Disposable Baby Bottles Invented

By ARTHUR EDSON WASHINGTON, Oct. 22—(AP)—A disposable baby bottle made of plastic, shyly described by its maker as the greatest improvement in infant nursing in 80 years, had its first public testing yesterday. And like everything else in Washington these days—from meeting the new ambassador to watching a lobster cooked by electronic baby's bottle got its sendoff at a cocktail party. Some 50 of us students of science and or scotch showed up for the event, in the swanky Mayflower Hotel.

Mrs. Adda May Allen, a local nurse who invented the bottle, explained how it works. The plastic bottle comes in a roll of 100. Mama or Papa gets the formula ready, then unrolls six of the bottles, cuts out each one, puts it on a rack.

A little gadget is used to pry each bottle open. The formal is poured in. The special nipple is put on. Since it takes heat of 400 degrees to mold the plastic in the first place, it's bound to be sterile. And baby's bottles of the old-fashioned kind, even with sterilizing, are apt to have bacteria. Then, too, (this is still Mrs. Allen talking) as the baby nurses, the plastic bottle collapses. This prevents him from gulping down a lot of air. One burp at the finish, and he's all set.

The new bottle is being put out by the Stillman Products Corporation of Mount Vernon, Ohio. A kit containing the racks, the gadget to expand the bottles, nipples and 100 plastic bottles will retail for \$6.95. Refills will cost a penny a bottle.

INEXPENSIVE MEAT FOR DINNER

Better acquaint yourself with the less expensive cuts of meat if you want to keep food bills down. They take longer to prepare than a chop or a steak but they have a

lot to offer by way of good flavor and good nutrition. Here's a Lamb Neck Stew that's delicious served with cooked noodles or brown rice. LAMB NECK STEW 4 pounds lamb necks 1 tablespoon kitchen bouquet 2 teaspoons salt 1/2 teaspoon pepper 1/2 cup fat 1/2 cup finely diced onion 1 eight-ounce can tomato

1 cup water 1 cup diagonally sliced celery 6 small carrots 1 small green pepper, cut in strips 1/2 cup flour 1/2 cup cold water 1/2 cup cooking sherry wine, if desired Have meat dealer trim necks and cut in 1-inch slices. Place in mixing bowl and sprinkle with a mixture of kitchen bouquet, salt

frying pan or Dutch oven over moderate heat. Add pieces of lamb and brown on all sides. Add onion and cook about 5 minutes longer, stirring frequently. Combine tomato sauce and water and add to meat. Cover tightly and cook until meat is nearly tender, about 1 hour. Add celery, carrots and green pepper, and continue cooking until vegetables are tender, about 20 minutes. Blend together and add flour and cold

Use up leftover pickle juice by pouring it over sliced cooked beets and allowing the beets to marinate in it. Serve the beets as a relish or on salad greens. water, stirring constantly until liquid thickens and boils. Add cooking sherry, if desired, blending in well. Serve immediately. Makes 6 servings.
