Have you figured it all out? If you haven't, keep on reading. English literature, of course, fits in with history, rather than with sociology and the other ones we'll be talking about here. Unless you're taking advanced courses in literary criticism, your English (or American) literature course is actually a history of literature. You're not learning how to write poetry, or really, what makes great poetry, but you're learning who wrote what and when he wrote it.

The development of history (and the history or literature) is, in a sense, a horizontal one. It flows and progresses from one point to the next, from one century to the next. But the development of sociology, psychology, political science and of economics is a vertical development. These subjects construct concepts and then develop these concepts, Some illustrations will help.



From this general concept one can work down (vertically) to regional groups, or people that live in the same geographic area, then to purposeful groups, or people who are working to achieve a common end (perhaps they"re organizing a charity drive, or working in the same office, etc.). And then you could move on to the concept of interaction between groups. In the same way, psychology might define defense mechanisms as unconscious techniques for dealing with, or avolding, stress in our lives. Again, from this general concept, you can work down to various types of defense compulsive, phobias, withdrawal, etc. Economics, after defining, for instance, the Law of Diminishing Returns will apply

the general law to specific cases, e.g., will a progressive tax structure (one that hits the higher income brackets harder than the lower brackets) discourage business investment?

## Learning From Stan

Stan Musial, no doubt, has taught any people many things. (This includes plenty of pitchers not to serve up a fat pitch to him.) Even so, there's one lesson that all of us-especially the youngsters—can learn from this sterling baseball player, retiring after 22 years of major league play.

His great success was compound-ed on a disappointment. When he broke into baseball in 1938, he want-ed to be a pitcher. After two years, he developed arm trouble and nearly quit the sport. His manager in the minors talked him into trying the outfield and his willingness to stick it out, even though he felt he'd failed led to fame and records in the book.

### Strap On Your Armor

It is ironic that the growing use of seat belts in automobiles is resulting in an increase in the number of traffic accident stories with headlines like:

P'

"Three Killed in Car Crash; Had Beits But Didn't Wear them." Or:

"Forgot to Buckle Belt, Crash Victim Says."

Sometimes it's a case of fatal forsetfulness. Other times, it is willful disregard of this simple safety preeither case. And in either case, the type of thinking that lets people either neglect or ignore seat beits is paradoxical.

The attitude is summed up by William W. Harper, a consulting legal physicist: "If the occupant wore the car, as

he would a suit of armor, the crushing of the car exterior in a collision would absorb tremendous amounts of impact energy and protect him from bodily injury. But for some unex-plained reason the teachings of physics have never been understood by the motorist; so, rather than 'strap on' the vehicle and take advantage of its protective armor in a crash, the motorist dashes himself violently to pleces against its interior! This makes no sense at all, but it is still standard practice after 50 years of automotive accident history."

Why this should be so when coins are fit for circulation for about a quarter-century has been spelled out by Miss Eva Adams, director of the Mint, before a House committee considering a bill which would auth. orize more buildings and equipment for the various mints. Some of the reasons:

• Our population is soaring, and there are more pockets to fill with change.

• Coin-gobbling devices are grow-ing in number and variety. As they do, demand for change in various combinations is growing. While the

machines don't destroy the coins, they do hoard them in their coin boxes, sometimes for many days, and thus keep change out of circulation.

• In places such as school cafeterias where there just isn't time to make change, patrons are required to bring exact change, usually in odd amounts, and that means families store more change at home.

• Some eight million coin collectors put a dent in the small money supply.

• Cost of many items require use of a multiple number of small coins. Which leaves the situation right where it began: "Who has change for a buck?"

The Sheriff reported Deputies Charles Fagan and James Moore at about 2:50 p.m. Sunday responded to a call from Justice of the Peaco Thomas Moon, acting coroner, that he wanted assistance in serving a warrant on Burdette at his home on Little Lake Howell, just off Tuska-

willa Road near Oviedo. Burdette was charged, Hobby reported, with shooting at the home of a neighbor, Forrest Ferrell. When the deputies and Moon arrived they were told that Burdette had gone to the Ferrell home and stated that he had killed a man.

The officers found Strickland dead in the Burdette home. He had been shot twice. Officers found a pistol, a rifle and a carbine, Sheriff Hobby said the deputies today were continuing

# Group Ignores **Police Order** To Move On

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) -Sheriff's deputies arrested about 95 Negroes today who sang and demonstrated in front of the Leon County jail where many of the 248 marchers arrested Saturday night remained in their cells. Estimates of the crowd that first arrived at the concrete jail set the figure at about 250, but when Sheriff William Joyce gave the group 10 min-

They sat on the concrets

apron in front of the door to the jail, singing "Climbing Ja-

cob's Ladder" and refused to leave. The Negroes were ringed by deputies and state patrolmen.

Joyce ordered the arrest of the demonstrators for violating a direct order by the sheriff to leave. He said if they resisted, they would also be charged with realisting arrest. When told they were under arrest, the Negroes stood up quietly and marched two by two into the jail. State patrolmen dispersed other Negroes standing across the street from the jail. As the spectators, many of whom had been part of the demonstration group earlier, moved away, a woman's voice from the second floor of the jail shouted "chicken." Meanwhile, 91 demonstrat-

ors arrested Saturday night while marching towards the jail were arraigned on charges of disorderly conduct.
