## Leadership Is Prime Requisite In Success Campaign, Says Karr

Be Coupled With  
Interchanging Ideas  
Get People to Do  
Work as Single Unit

Sanford's Natural  
Resources Superb  
Karr Believes  
City's Location Is  
Best To Be Found

Leadership, coupled with  
intercourse, which leads  
to the interchanging  
of thoughts and ideas by  
the men and consequently  
relying in all working together  
for a common end, is the  
prime requisite for the suc-  
cess of a greater and better  
campaign such as that  
conducted in Sanford by the  
City Bureau for the Im-  
provement of Commerce, declared  
Alexander Karr to the "Great-  
er Sanford Program" committee,  
which held its first meeting at  
the Cafe Monday night and  
which time the campaign was  
launched.

Karr was eloquent in his  
remarks on the situation existing  
in Sanford as affecting the  
improvement of the Chamber  
of Commerce and the committee  
which with a great deal of inter-  
est has been studying the  
"Sanford Plan".

Sanford, with its rich back-  
ground, a community which is not  
satisfied with its leadership and  
stagnation, and the head of navigation on  
the Johns River, has untold possi-  
bilities for development; and should  
become one of the largest  
most influential cities in cen-  
tral Florida, he said. The speaker  
made it clear he candidly believed  
Sanford's natural resources  
are greater than those of any  
other inland Florida city and as  
such are the basis of any city in the  
state.

The fact remains that Sanford  
has the opportunity to advertise through-  
out the nation its rich and fertile  
land, its climate, mild during the  
entire year and full of sun-  
shine and warmth, and its situation  
at the head of the  
Johns River navigation," he  
declared.

Karr cited the fact related  
to the migration of  
people from the east to the west and  
to the south. History repeats  
itself, and it is easy  
to see that the great  
migration never known in the United  
States will come to Florida during  
the next 10 years. Already, he  
said, this migration has started  
and he believed there is born  
in practically every person a de-  
sire to live on or near the seacoast,  
a lake or river. Florida with its  
5,700 miles of seacoast, numerous  
lakes and approximately 30,000  
miles of inland waterways offers  
the prospect more satisfactory in  
his opinion than any other state.

Climate Is Praised  
"Man is by nature a bolder and  
bolder explorer," Dr. Karr asserted, "and  
he will find a full opportunity in  
Florida for this nature to spring  
forth. For the wonderful chances  
here for development tend to make  
every northerner want to make  
Florida his home, and every southerner  
wants to come to Florida to live."

These are the reasons, declared  
the speaker, why Sanford, like  
Lakeland and other  
cities, should put forth  
every possible campaign to make  
the membership campaign of the  
Chamber of Commerce a big and  
complete success. Through funds  
contributed by a large number of  
members, Sanford will be ad-  
vantaged in the entire nation in  
secured desired results for other  
cities which, during the past 10  
years, have sprung into importance  
through this medium.

The fact that "advertising pays,"  
was brought out forcibly in a  
number of instances by Dr. Karr,  
showing that it is a certainty that  
through the advertising medium  
Sanford can be made to develop in  
the future Florida's largest and  
most influential cities.

Three Things Essential  
As a result of Dr. Karr's ad-  
vice, W. H. McFarland, manager  
of the membership campaign, be-  
lieves that there are three essen-  
tial requirements of a successful cam-  
paign that he had to obtain the best  
and most complete results. They  
are:

Everybody must do a certain

## SCOPES FOUND GUILTY AS CASE ENDS ABRUPTLY

Defense Counsel Files Notice  
of an Appeal and Teacher  
Is Released Under Bond of  
\$500; Fine Placed at \$100

Verdict Comes Shortly  
After The Noon Hour  
Young Instructor Insists He  
Has Been Convicted Of  
Violating an Unjust Statute

COURT ROOM DAYTON, Tenn., July 21.—The testimony of William Jennings Bryan, given in the Scopes evolution case, was expunged from record of the case this morning by Judge Raulston.

"I feel that the testimony of Mr. Bryan can shed no light upon any issue that will be pending before the high courts," he declared.

DAYTON, Tenn., July 21.—Admitted agnosticism met fundamentalism here Monday as Clarence Darrow, defense attorney in the Scopes evolution case, drew William Jennings Bryan, associate prosecution counsel, upon the witness stand.

Hundreds of men and women, drawn from the peaceful hills and valleys for miles around pushed close to the rough wooden platform beside the court house at the verbal swords of the two clashed time and again, sending off flashes that drew volleys of hand clapping and booming mountain fox calls.

A silence, broken only by the rustling of the maple trees, settled over the crowd as Arthur Garfield Hays announced the intention of the defense to call Bryan to the witness stand.

The purpose was explained later by Mr. Darrow as an effort to "show the people what fundamentalism is." Bryan arose from the witness stand to the assembled spectators that his purpose was to cast "shame upon the Bible."

Objections Made  
The nature of the examination brought Attorney General Stewart and other members of the prosecution to their feet in time after time to interpose objections. Frequently it even caused Darrow to arise with objections as the witness proceeded to direct the course himself.

Faces grew strained and lips tightened among the spectators at the apparent irrelevance of some of the questions and they arose to cheer as the witness waived aside the protection of the judge with the declaration: "These gentlemen have not had much chance. They did not come here to try this case. They came here to try to reverse religion. I am here to defend it and they can ask me any question they please."

As the examination proceeded, insinuations ceased to be insinuations and became direct, unvarnished and became ironical, until, a fresh one threatened to arouse more controversial remarks than any preceding ones and Judge Raulston adjourned for the day with several members of both the prosecution and defense counsel on their feet and hot words on their tongues.

The questioning began with the usual qualifying questions for the expert witness, and after Bryan announced his intention of calling to the stand Darrow, Malone and Hays.

Studied Bible 50 Years.  
The witness said that he had made considerable study of the Bible, including its interpretations on the particular question involved.

"I have studied the Bible for about 50 years, or some time more than that, but of course, I have studied it more as I have become older than when I was a boy."

"Do you claim that everything in the Bible should be literally interpreted?" asked Darrow.  
"I believe that everything in the Bible should be accepted as it is given there. Some of the Bible is given illustratively. For instance, 'Ye are the salt of the earth.' I would not insist that men are actually salt or that he had flesh of salt but it is used in the sense of salt as saving God's people."

"But when you read that Jonah swallowed the whale—or that the whale swallowed Jonah—excuse me please—how do you literally interpret that?"

## William Jennings Bryan's Testimony In Scopes Trial Is Expunged From Records

RIGHT OF INQUIRY  
GIVEN MINORITY  
IN RAIL HEARING

Van Sweringen Goes on Stand  
To Tell of Enterprise; New  
Turn in Nickel Plate Case  
Taken at Monday's Session

WASHINGTON, July 21.—Counsel for minority railroad stockholders fighting the Nickel Plate merger proposal were given the right Monday before the Interstate Commerce Commission to inquire at length into the affairs of O. P. and M. J. Van Sweringen, promoters of the plan.

H. W. Anderson, representing a Clevelander and Ohio opposition group, took full advantage of the permission, and O. P. Van Sweringen, backed by three document-bearing secretaries, spent the entire day in the stand finding answers to questions about the Van Sweringen really and rapid transit enterprises and the origin, expenditure and value of the Cleveland Union depot project. He had not finished when the session adjourned.

Newton D. Baker, chief counsel for the Van Sweringen interests, gave notice that his clients would draw an objection they had made to the latitude of the cross-examination when it began last month, and Commissioner Meyer remarked that the commission had overruled it any way.

Lists Furnished.  
Mr. Van Sweringen furnished lists of names of stockholders in corporations organized so far back as 1915 to require and develop realty and gave figures for realty to consist of some estimates of realty values in Cleveland.

Mr. Anderson explained he wanted to ascertain first, whether the New York Central Railroad, from which the Van Sweringens originally acquired control of the Nickel Plate, was involved in their affairs. Second, he desired to show that the Van Sweringens, organizing the Cleveland terminals project, or others, had obtained "undisclosed profits" upon which, as capital, the merger railroads using the terminals would be expected to pay a return.

One association with the New York Central as related by Mr. Van Sweringen, arose when that railroad, desiring to use part of the right-of-way into Cleveland of the Cleveland and Youngstown gas company, a Van Sweringen enterprise, bought the money for the latter to build grades and bridges along the joint line. He denied, however, that any "New York Central people" were named in the list of his associate stockholders in the Terminal Properties Corporation which went into the record.

Profits Explained.  
He was also emphatic in declaring that railroads utilizing and now owning the Cleveland terminal would profit greatly by participating in that facility on the basis which the commission now has approved. The Van Sweringens interests, in assembling and selling to the railroads the terminal real estate, he said, reserved rights to erect buildings in the air above part of the terminal tracks.

Hardly a mention of the plan for merging the Nickel Plate with the Chesapeake and Ohio, Hooking Valley, Pere Marquette, and Erie railroads came into the examination. Mr. Van Sweringen was asked whether he had conceived of the consolidation proposals at the time of embarking upon his Cleveland development, and the he said he had not.

BRAZIL DRAWS JAHS  
TOKYO, July 21.—Japanese immigration to Brazil is increasing according to authorities of the Immigration Commission, which announced that 1,500 emigrants would leave for South America, soon. It is expected that approximately 3,000 Japanese emigrants will have gone to Brazil by the end of the year.

## President Receives An Encouraging Report On Proposed Big Tax Cut

SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., July 21.—Plunging into his first real consideration of the administration's legislative program for next session, President Coolidge Monday received an encouraging report from Senator Curtis of Kansas, the Republican leader on the prospect for a heavy tax cut.

A reduction of some \$900,000,000 is in prospect on the basis of treasury reports he has just gone over. Senator Curtis told the executive. He emphasized, however, that should the program for reorganization of the government department be enacted a cut of a half-billion dollars seems possible. He presented no specific plan for tax reduction.

Senator Curtis, who came here today as the house guest of the president, also gave encouraging reports on the farm outlook. He confirmed Mr. Coolidge's view that no special session of congress is necessary now. He declared

## CITY AWARDS CONTRACT FOR \$23,000 DREDGE

City Commission Authorizes  
W. B. Williams as City Manager  
to Award Contract  
After Consideration Bids

Total of Five Bids  
Received Monday  
Firm of Stanley and Gill  
of Jacksonville Gets Contract  
for the Entire Equipment

Following the tabulation of bids received Monday afternoon at a special meeting of the City Commission, it was announced this morning that the contract for furnishing the city with a dredge and other equipment to be used in bulkhead work, has been awarded to the Stanley and Gill Machinery Company of Jacksonville.

Following the opening of bids by Mr. Craig, some discussion was heard from representatives of the competing companies and the bids were referred to City Manager W. B. Williams, City Engineer Fred T. Williams and Consulting Engineer J. E. Craig with instructions to the effect that the prices submitted were to be considered with the quality of equipment. Recommendations were to have been made at the regular meeting of the commission next Monday afternoon. This decision of the commissioners was changed, however, and the city manager was authorized to award the contract to the best bidder.

The price of the Stanley and Gill Company for the dredge complete with all equipment necessary for operation and delivered to this city was \$23,000. Of this amount about \$19,000 is the cost of machinery and equipment while the balance or hull for the dredge costs about \$4,000. It is declared complete includes pumps for the pipe line, sufficient pipe with which to carry on the work here and other necessary accessories.

The dredge, as specified on the city forms, upon which the bids were made, will have a 12-inch flow, with a 300-horse power pump. The newly built dredge will be delivered here as soon as it is completed and conditioned. The time limit for the delivery was not stated.

Other bids were:  
Colson Brothers Company, Orlando, for all machinery complete on hull furnished by the city, \$21,000; J. E. Olin, 821 E. Elliot Machinery Corporation, Baltimore, Md., 10 inch dredge instead of 12-inch, complete with hull, \$33,700; J. Olson and Son, Arlington, Fla., \$6,500 for hull and \$11,000 for complete dredge; Morris Machine Works, Hollywood, Fla., \$18,800 dredging equipment without hull, \$24,400 or dredge complete, \$39,200.

The City Commission further approved Mussen and Abernethy's Sub-division, Teague's addition to the city, and the city engineer, H. C. DuBois, as a member of the negro-subdivision, as submitted by the City Planning Commission. Upon the recommendation of the planning body the commissioners also agreed to change the south boundary of the negro section at Fort Meade to read, "the south line of the city shall be the line of the east quarter of the south west quarter of section 21 east."

A representative of the Hutton Engineering and Construction Company was present and stated that the grading work which was added to the grading force working on East First Street extension this morning.

Now he wants to accelerate the distribution of another millions but desires to entrust the entire subject of public philanthropy with a view to determining a way which will afford the most relief and benefit to those who need and merit help and at the same time offer some permanent good to society.

## COUPON LOAN OF FRANCE EAGERLY GREETED MONDAY

Finance Minister and His  
Cohorts Are Well Pleased  
With Reception Accorded  
Loan to Meet Obligations

PARIS, July 21.—The 4 percent gold coupon loan through which the French government hopes to refund its floating debt and pave the way for general financial equilibrium and settlement of the war debts, got a good start Monday. Notices of the new issue had already been sent to subscribers formed in front of the loan windows of the banks and postoffices.

While clerks were registering subscriptions from the holders of national defense bonds, other French bonds, the minister, attracted by the throngs, wanted to subscribe thereto, only holders of such bonds being permitted to subscribe.

Several days will pass before the financial markets will be fully satisfied with the beginning. The fact that non-holders of defense bonds are showing eagerness to buy gold coupon bonds, the ministry of finance regards as highly significant.

A systematic campaign to lay before the people of every corner of France the advantages of the new bonds began this evening when M. Cailhau broadcast his arguments in favor of the new bonds. At the same time large lectures in all parts of the country.

There is complete absence of statistics as to what portion of the \$400,000,000 of national defense bonds will be exchanged for the perpetual loan.

## Airplanes Will Use Steam As Power, Is British Prediction

CHICAGO, July 21.—The use of steam engines in airplanes was predicted by Dr. John S. Haldane at the annual meeting of the Institute of Mining Engineers.

In the course of a paper on coal and steam, Dr. Haldane said in the very near future he believed steam engines would take the place of internal combustion engines to a very great extent, and that future development of the steam engine would be along the lines of increased steam pressure with smaller and lighter engines.

The complete engine and boiler would be much smaller and lighter than an equivalent internal combustion engine, and would in all probability be more suitable and even superior for use in airplanes and motor cars.

Another scientist, Sir John Curman, said he looked upon oil as a phase which was passing. What oil was doing today could not do again tomorrow, although oil would go into certain channels of use which could never again be able to regain.

Persia Proposes To Monopolize on Sugar

BAGDAD, July 16.—Decision of the Persian government to put through a bill to empower it to take over the import and sale of tea and sugar in Persia as a state monopoly has aroused considerable feeling in commercial circles here. The seriousness of the matter from the local point of view may be gauged from the fact that, a very large proportion of the considerable re-export trade from this country to Persia consists of tea and sugar. Presumably the Persian government intends to make its own arrangements in Europe and to cut out the Bagdad middleman altogether.

and the courts, and thereby does

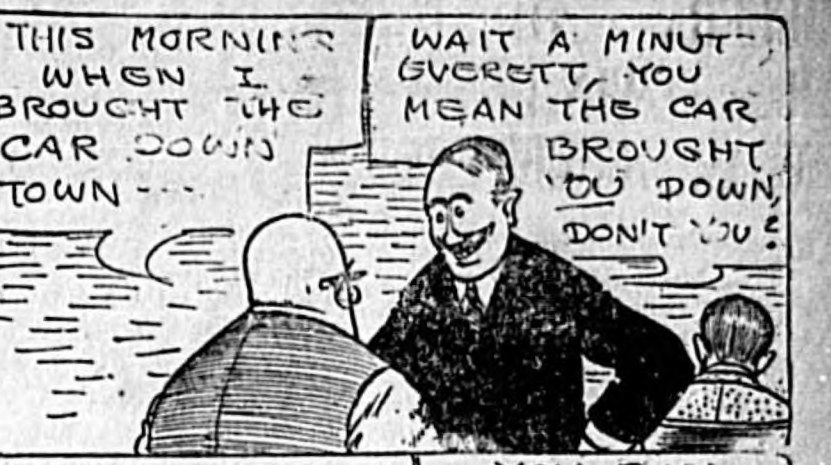
