At A Glance

Government offices will close Monday

Federal, state, county and city offices in Seminole County will all be closed on Monday in observance of Memorial Day.

It is also a holiday for banks and post offices. There will be no mail delivery and mail will not be put into lock boxes.

Schools and the School Board office will remain open.

Garbage collection will be as usual Monday in Altamonte Springs, but there will be no garbage pickup on Monday in Sanford.

Monday's pickup will be on Tuesday, and Tuesday's will be Wednesday. The normal schedule will be resumed on Thursday.

Jail guard appeals dismissal

SANFORD — Former Seminole County jail guard Martha Brown of Winter Springs, who was fired by Seminole County Sheriff John Polk after allegedly lying to state prison officials in applications to visit a felon inmate, is scheduled to appeal her firing to the sheriff's department civil service board.

Brown is accused of allowing the felon to borrow her car after his release from prison. Her .357 magnum revolver, for which she does not have a permit, was in the car at the time she gave the car to the felon, a sheriff's investigation shows. The felon stole Brown's car and disappeared. The car has been recovered and she was fired by Polk less than one month ago. Her appeals hearing is scheduled June 7.

Polk suffers heart attack in London

SANFORD — Seminole County Sheriff John Polk is hospitalized in London, England, where he suffered a heart attack Wednesday morning.

At about 10 a.m. today, doctors reported medical tests show little damage to Polk's heart as a result of the attack. He was sitting up and "wants to get up," said Seminole Sheriff's Chief Deputy Duane Harrell, who talked to Polk's doctor via telephone. Harrell said it hasn't

yet been determined how long Polk will be hospitalized.

Polk is in a little pain, Harrell said. In an earlier report to Harrell Wednesday afternoon, doctors said Polk's color was good and he was not in pain.

Harrell said Polk, 56, who underwent heart bypass surgery about 11 years ago, was admitted to Guy's Hospital in London early Wednesday after experiencing chest pains.

At about 10 a.m. (U.S. time) Polk telephoned Harrell from his hospital bed. "He was telling me

things he wanted taken care of and was having some pain and discomfort. He was having the attack while I was talking to him," Harrell said. Harrell said doctors confirmed that Polk's heart attack occurred during their phone conversation.

"I've talked to him since the attack. They don't know how serious it is yet," Harrell said.

London doctors told Harrell it would be early today before they could evaluate the seriousness of the attack. Polk will remain hospitalized in London. Harrell

said Polk's wife, Dorothy, is making arrangements to travel to London to be with him.

It will be business as usual at the sheriff's department, which Harrell said is well organized and can run smoothly on a day-to-day basis in his absence.

In the decade since his bypass, Polk was hospitalized once about a year ago as a result of chest pains. He underwent medical tests, but it was determined he did not suffer a heart attack at that time.

Polk left Sanford Sunday and

was to return home today after negotiations with Underwriters at Lloyd's of London for \$1 million in excess insurance for Florida sheriffs, who provided their own basic insurance for their departments.

Polk was there as chairman of the Florida Sheriff's Association. This was his second trip to London. Last year on the same kind of mission, he succeeded in getting the needed coverage. He returned this week to renew the policy and to try to

Couple loses possessions

Truck fire halts traffic on I-4

SANFORD — A truck fire on Interstate 4 Wednesday afternoon may have led to two subsequent accidents nearby due to traffic tie-ups.

At about 2:30 p.m., a Lakeland couple moving back to their home in Virginia in their 1971 Chevrolet pickup truck were traveling east on I-4 about a mile south of State Road 46 when they experienced an electrical problem leading to the vehicle catching fire, said Jim Williams, a Seminole County emergency medical technician who responded to the incident.

Williams said the couple, Cheryl Fadeley and her father, Sonny Wolford, had all their personal belongings and furniture in the truck. Fadeley told Williams he and his fiance were returning to their home in Edinburg, Va. after attending school in Lakeland because

central Florida was too crowded.

The fire quickly engulfed the truck, destroying it and about 90 percent of the belongings before it could be put out, Williams said. He estimated the damages at about \$5,000. One lane of I-4 was closed while firefighters were at the scene, Williams said.

While firefighters were extinguishing the vehicle fire, two cars collided nearby in the open lane, but there were no injuries, Williams said.

Fifteen minutes later four cars were involved in another accident about a quarter mile north of the accident scene, Williams said. He said both I-4 lanes had been opened by then and that accident may have been unrelated to the truck fire incident.

Information from the Florida Highway Patrol was not available on the additional accidents.

Williams said Fadeley and Wolford had no immediate plans

SCEA approves its budget

SANFORD — Seminole County Expressway Authority members have approved a \$2.7 million budget for next year and authorized negotiations to hire three design engineering firms to do up to \$3.4 million in work.

Gerald Britton, executive director of the authority, told members Florida Department of Transportation officials assured him funding would be provided for design and engineering services for three of the next six projects between State Road 26 and U.S. Highway 1792.

Britton said he is hopeful the Florida Legislature will provide funding for design work on the remaining three projects.

Without discussion, board members approved the \$2.7 million budget listing administrative expenses at \$482,000 and construction funds at \$2 million.

The single page budget document listed salaries for Britton and the authority's secretary as \$26,000. Britton refused to list their individual salaries or a breakdown of construction costs contained in the budget.

Board members authorized Britton to negotiate final design contracts with:

- Over, Huddle, Mills & Prentiss Inc., Orlando — for the 2.1 mile expressway section between SR 429 and Milder Road.

- Hensley Sehnadt Inc., Orlando — for the 1.7 mile section between Milder Road and Red Bug Lake Road.

- The Florida Engineering & Associates, Inc., and Lochner Engineering, Altamonte Springs — for the 2.5 mile section between Red Bug Lake Road to south of Lake Jesup.

Should additional funding be available, board members authorized Britton to negotiate final contracts with:

- ISA Group Inc., Tampa — for the 1.5 mile Lake Jesup bridge.

- Greiner Inc., Orlando — for design of the 2.0 mile section from the Lake Jesup bridge to

Latchkey program extended, expanded

SANFORD — Two programs — one which cares for children of working parents, and one that will attempt to curb the high expulsion and suspension rate of minority students — were approved by the Seminole

County School Board Wednesday.

The YMCA latchkey program will be offered at four new locations: Lake Orienta, Sabal Point, Geneva and Idyllwild elementary schools. The latter only with prior consent of the school's new principal. The

length of which will be determined at a later date. Richard Robinson, program director, has requested a three-year contract.

Robinson said the program currently cares for between 200 to 225 children each school day. The after-school programs operate from class dismissal

time until 6 p.m. A pilot project at Geneva Elementary will also have a before-school program from 7 a.m. to the start of school.

Robinson describes the program as loosely structured. Children have been in a very structured environment for

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Commission gets overview of WINS project

SANFORD — The city commissioners and mayor got their first official presentation of the WINS project from the design consultants Wednesday afternoon at City Hall.

The end result is commissioners are going to take a "long, hard look" at the financing of the project which could cost the city \$4.6 million over six years.

The Florida Center for Urban Design & Research (FCUD&R), Tampa, made a 2½-hour executive summary presentation to

the mayor and commissioners on the Westside Improvement Neighborhood Strategy (WINS), a proposed project which has been more than a year in the making.

"It will set a new standard for Florida in terms of affordable housing and redevelopment without federal funding," said David A. Crane, in charge of the project for the FCUD&R.

The commission promised to give additional study to the project before meeting with FCUD&R for a day and a half seminar in July.

"I'm going to take a long, hard look at it before making up my mind," said commissioner Herbert "Whitey" Eckstein. "I'm going to have to be convinced that it will work."

Mayor Bettye Smith concurred with Eckstein, but believes the project will become a reality.

"I think we all have to have some questions answered," said Smith. "We are talking about a lot of money. However, I think, as I have all along, that it (WINS) will be a go."

According to Crane, the WINS project is a rehabilitation and

revitalization of the existing Goldsboro community based on a "triangular partnership" between city, community and private business.

Initially, WINS will focus on 150 acres of the 720 in the Goldsboro community, which is bounded by W. First Street on the north, the Seacrest Railroad to the west, French Avenue to the east and the city limits, 18th and 20th Streets to the south.

Phase I (the 150 acres) will consist of 532 new and rehabilitated housing units and will include commercial develop-

ment, street and sewer improvements and public park facilities.

In my 35 years of designing urban redevelopment, this is the most affordable I've ever been involved with," Crane told the city commission.

The presentation included a cost analysis of the project, showing that with residential and commercial redevelopment WINS would mean an additional \$15 million to the city in tax revenue over 30 years, eventually paying for itself and

No bond set for Seminole man facing sexual battery charges

SANFORD — A Southeast Seminole County man remains jailed without bond after being charged with two counts each of sexual battery on a child and lewd and lascivious assault on a child. He also faces multiple counts involving other sex-related charges.

Two girls have accused Louis Edward Smith, 37, of 7113 Betty Ave., rural Winter Park, of raping them many times in the last eight years. At about 1:40 p.m. on County Road 427, rural Altamonte Springs, a sheriff's deputy spotted a man matching the description of the robber.

Bouchacra reportedly identified the suspect, whom police have charged with strong-arm robbery. The suspect is identified as Robert Dean Powers, 23, of 551 E. Semoran Blvd., # G-5, Fern Park. Powers remains jailed in lieu of \$8,000 bond.

Hearing officer's hours extended

SANFORD — To meet the need of an increasing court load of child support enforcement and alcohol and drug dependency cases, Seminole County commissioners gave their consent Tuesday to allowing a hearing officer to work longer hours for more money.

Lots Walker, Seminole circuit judicial administrative assistant, told commissioners "Baker" and "Myers Act" cases have increased from an average of three weekly two years ago to a current peak of 14 a week.

Baker Act cases involve hearings to determine whether mentally ill people should be involuntarily placed in a treat-

ment program if they prove dangerous to themselves or others. Myers Act cases are similar, but involve alcoholics.

C. Vernon Mize, Jr., Seminole County circuit administrative judge, told commissioners drug dependency hearings, where drug abusers are considered for mandatory treatment programs, have increased from one to two cases a month two years ago to an average of 12 to 15 cases monthly now.

"We anticipate an increase in these type cases," Mize said.

Mize said he and another judge currently hear child support and substance dependency cases, as well as criminal cases. With the additional hours, a hearing officer would be able to collect

information in hearings for the judges to free their time for an increasing criminal caseload.

Commissioners will consider a budget increase for the program from \$25,000 to \$40,000 annually, at their June 14 meeting. The additional funds would allow a hearing officer to conduct hearings four days a week instead of three. Pay for the officer would be increased from \$21 hourly to \$25 hourly.

Mize said the court will probably hire two officers, with each to work two days per week. He said the court would be able to hire more qualified people if two were hired, because the officers would be able to maintain a private law practice along with the court master position.

Board recommends subdivision approval

LAKE MARY — The Lake Mary Planning and Zoning Board voted to recommend denial of a sidewalk variance requested for a proposed subdivision at Country Club Oaks. However, the board recommended approval of the community's final plan for the subdivision.

The Country Club Oaks subdivision will be located across from Grace United Methodist Church on Country Club Road. The 22 acres of property will be developed into a single family home community with 50 homes.

Code requirements say two four-foot-wide sidewalks must be provided for the community. However, a variance for one six-foot-wide sidewalk was requested.

The variance would minimize

the amount of concrete and asphalt in the community, enhancing the community's aesthetics, according to one owner of the property.

John D. Brynes, a partner with Park Avenue Development Corporation, which owns the property, assured the board that the cost of two sidewalks was not a factor in requesting the variance. Brynes said the request grew out of "design criteria" for the community.

According to Brynes, other design criteria for the community have required a great deal of effort to preserve every tree possible on the property.

Board member Penny Gunn was absent, and the vote on the decision to grant the sidewalk variance was split. Chairman James Talmadge and Lowry Rockett voted to deny the variance. Rockett expressed

concerns about the safety of children who will live in the areas and will want to cross the street to use the sidewalk for play.

Connie Austin and Al Wichman voted in favor of the variance request. Both said the aesthetics of the community would be improved by the variance.

The board's recommendations will next be considered by the city commission.

Brynes said Country Club Oaks will be an "upscale type of community." A home builder has not been selected, he said, but the houses will cost between \$120,000 and \$175,000.

In other business, the board approved County Club Oaks final plan, but asked that several adjustments be made as a condition of approval.

Jewelry store robbed, owner handcuffed

LAKE MARY — Vincent Pompo, owner of V.P. European Jewelry, Lake Mary Village Shopping Center, Lake Mary, reported to sheriff's deputies a possible first name of one of two robbers who hit his store.

Pompo told Seminole County sheriff's deputies the two robbers had entered his shop earlier and had been in other shops at that center before they attacked and robbed him at about 2:45 p.m. Wednesday.

Pompo said he was pointing out the restroom to one of the robbers. He had turned his back on them and was grabbed from behind in a choke-hold and forced to the floor, a sheriff's report said.

The robbers handcuffed Pompo and forced him into a restroom before fleeing with \$70 from the register and an undetermined number of rings and gold chains taken from display cases.

Sheriff's deputies have descriptions of the robbers and said they recovered the handcuffs Pompo was wearing when they arrived on the scene. Pompo said he had talked to the robbers earlier, around noon, when they posed as customers. They had told him they were bounty hunters, he said.




Beach Conditions

Weekend outlook is very favorable

Oops, we maybe goofed. But, then, maybe not, it just depends on your point of view. Case in point—yesterday it was written here that there was no reported hail damage from the storm Tuesday. Nay, neighbors, there was damage but it was not reported until Wednesday afternoon. Here's the tale of woe.

Out yonder just off SR 46, across the bridge in Lake County, a beautiful motor home and a truck reposed at this residence. By Tuesday evening both were battered and bruised. Hailstones the size of walnuts, or thereabouts, pelted these vehicles and caused damage to both. The lady reported these facts.

However, as was pointed out to the nice lady, the fateful event occurred in Lake County. According to the rules, all damage reports from Lake County must be made before 8 a.m.; same with Volusia County. Seminoles can wait until 9 a.m. because of partiality.

Now this might be important today since there is a good possibility of late afternoon thunderstorms and gusty winds. This has the makings of hail. Be a weather observer this afternoon—if the storm clouds gather, get thee inside. The chance of rain today is 60 percent.

Now, that percentage starts dropping tomorrow and the forecast through the weekend and Monday's holiday is right good. Highs and lows will be the normal 60s to 90s range but rain probability is only about 20 to 30 percent for the late afternoons. Just typical summer days, so relax and enjoy.

Chilly weather sent springtime shivers through the

Midwest and along the Atlantic Coast today with temperatures in Pennsylvania near freezing, while storms brewed in Dixie and South Dakota residents tried to dry out after soaking rains.

Frost and freeze advisories were in effect this morning for western Maryland, western Pennsylvania, western New York state, lower Michigan, the eastern third of upper Michigan and West Virginia, the National Weather Service said.

Before dawn, temperatures were generally below 50 degrees in the middle and northern Atlantic Coast region, the Great Lakes region and the Ohio Valley. Readings were in the 30s across parts of Michigan, Pennsylvania and West Virginia.

It sank to 35 in Bradford, Pa., and 39 in Pittsburgh, while in Cleveland, Ohio, it was 41 at 3 a.m. and 43 in Cincinnati.

Slow-moving thunderstorms poured heavy rain in south central South Dakota Wednesday evening. More than 4 inches fell in northern Buffalo County in three hours, along with hail the size of golf balls and 55 mph winds.

Reagan prepares for summit, disturbed by Noriega situation

HELSINKI, Finland (UPI) — President Reagan took time out for some last-minute preparations today for his Moscow summit, confident the Senate will ratify the INF treaty before his meeting with Mikhail Gorbachev but stung by the collapse of talks to remove Panamanian leader Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega.

Reagan arrived in the Finnish capital early today aboard Air Force One after a trans-Atlantic flight that was the first leg of a journey spanning more than 10,000 miles. A formal welcoming ceremony for the

president and first lady Nancy Reagan, who have scheduled a two-day layover in Helsinki, was planned for later today.

Reagan was awaiting a report from Secretary of State George Shultz, who was flying in from Washington with details on the collapse of negotiations to remove military strongman Noriega from power in Panama.

The gloomy news, which Reagan received Wednesday afternoon in a telephone call from Shultz to Air Force One, cast a shadow over the president's historic trip to Moscow for his fourth meeting with Gorbachev.

The summit begins May 29 with a session inside the walls of the Kremlin and ends June 2.

Shultz, who had stayed in Washington to oversee the talks, said at a State Department briefing that the U.S. negotiator to Panama had been recalled and added, "No further negotiations are contemplated."

"At the final moment in negotiations, Noriega would not carry through with arrangements his representatives had negotiated," Shultz said. His comments made clear the controversial U.S. offer to drop drug charges against

Noriega was no longer on the table.

Reagan sidestepped questions about Noriega on his arrival at Helsinki-Vantaa Airport, where he was welcomed by President Mauno Henrik Koivisto.

"It seemed for a time as if he had some plan, but evidently he changed his mind about that," Reagan said of Noriega.

Despite the setback in Panama, Reagan was confident that White House Chief of Staff Howard Baker, who also stayed behind to ride herd on the Senate, will join up with him in Moscow on the weekend with a

ratified Intermediate Nuclear Forces Treaty in hand.

The Senate crossed a major INF treaty hurdle Wednesday, moving to the vital resolution of ratification, virtually assuring the historic treaty's approval before the summit.

Senate leaders huddled to devise a final debating agreement setting a time — probably Friday afternoon — for the final vote on the resolution and ground rules for the contentious interpretation issue debate. Baker went to the Capitol to join that session.

The Intermediate Nuclear Forces treaty, signed Dec. 8 in

Washington by Reagan and Gorbachev, bans ground-launched ballistic and cruise missiles with ranges of between 300 and 3,400 miles.

While taking time out in Helsinki to recover from jet lag, Reagan will study a stack of briefing papers on all the key issues he will discuss with the Kremlin leader at the summit, including arms control, regional conflicts, human rights and bilateral issues.

He also is reviewing 14 speeches, with some blanks to be filled in as he goes along.

Florida officials set for another hurricane season

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI) — Florida has been spared the brunt of a major hurricane for the past few years, but the advent of another season next week has emergency officials preparing again.

Civil defense officials recently trained and certified about 500 volunteers from Miami to Pensacola as emergency shelter managers in case a storm threatens during the hurricane season from June 1 through the end of November.

The shelter managers trained by Florida State University have a hard job that gets even tougher when the major part of the storm has passed.

"People get restless and want to go home as soon as they think the threat is over," said Donald D. Daake, academic administrator at the FSU Center for Professional Development. "But safety and health hazards could keep authorities from giving the go-ahead."

"Broken gas mains, dangling electrical wires, flooding and unstable buildings are very real dangers that could delay the return home," he added.

Impatient shelter residents are only some of the people portrayed during the training period, which includes role-playing by prospective managers.

"Course participants discover that being a shelter manager carries an enormous amount of responsibility," said Lois Knowles Gordon, instructor and program coordinator for the training.

"They find out it's not just a simple operation of opening doors and serving coffee," she said. "Instead, shelter managers must have knowledge and skills in areas such as organizing, communicating, conflict resolution and leadership."

The Legislature has funded the emergency shelter management training program for two years, after the one-two punch of hurricanes Elena and Kate in 1985.

Most lawn darts will be banned

WASHINGTON (UPI) — In agreeing to ban the sale of most lawn darts, the Consumer Product Safety Commission conceded voluntary compliance with safety rules has failed to reduce injuries to hundreds of children each year.

The commission directed its lawyers on a 2-1 vote Wednesday to draft final rules by June 30 banning lawn darts "that present an unreasonable risk of death or serious injury" or are capable of puncturing the skull.

"I'm very pleased with the vote and I'm sorry it didn't come sooner," said commissioner Anne Graham, a key advocate of the ban. "I became interested in this because there have been too many serious injuries involving children. I guess that means the voluntary efforts were just not working."

The large, metal-tipped darts are tossed at a ring laid on the ground in a game similar to horseshoes. The rule would affect the majority of the sets, but CPSC officials said there are some lawn darts with bulbous or weighted plastic cup ends that are incapable of the injuries and therefore exempt.



The commission will vote on the final rules in early July. If again approved, the ban would not take effect for another 30 to 60 days because it would have to be published in the Federal Register for public comment.

Graham and CPSC Chairman Terrence Scanlon approved the action; commissioner Carol Dawson said she opposed it because "in my judgment in this case, all other means have not been thoroughly pursued."

Dawson stressed, "I would not purchase or use the kind of lawn dart which are the target of the proposal before us if I were a manufacturer or a retailer. I would not produce or sell them."

Soviets leave their 'Vietnam'

The bloodied Russian bear finally began to limp out of Afghanistan the other day.

Not since 1955, when the Soviet troops voluntarily left Austria, has the U.S.S.R. withdrawn from a territory that it took by force. In fact, this marks the first time the Soviet Union has been compelled to roll back the borders of communism because of a military defeat.

The 1,200 troops who led the evacuation from Afghanistan are the first in a nine-month pullout under the terms of the Geneva accords that call for the complete withdrawal of 120,000 Russian soldiers who were sent there nine years ago.

Most of the credit for the Kremlin's change of heart, of course, belongs to the Afghan freedom fighters who defended their country with extraordinary valor. Still, their victory was due in no small part to the Reagan doctrine that ensured a steady flow of weapons and ammunition to the resistance. Since 1979, the United States has sent the guerrillas more than \$3 billion worth of military hardware, including Stinger missiles that destroyed nearly 200 Soviet planes. All told, an estimated 80,000 Soviet troops were killed or wounded. The Reagan administration has promised, moreover, to resume military aid to the freedom fighters if Moscow sends arms to prop up the puppet communist government in Kabul.

That government is almost certain to disintegrate soon after the departure of its Soviet protectors. So precarious is the position of Afghan President Najibullah that most experts predict that he and his henchmen will soon seek refuge in the Soviet Union.

A pitiful Afghan army numbering 30,000 men served the marxist government and its Soviet overlords. Fewer than 10 percent of these undisciplined troops were considered reliable once the freedom fighters began to close in on the nation's larger cities. The only question is whether the seven guerrilla factions that coordinated their campaigns of liberation can compose their differences in victory and in peace. That seems unlikely in a nation long beset with tribal difference.

Skip sweet deal

Bargaining with someone as ruthless as Panamanian strongman Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega is a bit like dealing with the devil. You have to be careful that you don't lose your soul in the process.

That's what is troubling about the U.S. State Department's proposal to drop indictments against Noriega by two federal grand juries. What would the United States get in exchange? Not much, according to the latest accounts. In theory, Noriega would give up power. But he certainly wouldn't have much incentive under the terms of this sweet plea bargain.

Noriega wouldn't have to go into long-term exile, which is the only effective way to remove him from power. Supposedly, American diplomats have agreed that his handpicked president, Manuel Solis Palma, could remain in office. *The New York Times* reported that Noriega could run for president in next May's elections. Because Noriega chooses and fires Panamanian presidents as readily as he changes uniforms, it's doubtful he would lose control of the country under this arrangement.

Why such easy terms? Obviously, the U.S. State Department is trying to save face. The American campaign to pressure Noriega out of power failed. Now we're willing to agree to accept a few crumbs from the general to make it seem as though we got something for all our efforts. But it's a strategy that's likely to backfire, compounding the State Department's previous pratfalls.

President Reagan should heed the advice of his own Justice Department and Drug Enforcement Administration and tell the State Department officials negotiating in Panama: "No sweet deals for Noriega."

Now is time to declare Palestinian state

Over the past few months, the protests organized by youthful Palestinians in the territories occupied by Israel have changed the dimensions of the long-festering Israeli-Palestinian dispute.

The focus has shifted from periodic Palestinian terrorist attacks on Israelis, followed by retaliatory Israeli bombing raids or artillery hits. Now the protest movement seems to have engaged the sympathy, if not the active participation, of nearly all the Palestinian people.

For many years, most experts on the Middle East have believed that the key to resolving the conflict would be an exchange of Israeli occupied territory for a peaceful settlement. The centerpiece of such an exchange would be the creation of an independent Palestinian homeland on the West Bank and Gaza Strip.

The barriers to such a state include the continued opposition by Israel, the fears of Jordanian King Hussein, and the military weakness of the Palestinians.

Recently, a new proposal for achieving a Palestinian state has been suggested by Jerome

M. Segal of the University of Maryland, a founder of the Jewish Committee for Israeli-Palestinian Peace.

Segal, an American Jew and a supporter of Israel, said in a Washington Post article that he believes the time has come for the Palestinians simply to proclaim the existence of a Palestinian state and begin lobbying for its international acceptance.

As Segal points out, this is the path Israelis took 40 years ago. Once the United Nations passed the partition resolution of 1947, the Israelis proclaimed the new State of Israel, despite the opposition of the U.S. Department of State.

They did not have the approval of other nations. They attempted no negotiations with the Palestinians who disputed their claim to the land, nor did they promise any. They simply proceeded unilaterally to gain the recognition of other countries, admission to the UN, and control of their newly proclaimed state.

The Palestinians, in the Segal scheme, might proceed as follows:

(1) The Palestine Liberation Organization would issue a declaration of independence and statehood for a Palestinian state on the West Bank and Gaza.

(2) The PLO would dissolve itself into the provisional government of the new State of Palestine, pending free elections.

(3) The new Palestinian government would declare itself at peace with Israel and maintain no army. It would forbid any act of terrorism.

(4) A global diplomatic effort would seek the recognition of Palestine and its admission to the UN.

(5) The provisional government would seek negotiations with Israel to set permanent boundaries.

(6) Israeli withdrawal from the occupied territories would be the central Palestinian and international objective. The Palestinian government would ban violent attacks on Israeli soldiers or settlers except in clear cases of self-defense.

(7) Palestine would proclaim its commitment to democracy and call upon the UN to supervise the first national election.

OMB gets paper power

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Because few chores infuriate more people than dealing with government forms, there should have been elation across the land when Congress approved the Paper Work Reduction Act of 1980.

Written specifically to "minimize the federal paper-work burden," the law replaced the antiquated Federal Reports Act of 1942 as the principal statute specifying government record-keeping and reporting requirements. The new law also gave the White House Office of Management and Budget unprecedented power to determine whether the collection of information by any department or agency is "necessary for the proper performance of its functions" and whether it "will have practical utility for the agency."

Moreover, the law gave the OMB director absolute authority to disapprove of any proposed government program to collect or disseminate information if it did not comply with OMB's interpretation of the statutory guidelines.

Aggressively exercising its newfound status as the government's "information czar," OMB has displayed an aversion to legitimate research projects that might conflict with the president's agenda or discomfit his friends in the corporate world.

Item: Disturbed about reports of high rates of birth defects and miscarriages among pregnant women working at video display terminals, the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health planned to study whether VDTs posed reproductive health hazards — but OMB scuttled the project.

Item: The Indian Health Service, which Reagan has sought to abolish, attempted to conduct a systematic evaluation of its delivery of medical services to Indians. Citing "apathetic respondent behavior," OMB killed the study.

Item: OMB refused to allow the Commerce Department's Economic Development Administration to evaluate the efficacy of making federal grants to impoverished communities.

Item: OMB quashed a Public Health Service proposal to study the relationship between reductions in the government's anti-poverty program and increases in infant mortality in some locations.

Congress set for liability act showdown

WASHINGTON — America's business barons have slip-flopped in their crusade to make it harder for consumers to sue them over unsafe products.

For years, the manufacturers have trotted out the high cost of liability insurance as exhibit "A" in their case to change the way courts judge product-liability lawsuits. Now some members of Congress want to call their bluff by finding out whether insurance rates would shrink if it were harder to sue manufacturers. Suddenly, the corporate types aren't so eager to talk about insurance.

Congress has watched million-dollar CEOs pout because their liability insurance premiums doubled and tripled. All this because consumers dared to take the companies to court when they were maimed or otherwise harmed by a faulty product.

The manufacturers grinned from ear to ear last year after Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich., took their whining to heart. Dingell proposed the Uniform Product Liability Act of 1987

Birth death effect

Once in a while statistics are published that change the essence of a nation the way the nation sees itself, and the way it is seen by others. In June or July, the Census Bureau will publish such a statistic, which is now in numerical limbo — used, but not noticed, and supposedly unpublished.

I believe it is a number that will pervade our national consciousness in the 1990s.

Consider this past example of the poignancy of data: The historian Frederick Jackson Turner looked at numbers from the census of 1890. He made the striking observation that the American frontier had closed, that there was no more "open" land left. That, he noted, represented the end of an era, and would come to change the nature of the frontier-driven American character. How it did is still argued by historians today.

The new census number is 1.8. That is the Total Fertility Rate (TFR) that will be used in the "middle variant" series of the new population projections to be issued by the Census Bureau. Demographic projections are usually issued in three series: "high," "low" and "middle." The middle series most closely resembles the current situation. These are the projections that will be used at every level of government from schoolhouse to White House, in every business that plans for the future, by every scholar trying to divine what is going on in this remarkable land of ours.

Roughly, the TFR equals the number of children a woman, on average, will bear during her life.

The last series of census projections, issued several years ago, used a middle series TFR of 1.9 children per woman, even though the actual

TFR in the United States has been 1.8 since 1974.

Why the fuss? Only this: At the old 1.9 figure, the U.S. population will keep rising for almost a hundred years (to 2080), although at a minuscule rate by the end of that time. At 1.8, however, the U.S. population will begin to shrink in the first few decades of the next century.

That the Census Bureau will go with the new number is certain. They have already used it in some tables in the new Statistical Abstract of the United States, and they have used it in displays shown to a public Senate committee hearing on Social Security chaired by Sen. Daniel P. Moynihan, N.Y.

Under the new projections, how much will the population fall, and how soon? For that we must await the official census report and see what estimates are used for immigration and other components of change. In my 1987 book "The Birth Death" (Pharos), I used some World Bank projections keyed to a 1.815 TFR. That showed U.S. population growth more or less plateauing shortly after 2020 and beginning to drop shortly after 2030.

What does it mean? Not that we'll "run out of people." We won't.

But consider the sea-change at work. For two centuries the United States had an incredible population explosion. From 1790 to 1990 the population will have gone up from 4 million people to about 250 million people. And now an official U.S. government document will project the beginning of a population decline!

Now, a projection is not a prediction; the numbers could turn out to be higher or lower. Still, I believe the change in psychology can be and should be enormous.

Gingrich deserves help

Congressman Newt Gingrich, the Georgia Republican whose district includes Atlanta's Hartsfield Airport resembles the airport in being difficult to avoid and hard to be neutral about. At 44, with a handsome mop of prematurely gray hair and a somewhat speakerly voice that would be absolutely ideal, Gingrich barges around the House of Representatives getting on the nerves of fellow members of both parties whose first principle like the late Everett Dirksen's is flexibility.

Now in his fifth term, Gingrich early became the leader of a band of more than ordinarily quarrelsome and conservative young GOP congressmen who were nicknamed the "Yellow Jackets" (to distinguish them from a group of conservative Southern Democrats called the "Boll Weevils"). In due course most of them became supporters of the concept of a Conservative Opportunity Society, which is Gingrich's name for the kind of America he envisions: entrepreneurial and

Congressman Jack Kemp has been the spiritual guru of these combative young House Republicans, but Gingrich is their principal day-to-day spokesman. It was he who hit on the inspired idea of reading to the C-SPAN cable TV audience during the so-called "special orders" period when the chamber was virtually deserted. Impudently, Gingrich made by Democratic Congressmen at the time of the Vietnam controversy in the early 1970s. This tactic so enraged Speaker O'Neill that he took to the floor himself to denounce Gingrich — only to be ruled out of order for insulting him.

Gingrich and his little band of samurai aren't always right. In particular they have blundered badly on the matter of South African sanctions, supporting demagogic Democratic proposals in a predictably futile bid for black support here at home.

But Gingrich has shown real bravery in taking on the most powerful and dangerous adversary any congressman can have: Speaker Jim Wright of Texas.

Wright, who succeeded Tip O'Neill in January 1987 is an anachronism in this Age of Accommodation — an unctuous but unbelievably arrogant parliamentary tyrant in the grand tradition.

and began an aggressive campaign to push the law through his Energy and Commerce Committee. Not one consumer group backed the bill then. Not one consumer group would find backs the bill now.

Big business wants a bill that will make it so difficult for consumers to sue that they won't even bother climbing the courthouse steps. That bill is still being debated in Dingell's committee.

But this week, some clever congressional upstarts are expected to gum up the works. These congressmen want to commission a study of how the new law will affect insurance rates. Reps. Al Swift, D-Wash., Edward Markey, D-Mass., and Thomas Tauke, R-Iowa, are scheduled this week to propose an amendment to Dingell's bill that would require the study of insurance rates.

We can't predict the outcome of such a study, but judging from the reaction of big business, it doesn't bode well for the argument that changes in product liability laws will poke a hole in ballooning insurance rates.

In a mad dash to pre-empt the study, four key business organizations co-signed a letter to several congressmen dated May 10 in which they did some frantic backpeddling. "Our objective in seeking enactment of (the bill) is NOT to obtain an automatic 'reduction' in insurance rates and premiums," says the letter, obtained by our associate Stewart Harris.

The letter came from the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, the Business Roundtable, the National Association of Manufacturers and the Product Liability Alliance.

"As consumers of commercial liability insurance, we believe that federal insurance-data collection is both unnecessary and counterproductive to the objective of this legislation," the letter continues.

It sounds like they don't want to be bothered by the facts. Yet officials with these business groups were eager to talk about rising insurance rates last year in hearings on the need for product-liability reform.

The U.S. Public Interest Research Group pored over hundreds of pages

of testimony and found several statements by executives who blamed insurance costs when they lobbied for the bill.

The flip-flop happened so quickly that the business lobby in Washington, D.C., hasn't had time to notify the troops in middle America. Congressional aides tell us they are still receiving mail from small-business people who say the bill will save them from high insurance premiums. The lobbyists themselves used that argument to sway small-business people into joining the crusade for product-liability reform.

At its best, Dingell's bill irons out the differences in product-liability laws from state to state. But consumer advocates say it goes overboard to protect companies from lawsuits. For example, the bill would virtually let manufacturers off the hook if they used the best technology available at the time the product was made. Another provision makes drug companies immune from punitive damages if the Food and Drug Administration approved their products.

Noriega negotiations come to a standstill

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The administration insists no offers remain on the table to bring about the ouster of Panama's Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega, assailed by U.S. officials for refusing their best deal at the last minute.

"No further negotiations are contemplated," a grim-faced Secretary of State George Shultz said Wednesday as he announced the collapse of efforts to bring about the resignation and exile of the military strongman ruler.

"At the final moment in negotiations, Noriega would not carry through with arrangements his representatives had negotiated," Shultz said. "All proposals addressed during these negotiations have been withdrawn. No offers remain on the table."

Shultz, who stayed in Washington to oversee the matter as President Reagan began his trip to the Moscow summit, said the special U.S. negotiator, Deputy Assistant Secretary of State Michael Kozak, had been recalled from Panama.

Before setting out for the summit himself, Shultz said the administration would continue its economic and diplomatic efforts to restore democracy to the strategically important Central American nation. His comments made clear that the U.S. offer to drop drug charges against Noriega no longer was available.

The Reagan-approved idea of dropping the indictments lodged against Noriega Feb. 4 by two federal grand juries in Florida had split the administration and had provoked harsh criticism from leaders of both parties in Congress.

Shultz had supported using the indictments as an inducement to get Noriega out of Panama, while Vice President George Bush disagreed and broke with the president by declaring on the campaign trail last week that if elected to the White House he would not negotiate with terrorists or drug dealers, period.

Shultz denied any domestic political concerns had undermined the deal with Noriega; indeed, his announcement dashed administration hopes

that the problem could be put to rest before Reagan arrives in Moscow Sunday.

Reagan, reaching Helsinki, Finland, on the first leg of his voyage to the Soviet Union, sidestepped all questions about Noriega.

"It seemed for a time as if he had some plan, but evidently he changed his mind about that," the president said of the Panamanian Defense Forces chief.

Noriega was expected to present his view in a speech to Panama's National Assembly today. In Panama City, the military-owned newspaper La Republica said the deal was rejected because it "did not give any security of continuity to the constitutional mandate of President Manuel Solis Palma," the general's handpicked successor to ousted President Eric Arturo Delvalle.

Ambassador Juan Sosa, not aligned with the Noriega government but recognized by U.S. officials as Panama's representative to Washington, accused Noriega of holding his country "hostage."

"We're discouraged, but we're not surprised by Noriega's actions. He's very irresponsible," Sosa said. "It proves he has so much thirst for power, it shows he has absolutely no intention of leaving the country."

The crisis in Panama began more than three months ago, when the indictments prompted Reagan to urge Noriega's removal. Delvalle announced he was firing the general — but Noriega's backers in the National Assembly instead ousted Delvalle, who remains in hiding in Panama.

The United States still recognizes Delvalle and has imposed a series of increasingly harsh economic sanctions that have staggered the Panamanian economy but have failed to ignite popular opposition to Noriega.

Undersecretary of State Michael Armacost said negotiations broke down when Noriega, apparently worried about military subordinates, rejected the terms his own representatives had agreed to during a month of talks with Kozak.

Accused Navy instructors silent during first day of hearings

PENSACOLA (UPI) — Four Navy instructors who are among six blamed in the death of a recruit during a water rescue drill were silent as they left the first day of a hearing that could lead to a court-martial.

The 2½-hour session Wednesday at Pensacola's Naval Air Station was the start of what could be a drawn-out series of hearings into the case. The next session, for two of the sailors who did not attend the initial hearing, is scheduled for Friday at 1 p.m.

The five swimming instructors and their supervisor are charged in the March 2 death of Lee Mirecki, 19, of Appleton, Wis. The Navy claims Mirecki was forced to participate in an exercise despite being "afraid of the water" and asking to withdraw from the class.

City demolishing 'crack houses'

TAMPA (UPI) — A demolition company began knocking down known or potential "crack houses" Wednesday in an around-the-clock effort by the city and private companies to clean up the city's neighborhoods.

The first three houses where crack cocaine was known to be smoked were razed at 3 p.m. EDT Wednesday and 50 others were to be demolished in a program launched by Mayor Sandra W. Freedman that she called the first of its kind.

"Operation Crackdown" is expected to continue in Tampa until Saturday.

SMU football scandal still drawing attention

DALLAS (UPI) — The Texas attorney general said Wednesday he has recommended a grand jury investigate possible criminal wrongdoing in the Southern Methodist pay-for-play football scandal.

Jim Mattox's office delivered a criminal complaint to the office of Dallas County District Attorney John Vance on Tuesday outlining the attorney general's investigation into possible criminal activity in the SMU case.

Mattox said in Austin he and his investigators "believe that there has been a violation" and want the grand jury to probe payments to former SMU football players and athletic department officials.

Ted Steinke, head of the district attorney's organized crime division, said he was studying the report to determine whether the case should go to a grand jury.

Manning's agent: Sky's the limit

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The agent for Danny Manning Wednesday said the Kansas star's unique talents warrant the richest contract ever offered an NBA rookie.

"I think Danny Manning is Danny Manning and Patrick Ewing is Patrick Ewing," Ron Grinker said following a news conference introducing Manning as the Los Angeles Clippers' No. 1 overall selection in next month's college draft. "I'm prejudiced and biased because I've known Danny Manning since the day he was born."

"There is only one player I've ever seen like Danny Manning and that is Larry Bird. Larry Bird has the ability to make everyone around him better and he is someone who won't ask anyone to do what he can't do. Nobody has been able to accomplish what Danny Manning has accomplished. He's the best I've ever seen."

Scott pumps in 30, Lakers rout Mavs

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (UPI) — Byron Scott may not be the best off-guard in the NBA just yet — but Los Angeles Lakers Coach Pat Riley says give him time.

Scott Wednesday night continued his torrid shooting against Dallas, pouring in 30 points to give the Lakers a 2-0 lead in the Western Conference final with a 123-101 rout of the Mavericks.

"Last year he showed he had a career year," Riley said. "This year he topped that. Another year at this continued improvement ... he will be the best off-guard in the league, if he isn't already."

Scott, who scored 23 points in Monday's opener, sank 11 of 17 shots in Game 2. The 6-foot-4 guard has hit 61 percent of his attempts against Dallas this season, while averaging 28.6 points.

"They were playing to stop my jumper, and left all kinds of lanes open," said Scott, the Lakers' top scorer this season. "They don't know what I'm going to do."

"He's having an All-Star year, that's

for sure," Dallas Coach John MacLeod said of Scott. "He's been on fire since training camp."

Kareem Abdul-Jabbar added 9 of his 19 points in the pivotal third period as the defending NBA champions improved their playoff record over Dallas at the Forum to 8-0.

The Mavericks return home Friday night and Sunday at Reunion Arena for the next two games of the best-of-seven series. However, the Lakers won both games at Dallas this season.

"We won two games at home two years ago against Dallas in the 1986 West semifinals and went down there and lost two, and it ended up a six-game series," said Riley, who team shot a 1988 playoff-high 61 percent from the floor. "Our objective is to get one win."

As was the case in their 113-98 victory in Game 1, the Lakers broke open the game in the third quarter, inflating a

59-48 halftime lead to 89-70 entering the final period.

Ahead 65-56 with 8:09 remaining in the third quarter, Los Angeles used a 15-6 run to build an 80-62 bulge. Abdul-Jabbar, beating the bulkier James Donaldson to the basket, had 7 points in the run. Scott concluded the burst when he capitalized on a missed layup by Detlef Schrempf with a 3-point play at 4:38.

Dallas, which has lost six of seven games to the Lakers this season, got no closer than 13 points in the final period. The capacity crowd at the Forum chanted, "Sweep, sweep," with 11 minutes remaining.

Mark Aguirre led Dallas with 28 points on 11 of 16 shooting, while Sam Perkins added 16 points and Roy Tarpley 13 rebounds. For the second straight game, the Mavericks out-rebounded Los Angeles, this time by 36-28.

Magie Johnson contributed 19 assists and 15 points for Los Angeles, which outscored the visitors 27-12 at the line. The Lakers, seeking to become the

first team since the 1969 Celtics to repeat as champions, limited the Mavericks to 18 points and 38-percent shooting in the second quarter to take their 11-point halftime lead.

With the score 34-34 and 10:42 left until intermission, the Lakers reserves fueled a 16-8 run, with Michael Cooper and Kurt Rambis each contributing 5 points in the spur.

Scott later made it 55-46 when he dropped in a layup with Rolando Blackman draped over him, then added a twisting layup off the break with 1:41 left in the quarter.

Both teams shot well in the first quarter, which ended with Los Angeles ahead 32-30. While the Lakers' shots came from inside — 22 of their first 26 points came on attempts in the lane or free throws — Dallas was fired mostly from the perimeter.

Abdul-Jabbar gave Los Angeles an early spark, collecting 8 points and 5 rebounds before leaving with his second foul at 4:05 of the opening quarter.

Pistons upend Celtics

BOSTON (UPI) — Not satisfied with ending a 21-game losing streak at Boston Garden, the Detroit Pistons are now intent on going home with a two-game lead in the Eastern Conference final.

Isiah Thomas scored 35 points Wednesday night to help the Pistons to a 104-96 triumph, their first victory on the parquet floor since Dec. 19, 1982. Detroit takes a 1-0 lead in the best-of-seven series into Game 2 Thursday night.

"We can't be satisfied with a split," said Thomas, who added 12 assists.

The Pistons entered the series with seven days rest and confident they could beat the Celtics at Boston Garden.

"It was important to have the attitude that you want to win every time you step on the court," said Vinnie Johnson, who said before the Pistons left Detroit they would not be content with a split. "We want to win two."

Boston ended a seven-game series Sunday at Boston Garden, beating Atlanta. They appeared lethargic at times and shot just 42 percent for the game.

Monster tarpon landed at Venice tourney


Sunday's tarpon fishing trip started as dozens of others. My fishing buddy, Bruce Carlton, and myself awakened at 3:30 a.m. to the unwelcome clamoring of the alarm clock.

We sleepily dragged our tired bodies out of bed and went through our pre-fishing trip rituals in trance-like motions. Fishing is supposed to be fun, but somehow Bruce and I always make tarpon fishing a lot of work.

After loading up the bait and equipment, we trailed the boat to Englewood, where we launched and headed for the tarpon hole. An old commercial fisherman had told Bruce about this spot which was inconspicuously tucked away in the back of Charlotte Harbor.

The boat was anchored bow and stern, and we then set about casting out the seven rods and tossing chunks of cut fish on top of each bait. When cruising tarpon find this chum, it is only a matter of time before they take the baited hook.

After sitting for about an hour, one of the lines took off and a

tarpon proceeded to bounce all over the bay. This fish was under 120 pounds, and Bruce and I didn't get too excited. We were entered in the 12th Annual Venice Area Tarpon Tournament, and we needed a fish bigger than 145 pounds. The tarpon was hoisted to the boat and we taped its girth—only 34 inches. This fish would barely weigh 100 pounds. It was quickly released and Bruce and I set about casting out the poles and re-chumming.

Time passes slowly when nothing is biting, but when you are after big fish, you must resign yourself to long dry spells. Every half-hour we reeled in all the rods, put fresh bait on the


hooks and re-chummed. It is not glamorous fishing, but the messy method does account for big tarpon.

Bruce grabbed a life cushion and stretched himself out on the back seat of the boat. Strikes can be few and far between and fish always seem to bite better when you are not paying attention.

Sure enough, out of the corner of my eye, I spotted a line starting to take off. I picked up the rod, reeled down, and got a good hookset on the fish. By this time, Bruce was up and his sharp eyes told him that this jumping tarpon was the fish we wanted—it was obviously over 145 pounds.

The huge fish made several spectacular, head-shaking jumps and then settled into a long run. Sixty-pound test peeled off the 4/0 Penn reel as the tarpon headed for the horizon. Bruce and I were preparing to chase the fish down just as the fish stopped its long run.

I regained preclaus line and the fish began to circle the boat. You can muscle 120 pound

With the score tied 3-3 late in the second period Tuesday night, Boston Garden was thrown into darkness by a power outage that forced cancellation of Game 4. The Bruins, however, had more to lose by the game's cancellation. Now, three of the first four games will have been played on the opposition's rink. Tuesday night, the Garden capacity crowd of 14,451 in the sweltering old building

was frenzied as the Bruins fought their uphill battle against a 3-0 series deficit.

Owners reduce reserve lists

MIAMI BEACH (UPI) — A good day for Paul Fireman turned into a lousy one for NFL prospects.

In a late compromise with the Competition Committee at Wednesday's spring meeting, league owners reduced reserve lists from five players to two, and offered several other announcements before concluding a one-day session. League management also tentatively approved the sale of the New England Patriots to Fireman, chairman of Reebok International.

In a morning meeting of league owners, the Patriots sale by the Sullivan family was unanimously approved, contingent on a deal involving Sullivan Stadium and completion of final papers. After breaking for lunch, owners belatedly voted for weekly club rosters of 45 active players, plus two players not allowed to participate in the upcoming game.

Last year's post-strike rosters carried 45 uniformed players and five on an inactive list. Without the luxury of the 50-man roster, NFL coaches likely will be reluctant to carry inexperienced players who require more time to develop into regular contributors.

"Today's agreement represents a compromise solution done at the last minute," said

Dallas President Tex Schramm, chairman of the Competition Committee. "We almost got enough votes to maintain the 50-man roster... in fact, we came within one vote several times. The two-player inactive list is where you might keep your third quarterback, or whatever. It appeared we could not get the 21 votes necessary to keep the 45 and five."

The Competition Committee Tuesday night concluded a seven-hour meeting with a recommendation that owners maintain the five-player reserve squad instituted after the 1987 strike. When the strike ended in October, NFL rosters were expanded to 50 players — but only 45 were allowed to suit up. Clubs had until Saturday each week to decide which five players would not be activated.

As part of the compromise, NFL clubs will be allowed to recall two players placed on pre-season injured reserve after each has been sidelined a minimum four weeks. Schramm also announced the 1988 cut-down dates as Aug. 23 (60 players) and Aug. 29, when rosters must be reduced to the 45 and two.

Top seeds breeze to wins

PARIS (UPI) — Defending women's champion Steffi Graf Wednesday led a string of top seeds through the second round of the \$3.9 million French Open, where only Frenchman Yannick Noah managed to really please the demanding Paris crowd.

Martina Navratilova, the second-seeded woman, advanced when her Dutch opponent Hella Ter Riet withdrew because of an upset stomach in the second set. Navratilova was leading 6-0, 2-0 when the match was abandoned.

Swede Stefan Edberg, the No. 2 men's seed, rolled to a straight-set victory over Frenchman Arnaud Boetsch, and compatriot Mats Wilander, the No. 3 seed, dispatched Argentinian Francisco Yunis 6-2, 6-3, 6-1.

Graf, the top-ranked woman tennis player in the world, trounced American Ronni Reis 6-1, 6-0 with no sign of the wandering concentration that Graf displayed in the first round. Despite getting over a cold, the

18-year-old Graf looks a good bet to retain the title she won in 1987, when she beat Navratilova in the final, despite the American veteran's claim to still be everything.

Noah had the vocal French crowd roaring with approval as he beat Brazilian Luis Mattar 6-2, 6-4, 1-6, 7-6(7-4).

"It's a great feeling to play and feel that people enjoy my win," he said. "Sometimes it's too passionate and if you make a mistake they are against you and that's difficult."

Noah said his game against Mattar, a hard-hitting baseliner, went well in the first two sets, but he was taken by surprise when the 24-year-old Brazilian lifted his game in the third set.

The Frenchman, who won at Roland Garros in 1983, faces Switzerland's Jakob Hasek in the third round. Hasek beat American Todd Witsken 7-6 (8-6), 6-1, 6-3.

Tim Mayotte became the highest seeded man to go out when he lost to Sweden's Magnus Gustafsson 7-6 (7-4), 6-4, 6-4.

Chris Evert, the third seed, beat qualifier Barbara Romano of Italy 7-5, 6-2, but was less than satisfied with her performance.

"I made a lot of unforced errors in the first set that I usually don't make and I shouldn't be making right now," Evert said.

She said she was "still feeling out" a bruised heel, but thought it might improve as the tournament progressed.

Unlike Evert, Navratilova was full of confidence after her victory, though she said it was a shame that Ter Riet was too ill to play.

"What I did today I did well, so I'm happy about that," she said. "I'm more versatile than anybody else out there. I think I'm just a little bit better at doing

tarpon, but this fish had a mind of its own. A simple tail flip would send it off on a powerful surge.

The next phase of the fight was "the rope a dope." The big fish circled the boat, passing under the bow and stern anchor ropes. Each time the fish went under the ropes, I had to lay down and pass the rod and reel under the ropes, following the tarpon.

Finally, after many anxious minutes, I was able to lay the fish up so Bruce could sink in the lip gill. We were both impressed with the length and girth of the giant fish as it floated, exhausted, on the surface.

Bruce lip-galled the fish, and we heaved the heavy tarpon into the boat. We taped the fish and were pleasantly surprised at the 43 inch girth. This fish was well over 160 pounds.

Eyes popped at the weigh-in as the heavy fish stretched the scales to the 174 1/2 pound mark! Very few people have caught bigger tarpon, and I felt grateful and fortunate to have landed this fish of a lifetime.

SHUPE'S SCOOP
Although tarpon can be caught on Florida's east coast, the largest concentration of tarpon in the state can be found around Boca Grand Pass and the Charlotte Harbor/Pine Island area.

The Celtics converted on four of their first five possessions of the third period to take a 61-54 lead but trailed 75-73 entering the final period. McHale scored 6 of Boston's first 8 points, his last basket giving Boston the

7-point lead.

Detroit, which converted 11 of 18 shots in the period, used a 9-1 run to take a 71-70 lead with 2:15 left in the period. Boston sank three free throws the rest of the period while Detroit received baskets from Vinnie Johnson and James Edwards.

Boston converted just 7 of 19 shots from the field for the period. Lambert left in the third period with a bruised right shoulder and was taken to the hospital. X-rays proved negative but he is doubtful for Game 2.

In the second period, the largest lead was 4 points, with Detroit holding a 53-52 advantage at intermission.

How do execs choose their new managers?

NEW YORK (UPI) — The departure of Chuck Tanner and Cal Ripken Sr. has revived the issue of baseball's managerial merry-go-round.

Both gave way to men who managed but never won in the big leagues. This begs the question of how executives choose their field leaders.

Tanner, last and next-to-last in his first two years in Atlanta, lost his job to Russ Nixon. Nixon's previous big-league experience involved two cellar finishes in Cincinnati.

Ripken, leader of last year's 67-95 Orioles, left in favor of Frank Robinson just one week into 1988. Robinson had also managed in Cleveland and San Francisco, his best effort being third place, two games out with the 1982 Giants.

Robinson complicates the issue of a managerial merry-go-round. Not long ago, it symbolized the racism in baseball; it seemed teams would rather fail with a Caucasian than widen the employment pool. It's not that simple anymore.

Cookie Rojas, a Cuban, re-

placed Gene Mauch in California this spring. And Ellie Hendricks, a black, filled in when Robinson was hospitalized the third week of May. Neither had previous big-league managing experience.

Still, we've seen enough re-cycled managers to wonder what actually goes into picking a leader. How vital is experience? When does it stop being experience and become proof of failure? And, strangely enough, how much thought do clubs actually put into choosing a leader for these million-dollar investments?

Tanner himself shows how tough those questions can be. His career highlight came in 1979, when he led the Pittsburgh Pirate "Family" to victory in the World Series. By then, however, Tanner had managed the Chicago White Sox, Oakland and Pittsburgh a total of nine years without finishing first. When the Braves hired him in 1986, he had toiled 16 years with one title. Does that one title justify a career? Very possibly.

Before the market opened, the Commerce Department released revised gross national product data, which showed the economy grew at a 3.9 percent annual rate in the first quarter. The government estimated last month that the figure would be 2.3 percent.

Dollar slightly higher; gold, silver open down

The dollar drifted slightly higher in thin trading today on major foreign currency markets. Gold eased.

In earlier trading in the Far East, the dollar strengthened against the Japanese yen, closing at 124.50 yen, up 0.20 from 124.30 yen on Wednesday.

Currency watchers in Japan said trading was quiet as most players anticipated no major movement in dollar-yen trading ahead of the U.S. release of revised GNP data for the first quarter of this year.

The dollar opened in Amsterdam at 1.912 Dutch guilders, up from 1.909.

In Brussels, the dollar began the day at 35.78 Belgian francs, up from 35.685, and opened in Milan at 1,267.50 lire, up from 1,263.00.

In early New York trading, the dollar was higher against key foreign currencies in moderate trading following the Commerce Department report on the nation's gross national product.

In Europe, the dollar began the day in Frankfurt at 1.7085 West German marks, up from Wednesday's close of 1.7023.

In Zurich, the dollar began the day at 1.425 Swiss francs, up from 1.4248, and opened in Paris at 5.7645 French francs, up from 5.748.

The dollar opened in Amsterdam at 1.912 Dutch guilders, up from 1.909.

GNP climbs 3.9 percent

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Skyrocketing exports and strong consumer spending sent the government's estimate of the nation's total economic growth up a strong 3.9 percent in the first three months of the year, the Commerce Department reported today.

That is 1.6 percentage points more than the government estimated last month that the nation's gross national product rose in the first quarter and reflects a more than 350 percent upward revision in first quarter net exports and 11.4 percent upward revision in estimates for consumer spending.

The unit the bureau uses to adjust for inflation, the implicit price deflator, was revised downward for the first quarter to an annual 1.7 percent from the

previously reported 2.4 percent, the lowest rate since the fourth quarter of 1986 when the deflator was 0.7 percent.

Another measure the department uses to adjust for inflation, the GNP weighted price index, was also lowered 0.1 percent to 3.6 percent, the same as in the fourth quarter of 1987.

At the same time the department revised downward by one-third its estimate for import growth, from \$7.5 billion to \$5 billion.

seven hours," he said. "We feel it's important to give the children some free time to unwind a little, play outside or play with board games."

There is also a snack time, and twice a week children are involved in an arts & crafts program, or may choose to do their homework.

The cost to parents averages \$22 per week. Parents who are unable to pay are offered assistance through special YMCA scholarships. Robinson says this is how he utilizes money from the United Way.

"We survey parents to determine if there's a need for the program," he said. "Usually a parent, principal or PTA member will call to inquire about the program. We contact the principal to receive permission to do the survey."

Seven Seminole County schools — Altamonte, Bear Lake, Goldsboro, Keith, Longwood, Lawton and Lake Mary elementaries — currently subscribe to the program.

The board also approved the start of three pilot programs for the 1988-89 school year. For

nearly a year, a special committee has studied ways to tackle the problem of student expulsions, a problem which hits especially hard on the black and minority community. One elementary, one middle and one high school will be selected when the board meets on June 8.

The Suspension-Expulsion Task Force recommended and the board approved a funded community mentor program. Dr. Hortense G. Evans, administrative assistant to the superintendent, explained that members of the community would be selected to serve as role models for minority students.

Evans also told the board that the pilot programs will help to discover ways in which minority students can be encouraged to participate in academic extra-curricular activities.

Vietnam plans troop withdrawal

BANGKOK, Thailand (UPI) — Vietnam plans to withdraw about 50,000 of its troops from Cambodia in June, nearly half of the 120,000-member force supporting the Hanoi-installed Phnom Penh regime, a Vietnamese official said today.

"We are going to withdraw part of our troops from Cambodia — approximately 50,000 men," a spokesman for the Vietnamese Embassy in Bangkok told United Press International.

The spokesman said the pullout is to take place in June with a specific date to be announced later after it has been "fixed and agreed on by the ministries of defense of Cambodia and Vietnam."

Vietnam invaded Cambodia on Dec. 25, 1978, with nearly 200,000 troops, capturing the capital of Phnom Penh within 15 days and ending the Marxist Khmer Rouge's reign of terror, torture and death.

Saddled with a Western trade embargo, a bankrupt economy and now a famine, Vietnam has vowed to withdraw all of its troops from Cambodia by the end of 1989 and leave the defense of the country to the pro-Hanoi government it has placed in Phnom Penh.

The announcement of the amount of this year's troop withdrawal follows meetings in Moscow between Thai Prime Minister Prem Tinsulanonda, Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev and other Soviet officials in which the Soviet Union said it would talk to its Vietnamese ally about speeding up a solution to the Cambodian problem.

Vietnam's annual troop withdrawals since 1982 have usually been judged as mere troop rotations, but the U.S. military has said Vietnam's 1987 withdrawal of 20,000 troops was genuine and reduced their presence in Cambodia to about 120,000 troops.

The announced withdrawal follows a visit to Moscow by Vietnamese Foreign Minister Nguyen Co Thach.

Both Vietnam and the United States seek to prevent the Khmer Rouge from returning to power and want a political solution in Cambodia.

"While we certainly welcome withdrawal, we would also like to see a political settlement," a Western official said in Bangkok today.

"One of the dangers of withdrawal are chaos and civil war in Cambodia, if you believe, as we do, that the People's Republic of Kampuchea (the

Phnom Penh government), is probably not capable of maintaining order," the senior official said.

"Withdrawing Vietnamese troops is not a solution to the Cambodian problem," said Thai Foreign Ministry spokesman Vith Ratanonda, reacting to the announced Vietnamese withdrawal.

"There will be a power vacuum after Vietnam withdraws if the political problem is not settled, a coalition government is not agreed on and the Cambodian people still have no chance to determine their own future," Vith said.

The Khmer Rouge maintain an army along the Thai-Cambodian border of about 35,000 troops who are armed by China and are the most powerful faction in the United Nations-recognized three-party resistance coalition led by Prince Norodom Sihanouk.

DEAR READER: Good point. Being human, doctors can become grouchy and nasty when they're tired. Certainly, some "bad experiences" do result when physicians are exhausted and overworked. All doctors go through these phases, and we hope that our patients understand, accept — and forgive — our lapses.

However, the thrust of much of my writing is directed toward a more insidious and chronic form of medical misbehavior. Some doctors are downright rude, unpleasant, unfriendly, uncommunicative, self-centered and haughty — not because of fatigue, but because they have an attitude problem. Such headers tend to forget the service qualities of their profession.

You snap at other people when you are tired. So do I. So does everybody. Nonetheless, doctors have an obligation to keep this at a minimum. When it progresses to the point of being a chronic problem, patients tend to say: "Well, what's going on here? Is this what I'm paying for?" Then they have to educate their doctors in how to shape up — or change practitioners.

I'm glad that you shared your concerns about over-tired physicians. I hope that other readers will be as understanding and will give their doctors the benefit of the doubt. On the other hand, people should be wary of M.D.s who seem to equate snipiness with being a doctor. This is simply bad manners and bad medicine. To give you more information, I am sending you a

WIN AT BRIDGE

By James Jacoby

South typified a common breed of bridge player — the result player. Just watch his reaction to the result of the current deal. North's jump to four clubs over South's response was a splinter bid, showing a singleton club, four-card support for South's spades and substantial high-card values over opening bid strength. With the ace of hearts and solidifying spade values, South happily cue-bid the side-ace. North bid five hearts, and South was justified in jumping to six spades. Nevertheless, when dummy came down, declarer was not overjoyed. He could see that the success of the slam would depend upon the location of the diamond king. Clubs were led and continued. Declarer ruffed, played a spade to his king and immediately took

the diamond finesse. When that held, he cashed the ace and queen of spades and took a second diamond finesse. Only then did he exclaim happily, "Well bid, partner!" We're all acquainted with this breed of player and are sometimes guilty of the same failing. Had the diamond king been with East, South would have been quick to shout, "How could you bid five hearts with only 17 high-card points?"

In fact, North did bid too much when he tried five hearts. He should not expect to miss a good slam by signing off in four spades. If South's hand also included the diamond king or the club ace, South would surely have bid again. North-South would have then reached a slam that was genuinely well bid.

PTL officials admit end is near

FORT MILL, S.C. (UPI) — PTL officials rocked by a year of scandals that shook the foundations of America's once pious Pentecostal community say Judgment Day has come and gone for the television ministry and the end is likely near.

The ministry fired 162 more workers Wednesday, leaving a skeleton crew of 500 to run its network and Heritage USA resort that once had 2,000 on the payroll. Officials said PTL could collapse within the next two weeks.

"We've struggled long and we've struggled hard," PTL pastor Sam Johnson told viewers of daily television program "The PTL Club." "We're all caught up in the emotion of it. Unless we hear from you this week or next, it will all be over."

For the past 15 years since founder Jim Bakker brought PTL to the nation's airways, its telecasts have claimed dire straits, begging for dollars from followers who opened their hearts and their purses to the cause.

But Johnson's plea was more than an idle threat, following an announcement that trustee M.C. "Red" Benton is prepared to close the ministry and put its daily TV program out of business.

"If we don't have the funds to operate, I'm prepared to close it all down," Benton said. "When we can't meet the payroll, we'll close the doors. The show will have to go off the air if we can't pay the affiliates."

Benton's announcement was no surprise to PTL insiders who saw contributions dwindle from more than \$300,000 a day in Bakker's heyday to an all-time low of \$18,000 Monday.

"It's been obvious for some time now," said PTL Vice President Neil Eskelin. "The numbers don't lie. This ministry, by all rights, because of the income levels should have closed down."

PTL was rocked last year by the revelation that Bakker had a one-time sexual fling eight years ago with a church secretary Jessica Hahn. Bakker and his wife, Tammy Faye, resigned from PTL at the height of the scandal, and he was defrocked by the Assemblies of God.

It was the first in a series of highly publicized episodes to plague charismatic television ministries.

Oklahoma evangelist Oral Roberts told followers that God would call him home unless he received \$8 million in donations. Then he claimed to have resurrected the dead.

Louisiana evangelist Jimmy Swaggart, who chastized Bakker for moral failure, also was defrocked by the Assemblies of God after disclosures of his sexual encounters with a prostitute.

At PTL, Johnson said he met with court-appointed trustee Benton who warned him there must be an immediate influx of cash if the television ministry is to survive.

Two die when planes collide

RALEIGH, N. C. (UPI) — Two single-engine private airplanes collided shortly after takeoff at Raleigh-Durham Airport Wednesday night, causing both planes to crash and killing two occupants of one of the aircraft.

Identities of the victims were not released. The two pilots had received clearance for a joint takeoff on the main runway at about 9:15 p.m., airport authorities said. The second plane to take off, a Cessna 172 Skylane with just a pilot on board, apparently overtook the first plane, a Piper Cherokee Arrow, in the air and struck it in the rear, they said.

The Cherokee nosedived between two houses in a residential area about one-half mile from the end of the runway, killing the aircraft's two occupants. No one on the ground was hurt.

The pilot of the Cessna made a belly landing

with his plane onto the airport's general aviation runway. He was taken to a hospital where he was apparently treated for shock and released.

"The pilot of the Cessna looked up shortly after takeoff and saw he was on the tail of the Cherokee," said Teresa Damiano, public affairs officer for the airport. "It essentially just chewed the tail off the other plane."

Jack Barker, a Federal Aviation Administration spokesman, said both planes were in contact with the airport's tower but were flying under visual rules, meaning the pilots were responsible for looking out for other aircraft.
