

Fess, Property Owners Set Shoppes Price Tag

A proposed price of \$3.55 million has been agreed to between the Mayor of Lake Mary and the owners of a city shopping center. The center, if purchased, would be the site of Lake Mary's municipal complex. including city hall, the public safety department, and other governmental agencies.

Last week, the city commission authorized Fess to investigate the city's purchase of the Shoppes of Lake Mary. located at the intersection of Lake Mary Blvd. and Country Club Rd. The commission also authorized the mayor to negotiate for a price of \$3.4 million.

Fess reported to commissioners Thursday night that a representative of the Richard Roberts Investment Group, Avon, Connecticut, flew into central Florida Wednesday, to discuss the city's interest in the center. The group purchased the shopping center from Azon Commercial Properties, Jacksonville, in April for \$3.2 million. The center opened last October, with a

construction cost of \$2.5 million. A July 9 memo from investment group representative Edward J. Glasband to Fess

Emergency Called In Philippines After Death-Dealing Typhoon

MANILA, Philippines (UPI) - President Corazon Aquino today declared an emergency in provinces ravaged by Typhoon Peggy and the death toll was revised to at least 73 as the season's first major typhoon roared toward China.

In Hong Kong, forecasters indicated it could still be packing gusts of more than 110 mph as it roared toward the south China coast and authorities in Hong Kong closed nchools, shops and offices and suspended ferry services.

Authorities in the Philippines said at least 19 more people were still missing and said 9,000 were left homeless with thousands of others temporarily forced out of their

During a visit with some 300 typhoon evacuees at a church in the Manila suburb of Quezon City. Aquino declared a "state of calamity in the provinces affected" by the typhoon and pledged \$550,000 for relief services.

British Honorary Consul Killed

BOGOTA, Colombia (UPI) - Police today hunted for two men on a motorcycle who assassinated Britain's honorary consul in Barranquilla — the northern city where three days ago Pope John Paul II called for peace, police said.

Police arrested two motorcycle drivers Thursday night shortly after British Honorary Consul Geoffrey Hutchinson, a Colombian citizen, was killed but said they were still hunting for suspects.

They released no information on the two drivers taken into custody.

Hutchinson was named honorary consul for Great Britain in Barranquilla 10 years ago, the British Embassy spokesman said, and succeeded his late father in the post. Hutchinson's sister, Myriam, is vice consul in Barranquilla, a city of 900,000 people.

Prisoner's Release Sought

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (UPI) - South Africa's leading industrialist today called for the release of political prisoners as the country's largest labor federation prepared for work stoppages to protest detentions under emergency

The Congress of South African Trade Unions, representing 33 largely black labor groups, Thursday announced "a national day of action" to protest the detention of 2,234 trade union members, including 245 leaders and organizers. Cosatu said its 640,000 members would stage strikes and slowdowns Monday.

Labor leaders detained under emergency rule include Cosatu's president and the leader of the affiliated 50,000-member Metal and Allied Workers Union.

NASA Musical Chairs Continues: Smith Announces Departure

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) - The director of the Kennedy Space Center, ending 35 years of government service, will retire at the end of the month, becoming the second top official to leave NASA following the Challenger disaster.

Richard Smith, director of the Florida spaceport for the past seven years, told employees Thursday he decided to join General Space Corp. of Pittsburgh, a subsidiary of Astrotech International, as president and chief executive officer after an offer made several weeks ago.

Rumors that Smith would be leaving the space agency had circulated through the Kennedy Space Center for several weeks but the director said Thursday he was not pressured to depart because of the Rogers Commission report on the Jan. 28 Challenger accident that killed all seven astronauts aboard.

Smith is the second space agency field center director to retire following the shuttle accident. William Lucas. director of the Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville. Ala., announced his retirement June 5.

Court Upsets Phone Fee Ruling

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - In an unusual rebuff to the Public Service Commission, the Florida Supreme Court has voted narrowly to reject a commission ruling that the court majority said favored the telecommunications giant AT&T over competing long distance companies.

In a separate opinion issued Thursday, the court upheld the state's Medical Consent Act, ruling a lower appeal court that found the statute unconstitutional did not read it clearly.

The 4-3 telecommunications decision means the commission that regulates Florida utilities will have to find another way to divide the benefits of a 1984 communications tax amendment to stave off an estimated \$6.15 million windfall to local telephone companies.

The Legislature approved the Medical Consent Act in 1983 to clarify patients' rights to be fully informed about medical procedures and possible complications. The statute holds that patients must be informed of the risks of surgery and other medical treatments and must be informed of alternative treatments.

Tiny Army To Fight Pollution?

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - A university researcher hopes to combat underground water pollution someday by launching microscopic armies of poison-eating organisms on subterranean assault missions.

The idea is all the more unusual because until recently scientists believed the lifeforms Florida State University microbiologist David Balkwill wants to send into battle did not, and could not, even exist.

Balkwill says he and collaborators at several other research institutes have discovered microscopic life as far as 700 feet underground, upsetting traditional scientific thinking that the Earth's crust is sterile. Balkwill has isolated 300 separate micro-organisms from deep-soil samples, disproving a 60-year-old belief that no life exists deep underground.

Manna Haven Lease Extended

Manna Haven will use the Seminole County school dis-trict's "Little Red Schoolhouse" building at the corner of Sixth St. and Palmetto St., Sanford, for a soup kitchen to serve free lunches for another year, the School Board decided.

The board granted permission for the group to use the building as it has since April, after hearing concerns from residents in the area of the building, who did not want to see the building open 24 hours a day.

Several Palmetto St. residents attended the Wednesday afternoon school board meeting, to say they did not want the building open on a 24 hour basis.

The Evening Herald, quoting a quested the school board permit 24 hour operation of the facility.

"Our current lease states for feeding and warehousing of food products within operating hours from 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. We wish to have this extended to a 24 hour operation. This request is made in the event the need arises. Also so we can schedule evening meetings and counseling sessions," the letter read.

Ms. Smith said the statement did not mean that the group was requesting the building be open and operating 24 hours a day. She said the request was part of a long range plan, and was made mostly so the Manna Haven officials could meet in the facility. past 3 p.m.

Under the present lease agreement, Manna Haven officials are granted limited access to the building between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. Lunch is served between 11 a.m. and 1 p.m.

The board agreed to a one year lease extension, allowing the group to be in the building from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. It also granted permission for Manna Haven officials to meet in the building on the first and third Friday of each month from 7 p.m. until 10 p.m. The group can also install paddle fans, a temporary office

"What you are doing is noble and worthwhile." Seminole County Superintendent of Schools Robert Hughes told Ms. Smith. But he said any further expansion of services at the site would have to be considered by Sanford 's city commission, and planning and zoning board, so the building's use is compatable with the area's residential neighborhood setting.

According to a Manna Haven report. 1,480 free meals were served at the building from April. 7 to June 8. Groceries and clothing were also distributed during that time.

Hughes said earlier this week that the 4,700 square foot building, which sits on a half-acre of land, is "not satisfactory as a school site." and may eventually be declared surplus property and sold by the board. Manna Haven officials have expressed an interest in purchasing the building.

Homeowners Seek Help board from Manna Haven President Marlane Smith, reported Tuesday that Smith had re-

Angry Georgia Avenue homeowners have turned to state Scnator Paula Hawkins for assistance in relieving a flooding problem they allege the city of Sanford has done nothing about.

At the same time, what may be a serious flaw in Sanford's code enforcement practices has apparantly been uncovered by one of the residents as the result of her complaints to the city about garbage and weeds at an abandoned home next to her property.

The city acknowledges the refuse complaint may have highlighted a weakness in city code enforcement guidelines, which have been under review for the last month, according to Sanford Mayor Bettye Smith.

And, although the city engineering department said measures will be taken to rectify the flooding problem, the city building department has said for the time being its hands are tied, by city ordinance, against cleaning up the admittedly serious garbage problem at 2535 Georgia Ave.

Although abandoned, the lot is still considered private property and Sanford "does not have an ordinance that would allow us to go in and clean it up." City Building Inspector Dan Florian said. 'I honestly feel for the people, but there is

nothing we can do for them at the moment." · Florian's suggestion that the residents appeal to city commissioners for an emergency cleanup was endorsed by Mayor Smith. The residents have already indicated they intend to show up for Monday's city commission meeting to discuss the garbage and flooding problems.

Mayor Smith said if commissioners are asked to address the refuse problem on Monday night, city counsel will be queried and "if we have the legal authority, of course we'll have it cleaned up."

An aide for Hawkins, meanwhile, said the senator has no formal juristiction to deal with the flooding problem, although contact will be made with Mayor Smith "to discuss the constituents"

complaints." Both the city and the Georgia Avenue property owners say the flooding is due to the nearlycompleted Parkside Place apartment complex. which fronts on Hartwell and Oscella avenues. and is located behind and next to the residents' homes. The residents say the project was built too close to their property lines and without an

adequate drainage system. They also said their requests for city intervention during the last year have fallen upon deaf cars and two of the residents say they are among six property owners trying to sell their homes as a

However, both Rene Keith and Nancy Strickland also say their efforts to sell their homes have been unsuccessful due to deterioration caused by the flooding and the garbage at the vacant home, and additional refuse on a city easement across the street from Mrs. Keith's

City Engineering and Planning Director Bill Simmons said the flooding situation came to his attention during the spring. He said he visited the

area last month, contacted the apartment's contractor and that the contractor has now submitted a drainage proposal that will facilitate storm water runoff to a nearby culvert. Simmons said the Georgia Avenue homeowners should expect relief within a month, when the entire project is scheduled for completion.

In regard to successful eradication of flooding. Simmons said "I think we're going to have a good shot at it, except for water that runs north onto undeveloped land."

He also said because this area will ultimately be developed, he will contact the apartment contractor about drawing up plans to divert rainwater from it.

Simmons said residents problems resulted because the complex was built on a vacant lot. which had been serving as repository for the rainwater runoff from their backyards. According to Mrs. Strickland, a lack of adequate

drainage at the apartment complex produces rainwater spilloff that collects in resident's backyards "up to our ankles, even during moderate storms.

Mrs. Strickland said the situation has existed for about a year, ever since construction began on the apartments. Mrs. Keith said she doesn't believe the city is

going to amend the situation, based on apathy she says it has demonstrated during the last year. "That's bull," she said after being told of the drainage plan.

'The city allowed construction that put water on us and depreciated our land values. We complained and got nowhere, and now they say something will be done. I don't believe them, Mrs. Keith stated.

Mrs. Keith has also taken issue with the city over refuse piled on a city easement across the street from her home.

Florian said today one of the two property owners responsible for the refuse plans to pay city public works department to cart it away. Notices of violation for both property owners had been submitted by Florian to the code enforcement board Wednesday noght.

During the same meeting, the vacant home next to Mrs. Keith was also cited for violation, as follow-up to a complaint she made to the city.

Florian said a violation hearing, "one of the first steps of a long process," has been set by the code enforcement board for Aug. 19. He said only city commissioners can authorize immediate clean-up, because the Sanford enforcement code cannot be relied upon for expeditious handling of the matter.

He said the code enforcement ordinance does not contain a provision for the clean-up of abandoned properties until the code enforcement board process has run its course. This could take 'months,'' Florian said.

The situation is "complicated" because the city does not know where the property's owner is and the bank foreclosing on the property has been "uncoopertative" when approached by his department about clean-up. Florian added.

NATIONAL REPORT: Potent thunderstorms brought cooling rain to parts of the Plains and Mississippi valley today, but the heat-weary Southeast faced a sixth day of searing temperatures that have claimed at least one life. "The temperatures won't be quite as hot as they have been," said National Weather Service forecaster Bill Barlow. "But some sections of South Carolina and Georgia will have highs of 100 degrees." Georgia's temperatures were expected to remain in the 90s and 100s at least through Monday, the National Weather Service said. The heat wave has been blamed for one death in North Carolina. Guy Fisher, 29, died Monday of heart failure in an abandoned Kingston house. The death of an elderly man in Augusta, Ga., where the temperature rose to 104 degrees Wednesday, may have been heatrelated, officials said. Heavy rain early today drenched parts of South Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa, Nebraska and Kansas. Thunderstorms on Thursday kept temperatures around normal from the Plains to the middle-Atlantic states and were expected to do the same today. Barlow said. The storms Thursday swirled tornadoes in S.C., reported a record 100

Carolina, and strong winds damaged buildings in South Dakota and in Kansas, where two persons were injured in Osage County. Trees and power lines were downed in Kansas and Illinois. Heavy rain also drenched parts of Oklahoma and Texas. But the Southeast sweltered in the hot, muggy weather that has plagued the region for nearly a week. "It feels like an oven," said Betsy Southall, director of Optimist Community Center in Raleigh. N.C. "You can't breathe. It hurts take a breath because there's no air." 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Can She Do Numbers?

Yet another study on why little boys take to math better than little girls has been produced. This time the researcher chalks it up to hormones.

While research of any kind is valuable, the danger in this case is in using the research conclusions to jump to wrong conclusions in the classroom. All too easily, the findings may be used to justify ignoring the needs of young women in math classes.

The geometry teacher who thinks girls aren't good at math anyway may again avert his eyes when the student in pigtalls raises her hand to be heard. No matter how subconsciously, he may use it as a reason to take a little longer and show a little more enthusiasm when answering a question for the young man. Several studies show that even the little boy with mediocre talents is likely to get more encouragement from math teachers than the girl with superior skills.

It is immaterial that boys are quicker at learning math, just as it is immaterial that girls are quicker at reading and writing. We don't, either in subtle or overt ways, discourage boys from learning or using language skills.

To discourage women in mathematics is to ignore the fact that despite general tendencles, many females are math whizzes. The danger is that such women as the brilliant German mathematician Emmy Noether or Polish-French physicist Marie Curie and her daughter (both Nobel Prize winners) will be neglected and lost to science.

The tens of thousands of women who teach math and science, practice accountancy, conduct medical and chemical research and develop computer programs are ample testament that girls can be competent in mathematics and should be treated equally in the classroom, regardless of some researcher's findings.

Showing Leadership

Plaudits are due the Ford Motor Co. for its promise to produce large numbers of cars equipped with driver-side air bags. However, the Department of Transportation should study Ford's request very carefully before deciding to extend the deadline, now the 1990 model year, for automatic restraints in both front-seat positions.

Ford recently announced that it would make driver-side air bags standard equipment in most of its popular-priced family cars. Ford already is the only domestic automobile manufacturer offering air bags, which are optional on the Tempo and Mercury Topaz modela.

Ford maintains that an extension of the deadline would permit manufacturers to work with suppliers. Ford also claims that its proposal could mean that more cars would be produced with air bags and seat belts at an earlier date than anticipated.

To its credit, the company doesn't insist that mandatory scat belt legislation in the state would do the job, eliminating the need for air bags. The federal rule is to be rescinded if states with two-thirds of the nation's population enact mandatory scat-belt legislation by 1989. The states should enact such laws, but not at the price of depriving drivers and their passengers of the full measure of protection that would be afforded by air bags and seat belts.

Our concern is whether, without a deadline, some manufacturers might prove laggards in development of passive restraint systems. That's why we think DOT should take pains with its decision.

Plagues Are 'No Party For The Fleas Either'

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Discover magazine estimates animal pets in this country harbor 4.5 billion fleas, give or take those that have run away to join a circus.

Fleas don't, and maybe can't, distinguish between dogs and cats, the magazine points out, and have never received the recognition they deserve for their contributions to the U.S.

Discover puts the sale of flea shampoos, collars, sprays, etc., at about \$600 million a

"In the face of declining heavy industry" and mounting trade deficits, the flea "has stepped in to stimulate commerce, provide jobs and support an entire new industry devoted to its destruction."

But is the flea ever thanked by President Reagan or mentioned in books by David Stockman, the former budget director? Not that

Fort Riley's **Future**

FORT RILEY, Kan. - From the era of the Indian wars to the age of air cavalry employing assault helicopters, this famous old Army post in the Flint Hills of Kansas has played an important part in the defense of America.

Many of the famous leaders in the country's military history served here, including J.E.B. Stuart, the brilliant Confederate cavalry leader: George Custer, the dashing Union cavalryman who was killed with all his troopers in the Battle of Little Big Horn; Gen. Jonathan Wainwright, the hero of Bataan; and Gen. George S. Patton, the superb tank army commander who played a key role in smashing German resistance in World War II.

History is everywhere to be found at Fort Riley, home of the 7th Cavalry, which pacified the Indians on the frontier; and, in modern times, home of the First Infantry Division, which fought four and a half years in Vietnam.

This historic fort in America's heartland is more than history.

It is likely to continue to play a major role in the nation's defense.

II, as seems likely. America's commitment of 300,000 troops to Europe's defense is reduced, redeployment of Army forces to the continental United States almost certainly will result in the build-up of a large strategic reserve of troops at Fort Riley.

Its central position virtually assures this.

Magazine Struggling

WASHINGTON - Proceso is a Mexico City weekly magazine, a courageous and respected exception to the longstanding rule that the Mexican government controls the media through intimidation and bribery. It was born 10 years ago this week, virtually at the point of a

As Mexico's ruling party for 57 years, the Institutional Revolutionary Party, known as PRI, has always regarded stability as its primary objective - which has discouraged the kind of irreverent, inquisitive press that we're accustomed to north of the border.

The party has some unsubtle but highly effective methods of controlling the press. The government has a monopoly on newsprint: it can and does deny paper to publications that get too critical of the regime. In addition, advertisting by government agencies provides 60 percent to 80 percent of all ad revenue for newspapers and magazines; the ads are simply withheld from troublesome publications.

On top of these persuasive mechanisms, the government also pays to have favorable articles printed and gives monthly payoffs, or "embute," to compliant editors and

If threats and bribes don't do the trick, the government has the full force of the police and the army to enforce its wishes - and journalists know it. In the past, erring journalists have been beaten up for writing stories critical of the government. Some have even been murdered.

This background is what makes the story of Proceso so remarkable. It has survived - even thrived while fearlessly exposing PRI corruption and blunders.

Proceso's publisher, Julio Scherer

Garcia, was for years the influential editor-in-chief of Excelsior, Mexico City's largest daily paper. The personal courage of Scherer and his team brought the wrath of then-President Luis Echeverria down on

First he tried leaning on Scherer. urging him to fire several reporters and columnists. Scherer refused.

Echeverria's men then quietly bought the support of enough employees of the newspaper - a cooperative - to stage a coup. On the evening of July 8, 1976, about 200 liberal Excelsion journalists were unceremonlously thrown out on the street by police in plainclothes. They weren't even allowed back in to retrieve their

Some of the fired employees were eventually taken back, properly chastized, but the hardheads started a news agency in the fall of 1976, using a building generously loaned by Pages Llergo, editor of the news weekly Stempre.

Echeverria came to regret his rash ouster of Scherer, and, in a series of personal meetings with the editor, he agreed to turn Excelsior back to the Scherer team: But the deal fell through when The New York Times broke the story prematurely. On Nov. 6, 1976, Scherer and his

loyalists began publishing Proceso as an independent weekly magazine. The new government of President Jose Lopez Portillo tolerated Proceso - but barely. By 1982, the last year of his term, the president had lead enough of the magazine's eritical articles and cartoons. He stopped all government advertising and sent a clear message to other advertisers that they should do likewise.

Despite this body blow, Proceso has continued to lead the Mexican press in tough but fair investigative ROBERT WALTERS

Legionnaire's Outbreak Anniversary

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) - A decade after 29 people died of Legionnaires' disease following a convention at a Philadelphia hotel, scientists now know where the organism that causes the disease can be found. how it is spread and who is most susceptible.

But basic questions remain. especially why certain people exposed to the bacteria contract the potentially fatal malady and others

Medical science has come a long way since 1976, when 29 veterans attending a state American Legion convention at the Bellevue Stratford Hotel began dying days after the meeting closed, while 151 others became violently ill with pneumonia-like symptoms from which they eventually recovered.

Newspaper headlines that summer screamed with theories about a cause: a germ warfare terrorist plot. food poisoning, dirty water, swine flu, even a new disease.

fectious diseases.

There was no sense of what this agent was," said Dr. David Fraser, an epidemiologist who at the time headed a team of investigators from the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta, "It was a time when people had a great deal of faith in medical science to solve problems quickly. They didn't expect there to be lots of unknowns in the area of in-

"Legionnaires" disease changed that," he said.

Scientists eventually determined the disease was spread through the Bellevue air conditioning system. but the source of the bacteria was never found.

"People were scared because they didn't know if it was contagious or what it was all about," said Edward Hoak, the Pennsylvania American Legion adjunct who arranged the 1976 convention.

Hoak said it was not unusual for older veterans to get sick or even die during conventions. When the first victims of Legionnaires' disease succumbed, not many people were surprised. "Almost every convention some-

body died of a heart attack, so you don't get excited about that." Hoak said. "What really saved us was the tightknit organization. If that would have been a shoc salesmen's convention ... the guys would have gone home and died and nobody would have known the difference."

Scientists later isolated the bacteria in a laboratory and determined the most effective treatment for Legionnaires' disease was the antibiotic erythromycin, which is still prescribed today.

But researchers still do not know why men are more susceptible to the disease than women, why it affects more smokers than non-

smokers or why the disease is more common in summer than in winter. Perhaps the most intriguing mystery is why the bacteria are present in the environment at all.

"I don't know if the answer to that will ever come," said Dr. Barry Fields, a microbiologist with the CDC "We've lived with it a long

Scientists first isolated the rodshaped organism in 1977 and in the last few years have determined it feeds off other bacteria and prospers in almost any form of fresh water. thus dispelling a theory it bred in soll on construction sites

While the organism appears naturally in the environment, researchers believe people do have something to do with triggering the disease.

"We know that certainly in man-made situations it can cause disease." Fields said.

Wholesale Prices Unchanged In June; Lower For 6 Months

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Wholesale prices remained unchanged in June to finish the first half of this year 6.5 percent lower than they were at the end of 1985, the Labor Department said Friday.

Analysis with the Bureau of Labor Statistics., which prepared the monthly statistical report, said the six-month decline was the steepest since 1949.

All figures were seasonally adjusted.

The flat inflation rate in June came as a pleasant surprise to most observers, who had anticipated a continuation of the modest inflationary pace set in May, when wholesale prices rose by 0.6 percent overall.

The wholesale price of gasoline, which fell rapidly in the first four months of the year, rose 2.9 percent following a revised 8.6 percent rise in June as motorists took to the highways en route to summer getaways.

Service station operators still paid 33.5 percent less for gas in June than the did in June 1985, the analysts said.

Fed Lowers Discount Rate

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Federal Reserve Board's attempt to spark vitality in a sluggish economy by slashing the interest rate it charges big bank borrowers takes effect with the start of business today.

The Fed, conceding economic growth is plodding at a pace below that generally anticipated, voted Thursday to drop the discount rate from 6 1/2 percent to 6 percent - the lowest in eight years.

The vote, taken on requests from directing boards of the 12 federal reserve banks, was 6-0. The action was announced at 4:36 p.m. EDT, timed to follow the close of stock trading in New York and minimize possible market

Chemical Fire Burning Itself Out

MIAMISBURG, Ohio (UPI) - Firefighters kept watch on a trackside toxic chemical fire that twice sent thousands of people fleeing from their homes, hoping it would burn itself out today, ending the worst such railroad disaster in U.S.

Hazardous materials crews Thursday opened two more holes in the stricken railroad tank car and used a large fan to blow air into the smoldering phosphorus.

The fire began Tuesday afternoon when seven cars of a southbound Baltimore & Ohio freight train derailed. One car, containing 12,000 gallons of phosphorus, ruptured.

Between 30,000 and 40,000 people were evacuated from the area Wednesday, many spending the night in the Dayton Convention Center or the University of Dayton

No Tainted Jell-O Found

Preliminary investigations showed no evidence of tampering with sugar-free Jell-O gelatin following a warning from an anonymous caller claiming to have poisoned boxes of the product in Chicago and Detroit.

The threat Thursday prompted at least four grocery chains to pull the product from their shelves in four Midwestern states.

The warning came just two days after on anonymous letter said Ac'cent flavor enhancer had been poisoned with cyanide, clearing the product from store shelves in the

Houston area. In both cases, there was no evidence either product had been poisoned or even tampered with. No extortion

Housing Starts At 6-Year High

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Private housing units were completed at an adjusted annual rate of 1,814,000 in May. up 8 percent over the revised April rate of 1,683,000, the govenment said Friday.

It was the quickest pace of housing completions since December 1979.

Residential units in buildings with five or more units accounted for most of the increase. The May rate for multifamily housing completions was 622,000, up 35 percent from the April rate of 462,000, the report said.

County Tax Hike Moves Step Closer

By Paul Schaefer **Herald Staff Writer**

A proposed property tax increuse ten percent above last year's millage rate, and 17 percent above the "rollback rate" for Seminole County property owners, came another step closer as county commissioners authorized the legal advertising of the proposed new tax rate.

If approved, the county-wide property tax rate will increase from \$4.17 per \$1.000 of assessed property value to \$4.60 per \$1,000. But the \$4.60 amount is 17.3 percent above the rollback rate, which is the rate generating the same amount of tax revenue, based on higher property values.

Two weeks ago, commissioners said the tax increase is necessary because of a loss of begins October 1.

Despite NFL Affiliations, Hess Said He Liked ABC's USFL Deal

NEW YORK (UPI) - Despite his NFL affiliations, New York Jets owner Leon Hess says he "heartily" approved ABC's contract with the rival USFL when the network's board of directors voted on the deal in 1982.

Hess testified Thursday as the NFL's seventh witness in the trial of the USFL's antitrust claims against the older league in U.S. District Court in Manhattan. The trial was recessed Thursday afternoon for the weekend and is expected to resume Monday with the testimony of Art Watson, president of NBC Sports.

One of the USFL's main arguments has been the NFL had tied up all three major networks with contracts in the fall and tried to pressure ABC into discontinuing its

contract with the USFL in the spring. Hess, also chairman of Amerada Hess Corp., was one of 15 members of the ABC board who considered the network's two-year contract for \$18 million plus two option years worth about \$34 million with the USFL in June 1982. He said he did not attend the March 1982 meeting at which the board approved ABC's \$650 million, five-year contract with the NFL.







Add Coolness To Your Surroundings With A Variety Of Lush Ferns

If you're looking for a plant to fill in those shaded spots around the garden, the patio, the pool — even indoors — why not plant some ferns? There is nothing so refreshing as being surrounded by lush, rich green plants during the heat of the summer, and ferns definitely add a coolness to your garden setting.

Ferns are among the world's oldest living plants and are lower on the evolutionary scale than seed plants. Some of the more common ferns that do well here are the Boston, the Maidenhair, Staghorn, Rabbits-foot, and Pteris. Others, such as Asparagus plumosa and sprengeri, are not true ferns since they produce seeds, not spores. Both make excellent garden plants, so we'll include them with the true ferns.

Cirus need à son dikture that's rich in organic material. In fact, they'll do very well in 100 percent peat moss. Or, you can mix up a combination of three-quarters peat moss and one-quarter sand. Whichever one you choose, be sure it drains rapidly. Fern roots are easily damaged by standing water.

If you plan to pot up ferns, select one with several drain holes in the bottom. Never use pots that don't provide good drainage. The growing

media in the pots should be kept moist at all times. This may mean daily watering in some

You'll find that your ferns will grow best when the temperature ranges from 70° to 80° F. Most ferns will be damaged by frost and freezing temperatures. But, they will come back from the roots in the spring. If you live in an area that suffers from heavy frosts and freezes, you can bring you plants indoors, if in containers. Actually, indoor temperatures are usually ideal for them. The low humidity found in most of our homes can be a problem. Most of the fern varieties perfer a fairly high level of humidity. You can compensate for this low humidity by regularly spraying your ferns with a fine mist of

When the humidity is too low, the fine, thin-leaved ferns, such as the Maidenhair. develop acorched leaf edges. The Boston and Rabbits-foot ferns have thicker fronds and will tolerate low humidity much better than varities with thinner ones.

Ferns do require small amounts of fertilizer. although they will obtain some nutrients from the breakdown of the potting medium. Liquid house-plant foods from your favorite garden shop work well on ferns. But use caution, apply the fertilizers at half strength as recommended on the label. Ferna will not tolerate high fertilization and will show leaf burn around the edges when fertilized too heavily.

Insects and disease are usually not a problem with ferns. Most are trouble free. You can easily damage ferns with insecticides and fungicides, so you're better off without them. If you have a problem, usually you can simply prune out the infected portion. To remove most insect pests, take your plants outdoors and spray them with

For those of you who wish to propagate your own ferns, the best way is by division or by

offsets as you'll find on Bostons. The true ferns can be grown from spores. From spores, it takes about a year to develop usable plants. The spores can be shaken from the underside of the fronds when ripe and placed on ground sphagnum moss in a well-drained container.

To keep the sphagnum moss moist, you'll have to cover the container with a piece of glass or clear plastic. Set your pots in a location where light is sufficient for normal fern growth. Young plants may be potted up about six months after germination. Both the Asparagus plumosa and sprengeri are easily grown from seed.

There are literally hundreds of different kinds of ferns that can be grown both indoors and outdoors in our area. You'll find their graceful foliage and their super ability to grow in dense shade and low light make them elmost the perfect plant. Outdoors, you can plant them on the north. side of your home, under trees as ground cover, in tubs, hanging baskets, and in shaded spots around the pool.

For a lush, cool summer, why not set out some ferns, then stand back and enjoy! You'll be glad
