

In recent years some of our larger Florida cities have grown into such metropolitan centers that virtually the entire county in which they are located is densely populated though a great deal of the area may actually be outside the city limits, thus depriving many persons residing in these outside areas of police and fire protection and many of the other services regularly furnished to urban inhabitants.

To some extend the same thing is true in many other counties, even in rural counties such as Seminole. The development of rural roads and the greater use of the automobile have resulted in a growing population outside of incorporated towns and cities, and the inability of the county government to furnish such residents with those services ordinarily furnished within the city limits is becoming an increasing problem.

Proponents of Amendment No. 3 maintain that under the county charter system as proposed the county government would operate much as city governments do now and that local laws not conflicting with state laws could be enacted on the local level without the necessity of going to the Legislature. Any charter under this amendment which might be adopted would first of course have to be approved

by the people in a county referendum. As is usual with most legislative matters or constitutional questions, there is another side to the story. Opponents of the amendment, and they are legion, present the outstanding objection that there might be no uniformity in the various county charters, that the laws in Orange county, for instance, might be entirely different from those in Seminole County, and that a great deal of confusion might therefore result for people going from one county to another or having business in several counties.
