DEAR DR. LAMB — Recently in a doctor's waiting room I witnessed a lady said to be in diabetic shock. My husband and son-in-law are both diabetics. Is there any way to predict such a seizure? What can be done as a preventive? Can you give us a few pointers on this neglected subject? What measures can be used to successfully resuscitate a victim of diabetic shock or coma? DEAR READER — Whether you're talking about diabetic coma or hypoglycemic shock from too much insulin is of extreme importance. When a person is unconscious it might be very difficult for a person not skilled in medicine to make the distinction. Diabetic coma is associated with very high blood sugar level. The elimination of sugar in large amounts of urine leads to a marked decrease in blood volume, causing dehydration and shock. About the only thing a non-medical person can do to help these individuals is to leave them lying flat, keep them warm, make sure that they have an artery to breathe through and try to get expert medical help as quickly as possible. The only successful treatment for these people is to increase the blood volume immediately with fluids through a needle in the vein. Skilled medical personnel give much larger amounts of insulin than is commonly used in the daily management of that individual's diabetes and take whatever measures necessary to restore the chemical balance of the body. Diabetic coma is often caused by stopping taking insulin. For example, some diabetics have the idea that if they don't eat they don't need to take insulin. It's true that your insulin is standardized to your diet but even if you are eating nothing the body will be converting protein to sugar and causing a high blood sugar level unless some insulin is taken. Another frequent cause for diabetic coma is the added demands imposed by an infection such as an abscess, pneumonia or some other infectious process. Precision Flying Team Featured At Rotary Air Show

Blue Angels Perform Aerobatics In Sanford's Skies

Six dark blue, dart-shaped projectiles streak overhead. The newest aviation of the Navy's flight demonstration squadron was scheduled to take place this weekend at the Sanford-Central Florida Airport, where the unit will serve as feature attraction for the Rotary Club's third annual Charities Benefit Air Show. Kick-off time is 1 p.m. For 30 years the Blue Angels have been thrilling crowds in all parts of the world, building their reputation with exhibitions of precision aerial artistry before more than 125 million spectators. At the same time, the all-volunteer squadron has acted as an ambassador of good will for the United States and its military forces. The Blue Angels pursue an exhausting eight-and-one-half-month show schedule each year, hitting the road in mid-March after 60-70 days of rigorous preparation at their winter training base near El Centro, California. In addition to the seven tactical jet pilots who receive the headlines and applause, the Blue Angels team includes seven other officers and 74 enlisted men who provide support in the areas of aircraft maintenance, physical and mental health, administrative and logistics coordination, and public affairs. For pilots, as well as backup personnel, a tour of duty with the flight demonstration team is only a temporary assignment. Pilots fly with the Angels for two years and are returned to an operational unit, while members of the maintenance crew average three or four years with the squadron before being reassigned to regular sea or shore duty. The excellence of the squadron's maintenance personnel is best represented by the fact that the Blue Angels have never canceled a performance due to mechanical problems. Following a thorough screening, each potential crew member is assigned to the unit on a one-month trial basis. It is only after the successful completion of this check-out period that a maintenance specialist qualifies to join the rotating 25-man crew which accompanies the Angels to their show sites. Blue Angels pilots, all of whom have at least 1500 flight hours in jet fighters before joining the team, are equipped with one of the lightest, fastest airplanes in existence today—the A-1 Skyhawk II. A product of the Korean conflict, the present-day Skyhawk II is powered by a Pratt-Whitney turbojet engine capable of blasting it forward with 17,000 pounds of thrust, twice that generated by the original model. The Skyhawk II, manufactured by Douglas Aircraft, can take off and land from aircraft carriers or rough combat-zone airfields as short as 4,000 feet. The Blue Angels adopted the A4 in 1972 as their official demonstration craft on a one-month trial basis. It is the strength of its design simplicity, reliability and operational economy. During a flight demonstration the Skyhawks are put through a sequence of split-second maneuvers which includes a six-plane delta formation, two solo aircraft streaming toward each other and passing within 1,000 miles per hour, and the Blue Angels' well-known trademark, the four-plane diamond formation. These routines will be on display at this weekend's air show, along with pulse-quickenin aerobatics of the Red Devils, a team of civilian flyers. Additional aerial excitement will be provided by Debbie Gary, Corkey Fieroff and Joe Hughes, who perform with Wingwalker Steve Trevor. Adults can enjoy all this for an admission price of \$3 each at the gate, while children under 12 will be admitted for \$1.

Time Near To Move Your Clock

WASHINGTON (AP) — The regular schedule for Daylight Saving Time will take effect again this year, with long days beginning a half-year on April 25, when most Americans will turn the clock forward one hour. Congress considered new legislation this year, but the efforts were blocked until the 1986 Uniform Time Act took effect again, providing for DST from the last Sunday in April through the last Sunday in October. In January 1974, at the height of the Arab oil embargo, provisions of the 1986 law were enacted after Congress concluded that energy could be saved through year-around observance of DST. Today Drama In, Out Of Court Clears Man Charged In Wife's Death

Michael Patrick Burke, 28, of Winter Park, walked from the courtroom in Sanford Friday afternoon a free man after a jury returned a verdict of acquittal for him on a manslaughter charge in the Jan. 23 death of his wife. The three-day trial before Circuit Court Judge Robert B. McGregor was highlighted by a drama inside and outside the courtroom. During closing arguments to the jury, Assistant State Atty. Claude Van Hook, apparently caught up in the heat of the legal battle with defense attorney Newman Brock, a former assistant State Attorney, told the jury he wanted it to be moved by it. During the trial, Van Hook was moved by it. Van Hook told the jury and then shocked spectators by plunging his right fist through the evidence. The prosecutor seemed surprised as the wallboard fell in crumbling pieces to the bright red courtroom carpet and the white gymnasium ground underfoot. Later, Van Hook said he'd meant to put his hand through the hole as a demonstration but he didn't mean to destroy the evidence. Brock's moments came Thursday night as he was winding up the defense case. Sanford police came to the home of his wife, Judith Ann Burke. Mrs. Burke and her husband were involved in an argument on Jan. 21. She died two days later as the result of a head injury, according to assistant county medical examiner Dr. Sarah Irgang. Mrs. Burke's relatives, who lived in the same south Seminole apartment complex as did Burke, testified that following the Jan. 21 incident Mrs. Burke told them he had put her head into the wall during the argument and a struggle.
