

### Power Company Is Given Award For Florida Ads

Efforts of the Florida Power & Light Company to extend Florida's tourist season into the spring and summer months through its "Stay Through May" and other campaigns received national recognition this week. E. H. Hartzell, president of the Public Utilities Advertising Association affiliated with the Advertising Federation of America, announced that the Florida company's advertisement "Springtime in Florida" in Florida magazine has been chosen best "public relations" newspaper ad of the past year in the southeast.

Formal announcement and presentation of an award certificate to Florida Power & Light Company will be made in Chicago Tuesday, June 25, during the Public Utilities Advertising Association national convention.

"The award to your company," Hartzell wrote, "coming after a year of such expert committee of judges from outside the utility industry, is a signal honor." Several thousand entries in all phases of public utility advertising and publicity were considered by the judges in picking the Florida utility ad as best.

The winning advertisement was prepared by the company's advertising division, of which Bernard Clark is manager. For many years the company has been active in seeking cooperation of Floridians to cure "summer ailments" and has taken the initiative by devoting a large por-

### Kissimmee Plans Cattleman's Day For July Fourth

KISSIMMEE, June 20.—This city has planned a full day of thrilling excitement for the Fourth of July, according to plans announced by executives of the Florida Cow Capital Roundup company. The program, which begins at 10:00 A. M. and lasts until 8:00 P. M., includes junior league baseball game, a public barbecue, and a "Cattleman's Field Day" which will feature horse racing and cowboy events. The barbecue will be served inside the gates at noon, and ample food for five thousand people is being provided by merchants and cattlemen of the Cow Capital. The gigantic rodeo arena, built at a cost of \$25,000 just north

of the city, will be the scene of the celebration.

Amateur cowboys are invited to participate for prize money offered in the various events which include wild cow milking, calf roping, bulldogging, steer riding, and horse racing.

Special exhibits such as the twin calves which recently attracted state-wide attention to the farm of Clay Partin, near St. Cloud, will be on view, as well as an exhibition of prize-winning Brahmas and other breeds of cattle.

Every ticket of admission to the grounds bears a stub which is good for the barbecue dinner. Thirty head of cattle, a thousand loaves of bread, planks by the barrel, and dozens of pounds of coffee are being ordered for the big feed.

Hitler Personally Hands His Peace Terms In Railway Car At Compiegne

French Action Is Unreported

German Troops Take French Battleships Under Construction

Hitler personally handed his peace terms—described as not humiliating for France—to the French armistice envoys in the historic railway car in the French forest of Compiegne.

The scene was the identical spot where Imperial Germany surrendered to the victorious Allies at the end of the World War, Nov. 11, 1918.

No immediate hour was given for the "cease firing" order, which is expected to follow swiftly—unless France rejects the Axis-dictated terms.

German troops still are mopping up sections of France's now abandoned Maginot Line. Two 35,000-ton French battleships, the Clemenceau and Richelieu were captured at Brest, where they were being built.

The Nazi Fuehrer met the French plenipotentiaries in the same historic railway car in which Marshal Foch dictated the terms on which Kaiser Wilhelm's Imperial armies laid down their arms.

Col. Gen. Wilhelm Keitel, chief of the Nazi high command, first read the preamble to the armistice conditions, with Hitler remaining silent nearby.

Four aims of the German armistice terms were announced: To prevent continuance of the war in France, there would have to be: (1) Complete demilitarization of the French zone.

(2) Full guarantees "necessary for the continuance of the war against Great Britain." (3) French industries, materials, wealth to be taken over by Germany to fight England.

(4) Pre-conditions for a new European peace. In that car, at 11 o'clock of the morning of Nov. 11, 1918, Maxime Weygand, the losing Allied generalissimo of the war, stood with Foch while the conquering marshal signed with a sorrowful German delegation a peace dictated on Allied terms.

This was three days after the terms had been made known. For Germany, today is an anniversary in time as well as in memory, for on Friday, June 21, 1919, the German battle fleet was scuttled at Scapa Flow—just one week before the signing of the treaty of Versailles, against which Hitler has thundered so long.

While that armistice of a generation ago was yesterdays on the conditions that the Allies had made, this one is expected to be no less firm on conditions—but Germany has made.

While this new ceremony between victor and vanquished was being prepared, Hitler's air force gathered strength for the battle already launched against Britain.

Four French emissaries, in a white plane, flew yesterday to a rendezvous with Hitler and his delegates to learn at what further cost to France Germany would halt the lightning war which has engulfed half of that nation.

German conquest of most of the western European coast—the last success being the capture of the French naval base of Brest, reported as strategically placed for blitzkrieg against the British even while peace is being concluded with France.

The German press and radio acknowledged in repeated reports that French officials disagreed over laying down arms, but added that this was of no importance.

"No logical mind in England or France... is able to make a decision which envisages putting up resistance against German troops on French soil," one newspaper commented.

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"Anti-Appesement" Party

With the appointment of two outstanding Republicans to high cabinet positions, President Roosevelt has knocked the props out from under the foreign affairs plank of the Republican party platform about to be drafted in next week's convention.

For if there is anyone in the country more international-minded than President Roosevelt it is former Secretary of State Stimson, who once advocated armed action to prevent Japanese aggression against Manchuria, or Col. Frank Knox, who has urged a declaration of war as a means of extending real aid to the Allies.

If the Republicans decide next week that under the circumstances the best thing to do is to support President Roosevelt's foreign policy, they will be deprived of an issue on this all important subject at a time when other issues are dwarfed to insignificance.

Some Republicans and indeed a few Democratic isolationists, are trying to use the appointments of Stimson and Knox as a means of branding the Democrats as the "war party."

Undoubtedly there are some who would follow the lead of Neville Chamberlain in trying to satisfy Hitler by making concessions. They would undoubtedly contend that if Hitler wants the French islands of Miquelon and Martinique, let him have them.

We do not believe there is any present danger of the Democratic party becoming that kind of a party. And the elevation of two such Republicans as Stimson and Knox proves it.

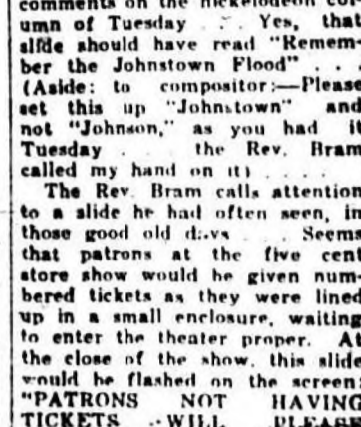

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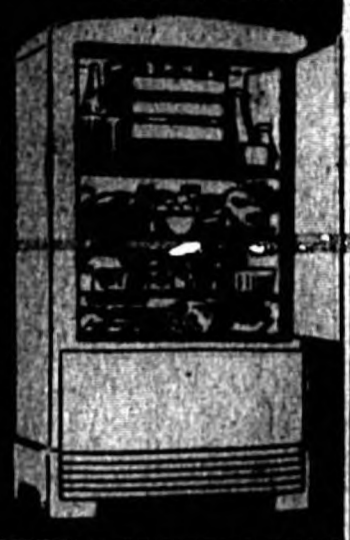

## Dutch Tell How 'Chutists Used 5th Column Aid Report Of Nazi Deceptive Tactics Received From London

WASHINGTON, June 21.—(AP)—The information bureau of the Netherlands Legation in Washington announced that it had received from London a report prepared by Dutch military officers warning the British of the type of Fifth Column and parachute tactics that they must expect from the German Army. The Dutch military officers, who managed to reach England after the Nazi invasion of the Netherlands, turned the report over to the British high command in London so that they might plan how to deal with such attacks from within the country as well as from without.

Each Nazi was equipped with a pistol and twenty-four rounds of ammunition. Sometimes this equipment was augmented by light machine guns or automatic rifles. He was clad in overalls, the heavy knees of which contained chemical food for ten to fourteen days. In his hands was a miniature radio for receiving orders from German planes. He also carried several hand grenades. Some were dressed as girls, some as priests, some as nuns. Dutch uniforms were dragged up used. These Germans in Dutch uniforms created confusion everywhere. When the ruse had been discovered, no one knew whom to trust. Everybody suspected everybody else.

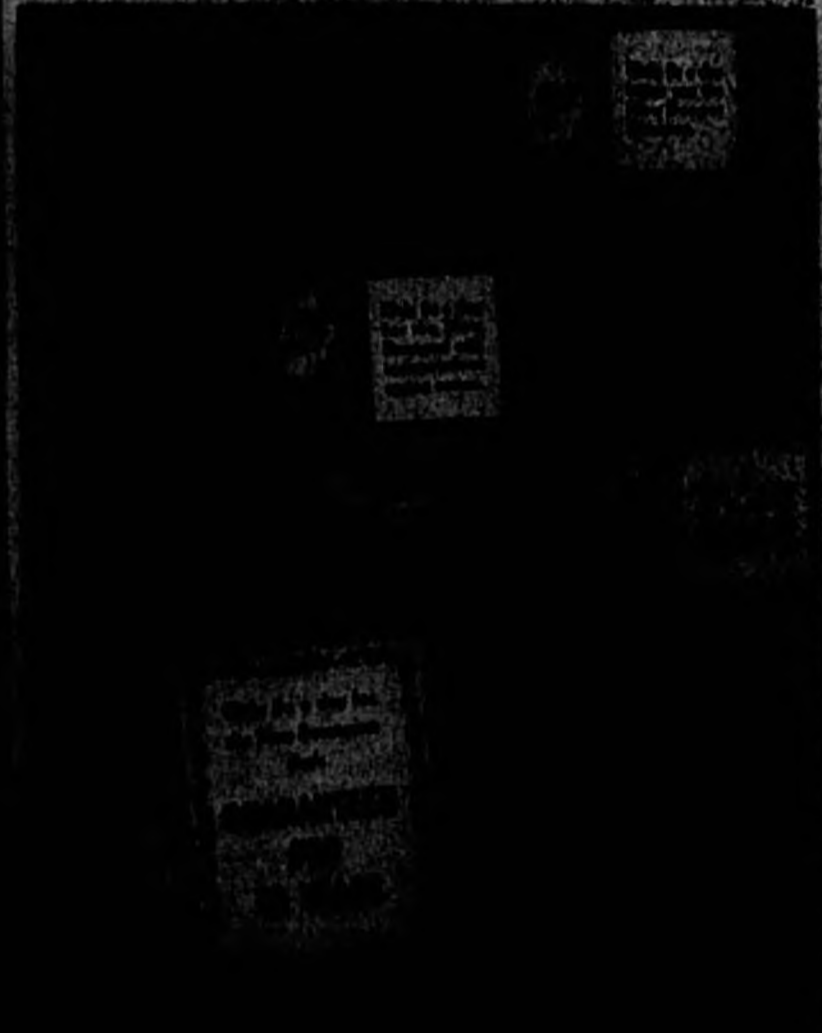

### Indian League Organized By Eastern Tribes

#### 16 Councils Attending Growing Corn Meet Bury Hatchet

DARREN, Conn., June 21.—(AP)—Ninety original American members of sixteen Indian tribes, celebrated their first annual Growing Corn Festival here and celebrated with tribal dances and ceremonies the organization of the Federated Eastern Indian League which aims to improve relations among Indian groups.

Attending were Mohicans, Menomonees, Powhats, and Schaghticoke from New York; Tuscaroras from New York and Canada; Shawanos and a Cherokee from Oklahoma; Wampanoags, Pequotas and Pocumtocs from Massachusetts; Chippewas from Minnesota; a Catawba out of South Carolina; a Hopi from Arizona; and a Mayan from New York. The Hopi sold trinkets and the Mayan told visitors he was a direct descendant of the last Aztec emperor of the Mayan Empire in Mexico.

The Indian League was established last night by chiefs around the council within the Federated circle, which was bounded by four small fires of hickory and sweet grass representing the four winds. As the pipe of peace was passed, the Calumet dance was presented and a booklet was passed with traditional significance.

Chief Red Cloud, of the Cheyenne tribe, was elected Grand Chief. Others elected were: Grand Medicine Man, Chief Fire; a Chippewa; Great Fire; Chief Bushkin, a Mohican; and Great Tally, a Narragansett.

George Barrett, first selectman of Stamford, was admitted to the league as an adopted member in recognition of his role in the Hill of Chief of the Hill. After being handed a red feather tipped with white, signifying his position, he told the council that he had long been proud of the Indians who lived on his farm.

Members of the Indians were given a booklet. They said that their ancestors were little more than headhunters, public opinion has caused them to adopt peaceful ways. The booklet was witnessed by 100 persons. They were held in a posture surrounded by a fire before the nine totems in which many of the Indians were the night, which are peopled by individual tribes, including an Indian wedding, a Catawba Hopi dance, a Medicine Dance, a Hunter's Dance, and a Powwow Dance in which 25 Indians and feathered Indians were present.

During the program, Indian moccasins were for sale, and a Narragansett Indian blouse offered for sale. "Pocumtocs," she said, "are not extinct."

### 2 Billions In French Assets Frozen By U.S.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—President Roosevelt has signed an order freezing about \$2,000,000,000 of French assets consisting of short-term French gold and securities held by the French government and its nationals in the United States for safekeeping. The order stops the confederation of these assets by the German invading army. Later Henry Morgenthau, Jr., Secretary of the Treasury, asserted he thought that the French government surrendered to the Germans and Italians, the freezing order would stand. Meanwhile, considerable speculation arose here whether the United States would permit the turning over of these assets to the new French government for reparations if Germany and Italy demanded such payments.

#### Spiritualist Fails; Woman Wants Refund

SÃO PAULO, Brazil, June 21.—(AP)—When there was no sign of her business worries disappearing after she had paid two-thirds of the \$75 fee asked by a spiritualist, Senora Erika Nogueira Oliveira, 65, called in the police. She said the spiritualist, Carmo Mirabelli, director of the "Brazilian Psychic Institute," had held spiritualist sessions in her home in Taubate and had burned an iron pipe in her garden to draw away the evil spirit of her home, but that her worries continued. The police said there were other similar accusations against 25-year-old Mirabelli.

### Billion Dollar Munition Plant Chain Studied

Several Score Factories Would Turn Out Powder, Shells, Armor Plate Planes

WASHINGTON, June 22.—(AP)—The construction of a billion dollar chain of government munitions plants has been recommended officially to President Roosevelt as a part of the further expansion of the five billion dollar defense program.

Authentic sources reported that the Chief Executive already is studying the recommendations by the National Defense Commission that Congress be asked immediately for an additional \$500,000,000.

One of the major proposals was that the government build without delay several score of plants to turn out powder, shells, armor plate, aircraft and other munitions.

He had been seriously ill and confined to the hospital for two weeks.

Butler, who would have been 70 years old July 30, died at 6:30 P. M. in recent years he had been regarded as a leader in opposition to any course which might lead to American military intervention in European affairs.
