information on a 24-hour a day basis, with certain time allocations for each government.

The Sanford City Commission has previously taken the matter up for discussion during a work session in December, suggesting possible uses of the air time. Sanford's suggestions included providing information regarding utility services, water conservation, government job availabilities, meeting agendas, a community calendar, special events, election information, various government projects and board vacancies.

Additional Sanford has proposed allocating some time to the police department for use in providing information regarding wanted persons, stolen vehicles and other areas where police may be interested in seeking public input or assistance.

Seniors' group volunteers to give primary caregivers a break

ORLANDO - Betty Teague pledged to "get things done for America" during a swearing-in ceremony at Community Care for the Elderly (CCE) last week, as she and nine others became Orlando's first AmeriCorps members as signed to Project R.E.L.I.E.F.

"I'm the oldest member," Teague proudly proclaimed. "I'm 74 and on Social Security." AmeriCorps, a national service program sponsored locally by the Florida Commission on Community Service and the Florida Department of Elderly Affairs, builds stronger communities through service to others. During the event, Florida officials stressed to the new recruits the significance of their commitment and the value it will bring to our community. AmeriCorps members receive a small living allowance and, after a year of service, an education award. One of only four AmeriCorps projects serving seniors in Flortda, Project R.E.L.I.E.F. gives family caregivers time off while volunteers stay with their frail loved ones.

"I was interested in this particular program," said Teague, who learned about AmeriCorps at church. "I could easily identify with the need for respite to the caregiver."

Ten years ago, Teague was a family caregiver, providing round-the-clock care to her 92-year-old mother and a sick husband. The retired real estate agent moved to Longwood to be closer to her children.

There was nothing like this when I was taking care of my mother," she continued. "I'm very anxious to get started."

Assigned to Project R.E.L.I.E.F., Teague will socialize or just sit with homebound clients while the primary caregiver takes a break. Respite for Elders Living In Everyday Families. a pilot project, matches families with volunteers. Community partners in R.E.L.I.E.F. for Orange and Seminole counties are Community Care for the Elderly, senior Resource Alliance and the Florida Department of Elder Affairs. Before being assigned to clients, R.E.L.I.E.F. volunteers learn about aging issues, how to protect an infirm person's safety and how to handle emergencies.

Your mission is to serve caregivers and help keep trail elders out of institutions," said Peggy Claborn of Florida's Department of Elder Affairs during the ceremony. The services you will be providing are badly needed. Florida has a larger concentration of elders than anywhere else in the world."

Sentors comprise 23 percent of Florida's population, with the over-85 age group growing three times faster than any other segment. Claborn warned that Florida does not have the capacity to care for every senior in need without the belp of family caregivers.

"If families weren't carrying the burden. Florida would go bankrupt overnight," Claborn said. We need to build aging programs for families. Families need to be able to carry the burden."

Caregivers often burn out or suffer illnesses of their own while trying to cope with the rigors of 24 hour a day bathing, feeding and monitoring. Unable to leave their homebound charges alone, many become isolated, letfriendships lapse and become overwhelmed. Each week Teague and other AmeriCorps volunteers will give caregivers time to unwind, read a book, dine with friends or take a nap.

For seniors, it's a lifeline, for our community an investment. And for Teague and the others, AmeriCorps Project R.E.L.I.E.F. provides the opportunity to serve while experiencing life and expanding horizons.

Your life will be changed. Once you're an AmeriCorps member, you'll always be an AmeriCorps member," Abby Walters, chairman of the Florida Commission on Community Service, told the new recruits, "Let yourself be changed and let yourself enjoy the changes in the clients and caregivers."

Families may request assistance from Project R.E.L.I.E.F. at Community Care for the Elderly. To be eligible for services, clients need to be at least 60 years old, require assistance to remain at home and be unable to afford proprietary respite services without Jeopardizing other basic needs. 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
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

Meningitis death

ORLANDO - Health Department officials do not believe that the death of a 22-year-old Magic Kingdom employee of bacterial meningitis has any connection to that of a 12-yearold Westridge Middle School student who died two weeks ago of the rare, hut contagious disease.

Mark Lynn Burke II of Kissimmee died Sunday night at Florida Hospital in Orlando. He worked as a costume character in the Magic Kingdom but health authorities do not think any Walt Disney World guests were exposed to the disease in art because of a protective mesh lining inside the costume heads

There is no reason to believe Burke's death is connected to that of 12-year-old Damaris J. Martinez, who thed of bacterial meningitis five days after she left Orlando to visit family members in the Dominican Republic

Until the two March deaths, it had been several years since any Orange County deaths had been attributed to bacterial meningitis. Four to \$13 cases are reported each year but few contribute to death. In the early stages of the disease, the symptoms are similar to influenza, including hody aches and a fever

Tricks" (as the 15-month probe was named), brazenly ripped off the insurance commissioner, investigators said.

Nelson used his own name and driver's license to investigate complaints that agents sometimes added extras to consumers auto insurance policies. The insurance commissioner stopped at two of-

fices in Tampa and found that each added unwanted products to his request for just the minimum mandatory coverage required by state law.

One woman at an Amscot agency sold the insurance commissioner a policy costing \$352 a year. But the agency charged him an annual payment of \$452, an extra \$100 investigators said was for unwanted towing coverage that the agency kept.

Nelson and Hines announced the indictments at a joint news conference in Tampa. The grand jury, through its indictment, alleged racketeering, conspiracy to commit racketeering and organized fraud in connection with auto insurance sales practices at 18 locations in Hillsborough, Pinellas, Polk,

Pasco, Manatce and Sarasota counties.

In addition to the agents and the company, the indictments charged the owner of Amscot, lan Mackechnie, in connection with sliding ancillary products to insurance customers. Often these products are towing and rental coverage or accidental death and dismemberment policies.

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
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Revenge of the automobiles

DEAR DR. GOTT: A recent television feature on ABC ("When Cars Attack") explored the possibility that mistreated automobiles may later misbehave in order to injure their drivers. This seems far-fetched. Is such a thing possible?

DEAR READER: I never fail to be amazed by people's beliefs. In the program you mentioned, the moderator suggested that automobiles that have been mistreated by their owners somehow develop an evil spirit that causes the vehicles to malfunction in ways calculated to injure their drivers. Such a fantasy is truly preposterous and is inconsistent with any scientific principle or rational thinking.

It's a little bit like the media reports last year Indicating that a British insurance firm was offering coverage for "Virgin Birth by Act of God." The alien impregnation insurance was sold to 300 women in the first week it was offered. Under the coverage, which cost \$3 a week, a virgin could collect \$1.5 million if she were impregnated by an "Act of God." According to the insurance company, the concept received a "frosty response" from church officials

People have a right, of course, to whatever beliefs they choose. But such beliefs, one hopes, should at least be in keeping with objectivity and the laws of nature.

DEAR DR. GOTT I was prescribed Zoloft last month for depression. After the first dose, I experienced debilitating nausea, vomiting and diarrhea.

Subsequently, I called the doctor and the pharmacist. Both were unbelieving and said something other than the Zoloft caused my symptoms.

Therefore, the following night, I again took the medicine with identical results. Goodbye, Zoloft. Goodbye, doctor. Now what do I do with \$60 worth of pills I cannot take?

DEAR READER: I don't know why your health professionals disparaged your reactions, which are recognized side effects of Zoloft and were certainly proven by your second experience with the drug. Obviously, the medicine disagreed with you and you were correct to discontinue it.

Since you have used two pills out of the original prescription, the pharmacist will probably not allow you to return the supply that is left. Ask him, however. I suspect that you'll just have to take this as an important learning experience, absorb the \$60 and flush the remaining pills down the

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have severe spinal stenosis, which causes constant pain. I've been receiving epidural steroid injections every six months for three years. I've tried special exercises and acupuncture. Are there any alternatives to the steroid injections?

DR. GOTT PETER GOTT, M.D.

DEAR READER: Spinal stenosis means that some firm tissue - such as a disc or bony outgrowth — is pressing on delicate nerves, causing pain and inflammation. The purpose of the epidural injections is to relieve swelling, thereby lessening symptoms. Acupuncture and physical therapy may also alleviate pain







Effective repellent of those pesky bugs

DEET or diethyltoluamide is an effective repellent of mosquitoes, gnats, ticks, mites, and blood-sucking flies. DEET is the active ingredient of Cutter's insect repellent and Off. It has been used effectively for the past 45 years to prevent insect bites and disease transmission. vide continuing protection. Application: Products con-

taining DEET are available as liquids, lotions, and aerosols. They should be applied as directed on the label. Before using any DEET product, read the entire label. Even if you have used the product before, read it again before application. Liquids and lotions should be poured or squeezed directly onto the hands and apread evenly and completely on exposed skin in a thin layer. Contact with the eyes and lips should be avoided. Use just enough repellent to cover the

Acrosols should be directed at the area to be treated from the appropriate distance, usually about 6 to 8 inches from the exposed akin. Do not apply acrosols directly to the face; first spray it onto hands. Then rub it onto the face and neck, avoiding contact with eyes and lips. Reapply DEET formulations as necessary, but avoid overexposure. Frequent reapplication and saturation are unnecessary. Also, do not apply DEET to the hands of small children. Only apply DEET formulations to exposed aldn; do not apply to areas underneath clothing. Do not apply DEET formulations on or near plastics, acetate, rayon, Spandex, synthetic fabrics (other than mylon), furniture finishes, leather, watch crystals, and painted or varnished surfaces. Plastic glass frames and goggles should be protected from DEET applications. Car finishes and interiors also may be damaged by DEET. It will not damage mylon, cotton, or wool fabrics.

Precautions: DEET may cause eye injury or irritate mucous membranes. Therefore, do not apply to eyes or lips. Warning, it may also be harmful if swallowed. In rare cases, it can cause akin reaction. Do not apply to sunburned or damaged akin. If DEET gets in cyes, flush with plenty of water. If eye irritation persiats, get medical treatment. If swallowed, call a physician or contact a poison control center. If a child or adult reacts to the dermal application DEET. wash treated skin and call a doctor. Many older DEET products contained an R-11 additive to enhance activity. Due to concerns about the additive, all current products do not contain it. Do not use DEET products that were manufactured prior to 1993 to avoid exposure to the additive.

Exposure: Three-fourths of all DEET poisonings occur with children under six years of age. Small children are more vulnerable because they are more likely to accidentally ingest DEET and have lower body weights. To prevent accidental poisoning of small children, store containers of DEET out of the reach of children. Also, use common sense in the application of DEET of small children. Do not apply to the hands of children because they may rub their eyes or ingest DEET from their hands or fingers. Do not allow small children to apply the product. An adult should apply the product or closely supervise the application. Use DEET sparingly on small chil-



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
