Crossing guards in high demand after turnover

SANFORD — As the first semester of the school year wraps up, the Seminole County Sheriff's Office finds itself needing school crossing guards, especially to work in the southern part of the county.

During the school year, the Sheriff's department uses the services of roughly 165 crossing guards. Each year, at semester time, there is some turnover, which is presently the case.

The job is part-time. It pays \$8 per hour. A school crossing guard must be available two hours a day, five days a week. Other minimum requirements include a valid Florida's driver's license, at least 18 years old, a high school diploma or GED, and submit to fingerprinting and undergo a background check.

The job is open to residents of Seminole County; however, exceptions are made if an applicant lives in relative close proximity to Seminole County's jurisdiction.

Those interested can receive applications at the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, 100 Bush Blvd., Sanford, or by calling Linda Moss, Crossing Guard supervisor at 407-665-6612.

Fired cop could return this week

SANFORD — A recently fired Sanford Police Officer is expected to rejoin the force if he signs a "last chance" agreement, despite outcries from the black community.

Kenneth Trezise, who was hired in 2000, was terminated by Police Chief Brian Tooley in August for insubordination and improper conduct toward the public.

Newly hired city manager Sherman Yehl reviewed Trezise's termination

and deemed it appropriate to rehire the officer if he agrees to sign a "last chance agreement".

Under the "last chance" agreement Trezise would have no appeal process if he has disciplinary problems in the future.

Members of the black community said the rehiring of Trezise is "mind boggling", because of his repeated disciplinary viola-

tions that have "racial overtones".

But Trezise's union representative George Hachigian said Friday that despite allegations that the officer was racist, Trezise plans on signing the "last chance" agreement this week, so that he can go back to work.

"The Fraternal Order of Police does not represent bad cops or racist cops," Hachigian said. "I wouldn't be represent-

ing [Trezise] if I thought he was either of those."

Trezise was fired for two primary incidents, with three violations coming into play.

In October 2004, Trezise was investigated for improper use of force when he assisted a Seminole County Sheriff's deputy with a vehicle pursuit. He was reprimanded and suspended for 30 days with pay for shooting at a moving vehicle.

Yehl said, after reviewing the files, he

Sprucing Magnolia

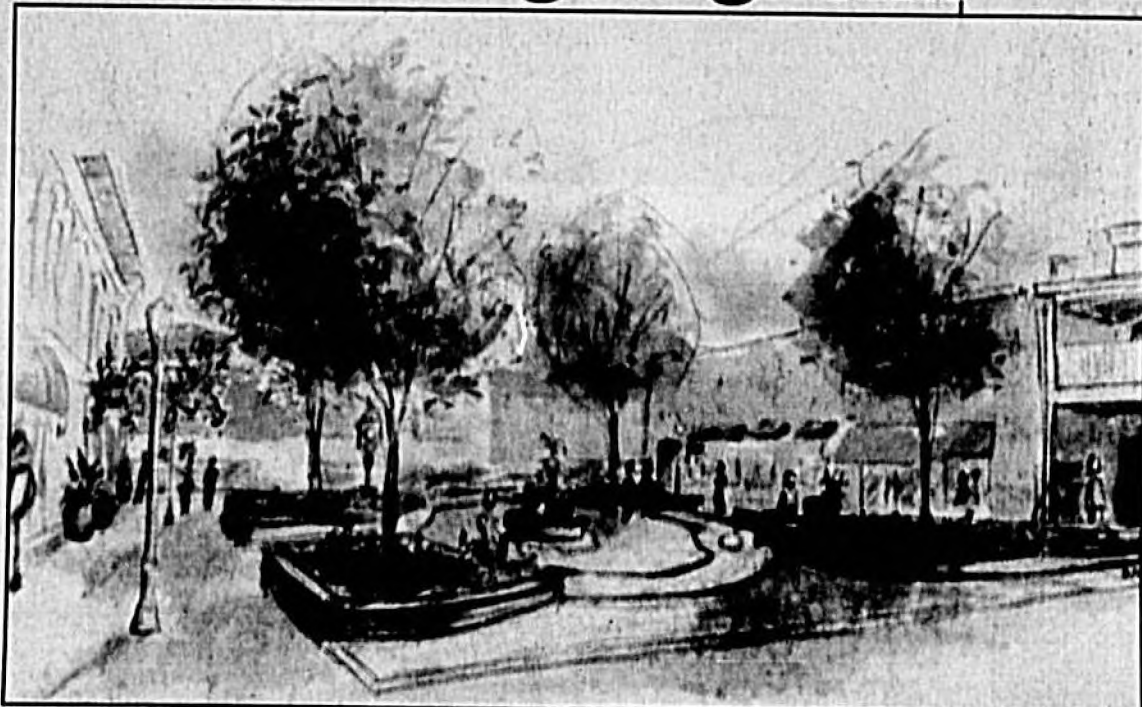

Facelift could cost \$250,000

SANFORD — After several months of ripping, rewiring, and replanting in Magnolia Square the Community Redevelopment Agency has a design plan.

Agency ideas came closer to fruition Wednesday after Land Design Innovations Inc., of Winter Park, presented its vision for the square.

But a design that will bring Magnolia Square up to par with the newly renovated 1st Street and the RiverWalk might cost the Community Redevelopment Agency a quarter of a million dollars, unless they find a benefactor

willing to donate \$75,000 for the purchase and installation of a cast iron fountain.

Renovations began in July, which included tearing out trees to replace with Blanchard Magnolias; replacing some of the bricks; re-routing electrical lines; redesigning the landscape of the new trees and greenery, and placing new benches and trash receptacles in the square.

CRA member Jeff Triplett said back in July that he didn't like the renovations.

"It still looks like a basketball court to me," Triplett said.

The CRA set aside \$50,000 to hire a landscape architect to redo the square. Eddie Browder, ASLA, Vice

President of Landscape Architecture, and also a Sanford resident, presented a design that incorporated a central, 12-foot, thin fountain, with four large high rise Live Oak trees at each of the four corners of the square.

"If you keep it simple, it will please most people," Browder said.

In the design, the Blanchard Magnolia trees, which were purchased and placed in the square over the summer, were moved toward the parking lot behind Magnolia Square.

Browder left enough room in the design for people to comfortably window shop on all sides of the

Judge: Delayed release claims troubling

SANFORD — An attorney said he doesn't know how many people would join a lawsuit claiming illegal strip searches and unreasonable delays in releasing detainees, but a judge's decision last week could increase it substantially.

"The Sheriff's computers will spit that out and tell us," said Fern Park lawyer Larry Hanks. "Who knows how many will be involved?"

Attorneys filed a lawsuit against the Sheriff Don Eslinger, jail managers and Seminole County in June. Eight plaintiffs claimed they were illegally strip searched, but six also claimed in the suit that they were delayed from release at least five hours.

U.S. District Judge Gregory A. Presnell wrote an 18-page order Dec. 2. He dismissed part of the suit, but said the individual defendants are not immune from the strip search claims and that anyone held for an "unreasonable" amount of time can seek damages.

Hanks said the lawsuit could reach class-action status, similar to a lawsuit settled for more than \$4 million in Miami. In that suit, more than 5,000 women said they were illegally strip-searched.

Compared to other cases, Presnell said, the alleged delays in the current case are shorter, but he called the current allegations more

LONGWOOD — In October, a Longwood Boy Scout issued a promise to U.S. Marines and their families at the pre-deployment briefing of the 6th Motor Transport unit from Orlando.

State to crack down on DUI for holidays

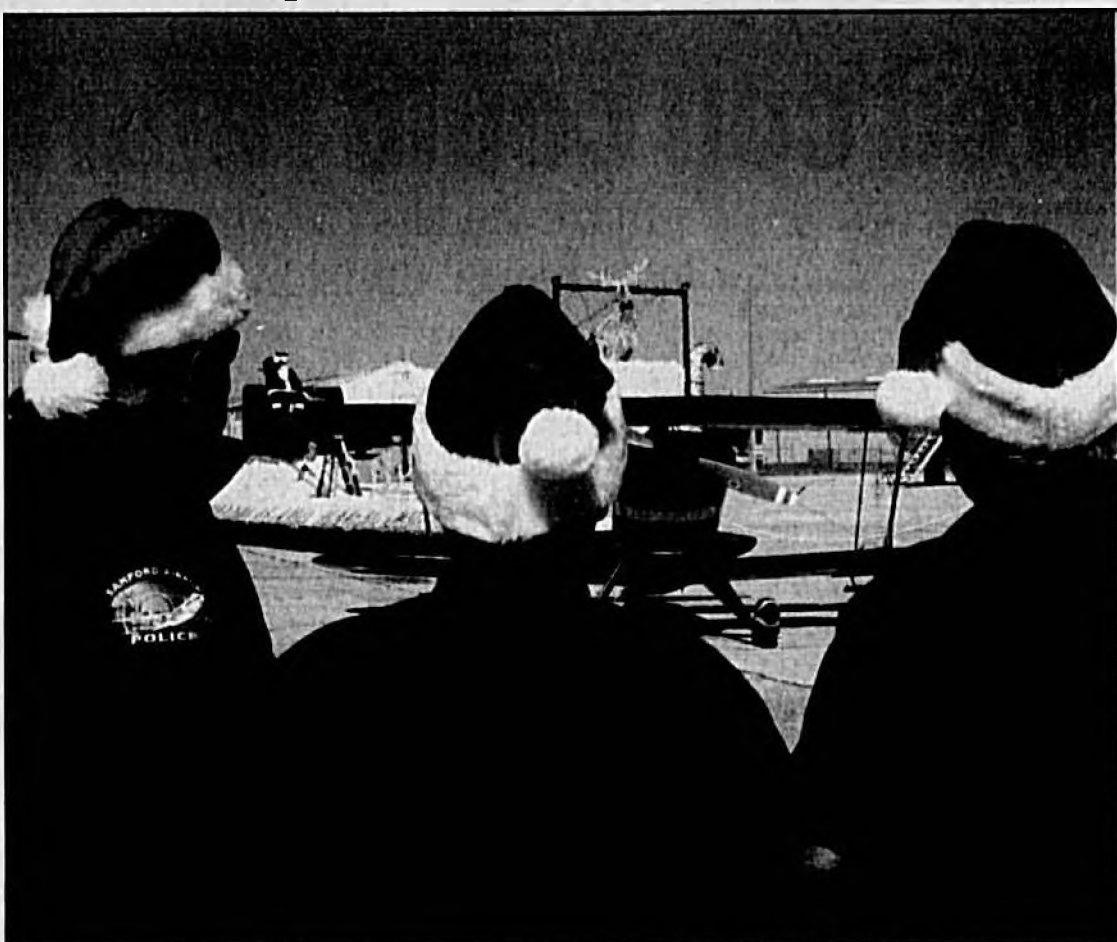
TALLAHASSEE — The Florida Department of Transportation and the Florida Office of Drug Control are sponsoring high visibility DUI enforcement operations during the last three weeks of December as part of the Drunk and Drugged Driving (3D) Prevention Month Enforcement Wave.

State and local law enforcement agencies in all 67 Florida counties have been asked to participate in the DUI wave between Dec. 10 and Jan. 1.

The agencies suggest the following tips for those who plan on drinking alcoholic beverages this holiday season:

- Don't risk getting sent to jail. If you plan to drink, don't drive. Take mass transit, a taxi or ask a sober friend to drive.
- Choose a sober designated driver before taking the first drink. Designated drivers are not those individuals who drank the least.
- Spend the night where the activity or party is being held. Party hosts should prepare accommodations or safe rides home for alcohol consuming partygoers.
- Report impaired drivers to law enforcement. Anyone can do this by dialing *FHP on their cellular phone.
- Always wear your safety belt. This is the best defense against an impaired driver.

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Scammers net more than \$10,000

SANFORD — Sanford police need help to identify a white male and black female who scammed \$2,000 from a city resident Thursday at the Harbor Federal Bank.

According to police, the man and woman arrived at the front door of the victim's residence Thursday and told the resident they were Sanford police officers. Both suspects wore business attire.

The man asked the victim to escort him to her bank and make a withdrawal of \$2,000 in reference to a police case. The man told the victim it is believed the money in the bank was counterfeit and had to be inspected prior to serving a search warrant, according to police reports.

The victim agreed to help and drove the man to Wachovia Bank, but she could not withdraw the money due to an alert placed on the account. She then drove the suspect to the Harbor Federal Bank and withdrew \$2,000 from her account. The man told the victim that indeed the money was counterfeit.

He then said he needed to

contact his partner and asked the victim to drive him to the Pizza Hut parking lot across the street from the bank. The male suspect then left in an unknown vehicle.

Harbor Federal Bank has provided photos from its security system, police said. Anyone with information, or who can identify the subject in the photo should call CrimeLine or

Investigator Ronny Neal of the Sanford Police Department at 407-323-3030.

A similar case occurred Oct. 14 in the Winn-Dixie parking lot.

A black suspect said he had just come from Daytona and he told a victim he was charged \$500, but police don't know what for. A second black male approached and the two sus-

pects asked the victim if she knew where an African Church was located. The victim said she did and one of the suspects asked her to drive them to the Dollar Store, which she did.

Then she drove them to the Wachovia Bank at 3603 Orlando Drive.

One man went in, while the other stayed with the victim in the car.

The suspects, according to police, asked the woman to establish trust by withdrawing \$9,000 from the bank.

One of the men pulled out a blue bandana and said there was \$50,000 in the cloth that he wanted to donate to local churches. Then they asked the victim to pray and one told her to place the wrapped money on top of his hand.

The victim then drove the suspects to the Bank of America at 3094 Orlando Drive. One of the men said he wife could pick them up there.

When the victim arrived home, she noticed her \$9,000 was missing and that the bandana contained only rolled up pieces of paper.

"Thanks for keeping your word on your project. Good luck to you also," Reyes wrote, signing the letter with the U.S. Marine's motto, Semper Paratus or "Always Faithful".

The project is important to Jimmy, not only because he wants to complete his Eagle Scout achievement, but because he has an older brother, Percy, stationed near Fallujah, Iraq, with the Marines. Percy's unit received care packages as well.

"I thought it was perfect," Jimmy said of the idea to send the items to Marines overseas. "I know they really appreciate it."

Each package cost \$7.70 in postage to send, Jimmy said. Sponsors donated more than \$1,500. The Altamonte Springs locations of Cracker Barrel and Costco also contributed items for the packages.

"Just getting packages from home, showing that we support them, is important," Jimmy said. He knows this because of Percy. "It really doesn't matter what's in them," Jimmy's packages included a letter and photo from the sponsor. He also included a cover letter from himself.

Recruited teams of friends and family stuffed the packages with items such as playing cards, powdered drink mix, pop tarts, Rice Krispie treats, pens, puzzle books, toothpaste, and crossword books.

Jimmy's oldest brother, Cyrus, 26, as well as Percy are Eagle Scouts. On the front lawn, the American flag flies atop one for the U.S. Marines. Would Jimmy ever follow his brother into the service?

"I think my mom would kill me," he said laughing. He will go to college, he added. Percy's deployment has been hard on

the family, especially his mother Anita, he said. The family sends Percy notes through a service that the U.S. Marines provide, so that helps, Jimmy said.

Like many Scouts, Jimmy gets kidded somewhat at school for belonging to the Boy Scouts.

"Scouts are not that respected at school," Jimmy explains, but the Eagle rank is respected. "People understand how uncommon an Eagle Scout is." He tells his friends that if a job comes down to them or him, he will have a better chance because of the Eagle rank.

Brown, whose son Corp. Daniel Brown is also in Iraq, said the local Marine family readiness officer helped with the project. First Sgt. Jose Henao helped clear the way for the project to go forward.

The goal of the project was 50 boxes, but that was easily surpassed with donations, Jimmy said. More than 80 boxes will be sent in total, he said. With the money left over, Jimmy will purchase toys for the children left here by Marines deployed in Iraq. Anything left over after that will go toward items for the Toys for Tots program that the Marines operate every Christmas.

Jimmy's Eagle project is not complete, he explained. He has

paperwork to fill out. Recently he and Brown reconciled the financial aspects. "It came out perfect," Jimmy proudly announced.

He will have a Scoutmaster conference and go before a Board of Review. He should be ready to receive the rank at a Court of Honor in April or May, whenever his brother returns from his tour of duty. Dan Brown should be back by then as well.

Aspy Canteenwalla, Jimmy's father, is originally from Pakistan. On Thursday, he wore his Lake Mary High School bowling team shirt because the team's banquet was that night. Jimmy is on the successful Rams bowling team.

"I'm real proud of him for his project," Aspy said. He had encouraged his son to do something a little different than other projects. "These men are serving the country, and the timing is perfect at Christmas."

Jimmy said the people around him gave him the confidence to take on such a large project. "I didn't see how I would finish it," he said, recalling the start. Brown said the project is the single biggest obstacle to reaching Eagle Scout because it's so intimidating for the young people.

The requirements can be difficult, but Jimmy was up to the

task.

"Typically young men his age are not equipped to do this," Brown pointed out. They often have other distractions.

Jimmy's parents were able to let their son take on the project without much input from them.

"They were always here," he said. "They also have to do the step-back and let me do it kind of thing."

Jimmy said he is looking forward to greeting the Marines when they return. He has already received an email from one of the soldier's mothers thanking him for the package.

He tries not to listen to the news because it doesn't give the full picture of the efforts in Iraq. Percy tells him about the more positive aspects of the military and rebuilding.

"This is something very near and dear to us," said Anita, who works for Seminole County Public Schools. "When you have someone serving you think about it in a different way."

I Remember When

As my folks were relatively poor, the gifts were often simple and mostly unwrapped such as a wagon or toy airplane. Nevertheless, it was a grand sight.

I would usually stay up for an hour or two playing with the gifts, but as sleep finally got the best of me, I would go back to bed — this time to really sleep and dream about how lucky I was. The next day, Christmas Day, it was off to church in the morning, then the traditional Christmas feast. As we raised chickens and grew our own potatoes, there was no question about what we would have. My mother was an old-fashioned cook and the food was delicious. I don't know why, we had the same meal quite often, but on Christmas Day, the meal was always special.

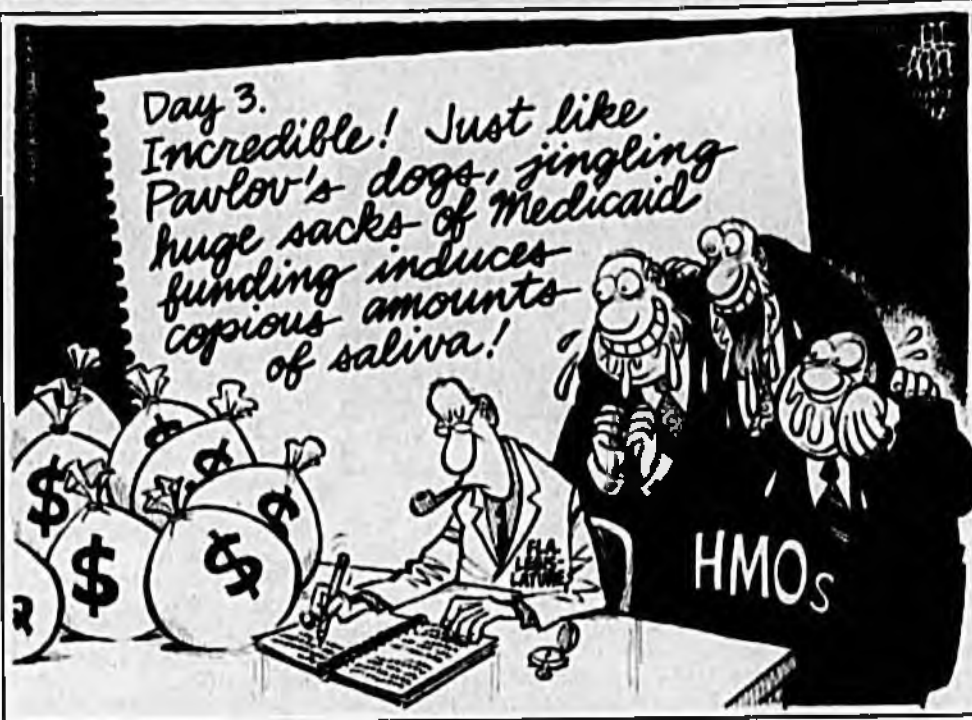
There was always snow on the ground. In my 10's, 11's and 12's, I would usually go outdoors and play with some of my gifts. As I recall, by the time I was 13 and older, I ended up shoveling snow out of our driveway so folks could move their cars. We had a very long driveway and this is not one of my fondest recollections.

The Christmas tree in those days was usually decorated in only a few manufactured bulbs. The rest of the decorations were something we might have made in school and carried on from year to year.

There were candles on the tree — not electric lights. It was often my job to light the candles in the evening hours, and blow them out before I went to bed. Now days, the use of candles on a tree is extremely dangerous. Up in Michigan, we had no problem getting a tree, as there were tree farms nearby. Usually my folks would lay out \$3 to \$5 to purchase one, if we had none growing along the fence line.

In the late days of World War II, my sister had a tree in her Detroit home. My brother, in the U.S. Air Corps, was expected to return from the war by Christmas. As it turned out, his discharge was delayed. My sister told him she would leave the tree up until he returned. He finally came back in late April, but true to her promise, the tree remained up and fully decorated. It was a real tree, and required watering daily. Within a few days after he returned, the tree suddenly died. It was always amazement to me until I realized that after he came back, she probably didn't water the tree any more.

I don't know about you, but in my family, we often sit around at Christmas time relating these old stories, and reminiscing about what we considered our best and worst Christmas recollections. You might try this. It helps people, even in a close-knit family, to understand more about each other. So those are my Christmas memories. I hope you enjoyed them. Now, think about your past Christmas times.

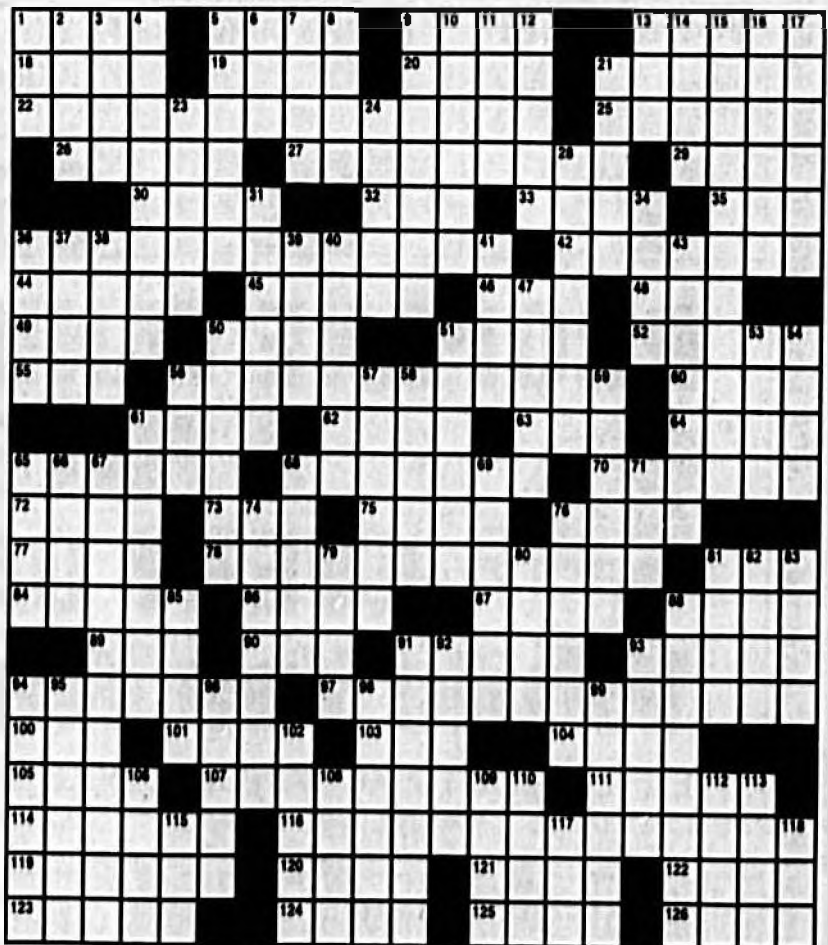

troubling. "The defendants are alleged to have simply refused to release the plaintiffs — despite a court order to do so — pursuant to an official policy, practice or custom," Presnell wrote in his order. "To this court, such an unjustified delay is so obviously a violation of every citizen's due process rights that it precludes qualified immunity even in the absence of case law directly on point."

Hanks said immediate release obviously does not mean instantaneous, but these people waited five hours at least.

"I am very familiar with the release process," Hanks said.

"I understand those procedures have to be done. If the jail does not have people in place to obey the rule of the court or to reasonably get people out of that system, then they have a problem."

Immediate release must be defined, Hanks added, but not by the Seminole County jail.

"What we don't want to get into as a society is just giving an institution carte blanche on what it thinks is reasonable," he said.

Now, even people who were "unreasonably" detained can join the lawsuit, Hanks said, whether or not they have been strip-searched.

"That process can be incredibly slow, and probably unlawfully slow," he said Wednesday.

The Sheriff's Office now has its "marching orders", Hanks said, to streamline the release process.

He said the jail should update its employees and practices.

"We know what the procedure is, this is not rocket science," Hanks said.

Presnell also ordered that Seminole County failed to legally show that it cannot be held liable for the actions of the individuals who operate the jail.

The county had argued that it was not liable for actions of jail personnel, but the plaintiffs allege that the county delegates man-

agement and operations of the jail.

That is why the county was included in the lawsuit.

The plaintiffs also alleged that jail personnel failed to get written authorization before performing strip searches as required by Florida law.

Presnell, however, dismissed this part of the lawsuit.

He explained that the plaintiffs claimed the strip searches violated the 14th Amendment right to due process, but, according to the judge, the searches are really Fourth Amendment claims.

The Fourth Amendment explicitly protects against the kind of "intrusive searches alleged in this complaint," Presnell wrote.

The Way We Were:

Brief history of LM church

Ettie Jane Gleason Keogh of Lake Mary loaned me a copy of a 1933 brochure entitled "A Brief history of Lake Mary Community Church (Presbyterian Government)". Rev. James M. Thomson, pastor. I have edited this history for this article.

Rev. J.F. Sundell, pastor of the Swedish Presbyterian church of Upsala, lived on the north shore of Lake Mary so it was natural for him to take an interest in the welfare of the community of Lake Mary.

In 1894, Rev. Sundell was instrumental in bringing Rev. H. Keigwar, synodical Missionary to the area where he conducted evangelistic services. He was able to stimulate enough interest to call for the organization of a church in Lake Mary. A petition for a church was circulated and signed by a large number of citizens. It was presented to the Presbytery on Oct. 10, 1894 during its meeting in Lakeland.

The request was granted and a committee consisting of Rev. Keigwar, Rev. Sundell and Elder Charles Ericson was appointed to organize the church. The organization was consummated the following Sunday, Oct. 14, 1894.

The first elders were J.Z. McDonald, Donald McDonald and J.A. Nyland.

With financial assistance from the Board of Church Extension, the newly formed church purchased a two-year old building built by A.E. Sjoblom.

The first pastor was Rev. D.A. Dodge who remained for four years. Then, the work was carried on for another 10 years by Rev. Sundell.

Evidently, the church became inactive for a few years as it is stated in the booklet that the church was revived in 1915. This was through the efforts of Rev. R.W. Edwards who was Pastor Evangelist. He brought in the Rev. H.M. Morey of the Presbytery of New York who conducted preaching services for two weeks in February 1915. As a result of these efforts, the church received many new members. W.V. Dunn and H.D. Durant were elected ruling elders on May 7, 1915 and on April 16, A.E. Sjoblom was elected Sunday School Superintendent and John D. Evans as Sunday School Secretary.

During the early 1920's an effort was made to operate the church independent of all denominations, but it was not successful. The work was then put back under Presbyterian control with the coming of Rev. J.S. Clark.

Rev. Allen Bowering served as pastor for a few months during the winter of 1925-26. On Jan. 18, 1926, the Ladies Aid Society was organized.

Rev. James M. Thompson came in as pastor in April, 1926. As there was no other church in Lake Mary, several denominations were represented in this church. On Nov. 26, new members received came from eight denominations. Soon afterwards, the community church idea was adopted but it was decided to remain under Presbyterian government and control.

The church's first Easter Sunrise Service was held April 17, 1927 at Evansdale Park overlooking the lake. This became an annual event.

On Dec. 15, 1927, a building committee was elected consisting of P.D. Anderson, Frank Evans, W.V. Dunn, W.G. Ferguson and J.M. Thompson. Architect J.L. Snoddy volunteered his services.

A large crew of volunteer laborers started work on Monday, Dec. 26, 1927 with Chester Saunders as foreman. More than 50 people volunteered to perform some service on the building. Leading workmen were carpenters Leon Pickering and Walter Flanders. Frank Evans established the credit while liberal cash contributions came from P.D. Anderson, C.H. Ellis, William True and Fred Bailey.

William True laid all the flooring in the auditorium. George A. Jones solicited funds for the purchase of a bell and had it installed. J. Staub contributed the wiring, Miller and Ericson donated the cornerstone and Mr. and Mrs. Harry Wing donated the pulpit bible.

There is a long list of 20 ladies who nailed down the flooring and Mrs. LaCourt contributed with fancy covering for the pulpit.

The Ladies Aid Society, under the leadership of Mrs. Frank Evans, contributed the first \$1,000. Part of this came from a quilt they had made which contained autographs of famous men including the current president, Calvin Coolidge.

The cornerstone was laid during the ceremony on Jan. 3, 1928. The building was occupied before it was completed. The finished building was dedicated March 30, 1930.

In 1933, the following were serving as trustees and elders: P.D. Anderson, C.H. Crosby, Fred Bailey, Homer Gleason, Roy Howell, Robert True, R.D. White, W.V. Dunn and H.D. Durant.

Mrs. J.N. Thompson was leader of the choir. Mabel Cole was organist, and choir members were Mrs. Horace Fennell, Mrs. Robert True, Miss Bernice Edmondson, Mr. R.D. White, Prof. Clarence Ibbill, and Mr. Harry Darrow.

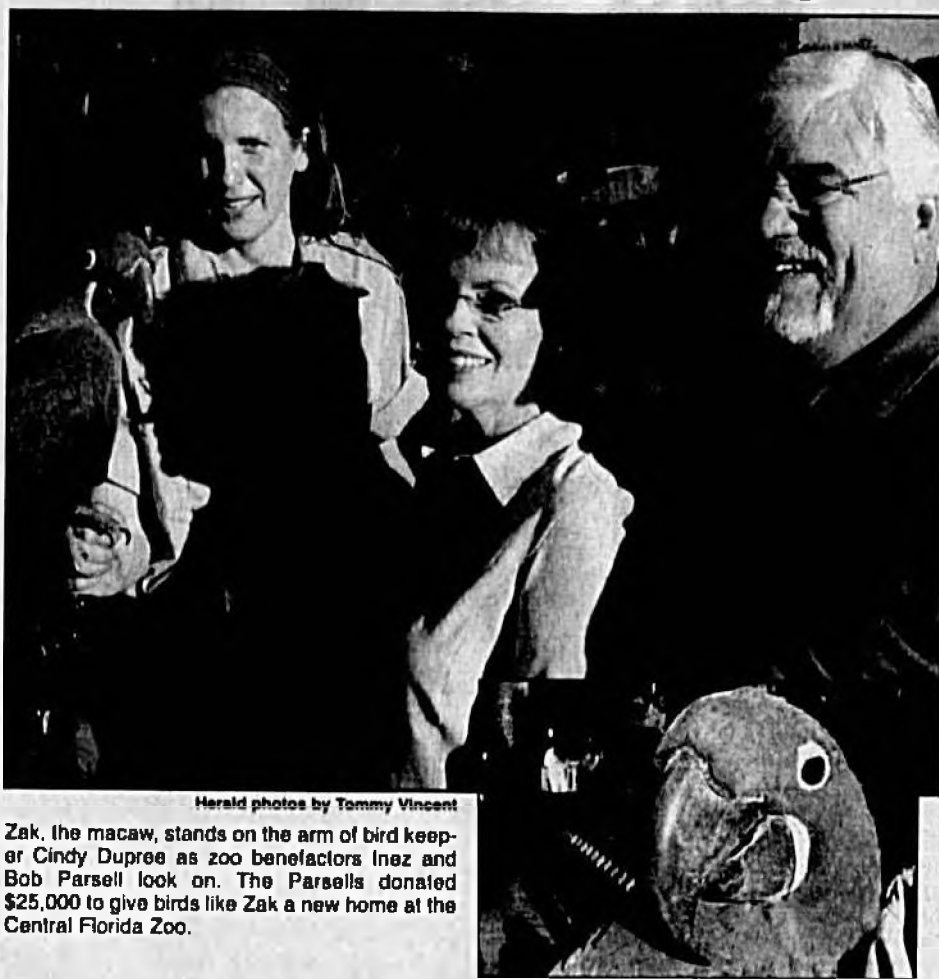
Officers of the Ladies Society were Mrs. Horace Fennell, Mrs. C.H. Lowe, Mrs. Leon Pickering and Mrs. J.M. Thompson.

R.D. Shute was Sunday School Superintendent. Christine Cole, secretary. Mrs. W.E. Cole, treasurer and Mrs. H. Houghton, pianist. Teachers were Mrs. W.E. Cole, Mrs. Mary Harris, Mrs. J.M. Thompson, Mrs. Horace Cochran, Mrs. W.V. Dunn, Mr. Harry Darrow, Prof. Clarence Ibbill, Mrs. P.D. Anderson, Mrs. Fred Bailey and P.D. Anderson.

The Boy Scout Committee members were Raymond Ball, R.D. White, and J.M. Thompson. Harry Darrow was scoutmaster with Don Anderson as assistant. Scouts were Russ Whitaker, Raymond Anderson, Neil Fisher, Barto Hutchinson, Floyd Touchstone, James Cochran, Charles Touchstone, Norman White, Earnest Wilson, Henry Tarrun and Roy Howell.

In the brochure, there is a list of 79 members with the dates of their having joined the church. Mrs. Louisa Nyland had the longest membership, having joined on Oct. 14, 1894.

SANFORD — Five years ago Bob and Inez Parsell watched a female hyacinth macaw named Aerial hatch at the Central Florida Zoological park.

Last Friday, after watching the bird grow over the last several years, Parsell and his wife participated in an unveiling of a new aviary, which they donated \$25,000 to see built.

Parsell said in a phone interview Thursday that he got to know the bird and the bird's keeper, Cindy.

"We got to watch the keeper and the macaw bond, which was really neat," Parsell said. "I can't tell you — when it was a little thing, you could look up at her and see her communicate with the keeper."

Parsell said when he and his wife found

out that the bird didn't have a display, they offered to build one. Shortly after, the zoo got another macaw around the same age as Aerial — a male named Zach. The first display that was built for the two birds, thanks to the Parsell's donation, was small he said, but "really nice."

With so many changes happening at the zoo, there was not going to be a display area for the macaws, Parsell said. He added that he gladly donated money for another display.

"We didn't want to see them not on display," he said.

According to Parsell, the new aviary is bigger and "much nicer" than the original display he and his wife donated money for.

"[The zoo] did a marvelous job in doing the exhibit," he said. "[The macaw] have become so special to us, so that's why we are involved."

Stetson's Corner Make a Joyful Noise

A pair of sandhill cranes were hanging out between the Geneva Baptist church and Geneva Elementary last week and they inspired me to write and share, as nature always does. Turns out these beautiful birds have a lot to teach us about values and life in general.

The Florida sandhill crane is a non-migratory crane

while the greater sandhill crane winters in Florida after nesting in the Great Lakes region. Just like true "snow birds" migratory cranes arrive in large numbers in November and December and leave during March and April. Some species of cranes breed as far north as the arctic tundra and the Bering Strait landbridge!

The Mississippi sandhill crane is another non migratory subspecies that is currently endangered.

No matter where they live, the sandhills fascinate us with their stylistic mating rituals and dance. They bob and bow, trumpeting and leaping into the air then "parachuting" down on their large wings. Sandhills mate for life, thus are often seen in pairs, and deliver 2 eggs at a time. The parents will not fly until the babies are ready to fly, this is why you'll see 3 or 4 sandhills together — they probably are a family.

Like our village of Geneva, the sandhills walk quietly about the rural, wetland landscapes observing their

various neighbors, enjoying a wild and beautifully independent life. On the other hand, just like us, they can be quite noisy! Their distinct voices carry long distances, trumpeting all kinds of messages to each other and to the world.

Interestingly the sandhill does not eat fish like a heron, but is an omnivore that eats small vertebrates like mice, snakes, lizards, crayfish as well as insects, grains, seeds, and berries. The sandhill however can be tempted for handouts, but this is never a good idea. Especially in temperate Florida, sandhills have become "nuisances" in subdivisions, golf courses, etc. where people have fed them. Their sharp beaks can cause a lot of damage as they look for food in the all the wrong places.

Our sister towns in the Midwest, like Lake Geneva, Wis., also share their wetlands with a variety of cranes including the migratory sandhill. Sandhill cranes were used to test southern migration routes with an ultralite plane. The whooping crane recovery project took the information learned and tried it out with the endangered whooping crane. One of the routes was from Necedah Wisconsin to the gulf coast of Florida. The hope is that they would teach their offspring to follow the route.

Amazingly the whooping crane is 65 million years old and man almost caused it to be extinct a few years ago. Fossil bones thought to be a sandhill crane were found in Nebraska and were estimated to be 10 million years old. Sandhills live a long life, longer than many other birds, some up to twenty years.

Cultures have mostly embraced these elegant birds using them as a symbol of loyalty, fidelity, joy, celebration of life. Asian cultures saw the white as purity and the red head as a sign of vitality or fire, and often associated cranes with good fortune.

Geneva celebrates its beloved sandhill cranes by featuring them on the Geneva Historical Society's license plate and t-shirts. Graphic artist Shaughnessy Hart created a beautiful design especially for the Geneva Historical Society. You can purchase them at the museum, at historical events, or by emailing GenevaHCS@aol.com

As the hectic holidays approach we can look to these lovely creatures to find peace and a deep appreciation for living in our beautiful Geneva.

We can take a moment to walk quietly among the river and lake wetlands, so precious and currently so vulnerable. Then we can throw our heads back and trumpet for joy!

square, by request of the CRA. He also incorporated checkerboard concrete pavers, such as on 1st Street, in a circle between the four trees and around the fountain, to break up the monotony of the red brick.

The existing benches would be placed underneath the large oak trees, which will provide shade in the summer months.

Because the CRA set aside \$50,000, Browder broke up his vision into two phases, with the first phase costing approximately \$51,000, not including the cost and installation of the fountain.

The fountain, which would be made by Robinson Iron in Alabama, would stand 12-feet tall, but would be narrow enough to allow seating by the fountain without a lot of overspray.

Browder warned though that the particular 12-foot fountain, called The Phoenix, is only being proposed at this time.

He told CRA members that more studies would need to be done to see if a 12-foot fountain would look appropriate in the square. Browder also discussed the possibility of a 7-foot fountain, but he told CRA members that if they go too small, "it's going to look like an afterthought."

Phase II of the project Browder called the "icing on the cake", with four bronze medallions set into the brick, with sculpted magnolias in the center of each of them.

Phase II could also include notice boards hanging on the empty walls that line Magnolia Square, to encourage people to keep window shopping between windows. The boards would contain upcoming city events, or advertisements from downtown vendors, which the city could lease out. Another aspect of Phase II would be the placement of several lampposts with hanging flower baskets, and other finishing touches.

CRA Chairman Bob Parsell said he liked the design, but was concerned, after last Saturday's Christmas in the Square event, about where they would put people in the square for future events.

Mayor Linda Kuhn was present at the meeting and suggested the possibility of closing Magnolia Avenue to 2nd Street, and use that space as well.

"It's not that big of a concern to me," she said. "Staff can work around it."

CRA member Charles Rowe was concerned with the cost of completing Magnolia Square.

"Is anybody surprised at the price?" he asked.

Browder explained to the board members that \$45,000 is not a lot of money to bring Magnolia Square up to the level of the RiverWalk. In fact, he said, the price tag of completing the project would be a lot higher, but city staff will be providing most of the labor for the project.

Triplet agreed. "[Do] you want something that's going to stand out, or do you want what we've got?" he asked.

Parsell told members to digest the landscape plans for the next 30 days and be ready to make a decision at their next meeting in January.

Browder said in a phone interview Thursday that he was excited about this project, but knew it was going to be a formidable task.

"We were up for the challenge," he said. "I saw the great potential with that space because of its location and its importance to the city."

Browder, who has a passion for outdoor spaces, said the reality of today's material and labor prices is an issue, but he

said the cast iron fountain he's looking at would be around for 100 years.

"We wanted to go with quality material," Browder said.

If the CRA cannot manage the cost of the fountain, they discussed putting large planters in the center, that could be easily removed, until they could afford to put the fountain in.

felt Trezise was justified in the shooting, although it is against the department's policy to shoot at a moving vehicle. Trezise claimed he was in fear for his life. The deputy said in the investigatory files that, he too, felt in danger.

"I think an officer can exercise some judgment," Yehl said.

In April 2005, Trezise was accused of insubordination and improper conduct toward the public, which led to his firing. Both of those accusations were investigated and deemed founded by Internal Affairs Sgt. Mike Taylor. Tooley terminated Trezise at that time.

Through Trezise's employee contract with the police union, he was able to appeal his termination or file for arbitration. Yehl said he decided to listen to the appeal instead of arbitration.

"I wanted to know the facts in the case and arbitration is a big roll of the dice," Yehl said.

Oscar Redden, a member of Concerned Citizens Committee of Seminole, said Friday that the minority community should be important enough to go through the arbitration process.

"We pleaded with [Yehl] not to put the man back on the streets in our community," Redden said.

Redden felt that Yehl should have talked with the City Commission about Trezise's rehiring, because he felt it was a public matter.

According to a letter written by the CCCS addressed to Yehl and Tooley, the rehiring of Trezise caused a "giant step backward" in community relations.

"We are insultingly disappointed and possess profound questions and concerns about the loud and clear message sent to us by this administrative decision," the letter said.

Trezise had 20 complaints on file, with 8 substantiated findings, and with 12 either unfounded, not sustained, or exonerated.

Yehl said despite the complaints on file, he also had to look

at Trezise's yearly evaluations, which were good enough to receive a raise each year.

He said that made Trezise's situation "iffy" at best, if it had gone to arbitration. He said in his experience, if there is not a solid case the arbitrator usually sides with the employee.

"If the employee is bad, why is he getting raises each year?" Yehl questioned.

According to Yehl, he felt Trezise's use of force was justifiable. If you take that away all you have is the action for insubordination and rude behavior, he added.

"Under my terms, [Trezise] has to execute a 'last chance' agreement before he comes back. That gives us some rights we didn't have before. He can't appeal any future disciplinary action," Yehl said.

The agreement also requires Trezise to attend anger management counseling.

Yehl said: "I think with the last chance agreement, either [Trezise's] behavior will change or he's no longer on the force."

Members of the CCCS met with Yehl on Thursday to discuss their disappointment with Trezise's rehiring.

"They thought I needed to be more sensitive to race relations in the community," Yehl said. "While I need to be sensitive to these concerns and issues, I also have to deal with the facts before me."

Hachigian said although Trezise acted improperly, he was in a volatile and hostile environment at the time and was frustrated. "We're all human," Hachigian said. "Did [Trezise] act improperly? Absolutely." But, he continued, nothing in Trezise's files indicate he is racist. "Those comments are totally out of line," Hachigian said.

But Redden, speaking on behalf of the CCCS, said although they don't want to pick a fight with the city over this, they are looking for justice.

"Everybody deserves a mistake," Redden said of Trezise. "But this guy has a book full."

The Silver Hawks are seeded only No. 6 in an amazing national field at the City of Palms and the Lions will also be facing a loaded national field at the GFS.

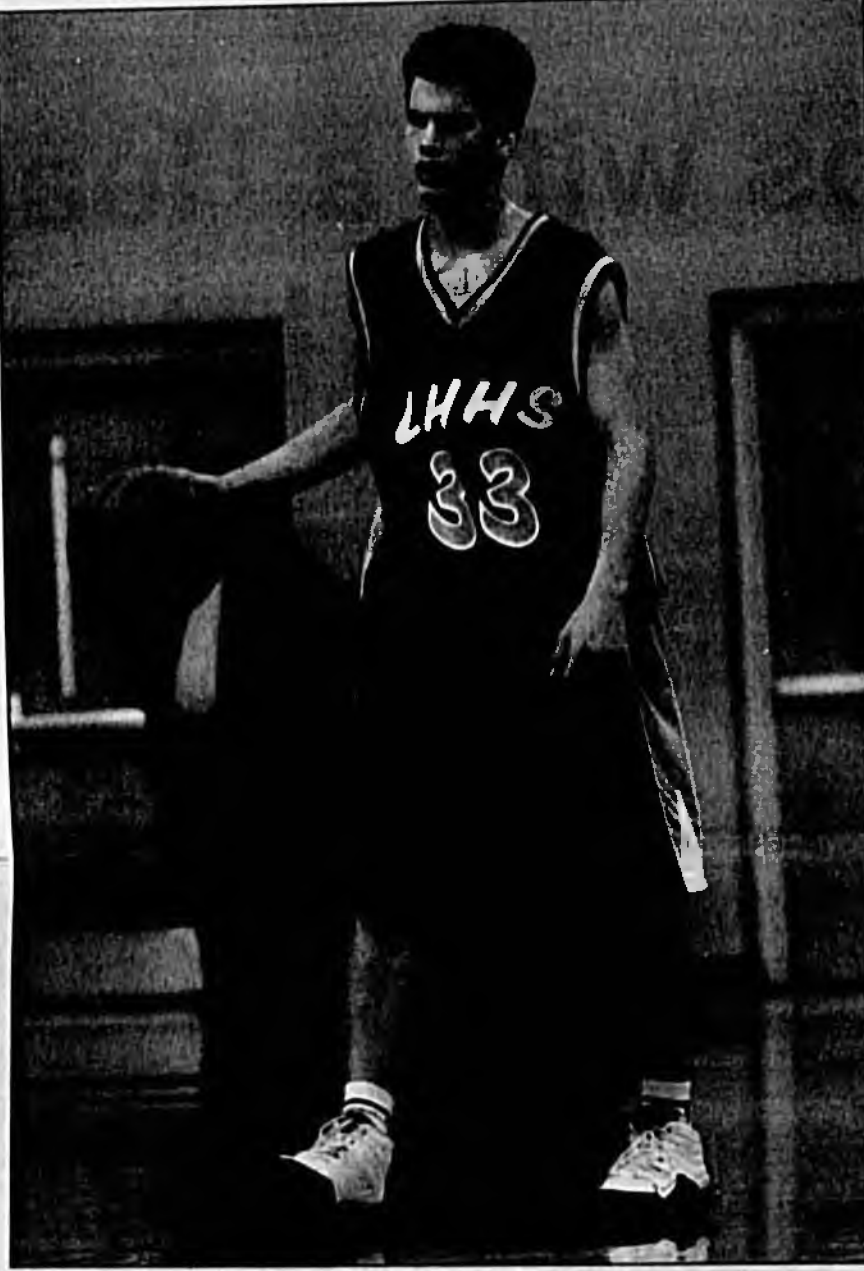
