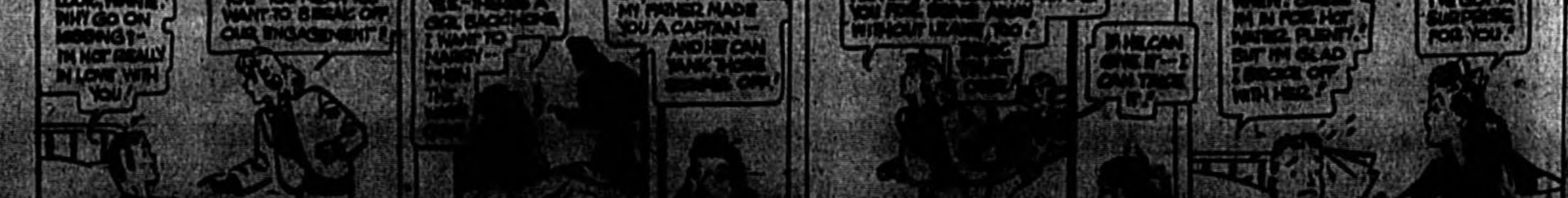

Violent Battle Rages In Region Of Smolensk

Reds Report 600,000 German Troops In Russia Are Going Thru Meat Grinder

(The Associated Press) The Russians today continued heavy offensives against the reinforced German lines from Leningrad in the north to Taganrog in the south. The Soviets reported violent battles were developing in Smolensk province west of Moscow, with the Russians in complete possession of 12 districts, challenging the enemy in 10 others. Soviet front-line dispatches asserted Adolf Hitler's invasion army, reported reinforced by 600,000 troops, were "going through a meat grinder," and that Russian attacks had cost the Germans 10,000 men in killed since Feb. 8. The Moscow radio reported discord between Rumania and Hungary had broken out into open fighting between army units on the Transylvania frontier of the two countries. Casualties were reported on both sides. More than 38 newly-arrived Nazi divisions were declared to be taking part in fighting raging from one end of the front to the other with battles in some areas as savage as any witnessed in this war. But despite this gigantic effort by the Germans, last night's regular Soviet offensive said to be under way during the day "no substantial changes occurred at the front." The Communists said that 31 planes were destroyed along the entire front Monday against 11 Soviet losses. Units of the Soviet fleet operating in the Soviet sea were credited with sinking a German submarine. The first Italian battleship to be engaged in the Mediterranean since Mussolini's navy suffered its crushing defeat in the Battle of Matapan has been reported in a running battle off Malta, the Admiralty announced last night.

Japanese Occupy Indian Islands Only 650 Miles From Calcutta

(The Associated Press) NEW DELHI, India, Mar. 25. (AP)—Japanese forces have completed the unopposed occupation of the strategic Andaman Islands situated in the Bay of Bengal supply routes to Calcutta in their first seizure of Indian territory. The islands are only 650 miles southwest of Calcutta. (The Associated Press) The Japanese took the Tungpoo-Pyinnama road at Kyungon today and pushed patrols around the Chinese flanks in the Sitang River sector of the Burmese front. Heavy aerial engagements were reported in progress over the entire battlefield with the Japanese attacking at British landing fields to the rear of the main lines. "Flying Tiger" pilots of the American volunteer group smashed 40 Japanese planes at the Thailand airport of Chiangmai Tuesday in a dawn attack which grounded Japanese by surprise. It was announced. Dropping down from the sky at 7:00 A. M. the U. S. airmen caught the Japanese pilots and caught 12 planes grounded on one of them, destroying seven and damaging many more. The other Japanese landing fields, not affected, the A.V.C. flyers were said to have destroyed several grounded fighters, bombers and transports in which the invaders had been hauling supplies and reinforcements.

U. S. Bombers Destroy 15 Jap Planes

Heavy Attack Staged On Foe In Guinea; 65 Nip Aircraft Lost In Two Days

(The Associated Press) The Japanese slackened their air attacks today on the air grounds to Australia with only three bombers raiding Port Moresby, New Guinea, in one of the heaviest raids of the war on that strategic point. The War Department disclosed heavy United States bombing attacks on Japanese-occupied Iar, New Guinea, in which 15 enemy planes were destroyed by 15 U. S. fighters. Other Allied aerial units have scored the most Japanese planes reported destroyed in the past two days to 65. Losses are mounting as the air war for control of New Guinea increases in intensity, but with the growing air strength of the Allied forces and the adoption of American Gen. George H. Brett's aggressive policy of "go out and find the enemy," U. S. and Australian machines and guns are dealing out a savage punishment for which the enemy has yet to find an effective answer. It is becoming apparent here that the bulk of the air strength for New Guinea in the next week or two might well decide the fate of northeast Australia. As long as the Allies hold Port Moresby, they are strong to force Japanese passage around the northern end of the neck of a submarine attack from the Southern Australian coast from the east can be barred. These aerial raids, skirting Australia at a distance varying from a few miles to 125 miles from the coast, each for more than 1200 miles from north of Sydney nearly to the Fly river mouth in New Guinea. Monday's raid, said to be carried by 12 heavy bombers, which dropped 67 bombs about the Port Moresby airbase, was a triumph for the U. S. fighters, which from four Mitsubishi fighters diving down at 4000 miles an hour, shot by their guns and machine guns with a stream of incendiary bombs. Nip Planes Ruined, Prisoners Taken, Bases Bombed On Wake And Marcus

(The Associated Press) Retaliating for the sneak attack on Pearl Harbor, United States warships and bombers were off today to have staged two dramatic and "highly successful" attacks on Japanese island outposts in the Pacific, striking within 950 miles of Tokyo. The first force of the Pacific fleet, the task force consisted of six destroyers and a battleship, sent to devastate island outposts in the western Pacific, and reached Wake and Marcus islands on the early morning of March 23. Bombing runs, which were carried out by the carriers Enterprise and Saratoga, and the battleship West Virginia, resulted in the destruction of five Japanese planes on Wake and four on Marcus. The carriers also sank several Japanese ships, and took a number of prisoners. The Japanese had been building up bases on these islands, and the attacks were a direct blow to their operations. The War Department announced that the attacks were highly successful, and that the Japanese had suffered heavy losses. The Pacific fleet is expected to continue its operations in the coming days.

3 Spearheads Are Aimed At India And Inner Burma

Enemy Paratrochists Drop Back Of Defenders Rangoon-Mandalay

Japanese forces were engaged in three spearheads aimed at India and the irradially oil field of Inner Burma today.

Paratrochists dropped from the skies back of Allied lines between Rangoon and Mandalay, presumably to foment a native revolt.

Japanese land forces pushed to within 40 miles of Mandalay. A force of 1000 Japanese, striking the Chinese outpost line extending from 200 miles below Mandalay and even closer on a diagonal route from the northwest captured an air field north of Tounoung yesterday.

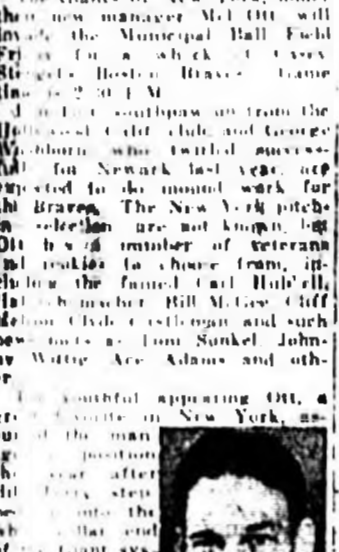
