

GEORGE MOORE CHARGED WITH AGENTS' DEATH

Grand Jury Finds Alleged Bootlegger's Killing Of Dry Men Was Act Of Murder

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. Jan. 24.—(AP)—George W. Moore, alleged bootlegger, was charged with murder to-day in connection with the slaying here last Saturday of two federal dry agents in an attempted raid on the Moore residence.

A warrant, holding Moore for the grand jury, was sworn to by Justice of the Peace Roberts, following the verdict of a coroner's jury yesterday that Robert K. Moneroe and F. N. Patterson, the slain agents, were killed by Moore "in an act of murder."

The jury's verdict came after two hours of deliberation over a page of testimony submitted through a hearing lasting a day and a half. In the defense, it was bitterly contended that the agents illicitly attempted to search the Moore home with a daytime warrant.

Mrs. Moore and her 11-year-old daughter, Olive, and several defense witnesses testified that the raid was attempted after midnight. One defense witness testified from government data that sunset on the day of the slaying came off at 5:30 P. M., whereas the two agents who survived the raid said they (Continued on page 24)

Time Is Extended On Shipment Of Fruits

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—(AP)—The time limit for the shipment of Florida fruits, subject to attacks of the frost by the southern and western states, was extended today and Monday. Under a previous order, the time limit was set at North Carolina, Tennessee, Arkansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Utah and Idaho, as well as the states named, was authorized until Jan. 21. Agriculture department officials announced that it had been decided that the shipments of fruit under this order should be continued without danger until Mar. 1.

MEXICO ORDERS ENTIRE LEGATION TO LEAVE RUSSIA

Action Is Protest Against Communist Activity In Mexico

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 24.—(AP)—The entire staff of the Mexican legation in Moscow has been ordered to leave Russia. This is a protest against communist activity in Mexico. A city official here said that the political office expect the action to result in recall by the Soviet of its Russian minister in this capital, A. M. Makar.

A statement by Genaro Estrella, foreign minister, revealed that the Mexican minister at Moscow had been ordered to leave several days ago and that the charge d'affaires and all others in the embassy personnel were directed to quit the Russian capital "as an act of protest."

The statement referred to recent "communist" manifestations in the capital and in the American continent, on the pretext of protesting against measures being taken here in the case of foreign agitators, who interfered with Mexican domestic affairs, and threatened to disturb the order of the republic, adversely affecting the interests in Washington, Rangoon, Amoy, and San Francisco.

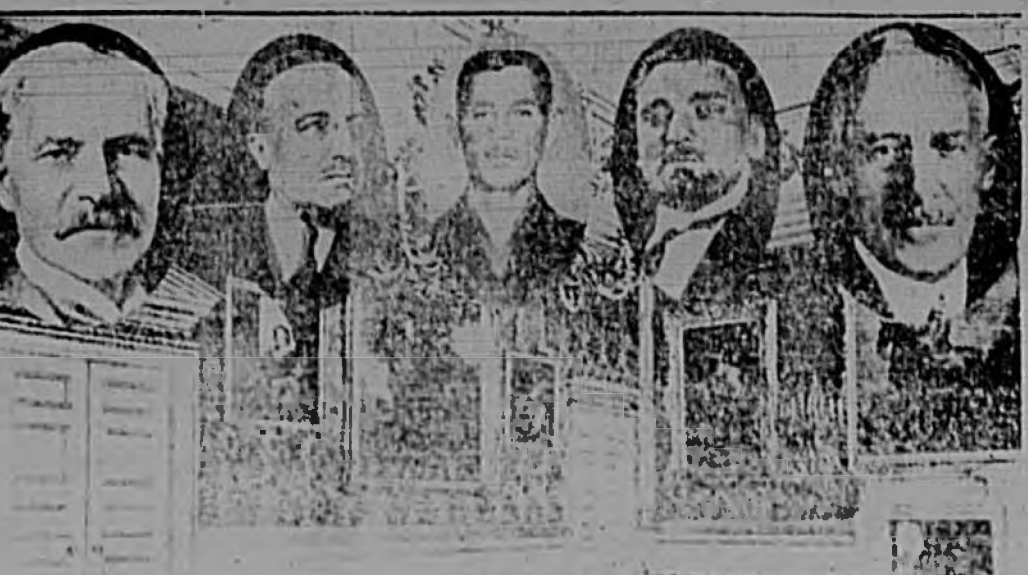

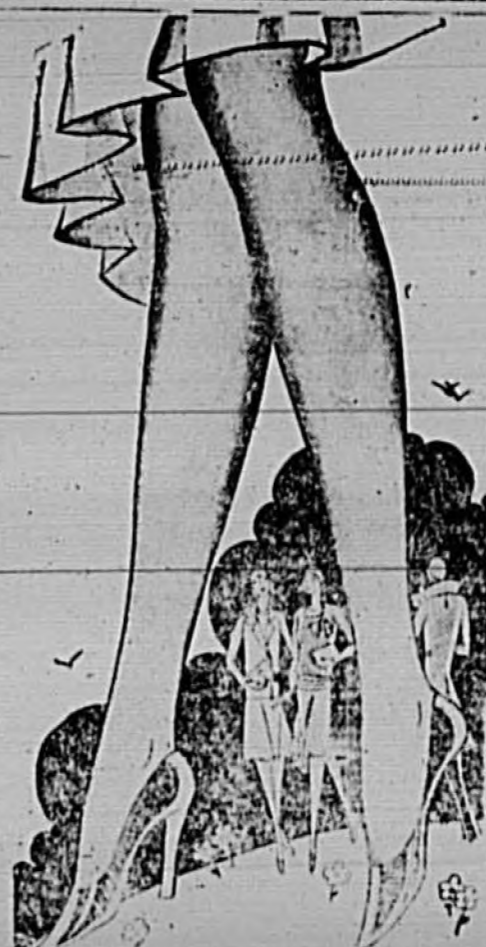
