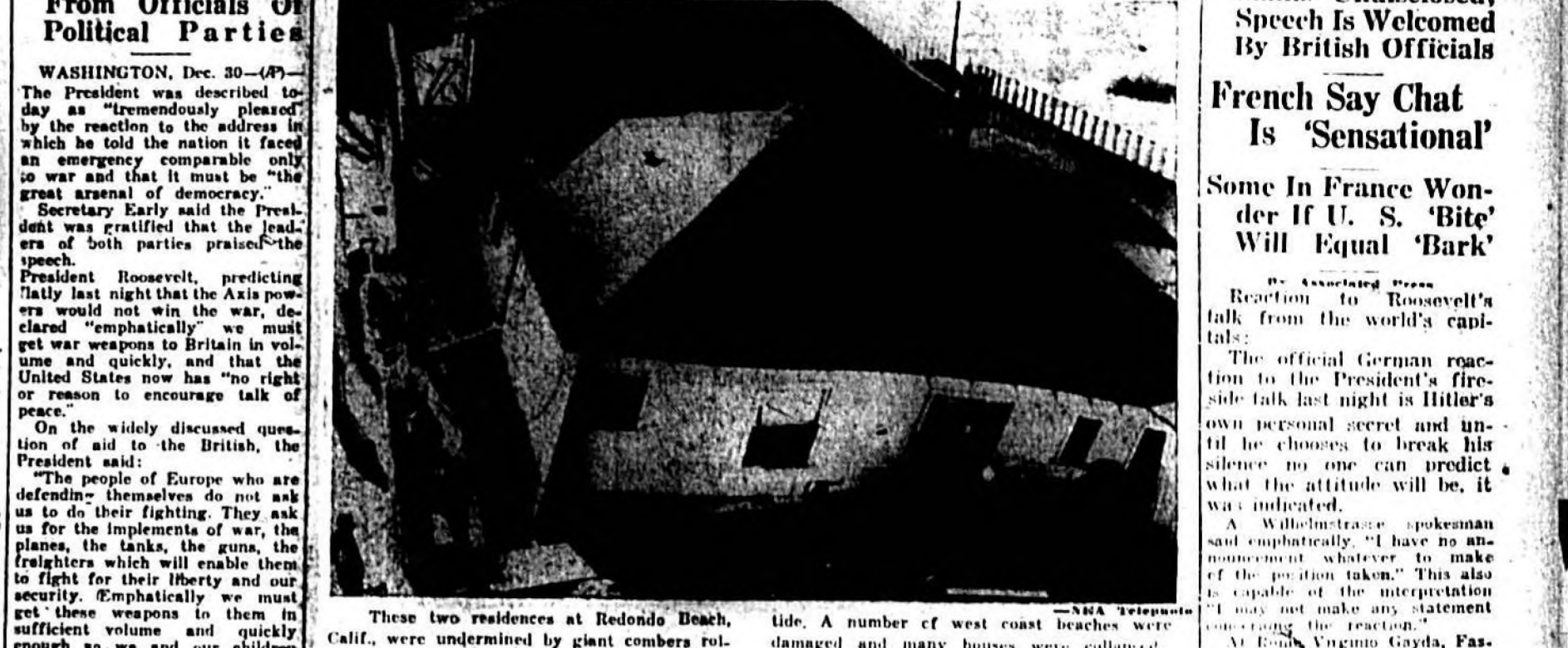

Hitler Defied

Adolf Hitler and his gang of ruffians can find small comfort in the speech of President Roosevelt last night. They have expected appeasement from this country, they were doomed to disappointment for President Roosevelt showed no disposition to retreat, no fear of dictator threats, no white feather. He told them off about as thoroughly as anyone could.

Declaring in effect a national emergency equivalent to a state of war, President Roosevelt called upon the nation for maximum production of materials of war, everything from pistol bullets to warships. He promised the utmost aid to Great Britain and other nations fighting aggression, denounced the Nazis in unmistakable terms and predicted the ultimate defeat of the Axis powers.

Pointing to the futility of any attempt to negotiate a peace with Germany, or to try to get along with the Nazis in the event of their victory, President Roosevelt quoted from the Fuehrer's own words: "There are two worlds that stand opposed to each other. . . . With this other world we cannot ever reconcile ourselves—I can beat any other power in the world."

If Great Britain goes down, the President continued, the Axis powers will control the continents of Europe, Africa, Asia, Australia and the high seas and will be in a position to bring unprecedented force against us. "It is no exaggeration to say that all of us in the Americas would be lying at the point of a gun—a gun loaded with explosive bullets, economic as well as military."

Pointing out that it is impossible for us to appease the Nazis, President Roosevelt declared, "No man can tame a tiger into a kitten by stroking it." Speaking of a "negotiated peace," which he has been urged by some Americans to attempt, he called it "Nonsense." "It is a negotiated peace if a gang of outlaws surrounds your community and on threat of extermination makes you pay tribute to save your own skins."

President Roosevelt praised the courageous fight against overwhelming odds which the British are making for the preservation of their own liberties and the security of the whole world. "In a military sense," he said, "Great Britain and the British Empire are today the spearhead of resistance to world conquest. They are putting up a fight which will live forever in the story of human gallantry."

Calling for greater efforts in the task of turning out armaments of war, President Roosevelt said the nation expects defense industries to carry on without strikes or lockouts and he commended both industry and labor for its spirit of co-operation with the government. "But he added that present efforts are not enough. "We must have more ships, more guns, more planes—more of everything." We must discard the notion of "business as usual."

With the United States "the great arsenal of democracy," President Roosevelt predicted the outright defeat of the Axis powers. "The British have received invaluable military support from the Greek Army. Their strength is growing. It is the strength of men and women who value their freedom more highly than they value their lives. I believe that the Axis powers are not going to win this war. I base that belief on the latest and best information."

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173 In State Get \$1000 In Benefits

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29—(AP)—A report filed with the Senate and House agriculture committees showed yesterday 173 Florida individuals, companies and organizations received benefit payments of \$1000 or more under the 1938 agricultural conservation program.

Many Left Homeless After Raid On Town

A SOUTH WEST ENGLAND TOWN, Dec. 29—(AP)—Hundreds of people were left temporarily homeless and a large number of shops were wrecked by the 240th and heaviest of German air raids on this particular town.

British censorship forbids identification of the town but from the circumstances it appears to be either Plymouth or Southampton, which both are large port cities and naval stations.

The raid, though short, was fierce and hundreds of incendiary bombs were scattered over all parts of the town. High explosives, some of heavy caliber, followed and fell on widely separated residential areas.
