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Sanford Ave. Road Project Starts Monday

Widening of Sanford Ave. from 13th St. to 23th St. will start next week, weather permitting, City Street Supt. Eddie Griffith said today.

City property on the west side of Sanford Ave. will be used to widen the street eight feet.

The city will supply the labor and right of way and the county will pay about \$10,000 for the necessary materials. The street will be widened for 5,140 feet but will remain two lanes.

The city will cooperate with home owners on moving shrubbery but, shrubbery must be moved along with at least 13 big trees, Griffith said.

The Sanford sewage department has started a downtown sanitary sewer line that will end using many storm sewers for organic waste. The new sewer extension being put in on Elm Ave. from Fulton St. almost to Commercial Ave. will serve the proposed Florida State Bank building on First St. The extension will eventually cover an area between Oak Ave. and French avenues and between Fulton and First streets.

These lines will someday run to the site of the proposed \$400,000 sewage disposal plant northwest of Sanford on Lake Monroe, sewage supt. Robert Kelly said yesterday.

Navy Inspector General Tours Station

The Sanford Naval Air Station is being inspected today by Rear Admiral J. W. Ailes III, Naval Inspector General, whose headquarters are in the Pentagon.

Adm. Ailes is here to begin a comprehensive survey to determine the adequacy of the facilities and the efficiency and utilization of the manpower at the Naval Air Station. Reports of his inspection will be made to interested activities of the Navy and to the Chief of Naval Operations, Admiral Arleigh Burke.

The visit of Adm. Ailes will begin the comprehensive survey to be continued by members of his staff during the rest of this month. The admiral was greeted by a group of

Air Station officers and the civic group conferred with Adm. Ailes on community relations and mutual problems in the operation of military base in a community.

"We wanted Adm. Ailes to be assured that the air station fence does not separate the Navy from the rest of the community," said County Commission Chairman John Krider who was in the delegation of special guests of the station commander and the CO of HatWing One.

"We also issued an official invitation to Adm. Ailes to retire here when he completes his service and join the many other Navy families now permanently located in the county," Krider said.

Adm. Ailes is a widely experienced Navy officer with more than 30 years of service. His career has included action at Pearl Harbor, the western Pacific and the Korean action. His decorations include the Navy Cross, Legion of Merit, Silver Star and Bronze Star. He has been director of the Shore Establishment Development and Maintenance Division of the Chief of Staff of Naval Operations.

Planner Recommends Monroe Yacht Basin

Sanford resident city planner, Gerald Dake, last night recommended to the Sanford planning board that the Lake Monroe bandshell be torn down and replaced with a marina and yacht basin.

A city yacht club building should replace the bandshell which has been costing Sanford money for many years, Dake said. The sea wall should also

be further extended into Lake Monroe to give shelter to boats, the city planner said. The planning board had no comments on Dake's suggestion.

Reporting on land use in Sanford, Dake said that the city has a tremendous high percentage of vacant land. Of the 2,834 acres with the city, 1,301.13 acres or 47 per cent are vacant.

Dake said that Sanford now has about eight persons per gross acre population. The city could have 15 persons per acre and still have a low population density, he explained.

Dake predicted that Sanford's 19,000 population will rise to 40,000 by 1980. Right now the city's existing limits could support 36,000 people, he said.

The planning board expressed approval of Dake's plan for a perimeter road to stop traffic congesting downtown areas and going through residential areas. The road is in concord with State Road Dept. plans and this department would be expected to bear a majority of the cost, Dake said. The road would run from First St. south on Grapeville to

23th St., east to meet 17-92 near Sunland Estates and across 17-92 to the Old Orlando Highway. From there it would go north on Orlando Highway to a point near Ginderville, east to Cameron Ave. north on Cameron to 13th St. and there meet a proposed extension of Seminole Blvd. and run along Lake Monroe.

Nazi-style swastikas were smeared across Jewish synagogues in Des Moines, Iowa; Milwaukee, Wis.; Harrisburg, Pa. and Tampa and Jacksonville. Two Jacksonville synagogues reported receiving the threatening letters.

Dixie Senators Hit Ike's Speech

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Southern senators today bitterly criticized President Eisenhower's State of the Union farm proposals.

But the senators, with a few notable exceptions, gave a hesitant pat-on-the-back to many parts of the speech.

Sen. Allen J. Ellender (D-La.), chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee, charged that the administration again failed to make any new proposals.

Sen. Richard B. Russell (D-Ga.), leader of the southern bloc, said Eisenhower "did not indicate a willingness to apply any remedy except the Benson formula of lower prices and lower farm income... which will kill rather than cure the patient."

Sen. Herman Talmadge (D-Ga.) said the "failure to outline a positive and realistic program" was the most serious omission in the message.

Sen. Olin D. Johnston (D-S.C.) called the whole speech a mass "of half-truths and omitted truths."

He said "I want no more of Benson or Eisenhower's proposals such as the belated soil bank farm busting project."

Sen. John Stennis (D-Miss.), expressing his disappointment at Eisenhower's failure to spell out a farm program, said "without his help there is scant chance to pass a constructive farm bill this session."

Possibly the sharpest criticism came from a southerner in the House of Representatives — Agriculture Committee Chairman Harold D. Cooley of North Carolina.

"The economic position of the nation's farm families worsens day by day and all the President has to prescribe is more Benson, more Benson, more Benson," Cooley said.

But many southerners found something to praise in the speech.

Sen. George A. Smathers (D-Fla.) called it a "splendid speech."

Longwood Council Seeks Better Utility Terms

The Longwood Town Council last night authorized Mayor A. R. Lohrmann to talk with City Attorney Vebber Haines about getting better service from Florida Power Corp.

Lohrmann said he told a Florida Power Corp. representative that if Longwood doesn't get better service the town would try to re-negotiate their contract with the company. Council President J. E. Reiter said that many street lights in the town are out. Longwood is now in a position to have the company start paying the town for the privilege of serving it, the mayor said. "I think they are not living up to their end of the bargain," he explained. Longwood now pays the power company about \$200 per month for service.

Episcopal Church In Sanford Gets Assistant Priest

Announcement was made this week of the arrival of the Rev. George T. Swallow to be assistant priest at Holy Cross Episcopal Church in Sanford.

The Rev. John W. Thomas, rector of the parish, made the announcement, praising it as a step in the growth of the congregation. This is a most significant event and a sign of the expanded service which Holy Cross has played in the community since its foundation in 1872, he said.

Father Swallow will share in the services, parish activities, and will also be available for counselling. He will have an office in the parish house. Until suitable quarters are arranged for him in Sanford, he will reside with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Francis P. Swallow, in DeBary.

In 1954, Father Swallow entered the College of the Most Holy Trinity, at the University of Toronto, Ontario, from which he was graduated with honors in Theology in 1957. Since ordination he has served pastorates in New York and Florida. During the summer and fall of 1959 he was incumbent at Homestead and Vere Beach.

Before entering the ministry, Father Swallow was graduated from Worcester Academy, Worcester, Mass., his home town, in 1953. He attended Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Class of 1948, and received a Bachelor of Science degree in Naval Architecture and Business Administration in New York City. As a Naval architect, and later, as an Industrial Engineer, he was employed at the Pearl Harbor Naval Shipyard. After the Korean War, he worked as an industrial engineer in the abrasive industry.

While living in Hawaii, Father Swallow became interested in sports cars, and drove a "red" MG. He belonged to sports car clubs in Hawaii and New York and drives his own car in "road rallies" - not races. He has plans to add to his collection, mostly of ships. His office at Holy Cross is the home port for a three-foot, full-rigged ship which he built in seminary.

"He could go in any league, any time," says George. "But he's one of the few around today who could."

Who was the greatest of them all?

"Well, I'd have to take Strangler Lewis," Ed pondered. "He had size at 260 pounds; he had endurance and he had knowledge of the game. Jim London was the most clever of them all, but overall I'd take the Strangler against any of them."

Modesty prevents the big quiet man from including himself, but Ed Don was one of the great ones, too. He came out of Michigan as a civil engineer and tried his hand at it for six months. That was enough, George turned professional wrestler early in 1930 and before the year was out had won the undisputed world heavyweight title from Gus Sonnenberg.

NFL Expansion Move Blasted By 'Skin' Owner

MIAMI BEACH (UPI) — Owner George Marshall of the Washington Redskins today accused National Football League owners of favoring expansion to Dallas and Minneapolis as a means of "destroying" the proposed American League.

And he warned that such a policy could only haul the NFL into the federal courts on charges of monopoly.

The outspoken Redskins president, leading figure in the NFL for 28 years, said that if the other owners defy him and go through with their expressed plans at their meeting here starting Jan. 20, it would:

—Subject the NFL to federal charges that it is a monopoly.

—Upset the NFL's present balance and its lucrative television program.

—Seriously interfere with the colleges which are the "incubators of professional talent."

"The only reason for expansion I've heard from other owners is that we could destroy the new league," insisted the valuable Marshall.

"If that is the only reason, then we are guilty of monopolistic practices. No one can give me an intelligent reason for adding a couple of new franchises."

In Chicago, owner George Halas of the Chicago Bears disagreed with Marshall that expansion would lay open the NFL to anti-trust action.

"Our intent," he said, "was to expand when competition among our clubs began to equalize itself on an extremely high level and we have reached the plateau."

Stadium Gets First Advertiser For '60 Season

Through its sports-minded president, T. E. Tucker, the Florida State Bank of Sanford yesterday became the first Municipal Stadium fence advertiser in 1959 to reserve space for the 1960 Florida State League Baseball season ahead.

W. Kenneth McRoberts, principal sponsor of the Sanford Greyhound team that will be supplied by the Kansas City Athletics, announced today that 1959 space holders will be given first opportunity to renew, and that a sales campaign will be undertaken next week under the direction of new general manager Peter Schaal.

Pointing out that fence and score-card advertising is the "bread and butter" income upon which all clubs must depend for survival, McRoberts expressed the hope that the "24 local sportmen who want to bet for us so reservedly last spring will be with us again this season."

He stated also that a general meeting of baseball fans will be held early in February at which time election of officers will be a feature.

Meanwhile, Robbie Robertson, the Suffolk, Va., 10-year baseball veteran who will manage the Sanford Greyhounds this summer writes that he is expecting "great things of several players he has seen assigned to him shortly. He caught for Jacksonville Beach in 1952 when the Florida State League had ten teams, and is familiar with Municipal Stadium.

Angry California Secedes From NBA

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UPI) — California, blasting the National Boxing Assn. for alleged failure to crack down on hoodlums in the fight game, seceded today from the NBA.

Jack W. Urch, executive officer of California's five-man commission, said Thursday his group had bolted because the NBA "wouldn't even declare themselves against the hoodlum influence."

The state, which handed approximately 90 per cent of last fiscal year's boxing business, thus joined New York and Massachusetts beyond the plans of the NBA.

FCC In New Celebrity Shuffled Row

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) today found itself in the middle of a celebrity-shuffled row over whether broadcasters are improperly plugging songs which they control.

None of the well-known personalities involved in the controversy are Helen Hayes, authors Pearl Buck and Howard Lindsay, poet Ogden Nash and song writers Rodgers and Hammerstein, Jimmy McHugh, and Otto Harbach.

The American Guild of Authors and Composers asked the FCC Thursday not to renew the licenses of more than 200 radio stations on grounds they were "controlling interests" in the music.

The report was filed by Burton Lane, president of the guild on behalf of himself and Nash and McHugh during the commission's hearings on radio-TV decisions.

Lane renewed charges that broadcasters maintain a 10 million dollar annual "black fund" to promote music they control. He said they work through Broadcast Music, Inc. (BMI).

Broadcast Music immediately filed a statement that Lane "knowingly distorts the facts." It said BMI competes directly with the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP), with which guild members are affiliated.

Injured Sailors Rescued At Sea

CHARLESTON (UPI) — The Caribbean cruise ship Jerusalem early today rescued two sailors who had been seriously injured in an explosion aboard the 15,725-ton Panamanian registered tanker Chrysalis.

The rescue took place 200 miles off Puerto Rico when the Jerusalem received an SOS from the tanker and rushed back 85 miles at top speed for the during midnight rescue made in seas so high the waves hit the deck repeatedly.

Collins Hunts For New State Road Chairman

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. LeRoy Collins hunted today for a new road chairman to carry out the biggest road building program in the state's history.

Road Chairman Joe Grotegut announced his expected resignation Thursday, effective Jan. 18. And the governor said he hoped to find a replacement by that date.

Grotegut, who has supervised the largest highway construction surge in Florida history in the last two years, will become general manager of Rose Printing Co. He also will direct publication of several magazines.

The doctor's stepdaughter Thursday backed up the eyewitness story of the Finch maid that she ran to the help of Mrs. Barbara Finch, 33, and then saw Finch chase her into the night and heard a gun shot.

The witness was 12-year-old Patti Daugherty. She is the daughter of Mrs. Finch's first marriage. In this bizarre case, the Finches previously had traded money—the doctor was previously married to the wife of Forrest Daugherty and vice versa.

Patti held her composure on the stand, though she cried before and afterwards, as she told of hearing her mother's screams from the garage but being so afraid she ran back into the house and locked the doors.

The trial was assuming all the Hollywood trappings. Finch got a 42nd birthday cake at the recent Thursday. Actress Terry Moore joined the press gallery to get "experiences" for a new picture role.

Red-haired Carol Tregott so far had come off well in the trial. Not a witness so far had incriminated her in the shooting of the doctor's wife.

Marie Anne Lidholm, the Swedish, Finch maid, survived a full day's cross examination and even upset defense attorney Grant Cooper by hurling that Mrs. Finch had told her of the doctor's death threats "in case anything happens to me."

Robustelli Turns Down Job

NEW YORK (UPI) — Andy Robustelli, the All-League pro football end Sammy Baugh wanted for the New York Titans of the new American League, will remain with the New York Giants of the National League.

That's the word the Giants gave out Thursday night several hours after Baugh, head coach of the Titans, said he had talked with Robustelli "for about two hours" and still hoped to land him as a defensive coach.

Englishman Admits Slaying Of Coed

TANGIER, Morocco (UPI) — William Moore, confessed slayer of Barbara H. Mueller, says he killed her because he loved her.

The 26-year-old Englishman's confession, read in court Thursday, said he killed her in his apartment here Nov. 19 when she stopped by to tell him she was leaving Tangier forever.

Moore said he wrapped the body in burlap sack bought in a shop here and tied up the bundle with light cord. That night, he took it in a rented car to the woods outside the city and hid it in the bushes.

Miss Mueller's body was found Dec. 13. Moore was arrested six days later.

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Gillman Gets Coaching Job

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Sid Gillman, fired by the Los Angeles Rams four weeks ago, was back today as a head football coach for a three-year term, this time with the rival Los Angeles Chargers of the new American Football League.

Sixty-six-year-old policeman John Michalk went to answer a call at a tavern in nearby Carmichaels.

He suffered a heart attack. He was taken to Green County Hospital, he turned to a companion and gasped in disbelief. "All this strength and I'm powerless. There's nothing I can do."

"The Cyclone" was dead on arrival at the hospital.

Newspaper Plant Employment Up

The fact, gestures and words of the speakers captured the frustrations they often encounter in graphic style.
There was, however, one point I thought the program failed to touch upon. It's my feeling the program could have addressed itself to the question: "Why is this space race so important? What's the hurry?"
Anyhow, the ground that was covered was covered well. Once more, TV performed an important service.

Pilots Refuse To Take Tests

MIAMI (UPI) — Pilots of National Airlines, hit by two disastrous crashes in less than two months, charged Thursday night that the Federal Aviation Agency's proficiency tests damage the safety of commercial aviation.

National pilots who are members of the Airline Pilots Assn. said that they will take no more flight proficiency tests because of "the recent National Airlines accidents." Airline officials called a meeting today with their pilot-members of the ALPA and said the pilots should have discussed their charges with the company.

"The company gives the proficiency tests," Louis Dymond, a National official, said, "not the FAA."

Shortly before the pilots made their announcement in the form of a telegram to FAA Chairman James P. Gossett, giving relatives and FBI agents identified 27 of the 34 victims of Wednesday's National crash near Miami, N.C.

The Boeing 720, in which 28 men, 10 women and 1 child were aboard, disintegrated in the air, was the second to hit National's Miami-New Orleans inter-city flight crashed into the Gulf of Mexico under similar circumstances and killed all 44 persons aboard.

The National pilots charged that the FAA's strict proficiency tests are harmful to commercial aviation "and may eventually lead to disaster."

ALPA official R. J. Roban said the FAA has been three months ago a new policy of forcing pilots to pass these planes through violent maneuvers in six-month pilot proficiency tests.

Experts Checking Fingerprints Of Crash Victims

BOLIVIA, N. C. (UPI) — FBI fingerprint experts expected to identify today the last five bodies recovered from the crash of a national Air Lines plane and establish the identity of two victims still missing.

By late Thursday night, 37 of the 33 bodies had been positively identified by finger prints, by clothing and jewelry or by grieving relatives who stood in a tiny screened-in section of a high school gymnasium to look at the victims. A hospital screen separated them from the main room where rows of bodies lay on the floor.

Two days of searching through muddy farmland and damp forests at the crash site failed to turn up any trace of two other victims. Discovery of several plane pilings and two fragments of fuselage skin at Kuro Beach led to speculation that the two may have fallen from the wreckage DC-8 before it reached the Bolivia area.

One Sentence In Ike's Message Improves School Aid Prospects

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A 22-word sentence that President Eisenhower inserted in his State of the Union Message has boosted prospects that Congress will go further than he asked on a school aid bill.

Eisenhower didn't intend it that way. In his printed message, distributed to members of Congress, the President urged action on the 25-year installment plan for school aid that he recommended last year.

It called for a federal outlay of about \$2,500,000,000 over a long period to help needy school districts pay off bonds for constructed new classrooms.

But Eisenhower, in reading his address, tossed in the extra sentence stating that his budget for the next fiscal year would show a \$1,200,000,000 surplus "to be applied against our national debt."

Liberal House Democrats seized this statement as justification for their pay-now program of bigger federal grants within the next few years for building schools.

Rep. Frank Thompson Jr. (D-N. J.), said Eisenhower's anticipated surplus "might better be used for our greatest natural resource—our children."

Thompson, who supported a larger program last year, said he was "willing to compromise and spend just as much as the President recommended in 1957." He recalled the President then recommended \$25 million dollars annually for four years.

Rep. Cleveland M. Bailey (D-W. Va.), chairman of the House education subcommittee, said Eisenhower's message "opened the door a little" on school construction. But Bailey described as "no much political honey" the President's statement.

FBI Makes Public 'Lynch' Report

JACKSON, Miss. (UPI) — A long-secret FBI report on the lynching of Negro Mack Charles Parker last April contains statements from three men that they were involved in certain events connected with his abduction from jail, United Press International learned today.

The three were among 23 white men listed in the report as "known and suspected participants in the abduction" of Parker from the Poplarville, Miss., jail.

The FBI report was read today by a UPI reporter. It was completed after a month-long FBI investigation last summer.

None of the statements contained admissions that the authors had themselves gone to the jail to get Parker, a truck driver who was being held on a charge of having raped a white woman.

One of the three men was quoted as saying that, because of fear, he gave jail keys to four men who came to his home the night of April 24, a few hours before the lynching. The report said he told FBI agents he knew the men "wouldn't hesitate" to do him or his family bodily harm if they did not get the keys.

Soviets Plan Tests Of New Space Rockets In Pacific

MOSCOW (UPI) — A Soviet scientist said today a new space rocket to be tested over the Central Pacific would be especially important for flights to other planets in the solar system.

An announcement Thursday night said Russian scientists will test-fire a series of new and powerful rockets between Jan. 15 and Feb. 15 and asked foreign governments to keep ships and planes out of the designated test area.

The target area is in the general vicinity of the Marshall Islands, where the United States has an atomic testing ground.

Aaxoly Dorodnitsin, writing in Komsomolskaya Pravda, said "the achievements of Soviet rocketry already enable extensive scientific experiments in space."

"It is perfectly clear, however, that an increase in the weight of Sputniks, for instance, will make it possible considerably to increase their instrumentation and thus carry out more detailed and comprehensive studies in the space around the earth," he said.

The new Soviet rocket, he said, "will be especially important in the light of flights to other planets of the solar system."

"Here again," he added, "the problem of payloads is of paramount interest to scientists. And payloads depend on the power of the rocket's engines."

All Moscow newspapers carried the news of the projected Pacific tests on their front pages.

COLUMBUS, Ohio (UPI) — A Mobile, Ala., engineering student was held in city prison today for allegedly torturing his pretty wife during a 500-mile auto trip that ended here.

Mrs. Patricia Joan Stanton, 24, a University of Virginia coed, escaped from a foreign sports car that had developed motor trouble here. She told police she was bound and tortured by her husband, Everett Dale Stanton, 27. Mrs. Stanton, daughter of Francis Hall, Federal Power Commission hearing examiner, told police she was made to lie under a pile of soiled clothing on the floor of the car during much of the journey.

Stanton was held for examination by a police surgeon and a psychiatrist.

Police said the wife escaped after Stanton drove his small auto into a garage for repairs. He left to purchase a pair of shoes for his wife.

Frank Ward, a mechanic, said he found the woman wrapped in a blanket and crying. "She said she was being held against her will," he said.

Police quoted Mrs. Stanton as saying the trip started from their Arlington, Va., home Tuesday, when her husband bound her hands and blindfolded her eyes. Thursday morning, he tied her to a tree, she said, and drove back home for some soiled laundry. Stanton fainted when he was arrested. Authorities notified the girl's father, who flew here for his daughter.

Steelworkers' Boss Rides Out Steel Storm But Is Caught In Political Fire

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A series of political brush fires touched off by the steel settlement blasted today hit as any blast furnace.

It all boils down to who did what, who promised what to whom and who's backing whom.

The furor started when the eight-month steel dispute was settled Monday, with part of the credit going to Vice President Richard M. Nixon and Labor Secretary James P. Mitchell. Nixon's presidential stock soared.

But Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler charged Thursday Nixon won a secret agreement from the steel companies to hold off any price hikes until after the 1960 election.

If Republican Nixon is elected president, Butler said, "the limit" on any price increases. He predicted that Nixon would not win the presidency.

Steelworkers President David J. McDonald is the man who really jumped out of the frying pan of the labor dispute into the fire of politics.

Columnist Drew Pearson said Thursday that McDonald had told friends he would forsake his normal Democratic allegiance and aid Nixon's presidential campaign because of the "very generous" steel settlement.

McDonald promptly denied that he's committed to support Nixon or anybody else.

Pennsylvania Gov. David L. Lawrence then gave the union chief a chance to prove he's still "100% Democrat." Lawrence invited McDonald to be a Pennsylvania delegate-at-large at the Democratic convention in July.

"I will accept with pleasure, of course," McDonald replied.

McDonald started his day in the hot political waters by saying in a TV interview that Nixon should not get all the praise for the steel settlement.

He said just as much credit should go to the financier father of Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.), Democratic presidential aspirant, for persuading his banker friends to support a steel settlement.

McDonald said that either Kennedy or Nixon would make a good president.

Photo Finish

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — The 1959 steel-labor dispute, which included a record-smashing 116-day strike, ended in a photo finish.

Both the steel companies' stockholders and the 500,000 United Steelworkers members could claim victory — or prove loss. It will take months to develop the picture.

No major steel company requested dividends to its shareholders. Pittsburgh area steel workers generally agreed that the strike wage loss — roughly \$2,000 per man — was worth the just. Most ended up with an annual income as good or better than their take home pay in recession-ridden 1958.

"I lost more time in 1958 than I ever spent on strike this year," said Ernest Lewis, a crane operator in the open hearth department at Jones & Laughlin Steel's Pittsburgh works.

Lewis, a veteran of 18 years in the steel mill, went on: "I got nothing but unemployment compensation and Supplemental Unemployment Benefits for sitting out the recession in 1958."

National Hate Group Suspected

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (UPI)—Evidence of the existence of a national hate organization, headed by a "fanatical fascist" has been turned over to the FBI.

The disclosure was made Sunday by Lt. J. O. Crews, head of the Jacksonville police department's intelligence division.

Crews said an admirer of Nazi doctrines had been arrested in connection with swastikas painted on the Jacksonville Jewish Center.

"The suspect may be the local leader of a national anti-Semitic, anti-Negro underground organization under the direction of a fanatical fascist operating out of a northern city," he said.

Crews said the 35-year-old suspect, whose he declined to identify, had been released pending an FBI report on evidence.

"We turned over all evidence and findings of local intelligence to the FBI in Washington," Crews said. "It should receive priority attention and we should have a report back by mid-week."

Crews revealed that phrases used in two warning letters to Jewish congregations here are similar to those found in material from a well known anti-Semitic writer in Virginia. He said the Virginia supplied material to members of a group arrested for the 1958 bombing of the Atlanta Jewish Temple.

Crews said the suspect is known to have received literature and Nazi decorations by mail from a northern city. He was carrying neo-Nazi literature when arrested, Crews said.

In Berlin, Chancellor Konrad Adenauer arrived today from Bonn on his annual visit and was expected to make his first public statement on the wave of anti-Semitism that has swept West Germany.

Adenauer is keeping a promise he made when he became chancellor in 1960 — to visit West Berlin at least once each year. During a three-day stay he will address the Berlin senate, tour the city and hold a reception.

He already has privately denounced the wave of anti-Semitism and the government is an official statement. Interned sources believed he would use this visit to speak out officially.

Red Test Plan Protested

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Assistant Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield has urged a strong U. S. protest against Russia's plan to test a powerful new rocket in the Central Pacific.

"If the Soviet Union ignores such a protest, he said, the United States should seek a special session of the United Nations to 'consider and deal with this high-handed announcement.'"

The Montana senator a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, telegraphed his views Sunday night to Secretary of State Christian A. Herter.

Mansfield described as "arrogant" the Soviet plan to send 37,000 square miles in the Pacific for the missile test. Russia announced last week it planned to conduct the test between Jan. 15 and Feb. 15, and warned ships and planes to stay out of the area.

There was no immediate reply to Mansfield's demand for a U. S. protest. But the State Department said last week it planned no protest. Officials said there was nothing illegal in the Russian warning for ships and planes to stay away.

The second session of the 86th Congress opened today into its first full working week with early skirmishing on two major legislative fronts — civil rights and missile-space spending.

Sen. Jacob Javits (R-N. Y.) announced he would introduce today a package of five civil rights bills, including one calling for appointment of federal registrars to assure voting rights.

Senate Republicans leader Everett M. Dirksen (Ill.) promptly predicted that the registrars proposal would become one of the "controversial" issues of the new session which convened Wednesday.

On the missile-space issue, Rep. Overton Brooks (D-La.) charged that the administration's program was clouded by "duplication, rivalry and indecision. He planned to announce today a witness list for House Space Committee investigation starting next Monday, Sen. Stuart Symington (D-Mo.),

Steel Pact Fixed, Butler Charges

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler charged Sunday that the Eisenhower administration engineered the end of the steel dispute "to insure the election" of Vice President Richard M. Nixon as the next president.

Sen. Thurston B. Morton (R-Ky.), the Republican national chairman, immediately denied the accusation. He and Butler locked horns in a television debate.

Butler said "the most significant statement that was made about the steel settlement was made by the Wall Street Journal, which is certainly not a Democratic source."

He said the administration "allowed the strike to exist" and then made "a political fix" to end it.

"The Wall Street Journal claimed that Vice President Nixon made a deal with the steel companies whereby they would agree to a price increase until after 1960," Butler said, "until after the election."

Morton, who disagreed with Butler point-by-point in their debate over the steel strike and other issues, declared "I feel sure that the vice president made no deal with any company about when it would or would not raise prices."

Labor Threatens Congress At Polls

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The AFL-CIO, apparently angry with both Republicans and Democrats, demanded today that Congress approve a seven-point "must" program or face the consequences at the polls next November.

"Our warnings no longer can be taken lightly," said AFL-CIO President George Meany in opening a three-day legislative conference attended by 600 union leaders from throughout the nation.

Meany called upon Congress to overcome "financial timidity and political cowardice" to approve an increase in the federal minimum wage, higher jobless pay, bigger defense spending and other labor-backed measures.

"We are growing increasingly impatient with frustrating delays, with the lack of constructive achievement and with the broken record of broken promises," he said.

This was regarded as a rebuke to the Democratic majority in Congress for what the AFL-CIO terms a "mediocre record in the first session of the 86th Congress.

Meany also lashed out at the Republican administration's tight-money policy, its warnings about inflation and other signs of what he called "defeatism."

"There is an election coming up next November," he said. "If we got our people to register and vote, if we pinpoint the issues and the voting records objectively, we can get a government that places human needs above the demands of big business."

Meany listed the following measures as unfinished business which he said Congress could ignore no longer:

Regaining superiority in military weapons "whatever the cost."

Federal aid for school construction and improvement of teachers' salaries.

An increase in the minimum wage from \$1 to \$1.25 an hour and extension of coverage.

Federal standards to raise unemployment benefits and free medical insurance for social security recipients.

Adoption of civil rights legislation to end "second-class citizenship."

Federal aid to depressed areas.

Program to build homes, wipe out slums, rebuild cities and provide new roads and airports.
