Some milkmen, who were said to be charging excessive prices, also were included.



It is planned by the Frisco to purchase the entire capital stock and to them construct 123 miles of line of the Frisco that now runs from Kansas City to Birmingham. Application for permission to take these stops will be made to the Interstate Commerce Commission within the next few days, according to announcements made here.

About 18 months ago the commission by a ruling prevented the Frisco from reaching a gulf port when it blocked the purchase by the Frisco of the International Great Northern Railway which have let the Frisco into Galveston. Texas. Under these conditions, the belief has been expressed that the commission will this time sanction the efforts of the Frisco to reach

and increasing business through-out the west with Florida points. At Pensacola the Frisco will connect with the Louisville and Nashville Railway and the Seaboard Airline. The old Kansas City, Fort Scott and Mempnis railway, a part of the Frisco line, between Kansas City and Birmingham, will now become one of the important factors in the system instead of a secondary part.




