Airline shuts down

SANPORD — Vacationers were left without a plane ride home from Orlando Sanford International Airport Friday when their TransMeridian Airline flights were cancelled due to a midnight cease of operations by the airline.

Airport officials released a pressrelease Thursday, Sept. 29, to confirm that TMA had shut down all of their commercial flights as of Friday.

The airport set up a call center and a

computer station for stuck passengers so that they could make phone calls and check Web sites for other arrangements.

We tried to get word out as soon as we heard," Michael Caires, OSI public relations manager, said Friday.

He said they hadn't heard why TMA had ceased operations, but a press release was issued Friday afternoon on the TMA Web site claiming unsuccessful negotiations to restructure the company's debt led to the shut down.

The company said they would file for protection under Section 7 of the US

Man faces Sexual battery charges

LONGWOOD - Ricky Basdeo, 42, was arrested Sept. 27 on the charges of attempted sexual battery with physical force and lewd lascivious behavior involving a 12-year-old girl.

According to a Longwood Police Department arrest report,



Basdeo went into the victim's room on July undressed himself, climbed on top of her and tried to pull pants her

while placing Basdeo his hands on her throat and chocking her. According to the victim, the

first time Basdeo did something similar to this was back on May 7, 2003, when he rubbed her genitals over her shorts while she was watching television in her

Officer Herb Stewartson was unable to describe what relationship Basdeo has with the victim to protect the girl's identity, but he said Basdeo had regular contact with her.

A tip of alleged abuse was made to the abuse hotline. Advocates then called Child Protective Services who then involved law enforcement.

Mom's anger drives her search for justice

ORLANDO - Travares McGill's gleaming smile stands out as one of the brightest memories Sharon Bostic possesses of the boy she raised from an

Bostic describes McGill as just an average kid, who loved to show his teeth with a smile. He cut teeth like crazy when he was a baby, she recalled.

"He'd cut four at a time," she said. When he was little, she would wake up to see Travares there with a big smile waiting for her. "People always told me, State attorney gets case

Police. city spar over pay

SANFORD — The Sanford Police Department's Union president claimed this week that their officers are overworked and underpaid, but interim City Manager Gene Miller disagreed.

The negotiations, which also include the Sanford Fire Department, began a few months ago, and when settled will take effect in the 2005-2006 fiscal year budget which starts in October.

Miller said Thursday that all city employees are receiving a 3 percent adjustment in October.

Union President Sgt. Ned Golden said earlier this week that police officers in Sanford rank sixth or seventh in the area in pay, but they have the most call-outs compared to

the other municipalities. "Our call volume is the absolute highest," Golden

said. The Sanford Department's Web site stated they had 110,462 calls for service

in 2004. The union is in the second year of a three-year contract, and the only thing in the contract that is open for negotiation is a cost of living increase. Golden said they first requested a ten

percent cost of living raise. The city and their labor attorney came back with a counter offer of one percent. Then, in turn, the union counter-offered again with a request for a six

A local Salvation Army staff member and volunteer spent a week and a half serving close to 600 meals a day in Bayou La Batre, Ala., to Hurricane Katrina vic-

Leon Harp, of Sanford, traveled to the devastated area with three other team members in an effort to feed the displaced

The Sanford Salvation Army sent up a mobile canteen (a food truck), that stationed in the small shrimp and fishing village, which only has a little more than 750 homes. The Salvation Army has a number of volunteers rotating shifts to travel for

Harp said most people would remember the village from the movie setting for

Forrest Gump. In a canteen report Harp said: "Forrest Gump, whose town, Bayou La Batre, ironically was also about a hurricane. The character Bubba had the only shrimp boat



cane and went on to make a fortune catching and selling shrimp."

Harp said on the first day in the bayou they saw shrimp boats beached on their sides, and laying on top of one another, just as in the movie.

They were told when they first got into the village that many side roads, which were blocked with fallen trees, led to small neighborhoods where some homes were

eight feet under water. Many people were still back in those neighborhoods, in their homes, so boats were being used to transport food to those stranded.

Each day, he said, people came by to pick up food for those they knew were

Camelot comes to life at Helen Stairs Theatre

SANFORD - Fact or fiction, myth or history, Arthur and the Knights of the Round Table came to life on the opening night of the Helen Stairs Theatre Repertory Company's production of Camelot, on Friday, Sept. 23.

Camelot was also presented Sept. 24, 25, and 30. Two more presentations are scheduled for Saturday, Oct. 1, and Sunday, Oct.

This story of the dream of the King of England to create a just and honorable kingdom is cleverly interwoven with the eternal love triangle and the treachery of the illegitimate son of the King, who attempts to destroy the dream - but the final scene demonstrates his failure.

John Segers as King Arthur, portrays the character perfectly, demonstrating the two sides of the complex character, the regal idealistic king and the human frailty of the man whose uncertainty and jealousy are all to apparent.

Kaylie Rojas superbly portrays his Queen Guinevere and her singing is a delight. The arrogant Lancelot, who is torn between his love for Guinevere and his loyalty to Arthur, is well portrayed by Gerrit Koester. Bert Phillipi is amusing as the bumbling King Pellinore though his delivery is not always clear. Erick Branch as the evil illegitimate son of Arthur is very convincing. David Lang as Merlin, Anthony Rogers as Tom of Warwick and Caroline Cox as Morgan Le fey, all give impressive performances.

The supporting cast of Knights and ladies are a pleasure to listen to and add to the convincing presentation of the story-

The costumes are colorful and accurately present the period adding considerably to the presentation of the show. The sets, whilst somewhat sparse, are acceptable and adequately convey the background and the times of this medieval story.

The orchestra, under the direction of Libby Sellers plays beautifully and supports the actors well without drowning them out.

Choreography by Daphne Winckler is charming and blends well with the mood of the scenes.

Tom Carter, in his first experience as a Director, can be well pleased with the results of his efforts.

School to be named after Crystal Lake

LAKE MARY - The School Board of Seminole County unanimously agreed to name the new school in Lake Mary as Crystal Lake Elementary.

Initially the School Board requested the public to submit names to be considered for the new elementary school, referred to as Elementary "L." The names were to have an historical significance to the city of Lake Mary. In accordance with the developmental agreement, the District then consulted with the city to receive its input. Crystal Lake was the favored choice of the Lake Mary City commission.


The newest elementary school, currently under construction, is located at 231 Rinehart Road, in Lake Mary. The building will feature a 2-story brick building (114,000 square feet), to include K-5 classrooms, resource rooms, computer labs, suites for Art and Music, a Media Center with a TV studio, multi-purpose cafeteria with a stage, PE pavilion, play fields, and separate bus and parent loops.

Doors will open for students at the start of the 2006-2007 school year.



was told something had happened and she should drive to her daughter's home.

Three investigators met her. McGill had been involved in a shooting. He had been identified. He was dead.

At just past 3 in the morning on July 16, McGill, who according to police didn't have a driver's license, steered a borrowed car into the Country Lake Apartments near Seminole High School. McGill attended the school, and he was dropping off one of at least four pas-


Two white, armed security guards approached the car. The guards said McGill reversed the car and hit an exiting passenger. They said he drove toward them, so they opened fire. Two bullets struck the young driver, one through the heart.

Bostic does not shy away from expressing her anger that the guards were not arrested at the scene. Sharon and Kirkland Bostic spoke with The Sanford Herald Thursday at the offices of Morgan and Morgan in downtown Orlando.

Sharon has spoken with other passengers in the car. They told her the car was in reverse when the bullets flew.

She made her anger known during a public meeting two weeks ago at a Sanford church with the chief of police and a representative of State Attorney Norm Wolfinger.

"I'm still just as mad as hell, nothing has changed," she said

about my son, who should be in school trying to make A's and B's." She wants the two guards to face charges. "If it were me that did the shooting I'd be in jail

right now," she said. Both of the Bostics want people to know what Travares was really like.

"Travares was a very bright kid, athletic," Kirkland said. He played baseball and loved basketball. Something people might not know about is his talent for drawing.

"He can draw just about anything," Kirkland explained.
"That was his talent."

His mother said the young man struggled in school, and he didn't like it, not unlike many students. She said McGill didn't have a regular circle of friends, which made him unique.

"Everybody came home with Travares," Sharon said. "It didn't matter what race they were. You'd wake up in the morning and there'd be 20 people on the floor, dishes everywhere."

This bugged Sharon. She asked him to stop, but she respected the young man's response.

"They have nowhere else to go Ma," he would say every time. "If he brought them home, he was going to feed them," Sharon said, adding that he would even give the young people his clothes.

The family wasn't doing that well, she would tell Travares, but he'd reply: "Aw, man Ma, I can get more, they need it."

She was aware that the young men could get into trouble. She warned Travares not to ride in any strange cars. The 16year-old had faced charges, but his mother said news reports have blown them out of proportion. Most had been thrown out, she said. He had two charges pending when he died.

"He was a leader, never a follower," Bostic said. He would tell his mom that he never took anything, but he sure did drive.

Bostic said police target these young people. Should more people be angry about this? She replied that most people are afraid to stand up and voice their opinion. Bostic, however, does not mince words.

She said Sanford has always been a prejudice town.

"Thirty police hang out in the projects," she explained.

They have labeled these young people as troublemakers, she suggested. "They make them seem as though they are bad children, which they are

For now, the Bostics are waiting to see what will happen

when prosecutors, get the case from Sanford police and Florida Department of Law Enforcement investigators. -

Gregorio Francis of Morgan and Morgan represents the Bostics.

"The security guards should face prosecution," Francis said Thursday.

If the guards are not arrested, that would amount to an approval of their actions.

"What that would say is, "It's OK to kill our young black men," Francis said. He added that Bostic is angry. Her son's 16-year life is worthless because these security guards were not

"We fully intend to file a lawsuit against the guards and the apartment complex," he said. His firm is conducting its own investigation and a civil action could involve wrongful death and violation of civil rights.


Bostic wants justice, he continued. Whether that comes from a panel of judges or a grand jury handing down an indictment does not matter.

"We want these two security guards to be prosecuted for the death of Travares McGill," Francis said.

McGill had many relatives, Bostic said. He had fine relationships with his brothers and sisters, nieces and nephews.

"Travares loved everybody," his mother said. "He was no angel, but he loved everyone. That's just the type of person he was."

Hail to the Mouse

October is a big month in the life of Mickey Mouse. On Oct. 1, 1971, Disney World opened in the Orlando area. On Oct. 3, 1955, the Mickey Mouse Club started running on television.

I recall being at Disney World for the grand opening, (with a press pass, naturally). Members of the media were given free tickets to go on



the rides and see the shows and exhibits. It was a wonderful day, as nothing had been created of that size or magnitude before, especially in this area. Having been on hand when Walt Disney announced his intentions of building this facility several years earlier, I was pleased to see it come to fruition. I knew it would be a boon to all of Central Florida.

Although the "Mickey Mouse Club', a halfhour children's program started on Oct. 3, 1955, there was an earlier program, mostly cartoons and Disney movies, called simply, "Walt Disney" Pfeifauf

Oct. 27, 1954). It flopped between different TV
networks, finally ending on ABC. The title was
then changed to "Disneyland", then "Walt
Disney Presents", next, "Walt Disney's
Wonderful World of Color" and several others. The "Club" is what

started in 1955 with the Mouseketeers, including Annette Funicello and Shelley Fabares. Finally, it was the "New Mickey Mouse Club" with Keri Russell and Britney Spears.

All of these programs featured remakes of Disney movies, and natural history documentaries. One of the spin-offs from these was "Davy Crockett", which started as segments, and later became a separate program. The Disney programs officially went off the air in December, 1980 after 25 years. There are stories that Mickey Mouse was first called Mortimer Mouse, but movie star Mickey Rooney, who turned 85 a week ago, claimed that Walt named his mouse Mickey,

In looking through the background of Mr. M. Mouse, I was surprised to learn he is older than I am. The way he hops around during musical numbers at Disney World however, shows he's in a much better physical condition than I am. The squeaky-voiced Mickey Mouse first appeared on Nov. 18, 1928 on the screen of the Colony Theatre in New York City. The film, "Steamboat Willie" was the first animated cartoon talking picture. Walt himself became the voice of Mickey dur-

Over the years, I have had one direct contact with Mickey Mouse During a camping trip to Fort Wilderness at Disney World several years ago, I called the main office and asked if I could get a wake-up call at 7 a.m. Sure enough, promptly at 7 o'clock, there was a knock on the door of my camper. I opened it and there was Mickey, in person,


pointing at his Mickey Mouse watch, and motioning for me to leave. For newcomers to the Sanford area, something many of us know and many are thankful that it didn't come about. At one time, Walt Disney officials were investigating the possibility of building Disney World just west of Sanford, near the intersections of SR-46 and Interstale-4. You can just imaging the changes we would have these days if we were the Disney headquarters in the southeast. While we probably wouldn't have luid the Seminole Towne Center at that area, there would be a great deal of growth. Our airport would have expanded unbelievably, businesses in the downtown area would have gone through changes that no one could imagine, and the cost of living, although relatively high now, would be even higher.

I don't recall exactly why the matter never transpired, and why the Orange/Osceola area was selected over us, but I personally am one of those who are thankful that it went the way it did.

Mickey Mouse is now just shy of being 77 years old, and Donald Duck is 71 years old (first appearing on June 9, 1934). We have been enjoying these characters for many years. And regardless of the impact they have made on Central Florida, we must wish both of them continued success.

An awning on the mobile canteen covered the first four or five people in line, the others stood in the hot sun waiting with a bottle of water to keep them from passing out, Harp recalled.

"We had to keep them watered down," he said.

Harp said he heard story after story of people's complete devastation. He said after a day or two of those stories it begins to take a toll on you emotionally, but it's rewarding.


"We didn't want to leave...because we were helping. And, emotionally, you feel like you're attached to them," Harp said.

Before Harp's team, which was a first responder team, reached Alabama, they stopped in Tallahassee where Florida Gov. Jeb Bush was "Rallying the Troops" for the volunteers

at Mt. Olive Baptist Church. After one day of stationing near the bayou, they positioned the canteen in the middle of town in a shopping center. The supermarket in the shopping center had almost every window broken out. Harp said he couldn't tell if there had been looting or not, because the store had been washed out by water

in a whirlpool fashion.

While there, their team served a total of 5,311 meals, with an average of 590 meals a day. They served 8,561 snacks,

The Sunday School

We are fortunate to begin with, in having a building constructed especially for Sunday School purposes, and in which each department has a place. Our Sunday School is perfectly graded according to the most approved methods and our department officers and teachers have been specially trained, and have taken special courses of study, fitting them for the work they are doing.

Our Cradle Roll Department, with Mrs. W.M. Thigpen as superintendent, is doing a wonderful work with the little ones. One of the special features of Mrs. Thigpen's department is the Mothers' Meeting, which is held frequently for the purpose of studying the best methods for the care and teaching of the

In the Beginners' Department, Mrs. A.C. Williams, superintendent, receives the little fellows of four and five years of age and here a great work is being done with these little folks.

On the third floor of our building we find Miss Allie Trafford, superintendent, in charge of the Primary Department. Six, seven and eight-year-old pupils, and it is here that a great deal of real study is done by the boys

pop up out of nowhere indicating the GFBT? I must have missed the meeting about this and wondered like you, exactly what is this trail all about? Here are a few interesting facts about it. For more, check out the website: http://floridabirdingtrail.com. This site supplies lots of information for the novice, like a link to "Bird Watching Basics", as well as into for the credit the site for the factual information in this column.

The trail is a 2,000 mile highway of new and existing birding sites, modeled after the Great Texas Coastal Birding Trail. East, West, Panhandle, and South make up its geographic sections. Geneva is in the East section that opened first in November 2000. There are "clusters" within each geographic section highlighting bird communities and special ecosystems of interest. Florida is rich in wild birdlife, boasting over 470 verified species largely due to its diverse habitats, location on migration routes, and temperate, tropical climate.

There are several specific trails in and around Geneva, Mims, Christmas, and Osteen: Lake Proctor Wilderness Area, Geneva Wilderness Area, Demetree and Kilbee tracts in the Little Big Econ State Forest, Buck Lake Conservation Area, Seminole Ranch Conservation Area, Tosohatchee State Reserve, Orlando Wetlands Park, Lake Ashby Park, and the Lake Jesup Wilderness Area. You can find details of each by downloading the East section, pages 14-16, the Bobwhite/Bittern Cluster.

If you are a birdwatcher, most

of this information is probably pretty basic, but if you're not, the GFBT gives you a wonderful opportunity to enjoy nature now that our Florida Fall has arrived.

With the heavy rains of this summer there have been many, many "water" birds in our back pasture and truthfully, I have no idea who is who back there. Okay, I know the sandhill cranes, the hawks, and the eagles, but the wide variety of other ducks, storks, and cranes, I don't have a

When you read about the trails, more interesting bird names surface: rails, painted buntings, pintail and teal ducks, harriers-for a writer it is wonderful to run across new words!

Here are some brief descriptions: Rail-a short or medium crane with long toes, allowing it to run on the swamp mud; Harrier-slender hawk with long legs and long angled wings. Purple gallinule-brightly colored aquatic bird with a frontal shield (a little like a chicken or hen); Rittern-small or medium heron: Towhee-common finch; Snipe-a kind of slender woodcock with a long bill to probe the mud for

All that being said, don't ask me the difference between a crane, a heron, or sandpiper-it's all too confusing. Shih! Sorry, am making too much noise?

Speaking of noise- need a quiet getaway with your kids? Join the Wings Over Florida -"Junior Birder Program" for erade school

kids.http://myfwc.com/educator/JrBirder is the website to download both student and teacher resources. The program is coordinated with FCAT writing prompts and Sunshine State Standards-kids can win certificates as they identify birds. Wings over Florida also encourages adult participation and identification of Florida birds.

You can purchase hats and Tshirts off the website (yes, yes there is one for the Purple Gallinule) through the link for The Wildlife Foundation of Florida. Nature lovers on your gift list will love decals, gifts, ties

Your businesses can be a sponsor of the GFBT, reaching thousands of bird enthusiasts across

the state and the country. It is estimated that \$477 million is generated by "non-consumptive" bird use in Florida-through gasoline, hotels, restaurants, travel necessities, and souvenirs. Florida is only second to California in generating income, and an estimated 19,000 jobs are related to this industry. There is a big benefit to small communities in this equa-tion because few capital improvements are necessary, so the economic impact is more sig-nificant with less capital invest-

ment.
This weekend, the Ponce Inlet is having the Migratory Bird Festival "Wings on the Wind" event-Sept 30-Oct 2nd. Check out the Event section of the website for great Birding events all year long.If you or someone you know is interested in the business or hobby or birds, there are dozens and dozens of birding links on this website to organizations, products, and services What a great example of big

organizations working together. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, with grant funding from the Florida Department of Transportation, forms the backbone of this project, along with partners such as Florida Park Service, The Audubon Society, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Wildlife Foundation of Florida, and Visit

Florida. One of my fondest memories, years ago, was an early morning February boat ride on Lake Harney. The sun had just come up when suddenly we were surrounded by hundreds of white pelicans. It was like that swan scene in The Notebook. They soared in and landed silently. White pelicans don't dive, by the way, and although they winter here, they actually breed out west and as far north as British Columbia. It was magical, and I thought, what wonderful snow-

percent cost of living raise. Officers are on a similar pay scale to Seminole County leachers, who just received an average 6 to 8 increase in their salaries in September. Police officers are on step salary schedule based on years of experience. Each year, if they receive a satisfactory rating, they are moved up to the next salary step, Golden

Officers in Sanford currently make anywhere from \$31, 384 to \$44,290 as a base salary, with additional supplements such as an extra \$500 a year for having an associate's degree, \$1,000 for having a bachelor's degree, and \$1,500 for having a master's degree. Golden said that the Sanford Police Department answers close to as many calls as the Sheriff's Office, if

you eliminate calls for service that do not require a sworn law enforcement officer, such as child services calls.

He also stated that the 116-officer department has a low retention rate, due to the salaries.

"They've probably lost 50 to 60 since the year 2000," Golden said. He added that even if the union went by the city's numbers, the retention rate was around 10 percent.

Miller said that he has not been involved with the union negotiations, but there is a negotiation team that includes the labor management attor-

ney.
"We have to hold our chairs," Miller said.

According to Miller, the city sought guidance last Monday before the City Commission meeting in a

closed session. The city is now in a position to go back to the bargaining table, he said.

As for the officers being overworked and underpaid, Miller said that it is a negotiating tool unions use.

"For someone who's been around in public management for more than 42 years, that's typical," Miller said. "It's respected by management, and we hope the union respects the city."

Golden said that he's aware that the city is in "great financial shape". This year there was an excess of \$2.6 million from added tax revenue, he said. According to him, the city is trying to boost up their reserves to 25 percent, but the focus right now needed to be on retaining employees and making Sanford a premiere city, as well as the Sanford Police

Department, a premiere agency We're not there," Golden said. "That's not the case."

Miller noted that the city's human resources director Sheryl Chapman will be conducting, with an outside consultant, a comprehensive review of pay structures and job descriptions over the next year for employees citywide. It was added in to the upcoming fiscal year budget after City Commissioners decided one of their main goals in the coming years was personnel issues that included reviewing salaries and benefits.

"That's a badly needed study," Miller said. "That hasn't been performed in years."

The union and the city will be back to the bargaining table early next





Lake Brantley gets defensive

It may have been just the district opener for Lake Brantley, but the Patriots have already joined Oviedo atop the Class 6A-District 2 pack.

And they did it the Lake Brantley way, using a time-consuming, yardage eating ground attack on offense and a powerful and hard-hitting defense to keep Winter Springs at bay, 21-7, at Tom Storey Field Thursday night. In fact, the Patriots defense set the

tone for the game right off the bat.

Trapped deep in their own end of the field, Bears' running back Tim Boykins found himself surrounded in his own end zone on the second play of the game and in trying to get away from Lake Brantley's Wes Estes the ball came loose and Dylan Livingston fell on the ball for a Patriots touchdown just 50

seconds into the contest. Winter Springs came back to tie the game in the second quarter on a 20yard touchdown pass from Taylor Salem to Lars Anderson, Anderson's

third touchdown catch in two weeks, but the hosts regained the lead for good before the half when quarterback Bryan Bearden hit Rhett Hamrick for a

22-yard touchdown pass.

The extra point was missed, but Lake Brantley still led 13-7 at intermission. The Patriots' defense kept the pressure on Salem, who came off the bench to star for the Bears in last week's rally

over Lyman, sacking the sophomore six times and intercepting two passes.
As usual, Bearden was the star on offense for Lake Brantley, carrying the ball 21 times for 140 yards, including setting up the 15-yard insurance touchdown run by fullback Lance Ault in the third quarter. For good measure, the senior signal-caller added the two-

point conversion run. All told, the Patriots had 252 rushing yards as they improved to 4-2 overall and 1-0 in 6A-2.

The victory was huge for Lake Brantley, because a loss would have dropped them two games behind Winter Springs, which is now 3-3 over-all and 1-1 in district play, and a game behind Oviedo (1-0), which played University in a non-district game on Friday.

Conversely, the loss was tough for the Bears, because a win would have given them victories over both Lake Brantley and Lake Mary, all but assuring themselves of a playoff berth.

Lake Mary thrives on Seminole miscues

LAKE MARY -Statistics don't lie....most of the time.

Thursday night at Don T. Reynolds Stadium, vis-iting Seminole dominated the statistics on both sides of the ball, but the Lake Mary offense capitalized on two defense-created opportunities in the first half and held on for a 14-9 victory in the crucial Seminole Athletic Conference and Class 6A-

District 2 football game. Rams star running back Kashif Vallot scored on a pair of short runs, five Lake Mary made two huge defensive stands in the red zone in the final three minutes to end a three game losing streak and win its first district game of the season. The Rams are now 3-3 overall

and 1-1 in 6A-2. The Fighting Seminoles offense had 254 yards of total offense, 216 rushing, with running back Julian Brown running for a game-high 110 yards on 21 carries and quarterback Travis Goodine rushed for 105 yards on 12 attempts and completed three pass-

es for 38 more yards. Statistically, the Tribe defense was nearly as impressive, holding Lake Mary to 56 yards of total offense. The normally potent Rams running game only gained 33 yards on 28 attempts, led by Vallot, who had just 29 yards on 17 carries.



The team's offense revolves around junior quarterback Jerry Babb, who in addition to signal-calling duties, is the team's second leading rusher, having already gained 115 yards on the ground for an average of 55 per game.

The Cajuns backfield features freshman tailback Tyrell Fenroy who posted 10.87 yards per carry against Northwestern State, tallying 163 yards on 15 carries.

O'Leary and the Golden Knights defense know what it will take to slow the Ragin' Cajuns. "They (Louisiana-Lafayette) have skill

kids that can run and a quarterback that's very active with his arm and his feet", said O'Leary. "They run a spread offense and they have a couple of run-

ning backs that can really get up and go. Defensively, they have multiple 7-8 man fronts, a lot of movement and a lot of pressure. For us defensively, we have to tackle well and close in on the tackle quicker."

On the defensive side of the football, look for the Cajuns to be overly aggressive with their front line as the team looks to record its first sack of the season. Sophomore linebacker Mark Risher enters the game with a team-high 22 tackles. Cornerback Michael Adams has wreaked havoc on opponents with a team-high 11 solo tackles in addition to an interception, fumble recovery and a blocked kick on special teams.

Junior quarterback Steven Moffett is completing a career-high 61.9 percent of his passes and has not been held under 200 yards passing this season.

Defensive end Paul Carrington is coming off a two sack performance against Marshall that garnered him Conference USA Defensive Player of the Weck honors. The fifth-year senior leads the team with four tackles for loss, setting opponents back a combined 20 yards.

UCF will look to turn around its luck on the road. The Golden Knights have lost their last 15 games away from the Citrus Bowl. The last road victory came on Nov. 23, 2002 against a Ben Roethlisberger led Miami (Ohio) Red Hawks.

O'Leary believes the key to victory lies with UCF's ability to maintain a high level of intensity.

"You have to have the same sense of urgency and importance as you do at home. You shouldn't need a crowd or a cheerleader yelling to get ready to play. They should play with the same intensity all the time," said O'Leary.



Did Ruth 'call' the home run?

As mentioned last week, Oct. 1st, 1932, was a banner day in the life of George Herman "Babe" Ruth, aka "The Bambino", and "Sultan of Swat".

In the fifth inning of game three of the World Series in 1932, Yankees versus the Chicago Cubs, Cubs fans were shouting at the Babe, calling him a drunk, womanizer, and a few other names which I will not mention.

With a count of two balls and two strikes, legend has it that the Babe paused and pointed to the center field bleachers of Chicago's Wrigley Field. With the next pitch, he hit a soaring home run high above the very spot to which he had gestured.

With that home run, Ruth squashed the Cubs' hopes of winning the game, and the Yankees went on to sweep the series with four straight victories.

That motion toward center field has been a mystery for over a half century. Even eyewitnesses disagnee. Joe Williams of the New York Times wrote, "In no mistaken motions, the Babe notified the crowd that the nature of his retaliation would be to wallop one right out of the confines of the park."

Cubs' pitcher Charlie Root however, said, "Ruth did not point at the fence before he swung. If he'd made a gesture like that, I'd have put one in his ear and knocked him on his (bleep)."

Ruth's daughter had once said her father denied it, but the Babe himself claimed later that is what he had done.

Whether this pointing was fact or folklore is a mystery, but either way, it is the legend of "Babe" Ruth. Some folks believe the

Some folks believe the Babe, in his major league years, played in Sanford. According to Alicia Clarke at the Sanford Museum, the Babe WAS in Sanford, but as a representative of Ford Motor Company, after his retirement. She said he spoke at the old Sanford Stadium, "he had a very raspy voice", and spent much time signing baseballs for local dignitaries and school children.
