## Observation Of Jewish New Year Halts Trial Of Miller And Harry M. Daugherty

NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—(P)—A German copper magnate who is said to have received \$6,500,000 of government money illegally delivered here to him at a champagne dinner in 1921, will resume testimony in federal court tomorrow. Trial of former Attorney General Harry M. Daugherty and former alien property custodian Thomas W. Miller, was interrupted by Judge Mack who declared a holiday in recognition of the Jewish New Year.

Richard Merton, German metals magnate and former captain in the German army, took the stand yesterday after Federal Attorney Emory R. Buckner outlined his case to the jury. Buckner charged that Daugherty personally had destroyed incriminating bank records.

## GERMANY SENDS ITS DELEGATION TO LEAGUE MEET

COUNT VON BERNSTORFF, former Ambassador to America, is one of delegates; members assume duties Friday.

GENEVA, Sept. 8.—(P)—With Germany now a member of the League of Nations and entitled to sit in the council of the league of nations on terms of equality with the Big Four, Great Britain, France, Italy and Japan, her delegates today were on their way to Geneva to participate in the league's activities.

Headed by Dr. Gustav Stresemann, the Reich foreign minister, and having among its members Count Von Bernstorff, former ambassador to the United States, the delegation is expected to assume its duties tomorrow. The attitude of Spain toward the league still remains a mystery to intrigue every one in Geneva.

It is considered likely that the European statesmen will endeavor to have Spain and Brazil retain their adherence to the league.

Germany's entrance is expected to cause controversies but one league official remarks: "It is better to battle with words than bullets."

Advices from Berlin indicate that the election of Germany has failed to arouse enthusiasm on the part of the newspapers, except the nationalist press. The conference of the World Court, which is discussing the problem of American adherence to the court has encountered a deadlock on American reservation which means that the council of the league of nations may not ask the court for advisory opinions on questions in which the United States is interested without obtaining the consent of the United States.

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## THREE ARE TO SHARON BINDS SPLIT FORTUNE OF I. B. BRIDGMAN OF VALENTINO OVER TO COURT

Mrs. Theresa Werner, Aunt By Marriage To Share Estate Equally With Brother And Sister of Movie Star

Winnifred Hudnut Is Cut Off With Dollar

Estate Will Be In Excess Of Million Dollars, Estimates Of George S. Ullman Show

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 9.—(P)—Rudolph Valentino bequeathed a third of his estate, valued at more than \$1,000,000 to Mrs. Theresa Werner, an aunt by marriage, who remained loyal to him during a separation from Natacha Rambova, his last wife. The former wife, who is known in private life as Winnifred Hudnut, is cut off with one dollar by terms of the will.

That Mrs. Werner is to share equally with Alberto and Maria Guglielmi brother and sister of the dead actor, in the final distribution of the Valentino estate, was learned yesterday when the provisions of the late screen star's will were made public by W. I. Gilbert, his confidential attorney.

Mrs. Werner, an aunt of Natacha Rambova is said to be present in New York, with her sister, Mrs. Richard Hudnut and her niece, Her home is in Salt Lake City. S. George Ullman, Valentino's manager, is named executor.

Attorney Gilbert professed to have had no knowledge of the existence of the will until he received word from Ullman in New York that the document would be turned over to him for filing. The will was dated Sept. 1, 1924, and signed "Rudolph Guglielmi." It is said to have been drawn hurriedly at Valentino's request to supersede an earlier will made in New York in which Miss Rambova was named as the sole heir.

Valentino has left an estate worth in excess of \$1,000,000 according to the estimate of Ullman. His real properties are appraised at a half million. This estimate does not include his rights in his last two pictures, "The Son of the Sheik" and "The Eagle" which are expected to result in a gross earning of more than a million dollars.

Valentino's private stables are valued at \$50,000. His five horses include an Arabian thoroughbred and three Irish jumpers. Twelve pedigreed dogs are valued at \$12,000. One is an Irish wolfhound, the gift of Mrs. Glen Stuart, of New York and said to be worth \$5,000.

"Falcon's Lair" Valentino's home in the Beverly Hills, is valued at \$175,000. A collection of armor and antiques is said to be worth \$75,000. Another house here is a seven-acre tract in Beverly Hills is worth \$15,000. Three motor cars are put down for \$46,000. There are five other cars to be included in the appraisal.

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## Rum Running Activities Pictured By Local Negro Who Returns After 3 Years

The large profits, graft and political connivance in rum running on the Florida East Coast were disclosed today to a Herald reporter by a Sanford negro who has returned to his home here after a three year's absence. He is now employed in a local restaurant.

The negro man was employed by a white man, he said, to "wholesale" the liquor shipments from the dock at Miami. He would load his automobile with all brands of liquor and wine smuggled into this country from Nassau, Bahamas. He carried \$1,100 in one year at Miami, and his expenses in this business was heavy, according to his story.

"Did the police ever get after you?" he was asked. "Yes, several times, but I managed to get away," he said. "My boss stood in good with them, and when I told him about it, he took it up, and he was told to give them my automobile number so they would know me."

Once the men sworn to uphold the law knew the automobile license number of a rum runner who was paying for police protection, neither he nor his men were supposed to be annoyed in the territory he was protected against police interference.

"Did you have many calls?" the reporter asked. "Many calls for liquor," he asked. "Oh yes mister, more than you could supply. The tourists want it when they come to Miami. My boss was paid \$100 once for five quarts of medium special. We couldn't get all we wanted at times. Sometimes the wind would be bad and the ships carrying the liquor couldn't come in."

The Sanford man told how rum smuggling ships exchange signals with the small motor boats and launches off the harbor and shore. The small boats are used to land the liquor.

"They have signals," he said. "One signal tells that a revenue boat is close by. Another way is clear." He was sent on a motor boat several times when a regular man was sick, and in that way became familiar with the signals of rum running ships, he said.

The liquor business is always "rushing" in Miami and Hollywood and other cities of the East Coast, he said, even when other lines of activity are dull.

## TRIO OF BANDITS, WANTED FOR GEM THEFT, CAPTURED

Robbers Are Surrounded in a Corn Field By posse Composed of Officers, Farmers; Find Hiding Place of Loot

CHAMPAGNE, Ill., Sept. 9.—(P)—Three dapper Chicago bandits who robbed three diamond merchants of a half million dollars worth of jewelry on an Illinois Central train near here last night, were captured in a corn field near Buckley, Ill., this morning.

They fell victims to the rain and the mud and the straight shooting of the sheriff of Central, Ill. Buckley is 36 miles north of Champagne. The robbers, who flourished about six miles through the mud from Loda where they had been forced to abandon an overheated taxicab commandeered after they jumped from the train. The three men told officers that they had hidden the jewelry between Loda and Buckley. Deputy Sheriff Henry Emen of troquous county and Chief of Police Louis Haecht of Buckley, who directed the capture, went back to find the jewels while the three prisoners were started to Champagne.

Two hundred farmers assisted in the capture, and surrounded the men in a corn field, finally compelling their surrender.

The bandits entered the drawing room of the three jewelry men, 20 minutes out of Chicago and before the train arrived bound the men, rifled their stock cases and bolted the compartment door. They did not make a thorough search of all the baggage and missed \$50,000 in uncut diamonds in Riskin's satchel.

The robber trio had tickets from Chicago to Champagne. Word of the robbery was disseminated over railroad wires from Mattson and Chicago were warned.

ATLANTA, Sept. 9.—AP—With Senator Walter F. George, World Court proponent, seemingly overwhelmingly renominated by Georgia Democrats over R. B. Russell, chief justice of the supreme court and avowed opponent of the court, and W. D. Upshaw, "irreconcilable prohibitionist" apparently defeated for renomination in the fifth district, interest in the Georgia Democratic primary is centered in the governor's race.

With a runoff primary virtually certain between John E. Hooten and L. G. Hardman, interest centered largely in which of the two would lead in number of county unit votes when returns from yesterday's primary all get in.

The returns are due to reach the county seats at noon today during the question as to which candidate will receive the vote of each county's delegates to the convention.

With incomplete returns from 104 counties reported about 11 o'clock today, Hardman has 48 unit votes; Hooten 186 and well 66.

Congressman E. E. Cox, R. C. Crisp, W. E. Wright, Rutherford, Carl Vinson, Lanford and W. W. Latta, are supposed for renomination.

Incumbents were leading on the face of early returns. They are Charles G. Edwards, of the first district, H. Brand, eighth, and Thomas M. Bell, ninth.

Featuring the primary was the contest of James K. Hines, associate justice of the state supreme court, and W. D. Upshaw.

(Continued on page two) was lying on his back and the car had disappeared. The Pinellas county court room was again packed with spectators when Judge Freeman P. Lane, reopened proceedings this morning, many in the audience being from Tarpon Springs.

Thomas and Reid, who are charged with first degree murder in connection with the death of patrolman Blewfield, maintained the same air of unconcern which has marked their demeanor since the trial started yesterday afternoon. Mrs. Roy Phillips, wife of the proprietor of the grocery store which was robbed on the morning of the killing, was the first witness examined.

She corroborated testimony of her husband yesterday as to the amount of cash and checks taken from the safe, mentioning particularly a \$2 bill as being among the missing greenbacks. At the conclusion of Mrs. Phillips' testimony, state's attorney Pasco Wilson announced that the two women companions of Thomas and Reid would be brought into court and a date set for their trial. They are Phyllis Thomas, reputed wife of Louis Thomas, and Bernice Spaulding, alias Billie Eastman. Both were jointly indicted with the men on charges of first degree murder.

On request of state's attorney Wilson, Judge Lane announced the women would be placed on trial at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning. This brought objections from attorneys Arthur R. Thompson and Arthur W. Jordan, their counsel, who requested a continuance. There was an argument among counsel, which Judge Lane terminated with the statement that he would set the trial for tomorrow morning subject to valid objections by defense counsel.

Both women were plainly nervous as they entered the court room. Phyllis Thomas sat close to her husband and held his hand. They carried on a whispered conversation while counsel debated over the trial date.

Bernice Spaulding and Reid exchanged no greeting. The young woman sat apart from her recent companion who kept his back turned toward her. She held her head in her hand during most of the proceedings and went.

J. T. Powell, a clerk in the Phillips' grocery store, another witness of the morning, testified that he had seen Reid in the store prior to the robbery.
