Sheriff's office investigating armed robbery

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is investigating a robbery Monday afternoon, during which a shot was fired.

The robbery was reported at First Union Bank, 5600 Red Bug Lake Road, at approximately 2:20 p.m. The suspect walked into the bank with a duffel bag and ordered employees to put money in it. He apparently did not think tellers were putting money in the bag fast enough so he fired a warning shot from a handgun, into the ceiling.

On his way out, he dropped some of the cash, and stopped to pick it up. Before he left, he also ordered two employees into the bank's vault to get more money, but by the time they emerged, he had fled from the bank. He is said to have run, perhaps to a vehicle parked in a subdivision northwest of the bank. Nobody was physically hurt. There were an estimated eight to 10 people in the bank at the time including one customer.

The suspect is described as a black male, about 5 feet 10 inches tall and weighing 200 pounds. It appears he was wearing layers of clothing, with the outer layer being a poncho (it was raining at the time) and a hood that was camouflaged.

McLain withdraws bid for district seat

SANFORD —Daryl McLain announced he will not run for congress in the newly created 24th District.

McLain, chairman of the Seminole County Commission, announced in May that he would challenge Florida Speaker of the House Tom Feeney in the Republican primary. At a press conference on Sunday, McLain said he determined it was in the best interest of the party for him to withdraw.

"When I first announced my intentions to run for congress, I listed three primary goals

I wanted to accomplish in this campaign," McLain said. "First, I wanted to represent you, the people of District 24. Second, I wanted to help the Republicans hold onto their lead in the House. And third, I wanted to help President Bush achieve his legislative agenda.

"In recent days, however, I have come to believe that the best way I could accomplish

these things would be to withdraw from the race and support the Party and Rep. Tom Feeney's campaign for congress."

Feeney and McLain met Friday night to discuss the upcoming primary. By the end of the evening, McLain had agreed to withdraw from the race.

"Tom and I have known each other for years, and we've just recently become

rivals," McLain told a small crowd gathered in the Vigilante Room at the Orlando Sanford International Airport. "We talked about what's important — not to me and not to Tom, but what's important to the people in the district."

One item high on McLain's list was better communication from Feeney's office. McLain and his fellow commissioners have groused in recent months about the lack of communication between the state legislature and local governments, specifically regarding unfunded mandates or restric-

Information sought on father, son paving team

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is seeking information about traveling pavers, believed to be working in this area.

Bill Yates, 49, and his son, Jason, 22, operating as pavers, were arrested by deputies on June 27, for environmental littering over 500 pounds and trespassing. A deputy reported seeing both individuals shoveling asphalt out of the bed of a blue Ford pickup truck, in an area that was clearly posted for not trespassing. At that time, both men said they were doing asphalt paving in the greater Orlando area.

According to the sheriff's department Public Information Officer Steve Olson, the two bonded out shortly after their arrest, and there is a possibility they may still be operating in this area of Central Florida.

"We're still checking to see if they have a legal license to do this work," Olson said, "and we would like to locate them again to look into this matter more".

The sheriff's office issued a reminder to residents and businesses to check the credentials of contractors who solicit business.

According to information presently available, the two men have given their home address as Mack Smith Road, East Ridge Tenn., and Max Smith Road, Chattanooga, Tenn. They were using a blue 1988 Ford pickup truck, with a Tennessee license tag V91FE. A woman identified as Kim Yates is believed to be the younger Yates' mother, and was believed to be living in Titusville.

William (Bill) Yates is a multi-state offender with prior arrests in Georgia and Florida. He was first arrested in Daytona Beach in 1983, and subsequently in Orange and Brevard counties during 1988. His son was a single-state offender with a prior arrest in Chattanooga during 1998 for theft.

Children get an early start on fine arts

It's not often people see a van Gogh or Picasso hanging on a refrigerator.

This summer, however, students at Lake Mary Montessori Academy are bringing home pieces of art reminiscent of these and other great painters.

Commission decides to name road after Reagan

Between Sanford and the Orange County line, CR-427 is known as Sanford Avenue, North and South CRT-427, Longwood Avenue, East Lake Drive, and Sanford Brick Road.

Now, the entire highway is to be renamed Ronald Reagan Boulevard.

The matter was approved unanimously by the Seminole County Commission at its regular Tuesday morning meeting. Five city commissions had also been asked to approve the measure. The City Commission of Altamonte Springs has already been given a briefing but the Planning and Zoning Board will discuss it tonight (Wednesday), and their commission is scheduled for final consideration on Aug. 20.

Meanwhile, city commissions in Casselberry, Lake Mary, Longwood and Sanford have already approved the change and have informed the county of their decision.

All 300 property owners in the effected CR-427 area had been notified, with the county receiving nine responses against the renaming, and one in favor of the proposal.

Although not scheduled as a public hearing at Tuesday's county commission meeting, Kathleen Watkins, a CR-427 resident in the unincorporated area had earlier submitted a petition signed by several dozen of her neighbors against the renaming.

"We would rather it remain simply either North or South CR-427," she said, "and leave the street names alone."

She requested the matter be brought up at a public hearing, but the request was denied.

The Community Resources division of the county Planning and Development board had opined that the change would improve emergency vehicle response, assist delivery personnel and the general public in locating residences and businesses along the 427 corridor, with one

State Farmers' Market groundbreaking this Thursday

The Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services and Sanwa Growers, Inc. will hold a groundbreaking ceremony at the Sanford State Farmers' Market Thursday, July 11, at 11 a.m.

The ceremony will mark the

beginning of renovations that are to transform the Sanford State Farmer's Market into a state-of-the-art distribution facility.

Engineered Homes lowers mortgage finance bar to 4%

Engineered Homes and its home lending subsidiary have 'raised' the bar once more with an innovative financing program on the company's completed inventory.

The Winter Park-based homebuilder - one of Seminole County's most active builders with five communities - and HomeBuyers Funding have introduced a 47 percent Interest Only 30-year Adjustable-Rate Conventional Mortgage financing program for all of the company's completed inventory homes in Central Florida.

Engineered Homes, which cracked the 4 percent interest barrier last year with a special 3.875 percent financing program, currently has about two dozen completed, read-to-move-into homes in six residential communities in Orange, Seminole and Lake counties that are eligible for the limited program, notes Engineered Homes Sales and Marketing Director Marilyn Anderson.

The new 10-year, Variable Rate Mortgage Loan applies to those inventory homes that are contracted between June 9, 2002 and August 15, 2002. Payments made during the first 10 years will be interest only and fully amortized for the remaining 20-year term. The rate is adjusted semi-annually up or down 1 percent with a cap of 6 percent up or down for the life of the loan.

The interest rate is calculated at each adjustment term based on the 6-month LIBOR rate as

published in the WALL STREET JOURNAL, plus a margin of 2.75 percent rounded to the nearest .125 percent.

A minimum credit score of 660 and a minimum 5 percent down payment are required.

Compared to a conventional 30-year mortgage at 7 percent, the program offers the homebuyer a significant savings on his monthly payment - almost \$750 a month on a home purchased for \$250,000 in the company's Sanctuary community in Oviedo, says Anderson.

The Interest Only premium at 4.25 percent is \$841. That compares to a P&I premium of \$1,580 for a conventional 30-year, 95 percent Loan to Value at 7 percent. Neither example includes PMI or escrows.

"Even though mortgage interest rates are still very attractive to the average homebuyer, we feel we've made them somewhat more appealing with this new program," Anderson adds. "This program enables the homebuyer to purchase even more home for their money than they might with most other mortgage financing programs available on the market."

What makes the program even more attractive is that many homeowners today live in a new home an average of four years before moving on to their next home. And the interest-only aspect doesn't detract from those concerned about losing out on building equity.

"New homes in Central Florida have appreciated from

about 3 to 6 percent annually, depending on the market area you live in," says Anderson. "You will be building up equity with the home's natural appreciation."

Buyers can also apply money toward the principal if they desire, up to 20 percent of the original principal balance during any 12-month period without penalty during the first five years of the loan. If the loan is refinanced during the first five years or more than 20 percent of the original principal balance is paid during any 12-month period, a pre-payment charge will be incurred.

Many local homebuilders are offering low interest financing programs of their own, but Engineered Homes is the first to offer a program of this nature.

"It's a win-win situation," notes Anderson. "The buyer is able to get into a new home with a minimum investment and reap the benefits of home ownership."

Engineered Homes currently has homes available priced from the \$130s to more than \$450,000.

The company, which posted a record \$78.6 million in home sales last year, is building The Sanctuary in Oviedo, Egret's Landing in Lake Mary, The Retreat at Wekiva near Lake Forest, Buckingham Estates north of Heathrow, Lake Griffin Estates in Casselberry and recently launched Mission Park in south Lake County near Clermont.

Founder of Lake Mary computer consulting firm asks for streamlines security approvals

National security is a critical concern these days but federal security clearances for computer workers today take an average of 15 months to process and sometimes as long as two years, says a leading U.S. expert, and that thwarts the goals of both security and industry.

"It is critical to maintain security and we need to devote more and better resources to this problem," said Matt Moore, founder and chief executive officer of TEAM Information Services, Inc., a Lake Mary company with divisions in Jacksonville and the nation's capital.

Moore is also president-elect of the National Association of Computer Consulting Businesses (NACCB), the nation's leading industry trade association that counts a vast

network of independent consulting companies among its members.

"The standard backlog of 15 months for individual worker security clearances means we are significantly delaying the development of important technology that is critical to America's own security needs," said Moore. "We are outsourcing work, sometimes to overseas companies, that we could and should be doing here in the U.S."

Moore has an appointment in mid-August to meet with Sen. Bob Graham (D-Fla) to discuss the issue. Graham heads the influential Senate Intelligence Committee.

"If we can streamline the clearance process to reduce the delay to three to four months, we can

achieve a significant level of efficiency in the development of other programs and systems that require security-clearance workers," Moore explained. "In the case of programs that enhance U.S. security, from software and networking solutions at our nation's airports to programs for U.S. security agencies, the speed at which we can develop new systems is really critical."

TEAM Information Services, which opened its doors in 1991, now employs more than 450 computer engineers, software designers and technicians in facilities nationwide. The TEAM family of computer consulting companies includes the Vereon Technology division in Jacksonville and Dragon Development, Inc., in the Washington, D.C. area.

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Commission approves merger of two departments

Altamonte Springs Fire and Emergency Medical Services are going under the control of Seminole County. The merger was approved at Tuesday's Seminole County Commission meeting. Still to come however, are agreements on pensions being paid to the city by fire

fighters, as they are transferred to the Florida Retirement System (FRS). This is to be worked out between Altamonte Springs union representatives and County Manager Kevin Grace.

The official change is scheduled to take place Oct. 1. From that point on, the city will pay the county \$5,294,640, with payments made in installments in October, January, April and July.

The city agreed to transfer \$630,000 of the city's Fire Impact Fee Funds, for use by the county's Fire/Rescue-related capital improvement program.

While the agreement may be reviewed on five year increments. At that time, the county may continue operation fire/rescue/emergency operations in Altamonte Springs, or the city may terminate the

agreement with all personal property and facilities transferred back to the city.

While fire suppression will now be taken over by the county, fire prevention services within the corporate limits will be continued to be handled by the city.

These include fire safety inspections, plan reviews, fire investigations, code enforcement, and other fire prevention services.

Emergency medical services will be maintained by the county and will include, at minimum, one emergency medical service unit to be stationed at each fire rescue station within the city.

With the County Commissioners approving the measure unanimously, Commissioner Carlton Henley said, "I believe this is a great move for the county as well as the city."

DeLAND — If this keeps up they may have to rename the event the Post 53 Invitational.

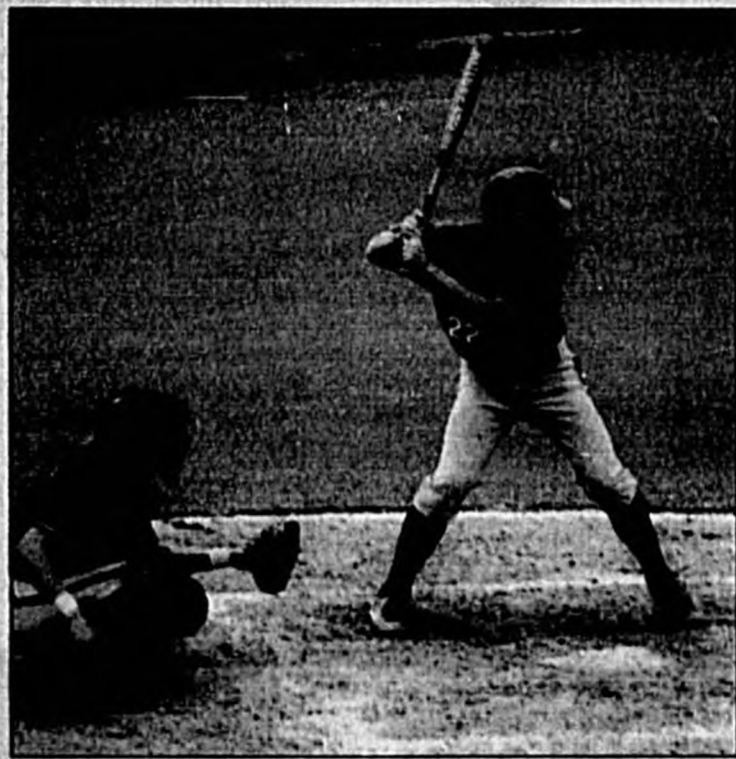

Ground breaking represents new generation for Sanford landmark

SANFORD — Old School met Next Generation at the State Farmers' Market on U.S. Highway 17/92.

Recognized as the nation's oldest state-run farmers' market, the Sanford facility is a reminder of the Celery City's once dominate stature in the produce industry. But with apartments and shopping centers sprouting faster than citrus or celery, the State Farmers' Market stood as a relic of the past. State and city officials gathered

Florida's Highwaymen plan Sanford visit

During the 1950s and '60s, a group of young black artists from the Fort Pierce area traveled up and down the state's east coast selling their paintings of Florida landscapes.

Decades later, several of these painters are stopping in Sanford to discuss the journey that has taken them from "starving artists" to becoming a part of Florida's folk art history.

The story of the Highwaymen began in the mid-'50s, when A.E. Backus, a Fort Pierce artist, allowed a group of young black artists to congregate in his studio to watch and learn the art of painting landscapes.

The young men were quick learners. With an entrepreneurial spirit, they decided to travel Florida's east coast and sell their paintings.

Using whatever supplies they had on hand to complete their artwork, they produced thousands of paintings depicting

romantic landscapes of wind-swept palms and placid waterways. Even before the paint was dry, the young entrepreneurs packed up their cars and followed the highway — selling their masterpieces in restaurants, offices, government buildings and any other place where there were perceptive buyers.

As a result of the group's marketing and sales strategy, the more than two dozen young men and one woman became known as the Highwaymen. During the two decades, they produced between 150,000 and 200,000 paintings and sold them at relatively low prices — usually between \$10 and \$25.

By the 1970s, however, the boom-market ended, and many of the paintings were moved into people's attics or sold at garage sales. It appeared the age of the Florida Highwaymen had ended.

One era of art history may have concluded three decades ago, but Art Chester tells his customers at Sanford's Something

Heroes in I-4 rescue 'just doing their job'

SANFORD — As the media gathered Friday morning at the Sanford Fire Station on French Avenue, Sanford Fire Chief Tom Hickson commented on the crew's bemusement with the commotion.

"They're sitting around waiting for the meeting to begin, but wondering why the big to-do over this," Hickson said. "They said they were just doing their jobs."

Their jobs, in this case, called for rescuing a woman Wednesday from a Ford Explorer that dangled precariously off the Interstate-4 bridge over State Road 46. The only things holding the SUV to the bridge were the bolts from the right front tie rods.

Hickson added that he was extremely proud of everyone who took part in the rescue.

Lt. George Seda, Gary Holten, and Karen Matthews were the key personnel in rescuing Christine McMichael. While Seda and Matthews had been with the department a number of years, Holten had only joined the Sanford Fire Department five months ago. All three said they really didn't know what to expect en route to the scene, but were prepared to do whatever possible. Matthews handled the bucket truck operation.

"It takes a group effort to do this," she said. She added that there was never any thought in her mind about how to place the truck on SR-46 to allow raising of the bucket.

"We just pulled up and did it," she said.

Lt. Seda, who received a hug from McMichael after he removed her from the car, said much of the success could be attributed to the young woman herself. "She was very calm during the entire incident," he said. "She only broke down and shed a few tears after we had her safely in the bucket."

Regarding the attention given to the saving of the life, Seda said,

"It's very seldom we get such attention, but I think it's a rare situation. We get, generally, mostly bad news. I'm glad this one turned out like it did."

Seminole County Battalion Chiefs Jim Dickerson and Norm Miller both took the opportunity to thank all others involved in the incident, including the Department of Transportation, Florida Highway Patrol, Seminole County sheriff's personnel and firefighters, and the city of Sanford and its commissioners, who only recently approved purchase of the new bucket truck to replace one that had become worn out.

City Commissioner Randy Jones, on hand to represent the

Sanford police arrest two burglary suspects

SANFORD — Robert Allen Kilpatrick 36, of West 14th Street and Sean Larue Atkins, 22, of West 9th Street, were arrested by Sanford police Tuesday, in connection with a residential burglary.

Police were summoned to a residence in the 2000 block of Rosecliff Circle in reference to a suspicious incident. A man told police he had seen two black males exiting an apartment carrying two suitcase type bags. When he went to the rear of the resi-

dence, he found the back door had been broken open, and summoned police.

With a description of the getaway vehicle, a white Ford Thunderbird, officers began a sweep of the city, and located the vehicle at the intersection of West 3rd Street and Cedar Avenue. At that time, an officer saw who proved to be Atkins, holding a black music keyboard, while talking to another man. When Atkins saw the officer, he attempted to put the instrument back in the Thunderbird, but was stopped by officers.

The two men were identified by the person reporting the incident to police, and articles in the vehicle, including Canadian coins, a laptop computer, computer printer were identified by the home owners as having been missing.

Following interrogation at the Sanford Police Station, both men were taken to the John E. Polk Correctional Facility.

Each has been charged with unarmed burglary to a dwelling, larceny of over \$300/under \$20,000 and dealing in stolen property.
