Negro Woman Is Wounded In Row Over A Husband

Viola Haddock, negro, was arrested by County officers early Sunday morning after she had fired a 410 gauge shot gun through a wooden door at the home of a neighbor in Geneva, seriously wounding an Anna Mae Lockett, who is undergoing treatment at the local hospital, County Sheriff C. M. Hand reported today.

Norman Haddock, husband of the negro woman arrested by officers, and James Lockett, husband of the wounded woman, were fighting in the latter's home and after being refused admittance to the house, Viola Haddock, who had come to take her drunken husband home, obtained a shotgun and after knocking on the door fired through the thin wooden panel seriously wounding the other negro woman as she was preparing to open the door, it was learned at the Sheriff's Office.

Law-enforcing officers who were called to the scene found Viola at her home and she admitted the shooting. She told them that she had intended to kill Lockett whom she said attacked her husband.

Charges against Haddock's wife are awaiting the outcome of the wounds inflicted on the other negro woman. The two men were also arrested and lodged in jail today.

Police Radio Equipment Has Been Delivered

Installation Awaits Final Approval of Radio Commission

Equipment for the installation of a radio system at the local Police Department arrived at the Police Station this morning, but installation awaits the final okay of the license by officials of the Radio Communications Commission in Washington, according to Chief of Police Roy G. Williams, who is largely responsible for the acquisition of this equipment in order "to increase the efficiency of the Department."

The transmitter is an ultra-high frequency type. Messages broadcast over the system will be picked up only by specially constructed receivers which will be installed in the patrol cars of the Sanford Department and in one of the cars belonging to the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

The ultra-high frequency set was chosen, Chief Williams explained, because messages intended for law-enforcing officers cannot be intercepted by the public which receive only messages broadcast over the conventional band.

Adverse weather conditions do not have less effect on this recently developed method of broadcast than for the conventional type, assuring clear reception and better coverage of all times.

The 105 foot mast on which the antenna will be mounted has been delivered to the Police Station and the concrete foundation in which the pole will be mounted has been constructed in front of the station.

C. Of C. Leader Asks Assurance Of No New Laws Cause Of Recession Is Laid On General Lack Of Confidence

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—(AP)—George H. Davis, president of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, called yesterday for "assurance" that no additional laws regulating business would be passed at this session of Congress.

In a formal statement sent to the Senate Unemployment Committee, he said:

"The real cause of the present recession is due to lack of confidence in the future, caused accumulatively by the passage of laws culminating in the undistributed profits tax and the threat of the wages-and-hours bill."

There is no question in the minds of business men, he said, that the following steps would restore confidence:

1. Repeal of the undivided profits tax.
2. A sharp modification in the amount of capital gains tax.
3. Liberalization of the Security Exchange and Commodity Exchange rules "to provide more liquid markets."
4. Assurance that, at this session at least, there will be no additional laws passed further regulating business, such as the wages hours bill.

Davis said these measures "would result in a restoration of confidence which would revive business activities, and do more to solve the unemployment and relief situation than possible by further artificial means, regardless of what form they would take."

Precipitate action by Congress to develop new regulations would be "futile," he said.

"The country is sound, but in order to have prosperous conditions, whether for so-called big business or for little business, plans must be made months, and

Domination of the 600-mile long line means domination of the corridor through which Russian supplies could come to China. (Chinese have reported that the independent Outer Mongolian Republic, established under Russian influence, was merged with the Chinese government after the war started.)
