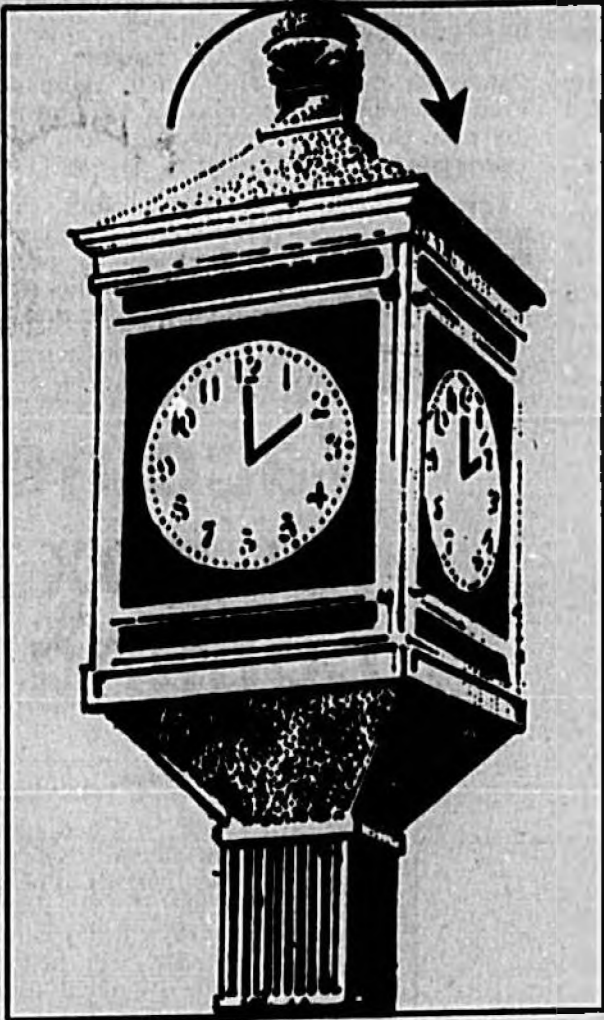

### Transportation hub revealed

SANFORD — The brief ceremony marking the inaugural arrival of Amtrak's Sunset Limited this morning, was also to include the announcement of a future public transportation hub in Sanford. The project will link Amtrak, light rail and the Lynx bus system, at a single facility, for residents of North Seminole and West Volusia Counties.

Findings from a preliminary study, sponsored jointly by the City of Sanford, and Seminole County, were to be presented by Mayor Bettye Smith, and County Commissioner Daryl McLain.

### Cadle asks McGregor be removed

SANFORD — In a surprise move this morning, anti-abortionist leader Bruce Cadle asked Seminole Circuit Judge Robert B. McGregor to remove himself from deciding whether Cadle and others violated a 1992 injunction against illegal activities at abortion clinics.

McGregor immediately recessed the hearing to decide the issue. Cadle, southwest field director of Operation Rescue, and other anti-abortion activists are facing jail terms and fines if McGregor decides they have violated his order.

During the recess, about two dozen anti-abortionists prayed in the lobby of the Seminole County Courthouse.

"Our Lord, our God, will destroy them for their sins," one man said. "You are the one who will punish the wicked. Let us rise up against the wicked."

Abortion clinic operators have testified prosecutors have obstructed their access to clinics and picketed at their homes and hotel rooms.

Cadle had called up to 40 anti-abortion protesters and clinic employees to testify today. McGregor has restricted him to 10 witnesses.

McGregor stated he hopes to reach a decision today and may decide to expand his injunction restrictions.

# Winn Dixie robbed

## Armed gunman, accomplice hit Sanford store

SANFORD — The Winn Dixie store, 1722 W. Airport Blvd. in Sanford was robbed at gunpoint last night. Two men reportedly fled with approximately \$10,000 in cash.

Early this morning, Sanford police reported only preliminary information is being released.

The manager of the Winn Dixie store would not comment on the robbery.

According to police Lt. Mike Rotundo, "At approximately 2300 hours last night, (11 p.m.), two black males, one armed with a semi-automatic hand gun, robbed the Winn Dixie Store on Airport Boulevard."

He said, "The man with the gun was described as a black male, approximately 200 pounds, five

foot eight, and about 20 years of age." He had no description of the other man, but said reports indicated he did not have a firearm.

"After robbing the store," he continued, "they fled and apparently ran south on foot."

Rotundo said police are checking on all leads and interviewing witnesses in connection with the case.

# Two murders resolved

## Top Warlock's slaying: Teen sentenced

SANFORD — A 18-year old Altamonte Springs youth was sentenced to 36 years in prison Thursday for the 1991 shooting death of Wayne Sanzo, national president of the Warlocks Motorcycle Club.

Freddie Mathis Jr., who pleaded no contest in February to second degree murder, conspiracy to commit first degree murder, armed burglary and grand theft of a firearm, will also be on 15 years probation following his prison term. He was credited with the 576 days he has spent in jail since the shooting in September 1991. Mathis' sentence was part of a negotiated agreement between the state and defense attorneys. If found guilty as charged of first degree

murder, Mathis faced 25 years in prison without parole.

Despite Mathis' age, he was given adult sanctions by Circuit Court Judge Alan Dickey with the concurrence of the public defender.

"Although Freddie is not as educated as he would like to be," Judge Dickey said, "I find that he is street

## Mom to serve 5 years for starving baby

SANFORD — A 24-year old Oviedo woman was sentenced to five years in prison Thursday after pleading guilty to manslaughter in the starving death of her infant son in 1992.

Under the negotiated plea agreement, Sheila Powell agreed to give up custody of another minor child in a case pending in juvenile court. She will be credited for 308 days served in the John E. Polk Correctional Facility and be placed on ten years probation.

Originally, Powell was indicted by a Seminole County grand jury for first degree murder in the starving death of her son, Dominique Lewis. The baby was born Aug. 10, 1991 and died Jan. 12, 1992. Manslaugh-

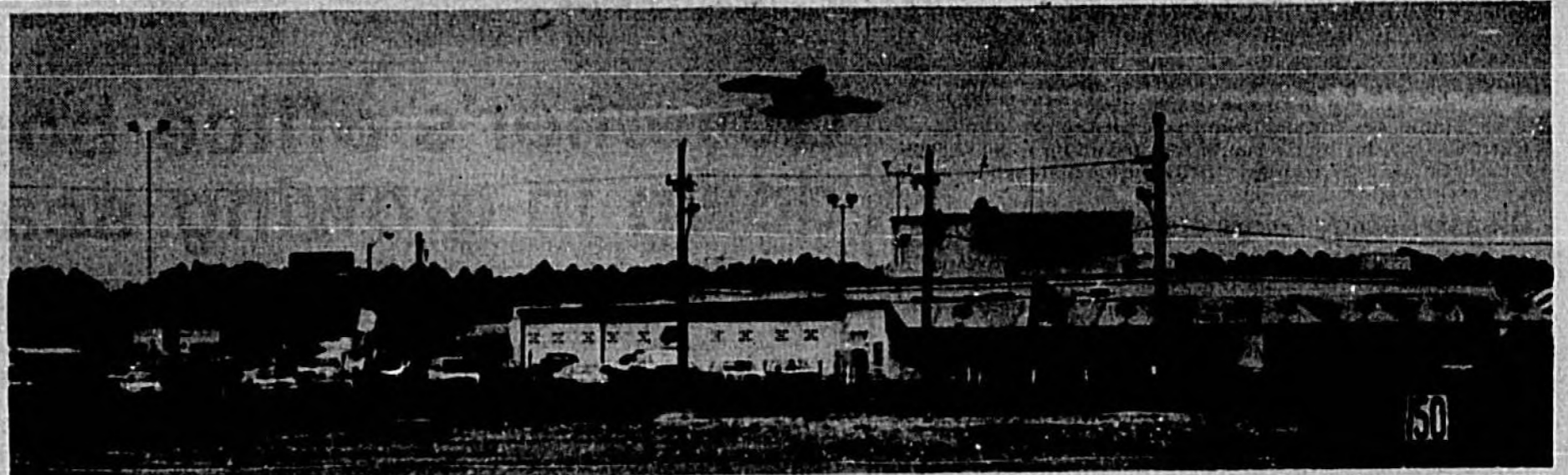
ter is a lesser included offense of the charge of first degree murder.

In addition to the other terms of the plea agreement, Powell is to participate in Project Independence through the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services (HRS).

Powell was indicted by the grand jury in March 1992 alleging that

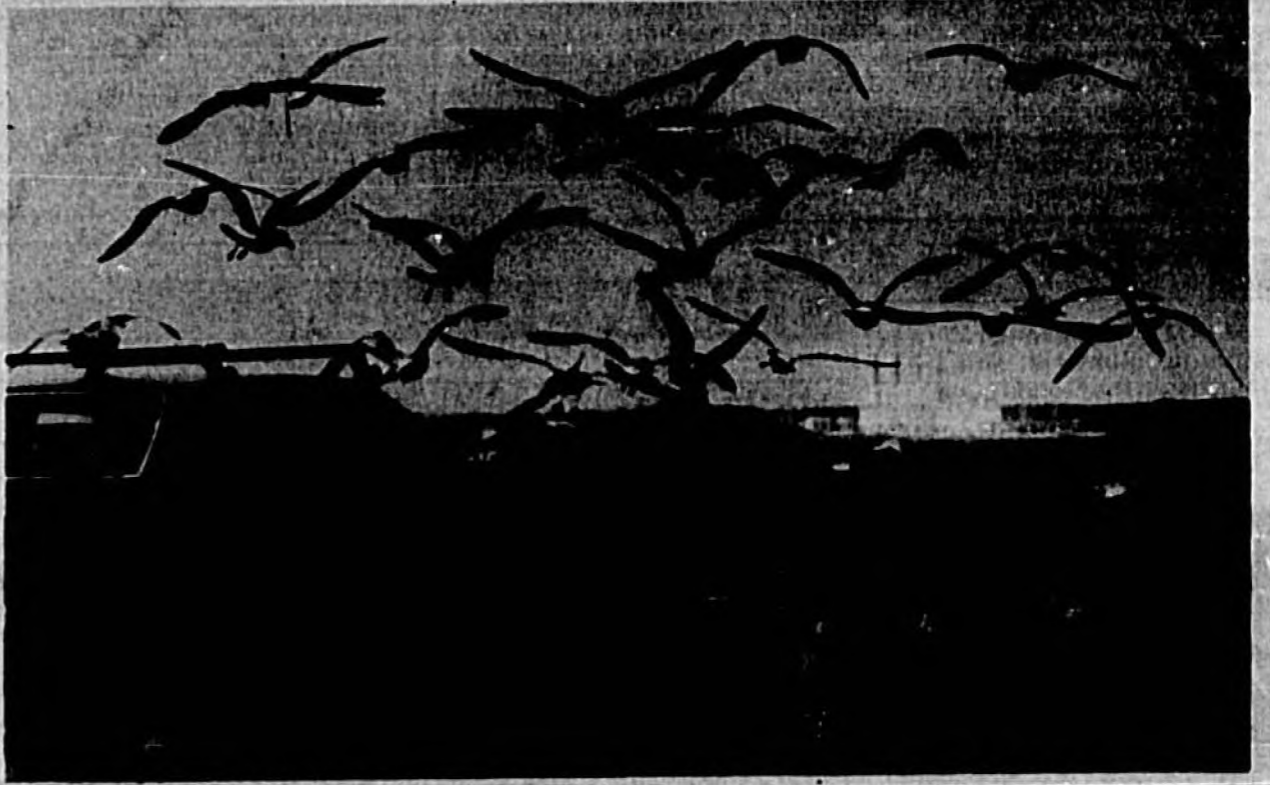

# Cable television cost cut draws criticism

SANFORD — The Federal Communications Commission has ruled cable television companies must cut their monthly bills for basic subscribers. The decision, made yesterday, is already drawing criticism from at least one cable official.

Storer Cable covers Lake Mary as well as Altamonte Springs and several unincorporated areas. Storer has 17,800 customers.

Local Storer manager Jeff Walker said he has not studied the FCC decision closely, but has received a statement from the Storer Senior Vice President Robert Thomson.

“The Commission has clearly pushed the outer bounds of its authority,” Thomson said in the release, “and in some critical aspects appears to have exceeded that authority.”

He continued, “Though critical details will not be known for several weeks, it seems certain the FCC has misinterpreted the 1992 Cable Act in several key provisions and imposed heavy-handed regulation on programming services and new technology that was not contemplated by Congress.”

“We suspect that much of what was done may not survive judicial scrutiny,” he added.

Cablevision of Central Florida serves Sanford, Longwood, and other unincorporated areas of the county. Manager Jim Rozier could not be reached for comment.

The reduction is due to a Federal Communica-

### Felon sentenced to electric chair

FORT LAUDERDALE — A seven-time convicted felon who beat and strangled two women for a Pontiac Trans Am and two bracelets has been sentenced to die in the electric chair.

David Pangburn, 33, his legs shackled and his left arm handcuffed to a chair, did not move or even blink Wednesday as Broward County Judge Paul Backman decreed his death.

A jury on Dec. 10 found Pangburn guilty of the Nov. 20, 1989, murders of Nancy Danata Matlawaki, 32, of Pompano Beach, and Nancy Marilyn Cole, 51, of Wilton Manors.

By a 7-5 vote, the same jury on Feb. 1 recommended Pangburn die for Matlawaki's murder and be sentenced to life in prison for killing Cole.

Backman followed the jury's recommendation, which Florida law says should carry "great weight" in his sentencing decision. It was the first time Backman has ordered a man to die.

### Torching tourists trial delayed

TAMPA — The trials of three white laborers in the New Year's Day burning of a black tourist have been delayed until June 7.

The trials had been set to begin April 12, but Circuit Judge Donald C. Evans postponed them during a brief hearing Wednesday.

The prosecution asked for the continuance after Mark Ober, attorney for defendant Jeffery Pellett, told the judge he would not be ready for trial because of several other pending cases.

Mark Kohut, 26, Charles Rourk, 33, and Pellett, 18, remain jailed without bond on charges of attempted murder, kidnapping and armed robbery.

They are accused of abducting Christopher Wilson, 31, a stock brokerage clerk from New York City, forcing him to drive to a remote field, where he was taunted with racial slurs, doused with gasoline and set afire.

Wilson, burned over nearly 40 percent of his body, is recuperating at his Brooklyn home and has only been able to identify Kohut from photographs.

### False magazine soliciting charged

FORT LAUDERDALE — U.S. News & World Report has filed suit against two Coral Springs companies, accusing them of fraudulently soliciting subscription renewals and pocketing the proceeds.

In the civil racketeering lawsuit filed in federal court here, the Washington-based magazine claimed that as many as 1,700 subscribers paid more than \$112,000 in bogus subscription renewal fees to the two companies.

The suit names M and H Publishers Service and Elite Services Inc., and Michelle A. Hayes of Coral Springs, listed as president and sole director of both companies.

According to the lawsuit, existing subscribers were offered a chance to renew the subscription for \$79.50 for three years, and if they agreed to send a check to a company bank account in Coconut Creek.

Magazine officials discovered the arrangement when subscribers complained that they were not receiving the magazine issues for which they had paid.

### No charges filed in death of tourist

NEW SMYRNA BEACH — A rookie police officer was driving a patrol car that struck and killed a German tourist earlier this week, police revealed.

No charges have been filed in the death of Christa Lina Emille, 67, of Berlin.

The officer, Ray Smith, 25, was placed on paid administrative leave after the accident Tuesday evening, Police Chief Denver Fleming said Thursday.

The Florida Highway Patrol had not completed its investigation of the case, and city police would not say whether Smith was responding to a call, whether his emergency lights were flashing or how fast he was going.

Ms. Emille was crossing a four-lane road to get to the beach when she was hit by the patrol car, according to an accident report. Smith was trying to help the woman when rescue workers arrived on the scene.

### Disaster study favors elderly

TAMPA — During a hurricane, special attention must be given the elderly, particularly those with medical needs, the head of a state disaster study group said.

"Mother Nature has given Florida a rough going-over the past eight months," former state Sen. Phil Lewis told a national hurricane conference on aging Thursday.

Last August, Hurricane Andrew devastated much of south Dade County, a region situated between Miami and the Florida Keys, killing 41 people and causing an estimated \$20 billion in damages in Florida alone.

A no-name winter storm two weeks ago thrashed the state with hurricane-force winds, claiming 48 lives and causing \$500 million just in insured losses.

Lewis, who headed Gov. Lawton Chiles' disaster planning and response review committee, said special shelters should be set aside for the elderly. And there should be contingency plans to meet medical needs, along with volunteers prepared to handle seniors.

## First transcontinental passenger train welcomed

ABOARD THE SUNSET LIMITED — The nation's first transcontinental train has received a rousing welcome in closing the "missing link" in Amtrak's passenger rail system.

A special inaugural version of the Sunset Limited restored east-west passenger service across North Florida Thursday after a 22-year lapse. The train was scheduled today to depart Jacksonville for Miami with 11 interim stops, including Orlando.

Regular service begins Sunday three times a week between Miami and Los Angeles.

The Sunset Limited is the first train in the 163 years of passenger railroading in the United States to make a coast-to-coast run.

Regularly scheduled passenger service between New Orleans and Jacksonville ended in 1971 when the Gulf Wind was discontinued.

"Don't you love a train — whoo!"

exclaimed Gov. Lawton Chiles when the silver double-decker pulled into Tallahassee. "It beats walking."

He is known as "Walkin' Lawton" because of his campaign hikes across the state.

Chiles, the son of a railroad worker, was instrumental in getting \$6.5 million in state money for rail improvements and station construction on the North Florida route. But he turned down an offer to ride the train because he wanted to remain in Tallahassee to deal with a contentious Legislature.

"If I could put 40 members of the Senate on that train and send them somewhere, I would," Chiles joked.

Bands played, officials spoke and thousands turned out to greet the train as it chugged from Pensacola to Jacksonville. The biggest crowds were in the smallest towns such as Crestview and Chipley.

In Pensacola, Bill Reeley wore an engineer's cap with insignia patches of the railways he has ridden. He clutched a signal lamp his father had used as a Penn Central

telegraph operator in Ohio, and he blew a wooden whistle that simulated the wall of a steam engine's whistle.

Chester Davis, who worked for 40 years for the Louisville & Nashville Railway, wore an L&N cap to the Pensacola ceremony and recalled his days as a coach cleaner and eventually a car inspector.

Davis, now retired, said the return of passenger service will enable him for the first time to use a pass Amtrak gave him 10 or 12 years ago.

"For travel it's just the comfort," said Pensacola rail buff and model railroad Fred Newcombe. "It's relaxing. I've flown a lot and there's the hustle and bustle. With trains you just kind of relax."

Leaning back in a coach chair that surpasses first-class airline seats in roominess, Austin Coates of Jacksonville, president of United Rail Passenger Alliance, said he couldn't explain the attraction of trains.

"Grown men become little boys when you start talking about trains," Coates said.

# Governor's office bogged down in growing scandal

TALLAHASSEE — Senate President Ander Crenshaw thinks lawmakers will find more problems with the state's social services agency, which is already reeling from a computer scandal that led to the dismissal of its top three administrators.

"It's like quicksand — it's going to swallow some people," said the Republican lawmaker, a possible opponent for Gov. Lawton Chiles in the 1994 election.

"Our approach has been to try to get to the bottom of the situation," Crenshaw said Thursday. "I think we're going to uncover a lot of mismanagement."

Chiles, meanwhile conceded that budget

director David Coburn was wrong not to tell him about the computer horrors at HRS.

"The first thing I heard about this is when he told me and said, 'I made a mistake.' When somebody comes to me and says 'I did something wrong, I made a mistake,' I don't have any problem with that."

Coburn waited for more than two weeks before informing Chiles about Medicaid errors that made an additional \$173 million available for the state budget. He also told HRS officials to keep quiet.

But legislators, concerned that Coburn may have kept the information quiet in hopes of pushing through a tax increase sought by Chiles, said Thursday they are troubled.

Chiles claims his administration is getting on top of the situation at HRS.

# Vaccine for pox coming

GAINESVILLE — Good news for parents: a vaccine that will prevent chicken pox could be on the market within two years. Researchers now will determine whether the shot will be administered with the usual litany of vaccines for toddlers.

"It's a question every mother wants to know because no mom wants to have her child pricked with a needle more frequently than necessary," said Dr. Peter Reuman said.

Reuman, an assistant professor in pediatric infectious diseases at the University of Florida, is heading up a study to determine whether the shot will be included with the required measles, mumps and rubella inoculation at 15 months. Clinical trials are being conducted on infants between 12 and 18 months.

If approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, the new vaccine could be available within two years, Reuman said.

The infants are being split into two groups to determine whether there are differences between giving the vaccine alone or in combination with the standard shot.

Reuman said out of every 100 children given the vaccine, only about four will develop a minor rash similar to insect bites within one to two weeks after receiving the shot. The reaction is not serious nor does it make the child contagious.

Some 9,000 children have been given the vaccine in various clinical trials since testing began in the United States in the late 1980s. To date, none have lost their immunity to the chicken pox virus, Reuman said.

The first step toward wiping out this disease is to inoculate children since 90 percent of them will contract it before the age of 10, Reuman said.

# FHP seeks drivers violating laws

SANFORD — "Smokey" could be on the lookout for improper vehicle equipment and criminal violations on area roads during the next five weeks.

The Florida Highway Patrol will establish vehicle checkpoints on several local roadways during the next month. Troopers will stop traffic during daylight hours to assure safety equipment is sound and vehicle registration is current. Any criminal law violations, such as drunken driving,

## Critics blame ads, cut rates for more women who smoke

NEW YORK — Smoking is up among blacks and women despite louder-than-ever warnings about the dangers, and critics of the tobacco industry blame cut-rate prices and aggressive advertising.

"The tobacco industry has targeted these two groups," said Stanton Glantz, a professor of medicine at the University of California at San Francisco. "They're recruiting people to kill, preying on groups that often don't feel empowered."

The Center for Disease Control and Prevention reported Thursday that a steady, 25-year decline in smoking has leveled off. The agency said 48.3 million adults, or 25.7 percent, smoked in 1991. In 1990, 25.5 percent smoked, the lowest rate since tracking began in 1965.

But the CDC said more blacks — 29.2 percent versus 26.2 percent in 1990 — and more women — 23.5 percent versus 22.8 percent — are lighting up.

The CDC's Dr. Michael Eriksen said people who would otherwise have quit because of the price are shifting to cheaper brands. Brands costing as little as \$1 a pack now make up about 30 percent of the \$44 billion-a-year industry.

And while \$2-a-pack taxes are being proposed in Washington, cigarette companies are offering rebates on cartons or selling 10-packs at half-price.

Tobacco industry critics also blame billboards in inner cities, sponsorship of cultural events such as the Kool Jazz Festival and the Benson & Hedges Blues Festival, and ads that depict thin, sexy, sophisticated-looking women.

"Marketing appeals to a person's sense of want. And the two top issues for young women are weight control and stress

reduction," said Regina Penna-Curie of the group Women and Girls Against Tobacco.

"The tobacco industry can change its identity to anything it wants. They're one thing in an Afro-American community and another thing in the Latino community. That's what they're good at, sponsoring a cultural event or a wet T-shirt contest," said Eric Solberg, executive director of anti-smoking group Doctors Ought to Care.

The tobacco industry denied any wrongdoing, saying it reaches smokers in rich suburbs with magazine ads as readily as it reaches inner-city blacks with billboards. The industry spends nearly \$4 billion a year on advertising.

"All advertising is targeted to its potential customer. That's Marketing 101," said Thomas Lauria, spokesman for the Tobacco Institute. "I don't think a billboard ever turned a non-smoker into a smoker."

## Bullet is recovered from Lee's body; probe widens

WILMINGTON, N.C. — The death of actor Brandon Lee looked like a whodunit after an autopsy showed he was killed by a .44-caliber slug, apparently fired from a prop gun that was supposed to be loaded with blanks.

Police said they would conduct ballistic tests on the gun, interview witnesses and screen footage of the scene being filmed when the 28-year-old son of martial-arts star Bruce Lee was shot on a movie set Wednesday.

A production company spokesman, Jeremy Walker, insisted Thursday that "there's nothing to suggest it was anything other than an accident."

The actor's publicist in Los Angeles disputed that view.

"How does he get a .44-caliber bullet in the stomach?" Alan Nierob said. "I'm not an attorney, so I don't know, but they'd have to be investigating murder. It's no longer believed to be a special

effect gone wrong."

Lee was playing a rock star who is murdered by a gang, then comes back to life with supernatural powers to avenge his death in "The Crow," an action-adventure movie.

The shooting occurred during filming of a flashback scene of the character's death. Lee was to have simulated being shot by setting off a small explosive charge hidden in a grocery bag as a gun was fired at him.

The gun was fired from 15 feet away and Lee collapsed, police said. The bullet entered his abdomen and lodged against his spine.

Police wouldn't disclose who fired the gun and said they weren't certain whether the death was foul play or a freak accident.

"We don't have enough information to make a determination one way or the other," Capt. L.P. Thomas said.

Typically, blank pistols fire only powder and wadding, but they can fire live shells.

## Limiting salaries

One of the economic proposals put forth by President Clinton to allegedly increase taxes is being used to make a political statement while having virtually no impact on our deficit. This proposal would disallow deductions by an employer of the "excessive" portion of the salaries of CEOs. He has suggested that executives' salaries in excess of \$1 million would be "excessive" and thus not deductible by corporations. This may force corporations to limit salaries of its CEOs to \$1 million or below. The initial reaction of most people is to agree with the president.

This proposal has a fundamental flaw. In this country we pride ourselves on having a free enterprise system based on a market economy. The president's proposal only makes sense under a government-controlled economy. There are better ways within our existing free market system to control CEO salaries if that is desirable. In practically every case involving publicly owned companies the CEO owns only a small percentage of the shares of stock of the corporation. The stockholders, if they cared enough, could vote to limit the CEO's salary. Some may claim, as a practical matter, this is difficult if not impossible to actually accomplish, but this difficulty is not sufficient justification to change the basic philosophy of our market system.

If salaries of some business executives appear excessive, what should be done about sports figures or those in the recording or movie industry who enjoy the same or even greater incomes per year? For instance, Shaquille O'Neal is reported to have received a contract for \$40 million in salary over seven years. Will the President's proposal limit the Orlando Magic's deduction to only \$1 million per year?

One could argue that hallayers and entertainers should not be included because they are independent contractors or employees, not executives. Should it make a difference as to how you make your money? Should we adopt an economic policy that punishes making money by using your brains, yet rewards making money by the use of athletic ability or artistic talent? To try and distinguish between Michael Eisner, president of Walt Disney and Shaq O'Neal seems inappropriate. Both are outstanding in their fields. Both deserve the economic benefits of their negotiated contracts. Both are prime examples of individuals who have realized the American Dream. The dream should not become a nightmare because you use your brains not your brawn.

## Let U.N. be our brother's keeper

A peacekeeping force is like brotherhood. Everybody believes in it, but nobody wants the wrong "brother" living next door. Everybody wants a U.N. peacekeeping force to put out global brush fires, but few are willing to pay for it.

Peacekeeping has suddenly mushroomed into a global industry. A few days ago, I heard a radio report on thousands of Sudanese who are dying at a higher rate than the people of Somalia.

The reasons for these mass deaths are different. Somalians are dying of starvation, their survival held hostage by genocidal warlords. Southern Sudanese, most of whom are Christian or animists, are being slaughtered by the Muslim government's version of ethnic cleansing.

The Sudanese government's orgy in death is not unique. Mutual destruction in Bosnia-Herzegovina, reciprocal Hindu-Muslim slaughter in India, and the Bosnian Serbs' war against humanity.

In 11 other areas around the world, U.N. peacekeeping forces are trying to keep the peace, in some instances doing the work that previously was a primary obligation of American armed forces.

That raises the question of global responsibility. Are we our brothers' keepers everywhere? What decides where we should keep the peace?

What is the cutoff point for humanitarian aid in dollars? If we encourage the U.N. peacekeeping forces to replace American troops, should American troops be a part of such forces, and if they should, do we surrender a part of our national sovereignty to an international agency?

Some of the members of Congress who are urging that American military firefighters be dispatched to put out other nations' fires are also screaming the loudest about the escalating costs and the underlying danger of U.S. military sovereignty being compromised.

Typical of such hypocrites, they want it both ways. But ultimately, there can be an alternative to the United Nations as the world's major

peacekeeping force. This nation cannot cut spending by almost \$300 billion and simultaneously maintain the same level of foreign aid — military or humanitarian — that has been part of its international commitment since World War II.

Gradually and subtly, the United Nations has grown in international prestige as it has increased its peacekeeping responsibilities. As a Congressional Quarterly article recently pointed out, the U.N. Security Council's approval of 14 peacekeeping missions since 1988 is one more than it approved in the previous 40 years. From 1992 through the end of 1993, the United Nations is expected to spend more than \$3.6 billion on peacekeeping missions, again, as CQ reported, about 10 times its expenditures from the same period six years earlier.

Compared to the \$100 billion budget that the U.S. billion doesn't seem like an exorbitant sum. But when you match it against the 1990 total of U.S. foreign aid of \$11.9 billion — \$9.3 billion of which went to only two countries, Egypt and Israel — then it takes on an economic life force of its own. Right now, according to the State Department, this nation owes the United Nations \$240 million for dues and \$40 million for peacekeeping activities.

## More military base closures likely

WASHINGTON — Defense Secretary Les Aspin has asked the Base Closure Commission to shut 31 major bases, and to close, consolidate or redesign 134 smaller installations. Over the next three months, dozens of communities will present elaborate arguments about why their local bases should be spared. Their plans will probably fall on deaf ears.

Actually, based on the commission's initial public hearings and in off-the-record conversations with its staff, it appears likely that the final recommendation will actually add bases to the Pentagon's list.

This is the second of three aimed rounds of base closures. Over the years Congress found it all but politically impossible to close unneeded military bases. So it set up an elaborate process to try to take the decisions out of the political realm.

Under the law, in 1991, 1993 and 1995 each of the uniformed services must examine its base structure in light of future manning plans to determine where excess capacity exists. Each service then recommends closures, consolidations and realignments to the secretary of defense. He reviews the list, makes additions or deletions, and forwards the recommendations to the Base Closure Commission whose eight members have been appointed by the president and confirmed by the Senate.

The commission can do as it wishes with the list. It can remove bases, it can add bases, and it can recommend — but only recommend — consolidations and realignments. The list then goes to the president on July 1. He has 30 days in which to approve or reject it. He may not make changes, and if he rejects the list, there will be no closures at all. If he approves the list, it goes to Congress and becomes effective within 30 days both the House and Senate vote it down.

There is no doubt that bases must be closed. In the post-Cold War era, the number of people in uniform is already slated to come down 34 percent, but so far — even with the 1991 round of base closings — the base structure to house them shrank only 9 percent. If all the bases on the Aspin list are approved, the base structure will only shrink by a total of 15 percent. Many more bases will have to be closed in 1995.

At first glance the list of recommended closures seems unbalanced, even unfair. The Navy will close 23 major bases, including all its installations in Charleston, S.C., and the San Francisco Bay area, while the Army is closing only two major bases. Some headlines say the Navy is being "picked on," but there are actually complex and valid reasons for the seeming discrepancy.

In the last round of closings, the Army was much more aggressive than the Navy. Now the Navy is playing catch-up. Also, the Army is

still in the middle of a major reorganization of its forces, and it cannot really decide which additional bases to close until it knows how many heavy and how many light divisions it will have in the future. The Army says it will recommend major closings for the 1995 round.

As for the hard hits on Charleston and San Francisco, the Navy has simply made two tough choices: San Diego over San Francisco, Norfolk and Portsmouth, Va., over Charleston.

While most communities losing bases are upset, the major controversy so far is actually over two bases not on the list. At the last moment, Aspin bent to considerable political pressure and removed two California bases — McClellan Air Force Base in Sacramento and the Presidio in Monterey — from the final list.

Aspin told the commission he made the change because of the "cumulative total economic impact" the 1991 round and this round was having on northern California. Later, though, acting Air Force Secretary Michael Donley and Asst. Sec. James Benbright — who ran the Air Force's internal base closure committee — admitted there was no military reason to keep McClellan open, and a host of reasons to close it.

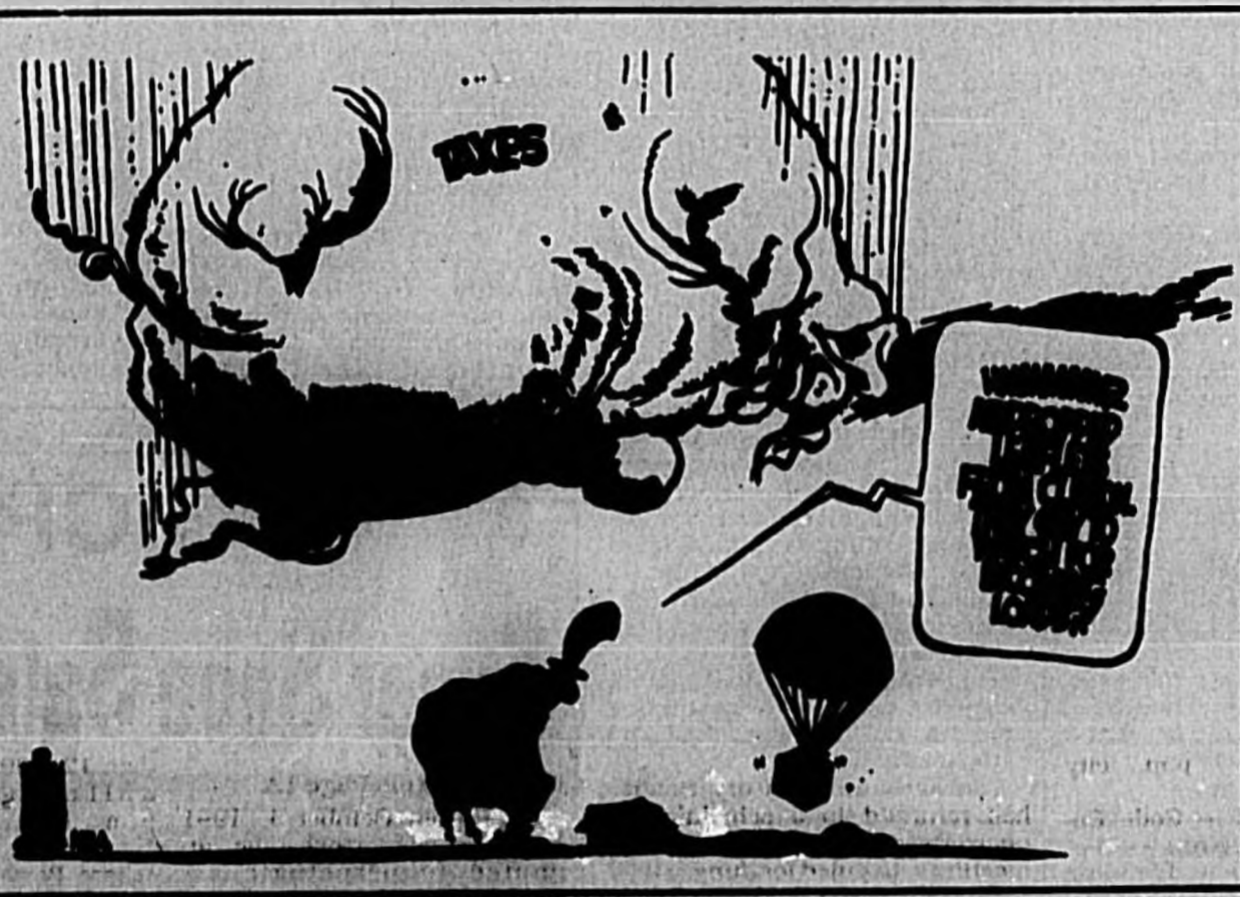
Insiders are guessing that McClellan and Monterey will end up back on the commission's final list. Effectively, Aspin all but asked the commission to overrule him. He could not come out and say it point blank, but the clear subtext was that he lacked the political clout to close McClellan, but that the commission could — and probably should — do it.

The commission also is very upset over attempts by communities to buy their way out of Pentagon decisions. Chicago, for instance, is offering to pay to have an Air Force reserve unit removed from O'Hare Airport and relocated to Rockford, Ill. In another case, Columbus, Ohio, is taking over the operation of Richman AFB, which is slated to close, and turning it into a municipal airport to keep a large reserve unit there.

If this is allowed, some commission members believe, a precedent will be set allowing wealthy communities to keep bases open by offering to pay part or all of their expenses.

## Boxing tied to organized crime?

WASHINGTON — More than 30 years after the late Sen. Estes Kefauver probed professional boxing and concluded it was "infested by racketeers and hoodlums," Sen. William Roth, R-Del., is investigating whether or not three active boxers have connections to organized crime figures.

All three boxers are current or former champions, and two of them were subpoenaed to testify at an April 1 congressional hearing where evidence gathered during Roth's 14 month investigation is to have been unveiled. Roth is the ranking Republican on the Senate's permanent subcommittee on investigations.

Security for the hearing is to have been extremely tight because the star witness will be mobster-turned-government informant Salvatore "Sammy the Bull" Gravano. The former right-hand man to John Gotti ("the Teflon Don"), Gravano has been a

marked man ever since his nine days of riveting testimony last year helped put Gotti behind bars for life.

The three boxers are: Bobby Czyz, the current WBA Cruiserweight champion; James "Buddy" McQuirk, who lost his WBC Welterweight title less than a month ago; and Iran Barkley, who lost his IBF Super Middleweight title in February. McQuirk and Barkley have both been subpoenaed to testify, but Czyz testified at a Roth hearing last summer so he was not called for this one.

"They're trying to focus on organized crime, but I don't know anything about organized crime," McQuirk told us. Barkley's attorney, Mark Tuohy, told us that Barkley's testimony is "quite insignificant to the organized crime debate. He's not a target." Czyz could not be reached for comment.

According to a draft copy of Roth's opening statement for the hearing, he says: "I would like to be able to say that professional boxing has cleaned up its act and organized crime is no longer among the sport's many problems. But ... that is not what the evidence shows. Instead, the evidence shows that the tentacles of organized crime still extend to the boxing ring, squeezing the mob's cut out of boxers."

"The boxer may even be an unwitting dupe in the whole scheme," Roth said in the statement obtained by our associate Ed Henry. "However ... it is the boxer and the public who lose — whether the boxer knows it or not."

Five other members or associates of organized crime families are expected to testify. But the star attraction will undoubtedly be Gravano, who's been given a new nickname by his former friends in the underworld: "Sammy the Rat."

With his gravelly voice and intimate knowledge of the mob, the 48-year-old Gravano has become a marquee government witness from coast to coast. There is such a demand for his services that Roth was forced to delay the hearing for a few weeks until Gravano's schedule opened up. In exchange for at least two more years of being a government witness, Gravano will serve a lighter sentence for his own crimes (he has admitted to having some involvement in 19 murders) and then be given a new identity under the federal Witness Protection Program.

Gravano is expected to tell the subcommittee how changes in the boxing industry have made the mob less likely to fix fights and more likely to seek control of individual boxers. This allows crime families to take a cut straight from the hefty paychecks of today's fighters and cheat behind the scenes for extra profits.

# Lake Mary cuts costs as prelude to 1993-94 budget

**LAKE MARY** — Cost-cutting is growing in Lake Mary City Commission meetings. Commissioners say it is a prelude to the beginning of work on the 1993-94 fiscal year budget.

During Thursday night's meeting, two purchase proposals were voted on, with the end result of the city saving approximately \$15,000 in expenditures.

One item, a proposal for a new sound system to be installed in the commission chambers, was turned down. The plan was to provide new microphones and equipment to improve the sound in the room during meetings, as well as sound carried to homes through cable TV coverage of

the microphones during the meeting on March 18. They attach to a coat or tie, eliminating the sound losses caused when a commissioner turns his head away from the stand-mike to address a fellow commissioner.

Although members of the commission agreed the sound was improved, the purchase price for the new system, \$6,985, was turned down. "This would be a great improvement in the sound system," said Mayor Lowry Rockett, "but I don't think it's economically feasible for us to buy this now. I would rather have it put into consideration for next year's budget."

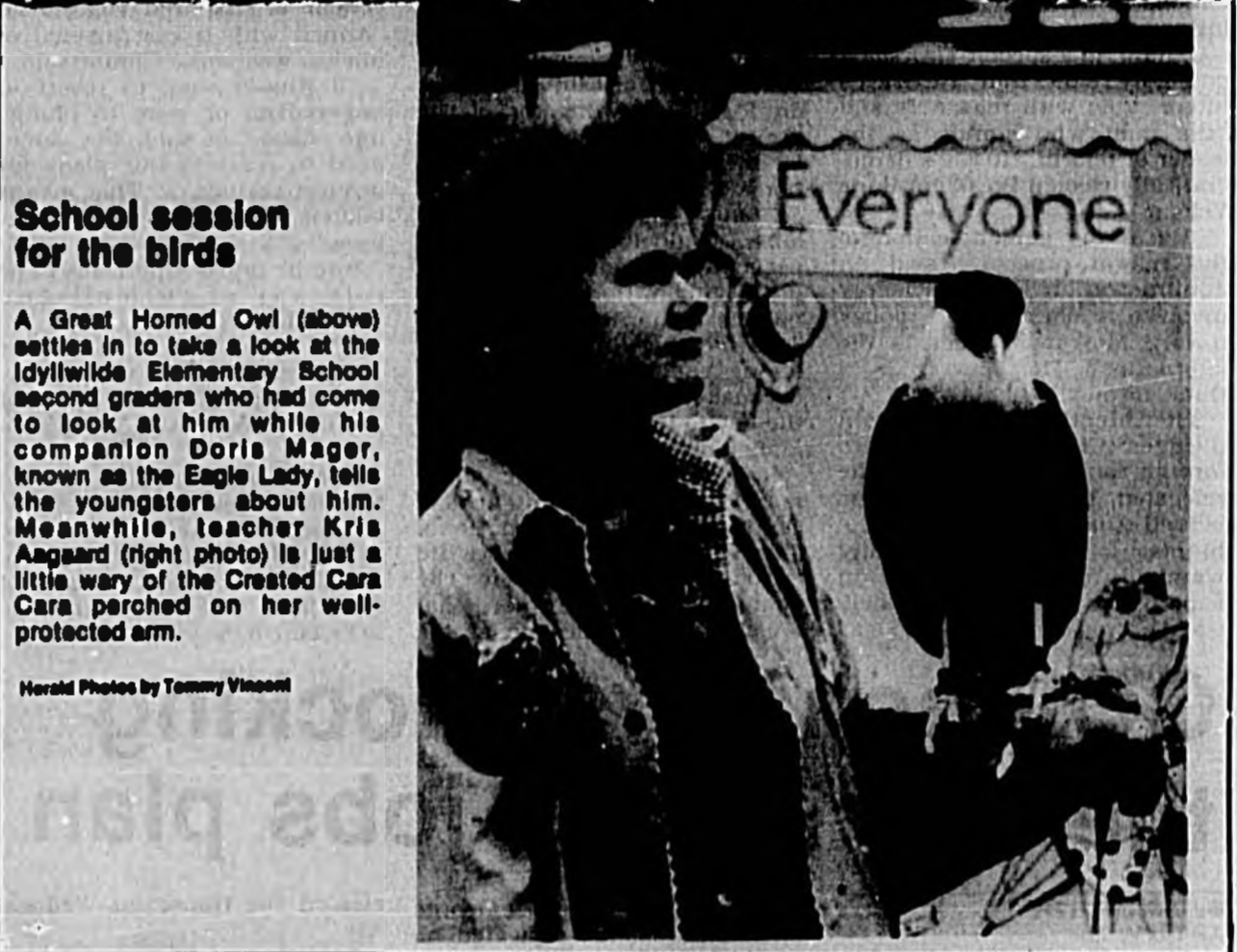
The other item was a reduction in automatic defibrillators, requested by the Lake Mary Fire Department. Although the city

units, the company from which the purchase was to be made failed to supply the units.

At the request of City Manager John Litton, the original contract was nullified, and one, rather than two units, were approved for purchase from another contractor. The cost through the change in contractors plus the reduction of units, resulted in a saving of almost \$8,000.

Police Chief Robert Stoddard was pleased with the change. "The new unit is even better than the first we attempted to obtain," he said. "It is more simple to operate and would better serve our current needs."

# Senate votes 22-14 against health care reform proposal

**TALLAHASSEE** — The confrontation between the Senate and Gov. Lawton Chiles over health care continued on the eve of the final day of the regular session with a 22-14 vote defeating a provision backed by Chiles.

"We don't believe this bill will ensure access to the 2 1/2 million Floridians who need it," Chiles' spokeswoman Julie Anbender said shortly after the vote late Thursday.

The senators planned to finish work on the legislation (CS-SB 1914) today, but it was with the threat of a special session on

health care hanging over them.

"The governor has been very clear about wanting to fulfill the promise we all made," Anbender said, referring to a 1995 deadline for reform set by the Legislature last year. "That may require a special session."

A key fight has been over the power of the 11 regional alliances that would be set up to pool the purchasing power of the public and private sectors. Chiles wants language that would have the alliances provide "member purchasing services" as well as information about health care options. An amendment by Sen. Kenneth Jenne, D-Fort Lauderdale, included those words.

That's too much, said Republican Sen. Alberto Gutman of Miami, chairman of the Senate Health Care Committee.

"Senator Jenne's amendment states that the board has the power to negotiate and purchase on behalf of those alliance members," Gutman said. "That's what those three words mean."

He offered a substitute amendment that deleted the phrase from the definition of Community Health Purchasing Alliance.

"I am not in favor of another information-gathering activity," Jenne replied.

From October 1, 1991 until Jan. 12, 1992, she attempted to perpetuate aggravated child abuse by starving the baby. In October, Circuit Court Judge O.H. Eaton sealed portions of the case file.

According to police records on

Jan. 12, 1992, they responded to a 911 emergency call about 8:30 a.m. that a baby was not breathing at the Oviedo home where Powell lived. Paramedics began CPR on the baby who had a history of seizures. The baby was described by a paramedic at the time as pulseless, breathless and looked lifeless. "His arms

and legs appeared stiff and neck was plant, the infant looked like 'skin and bones', and he was warm," the report stated.

Additional first aid was performed on the baby as he was transported to Winter Park Hospital but there was no change in his condition and he was pronounced dead on arrival at 9 a.m.

smart and street wise and beyond help of any juvenile sanctions."

The defendant's mother declined to speak at the sentencing but Sanzo's widow, April, told the court although she originally wanted the death penalty for Mathis, she favored the long prison sentence so he could remember each day what he had done. "He took my husband and my daughter away from me," she said.

Sanzo's daughter Tiffany, 16, was sentenced in December to four years in prison for her part in her father's death. Two other teens, Kamy Trickell and John

Valois were sentenced to probation and house arrest.

The four teens plotted Sanzo's death to make it look like he was the target of a rival motorcycle gang. Wayne Sanzo disapproved of Tiffany skipping school with friends and of Mathis because he is black.

Outside the courtroom when asked if she was happy with the sentence, although Mathis may only serve 12 years in prison, Sanzo commented, "Yes. If he survives 12 years. He is a young boy and they're going to have fun with him in prison."

A brief shouting incident between Sanzo, Mathis' mother, Ann Green and Green's female

friend was broken up by jail personnel. Mathis was sentenced at the jail courtroom.

Sanzo said she plans to file civil damage suits against the families of Mathis, Trickell and Valois over the wrongful death of her husband. She said she is losing her home because she has not been able to keep up the payments since her husband's death.

During the sentencing, Mathis was ordered to make restitution to the county for his defense, to pay two insurance companies a percentage of Sanzo's death benefit and to pay April Sanzo \$100.

Commission decision made yesterday, to cut rates by 10 percent to 15 percent.

The decision to cut rates by 10 to 15 percent, will initially involve only "basic" cable TV service. They are not expected to be put into place until at least September.

The rules carry out terms of a law Congress passed last October over then-President Bush's veto. Here in question-and-answer form is a look at some of the issues.

**Q: What did the FCC do?**  
A: It ordered a rollback of rate increases imposed by cable operators since Sept. 30, when Congress enacted the legislation returning cable TV to federal regulation. Such rates increases averaged 5 percent to 7 percent.

The FCC also ordered reductions of up to 10 percent of rates being charged on Sept. 30.

**Q: What does the rate rollback affect?**  
A: It applies to basic service, which includes the local broadcast signals plus public access cable channels. It also applies to the expanded basic service, which includes such cable channels as CNN, ESPN, the Weather Channel and the Discovery Channel.

**Q: What about premium channels?**

A: Premium channels, like Home Box Office and the Disney Channel, are not covered by the regulations or the law. Pay-per-view movie services also are not covered.

**Q: How soon will my bill go down?**  
A: Not until September at the earliest. Local governments that regulate cable systems must get FCC certification to conduct rate proceedings. FCC officials estimate that local governments could require cable operators to file new rate schedules by August. The local authorities would then take 30 to 150 days to process the rate request.

**Q: Will everybody get a 10 percent rate cut?**  
A: No, but the FCC estimates that more than half the 57 million households that subscribe to cable TV will get a 10 percent cut.

Other customers will get smaller cuts depending on the difference between the Sept. 30 rate and a "benchmark" charge that the FCC determines is appropriate for each cable TV system.

For example, a system that charges rates only 5 percent more than the "benchmark" figure would only be required to roll back its rates 5 percent.

But the FCC estimates that two-thirds to three-quarters of all cable subscribers will see some

reduction in their cable bills. The annual savings could be \$1 billion.

**Q: What is the FCC's role in enforcing the new rules?**  
A: The FCC will investigate complaints that cable operators are charging unreasonable rates for satellite-delivered programming beyond the basic service. It can order deeper cuts in rates if the monthly charge exceeds the "benchmark" rate for such services.

It will also review complaints that cable operators are charging too much for equipment, such as remote control devices, and extra outlets. Cable operators will have to justify the cost of those charges.

**Q: How do I complain?**  
A: The FCC will distribute forms that consumers will be required to fill out and send to the commission along with a copy of their bill. Consumers will have to state that they believe their bill is unreasonably high and serve a copy of the complaint on their cable operator.

**Q: Will there be further rate cuts?**  
A: The FCC says it will conduct further studies of cable TV rate data to determine if additional price cuts are in order.

# Clinton believes it is crucial to help Yeltsin

PORTLAND, Ore. — President Clinton's weekend superpower summit is built around the stark conclusion that it's crucial to help keep Boris Yeltsin in power to prevent a collapse of Russian reforms and a return to Cold War rivalry.

In the debate over whether the United States should hedge its bets or put its eggs in one basket, Clinton has come down squarely on the side of the embattled Yeltsin.

When they meet Saturday and Sunday in Vancouver, Clinton will try to bolster the stature of the Russian president by offering a modest program of U.S. aid and promising to lobby for a much larger package of collective assistance from Western nations and international financing agencies.

Clinton, in a speech Thursday, pointedly said that America's interests lie with reformers and "the man who stands as the leader of reform, Russia's democratically elected President Boris Yeltsin."

"He is the personification of the reform process," said an administration official deeply involved in shaping U.S. policy toward Moscow. "What is the alternative? The answer is, I think, no one."

The meeting with Yeltsin plunges Clinton deeply into foreign policy, a subject he relegated to secondary status behind America's domestic problems. It will be a closely watched test of his skill in superpower politics and the delicacies of international

diplomacy.

Clinton did not equivocate when he was asked at a news conference late last month if there was a danger of putting too much American support behind Yeltsin.

"I don't think so. ... He has shown a great deal of courage in sticking up for democracy and civil liberties and market reforms and I'm going to support that," the president replied.

Yeltsin survived an impeachment attempt by hardliners in the Russian Congress, but faces determined efforts to rein in his power and roll back his economic and political reforms. Clinton hopes that promises of Western aid will help Yeltsin in an April 25 referendum on who rules Russia.

The stakes are huge. "If the economic transition fails, the chance of a democratic government in Russia is all too unlikely," said Michael Mandelbaum, a Clinton adviser on Russia and director of the project on East-West relations for the Council on Foreign Relations.

"And if democracy in Russia fails," Mandelbaum said, "then peaceful Russian relations with its neighbors (former Soviet republics) are far from guaranteed. This meeting (in Vancouver) is about the Russian economy because the Russian economy is the key to Russian domestic and foreign policies."

Robert Hormats, vice chairman of the investment firm of Goldman Sachs International Corp., said that Western aid "can only act at the margin. The challenge is to make sure that Western aid is effective at the

margin."

Clinton's aid package stresses "people to people" initiatives, bypassing the central government in Moscow to target assistance at local grassroots levels.

"Our goal must be to ensure that the Russian people soon come to feel that they are the beneficiaries of reform and not its victims," the president said in his speech Thursday to newspaper editors in Annapolis, Md.

Clinton emphasized that the United States has a huge stake in the survival of Yeltsin's reforms.

"The danger is clear if Russia's reforms turn sour, if it reverts to authoritarianism or disintegrates into chaos," Clinton said.

The world cannot afford to see Russia turn into a much-larger "armed with a vast arsenal of nuclear weapons," Clinton said.

"If Russia were to revert to imperialism or were to plunge into chaos," he said, "we would need to reassess our plans for defense savings. ... That means billions of dollars less for other uses."

And he urged Americans to be tolerant of turmoil and backsliding in Russia.

"We must be concerned over every retreat from democracy, but not every growing pain within democracy," Clinton said.

Recalling America's own turbulent development of democracy, he said: "You can't be so impatient about what's happened in the short stretch of time from (Mikhail) Gorbachev to Yeltsin to the present crisis."

# GOP senators blocking the President's jobs plan

WASHINGTON — Outnumbered Senate Republicans are blocking a vote on President Clinton's short-term job-creation bill after lining up unanimously against his budget. Clinton called the GOP lawmakers "43 votes for paralysis."

"They want to gut all the job-creating programs," Clinton complained to reporters in Portland, Ore., on Thursday. "The American people have to send them a signal."

If they were getting a signal, the Republican senators didn't let on, offering — and losing — amendment after amendment to the \$16.3 billion jobs bill.

Democrats, who last year had urged voters to end government gridlock by giving the party control of Congress and the White House, learned in Clinton's 10th week in office that a majority is not enough. Democrats hold 57 of the 100 Senate seats but cannot muster the 60 votes necessary to choke off a filibuster.

"I'm getting a bellyful of this abuse of minority rights," Sen. Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., master of Senate rules and longtime protector of minority rights, told colleagues Thursday night.

"They are unwilling to let a new president, who was elected because the people wanted to get rid of gridlock, have a chance."

In Oregon, where he was presiding today at a conference on environmental and timber issues, Clinton chastised the Senate's 43 Republicans, who were threatening to use Senate procedures to block a vote on final passage of the measure.

"They do not get it," he said. "This is 43 votes for paralysis, for gridlock."

Republicans were offended that Democrats were refusing to accept any change in Clinton's bill.

"I don't see any way out of the impasse," said Senate Republican Leader Bob Dole of Kansas, who has offered himself as the spear carrier for the 57 percent of Americans who did not vote for Clinton.

Republicans ridicule the jobs bill as a grab bag of pork-barrel projects that would do little to help the economy — which, they contend, is recovering nicely anyway. Democrats say the extra spending for everything from public works to child immunization is needed to create jobs that have been slow to come out of the sluggish recovery.

The GOP campaign against the bill threatened Democratic plans to get the completed measure to Clinton before Congress recesses for two weeks. That still could happen — but the start of the break might be delayed beyond its scheduled start tonight.

Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, indicated he would force Republicans to vote daily on motions to choke off the debate, perhaps starting as early as today.

Eventually, Democrats contend, some Republicans will cave in because the bill includes money to extend unemployment benefits to many of the nation's long-term unemployed.

The Senate put aside the jobs bill long enough Thursday to complete congressional action on the outlines of Clinton's budget. The measure, which includes \$496 billion in deficit reduction over the next five years, envisions a major tax increase and deep cuts in military spending.

No Republican voted for it, just as none had done when it

cleared the House on Wednesday.

The House, meantime, completed what has become a routine chore: raising the government's authority to borrow money. With the government bumping up against its \$4145 trillion credit limit, the House voted 237-177 for another \$225 billion, enough to last through Sept. 30.

The Senate planned to go along today — under special rules that would block Republicans from trying to attach an amendment requiring a balanced budget.

The Senate mood turned angry Thursday night after it became clear that Democrats were going to have a much harder time passing the spending bill than they did the budget outline.

# The era of hayseed humor passes as Hee Haw ends

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — "Hee Haw," the cornball country music show that celebrated hayseed humor for 25 years, has been put out to pasture.

The syndicated hour-long show is ending production, leaving a legacy of corny jokes in a cornfield, scenes of a swinging board fence smacking folks in the backside and an animated donkey braying across the screen.

"I'm in mourning," said George "Goober" Lindsey, who was on the show 22 years. "I've lost an old friend."

Jane Grams, general manager of Gaylord Syndicom, the show's owner, said that after a year's worth of old shows got a good viewer response, the company decided it would be easier to serve up reruns rather than produce new episodes.

There are plenty of reruns to draw on: "Hee Haw," seen in 140 markets, has 600 shows in the vault.

As they'd say on "Hee Haw,"

"That's a lot of pickin' and grinnin'."

"Hee Haw" ranks among TV's longest-running shows. "The Tonight Show" has been produced for 39 years, Walt Disney's weekly anthologies have been made for 35 years, and "60 Minutes" has been on the air for 25. "Monday Night Football" has been on for 23 seasons. "Gunsmoke" and "Red Skelton" were on for 20.

The "Hee Haw" format remained the same: fetching Southern belles in skimpy outfits doing brief skits with hick comics, and country music by top stars like Loretta Lynn and host Roy Clark.

"It was the closest thing to vaudeville you'll ever do: pratfalls, one-liners, singing and dancing," Lindsey said.

The show had humor like this: Grandpa Jones to Junior Samples: "Junior, I saw you riding on a mule and your wife was walking behind you. Why was that?"

Samples: "My wife ain't got no

"Hee Haw" first aired on CBS as a summer substitute for the "Smothers Brothers Variety Show" in 1968. CBS dropped the show in 1971, but it went into syndication without missing a season.

This past year, "Hee Haw" was available in about 85 percent of the TV households in the country, mostly during the early Saturday night time period. Viewership is put at 3.5 million.

Down through the years, "Hee Haw" had non-country guests like Sammy Davis Jr., Ethel Merman, Ernest Borgnine, Regis Philbin and Kathie Lee Gifford.

Cast members included Lulu Roman, Minnie Pearl, Misty Rowe, Gordie Tapp, Marianne Rogers and Roy Acuff. Buck Owens was co-host with Clark from the show's inception until 1986.

"It will always remain a big part of my life," Clark said.

But, as the perky Kathy Baker said in closing every show: "That's all."

Winston Cup champ Kulwicki dies in plane crash

BLOUNTVILLE, Tenn. — Alan Kulwicki, winner of last season's Winston Cup driving championship, apparently was among five people killed Thursday night in the crash of a private plane, associates and emergency officials said.

The dead weren't immediately identified, but associates of the 38-year-old stock-car driver from Greenfield, Wis., had confirmed he was aboard the plane.

"Apparently Alan Kulwicki was on the plane," said Mike Bales, president and owner of Appalachian Flying Services at Tri-Cities Airport. "We have a young lady here with us who is waiting for Alan Kulwicki. She reports he called them from the aircraft telephone and said he had

just departed Knoxville and to pick them up."

Wayne Estes, a spokesman for Ford Motor Co.'s racing division for whom Kulwicki raced, said others scheduled to be on the plane were two unidentified pilots, the marketing director for a restaurant chain that sponsors Kulwicki and a relative of one of the chain's executives.

Sullivan County Sheriff Keith Carr said he had seen at least three bodies and that authorities have an idea who the dead might be. But he would not release any identities.

"Everyone on board the plane was killed upon impact," he said. "We do have a belief as to who might be on there."

Ann Eldridge of the Federal Aviation Administration in Atlanta said five people were aboard the twin-engine turboprop registered to Kulwicki. Four bodies were located within two

hours after the crash, she said.

Joe Minor of the Bristol Lifesaving Crew said the plane went down behind some houses just off a main highway between Bristol and Blountville. He said the airplane was engulfed in flames.

Emergency management officials said there appeared to be no survivors in the plane and no injuries on the ground.

Dale Cannon, air traffic manager at the airport, said air traffic controllers lost radio contact with the Merlin turbo prop about 9:30 p.m. EST. The plane was approaching the airport from the northeast and was about five miles out when contact was lost.

Officials said a flight plan filed in Knoxville, 90 miles to the south, indicated five people were aboard. Kulwicki had been in Knoxville Thursday on a promotional visit.

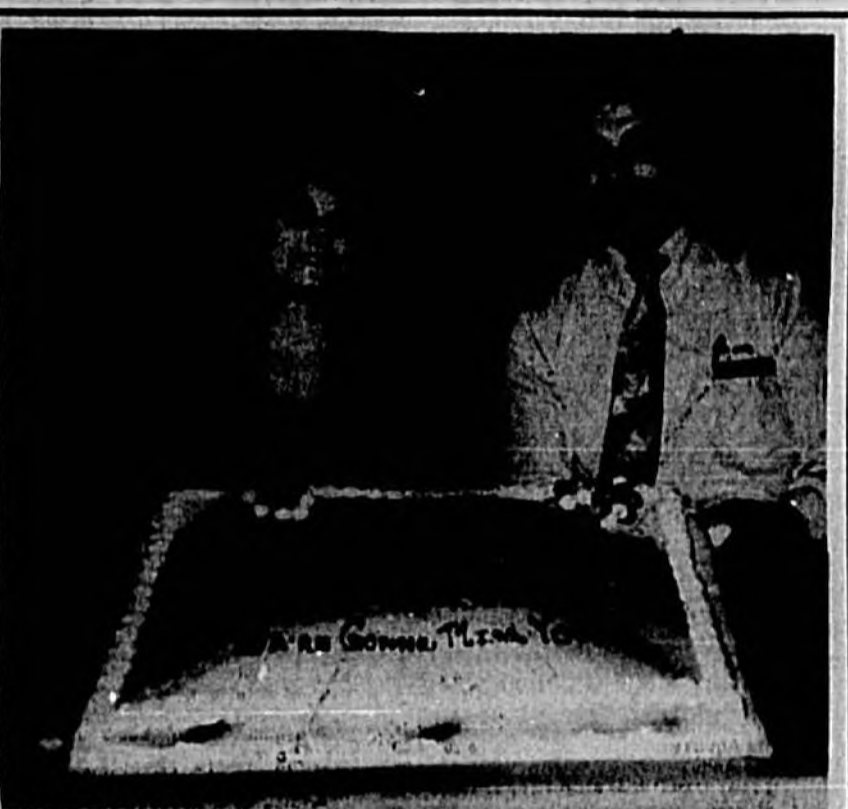

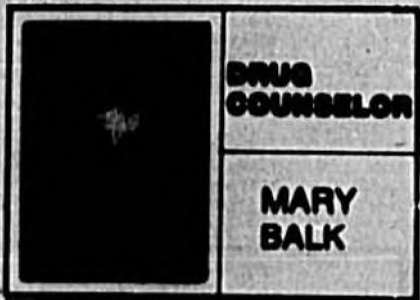
# Mom, daughter both suffer from sexual abuse

**DEAR MARY:** My daughter has an alcohol problem. She also became pregnant when she was 15, had an abortion, then attempted suicide. She is to be released from a treatment program soon and now she says that she was sexually abused by her stepfather from the time she was 7 years old until we divorced last year. I know she didn't like him, but I thought it was because he punished her when she disobeyed or had temper tantrums. When I asked her why she never told me, she said that she felt ashamed and thought it was her fault, and was also afraid either I wouldn't believe her or I would make her go away for causing trouble.

To tell the truth, I don't want to believe it happened to her because the same thing happened to me when I was a kid. I still have nightmares and problems with intimacy because of it, but I've never told anyone. I want to help my daughter but I'm having trouble dealing with this, plus all the other heartache she's caused me. I don't know where to turn or how to start.

**SHATTERED MOM**

**DEAR SHATTERED:** You've experienced one of the awful truths about sexual abuse; it runs in families and is multi-generational. If appropriate intervention doesn't occur, it simply continues to occur and shatter lives. The first thing you must do is to deal with the reality of your own experience so you can begin to break the pattern. Sexual abuse violates a child's boundaries in every conceivable way — physically, emotionally, and sexually. Your daughter is living out many of the other terrible consequences of sexual abuse such as substance abuse, attempted suicide, sexual acting out and other self-destructive behaviors. Victims often blame themselves for the sexual abuse but feel



both guilty and powerless to make it stop. The other nearly universal consequence of sexual abuse is low self esteem for the victim. She feels deeply ashamed as though it's her fault that it happened.

These are just a few of the consequences of this form of abuse which strikes at least one out of three girls and one out of 10 boys. It is time for you to acknowledge your own abuse and start your own healing process. As you become open and honest about your own experience, you can begin to help your daughter. However, your daughter must remain sober for awhile before she can really start to deal with problems related to her sexual abuse.

Help is available in our community. There are agencies, private providers and support groups for victims of sexual abuse. Contact the Mental Health Clinic (831-2411), the Seminole County Office of Substance Abuse and Control (323-3734, ext. 3363) or the Prevention Office (323-5555, ext. 218) for a resource list of providers available in this area.

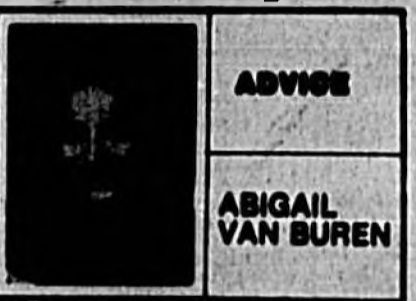
You missed it on this one, Abby. Go back to your original answer. It's like taking a test. Your first answer is usually the right one.

**DEAR ABBY:** Concerning the errors discussed in your grammar column that ran in *The Times-Picayune* of New Orleans, may I submit my pet peeve?

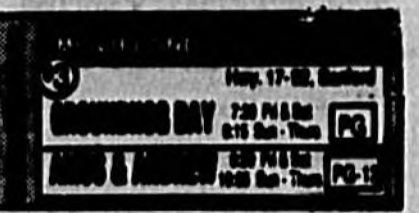

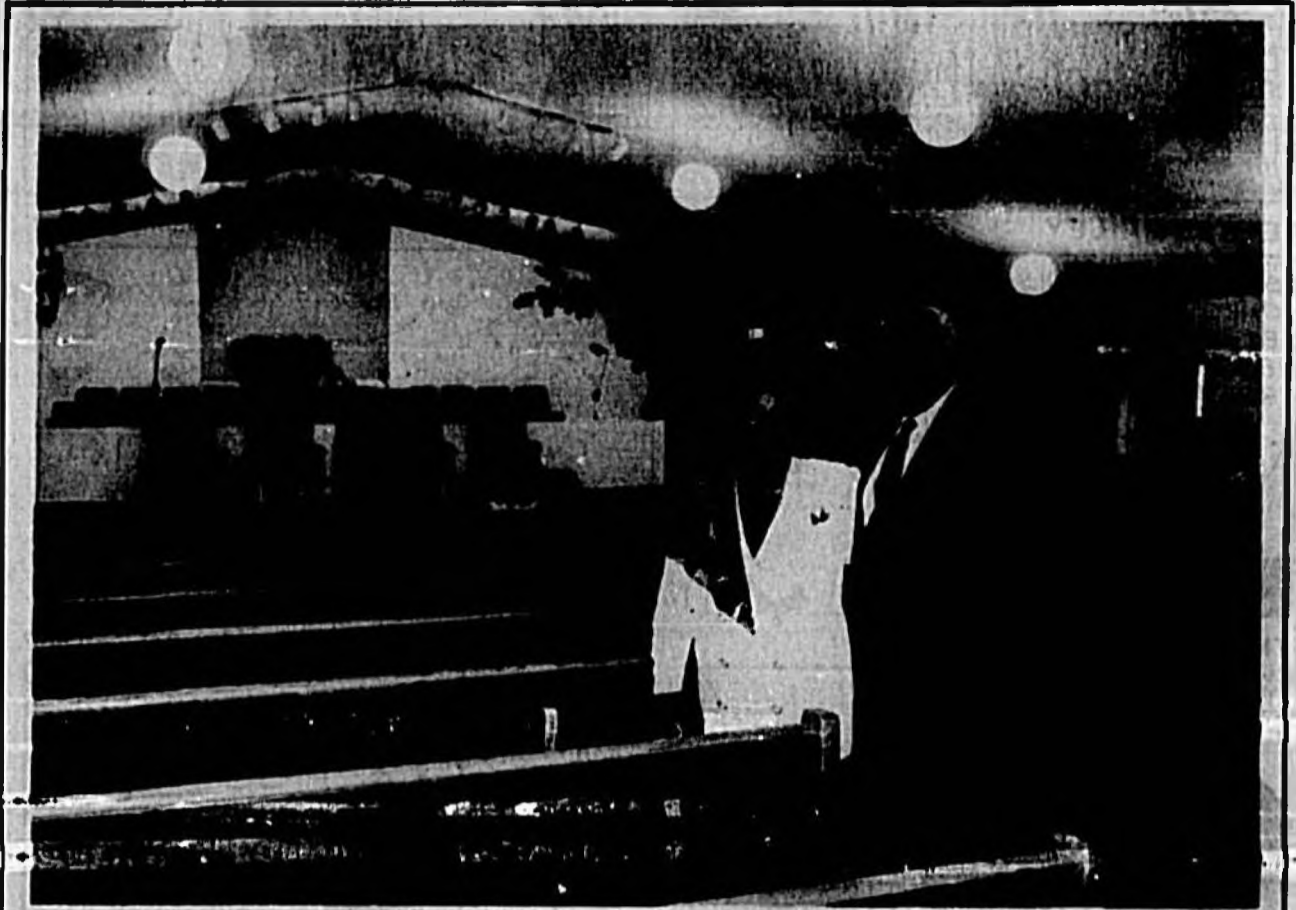

## Let Easter reawaken community spirit

As we pick up the story -- told by Arthur John Gospi, the great Scottish preacher -- it is the day before Easter.

A raw soldier boy is tramping along with his buddies -- footsore, "long past whistling." Then he sees a tree bursting into bloom.

Suddenly, his heart stands still. "If God can bring the wonder of fresh life out of a thing so dead," he says to himself, "imagine what he can do for me."

There began one of the world's most inspiring stories.

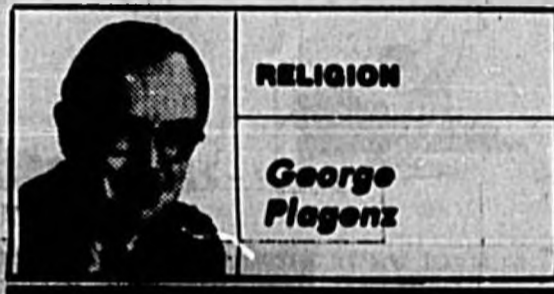
That soldier became Brother Lawrence, a humble monk who found he could glorify God in the monastery kitchen where he worked. His little book, "The Practice of the Presence of God," is one of the most widely read pieces of devotional literature.

One wonders whether Brother Lawrence, seeing those buds come to life under the warm spring skies after the dead of winter, thought of Lazarus, who was raised from the grave by Jesus.

It's Lazarus who is pictured as coming forth into the sunlight, breathing "the wonder of fresh life" after lying in the cold, dark tomb.

In many ways, the raising of Lazarus and the Easter story of the resurrection go together.

Lazarus died just before the events of Holy Week.

When Jesus learned of the death, he tried to comfort Martha by saying, "Thy brother will rise again."

She replied, perhaps with a hint of irritation, "I know he shall rise again in the resurrection at the last day."

Realizing she had misunderstood what he meant, Jesus tried again. "I am the resurrection and the life," he told her.

Resurrection was in the future. Yes, there would be that.

But "the life" -- that was what he was getting at. "The life" is now. It is not withheld until the last day. It becomes a current possession whenever Jesus is there. He proceeded to demonstrate what he meant.

As he stood in front of the grave that had a large stone rolled in front of it, Jesus turned to the people who were standing there and told them, "Take ye away the stone."

Miracles begin with us. There is always something we have to do first. Sometimes it is simply to have faith. "Only believe" said Jesus; when people believed, they were healed. And so are we.

Sometimes what we are called upon to do before a miracle can take place in our lives is simply to be quiet.

On one occasion, Jesus noticed that the people gathered around him were hungry and tired. They were getting restless and nervous.

"Make them sit down," Jesus told his disciples.

When the people were seated on the grass, all 5,000 of them were miraculously fed and refreshed.

And so are we -- when we cease our anxious striving and scurrying about and rest awhile.

Sometimes, as in the story of Lazarus, what Jesus commands of us calls for great effort.

"Take ye away the stone," he tells us. What makes this so difficult is that we, like Martha, shrink from exposing what lies behind the stone. The sight could be too horrible.

Yet nothing can help us if our hopes, our dreams and our aspirations -- which in an earlier springtime made life so fair with its promise -- are left rotting in a graveyard. It may require a miracle to revive them.

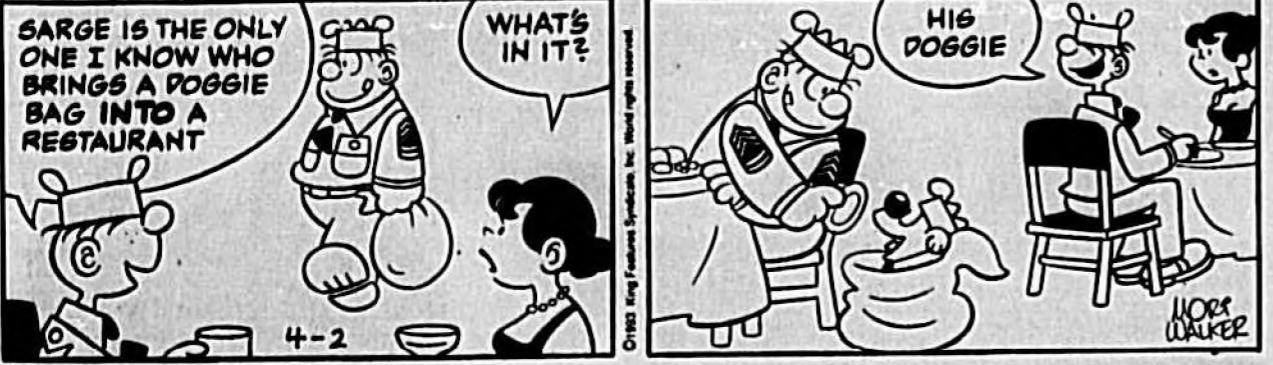

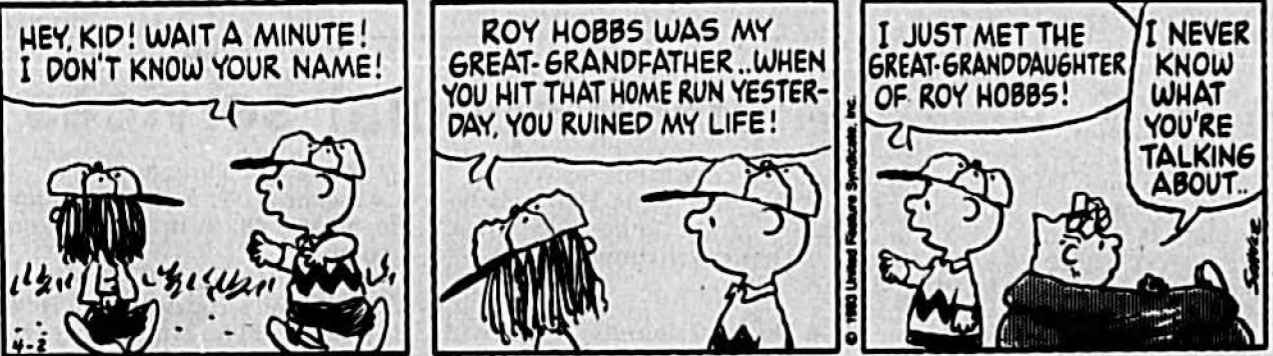

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**Chest pain is always a cause for concern**

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** I'm a 69-year-old female and am concerned about something that happened two years ago. While relaxing on my porch, I suffered excruciating pain that circled my chest, lasted about one hour, and then subsided. For the next day I could do nothing because my rib cage was so sore. Two weeks later the same symptoms appeared, this time awakening me at 5:30 a.m. I've never seen a physician and wonder if you can explain what happened?

**DEAR READER:** As you know, chest pain in a 69-year-old person is always cause for concern because of the possibility that it could reflect a heart attack, a blood clot in the lung or some other serious ailment.

While I doubt that you had such a potentially hazardous condition two years ago (because you've had no recurrences), I urge you to be examined by a doctor. You must make sure that your blood pressure and heart are normal.

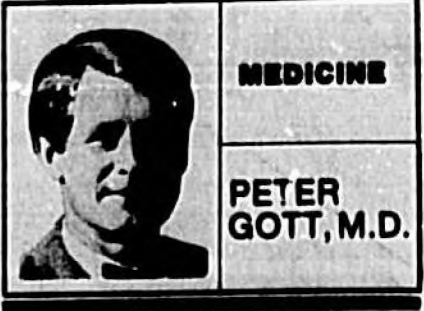
**DEAR DR. GOTT:** I've been diagnosed with tic douloureux, or trigeminal neuralgia. I've taken many drugs including vitamin B complex that my doctor prescribed, yet stopped when I didn't see improvement. Is my condition curable?

**DEAR READER:** Trigeminal neuralgia, a condition of unknown cause, is marked by attacks of sharp, stabbing pain in the region of the trigeminal nerve, on one side of the cheek. Some cases appear to be secondary to other diseases, such as multiple sclerosis and rheumatoid arthritis. Also, tumors of the nerve can cause neuralgic pain.

However, in most instances, no cause can be identified. The pain can be incapacitating and may be initiated by touching a trigger point or by mundane activity, such as brushing the teeth.

Tic douloureux is treated with carbamazepine, sometimes in

conjunction with ancillary drugs, such as Dilantin. In severe cases unresponsive to drug therapy, surgery (to cut the nerve) may be necessary. Vitamins, such as B complex, are usually ineffective.

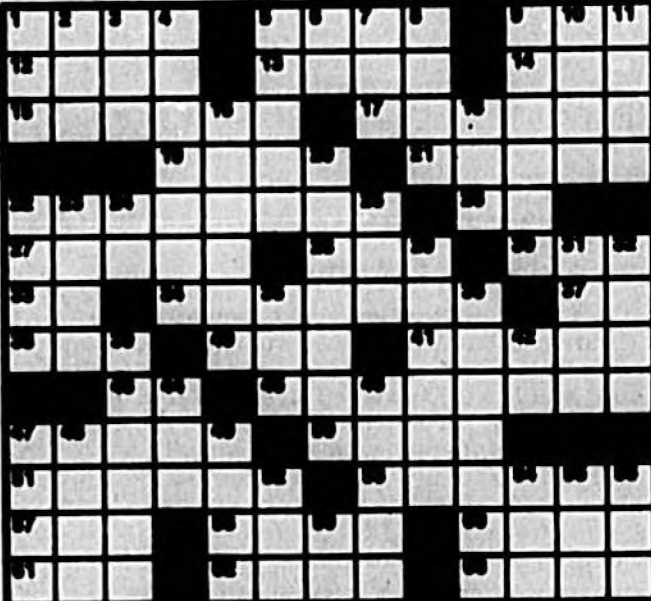

**WIN AT**

Bill Root has produced his fourth videotape. It runs for two hours and contains three of Root's lessons about opening leads. You will learn which card to lead in a variety of situations, and which suit to select when leading against no-trump or suit contracts.

The tape may be purchased for \$39.95 from Root-Hahn Enterprises, P.O. Box 7205, Heights Station, Concord, NH 03301.

Look at the West hand in the diagram. Which card should you lead against three no-trump, given the actual auction?

Partner didn't overcall one spade, so maybe you lean toward the diamond nine. However, partner will need a particularly powerful diamond suit to establish enough tricks there to defeat the game.

Perhaps a better potential

source of tricks is your club suit. But which card should you lead from the Q-J-10-4-3?

Normally, you would select the queen. But, as Root points out, if your partner rates to be short in the suit and declarer long, you should lead the four, not the queen.

Root gives today's deal to support his argument. When South doesn't raise hearts or rebid one spade, he must have at least four clubs. This means partner is short. However, you should hope that he has at least a doubleton with a useful card, the ace or king (or perhaps even the nine). If he does, then leading the queen will block the suit. But by starting with a low club, you will establish four winners immediately. And you will defeat the game because declarer cannot cash nine tricks without touching hearts.

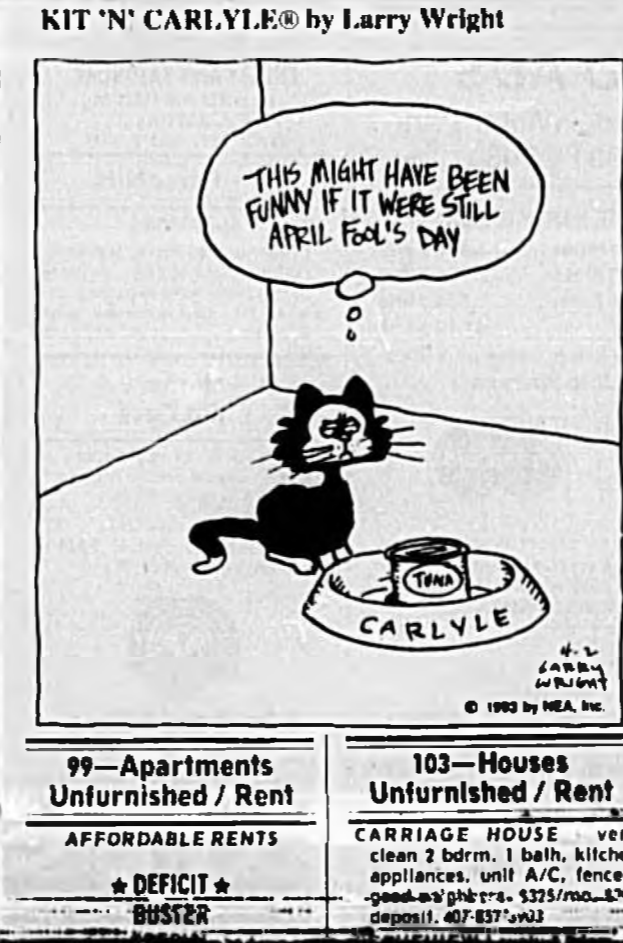
