Three Notes Left In Cell By Goering

Officials Refuse To Divulge Contents; Dozen German Prison Workers Held

NUREMBERG, Oct. 17. (AP)—The Allied Control Council's commission which conducted the execution of the ten top Nazi leaders disclosed today that it had translations of the three notes Hermann Goering wrote and left in his cell before he cheated the hangman. The commission, however, refused to divulge the contents. Meanwhile, the three main Army board investigating the suicide of Goering surrounded himself today with a barrier of security and refused to make any information available to the public as to how the former Reichsmarschal obtained the cyanide and placed the vial in his mouth undetected.

Twelve German prison employees were being questioned today in connection with the mystery. Although not under arrest, they are being "protectively held." They will be kept under constant scrutiny until cleared of all possible complicity. An answer to the mystery was suggested today in a dispatch from Nuremberg by one of the eight Allied correspondents who was in on those last fatal hours. The newsman had been taken on a tour of the death row in Nuremberg prison shortly before the executions were to start and there was considerable commotion with the correspondent peeping into the small iron-barred portholes of each of the condemned men's cells. They saw Goering lying in bed — one arm outstretched over the Army blanket which covered him; the other folded over his chest with the fist clenched. Perhaps in that last moment, the potassium cyanide, the common cause of the visitors may have served to tip off Goering that the hour of his doom was almost at hand. It is possible that in those last moments, that the G. I. guarding Goering's cell turned his head. It was only human for him to turn around to see what the star was all about — that the Nazi crown prince slipped the deadly vial into his mouth.

The big mistake, says the American correspondent, was that the newsman were taken through the condemned block in a body. It might have, turned out differently, he suggests, if the correspondents had been taken through one or two at a time. Goering's suicide was still the major news in Nuremberg, although many sensational rumors circulated about the prison. One of these was that the ring-leaders of Adolf Hitler's Nazi state have been buried at sea. An earlier rumor had them in unmarked graves. There are some additional viewpoints: A barber said Americans gave Goering the poison. A laundress said the poison was slipped into the prison in a bar of soap. "Astraw dolls," actually were hanged and the real Nazis are alive somewhere — despite the fact that many witnesses saw the executions. Meanwhile, British newspapers charged that American military authorities had "gagged" newsmen and bungled the handling of news in connection with the suicide of Goering and the hangings. The charges drew a sharp reply from American military Government public relations officers today, who said the coverage of the hangings was a four-power arrangement.

Final Rites Held For Former Resident

Funeral services were conducted this afternoon at 4:00 o'clock at the Seattle Funeral Home in New Smyrna for William James Griffin, 50, who was found dead in his home there yesterday morning. He is reported to have been dead about 15 minutes when his body was found. The Rev. J. Alvin Inman, pastor of the First Baptist Church there officiated and burial was made in Edgewater Cemetery. Mr. Griffin was born Oct. 11, 1896 in Sanford and had lived in New Smyrna Beach since 1932. He has been a railroad conductor for 27 years, and was a member of the Order of Railroad Conductors. Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Pauline Griffin; one son, Billy; one daughter, Betty; three sisters, Mrs. Margaret Leeks and Mrs. Edwina Handy, both of Sanford; and Mrs. Lamar Mace of Globe, Ariz.; one brother, Douglas C. Griffin of Hendersonville, N. C.

Lifting of OPA restriction, and the immediate filling of hitherto empty meat counters, but due to the fact that orders had been made for much of this meat on Monday before the restrictions were lifted, little if any increase in retail prices is to be noted. Retail prices are, however, an indicated next week. Practically all retailers are taking their full quota of meat as with the lifting of the regulations they find a chance to secure adequate profits which, they say, were very low under OPA control.

Wilson Reveals Sharp Advances In Cattle Prices

JACKSONVILLE, Oct. 17. (Special) — A report received in my office this morning from the Aradita State Livestock Market shows sharp advances in prices all along the line, for cattle handled yesterday in the first sale following President Truman's announcement of the removal of controls, said William L. Wilson, director of Florida State Farmers' Markets, today. "The sale on Tuesday was the first held on the Aradita market for two weeks due to a cancellation last week on account of storm conditions then existing over much of the peninsula.

"The President's announcement of Monday night, he declared, 'came too late to affect volume of offerings on this week's sale. The week being handled as compared with 275 for the first sale in October. Gross receipts however, totaled \$24,138.65, as compared with \$3,838.20, two weeks ago. It should be noted that this gross figure is not accurate as a yardstick for advance since the numbers of animals sold in the various classifications was naturally different, in the two sales. "The best indicator of advance, is in a comparison by classifications. Price ranges were: Calves, \$9.40 to \$19.50 per hundred pounds this week, and \$5 to \$13.40 two weeks ago; yearlings, \$9.50 to \$13.30 this week, \$9.60 to \$11.50 two weeks ago; heifers, \$7.70 to \$14.10 this week, \$8.50 to \$10.10 two weeks ago; cows, \$7.00 to \$15.10 this week, \$7.50 to \$12.20 two weeks ago; steers, \$10.50 to \$14.10 this week, \$8.70 to \$12.20 two weeks ago; bulls, \$10.90 to \$15.50 this week, \$8.00 to \$10.40 two weeks ago.

"Market Manager John H. Kelly advised me this morning that producers and buyers were very grateful and happy for the lifting of OPA controls off meat. Buyers and producers did not have time to gather cattle for this week's sale. We expect a good sale next Tuesday. "Manager Kelly, veteran head of this largest unit among State-operated livestock markets, today gave this comment: 'Meat has been the cheapest food on the market for several years and the above prices should work higher in the next couple of weeks to get in line with wages and other commodities. After serving as ringmaster and manager of the Aradita market for the last eight years, he believes the producers of cattle in this district got the first break in their favor at the sale here this week that they have had in five years.'

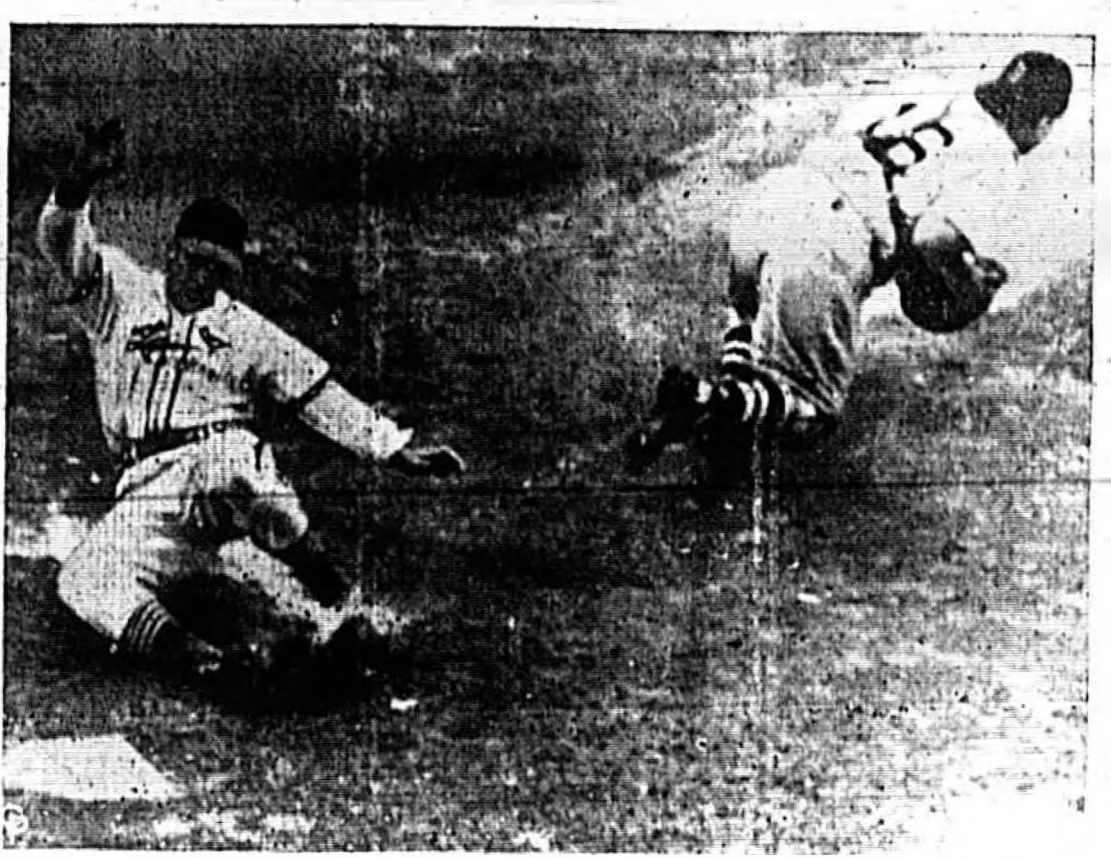

Alexander, Deal And Tyre Stand Out For Seminoles

Sparkling Defense Of Feds Deciding Factor In Contest

If last night's gridiron exhibition by the Seminole High School Baby Celery Fed eleven in any decision of what Semifinals may field during the next couple of years, local football fans need not worry much about having a winning club. Coach Fred Canas sent his smaller but faster charges against a large Seabreeze High Baby Sandcrab machine and although the locals were outplayed, 254 yards to 221, the running Johnny Alexander, Don Deal, Lloyd Swain and Bill Humphrey, led to be too much for the visitors to be so much for the visitor and the Baby Feds racked up their first win of the season by a score of 25 to 18.

The contest was only several minutes old when Swain, Alexander and Deal, on a series of line plunges and tricky off tackle thrusts, carried to the Seabreeze one yard stripe. Deal promptly ploughed over center for a touchdown. The try for the extra point from placement failed.

Daytona Beach took the kickoff and worked the oval down to the Sanford 12 where the Fed line held and the locals took over. However, a Seabreeze lineman broke through and deflected Swain's punt and the Sandcrabs recovered on the Fed 28. Buchaven and Pete Alexander carried down to the 24 where Alexander went wide around his left for a touchdown. The conversion attempt failed and the score was knotted.

In the second period, the Feds took over on their own 48 and Swain picked up 10 yards on a beautiful display of hip-swinging and deceptive footwork. Alexander carried down to the 20, Deal tipped a quick aerial to the seat Alexander for 16 more yards and then the Fed fullback, Dean crashed over from the four. Again the extra attempt failed.

The Feds seemed to be Daytona 23 and Buchaven returned to the 43. Daytona fumbled on the 46 and the Seabreeze promptly began another exciting thrust. Alexander sped off tackle for five yards Swain waded through the Daytona secondary for 20 more. Deal, Alexander and Swain ploughed and skinned down to the Seabreeze, eight yard stripe. Swain then flung around left end for another touchdown. Deal crashed over center for the extra point.

Going into the third period with a 19 to 0 lead, the Feds received the kickoff and carried to the Seabreeze 41 before losing the ball on downs. Buchaven picked up nine and 11 yards on two tries. Miller passed to Buchaven for eight and carried down to the Fed 11. Small skinned his right end for a touchdown. Again the conversion attempt from placement was blocked.

In the final quarter, Seabreeze recovered a fed miscue on the Sanford 48-yard line. Buchaven promptly traveled to the Fed 59. Small picked up 24 and then went over for a touchdown from the six. Again Seabreeze failed to convert.

Venetian Glass Is Scarcer Now Than Before War

AP Newsfeatures
VENICE—Venice's famed glass industry, a war casualty, is not dead. But it is badly crippled.

Sergio Bacci, proprietor of one of the biggest factories, the Ar-

Vetraria Murano (AVEM), says only 10 of the 52 on Murano Island are producing. They employ some 200 persons. Before the war, 10 times that many were at work.

The reasons for the curtailment, he says, are the lack of coal and wool for the furnaces, sand and silica to make the glass and tourists to buy the finished product.

We used to get the coal and the silica from Germany, the sand from Fontainebleau in France, and the wool from Yugoslavia," he explains. "Now we get none of them."

You can expect, therefore, Bacci adds, that Venetian glass, with the intricate designs in gold and glass dating back six centuries, will be scarce and expensive for the next few years. Even so, he does not expect that Venice will lose her markets.

"Good Venetian glass," he contends, "can't be imitated. France and England and Germany and the United States all make good clear glass. But they haven't the workmanship in design that Murano has. And even if they did their labor costs would make the price too high."

The artists who put together mosaics out of minute pieces of colored glass, using as many as 5,000 for one postcard-size picture, work five to six days to complete one, but it sells for only \$8.88.

"Some of it is not as good as it used to be," Bacci says frankly. But he adds with pride, "It is still the best in the world."
