Airline shuts down

SANFORD — Vacationers were left without a plane ride home from Orlando Sanford International Airport Friday when their TransMeridian Airline flights were cancelled due to a midnight cease of operations by the airline.

Airport officials released a press release Thursday, Sept. 29, to confirm that TMA had shut down all of their commercial flights as of Friday.

The airport set up a call center and a

computer station for stuck passengers so that they could make phone calls and check Web sites for other arrangements.

"We tried to get word out as soon as we heard," Michael Cairns, OSI public relations manager, said Friday.

He said they hadn't heard why TMA had ceased operations, but a press release was issued Friday afternoon on the TMA Web site claiming unsuccessful negotiations to restructure the company's debt led to the shut down.

The company said they would file for protection under Section 7 of the US

Bankruptcy Code.

Shelly Varel and three of her friends, all from Illinois, had vacationed together in Orlando this past week and were supposed to fly out at 11:15 a.m. Friday on TMA.

"We walked in and they said it was cancelled," Varel said.

The foursome was able to get another flight out of Orlando International Airport but they said they weren't sure yet how they were going to get from OSI

Man faces sexual battery charges on girl, 12

LONGWOOD — Ricky Basdeo, 42, was arrested Sept. 27 on the charges of attempted sexual battery with physical force and lewd lascivious behavior involving a 12-year-old girl.

According to a Longwood Police Department arrest report,

Basdeo went into the victim's room on July 4, undressed himself, climbed on top of her and tried to pull her pants down, all while placing his hands on her throat and choking her.

According to the victim, the first time Basdeo did something similar to this was back on May 7, 2003, when he rubbed her genitals over her shorts while she was watching television in her living room.

Officer Herb Stewartson was unable to describe what relationship Basdeo has with the victim to protect the girl's identity, but he said Basdeo had regular contact with her.

A tip of alleged abuse was made to the abuse hotline. Advocates then called Child Protective Services who then involved law enforcement.

Mom's anger drives her search for justice

ORLANDO — Travares McGill's gleaming smile stands out as one of the brightest memories Sharon Bostic possesses of the boy she raised from an infant.

Bostic describes McGill as just an average kid, who loved to show his teeth with a smile. He cut teeth like crazy when he was a baby, she recalled.

"He'd cut four at a time," she said. When he was little, she would wake up to see Travares there with a big smile waiting for her. "People always told me,

State attorney gets case

SANFORD — A spokeswoman for State Attorney Norm Wolfinger said late Friday that investigators have handed over a report to their office on the shooting death of Travares McGill in July. No other information was available.

"That's the smilingest baby!"

In July, 16 years after she started caring for McGill, Bostic received the phone call at work that any parent dreads. She

Police, city spar over pay increase

SANFORD — The Sanford Police Department's Union president claimed this week that their officers are over-worked and underpaid, but interim City Manager Gene Miller disagreed.

The negotiations, which also include the Sanford Fire Department, began a few months ago, and when settled will take effect in the 2005-2006 fiscal year budget which starts in October.

Miller said Thursday that all city employees are receiving a 3 percent adjustment in October.

Union President Sgt. Ned Golden said earlier this week that police officers in Sanford rank sixth or seventh in the area in pay, but they have the most call-outs compared to the other municipalities.

"Our call volume is the absolute highest," Golden said.

The Sanford Police Department's Web site stated they had 110,462 calls for service in 2004.

The union is in the second year of a three-year contract, and the only thing in the contract that is open for negotiation is a cost of living increase. Golden said they first requested a ten percent cost of living raise.

The city and their labor attorney came back with a counter offer of one percent. Then, in turn, the union counter-offered again with a request for a six

Local Salvation Army members served storm victims in Alabama

A local Salvation Army staff member and volunteer spent a week and a half serving close to 600 meals a day in Bayou La Batre, Ala., to Hurricane Katrina victims.

Leon Harp, of Sanford, traveled to the devastated area with three other team members in an effort to feed the displaced victims.

The Sanford Salvation Army sent up a mobile canteen (a food truck), that stationed in the small shrimp and fishing village, which only has a little more than 750 homes. The Salvation Army has a number of volunteers rotating shifts to travel for the cause.

Harp said most people would remember the village from the movie setting for Forrest Gump.

In a canteen report Harp said: "Forrest Gump, whose town, Bayou La Batre, ironically was also about a hurricane. The character Bubba had the only shrimp boat

that survived the hurricane and went on to make a fortune catching and selling shrimp."

Harp said on the first day in the bayou they saw shrimp boats beached on their sides, and laying on top of one another, just as in the movie.

They were told when they first got into the village that many side roads, which were blocked with fallen trees, led to small neighborhoods where some homes were eight feet under water.

Many people were still back in those neighborhoods, in their homes, so boats were being used to transport food to those stranded.

Each day, he said, people came by to pick up food for those they knew were stranded.

Camelot comes to life at Helen Stairs Theatre

SANFORD — Fact or fiction, myth or history, Arthur and the Knights of the Round Table came to life on the opening night of the Helen Stairs Theatre Repertory Company's production of Camelot, on Friday, Sept. 23.

Camelot was also presented Sept. 24, 25, and 30. Two more presentations are scheduled for Saturday, Oct. 1, and Sunday, Oct. 2.

This story of the dream of the King of England to create a just and honorable kingdom is cleverly interwoven with the eternal love triangle and the treachery of the illegitimate son of the King, who attempts to destroy the dream — but the final scene demonstrates his failure.

John Segers as King Arthur, portrays the character perfectly, demonstrating the two sides of the complex character, the regal idealistic king and the human frailty of the man whose uncertainty and jealousy are all too apparent.

Kaylie Rojas superbly portrays his Queen Guinevere and her singing is a delight. The arrogant Lancelot, who is torn between his love for Guinevere and his loyalty to Arthur, is well portrayed by Gerrit Koester. Bert Phillip is amusing as the bumbling King Pellinore though his delivery is not always clear. Erick Branch as the evil illegitimate son of Arthur is very convincing. David Lang as Merlin, Anthony Rogers as Tom of Warwick and Caroline Cox as Morgan Le Fey, all give impressive performances.

The supporting cast of Knights and ladies are a pleasure to listen to and add to the convincing presentation of the storyline.

The costumes are colorful and accurately present the period adding considerably to the presentation of the show. The sets, whilst somewhat sparse, are acceptable and adequately convey the background and the times of this medieval story.

The orchestra, under the direction of Libby Sellers plays beautifully and supports the actors well without drowning them out.

Choreography by Daphne Winckler is charming and blends well with the mood of the scenes.

Tom Carter, in his first experience as a director, can be well pleased with the results of his efforts.

School to be named after Crystal Lake

LAKE MARY — The School Board of Seminole County unanimously agreed to name the new school in Lake Mary as Crystal Lake Elementary.

Initially the School Board requested the public to submit names to be considered for the new elementary school, referred to as Elementary "L." The names were to have an historical significance to the city of Lake Mary. In accordance with the developmental agreement, the District then consulted with the city to receive its input. Crystal Lake was the favored choice of the Lake Mary City commission.

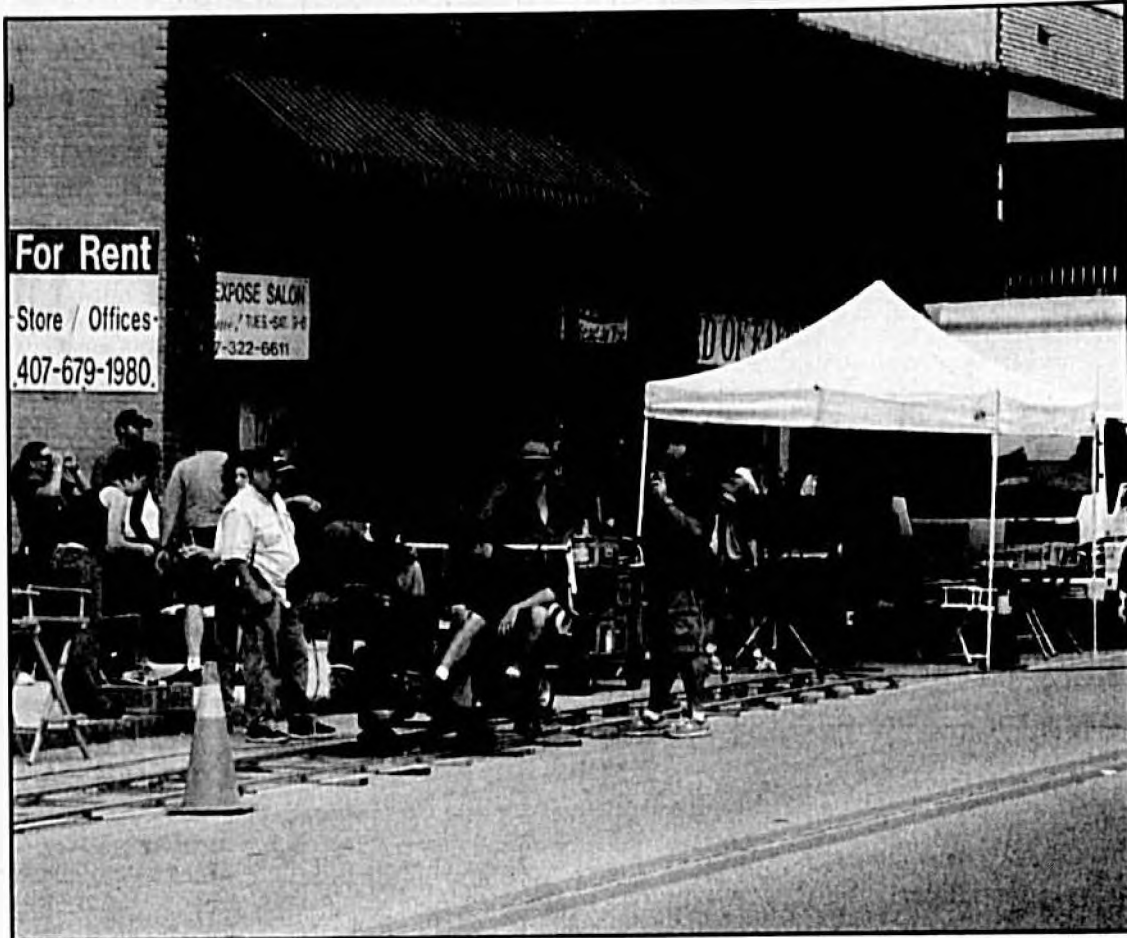
The newest elementary school, currently under construction, is located at 231 Rinehart Road, in Lake Mary. The building will feature a 2-story brick building (114,000 square feet), to include K-5 classrooms, resource rooms, computer labs, suites for Art and Music, a Media Center with a TV studio, multi-purpose cafeteria with a stage, PE pavilion, play fields, and separate bus and parent loops.

Doors will open for students at the start of the 2006-2007 school year.

was told something had happened and she should drive to her daughter's home.

Three investigators met her. McGill had been involved in a shooting. He had been identified. He was dead.

At just past 3 in the morning on July 16, McGill, who according to police didn't have a driver's license, steered a borrowed car into the Country Lake Apartments near Seminole High School. McGill attended the school, and he was dropping off one of at least four passengers.

Two white, armed security guards approached the car. The guards said McGill reversed the car and hit an exiting passenger. They said he drove toward them, so they opened fire. Two bullets struck the young driver, one through the heart.

Bostic does not shy away from expressing her anger that the guards were not arrested at the scene. Sharon and Kirkland Bostic spoke with The Sanford Herald Thursday at the offices of Morgan and Morgan in downtown Orlando.

Sharon has spoken with other passengers in the car. They told her the car was in reverse when the bullets flew.

She made her anger known during a public meeting two weeks ago at a Sanford church with the chief of police and a representative of State Attorney Norm Wolfinger.

"I'm still just as mad as hell, nothing has changed," she said

Thursday. "I'm sitting here in a lawyer's office in Orlando talking with a newspaper reporter about my son, who should be in school trying to make A's and B's."

She wants the two guards to face charges. "If it were me that did the shooting I'd be in jail right now," she said.

Both of the Bostics want people to know what Travares was really like.

"Travares was a very bright kid, athletic," Kirkland said. He played baseball and loved basketball. Something people might not know about is his talent for drawing.

"He can draw just about anything," Kirkland explained. "That was his talent."

His mother said the young man struggled in school, and he didn't like it, not unlike many students. She said McGill didn't have a regular circle of friends, which made him unique.

"Everybody came home with Travares," Sharon said. "It didn't matter what race they were. You'd wake up in the morning and there'd be 20 people on the floor, dishes everywhere."

This bugged Sharon. She asked him to stop, but she respected the young man's

response.

"They have nowhere else to go Ma," he would say every time. "If he brought them home, he was going to feed them," Sharon said, adding that he would even give the young people his clothes.

The family wasn't doing that well, she would tell Travares, but he'd reply: "Aw, man Ma, I can get more, they need it."

She was aware that the young men could get into trouble. She warned Travares not to ride in any strange cars. The 16-year-old had faced charges, but his mother said news reports have blown them out of proportion. Most had been thrown out, she said. He had two charges pending when he died.

"He was a leader, never a follower," Bostic said. He would tell his mom that he never took anything, but he sure did drive.

Bostic said police target these young people. Should more people be angry about this? She replied that most people are afraid to stand up and voice their opinion. Bostic, however, does not mince words.

She said Sanford has always been a prejudice town.

"Thirty police hang out in the projects," she explained.

They have labeled these young people as troublemakers, she suggested. "They make them seem as though they are bad children, which they are not."

For now, the Bostics are waiting to see what will happen

when prosecutors get the case from Sanford police and Florida Department of Law Enforcement investigators.

Gregorio Francis of Morgan and Morgan represents the Bostics.

"The security guards should face prosecution," Francis said Thursday.

If the guards are not arrested, that would amount to an approval of their actions.

"What that would say is, 'It's OK to kill our young black men,'" Francis said. He added that Bostic is angry. Her son's 16-year life is worthless because these security guards were not arrested.

"We fully intend to file a lawsuit against the guards and the apartment complex," he said. His firm is conducting its own investigation and a civil action could involve wrongful death and violation of civil rights.

Bostic wants justice, he continued. Whether that comes from a panel of judges or a grand jury handing down an indictment does not matter.

"We want these two security guards to be prosecuted for the death of Travares McGill," Francis said.

McGill had many relatives, Bostic said. He had fine relationships with his brothers and sisters, nieces and nephews.

"Travares loved everybody," his mother said. "He was no angel, but he loved everyone. That's just the type of person he was."

Hail to the Mouse

October is a big month in the life of Mickey Mouse. On Oct. 1, 1971, Disney World opened in the Orlando area. On Oct. 3, 1955, the Mickey Mouse Club started running on television.

I recall being at Disney World for the grand opening, (with a press pass, naturally). Members of the media were given free tickets to go on the rides and see the shows and exhibits. It was a wonderful day, as nothing had been created of that size or magnitude before, especially in this area. Having been on hand when Walt Disney announced his intentions of building this facility several years earlier, I was pleased to see it come to fruition. I knew it would be a boon to all of Central Florida.

Although the "Mickey Mouse Club", a half-hour children's program started on Oct. 3, 1955, there was an earlier program, mostly cartoons and Disney movies, called simply, "Walt Disney" (Oct. 27, 1954). It flopped between different TV networks, finally ending on ABC. The title was then changed to "Disneyland", then "Walt Disney Presents", next, "Walt Disney's Wonderful World of Color" and several others. The "Club" is what started in 1955 with the Mouseketeers, including Annette Funicello and Sherry Fabares. Finally, it was the "New Mickey Mouse Club" with Kerl Russell and Britney Spears.

All of these programs featured remakes of Disney movies, and natural history documentaries. One of the spin-offs from these was "Davy Crockett", which started as segments, and later became a separate program. The Disney programs officially went off the air in December, 1980 after 25 years. There are stories that Mickey Mouse was first called Mortimer Mouse, but movie star Mickey Rooney, who turned 85 a week ago, claimed that Walt named his mouse Mickey, after him.

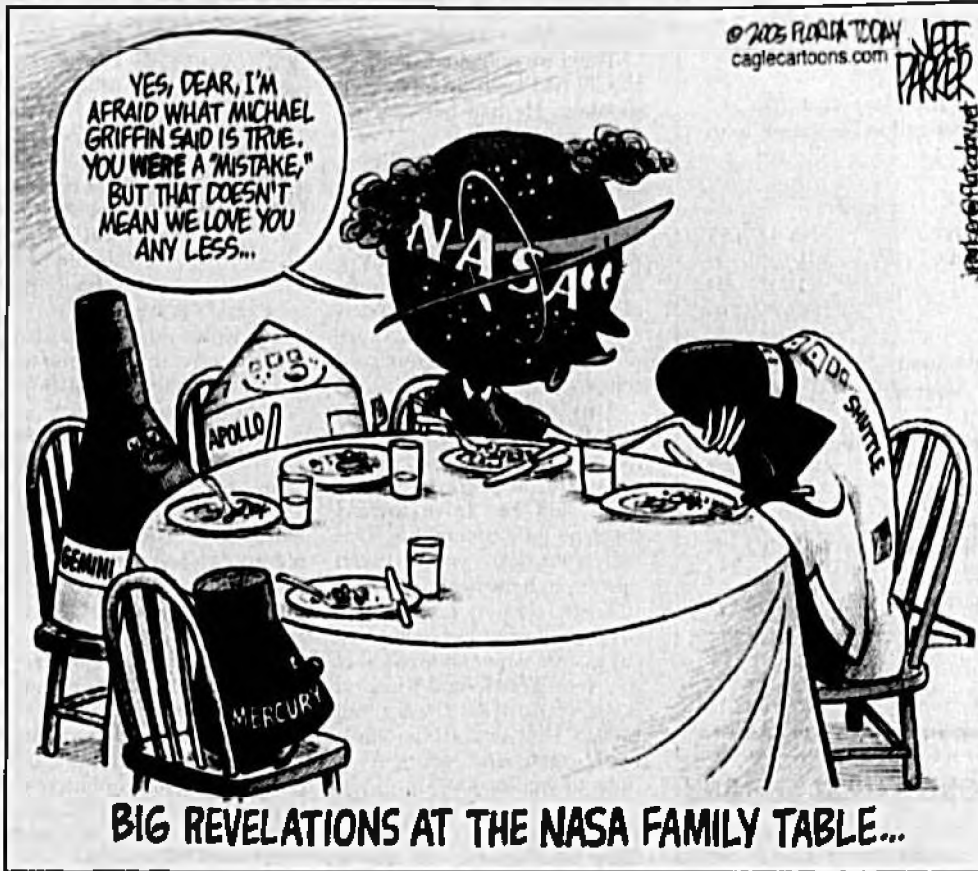
In looking through the background of Mr. M. Mouse, I was surprised to learn he is older than I am. The way he hops around during musical numbers at Disney World however, shows he's in a much better physical condition than I am. The squeaky-voiced Mickey Mouse first appeared on Nov. 18, 1928 on the screen of the Colony Theatre in New York City. The film, "Steamboat Willie" was the first animated cartoon talking picture. Walt himself became the voice of Mickey during the early movies.

Over the years, I have had one direct contact with Mickey Mouse. During a camping trip to Fort Wilderness at Disney World several years ago, I called the main office and asked if I could get a wake-up call at 7 a.m. Sure enough, promptly at 7 o'clock, there was a knock on the door of my camper. I opened it and there was Mickey, in person, pointing at his Mickey Mouse watch, and motioning for me to leave.

For newcomers to the Sanford area, something many of us know and many are thankful that it didn't come about. At one time, Walt Disney officials were investigating the possibility of building Disney World just west of Sanford, near the intersections of SR-46 and Interstate-4. You can just imagine the changes we would have these days if we were the Disney headquarters in the southeast. While we probably wouldn't have had the Seminole Towne Center at that area, there would be a great deal of growth. Our airport would have expanded unbelievably, businesses in the downtown area would have gone through changes that no one could imagine, and the cost of living, although relatively high now, would be even higher.

I don't recall exactly why the matter never transpired, and why the Orange/Osceola area was selected over us, but I personally am one of those who are thankful that it went the way it did.

Mickey Mouse is now just shy of being 77 years old, and Donald Duck is 71 years old (first appearing on June 9, 1934). We have been enjoying these characters for many years. And regardless of the impact they have made on Central Florida, we must wish both of them continued success.

An awning on the mobile canteen covered the first four or five people in line, the others stood in the hot sun waiting with a bottle of water to keep them from passing out, Harp recalled.

"We had to keep them watered down," he said.

Harp said he heard story after story of people's complete devastation. He said after a day or two of those stories it begins to take a toll on you emotionally, but it's rewarding.

"We didn't want to leave...because we were helping. And, emotionally, you feel like you're attached to them," Harp said.

Before Harp's team, which was a first responder team, reached Alabama, they stopped in Tallahassee where Florida Gov. Jeb Bush was "Rallying the Troops" for the volunteers at Mt. Olive Baptist Church.

After one day of stationing near the bayou, they positioned the canteen in the middle of town in a shopping center. The supermarket in the shopping center had almost every window broken out. Harp said he couldn't tell if there had been looting or not, because the store had been washed out by water in a whirlpool fashion.

While there, their team served a total of 5,311 meals, with an average of 590 meals a day. They served 8,561 snacks,

with an average of 951.2 snacks daily; and they served 8,134 Gatorades and 140 gallons of water.

"I'm ready to go back again," Harp said.

Back in Sanford, the Salvation Army is looking for local volunteers to help sort out

donations, among other things. Harp said that the organization is in the recovery stages, and is in need of volunteers right now.

to OIA. The airport said that they currently had no replacement flights in Sanford. They were in good spirits though, after spending a week in a condo in between visits to Universal Studios, the beach, and Arabian Nights. When asked if anything like that had ever happened to her before she laughed and said:

"No, it's actually my first time flying." Several other passengers without flights were using the computer station or their cell phones to make new flight arrangements. Some were on the phone with their credit card company or travel agency. One of Varel's friends, Kenny Winkler, said Varel's first vaca-

tion flying could have been worse.

"The plane didn't crash," he said as they carried luggage toward the airport doors.

TMA began service at OSI with flights to Syracuse, NY in June 2003, an airport press release said. At one time or another they operated flights to and from Aquadilla, Puerto Rico; Allentown, PA; Atlanta, GA; Chicago/Rockford, IL; Cincinnati, OH; Harrisburg, PA; Louisville, KY; San Juan, Puerto Rico; St. Louis-MidAmerica; Toledo, OH; and Washington, DC (Dulles).

The only flights that were not cancelled, just delayed, were the flights that were operated by TMA on the behalf of Vacation Express. Those flights were taken over by Vacation Express's former partner Pace Airlines. Vacation Express is an Atlanta-based tour operator since 1989.

"We were notified late Thursday evening by TransMeridian executives of their decision to shut down their operations," Gantt Cookson, vice president of Vacation Express said in a statement.

"As part of our standard operating procedures Vacation Express has a contingency plan in the event difficulties arise with one of its suppliers. This plan was executed successfully last night," Cookson continued.

TMA was based in Atlanta and was founded in 1995. They had carried more than a million passengers to more than 150 destinations, their Web site said.

"The management of TransMeridian would like to thank all of its customers for their patronage and continued support over the years," a TMA statement said.

They also said the airline is working to assist employees, and advised passengers to contact travel agents or credit card company.

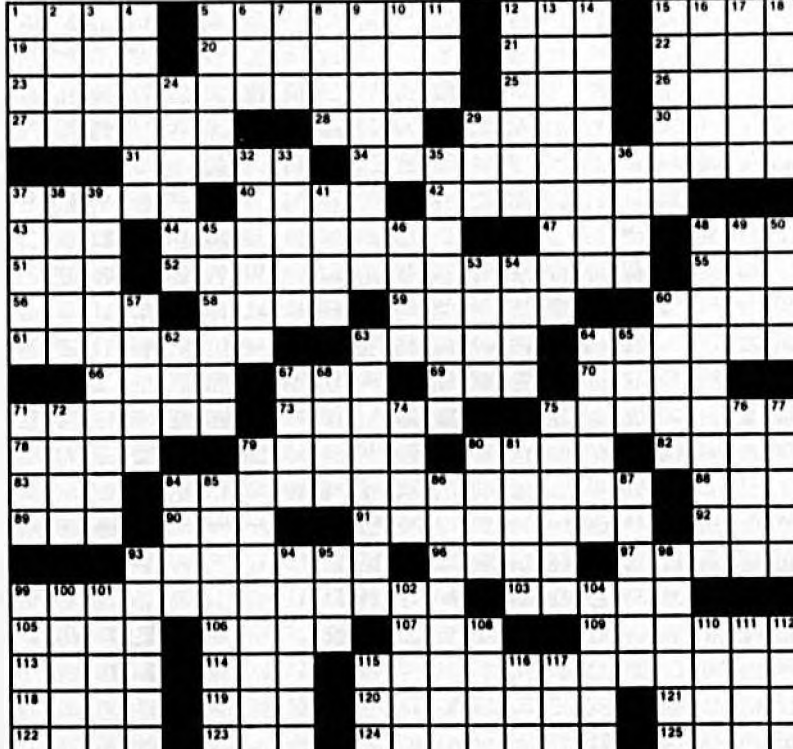

Reynolds Stadium, visiting Seminole dominated the statistics on both sides of the ball, but the Lake Mary offense capitalized on two defense-created opportunities in the first half and held on for a 14-9 victory in the crucial Seminole Athletic Conference and Class 6A-District 2 football game. 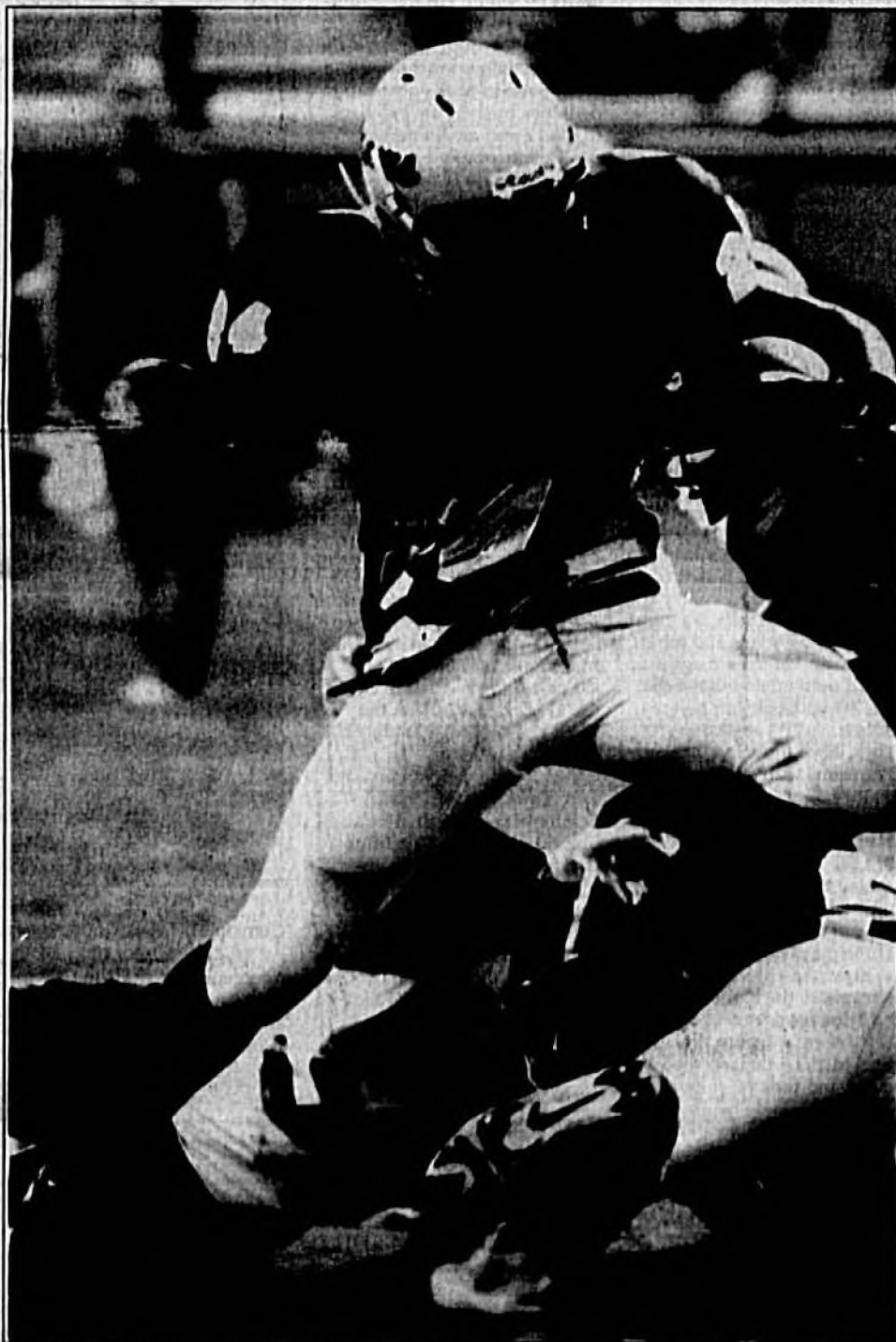
