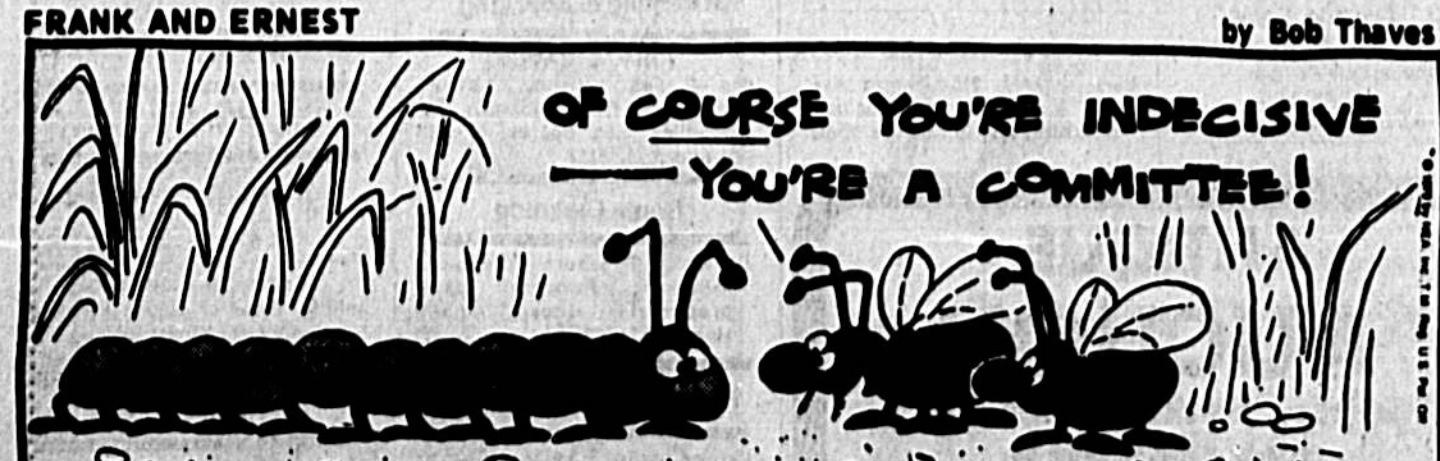

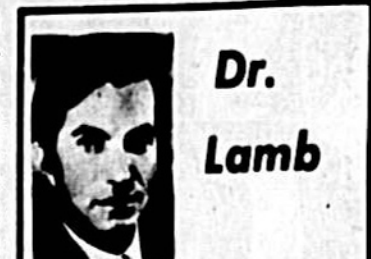

Brezhnev Warns China, Reaffirms Loyalty To Vietnam

Brezhnev: SALT Near Soviet President Leonid Brezhnev today demanded an immediate halt to China's war with Vietnam and pledged more that the Soviet Union would honor its treaty commitments to Vietnam.

He called Peking's policies "the gravest threat to world peace." Brezhnev's remarks followed a Soviet warning Thursday that the Soviets will not abandon Vietnam "in a time of distress."

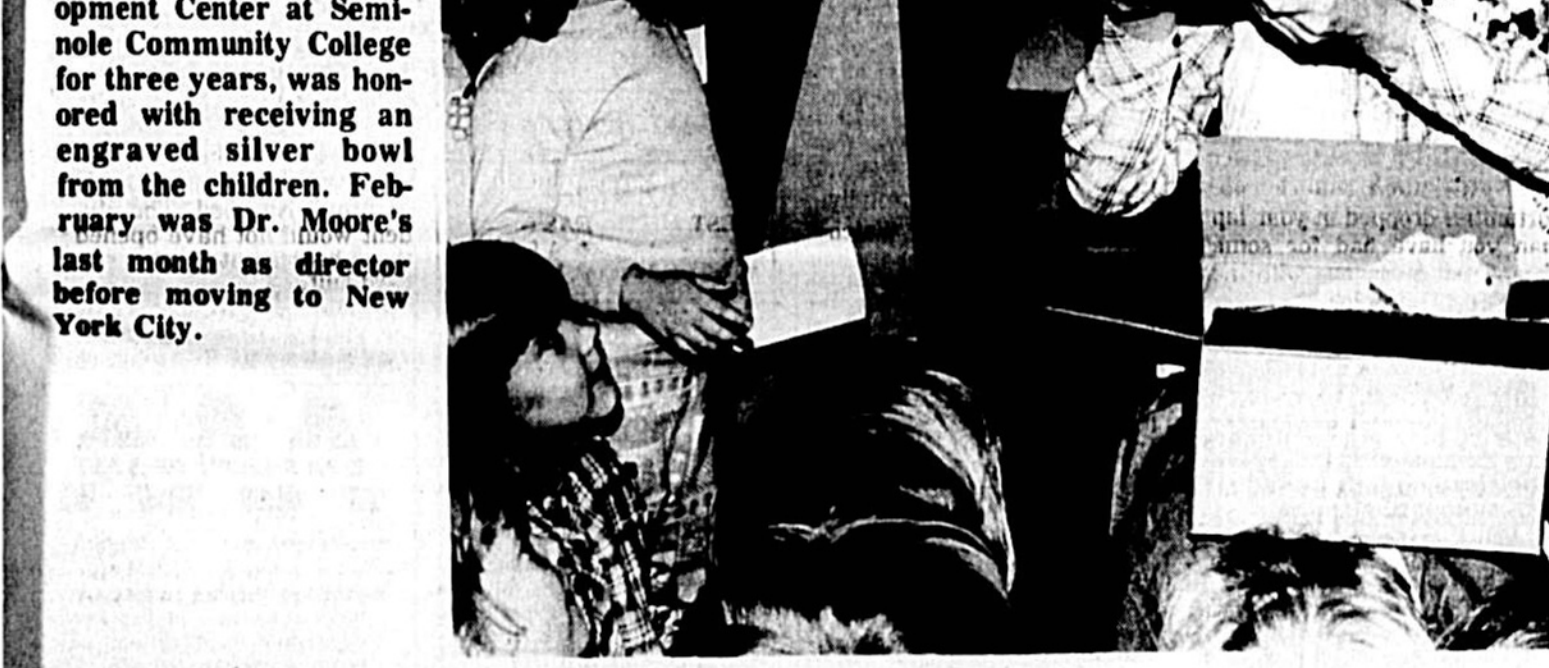

DELAND — It's the magic word on everyone's lips here at the junior college state tournament. The magic kingdom of JuCo basketball.

ORLANDO, Fla. (UPI) — Andy Bean fired a 64 Thursday to take the lead in the \$250,000 Citrus Open, but Arnold Palmer — in spite of a 1-under-par 71 — came up a winner as the tournament host and golf course owner.

Praise of the 7,100-yard course and its condition was profuse after the first round of the event, played for the first time on the Bay Hill course of which Palmer is part owner.

Jack Nicklaus showed up at the Orlando stop for the first time in years out of loyalty to Palmer. He was 3-under-par at 69, and not at all displeased. "It took a round when I didn't putt all that well and turned it into a 69, although I haven't had much tournament work," said Nicklaus. Since the start of 1979, he has played only at the Bob Hope Desert Classic, where he finished in 15th place.

He indicated that allegiance to Palmer convinced him to come. Nicklaus' sentiments

were shared by many among the field of 144 golfers, whose ranks will be cut to the top 70 scorers and ties after today's round.

"I asked anyone I saw to come," said Palmer, whose poor putting has kept him from making the cut in a single tournament this year.

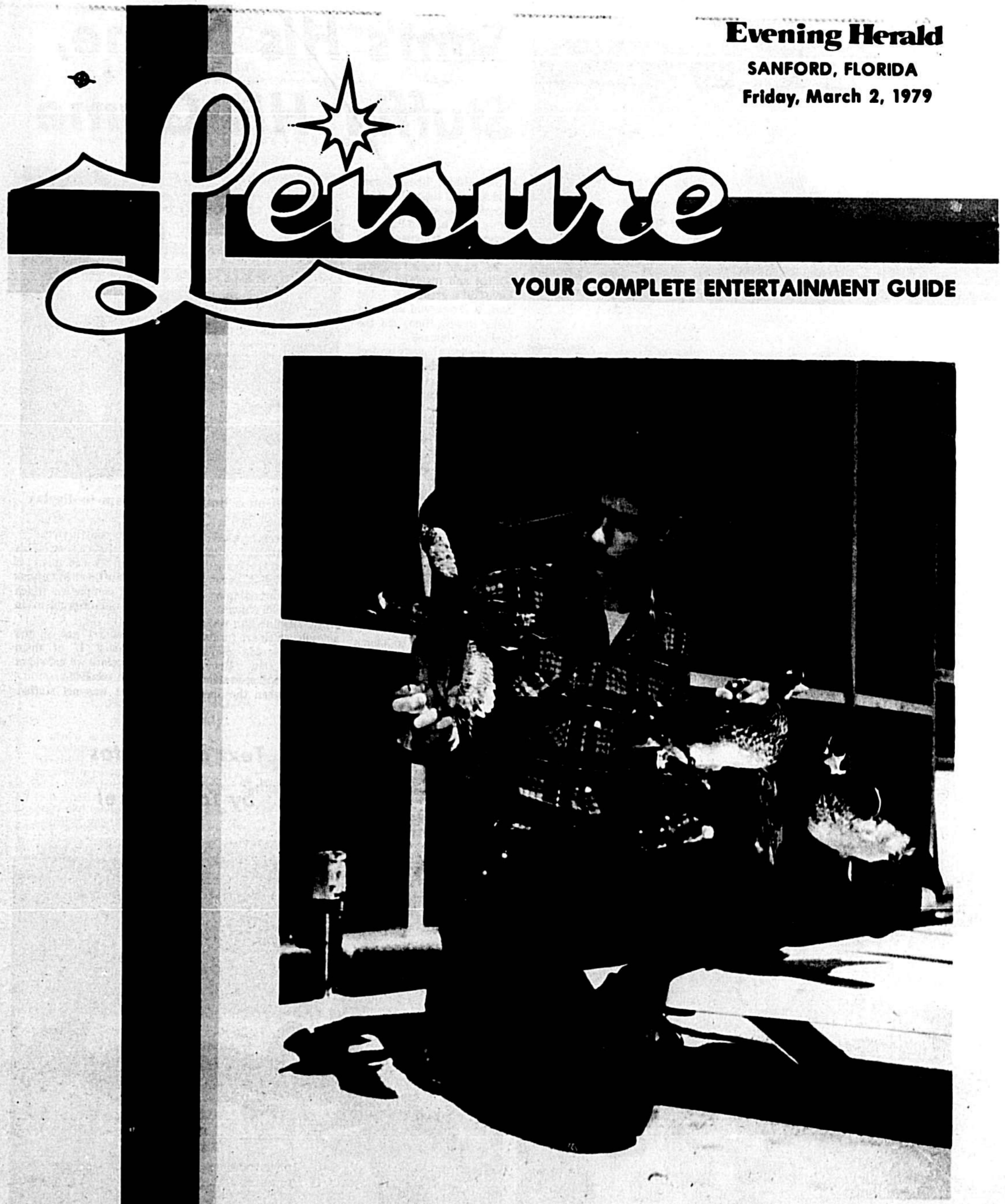

Sam's His Name, Stuffin' His Game

Sam Gibson likes to hunt and fish and the walls of his parents' home on Glastonberry Road in Fern Park are covered with trophies he has taken: ducks, bass, squirrel. To have these animals stuffed and mounted would have cost a great deal — but Sam, a 17-year-old senior at Lake Howell High, did the taxidermy himself.

"I needed a biology project in the 9th grade," explained Sam, "and I asked the teacher if I could do it on taxidermy." With some books and information he sent for and with a little help from his father, Sam turned in his first project: a squirrel.

The teacher liked his work so much she asked him to stuff other animals so Sam added a duck, a raccoon and a crow to the biology class collection.

Four years later he still enjoys the hobby and each hunting season adds to his personal collection. Preparing to work on a duck which was given to him he observed: "A small duck like this only takes about an hour and a half to do but then about 2 or 3 weeks to dry."

The body is stuffed with excelsior and the wings and feet are positioned with stiff wire. Glass eyes are added and the animal is then allowed to dry. Paint is sometimes added to the bill to restore its natural coloring.

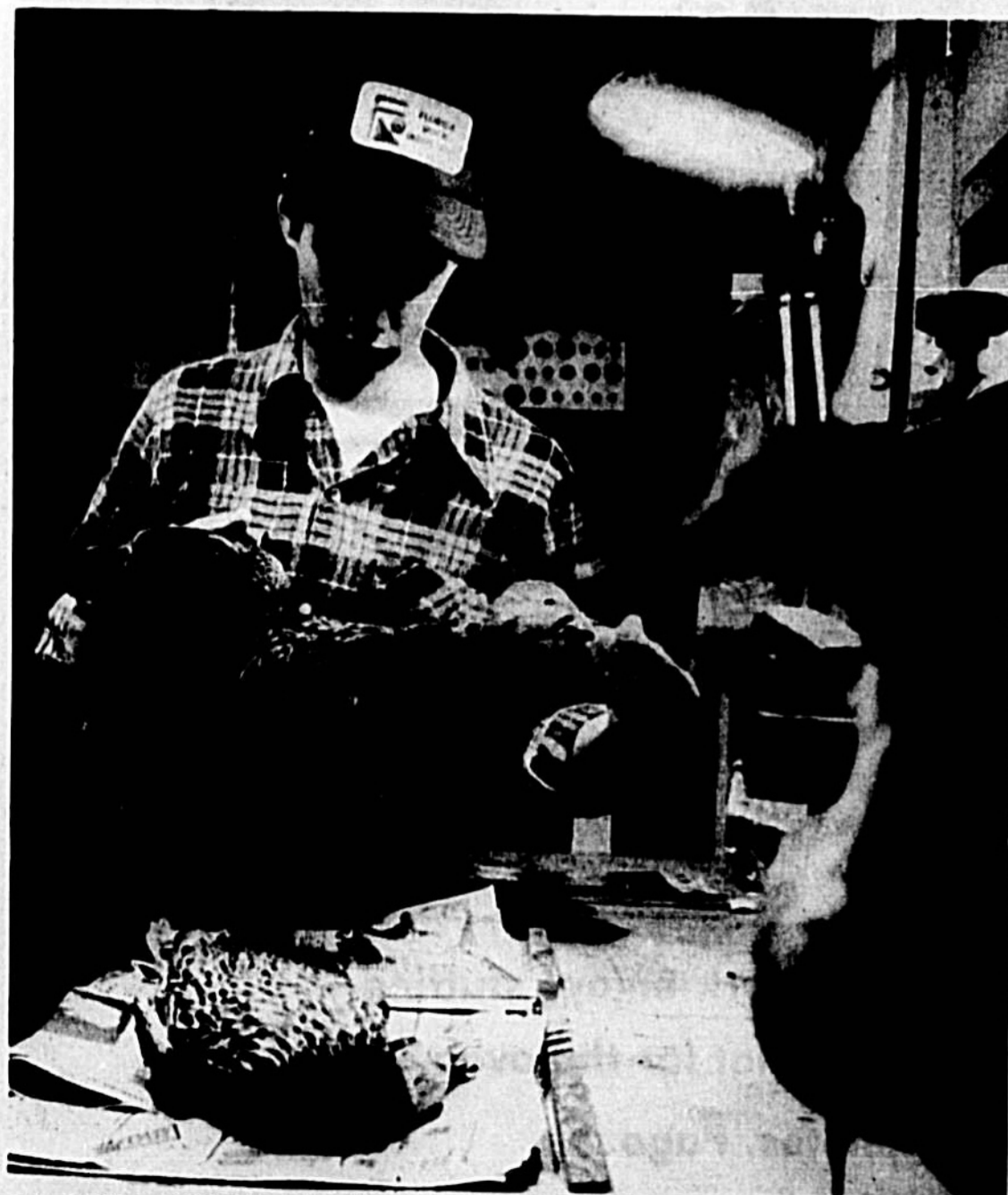


Squirrel on a limb adds realism to display

He has been contacted by the Seminole County Environmental Center and asked to stuff a variety of animals for display to visiting school children. The center supplies him with the animals which are furnished by the Florida Wildlife Sanctuary in Brevard County. He will soon start on a bobcat when the special

styrofoam body arrives. Sam works in a shop off his garage and keeps many of the animals there in various stages of completion which has caused some problems in the past. "A fruit rat got in and ruined about 11 of them (ducks) before we got rid of him," he recalled. The rat was not stuffed.

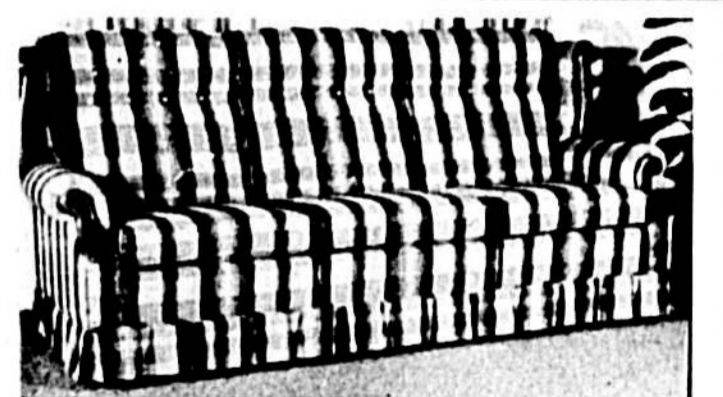

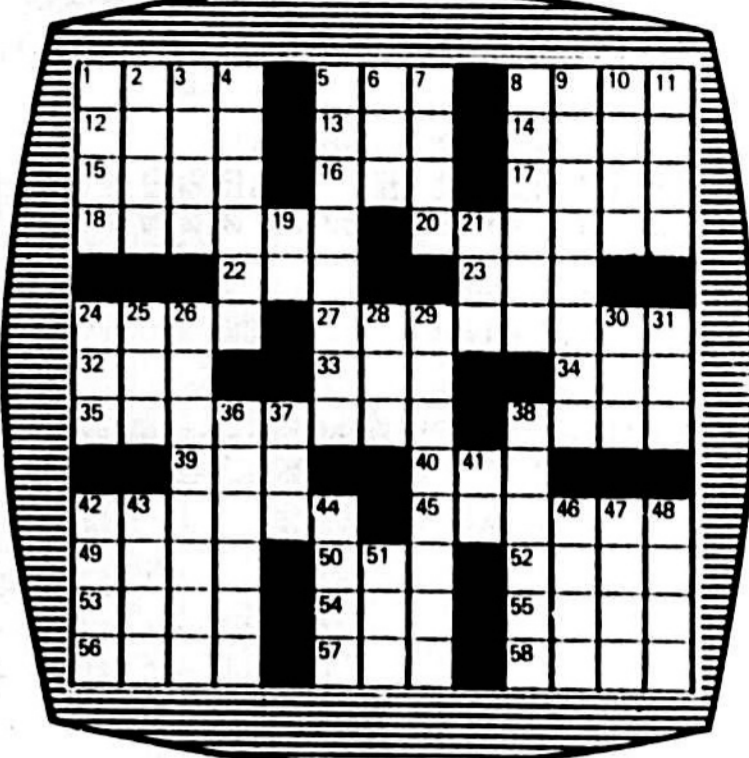

The Kids: 'Where Can We Go?'

Teen-Age Hangout A Problem For Longwood Officials

"This is our place to hang out and have fun," Robert Moore of Longwood said.

But, fun for Moore and his contemporaries is a problem for Longwood city officials.

Each evening dozens of teenagers gather at the Little Dixie Market at Church Street and state road 427 in Longwood. Known throughout the country by teenagers looking for somewhere to spend an evening, the Little Dixie Market is one of the few places in Seminole County where youths under 18 can play pinball and football and shoot pool.

The problem, according to Longwood Police Chief Greg Manning, is not the youngsters inside the combination convenience store and fun center, but the large number spilling out into the adjoining parking lot.

"When you have that many people mingling around, they're

going to get in trouble," Manning said. "I want them to stay inside or go back home."

The issue of the youths hanging out at the Little Dixie Market has been raised at several Longwood City Council meetings.

Among the thus-far rejected suggestions for dealing with the problem which has been discussed are: a 8 p.m. curfew for those under 18; surprise raids to catch the youths with drugs or alcohol and bringing some of the youths home in police cars as an alert and warning to their parents.

After all the suggestions were tentatively rejected, the city council instructed Manning to check with area cities to see how they handle similar problems.

Manning said this week he is working on some solutions but he declined to be specific.

Manning said a solution is necessary because of the increasing number of complaints from local parents and area businessmen. Most vocal in his protest of the situation is the owner of the

Longwood Village Inn, which is next door to the Little Dixie Market.

Manning said the hotel owner has complained customers are afraid of leaving their cars with large groups of youngsters hanging around nearby. The owner has also complained the teenagers sit on and break the wooden fence which surrounds his property.

Manning said "off-hand" he does not recall any incidents of vandalism directly attributable to the youths at the Little Dixie Market. But citywide, Manning said, petty crimes are on the increase.

"We've had one heck of an increase in larcenies and vandalism," Manning said. "There's more kids in this area than you can shake a stick at."

"They're eventually going to wind up in trouble," Manning said of the patrons of the Little Dixie Market. "We should try to act before something happens."

The owner of the Longwood Village Inn, who identified himself only as Christy, said the youths are hurting his business.

"They're bums. They shouldn't allow them to do that," Christy said. "They broke my fence in 10 places."

"Go see the pile of garbage they leave behind. I'm sick and tired of cleaning it everyday," Christy said. "He shouldn't have opened that establishment over there," he said of the Little Dixie Market.

But, Luther Bruce, owner of the Little Dixie Market, views the youngsters differently. He left his convenience store unattended for about 10 minutes while being interviewed in the parking lot behind the store. He said he wasn't afraid of the youths "stealing my merchandise."

"I know all these kids," Bruce said. "These are nice kids. Most people look at these kids like they don't have parents."

Brezhnev Issues New Warning China Reported Ready To Pull Out Of Vietnam

China, its troops in virtual control of the strategic provincial capital of Lang Son, has decided to halt its advance and withdraw, a Japanese report from Peking said today.

The Kyodo News Service said Chinese authorities disclosed the decision to pull out of Vietnam, but the date for the cease-fire and troop withdrawal has not yet been set.

Japanese news reports in Tokyo said today Chinese troops captured a hill overlooking Lang Son Friday morning and Vietnamese forces had abandoned the city, turning it into a "ghost town." They said it was not immediately known if the Chinese would advance further to seize the city.

Kyodo quoted Chinese authorities as saying the ceasefire and pulled decision was made by the Chinese Communist Party Central Military Commission.

The authorities said there will be a halt of all military operations by Chinese forces deployed inside Vietnam and a withdrawal of all personnel to Chinese territory.

Japanese dispatches from Washington, meanwhile, quoted government and Defense Department officials as saying Chinese troops had captured Lang Son, about 90 miles north of Hanoi.

Kyodo said, however, a spokesman for the Vietnamese

Embassy in Peking denied the reports today that Lang Son had fallen. He said Vietnam would continue to counterattack the Chinese troops.

Vietnam Friday rejected a Chinese offer of truce talks and demanded Peking withdraw its troops from Vietnam "completely, immediately and unconditionally."

Soviet President Leonid Brezhnev, in a radio broadcast Friday, added his voice to that demand but stopped short of pledging military action if the Chinese did not withdraw.

Chinese news reports from Peking said the Chinese leadership actually appeared to have been encouraged by Brezhnev's speech which, despite its harsh denunciation of China's "impudent, piratic attack" on



China Vice Premier Ku Mu said in a television interview Friday the war was going "smoothly" and that Chinese troops could be withdrawn according to plan.

The Chinese have insisted they have a war plan that provides for a Chinese withdrawal once its other objectives have been met. But they have been scrupulous in their refusal to discuss them openly.

China's foreign ministry said it was ready to negotiate a Chinese withdrawal. On Friday, the Vietnamese Foreign Ministry sent a note to Peking rejecting its call for truce negotiations and demanding China "stop forever its aggression and completely."

The later warning, contained in a Soviet government statement distributed by the official news agency Tass, also fell short of a military ultimatum although its tone was noticeably harsher than Brezhnev's remarks.

The government statement accused China of preparing to extend its invasion into Laos and warned:

"The Chinese troops must be immediately withdrawn outside the boundaries of Vietnam, military demonstrations on the borders of Laos and preparations for invading that country must be ended. The Chinese aggressors must know that the more crimes they perpetrate, the longer China remains there the harsher will be the

immediately and unconditionally withdraw its troops."
