Florida's Tobacco Crop for Year Is Sold at Good Price

GAINESVILLE, Sept. 20.—Florida's tobacco crop for this year has been harvested and sold with the results generally, the federal crop report for September states.

Total production of tobacco, the report shows, is estimated at 5,752,000 pounds, compared with 4,241,000 pounds last year. Several thousand acres of bright the cured tobacco were planted in Florida this year, and the crop has proven a profitable one. Figures on production by types will be published by the department of agriculture later in the year.

While Florida showed a substantial increase in its tobacco yield, the United States as a whole fell below last year's production, figures showing an estimated production this year of 1,195,000,000 pounds against 1,491,000,000 pounds last year.

Another of Florida's crops—peanuts—show an increase in production over last year. A slightly larger acreage will be harvested and an estimated yield of 55,711,000 pounds with 48,000,000 pounds last year, is indicated by the government report.

Here again, Florida keeps well ahead of the rest of the country for the estimated peanut production in the United States as a whole is placed at 615,000,000 pounds, a decrease from the 636,000,000 pounds produced last year.

HAGAN WINNER PROFESSIONAL GOLF MATCHES

Adds Another Title to His List Saturday When He Defeats James Barnes in 36-Holes Finals For National Professional Championship on Course at French Lick

FRENCH LICK, Ind., Sept. 22.—Walter Hagen, of New York, added another title to his list Saturday by defeating James Barnes of New York two up in the 36-hole finals for the national professional golf championship over the championship course at French Lick.

Hagen finally became dormie-two, only to drop a short putt at the 36th hole but Barnes threw away the final hole by punching his iron, over-approaching and falling to get down a long putt for a par. Hagen shot one under par this morning while Barnes took 75 but this afternoon Hagen scored a pair of 37's, while Barnes got a 71.

Outside of putting Barnes played Hagen at least even and the latter got so badly trapped on the 25th hole that he had to pick it up.

A large gallery followed the match through the entire 36 holes and at times saw machine-like golf. There were a number of occasions, however, when Barnes missed putts that the ordinary club could handle.

Hagen has played steadily throughout the tournament, qualifying in a tie for second place in 141 strokes and winning all his matches by a handy margin. His closest preceding contest was with John Farrell of New York who carried the British champion to the 43rd green, after he had defeated Tom Harmon 6 to 5 and Al Watrous 4 to 3.

Hagen had his easiest match Friday with Ray Deer of Philadelphia whom he eliminated 8 and 7.

Barnes has fought an uphill battle from the start and that has been his fate ever since he came to America. He played in championship several years before he was able to win the national open three years ago and in this tournament after qualifying with 148, seven strokes higher than Hagen, his very first match was with Mike Brady of New York, who was running up a few years ago in the national open.

Brady carried Hagen to the 30th hole. He not only shot a 69 in one round against Brady but he notched a sixty-nine yesterday in defeating Eddie Towne. Barnes shot even par in the third round to defeat Emmett French, 6 and 4 and yesterday had the second toughest match with Larry Nabholz, of Lima, Ohio, who carried the former open champion to the home hole and allowed him to win by one up.

Barnes, who had held the national professional title for the last two years, although he qualified with 142, was put out by Nabholz in the second round 2 and 1.

COCHRAN LOW IN FIRST ROUND AMATEUR PLAY

Plays Eighteen Holes in 67 With Bobby Jones of Atlanta in Second Place With a 72; Course Record Is Broken; British Make Poor Showing in Match

ARDMORE, Pa., Sept. 22.—Brilliant golf, including a record-breaking 67 by D. Clarke Cochran, of Philadelphia, featured the first 18 holes of play Saturday in the qualifying round for the national amateur championship at the Merion Cricket Club.

Out in 36, equal to par, and home in 31, three under par, Cochran led an international field in which most of the ten stars of Great Britain's Walker cup team fared poorly. He has an excellent chance to win the qualifying medal which will be decided when the field has played 18 more holes today.

Bobby Jones, of Atlanta, competing at the club where he made a sensational debut in national golf 8 years ago, seemed to have the lead without dispute with a 72 until Cochran turned in his surprising card. Bobby dropped to second place. Next came another prodigy, Roland R. McKenzie, 17 years old high school student of Washington with a 73, which was equalled by T. A. Torrance of the British Walker cup team, the only visiting Briton to be in the low seventies; E. J. Wright, Jr., of Boston, formerly of Los Angeles, and Dexter Cummings of Chicago, intercollegiate champions.

Must Make Under 80. If the excellent condition of Saturday continue on Monday competitors must get well under 80 in order to be certain of being among the 32 who will continue the tournament, starting match play Tuesday. There were 49 scores of better than 80 after Saturday's play, with 14 at 79.

Out in the danger zone, with 79 ordinarily enough to qualify if supplemented with another round equally as good, are, among others, Jess Sweetser of New York, former amateur champion and Cyril Tolley, captain of the British Walker cup team. Eight other Walker cup players seem to have slim chances to qualify.

The champion of Panama, Edmund I. Kopercki, took a 94 and is out of it. Three Canadians including the Dominion's champion, Frank Thompson, Toronto, must have exceptional rounds today in order to remain in the tournament.

Cochran, a semi-finalist at Merion in 1916 and a former resident of Baltimore, smashed the record for the new Merion course of 6,515 yards which, hitherto, has been over perfect figures but three times. We took 28 putts for the round and made six birdies. A bad lie caused him to go over par once, three putts were responsible at another hole and a hood, to a trap was the cause on the third occasion.

At other times he was long and straight from the tee and accurate with irons and putts. Never has he 67 been equalled in national amateur golf.

Bobby Jones was out in 35, one under par but slipped a bit coming home. He scored three birdies. On the 623 yard second hole he missed an eagle by less than an inch. His worst hole was the eleventh, where he got a six after driving to rough of deep clover.

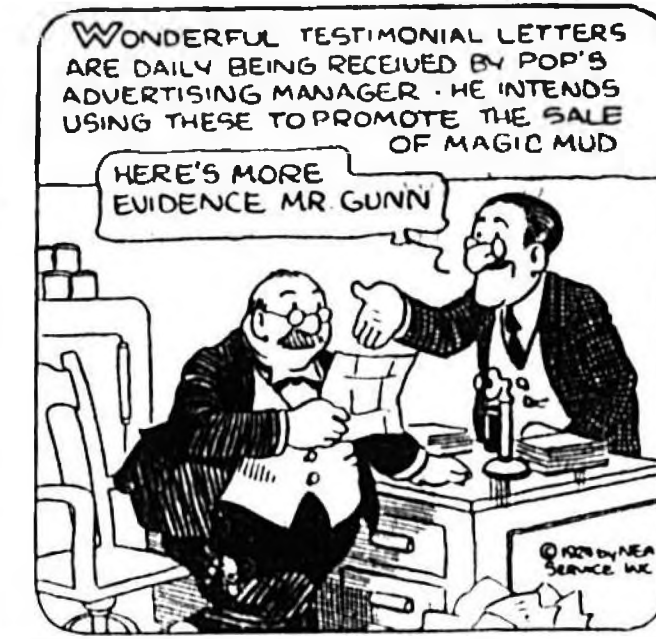
McKenzie hung up the best score of the day for the outgoing nine, his 34 being two under par. He had two birdies, used 31 putts and was over par on five holes in the round, once as the result of three putts, and on the other occasion because of visits into traps.

Tolley Just Breaks 80. Cyril Tolley, the mighty hitting captain of the Walker cup team, was wild with his tee shots. His 42 for the first nine holes, six over par, seemed to put him out of it entirely until he took a brace in putting and holed several long ones that enabled him to do the last nine in 37, two over par, and just break 80 for the round.

Francis Vannet played steady golf and if long putts had dropped for him he might have broken 70. He took five over par for a 75.

Jesse Guilford, of Boston, needed to play the last four holes in even fours to get a 70, but slipped a bit from what otherwise was almost a flawless round and took 74.

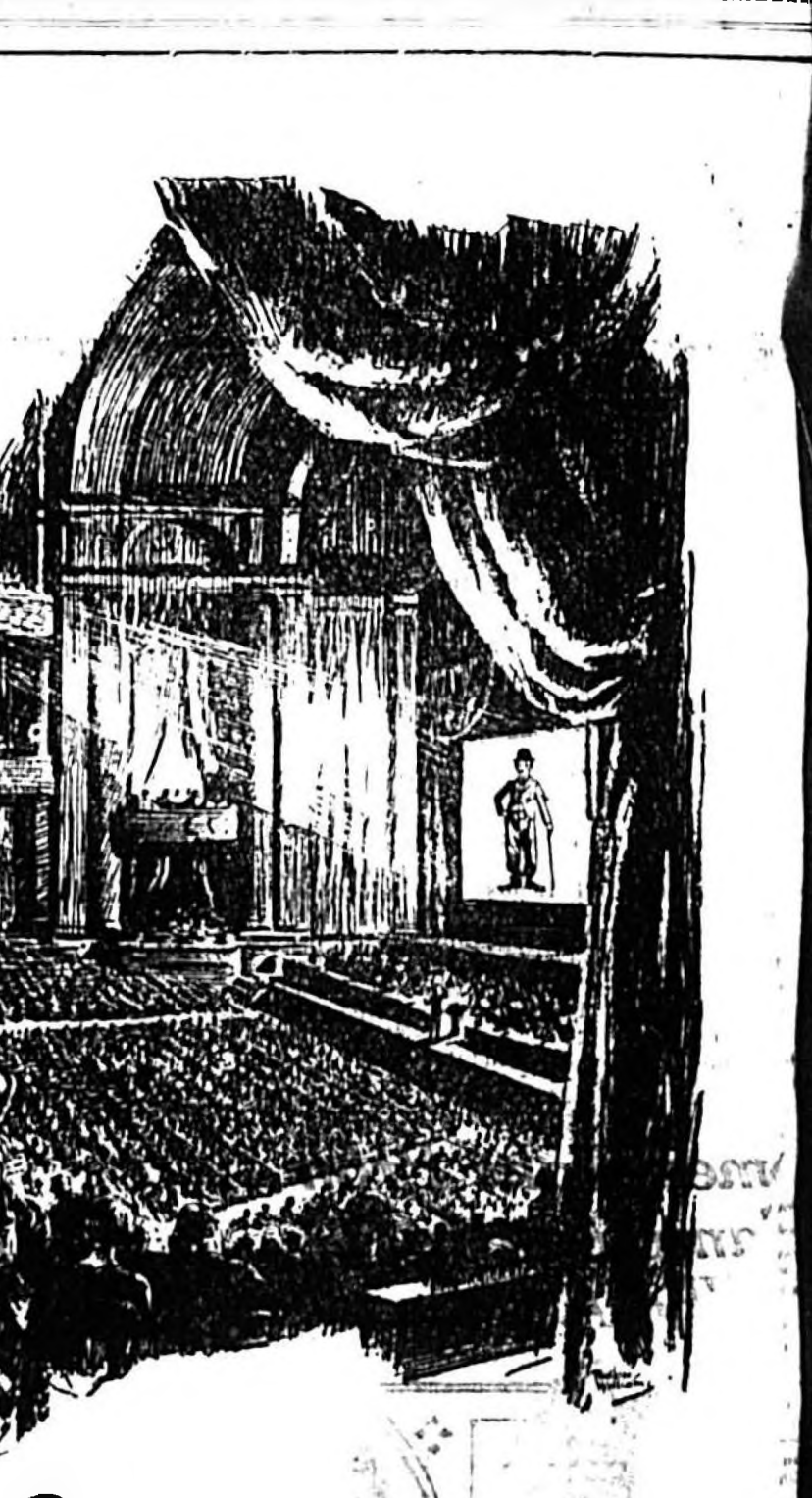

Geological Survey In Alaska in 26th Year

JUNEAU, Alaska, Sept. 22—The twenty-sixth consecutive year of investigating mineral resources in Alaska have been started by the Geological Survey, announced the Department of Interior.
The Geological Survey has mapped the topography and geology of more than one-third of the territory. It has investigated every productive mining district in a preliminary way and has mapped a few in detail. Since 1905 it has published annually statistics of mineral production. Altogether 280 reports have been published and more than 100 maps issued on Alaska's mineral production.

Tax Swindlers Drive Poles Over Frontier

WARSAW, Sept. 22—Its suspicions having been aroused by the abnormally small income returns filed by some important concerns in Polish Upper Silesia, the government sent a special mission to make investigations on the spot. It was disclosed that two industrial firms had carried duplicate sets of books, one secret and the other public. One concern reported a taxable income of 150,000 zlotys, while the hidden books showed it should have reported 600,000,000. The fines to be imposed will reach 5,000,000 zlotys. Some arrests have been made but the directors of the two companies have escaped to Germany.

Russian Detectives On Trail of Lenin's Diary

VIENNA, Sept. 22—Reports are current that the personal diary of Lenin, spangled out of Russia, was recently offered for sale in Vienna. These documents are being trailed by Moscow secret service operators, but up to the present they have failed to find them. The apartments of several Soviet Russians in Vienna, Berlin, Warsaw, and Prague have been searched, but without avail.

Parsons Must Acquire Better Pulpit Voices

LONDON, Sept. 22—The comedy person, one of the stinging jokes on the English variety stage, is threatened with extinction. With the enthusiastic support of the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, ascheme is to be launched in October whereby all theological students preparing for Holy Orders in the churches of England will be trained in the right production and management of voice.
