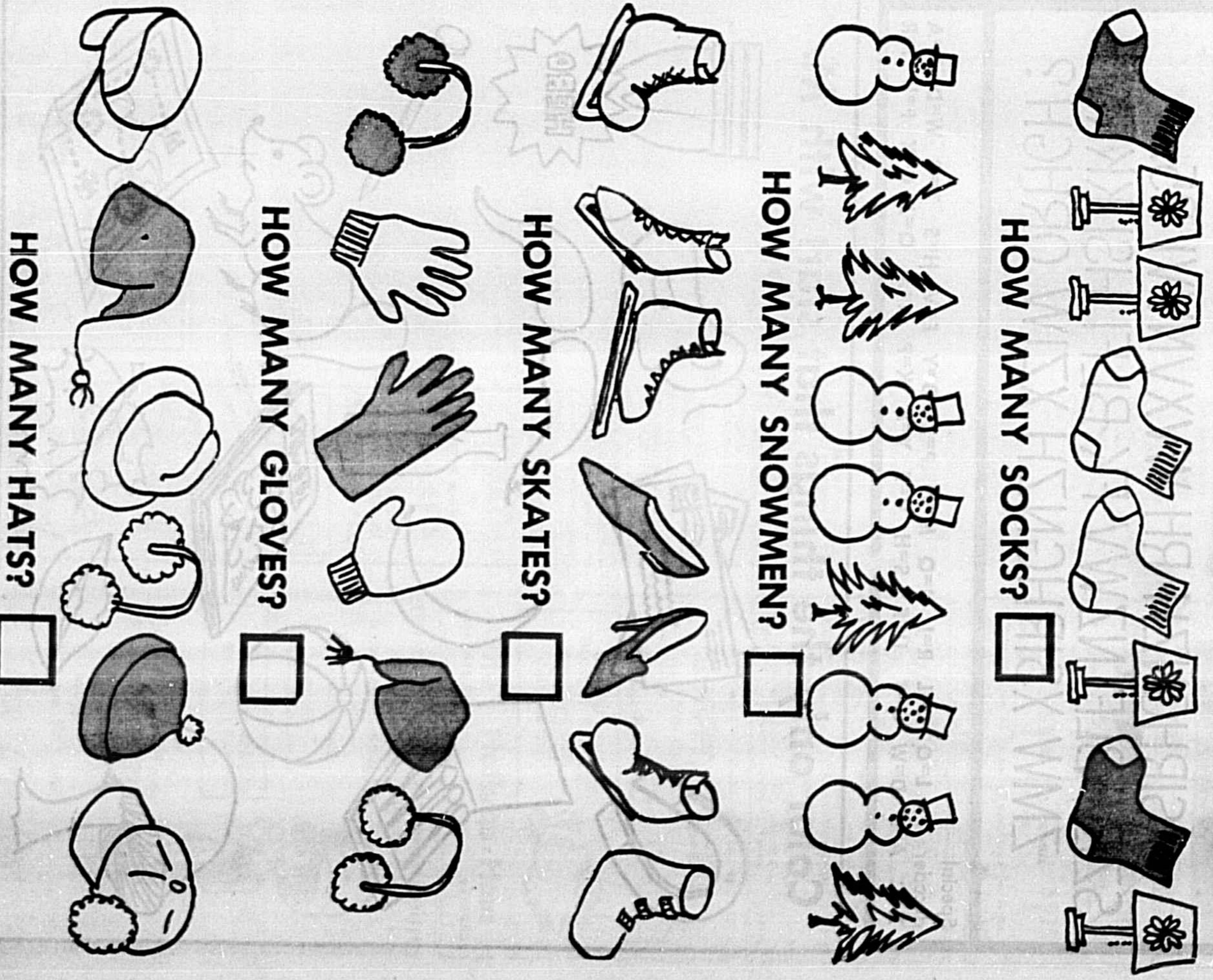

## Sanford Is State Terminal Auto Train Is Coming

 Sanford will find its own unique spot on the national map Tuesday when the first Auto Train pulls into its new terminal on Perimeter Avenue and unloads approximately 400 northerners and their 100 automobiles.

The first train is scheduled to leave its northern terminus, Lorton, Va., 12 miles south of Washington, D. C., at 8 p.m. this evening. It is due to arrive here at 11 Tuesday morning.

Aboard also will be company officials and representatives of various news media from the north. They will be greeted by 10 Seminole Junior College coeds, who will dispense free oranges and free orange juice in welcoming these visitors to the state. Local dignitaries also will greet the visitors.

The Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce will be host to the visiting newsmen, company officials and local county and city governmental officers and other dignitaries at a 1 p.m. luncheon at the House of Steaks. Top guests will be Auto Train Corporation officers: Eugene Garfield, president, and Kenneth Howes, Richard Tolbert, Jules Van Markson, and Richard Goldstein, all vice presidents.

Regular nonstop auto-train service will be inaugurated Tuesday, with trains leaving Sanford and Lorton at 8 p.m. and arriving the next morning at the opposite city at 11 a.m.

During the overnight 15-hour ride, passengers will ride in newly designed bi-level dome passenger coaches. The dome areas have been fitted with reclining leg and foot rest seats, designed and built especially for the Auto-Train. Bedroom accommodations complete with color television also are available.

Upon boarding the Auto-Train, passengers will be treated to a complimentary buffet featuring Beef Wellington and Lobster Bellevue, which will be served in two newly designed dining cars. A complimentary continental breakfast will be served at the seats the following morning. Complimentary hors d'oeuvres will be served in the lower lounge areas of the dome coaches. Following the buffet, free first-run movies will be shown in the dining cars.

Passengers also will be able to relax and enjoy themselves in a bi-level dome night club car. Complete with piano, the car will have a starlight lounge and intimate cocktail room.

The automobiles will be carried in fully enclosed bi-level dome trailers. Auto-Train attendants will load the automobiles before departure and will deliver the automobiles to the passengers upon arrival.

## Kidnaper Of Girl Shot, Captured

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — A shotgun-wielding man abducted a mid-clad college girl from her home at dawn today, holed up in a woods, demanding \$1,000, and was shot and wounded when he tried to pick up the ransom. "He didn't hurt me. Jesus was with me," the girl, Geraldine Givens, 17, said following the hour-long ordeal. She was uninjured.

Andrew Jackson, who lived near the Givens home in rural east Tallahassee, was hospitalized for treatment of a wounded right forearm, said Leon County Sheriff Ray Hamlin.

Hamlin said Miss Givens' father, Gerald Givens, was wiping dew from a windshield at 7:20 a.m. when a shotgun-carrying man stepped from behind an oak tree and said, "I need \$1,000."

Givens told him he didn't have it, but would get it. Inside the house, Geraldine and her mother, Azura, a language professor at Florida State, telephoned the sheriff's office.

By the time the first deputy had arrived, the man had taken Geraldine, an FSU freshman, 100 yards into the woods at gunpoint. Hamlin's men and city and state officers sealed off the area and brought in Bloodhounds.

Minutes later, said Hamlin, a call was received at the Givens home from the girl, who said her father wanted \$1,000 in cash left behind a horse barn at the rear of the house.

## Seven Arrested In Drug Shootout

 A combined force of Seminole, Volusia County and U. S. Bureau of Narcotics undercover agents captured seven persons, including a woman, after an arranged drug purchase early Saturday backfired in a true "cops and robbers" shoot-out.

In what appeared to be an actual plot written for television or the movies, county and undercover agents had arranged to purchase from an Orlando-based drug ring, believed to be part of the so-called "Dixie Mafia" led by Errol B. Bessih, under sentence to death in the murder of a police informer.

According to Sheriff John Polk, the "buy" was supposed to have taken place in a rented panel truck at a Longwood parking lot. Nervous "hoods" met agents there at a pre-arranged time and wanted to see the \$60,000, used by agents to purchase 1,000 pounds of marijuana.

After the initial meeting, agents followed the man to the rented truck at K-mart shopping center on U. S. 17-92 at Fern Park, where the "deal" was to have been completed but, instead of marijuana, narcotics agents were confronted with four men, three with shotguns and the fourth with a 20-30 rifle. The fifth man, who led officers to the scene, produced a pistol.

Lt. A. F. Davis, Seminole undercover agent, who opened the door to the truck, shouted, "It's a rip-off" and slammed the door shut in the face of the four guns.

Nearly cars containing eight other agents quickly arrived on the scene as bullets sprayed the parking lot from both sides.

Miraculously, no one was hit. It was at this point that a car containing Weyman Gerald Glover, 30, Orlando, and Joyce Kay Woodbury, 25, 1726 Wyandotte Trail, Casselberry, arrived on the scene. They quickly fled north on 17-92, turned onto Semoran east with agents in pursuit.

Describing Glover as "the Mr. Big" of the drug ring, Duane Harrell, chief deputy, said Glover's car was stopped after agents pumped bullets into the

## Foreign Migrants Deported

APOPKA, Fla. (AP) — Sixty-six migrant workers, including a woman and two teen-age children were arrested in a labor camp near here Sunday by border patrol agents and charged with violating U.S. immigration laws.

Robert L. Woytych, district director of the U. S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, said 64 of the migrants were from Mexico and two from Jamaica. He said the workers would be returned to their own countries.

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# Zoning Board Member Criticizes City Council Action

**LONGWOOD** — "The city has been had" — that's the cry that is being heard in the City of Longwood. J. R. Grant as the City Zoning Board discussed approval by the City Council of the Winsor Manor plat without prior recommendation of the advisory board.

And the board unanimously passed a motion to order an official stamp to be placed on plats in the future to make certain that the City Council is clearly knowledgeable in the future whether the zoning board has given stamp of approval to planned subdivisions.

At the same time, Councilman Agnes Weber, who served as secretary to the board in the absence of the regular secretary, revealed she had not examined the plat submitted by developer Irving Berger to the Council before voting to approve it.

He stated that the Winsor Manor plat had been discussed enough when Councilman Sandra Thompson begged for delay before official approval was given, Mrs. Weber said. "I just took it for granted it was the same plat approved by the zoning board."

Member Richard Crenshaw at

the same time urged that a subdivision in October with the development containing 185 homes and with a 21-acre water storage area for the low-lying land, no copy of the plat was filed with the zoning board.

Plans approved by Council Tuesday night had only 70 homes with no water storage area. Indication was that the final plat was for only a section of the property at old State's Airport, north of SR 424.

Grant said, "Unless the zoning board passes on development plans, the city council should not pass them."

Acting vice chairman Eugene Jones said Tuesday the council "will apologize to the zoning board for passing the subdivision without its approval, but that that is all we will do."

Meanwhile Councilman Thompson, who voted against passage, said he felt the city had given the developer a "blank check."

In other business the zoning board: Voted to have a duplicate copy of zoning board minutes placed in the city clerk's office where they will be available to the Council.

Also requested copies of the Zoning Ordinance considered by Council some time ago but not passed — as well as copies of the multi-family dwelling district ordinance.

Harry Wolk, of Pomona, N.Y., who visits friends and relatives in Fort Lauderdale, said, "It was a great trip. The service and food were absolutely excellent." Jules Miller, of Rye, N.Y., looked at it from the economical aspect and commented, "Although I've been in Florida many times previously, it would cost \$600 for air fare alone, not including the additional expense for a rental car. This time, our family of four made it for only \$190 (or \$380 round-trip).

"And as far as the service is concerned, it's as good or better than any I've ever had on an airplane."

The impression of long-time Sanford residents' "It's the first time I've seen a traffic jam in these parts for the last 40 years."

## Balloting Strong In 2 Cities' Vote

 Only Casellberry, of the five Seminole municipalities with elections today, was experiencing a heavy voter turnout at the polls. City Clerk Mary Hawthorne said voters have been turning out in record numbers since the polls at 7 this morning.

Some 2,681 residents of the community are qualified to vote in the election, which will select a mayor and two councilmen. Candidates for mayor are incumbent Curtis Blow, David McCoy and Richard Wirz. Voting for two council seats are incumbents Edith Duerz and Bill Grier, Owen Sheppard and Dr. John Zaico.

Meanwhile in the City of Sanford, City Clerk Henry Tamm said by 11 a.m. 456 voters had been to the polls at the civic center, in what he said indicated the "biggest vote in the history of Sanford." There are 6,684 persons registered to vote in the election for two commission seats and on a \$4 million drainage issue.

Running for Group I seat on the City Commission are Carmen Gager, A. A. McManahan and incumbent W. Vincent Roberts and for Group II J. E. Connely, Earl Higginbotham and John G. Morris.

In Longwood, with little more than half of the city's 1,124 voters expected to turn out, and with a moderate turnout seen during the morning, a new mayor is being chosen as well as three councilmen. Polling place is city hall.

Running for the office of registered voter: Orlando city clerk Nancy Cox said the turnout in her city, was fairly light this morning in a special referendum on a charter amendment and two annexation issues. The polls in all five cities will close at 7 p.m. tonight.

Monday night a political rally and forum with all six Sanford candidates present to discuss the issues was sponsored by the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce and the Sanford-Seminole Junior Chamber as a joint venture.

## Court Action Is Promised On Annexation

 City of Sanford will find itself in court, unless it agrees to "de-annex" several parcels of property reportedly taken into the city without the knowledge of the owners.

This was confirmed today by Robert G. Petree, counsel for J. B. Cain, owner of Super Trading Post and Albert Phelps, operator of Phelps Restaurant, both properties located on U.S. 17-92 across from the Sanford Plaza.

Petree said he would request the City Commission to remove these properties from the city taken into the city in a November action by the Commission. "If the Commission declines we will seek action in either the state or federal courts," Petree warned.

Discussing his personal feeling on the city's recent annexation involvements, the attorney said he lives not too far from the city and added, "They will have a civil war on their hands trying to bring me into the City of Sanford."

Cain and Phelps appeared at Phelps told the Commission the annexation action amounted to a "gerrymandering" procedure to obtain the needed number of petition signers to obtain annexation for certain properties.

City Attorney W. C. Hutchinson was asked why the annexations were never made known to Cain and Phelps by either letter or advertisement and he replied, "The city is not required to advertise."

City Commission delayed any additional action on the property owners' complaints until the Dec. 13 regular meeting.

## Youth Gets Ten Years For Drugs

 Eddie Schweickert Jr., was sentenced to 10 years at hard labor in prison this morning by Circuit Judge Dominick Salfi for sale and possession of drugs.

The 18-year-old youth also was sentenced to from six months to five years at hard labor on a second possession charge. The two sentences will run concurrently and Schweickert will have credit for time incarcerated.

Schweickert was found guilty of sale and possession of narcotics by a Circuit Court jury on July 7 and pleaded guilty to a charge of possession on Aug. 2.

Schweickert told the court that he realized how wrong he had been in hurting his family and himself in becoming involved with hard drugs and that he wanted "to make something of myself."

Judge Salfi asked the youth how often his mother had pleaded with him not to become involved with the people in drug traffic; how often she had pleaded with him to "get off drugs." Schweickert told the court, "I didn't listen." To which Judge Salfi replied, "You sure didn't." The court continued, "This is the hardest thing for your Mom and Dad to endure... to see their 18-year-old son sent off to prison..."

Judge Salfi asked the youth where he obtained the heroin and Schweickert replied, "From Big John." The youth admitted he had gone "all the way" in the drug area and was using opium; that he was 15 when he began using drugs. The court noted, "You've done it all in three years..."

Judge Salfi also queried the youth if he had ever considered the lives he had ruined by "pushing" drugs, and Schweickert replied that he had never said that much.

Nevertheless, pointed out Judge Salfi, "You held a position in the drug business... people knew they could go to Schweickert to get any drug they wanted."

The youth told the court that one ounce of opium on the drug
