Link Between Diabetes, Stroke

DEAR DR. LAMB - Can you tell me if it is possible for a person to have a stroke and diabetes hit at the same time, or does the diabetes act like a stroke? If there such a thing as diabetic coma? Just how does it affect a person, and does it cause death? Anything you can answer on this subject would be greatly appreciated.

DEAR READER - A stroke caused by inadequate oxygen supply to part of the brain, and that usually means a blockage in circulation in a major artery of the brain. The oxygenation of the brain can be affected by a host of contributing factors. If an elderly person has disease that closes part of the arteries to the brain and then has pressure applied to an artery from a neck deformity from arthritis, the combination can induce a stroke. If a person develops a severe anemia and may progress to coma with unconsciousness and shock.

During the coma the shock-like reaction may lower the blood pressure enough to induce a stroke if a person already has disease in the arteries to the brain.

You can get more information on diabetic coma and how diabetes works by using the same procedure mentioned for getting information about strokes, but ask for The Health Letter, number 3-10, Diabetes, The Sweet Sickness, which explains how acidosis results in formation of ketones and gives the patient an acetone breath.

The acetone breath is often confused with alcohol. If the person is confused, which is often the case, the combination may lead an unsuspecting law enforcement officer to think he is drunk. The result is a disaster with a critically ill patient ending up in jail in less than optimal circumstances when he should be getting emergency treatment in a hospital.

About two-thirds of patients who develop a stroke have either diabetes or high blood pressure. The control of both conditions would go a long way toward eliminating the high incidence of strokes in our culture.

Indictments To Remain Sealed High Court Denies Herring's Petition

The Florida Supreme Court today denied Seminole-Brevard State Atty. Abbott Herring's appeal seeking to have four sealed Seminole Grand Jury indictments made public.

State Atty. General Robert Sherrin's office said the high court's ruling, without a written opinion, puts the indictments "in limbo at least for the weekend."

Herring, contacted at his Titusville office, indicated he doesn't know what his next move will be.

Assistant State Atty. General Raymond L. Markey Jr. said since the six-judge Supreme Court panel didn't render a written

opinion on its ruling that the basis for the ruling wasn't immediately known.

"It means, in the minds of the Supreme Court," Markey said, "that Circuit Judge Joe A. Cowart's actions to this point haven't been such as to invoke the extraordinary power to stop him."

On Dec. 3 Cowart received the Seminole Grand Jury interim report and four indictments and immediately ordered them sealed. It is believed that the sealing of indictments is without precedence in the state.

Markey said Herring "can always seek new indictments to eliminate any deficiencies that Judge Cowart may have found in the original indictments."

He also said Herring "may also file direct information" charging persons who were named in the original indictments.

"I'm confused," Markey said, "because this doesn't follow normal rules applicable. I don't know — I'm sort of guessing who goes next."

The Supreme Court ruling immediately gave rise to local speculation that the Seminole County Grand Jury may go back into session Monday or early next week concerning the reported county government probe and indictments.

Judge Cowart Jr. wasn't available at press time for comment on a report published Thursday in a Brevard County newspaper saying that Cowart said the names of those indicted will be made public Monday during open court proceedings.

When Cowart ordered the indictments sealed he cited a state law allowing persons named in a grand jury report, but not indicted, time to ask the court to regress or expunge the report or portions concerning the unindicted persons.

The law gives persons concerned 15 days in which to file motions for expungement. If such motions are filed, according to the law, the grand jury report must also remain sealed until the local court's ruling on the motions can be ruled on by the district court of appeals.

Grand Jury Foreman Gary Hall attended a five-hour closed door hearing concerning the grand jury return before Chief Circuit Judge Virgil B. Conding Thursday afternoon.

Democrat Panel Plans Strategy Against Herring

LONGWOOD - A select committee of five Democrats — three of whom have been under fire from the state attorney's office — has been organized to oppose State Attorney Dan Herring's bid for re-election next year.

"It is time we stood up to this little guy," said Tom Pratt, Seminole businessman, named chairman of the select committee, at a Thursday night meeting of the Seminole County Democratic Executive Committee.

Both was accused in 1973 and again in 1974 of "Sunshine Law" violations when he was a member of the Winter Springs City Council.

He was subsequently cleared of both charges. Herring's office, early in 1974, after receiving a tape recording from then Mayor Roy McClain of an alleged meeting, in the Booth home, among McClain, Booth and Councilman Irwin Hunter, cleared the two councilmen.

At the time McClain said, just after his election in December, 1973, the two city councilmen requested the meeting to discuss mayoral committee appointments.

Hunter and Booth were cleared on the basis of an opinion from Florida Attorney General Robert Sherrin that intent to violate the law had to be proved.

Both councilmen said they had not intended to violate the law which requires that all governmental meetings where elected officials were decisions are made or discussion leading to ultimate action is held must be open to the public.

The opinion was sought by Freeman, who was then city attorney of Winter Springs.

McGregor To Seek Media Guidelines

Seminole-Brevard Circuit Court Judge Robert B. McGregor says he will seek guidelines governing news media conduct and coverage of local court proceedings.

After an incident Thursday involving McGregor and a television cameraman in the courthouse offices of the circuit judges, McGregor said a group of news reporters and cameramen "were interfering with the operation of the court."

"I propose to discuss the relationship of the courts and the press at the next judges' meeting," McGregor said.

The judges' meeting is scheduled for Jan. 12 at the Brevard County Courthouse at Titusville.

"I feel that guidelines must be established for future contact between the press, the courts and those person obliged to attend court," McGregor said.

As newsmen crowded into the judges' outer office Thursday, to cover a five-hour closed door hearing concerning four sealed grand jury indictments and a sealed interim grand jury report, McGregor, who isn't involved in the grand jury case,

Ex-Police To Stay In Prison

Tom Binford, a principal who testified in the grand jury probe of alleged wrongdoing in county government, said today he is in favor of judges releasing the names of persons indicted.

"I think the indictments should have been made public the day they were issued by the grand jury," Binford said.

Last week the jury reportedly returned four indictments and named one person as unindicted co-conspirator. But, circuit court judges ordered indictments sealed. And, the State Supreme Court today turned down an appeal from the state attorney to order the judges to release names of those indicted.

Binford, a former salesman for Laurel Realty, was the salesman who negotiated the purchase of a \$17,000 clay pit near Markham Woods Road. Binford says he lost \$12,500 when the county commission backed off and voted not to purchase the site owned by Lester Mandell, president of Greater Construction Co., Casselberry.

Meanwhile, two county commissioners — John Kimbrough and Richard Williams — issued a joint statement

Binford Says Indictments Should Be Opened

Thursday denying they were subjects of the grand jury report. Commissioner Sidney Viblen Jr. joined Kimbrough and Williams in their denial.

All three commissioners say they have received no notice from the jury or from the judge that they have been either indicted or named as an unindicted co-conspirator.

State Rep. Robert Hattaway, a cousin of County Commissioner Mike Hattaway, declined to comment today on the grand jury report. Asked if he was named in the report as an indicted co-conspirator, Hattaway said, "You know I can't say anything. I haven't been served any papers."

Commissioner Hattaway and County Attorney Thomas Freeman both replied "no comment" today when asked about the probe and if they were named in the indictments.

Commissioner Harry Kwiatkowski has answered all queries with a "no comment" also. Kwiatkowski could not be reached today.

Though Rep. Hattaway appeared before the grand jury, he was not named in the report. Asked if he was granted immunity from prosecution in return for his testimony before jurors, Rep. Hattaway said, "I used my constitutional rights like anyone should when they go before a grand jury."

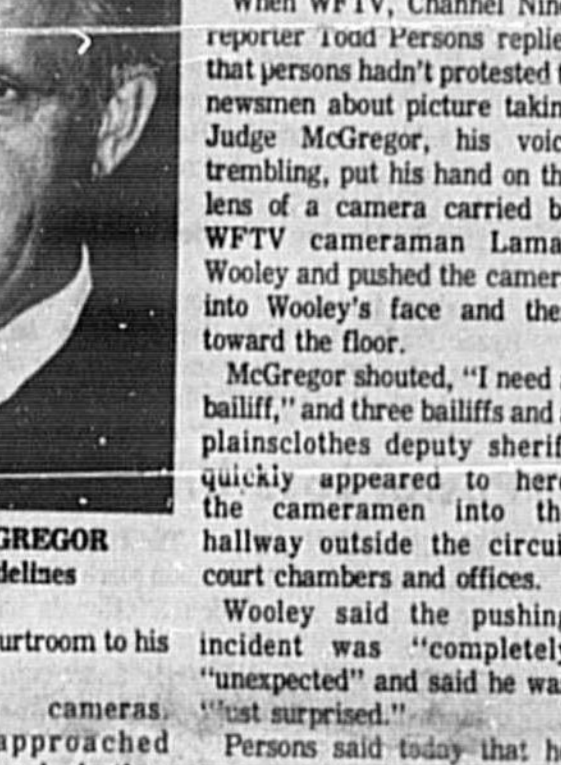

Home Destroyed, Two Children Burned

A home was destroyed by fire and two children were burned early today, according to Lt. Richard Evans of the Sanford Fire Department.

Evans said two little girls, suffering from third-degree burns, were taken to Seminole Memorial Hospital. One of the girls, approximately nine months old, is Trina Jackson, Evans said, but the name of the other girl, and conditions of both, were not immediately available.

Evans said the home, the residence of Roy Williams, 1202 Lincoln Court, suffered "extensive damage" from the blaze.

Evans said a girl "was supposed to have been babysitting" at the time of the fire, but the house apparently was unoccupied except for the children.

Immediately after the incident, no other injuries were reported.

House Damaged

Another fire damaged the home of a Sanford physician Thursday, according to reports at the Sanford Police Department.

Police said the home of Dr. Thomas Largen, 4100 Orlando Dr., suffered an undetermined amount of damage from the deliberately-set blaze, and nearby houses escaped damage only because of the "prompt response" of fire units.

A 44-year-old suspect, a resident of the Sanford Detoxification Unit and a former mental patient, is under the care of another doctor pending further investigation, according to the reports.

Police said three witnesses reported a man wearing tan pants and a dark plaid shirt sprinkled kerosene at the residence, then set the fire. A kerosene can was confiscated at the scene.

Double Standard On UN Morality

Daniel Patrick Moynihan, in a riposte to the General Assembly's adoption of a resolution equating Zionism with racism, has proposed a worldwide amnesty for political prisoners.

Even though Moynihan's resolution was withdrawn it had real merit.

He counseled the nations that voted to denounce Israel to look to the condition of human rights in their own countries.

The Soviet Union, for example, voted for the Zionism resolution. Yet Amnesty International, based in London, reports that there are "at least 10,000 political and religious prisoners" being held in Soviet prisons and all are being mistreated.

Brazil, which voted for the Zionism resolution, is under a military dictatorship which has refused to tolerate peaceful dissent. A Roman Catholic bishop recently led two million protesters in a fast against the imprisonment and torture of political prisoners in Brazil and other countries.

Top Communist Labor Leader Released From Spanish Jail

MADRID, Spain (AP) — Spain's top Communist labor leader Marcelino Camacho was released by court order today from prison, where he had been held without charge since Sunday.

The 57-year-old Camacho had been pardoned from prison Nov. 29 but was rearrested Sunday at the time of a scheduled demonstration called by the outlawed Communist party to demand amnesty for political prisoners.

The demonstration was not held as scheduled outside Madrid's Carabanchel Prison, but 150 persons were reported arrested in the area.

Angola Spending Cited

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States has spent nearly \$50 million in aiding two anti-Soviet factions in the Angolan civil war, The Washington Post said in Friday's edition.

In a story that quoted unidentified informed sources, the newspaper said the bulk of the U.S.-supplied military equipment has been sent to the former Portuguese African colony in the last six months and that most of it is being funneled through neighboring Zaire.

Recipients of the reported aid are the National Union for the Total Independence of Angola (UNITA) and the National Front for the Liberation of Angola (FNLA), which are battling the Soviet-backed Popular Movement for the Liberation of Angola (MPLA).

Moslems Besiege Christians

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Leftist Moslem gunmen besieging the last major Christian position in the heart of Beirut vowed today to ignore all cease-fire agreements until they drive their foes from the downtown hotel district.

"The cease-fire is not binding until the Phalangists get out of the Holiday Inn," said a Nasrerie lieutenant running an operations room in the Palm Beach Hotel.

"We will not lay down arms until the district is purged of Phalangists, even if the state and the army threaten us. When the area comes under our complete control, it will be reopened to tourism and business."

Or, more seriously, many Americans have grown to distrust their government so much that they believe another investigation of the assassination would be no more trustworthy than that of the Warren Commission, upon which the critics have been heaping doubts and scorn for more than a decade.

As, or seems more probable, many people may simply believe that if the Warren Commission did not err at the complete, undisputable and uncontradictable truth about the assassination, it came as close as it was possible to come and that another investigation would not likely come any closer.

The admirable efforts by the CBS organization may have added an unknown number of people to this latter category.

In 1967, CBS had marked a first in the history of the network by airing a report of the Warren Commission that was so graphic that it caused a major target of the actual physical conditions as the President's car moved past the Texas School Book Depository building. This was something that the Warren Commission itself had not done.

The tests demonstrated that a lone gunman could easily have pumped off the three shots the Commission said Oswald fired, well within the time span recorded by the famous Zapruder film of the assassination.

Writing, Hair Samples Taken

Fear Is Patty's Defense

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)— Patricia Hearst gave prosecutors a lock of her hair and samples of her handwriting after her attorneys revealed her defense against bank robbery charges would be "fear of death."

Before she was returned to her San Mateo County Jail cell after a federal court hearing Friday, Miss Hearst spent 3 1/2 hours giving the government samples of her handwriting.

She also let them pluck strands of her chestnut brown hair, presumably for comparison with hair found on items of evidence.

The handwriting samples could be compared with written

memoirs found in the apartment where Miss Hearst was arrested Sept. 18. The "narratives and chronicles" record events from the kidnaping of the newspaper heiress on Feb. 4, 1974, through the robbery of the Hibiscus bank on April 15, 1974.

Authorities have said they do not know who wrote the documents.

The government dropped a request for a sample of Miss Hearst's voice for comparison with tape recordings sent after the bank robbery. The defense apparently will concede she made the recordings.

The key question confronting jurors at the trial set to begin

Jan. 26 will be whether she was forced to participate in the robbery six weeks after she was kidnapped by the Symbionese Liberation Army.

F. Lee Bailey, chief defense lawyer, told U.S. District Court Judge Oliver J. Carter that fear of death "will be Miss Hearst's prime defense."

"We'll have a simple defense—somebody put a gun at my head and I did what they told me," said Bailey.

The judge told U.S. Atty. James L. Browning he understood Bailey "will not take a position that (her defense) is insanity or diminished capacity. What he is saying is there is a mental condition that goes to the defendant's ability to commit the crime."

The defense strategy falls within federal guidelines on a defense called "coercion." The federal code says, "In order to provide a legal excuse for any criminal conduct, the compulsion must be present and immediate and of such a nature to induce a well-founded and serious bodily injury."

It also requires "that there be no reasonable opportunity to escape the compulsion without committing the crime or participating in the commission of the crime."

Reagan 3 Face Murder Charges In Slabbing Of Editor

PHILADELPHIA (AP)— Police have charged three Philadelphia men with murder in the slaying of a newspaper editor John S. Knight Jr.

One has been arrested, Joseph Golden, chief of detective. He told a news conference Thursday that he "doesn't know where they are," Golden said. Robbery was the motive for the crime, he said.

Golden said the FBI is being asked to join the case because of federal arrest warrants charging the three men with interstate flight to avoid prosecution.

Charged are Salvatore Soli, 38; Steven Maleno, 25; and Isaac "Felix" Melendez, 20. Warrants signed by Municipal Court Judge Edward Quinn charged each man with murder, attempted murder, conspiracy, aggravated assault and three counts of robbery.

Knight, 30, was the special editor at the Philadelphia Daily News and grandson of John S. Knight, founder of the Knight newspaper empire.

He was stabbed to death Sunday morning at his luxury apartment in center city. It had been reported that Knight may have known one of the intruders and that one of the three men was a homosexual.

On Wednesday, Golden said Knight was bisexual and that homosexuals were being interviewed. He refused to say if he discussed any aspect of the private lives of the suspects.

Golden said he did not want to prejudice any future criminal case.

Golden did not explain why he thought robbery was the motive. Police have said jewelry, silverware and a \$4,000 wristwatch were taken, but \$300,000 worth of paintings and art work were left untouched.

Rosemary McKinnon, a house guest at Knight's apartment, told police she tried to escape down the elevator. Her husband, John, was not injured. Golden said it was the slaying of Mrs. McKinnon which prompted the charges of attempted murder.

Golden refused to say how police identified the names of the suspects, saying only "they were arrested at through intensive investigation."

He was buried Wednesday in Columbus, Ga., where his widowed mother lives.

Ford Pressured To Veto Site Bill, Dunlop Says

WASHINGTON (AP)— Secretary of Labor John Dunlop says President Ford is under tremendous political pressure to veto a controversial construction site picketing bill that Ford earlier had personally endorsed.

And Senate conservatives, who had threatened a filibuster to veto the bill, are now pushing for its passage.

Dunlop acknowledged, in an appearance Thursday at the National Press Club, that pressure for a veto is coming from some construction industry employers, some management representatives and from the politicians in various states around the country.

He noted that he had pushed for its approval earlier "in the President's personal instructions," but he said that he has no indication now whether the President will sign it.

When asked if he might resign if Ford reverses himself and vetoes the measure, Dunlop avoided a direct answer. He said, however, that he would doubt he would quit.

Ford had personally endorsed the bill with the condition Congress also approve a companion measure creating a new mechanism for settling construction industry disputes. Senate House conferees included that measure in the final version of the picketing bill.

The measure passed the House on Thursday, despite some last-minute administration pressure to beat the measure now so Ford won't have to make a decision on it.

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Says Bill Would Save On Fuel Costs

Zarb Switches, Backs Energy Plan

WASHINGTON (AP)— Federal Energy Administrator Frank Zarb, who earlier expressed doubts that a congressional energy plan would lower fuel prices, now says the bill should save consumers about 2.3 cents a gallon on fuel oil and gasoline.

Although the Democratic-sponsored plan would temporarily run counter to President Ford's own energy program, he has not said whether he will veto it.

Zarb told Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., in a letter that while the congressional plan's price cuts might not be felt immediately, "prices will be less in future months than they otherwise would have been under a continuation of the present program" of price controls.

Portions of the Dec. 8 letter from Zarb were printed in a conference committee report on the compromise energy bill, on which a final vote in the House and Senate will come next week. The letter was released Thursday.

Congressional economists say the bill could mean a temporary saving of 3.3 cents per gallon on gasoline or household oil, and they predict lower prices may be felt as soon as the bill becomes law — if it does.

Zarb has urged Ford to sign the bill as the best energy plan he can get from Congress this year, but conservative lawmakers "obviously reflect the publicity" from Reagan's televised campaign declaration.

He said he is confident the barometer will continue before the nation's first presidential primary.

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United Aided By Competitors

WASHINGTON (AP)— An industry strike insurance plan will bring United Airlines between \$3 million and \$5 million a day from its competitors as long as the airline remains on strike.

United, the nation's largest domestic air carrier, has canceled all flights until Dec. 24 due to the walk-out last weekend by 16,800 mechanics.

United officials have forecast a long walkout, and say the industry's mutual aid pact prolongs strikes by allowing the airlines to make a profit even when they are shut down.

Bargeholders between United Airlines and the International Association of Machinists and Aerospace Workers broke off on Wednesday, with the parties far apart on new contract terms.

Union rules permit strike benefits to be paid beginning Dec. 21, but because scattered industry strikes have crippled the union strike fund, the benefits will be terminated on Jan. 1, a spokesman said.

United will be in far better shape.

Under the strike insurance agreement, United will be reimbursed for its losses to the tune of \$3 million a day for the first two weeks of the strike, declining to about \$2 million a day after the first month.

Pan American World Airways, which is not now authorized to carry passengers between domestic points, has filed with the Civil Aeronautics Board for emergency permission to do so.

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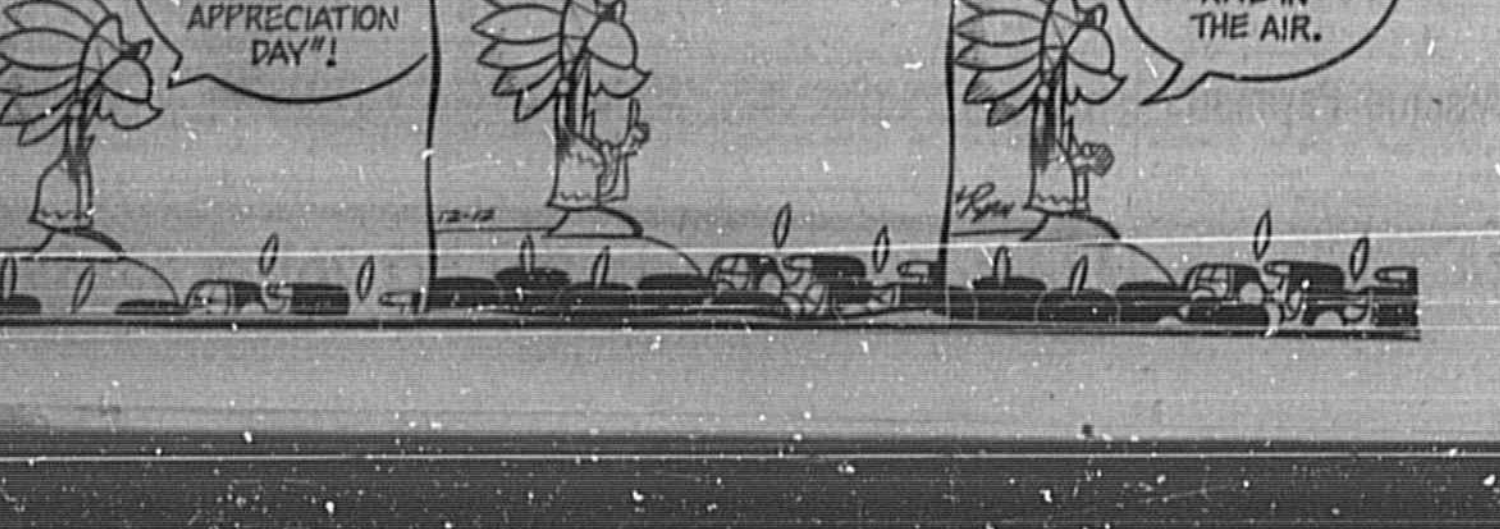

Inflammation of Prostate Gland

By Lawrence E. Lamb, M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB - What is prostatitis? Why does a young man in his 30s get this? My mother says a man is running around with other women, straining his prostate gland which results in the prostatitis. Please help clear this up one way or the other. It's on my mind quite often. DEAR READER - Your mother may mean well, but she is misinformed and her statement could be causing a lot of unnecessary trouble. She is repeating a frequent misconception that has caused other people a lot of unhelpful problems. Prostatitis means inflammation of the prostate gland, just as the ending "itis" means inflammation as applied to appendicitis, bronchitis, laryngitis, gastritis, cystitis and so on. The inflammation can be, and in the case of a young man usually is, caused by some bacteria. The bacteria involved in most cases is not the organism that causes sexual activity at all. A common source of the infection is one of the bacteria in the colon which some way escapes and lodges in the crypts of the prostate gland. Some urologists believe that such an infection is more likely to develop in a person who is not having as much sex as might be optimal and the over-distended prostate gland gets boggy and is more likely to become infected. It is true that the prostate gland can be involved in a venereal infection, but again, the bacteria commonly involved in most cases of prostatitis are different germs entirely. The kind of prostatitis that a man commonly gets when he is older is often related to enlargement of the gland. This may be from some hormonal imbalance or from chronic infection. As The Health Letter points out, the best treatment depends upon what bacteria is causing the infection. When the proper medicines are used, most acute cases are cured quickly. Some chronic infections remain troublesome to treat. DEAR DR. LAMB - I am a 18-year-old girl and am 5 feet 2 and weigh 130 pounds. I'm trying to lose weight by eating nothing. I just drink 100 per cent tea and coffee, also water. I take two vitamins daily for energy. My problem is my parents and neighbors. They keep trying to get me to eat. I've tried balanced diets, but they don't work for me. Why water diet hurt me in any way? Are my parents right? DEAR READER - You can bet your pointed head your parents are right. I just wish there were some way to get the transmission across to all you young girls that starvation diets are harmful to your normal development. You are not even physically mature yet and your body needs vital nutrients and proteins to develop a normal, healthy body. Your diet is deficient in calcium which you need for bone development. It is protein deficient which will affect your normal muscular development. You can do serious damage to yourself. I think it is particularly important for young people in the development stage to have good medical guidance if they are going to be on a diet to lose weight. If you want good teeth, a good skeleton, adequate sexual development and a host of other problems, just continue with your present unwise course.

Seminole County Grand Jury Expected To Reconvene

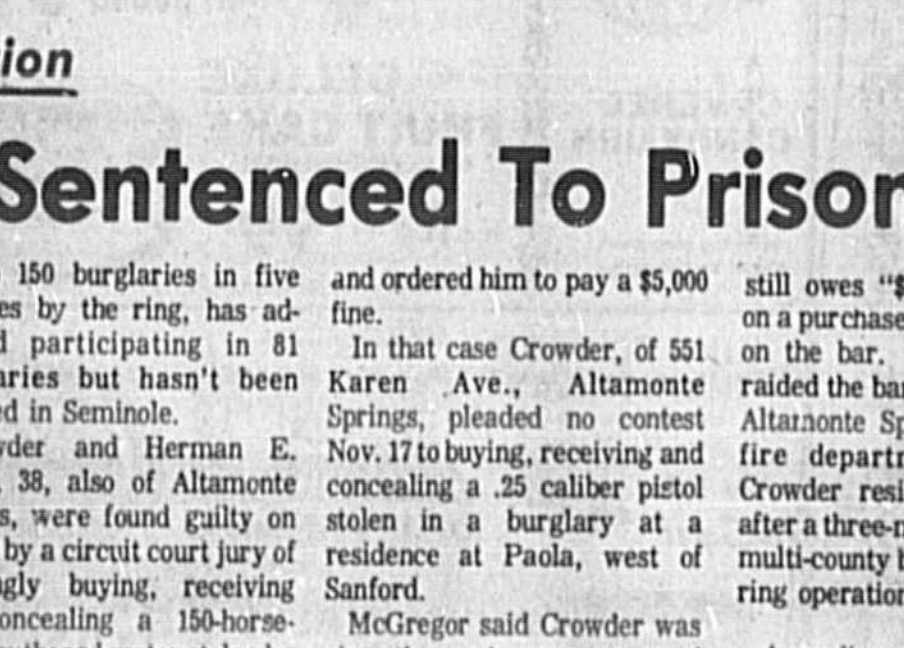
The Seminole County Grand Jury is expected to convene Monday or Tuesday to reconsider an interim report and four indictments returned Dec. 3 after a four-week reported probe of county government actions. Two Seminole-Brevard circuit court judges late Friday ordered the report and "attachments" returned to the grand jury for reconsideration because the report and some of the documents accompanying it "contained improper matters." Circuit Judges Virgil B. Conkling and Joe A. Cowart Jr. ordered the interim report and indictments returned to grand jury foreman Gary Hill following a closed door hearing of nearly two hours with Assistant State Atty. Bill Heffernan and private attorneys Newman Brock, Gerald Rutberg, J. Cheney Mason and Franklin T. Walden. Judge Cowart ordered both the jury report and the four indictments sealed for 15 days on Dec. 3, citing a state law allowing persons named in a grand jury report, but not indicted, time to ask the court to suppress or expunge the report or portions concerning the unindicted persons. State Atty. Abbott Herring asked Cowart to release the indictments so persons named could be arrested but Cowart refused to do so. Herring then appealed to the Florida Supreme Court
