

Spaziano Trial Is Postponed

The rape trial of 30-year-old former Outlaw motorcycle gang member Joseph Robert "Crazy Joe" Spaziano that had been scheduled for next week has been postponed until the week of Jan. 26.

Spaziano is accused of raping a 30-year-old south Seminole woman on Dec. 26, 1973. The trial postponement was made in circuit court after both the prosecutor and defense attorney Edward Kirkland sought the delay. A document in the court file indicates the state may call as witnesses in the rape case persons named as witnesses against Spaziano in a murder trial now

scheduled at Sanford for the week of Dec. 8. Spaziano was indicted for first-degree murder in th August 1973 death of an Orlando woman whose decomposing remains were found on an Altamonte Springs garbage dump.

Addresses of five state witnesses, including former Outlaw gang members, have been ordered kept secret by the court because of alleged threats against their lives, according to documents in the court file on the murder

Sapaziano is accused of murdering Laura Lynn Harberts, an 18-year-old Orlando hospital clerk. A second decomposing female body found on the trash heap still hasn't been identified, according to investigators, and no charges have been made in the second

Spaziano is already serving a life sentence for rape in Orange County.

New York Lottery Staff

Disbanded In Fraud Probe ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) - The entire staff of the state's lottery system has been disbanded in the wake of a report citing "needless opportunites for fraud," lax security and

a variety of serious problems. Gov. Hugh Carey, who suspended lottery operations Oct. 22, said he will replace the current lottery staff with new people. He said a special team headed by outside experts will revamp the lottery, but he gave no date as to when it would resume.

The lottery had generated about \$20 million in revenues for the state this fiscal year before Carey suspended operations following disclosures that hundreds of thousands of tickets with duplicate numbers had been printed and distributed for a special \$1.4 million drawing on Oct. 31.

Ford Says Peace At Issue

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Ford, setting off or the first leg of his trip to the People's Republic of China, says he hopes to "foster mutual understanding," but is promising the Chinese that "we will stand for our own

In remarks prepared for delivery at Andrews Air Force Base today, Ford expressed thanks that the United States is at peace in Asia and declared, "I begin a mission to Asia to consolidate that peace."

As he departed on the first long flight of his 10-day trip, Ford indirectly appeared to acknowledge he does not expect the United States and China to see eye to eye on

Traffic Toll Reaches 175

The nation's Thanksgiving holiday weekend traffic death toll reached 175 today.

Snow slowed highway travel in portions of the Plateau, the northern Rockies and northern Plains. Fog and drizzle dampened roadways or lowered visibility in the eastern Plains and the Mississippi Valley. The National Safety Council estimated that between 450 and 500 persons would die in traffic accidents during the

weekend that began at 6 p.m. local time Thursday and ends at midnight Sunday. The Associated Press counted 504 highway fatalities during last year's Thanksgiving holiday period.

Cutting Trees Charged

BOULDER, Colo. (AP) - Five men and a juvenile were arrested for cutting down, without the required permits. at least 3,000 Christmas trees in Rocky Mountain National Park, Roosevelt National Forest and on private land. The arrested men came from Ohio, Alabama, New York and California. Officials said they were using snowmobiles to haul the trees, some 50 feet tall, out of the woods and had a flatbed semitrailer truck to transport

Boulder County Sheriff Brad Leach said it was "an outward, well-planned, illegal, commercial type of treecutting activity."

10 Jailed On Pot Charges

MOBILE, Ala. (AP) - Ten persons have been jailed in Mobile on charges of possession of marijuana in connection with a shrimper that authorities said was seized with 15 tons of the drug aboard.

Federal agents, aided by Baldwin County sheriff's deputies, raided the Hurricane Three on Thanksgiving Day when it landed on the south Alabama coast near Gulf Shores. The marijuana was estimated to be worth \$9

Several shots were fired when the law officers arrived, but there were no injuries.

Quick Hearings Expected

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate Judiciary Committee is expected to quickly schedule hearings on President Ford's nomination of Judge John Paul Stevens of Chicago to fill the vacancy on the Supreme Court. Immediate reaction from committee members to the nomination of the 55-year-old judge was limited because

many lawmakers said they knew nothing of Stevens' Ford, in announcing late Friday his selection of Stevens as successor to retired Justice William G. Douglas, said Stevens has had an outstanding career in practicing and teaching law as well as on the federal bench.

Doctors' Names Released

WASHINGTON (AP) - The names of 207 doctors who received \$100,000 or more for treating Medicaid patients in 1974 have been released by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Twenty-eight physicians received more than \$200,000, four of them taking in more than \$300,000, according to the HEW list released Friday

Dr. William A. Treibel of New York was reported by HEW to have received \$451,156. Last month he denied receiving that amount, but he would offer no figure of his



Nation's Health On Critical List

Some labor leaders suggested early this year that Congress celebrate the Bicentennial by voting in a tax-financed health insurance plan covering every man, woman and child in the United States of America. Since Congress now is searching for some justification to give us the Bicentennial gift of a tax cut, not an increase, a big plunge into national health insurance has gone deservedly to the back

This has not kept the House Ways and Means subcommittee on health from conducting hearings the past week on some less ambitious health insurance proposals - a \$3.6 billion plan for the government to provide coverage for "catastrophic" medical expenses, and a \$5.3 billion plan to upgrade the benefits provided to the poor under the Medicaid program. Even with those price tags, it is an inopportune time for Congress to be considering an expansion of governmentsponsored health insurance.

That some Americans are still without adequate health insurance, either from private sources or under a government program, is a problem that can hardly be addressed without coming to grips with a bigger problem. How are we going to put a rein on the costs of the health programs we already have?

Inflation has struck at every aspect of our lives, but only the term "superinflation" applies to what has happened to medical costs. Federal pending on health programs has jumped from \$5.9 billion in 1966 to \$35 billion this year. Since 1971 the number of beneficiaries covered by Medicare has increased by 29 per cent : while the cost has leaped by 105 per cent. The surge in medical costs has had a similar impact on premiums paid by individuals and companies for group insurance, and our national health bill paid from public and private sources now stands at an astounding \$118 billion.

While the quality of health care available in our country is probably the best in the world, we face the possibility of seeing its price exceed what most people can afford. For the government to intrude even further into the picture, in an effort to control costs, could destroy the quality which is the strong point of our private medical care system. Therein lies the dilemma.

A study prepared for the Social Security Administration suggests that health insurance itself is a major cause of superinflated costs. It has removed the link between the payment for a medical service and the person who receives it. "Because there is no link between what providers charge and what consumers are really willing to pay, there are no competitive pressures on providers to hold down costs," the report declares.

If that's the case, a venture into national health insurance would escalate medical costs even more, with a disastrous impact on future federal budgets. Until the link between insurance and spiraling costs is better understood, and some measures devised to cope with it, any new or broadened government health care programs should be approached with utmost caution.

WASHINGTON - (NEA) - Your income tax forms are not held in confidence.

Thousands are regularly looked at by the Justice Department, the Securities and 5xchange Commission, Congressional committees and other assorted agencies and branches of the federal and state governments. Sometimes for very good reason, sometimes in fishing expeditions for suspected law violations of one type or another and sometimes merely to secure background information as to what kind of a
