## Mythical Football Title Is Disputed By Several Of Nation's Undefeated Teams

When the season of a record-shattering football season of thrills and excitement has left a legacy of greater glory than any mythical national championship before than any season in years.

When Navy, Dame's "Four Bears" spaced victoriously far and wide in 1924 and Dartmouth's scenic artists decorated the trophies without much controversy in 1925, the close of the regular season finds at least four outstanding eleven's in the title debate. Rebuttals from two of three ways further complicate the situation.

The most conspicuous post-season prospect, a projected New Year's battle at Pasadena between Alabama's Southern champions and Pop Warner's Stanford outfit, titleholders on the Pacific coast, may do a lot to clear the air but it cannot entirely settle the issue. These two teams share with Lafayette the distinction of being neither tied nor beaten. Victory at Pasadena for one or the other would establish a strong championship claim as any contender.

In spite of its spectacular tie with the Army in Chicago's record-breaking service classic, the Navy still regards itself as very much in the running when title laurels are passed around. Simultaneously the Army's claim would seem to be on the same level, but the Cadets tasted one defeat at the hands of Notre Dame, while the Navy, up to its final tussle, sank all opposition in nine successive games against some of the most powerful outfits in the East or middle-West.

No team anywhere put in bringing a series of battles as the Maryland Sailors, who also covered themselves with glory in their closing fray. No such sustained offensive power as that exhibited by both the Army or Navy, but particularly of the Middle, has been witnessed in any other single game this fall.

Brown's top, enters some claim for recognition in spite of having its winning streak checked by a fight with Colgate. Notre Dame after eight straight victories over rugged foes and a defensive record of yielding only one touchdown had its case all ready for argument until Carnegie swooped over the prostrate Hoosiers in an astonishing 19 to 0 upheaval.

Notre Dame's elimination left the middle-West without a real na-

tional battle contender for the first time in years. Michigan and Northwestern, who finished tied for the Western conference championship, both met defeat by "outsider" the Wolverines leading to Navy and Northwestern to Notre Dame.

Except for a tie with Missouri, the Mustangs of Southern Methodist University, Southwestern champions, would be in the thick of the fight. They won all of their remaining games, Oklahoma Aggies, Missouri Valley champions, for the first time, met several defeats outside the conference fold.

While the argument of experts rages over the relative merits of these title claims, assessing of the more stable products of the season reveals these salient features:

- 1.—Establishment of new records for attendance and receipts, with estimates placing the total number of spectators at 15,000,000 and the nation-wide "gate" at \$30,000,000, featured by figures of 110,000 onlookers and \$800,000 in receipts for the Army-Navy game, breaking the previous high mark of 94,000 spectators, set at the Ohio State-Michigan contest at Columbus earlier in the season.
- 2.—The dethronement of nine of 15 of the 1925 champions in various champions in groups, featured by the fall of Dartmouth in the East and Washington on the Pacific coast.
- 3.—Elevation of the field goal as a decisive factor in an unusual number of big games, corresponding with a somewhat sharp decline in the general effectiveness of forward passing attacks, except those of Brown and the Navy.
- 4.—Emphasis on the development of eleven-man attacks as opposed to the one or two star offensives, a trend which produced fewer individual performers of the conspicuous stamp of Grange, Nevers, George Wilson, Oberlander or Flournoy.
- 5.—Agitation against the use of the shift play, culminating in the decision of coaches of the Western conference "Big Ten" to enforce a two-second halt after all shift formations, a move interpreted as likely to mean nationwide abolishment of the shift.
- 6.—Rupture of the historic "Big Three" by Princeton's break in relations with Harvard, brought about by apparent bitterness of undergraduate feeling and resulting in revival of proposals for an organized eastern "Big Ten."

## Harry Wilson Chosen Captain Of The Army Team For Next Year

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—(AP)—The Army's confidence in Harry Wilson, who failed Saturday to kick field goal that would have beaten the Navy, is attested by his election as captain for next year. The election was held on the train bringing the Cadets home from Chicago.

Harry E. Wilson, whose home is in Sharpsville, Pa., has three letters, for football, basketball and lacrosse. He is 23 years old and formerly attended Sharon, Penn., High School and Pennsylvania State College.

The season of 1927 will be his last at the academy and his seventh varsity football campaign.

It was the power of "Lightning Harry," once an all-American back at Penn State, that led the Soldiers one of the top teams against Navy, and his added three points after scoring.

## Dartmouth Star Is Partial To Rugby

OXFORD, England, Nov. 20.—(AP)—Nathan K. Parker, of Pittsfield, Pa., Rhodes scholar from Dartmouth, says that since six weeks in Oxford he has become an ardent convert to the English game of rugby football. He is captain of last year's Dartmouth football team, which came second in the nation.

He conceded the American football is a real sport, while American football has been reduced to a business.

Welfare Director Dudley S. Blossom, who, with his brother, John T. Blossom, has been named as a possible purchaser of the team, denies any intention of buying it.

Rumors that the club is to be sold were revived recently when it was reported that Speaker declared he would quit baseball if his salary was lowered.

## VANDY HALFBACK LEADS SOUTH IN SCORING HONORS

Battering Ram Of Tennessee Eleven Made Sixteen Touchdowns For 96 Points; Leads Nearest Man by 41 Points

ATLANTA, Nov. 20.—(AP)—Bill Hendrix, line battering fullback of the Vanderbilt Commodores, crossed his opponents' goal line just sixteen times during the 1926 Southern conference season to roll up ninety-six points for the conference leadership in scoring, figures compiled by the Associated Press today show. Aside from the sixteen touchdowns Hendrix failed to register a point the past season but he was forty one points ahead of his nearest competitor, Rauber, of Washington and Lee, and Peake, of Virginia Polytechnic institute, who were tied for second place with 55 each.

Meeks, of Mississippi A and M, and Barnes, of Alabama, shared third place with forty nine each, while Smith, of Kentucky, trailed them one point in fourth place. Fifth position in the standing was crowded with Thomas of Maryland, Wimberly of South Carolina and Caldwell of Alabama, each of whom claimed their berths with 42 points.

Caldwell's points after touchdowns gave him half of his points, 21 extra points being credited to him, he led the conference in this branch of scoring. Mackall, of Virginia, had the most dependable too for field goals and led with four.

Alabama's leadership of the conference for the third consecutive year, and high scoring honors for the past season, can be attributed to the scoring ability of Barnes, Caldwell, Winslett, and Taylor, who scored 176 of the Crimson Tide's 251 points.

Although trailing the conference with no conference victories, Sevanee's Tigers gave the organization one of its leading scorers Fullback Helvey, who placed sixth with 39 points.

## Middle West Likely To Stage Army-Navy Contest Again Soon

CHICAGO, Nov. 20.—(AP)—The middle-west, having made a spectacular job of staging its first Army-Navy football classic, may do so again before many seasons have elapsed, if the wishes of numerous high officials, as well as coaches of the rival teams materialize.

The service battle is slated for New York, probably at the Polo Grounds next season, when the Army has the choice of a site. The 1928 game is expected to be played either in Baltimore or Philadelphia, under Navy supervision, after which another proposal to come West may be considered. If it is St. Louis will be at least one rival of Chicago for the distinction of playing host.

"Navy Bill" Ingram, Annapolis coach, declared he would be "delighted to bring the team West again," adding that he did not consider the long trip a handicap to the players. "Biff" Jones, Army head coach, suggested however that five year intervals would be often enough to move the game out of its original eastern setting.

Herb Joesting, sensational Minnesota fullback, topped the Western conference list with 78 points. The same total placed "Wild Bill" Kelly, of Montana, in the vanguard of Pacific coast conference scorers.

Sanford people will receive this bit of news with a sense of pride that the State Comptroller should come to Sanford to find the man for so important a post, at the same time regretting that the appointment will cause the removal from this city, for the present at least, of so popular a man.

Mr. Tunncliffe came to Sanford several years ago to reorganize the Peoples Bank at a time when that institution was floundering on the proverbial rocks. He found its condition most deplorable and worked night and day to save it from complete wreck. After years of conscientious struggle, coupled with practical banking methods, he left his bank a few weeks ago one of the soundest in the state.

It is interesting to recall that the Sanford Bank and Trust Company of which Mr. Tunncliffe was president, was one of the few in the Manley chain, which did not crumble, or at least tremble, when dozens of others in the "system" began to fail early last summer.

The Commercial Bank and Trust Company was one of these. It was one of the first to crash and has been one of the last to attempt reorganization. Indications are that its financial condition, if any, is disreputable. Furthermore politics has contrived to become mixed up in the affair until it is all a grand mess. Mr. Tunncliffe will have a job on his hands. That is why a man of his caliber was selected.

### What Price Annulments

Much has been seen in the newspapers recently about the annulment of the marriage of Consuelo Vanderbilt and the Duke of Marlborough, and many folks are wondering just how it is possible for the Rota Tribunal to nullify a marriage of over a quarter century's standing just as if the ceremony had never been performed.

In 1895 the late W. K. Vanderbilt, ambitious for a title in his family, bought for his daughter the Duke of Marlborough at a reputed cost of approximately seven million dollars. The couple were married in St. Thomas Protestant Episcopal church in New York City and lived together until recently. Children were born of the union and apparently they were very happy.

But it seems that lately a rift has developed in the family and the principals in the contracting parties have been looking about for new hearts to conquer. Unfortunately their eyes fell upon those who happened to be members of the Catholic church, and of course, the Catholic church, disapproving divorces, does not sanction second marriages.

Consuelo and the Duke didn't know what to do until it occurred to them that the church might annul the marriage. Usually annulments do not take place thirty years after a marriage but the length of the union seems to have been overlooked in this particular case. They worked up a great story anent duress and coercion, which has proved wonderful reading to a scandal-loving public, in order to show grounds for annulment.

Apparently the Rota Tribunal felt sorry for what had been thirty years ago the poor little seventeen-year-old Consuelo, for the marriage was annulled. Now Consuelo and the Duke are free to marry their new and Catholic lovers, as free as if the Catholic church granted divorces.

But it seems that everyone does not believe that coercion was used thirty years ago to get Consuelo to marry the Duke. Says Bishop Manning of the Episcopal Church: "Many who were present at the marriage and were associated closely with the Marlboroughs at the time have informed me that they saw no sign whatever that the bride was acting under any compulsion, but quite of the contrary. I have the direct testimony of one who heard his statements that in view of the special circumstances attending the marriage, the rector of the church, the Rev. Dr. John Wesley Brown, took great care to assure himself that his young parishioner was acting of her own free consent, and that he was entirely satisfied as to this."

At least almost any fair minded person will admit this, if Consuelo was forced into the marriage she took a mighty long time to raise a kick about it. Probably the crux of the situation is just the simple fact that in the Catholic church, annulments are just as effective as divorces and are much more remunerative.

THE HERALD CONGRATULATES the Daytona News and the Daytona Journal on the merger, recently effected, of those two splendid newspapers. The new paper, the Daytona News-Journal, will issue both morning and evening editions under one management but with the combined staffs of both the former papers. The arrangement is an ideal one for a city the size of Daytona and should react greatly to the benefit of both the publishers, the advertisers and the subscribers. It has been rather poor business in Daytona for two newspapers since the collapse of the recent real estate boom, but the field is there for the successful management of one such newspaper as the merger will make possible.

### The Whipping Boss

The system of using whipping bosses in convict camps is a relic of past ages that is fast being abolished by the force of public sentiment, but in several states it seems as though the authorities in charge in some isolated sections of the country still use the antiquated method of punishing criminals. A South Carolina judge now announces that he will not sentence a man to a county jail where there is a whipping boss.

There are other methods of punishing criminals except by using the lash. When the whip is placed in the hand of prison authorities to be used on prisoners who will not work or who break other rules of the camps where they are confined, criminals out of all proportion to the offense which they committed are the result. One of the greatest prison scandals this state ever had to blacken its history followed the use of the whip in a convict camp on a young white man. The controversy that developed resulted in the lash being banished by legislative enactment, never to return.

### Use More Milk

Campaigns to encourage the adequate use of milk are assisting materially in reducing under-nourishment, Miss Jessie M. Hood, nutrition specialist, of the department of agriculture, announced on her return from a series of campaigns in North Carolina and Virginia, she advised that these campaigns are undertaken throughout the nation to spread the gospel of "using milk for health."

To Bishop Manning's remark that it is "impertinent intrusion" for the Catholic church to annul a marriage of two Protestant Episcopalians, performed by an Episcopal bishop in a Protestant church, Monsignor Dunn replies that the Catholic church derives its authority from its divine founder.

THE WORLD quotes Mgr. Massimo of Rome, "auditor of the sacred Rota," which annulled the Vanderbilt-Marlborough marriage, as follows:

"The Catholic church deems the Rota capable of examining the annulment, not only of Protestant but of Jewish and Mohammedan marriages, if the grounds are sufficient according to canon law."

HUNDREDS OF Protestant clergymen give excited interviews and the excitement promises to last.

It is, perhaps, over done, for in this country government and religion are separate. Legally, in this country, the least important justice of the peace officiating at a marriage in accordance with laws of the United States, has more power than all the heads of all religions all over the world.

Our ancestors were wise when they separated church from state, and our descendants will be wise to continue the separation. One government for one country is enough.

NORMANDY WILL celebrate the 500th anniversary of the birth of William the Conqueror, who sailed with 3,000 ships, 60,000 men and conquered England.

The celebration should include honors for Arletta, the humble daughter of a tanner of Falaise.

WILLIAM'S FATHER, Robert the Devil, would never have been father of a conqueror without that tanner's daughter, whom he saw washing clothes in a brook.

There should also be some mention of William's half-brother, the tall bishop, all in white, killed beside him at the battle of Hastings, a son of the same Arletta. She should have been made duchess and queen, but wasn't. It makes little difference to her now, fortunately, for surely there are no duchesses among the angels.

THE BOLSHEVIK government proposes to "tax private business almost out of existence, not quite." That's a sure way to tax Bolshevism out of existence quite.

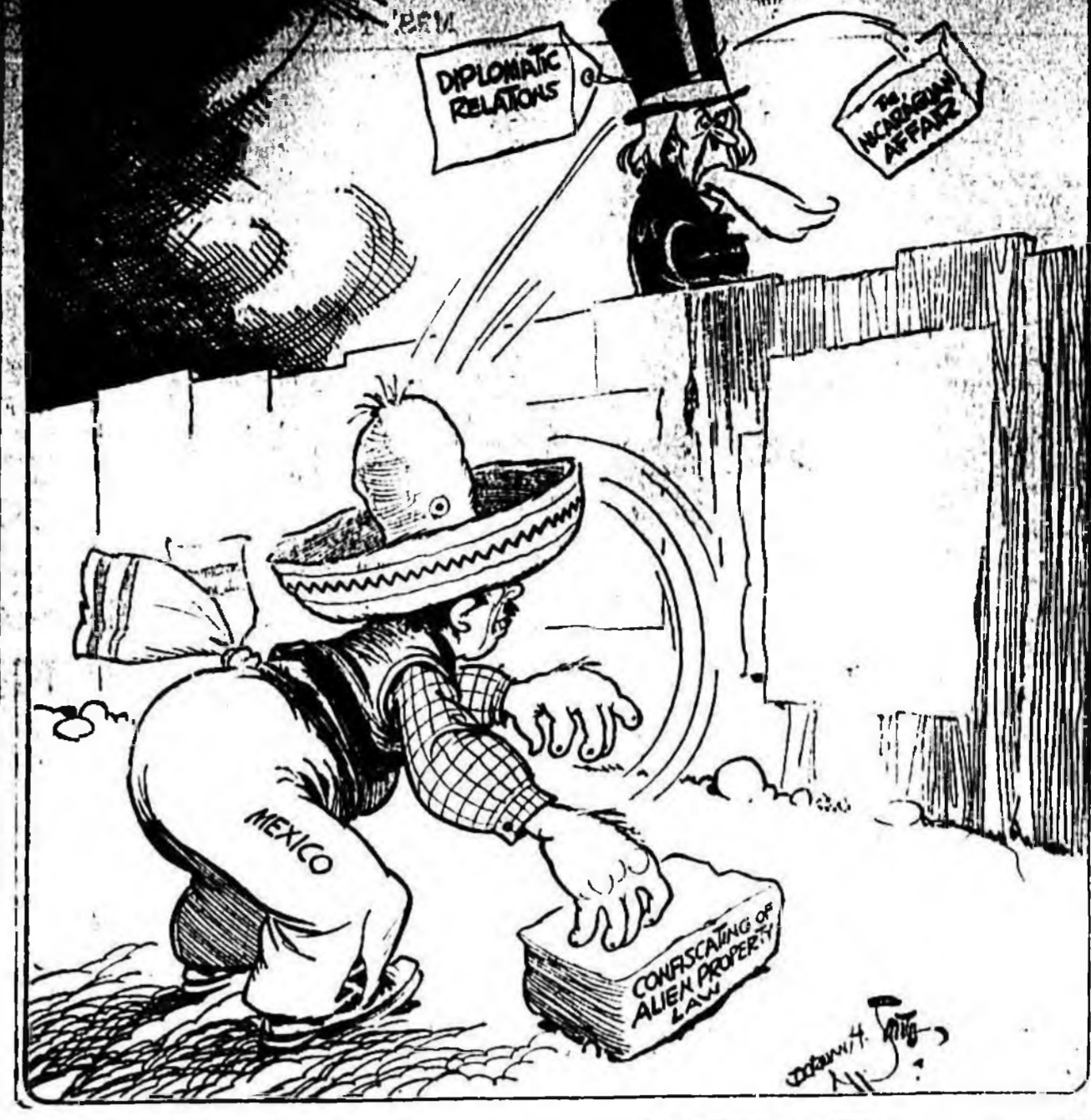

### Threatened Diplomatic Rupture

The government of the United States is said to have sent to Mexico what is virtually an ultimatum in regard to disputes as to the status of American claims to oil lands in that country. Usually an ultimatum means "Do what I say or fight." Neither the president of the United States nor any cabinet member serving under him has the legal power to send such an ultimatum, for the president has not the power to declare war. This power is vested by the constitution in congress.

But in this case the treat is not so very serious. It is to withdraw recognition which was extended to Mexico by the government of the United States a few years ago after that country emerged from a period of revolution, almost of anarchy. Mexico has been an independent nation for a century and her existing government is legal. The sun would shine whether the government of the United States recognized it as shaming or not. Mexico has adopted a constitution which, if applied retroactively, would interfere with the oil holdings of Americans in that country. No action has been taken that is complained of. This country merely wants Mexico to make a declaration of policy such as would make American holders of oil lands feel secure. We do not see that the dispute is ripe until Mexico has taken some action that has inflicted injury on American interests. Speaking generally, we do not like to see this country involved in a dispute with another over the interests of private individuals. Americans are not obliged to invest in Mexico. I f they do invest there it is because they expect to profit by it. They take the risk—let them take the consequences. No country can enforce its demands on another except by war and we do not like to see American men sacrificed to collect money for American capitalists. In this case it happens that some of the men whose rights are being urged in Mexico are being prosecuted in this country on the charge of having secured oil lands from the government by fraud.

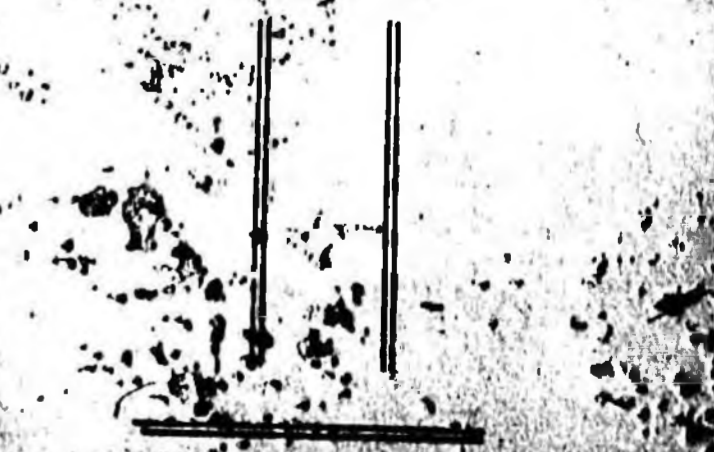
