CROP REPORTS

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., April (INS)-Perfect weather prevailed yesterday and it was generally favorable for farm work which made good progress, according to the weekly weather and crop builetin issued today by A. J. Mitchell, meteorologist in charge of the local government weather bureau.

The complete bulletin follows: "There was a high percentage of sunshine, generally dry and warm weather, although the nights were cool. The week was practically without precipitation in all districts. The daily temperature departures ranged from 2 to 7 above the normal, and the rainfall deficiency was as much as 0.97 inch.

"The continued dry weather was generally favorable for farm work. which made good progress. The need of rain is orgent on most uplands, and the drought is acute ove the greater portion of the southern division, where citras and oth fruits were unfavorably affected. The planting of corn and the netting of tobacco and sweet potato slips continued where soil moistore was sufficient.

Early com and melons were cultivated; some corn is 'knee high' in the central division, and melon vines are 'running.' Oats are maturing in fair condition, although poor on uplands. Tomatoes are doing well in the central and northern divi sions. Shipments of beans, peppers squash, and other truck continued; tomate shipments were reduced from the southern division, owing

to unfavoreble markets. The harvesting of potatoes continued over portions of the central division, and digging became active in northern counties where, however, 'blight' is damaging some late planted fields, Early planted peanuts are being worked; planting continued. The planting of cane made good progress in the cane district of the southern division. The dry weather seriously affected truck crops in some districts of Lee


