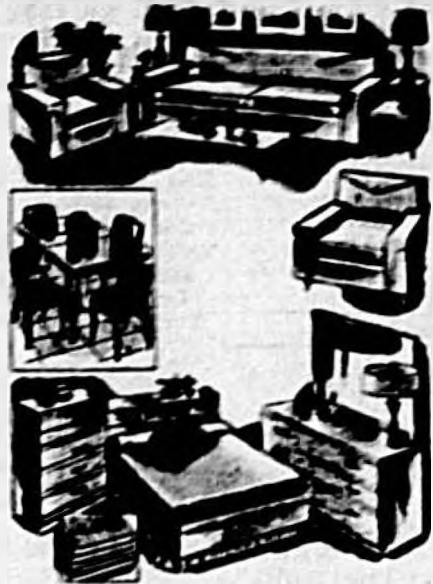

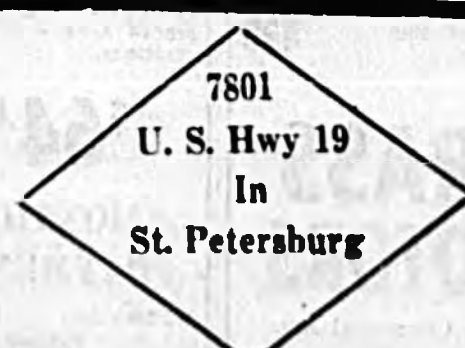
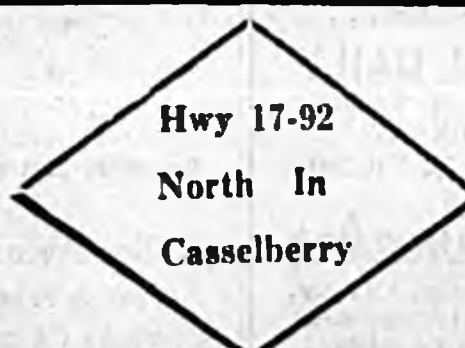

## Travelers Rescued By Copter

VAUGHN, N. M. (UPI) — All but the most timid of 800 travelers were gone from this once-marooned community today as an Air Force helicopter flew nearby in search of others in need of help.

Most roads were cleared of the deep snow which sealed Vaughn, focal point of New Mexico's second worst storm in history. Residents of the area went through more than three of the most harrowing days in local memory after the storm isolated the town Monday.

The helicopter was sent out to direct rescue operations for any families in the countryside in need of assistance.

Most stranded travelers had warm words for Vaughn's population, state police, highway workers, National Guardsmen, and the Air Force.

The pre-winter storm that battered the Southwest early this week spread rain from eastern Texas to the Atlantic Seaboard today.

The vast rain area stretched from Oklahoma and Texas across the lower Mississippi Valley and as far east as Virginia and the Carolinas.

## Board Approves Road Projects

The County Commission today approved a list of county roads to be included as part of a large scale road improvement project in the county.

The recommendations were made by County Engineer Robert Davis.

The roads include Dean Road from SR 426 to the county line; Tangerine Ave. from SR 426 to SR 425; Bird Road from SR 418 to Tuskawillo, Big Tree Road from SR 497 to U. S. 1, 2 and West Orange Extension from U. S. 17-92 to Lake Mary Road.

These recommendations will be presented to the SRD in conjunction with a proposed large scale road improvement program to be carried out within the next five years.

High on the list of recommendations approved by the county commission during its Nov. 11 meeting was a new causeway to be built across Lake Jessup that greatly will shorten the distance between Ovelto to Sanford.

The board also agreed to look over a six acre tract between Longwood and Altamonte Springs for a possible site for a new county barn.

## Final Health Center Plans Approved By Commission

### Bids May Be Asked Jan. 1

Indications today are that the County Commission will advertise for bids for construction of the \$100,000 county health center by January.

At a special meeting of the board this morning, final plans for the 22 room structure to be located on French Ave. between Ninth and 10th St. were approved.

Architect John Burton, who presented the plans to the board, reported that they will go to Tallahassee for state approval and should be back in time to advertise by the first of the year.

Burton also said that, if everything goes according to plans, the health center should be ready for occupancy by August of next year. The health center will be fully air conditioned and will have adequate facilities for laboratories and consultation rooms, Burton said.

All commissioners expressed approval of the plans and voiced their confidence that the center would be a boon to the county.

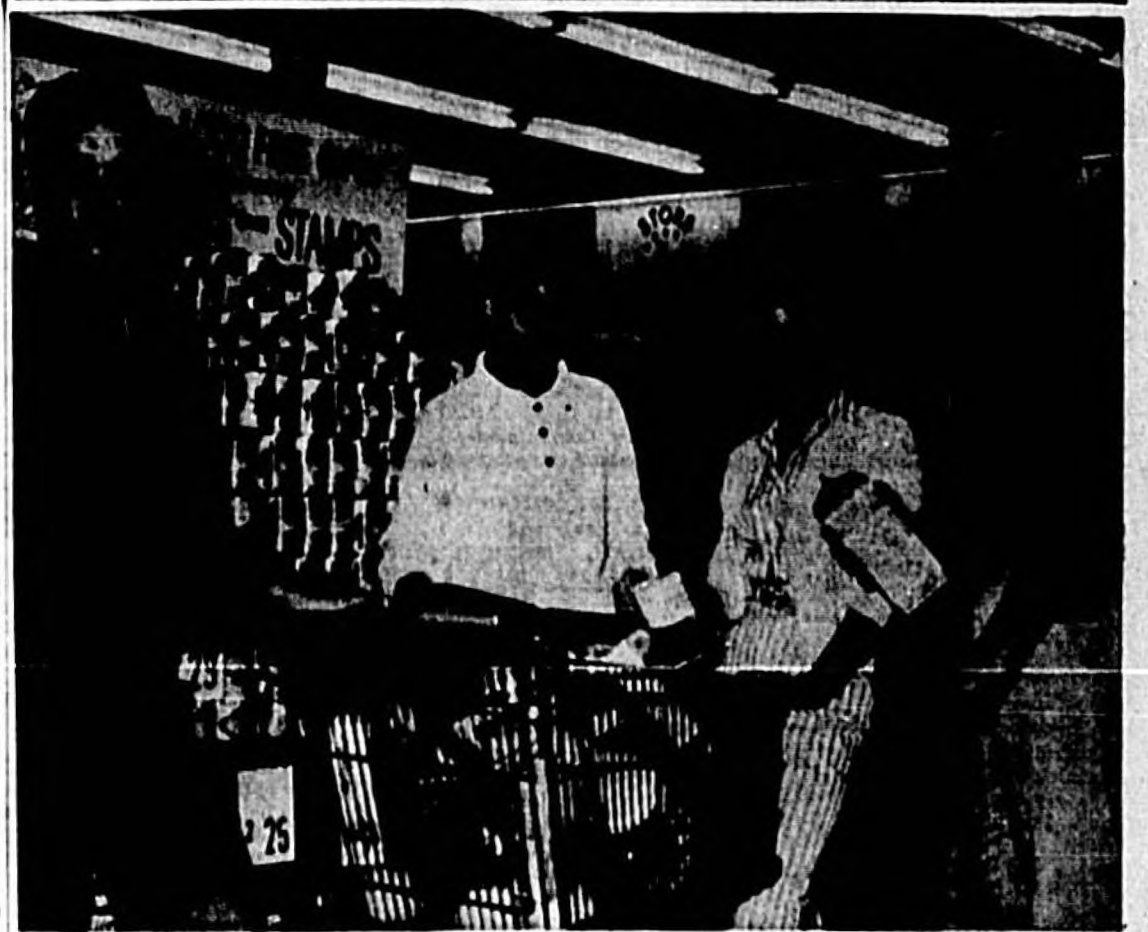

## Police Sift Underworld For Touhy's Slayer Clue

CHICAGO (UPI) — Homicide detectives today pored over massive files of Chicago's underworld history and searched the littered basement of a home for clues to the assassins of mobster Roger Touhy.

But the investigation, one of the most intensive in a long line of gangland slaying probes, had revealed little more than that the 61-year-old prohibition beer baron could have been slain by organization mobsters or someone who held a personal grudge.

Federal investigators contended that Touhy and his bodyguard, Walter Miller, 62, were gunned down Wednesday night by the Mafia, international crime organization, to "seal their lips for ever."

But the Chicago police investigation proceeded on the assumption that either hoodlums from Touhy's underworld past or gunman of Chicago's current crime syndicate blasted the pair with shotguns.

Miller, a longtime friend of Touhy and a defense witness at his parole hearings, remained in critical condition at a hospital with a broken pelvis in his legs, buttocks and back.

Investigators' best clue so far was the finding of a basement hideout across the street from the home where Touhy had been living since his parole from prison only 23 days before he was shot.

Police believe the killers kept watch over the home of Mrs. Ethel Alesia, Touhy's sister, for perhaps 10 days, watching Touhy's

comings and goings to determine when best to cut him down.

Two gunmen apparently hid out behind the hedge near the Alesia home Wednesday night, police said, and ambushed Touhy and Miller shortly after 10 p. m. as they returned from a business engagement in the loop.

# Like May Visit Tokyo, Seoul

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower may visit Tokyo and Seoul next summer in an effort to help end the cold war between Japan and the Republic of Korea, informed sources said today.

The prediction that Eisenhower might extend his good will campaign to the Far East, possibly in late June or early July, followed the disclosure that he has decided to visit Latin America sometime next spring.

High administration sources said Thursday the Chief Executive would go to Brazil and four or five other Latin American countries. April was considered a likely month for the trip provided this would not conflict with the contemplated East-West summit meeting in Geneva.

The enthusiastic reception Eisenhower has received on his good will trip to Asia, Africa and Europe was said to have influenced his decision to go to South America.

A ranking diplomat said he believed the success of the current tour also assured that the President would add the Far East to his travel schedule next year.

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# Public Increases Stock Market Action

The prospects of further labor trouble in January, or of tighter money, or of congressional airing of questionable business, don't seem to deter the American public from continued participation in the stock market. Mutual fund sales have been high and rising all year. The public seems to be saying that stocks are continuously going to be preferable to bonds, even with the highest interest yield in nearly 20 years—and such public conviction can go a long way toward making it come true.

D. Moreau Barringer of Delaware Management Company, Inc. reveals the fund completed three new positions lately in common stocks. They are: Eastern Air Lines, American Airlines, and Phillips Petroleum. The reasons for the above purchases were: Eastern and American have been suffering from the heavy costs of buying and integrating jet planes into their operations, a process which largely will be completed during 1960. "As the traffic builds up to occupy the extra seats thus made available, and the break-in costs are completed, it is expected that earnings of both lines will show a smart recovery." The reasoning behind the Phillips Petroleum purchase was this: the stock had come down over 20 per cent from its 1959 high point, and the yield had risen to 4 per cent (a well-known low paying stock). The petroleum giant has been spending practically the whole of its cash earnings in development for the past eight years; "Indications are that such investments are nearing completion, and the company's earnings will get a chance to expand importantly in the next few years." There are many question marks about the future of the oil industry but in some cases the lowered prices of the stocks had satisfactorily offset the worsened outlook.

At the 26th annual meeting of the American Petroleum Institute recently, the following was disclosed: The Russian potential in future oil markets was discussed by Theodore Shabad, specialist on Russian affairs, foreign news section, New York Times. In his address he stated that by 1965 Russia would have about "500,000 barrels per day available for export. The rapid expansion of Russian oil production is demonstrated by the 15 per cent annual increase over the past ten years. In 1959, exports were 22,000 barrels per day, or about 3 per cent of production, of which some 80 per cent went to other communist countries. In 1958, exports rose to 260,000 barrels per day, equivalent to 16 per cent of production, and over one-half went to countries outside the communist bloc. It appears inevitable that Russian exports of oil by 1965 will be of major significance in adding to world supplies."

The present adverse publicity in the drug industry's pricing policy being investigated by Senator Kefauver brings the following to light: The choice of cortisone and its derivatives, being an initial target in the hearings, was apparently dictated by pressure from Senator Smathers of Florida. Many of our elderly residents who are sufferers from arthritis have complained by mail about the high prices paid for anti-arthritis drugs. The committee is also looking into the various patent and licensing arrangements surrounding this group of medications.

George N. Shaw, well-known in municipal finance circles for many years and formerly director of finance of the City of Miami, will join the municipal financial consulting firm of Wainwright & Ramsey Inc. as a vice-president effective Jan. 2, 1960. J. Basil Ramsey, announced, Shaw will manage Wainwright & Ramsey's new Florida office which will be located in the First National Bank Building in Miami. Ramsey said Shaw will work on the firm's larger assignments throughout the country.

# Inez Robb Says

 Probably I'm a cockeyed optimist. But recently I have been dreaming that a musical comedy will spark a new fusion political movement in New York and bring back good government to this sorely-tired city.

That musical is "Fiorello!"—a gay, warm and ebullient recap of Fiorello LaGuardia's early excursions into New York politics, prior to his election as the most recent, best mayor the city has had in my generation.

Ever since Fiorello left the mayoralty in January '46, after 12 constructive years in City Hall, New York has been afflicted with one inept Tammany hack after another in a political office that is one of the most important in the nation. It is amazing the number of guys that Tammany can scrape off the bottom of the barrel.

In the almost 14 years since Fiorello retired (and since his sad death of cancer in 1947) this city has gradually run down to the heels until now it is literally walking on its uppers—and I have some reservations about how long the uppers will last.

Why, I can remember "way back when the streets of New York were clean; when it was not only reasonably safe to walk the streets of the city but even to stroll in Central Park; when traffic police and white wings were plainly visible, doing their appointed jobs; when mean and petty graft was banished and when big scandal didn't haunt one of another city bureau.

Ever my friends who live on Park Avenue, one of the show thoroughfares of New York, were pathetically grateful to Nikita Khrushchev because his visit insured the city authorities to thoroughly clean Park Avenue for the first time in ages!

So perhaps it is the memory of a clean, safe city, with good government in City Hall, that causes audiences at "Fiorello!" to cheer at every performance when the fiery Little Flower denounces Tammany Hall and all its satanic works, and when he cried aloud against municipal graft and corruption.

When the bouncy Fiorello, making his first political speech on stage, tells his followers to take a deep breath and asks, "What is that you smell?" and then himself supplies the answer, "Tammany!"

the paying customers stop the show. And that's only the beginning.

For years there has been desultory talk of another fusion ticket in the city to drive Tammany into the river. If fusion partisans need any further proof that people want good government again and are fed up with Tammany, let them buy a ticket to "Fiorello!"

Of course, the Little Flower was an original, and the mold is broken. But the fusionists and the Republicans can't expect to win or form the cornerstone of a fusion movement in New York as long as they continue to nominate nice, pleasant, colorless non-wielders who have all the platform magnetism of Caspar Milquetoast.

The GOP needs to run a man, not a martyr—not someone who takes the thankless nomination just for the party's sake. What a successful fusion ticket will need to win is a nominee who is honest, intelligent, unimpaired, colorful, free-wheeling, and not afraid to take on his weight in polecat.

It is foolish to hope that a fusion group can come up with even a reasonable facsimile of the Little Flower. But, surely, somewhere in this extraordinary city lurks another outrageous, independent, fiery, brilliant, courageous and honest Donald Duck who can lead us out of the Tammany wilderness. Broadway is showing the way.

# Assignment Washington

 WASHINGTON — A tall young man with a rectangular jaw and tousled hair came up the cobbled country road 75 miles northeast of Warsaw and entered the tiny village of Janiszewka, Poland. This was a little more than a month ago, a moment he had long lived for.

Fifty-nine years before, a Polish immigrant settled in Rumford, Maine. He had the tongue-mangling name of Marciotowski and Rumford was a French settlement. It wasn't long before he changed his surname to a streamlined six-letter word.

The immigrant never had the opportunity to go back to Poland, to respond to the urging that every man is struck with in his later years—to return for a look at the place of his boyhood.

But now this tall young man was fulfilling his father's dream, and he came as any man's father would have wanted it—as an immigrant's son who had gained a status of greatness in the land of democracy.

Sen. Edmund Muskie of Maine thus made his appearance in the little community of Janiszewka. The Senator wrote to me about it. It was one of the most touching letters I have ever read.

Here are parts of it: "We left the main road and were driving over a narrow, cobbled country road. As we topped a slight rise, there came into view in the distance a large white building, somewhat shabby, but clinging to the shreds of an ancient dignity which I instinctively felt must be the manor house of a nobleman's estate which my grandfather had managed at the turn of the century. And so it proved to be, now converted to a state farm."

"A short distance beyond, the pitiful unpainted, weather-beaten homes of the villages were clustered about a broad square, dominated by the stately white church which my father attended."

"My first object was to find some trace of my father's family. We proceeded to the local precinct and almost immediately located a friendly girl who recalled an old lady bearing the family name. She escorted us to a drab little house on one of the side streets. We knocked on the door and entered."

"In a dark little cubby hole of a kitchen I met the widow of my father's brother—my and stood under the weight of almost 80 years. With her was my father's niece."

"They did not know of my father's death and accepted his silence over the past three years as just another of the burdens which filled their daily lives."

At this point, Senator Muskie said, villagers swarmed in from the house. The word of his arrival had been carried by the local grapevine.

"It is difficult to comprehend the economic circumstances of the people in that little village—the bareness of their lives. They have no meat. They stand in line for bread."

The catch in Senator Muskie's throat reached down to the words on his paper. He wrote: "But for my father's dream of freedom and opportunity, I would be my life—the life of my children..."

The meaning of Thanksgiving is told in simple words. But Senator Muskie's letter inspired me and I, similarly in Czecho-Slovakia there is a small town, and there are relatives whom my family has not seen in more than 30 years. What is life like for them? In 30 days I shall know...

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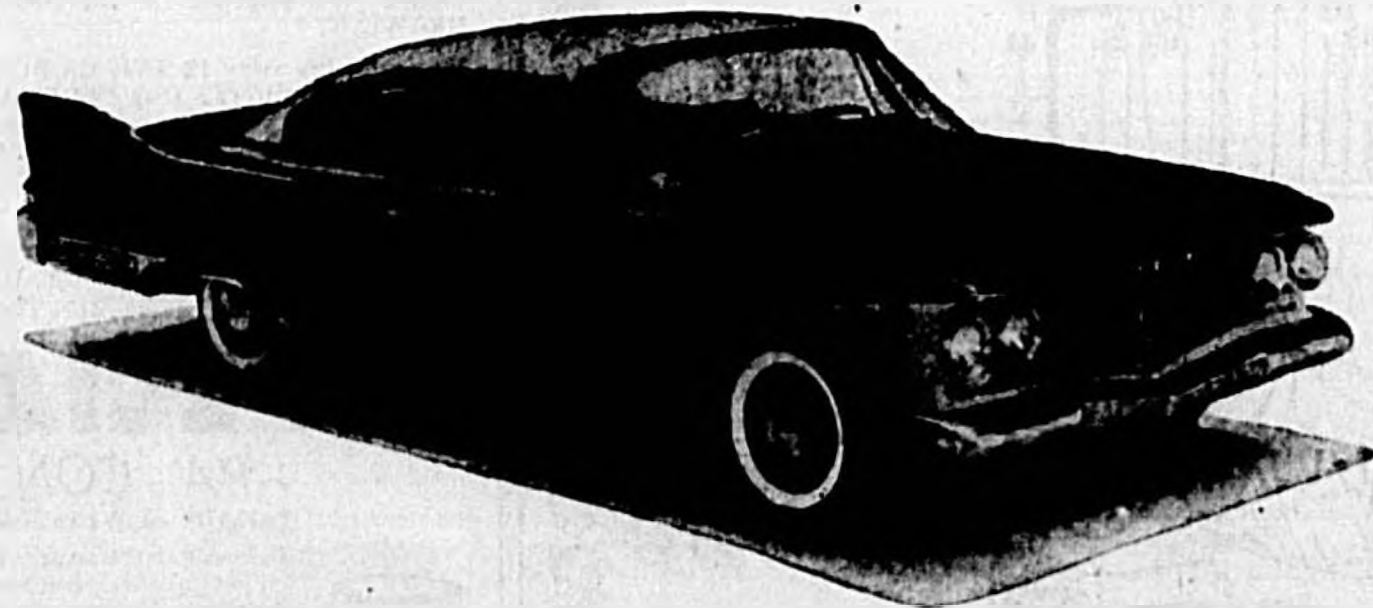

## Poultry Stuffings

MYRTIE C. WILSON  
Home Demonstration Agent

Stuffing is a perishable food and may cause food poisoning if it becomes contaminated. Holding a stuffed bird, even in the refrigerator is hazardous. The following is a list of precautionary measures to take in stuffing, cooking and storing poultry that are suggested:

1. Be sure equipment used in preparation of the stuffing is clean. The cutting board and the worker's hands, for instance, can be easy sources of contamination.
2. Work quickly in preparing the stuffing.
3. If broth is to be used, heat it to boiling before adding to the stuffing. If giblets orysters are used, cook them thoroughly before combining with the remaining ingredients.
3. If the ingredients for the stuffing have been refrigerated, heat them before combining and stuffing. This reduces the time necessary to heat the stuffing to 165° F. during the roasting. At 165° F. food poi-

son microorganism, which might be present in the stuffing will be killed.

5. Roast the stuffed bird immediately without refrigerating it. Poultry may be baked without stuffing and the stuffing may be baked in a separate greased container during the last 1 to 1½ hours of the bird roasting time.

6. Remove giblets stuffing from the bird, cut the bird into pieces small enough to fit in the refrigerator, and refrigerate bird and stuffing.

- LEFT OVER TURKEY**
- 2 cans condensed cream of mushroom soup,
  - 1 or 2 pintos, chopped or sliced,
  - 2 cups cooked chicken or turkey, cut in 1-inch pieces.
- Heat soup in a saucepan over low heat, stirring to keep it from scorching and make a smooth sauce. While the soup is heating add remaining ingredients. Serve over rice, crisp toast, toasted cornbread, waffles, Chinese noodles, or in patty shells. Yields: 4 to 6 servings.

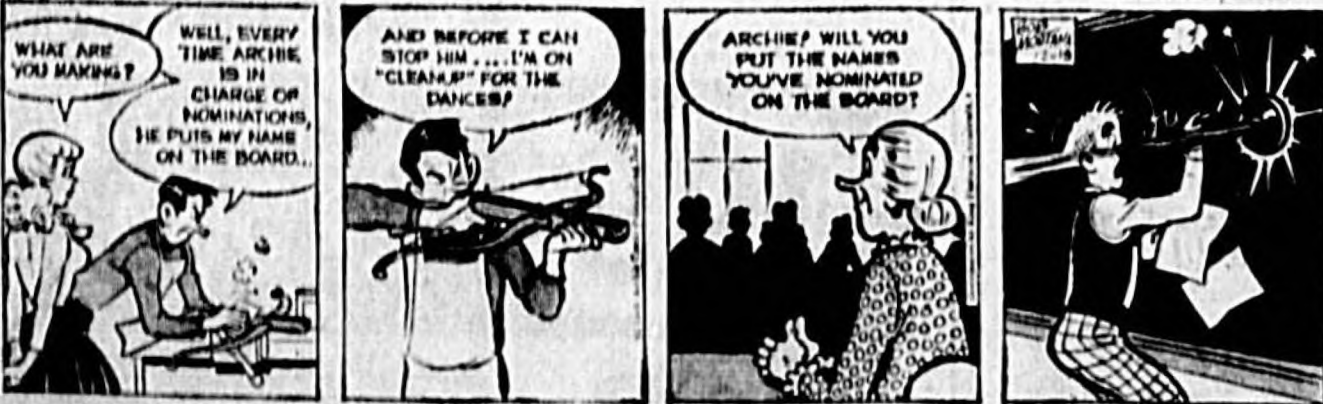

# Lions, 'Bama' Mix In Liberty Bowl

PHILADELPHIA (UPI)—Penn State, an Eastern powerhouse which stumbled twice, and Alabama, which rose from an opening defeat to prance unbeaten through its last nine games, smoothed out the final wrinkles today for their clash in the Liberty Bowl game Saturday.

The meeting between the Nittany Lions, powered by All-America Richie Lucas, and the defense-minded 'Bama's in the East's first major NCAA approved post-season game will be nationally televised on NBC starting at 12:45 p. m. e.s.t.

It will mark Alabama's 15th bowl appearance dating back to the Rose Bowl in 1926, and Penn State's third in bowl games. The promoters were hopeful for a crowd of 40,000 in the vast Philadelphia Stadium which seats 60,014, but which only the Army-Navy game fills. The long range weather forecast in an area where sub-freezing temperatures would not surprise was cloudy and fairly mild, with a risk of rain.

Both teams came to town Thursday — the Crimson Tide at mid-day in time for a workout in the stadium, and Penn State late Thursday night after a day drill on its campus. Each planned a loosening drill today.

A hopeful Paul (Bear) Bryant of Alabama, and a gloom-shrouded Rip Engle of Penn State, looked forward to "quite a game" in the post-Christmas bowl venture in the north.

Each hinted "surprises." Penn State could come up with anything, having used practically every offense but the single wing during the season. Defense-minded Alabama, a low scoring unit, also had some plotting.

"I hope to have a new wrinkle or two, and I expect they will too," Bryant said. "But, if I did have, I wouldn't tell you."

Engle insisted all week he was worried over State's mental attitude because there was a let-down following Pitt's startling upset of the Lions "and it's been hard getting the boys up since that time."

### Red China Ready For Invasion, Official Says

WASHINGTON (UPI) — U.S. Ambassador Everett F. Drumright, an expert on China, said Saturday that Communist China now is militarily ready to "jump off at any time" on its long-threatened invasion of Nationalist Formosa.

But he doubted the Reds would strike in the near future.

And he said Nationalist President Chiang Kai-Shek will not start a war because he knows he would require U.S. military support to return to the Chinese mainland. "He knows the United States would not embark on an effort to forcibly liberate the mainland under existing circumstances," the ambassador said.

Drumright, now envoy to Nationalist China and former head of the big U. S. Consulate listening post in Hong Kong, made this assessment in an interview. He is here for consultations at the State Department.

He says a major foreign policy shift in Red Peiping's current apogee toward neutralist India and Indonesia, in contrast with its earlier efforts to woo Southern Asia.

He predicted that Communist China's expansionist probing of the Indian border will be repeated "sooner or later" on the Chinese borders of Pakistan, Nepal and Burma.

"They now are showing their teeth to Asia and revealing their expansionist intentions," he said.

Why? Drumright frankly confessed that he did not know. But he said that until Peiping has built an industrial base for its military establishment—now heavily dependent on Russia—it is doubtful it will press its expansion drive beyond limited, probing actions.

He saw no serious conflict between Russia's Nikita Khrushchev and China's Mao Tse Tung on the basic issue of whether to risk war.

"I doubt that either Khrushchev or Mao wants a major war," he said. "Their pullback from the threat to Taiwan last year shows this."

### Hearing Set Dec. 28

The State Road Department has started legal action to get land bordering Sanford Ave. for the Sanford Ave. widening project.

The department filed a petition this week aimed at getting 98 parcels of land along Sanford Ave. through eminent domain proceedings. The department estimated the parcels owned by 137 persons to be worth \$22,103.

Circuit Court Judge Volie Williams will consider the declaration of taking at 4:30 p. m., Dec. 28 in the circuit court chambers. Judge Williams will appoint court appraisers and "make such order as the court deems possible."

Owners of the land involved are commanded to file answers to the petitions in court before Jan. 25, to show "what right, interest or lien" they have in the lands and to show why the land shouldn't be used to aid in Sanford Avenue's width.

The county will pay for the land acquired for the road widening. Sanford Ave. eventually will be 14 feet wide from Geneva Ave. to Onora Rd. with sidewalks on both sides between 25th St. and 27th St. and a sidewalk on the west side from 27th St. to Onora Rd. From Onora Rd. the street will be 24 feet wide to Ginder's Corner.

### New Cold Front Slated To Move Across State

LAKELAND (UPI) — A cold front was expected to bring frost and freezing temperatures to North Florida today.

Chilly weather was forecast for the entire state with the temperature dropping to the thirties and forties in central Florida. The low on the east coast was expected to get a low of from 48 to 55.

The future outlook was for continued rather cold tonight with temperatures near the danger point for crops in the northern portions Monday morning.

A low of 29 to 32 with frost was predicted for pockets and mucklands in the Suwannee and Gainesville citrus districts.

Thirty three to 35 with scattered frost was predicted for the upper east coast, Orlando and north portion of the Brooksville districts.

### Big Four Agree On Peace Plan

PARIS (UPI) — President Eisenhower agreed with the other Western Big Four leaders Saturday on a "maximum program" of peace to present to Russia at a summit conference next April and then staged a "very frank" showdown meeting with Charles DeGaulle on their private differences.

As the Western summit meeting opened in the presidential Elysee Palace Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev injected himself into it by releasing in Moscow a two-month-old letter demanding a German peace treaty and an end to West German rearmament.

Both sides then began to set the stage for an East-West summit meeting which Eisenhower, DeGaulle, West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer and British Prime Minister Harold MacMillan agreed Saturday should be held late next April. April 25 was mentioned as a likely date and a letter was to be drafted Sunday to Khrushchev suggesting the time, Geneva was to be the site, although DeGaulle would prefer Paris.

### East-West Fail On Nuclear Pact

GENEVA (UPI) — Western and Soviet scientists Saturday failed to reach agreement on a workable control system for underground nuclear explosions that could escape detection by present methods.

Their failure after three weeks of discussions ruled out Western approval for a complete ban on all nuclear testing, as demanded by the Soviets, because the west fears sneak tests would be possible.

American scientists discovered that some underground nuclear blasts could be muffled so that detection was nearly impossible. Others might be mistaken for earthquakes. The West presented the information to the Russians and asked them to cooperate on finding ways to close the loopholes.

### Ike To Report To Nation Dec. 23

PARIS (UPI) — President Eisenhower will report to his bosses, the American people, on the results of his 11-day tour next Wednesday night from Washington. It was learned Saturday night.

An informed source said the President already has begun work on the 10-minute address which will be delivered 24 hours after he returns home from his 19-day peace mission.

The speech will be an expansion of the usual presidential remarks at the traditional ceremony of lighting the Christmas tree in the White House lawn.

The source said Eisenhower would keep his remarks generalized on grounds that a detailed, thorough report would be a pretty heavy diet for the nation just at Christmas time.

He has decided to save the heavier material and weightier discussions of foreign policy for his state of the union message to congress early in January.

Some presidential advisers also feel that before he makes any serious pronouncements on his trip he should wait until reaction has solidified in the countries he has visited.

This presentation marks the first time that the distinguished two-time Academy Award winner Betty Davis has appeared in a national tour. She and her co-star, Cameron Mitchell, will be ably supported by Clark Allen who is a rare combination of painter, folk singer and guitarist all rolled into one.

The show, adapted and directed by Norman Corwin, is based on the works of Carl Sandburg, the 82-year-old American poet laureate.

The death of the tough old soldier was the signal for President Eisenhower to proclaim a day of national mourning.

Williams, made blind and deaf by the ravages of time, had been battling for more than a week his fourth bout with pneumonia in the last year.

### Group Formed To Aid Cities On U. S. 17-92

A new organization has recently been set up to make U. S. 17 the most traveled road in Florida and to aid cities on the route, John Krider, Chamber of Commerce manager said yesterday.

The name of the organization is called "Scenic 17 Highway Association" and the group is planning to send out colorful folders across the nation highlighting the various cities on U. S. 17-92 including the names of motels and lodges and brief description of each city.

Among the plans the group hopes to formulate in 1960 will be included improving, resurfacing and four-laning U. S. 17-92.

Among the major work spearheaded by the organization will be helping to break the bottleneck at Matland and forwarding the stretch around Lake Monroe.

The group also has gone on record as urging the State Road Department to improve the complete road in order to help the economy of the communities along the road.

Krider, who is an officer of the group, will ask the Florida Development Commission assistance in promotion of tourist travel over U. S. 17-92.

Krider also reported that contacts will be made with some 5000 travel editors in the region to gain support for their projects on beautifying the road and to work with various garden clubs in Seminole and Volusia counties to carry on a program of beautification.

"Not too long ago," Krider said, "U. S. 17-92 was the most traveled road in Florida. Through inactivity by the communities along this highway, other roads with active promotional groups, gained much of our traffic," Krider said.

"Now with this organization we hope to start the ball rolling in making U. S. 17-92 'Scenic 17,'" Krider pointed out.

### Gangster Roundup Opens In Chicago

CHICAGO (UPI) — Attention switched to the so-called "youngsters" in the alleged Chicago crime syndicate Saturday — everyone under 40 — in hopes of solving the gangland slaying of Roger Touhy.

The "youngsters" in a turn refused to do, or say, a thing without first consulting their attorneys.

Touhy's attorney, Robert B. Johnston, charged, however, that the syndicate had instigated Touhy's killing.

Touhy, 61, just out of prison after serving 25 years on what he insisted was a "framed" kidnap conviction, was shot in the death Wednesday night in front of his sister's home.

A companion, Walter Miller, 48, an ex-police sergeant who was serving as Touhy's bodyguard, was critically wounded.

The entire case appeared a throwback to the heyday of Al Capone. Touhy and Capone were arch rivals for the bootleg beer trade of the 30's.

It was the "youngsters" who inherited, or hope to inherit, the Capone empire who today were being questioned on the Touhy killing.

### Here's One Man Who Enjoys Yule Season In Jail

FAYETTEVILLE, N. C. (UPI) — Fayetteville police, with the help of a sympathetic judge, are trying their best to keep Luther Britt out of jail this Christmas.

If they do, it will be the first time in 28 years. He has spent the last 27 Christmases in custody of local or state prison officers.

Britt was released from jail a week ago Saturday and was back in custody a few hours later on public drunkenness charges.

City Recorder's Court Judge DeB S. Carter suspended a 30-day sentence for him Tuesday. But two hours later, police arrested him again. And again the charge was public drunkenness.
