Just The Facts!

The news that The New York Times is well on the way to developing a system for instantaneous retrieval of information on "virtually every subject of human research and inquiry

leaves us in chilled awe. It is natural for the Times; and it is as inevitable a feat for our age as the turning of the stars. Yet we can't help wondering if such a gigantic grab-bag of information will make the world any better.

One critic of America once said that we possessed more half-truths than any other civilization in history. The Times retrieval system certainly won't help that situation; the gap between getting the facts and arriving at the truth will be as wide as ever.

Finding all there is to know about, for instance, the mating habits of the Ibex in five seconds is a heady accomplishment. But the harder task, to assimilate and use those facts, will still have to be done the old-fashioned way -through the slow, ponderous mechanism of human thought.

The Times system wil be able to heap huge plates of food for thought on the table; but no "real-time interactive retrieval system" in the world can do the digesting for us. And it is that process of digesting, or lack of it, that causes so much pain. - Roanoke (Va.) Times







CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) -The three Apollo 11 astronauts were to climb inside their spaceship today to help launch crews complete an important countdown rehearsal test for their historic moon-landing adventure in

Wearing work clothes instead of space suits and with their moonship hatch open as a safety precaution, astronauts Neil A. Armstrong, Michael Collins and Edwin E. Aldrin Jr. were to check spacecraft communications and other electrical systems during the final hours of a mock countdown that has been under way since Wednesday. Called a flight readiness test the exercise helps crews establish procedures that should be followed on launch day and gives officials an opportunity to check electronic components in the rocket and spacecraft. It was being conducted with the 363-foot-tall Saturn 5 booster empty of fuel.

Apollo 11 is to blast off at 9:32 .m. EDT July 16, with Armstrong and Aldrin piloting a lunar landing craft onto the moon's surface at 2:22 p.m. July Nine hours and 50 minutes later, at 12:12 a.m. July 21, Armstrong is to take man's historic first step onto the lunar surface.



"We surely did keep Marrin' Sam busy. He must have married over 100 couples — all in one night!" "You are leaving out all of the Senior Privileges that have


finally been put into effect." "Oh, yes, the Senior table at lunch is one."

"Well, all that is about over now. The year is coming to an end and the preparation are being made for our graduation." "It won't be long now."



Henry Shelton Sanford was bern on June 15, 1825 to a grown wealthy from the Shelton Tack Co. established by the senior Sanford and his brother.

Henry Sanford was educated at the Episcopal Academy in Cheshire, Conn. and at Trinity College (then called Washington College) in Hartford. As befitted a seion of a wealthy family, Sanford travelled in Europe, completing his studies with a law degree from the university at Heidel-

berg. Even before his graduation. young Sanford had worked as secretary of the legation at the American embassy at St. Petersburg (Leningrad), Russia, and he had been acting secretary for the legation in Frankfort, Germany. On his graduation, he received a Presidential appointment as secretary of the Paris legation. He later became charge d'affaires there.

Upon election in 1860, President Lincoln appointed the young diplomat U. S. Minister to Belgium, a post he held for eight and a half years while also serving as the government's fiscal agent and supervisor of the Secret Service. On his return to the United States, Gen.
