

elementary school, the committee that will look at the rezoning needs has not even been formed.

"We are looking at having each school represented by the principal and a parent." McNamara said. With the elementary schools. that's more than 60 people right there."

The committee is scheduled to meet on Sept. 19 at 7 p.m. The meeting place has not yet been finalized.

It is McNamara's hope that the committee, "armed with all the information (the school district) has," will be able to make some recommendations regarding the extent of the need for rezoning.



Meetings, more meetings Sanford commissioners deal with airport growth, mall development

SANFORD - The meeting rooms at Sanford City Hall will be packed Monday afternoon and evening. A number of meetings have been called.

At 3 p.m., the Orlando Sanford Airport Authority will hold a special meeting in the city commission conference room. A number of items are listed on the agenda for discussion and approval including several agreements pertaining to the new arrival station at the airport. These include a welcome center to be located across from the new terminal, and a catering kitchen.

At 4 p.m., in the city manager's conference room, the airport authority will hold a joint workshop with the city of Sanford. "Mostly we will be discussing the proposed airport budget for fiscal 1995/96." said Director of Aviation Steve Cooke.

Another item to be discussed is the proposed demolition of Building 3. "This has been the subject of a number of discussions." Cooke said. "We want to demolish it, but we have to work out exactly how to go about it."

One of the first needs will be to remove the asbestos from the building, required by federal law. Cooke said the airport authority is willing to pay for approximately \$20,000 in the removal.

Original proposals suggested the building might be used by the Sanford Fire Department for training, with the building to be burned. "Now we are looking at the possibility of digging a pit." Cooke said. "and putting the materials in the pit for burning to avoid problems the fire department has voiced concerning the smoke

Man rubbed the wrong way over fee for massage

LONGWOOD - As the warden commented in "Cool Hand Luke" ... "What we have here, is a failure to communicate." Calling for a massage in Central Florida apparently isn't like it is in Europe.

Incident reports filed with the Seminole County Sheriff's office detailed how a man and his cousin decided to get an early morning massage Monday. The man called a number about 2:30 a.m., requested a massage and was told the cost would be \$65 for two women to come to the Longwood apartment to perform the service.

When the two blonde women, both of average height and build arrived, the man claimed they expected a \$200 "tip" over and above the quoted \$65 fee. He told police a \$10 to \$20 tip for a massage was more reasonable.

The Middle Eastern man reported the women opened their purses and showed condoms, adding that \$200 would be the minimum tip.

About that time, the man's roommate and another male returned. The women said the two extra males were "not part of the agreement."

The man said he cancelled the appointment but objected when the women took two \$20 bills from a dresser claiming it was a cancellation fee. As the females were leaving, the man grabbed one woman's arm and was confronted by another man outside the door who said. 'Don't assault my ladies. What you did was assault and I'm going to call the police." Bee Massage, Page 5A

3 killed in crash

HAINES CITY - A 15-year-old girl lost control of her car and slammed into an oak tree, killing herself and two others and seriously injuring a fourth passenger.

As they left the school parking lot Wednesday, Haines City High School Assistant Principal John Guest cautioned them to drive carefully. An hour later, less than a mile from the school in castern Polk County, the car hydroplaned on a puddle and crashed.

Killed were driver Patrice Shunte Johnson and passengers Janelle Gamble, 16, and Mikeyla Shondria Jackson, 15. Erica Foxx. 16. was in serious condition Thursday at Orlando **Regional Medical Center.**

Johnson did not have a Florida driver's license nor a restricted license, and friends said she did not have much driving experience.

Troopers said none of the teen-agers were wearing seatbelts.

Deadbeat dad sentenced to pay up

MELBOURNE - A former pathologist who quit his profession to avoid paying child support has been sentenced to five years of probation and ordered to pay \$76,000 to his two children.

Daniel Williams Jr. was sentenced Wednesday under a new federal law that targets out-of-state parents who owe more than \$5,000 in child support.

Williams worked at Space Coast Pathology before leaving to become a hotel clerk in Phoenix as a result of problems with his wife in 1990, according to federal prosecutors.

He closed their joint checking and savings accounts. canceled their credit cards and then quit his job to avoid making child support payments for his sons, ages 7 and 14, prosecutors said.

Williams' ex-wife, Nancy Williams, brought charges and the FBI investigated in December.

Williams returned to Brevard County from Phoenix earlier this year and pleaded guilty to violating the federal Child Support Enforcement Act.

Noriega's freedom sought

MIAMI - Lawyers for Manuel Noriega have asked the federal court here to free the deposed Panamanian leader until the appeal of his drug racketeering conviction can be heard.

"He's probably one of the most recognized men in the world. I really doubt he could go anywhere and hide so no one could ever see him again." said lawyer Frank Rubino, who filed papers with the U.S. District Court in Miami asking for Noriega's freedom.

Norlega has been held at the Metropolitan Correctional Center in southern Dade County since April 1992 when a jury convicted him on eight of 10 drug-related charges.

Noriega was first brought to Miami in December 1989, when U.S. troops invaded Panama, captured the general and flew him here to stand trial.

Noriega was sentenced to 40 years in prison, but appealed that sentence in April 1994 to the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Atlanta. The appeal process has been at a standstill since then, prompting this week's request by Noriega. In papers responding to Noriega's freedom request, pro-

secutors say putting Noriega back on the streets would be a risky proposition because he still has ties to international criminals who might help him flee.

EDGEWATER - One of the state's most-wanted fugitives. Linnie D. Frankline, is in fail awaiting trial for murder after being captured while baby-sitting one of his brother's children.

Frankline, 20, was portrayed by investigators as a remorseless killer who would not be taken without a bloody gun battle. But there was no gunfight. No standoff.

Frankline, a cross-dresser, didn't have time Wednesday to don his favorite disguise: a woman's wig, skirt and other feminine apparel. His loaded guns were in a jacket near the front door.

'We're all relieved," said Daytona Beach police Sgt. Thad Lingo, one of his captors. "We were sure he was going to kill someone. I don't remember any guy as bad as this one in the last 20 years."

Frankline is charged with first-degree murder and two counts of attempted murder. He is a suspect in several other criminal cases.

Investigators say Frankline and his brother. Richard Frankline, 21. repeatedly shot Gregory Roper, a Bethune-

The brother and his wife were arrested as they drove off. They were charged with auto theft and harboring a fugitive. When members of a Volusia County special response team burst into the house, guns drawn expecting gunfire, they found Frankline with the two small children. The fugitive jumped out a window. He was

The discovery has alarmed UF scientists because drugresistant bacteria, blamed for the re-emergence of tuberculosis and diphtheria, have been growing at a fast pace. Some consider it one of the world's most serious health-care problems.

If their preliminary findings are proven true, then the current practice of treating cattle with antibiotics may increase the incidence of drug-resistant bacteria in humans, said Clay Walker, a professor of oral biology and principal investigator of the study.

The researchers detected, in both livestock and people, the same gene that generates resistance to the antibiotic tetracycline. This finding suggests that bacteria may be able to transfer their genetic code for antibiotic resistance to other species.

The preliminary results of the four-year study, funded by a \$600,000 grant from the National Institute of Dental Research. were presented in June at the International Association of Dental Research conference in Singapore.

Walker said his findings reinforce a long-held belief among scientists that treating cattle with antibiotics increases resistance to these drugs in people.



TALLAHASSEE - Joseph "Crazy Joe" Spaziano, convicted of the mutilation-murder of an Orlando woman whose body was

found in a Seminole County dump 22 years ago, is set for execution next month after Gov. Lawton Chiles signed Spaziano's Afth death warrant.

Chiles signed the warrant Thursday after a two-month investigation by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement into media reports earlier this summer that raised questions about the case, prompting the governor to call off an execution scheduled in late June.

"This exhaustive review removes any doubt in my mind about this case." Chiles said in a statement released by his office. The FDLE report backs up the

Pick convention center site

Hurray for the planning. Now let's do something with it.

We believe it is excellent that action is getting underway toward pursuing a convention center for Seminole County. The County Commission has approved advertising for proposals.

Several locations were discussed by the commissioners, most of which were located in the Lake Mary/Heathrow area. While these might be excellent choices, we believe a demographical study would prove such a facility might do well to be farther north, nearer to Sanford, for example.

Orlando has a convention center. So does Daytona Beach. Wouldn't it be better then to have one located as near to the middle of these two centers as possible? Between the cities of Sanford and Lake Mary, and the Deltona/Orange City area, we have a large population from which to draw. Being nearby in the Sanford area would be closer for motorists from these communities wishing to attend various functions.

Right now, many people from Deltona go to Daytona Beach for top-flight entertainment and exhibitions. People on the south side of the St. Johns River generally head for Bob Carr Auditorium or the Orlando Convention Center. There again, they find some of the best in cultural presentations.

If there were a facility in Sanford capable of handling major conventions, exhibitions, Broadway-type entertainment and other activities, we may be able to draw people from both Orlando and Daytona Beach into our area rather than us going to them.

This is not to object to any Lake Mary/Heathrow location, but we believe a location farther north would be of better service to everyone.

The closer we get to Orlando, the fewer people we can expect from the northern side of Lake Monroe. It would be the same if a

He details for me how his Ninja Turtle action figure beat up "a real apple-head!" He asks to sleep over. And asks three times why I said, "Not tonight." United Nations' rogues' gallery

UNITED NATIONS - As Secretary General Boutros Boutros-Ghali marks the United Nations' 50th anniversary, his peace-keepers are under fire around the world, and his political allies are caught in a different kind of cross-fire on Capitol Hill

That's because the U.N.'s bloated bureaucracy has become a tempting target for its critics in Washington. It appears that the world's premiere peace-making operation could use a good personnel office.

Boutros-Ghali has certainly surrounded himself with some bright and capable people. But their effectiveness has been hampered by colleagues who have found themselves on the wrong side of history, but the right side of Boutros-Ghali.

At various times in his tenure, Boutros-Ghali has employed people whose resumes might have disqualified them from almost any other reputable organization in the world. They are diplomats from disgraced regimes who are unemployed and in search of good pay and a secure home. There have been enough of them since Boutros-Ghali came on board in 1992 to warrant internal anickering here that the secretary general is running a Retired Diplomats Protection League.

The only explanation, defenders of Boutros-Ghali say, is that the former Egyptian diplomat believes diplomats are not responsible for the sins of the regimes they once represented. U.N. spokesman Fred Eckhard told us that that was a fair characterization of Boutros-Ghali's thinking and added: "The main thing is that this is an international organization and you don't select your senior personnel on the basis of a moral judgment about the country they come from."

Here are some examples of people who have worked in the uppermost ranks of the U.N. Secretariat at one time or another during Boutros-Ghali's tenure:

- Ji Chaozhu was appointed in 1992 to serve as undersecretary general in the Department of Economic Development. As an ambassador from the People's Republic of China, Ji amazed even cynical diplomats with his denials of the massacre of Tibetans, and with his defense of the Tlananmen Square massacre.

-- Eugeniusz Wyzner was tabbed as the undersecretary general for the Department of Public Information, despite his previous incarnation as the U.N. ambassador from Communist Poland when martial law shut down Lech Walesa's Solidarity movement. The appointment stirred unusual resentment at the normally complacent U.N., so Wyzner kept a low profile. He was out in a year, but Boutros-Ghali gave him another paid plum as commissioner general of the Tacjon Expo '93.

- Darko Silovic, the former Yugoslavian U.N. ambassador, was made a consultant to the U.N. Development Program when civil war broke apart his country. After washing out at the UNDP, Silovic has held a series of other positions and is still on the U.N. payroll.

- For 11 months, Vladimir Petrovsky was Boutros-Ghali's undersecretary general for the Department of Political Affairs. No chum of Russian President Boris Yeltsin, he was the former deputy foreign minister of the old

Soviet Union - even serving for a time as the official "spokesman" for political prisoner Andrei Sakharov during the Nobel Prize winner's exile in Gorki. Petrovsky had also served at the U.N. at a time when most Soviets there reported to, or were part of, the KGB. Since February 1993 Petrovsky has been director general of the U.N. office in Geneva.

-- Boutros-Ghall inherited Victor Sukhodrev, but kept him on as a "special assistant," carning

more than \$100,000 annually, until Sukhodrev left the U.N. last year. Sukhodrev's notable past had been to serve as Mikhail Gorbachev's interpreter before coming to work for Secretary General Javier Perez de Cuellar as a special adviser on Soviet affairs.

- The most curious of this lot has been Ismat Kittani, an Iraqi whom Boutros-Ghali has not been able to do without. Kittani was Saddam Hussein's U.N. ambassador for many years. which should be damning enough. Kittani defended Iraq's invasion of Iran. Worse, Kittani - a Kurd - turned his back on his own people and defended Saddam's use of poison gas against his countrymen.

In 1992, Boutros-Ghali tapped Kittani as his special representative to Somalia. The envoy soon quit after pleading poor health -- and was appointed to the easy new post of special representative to Tajikistan.

In January 1994, he was promoted to senior adviser to the secretary general, a job so special that few know what he does. The arrangement infuriated American U.N. ambassador Madeleine Albright. And we've obtained a private cable she fired off to U.S. Secretary of State Warren Christopher complaining about it.

All the while, Kittani continues to draw his pension from Saddam Hussein's Iraqi Foreign Ministry.

So, I say, the war on drugs is designed. to prevent that.

Right, Fred says. OK, I say, explain this: In 1981, we spent \$1.5 billion to fight drugs. Nearly 15 years later, the

Fred, I say explain to me once again why politicians are so enthusiastic about the war on drugs.

anti-drug budget has soared to \$14 billion. During that 15 years, governments on all levels have spent an estimated \$250 billion in the war on drugs.

Really? Fred says. That shows commitment.

But Fred, I say, this so-called war is a complete bust. Young people are using more drugs than ever. They're smoking more marijuana. They're taking more LSD. They are popping more hallucinogens, more stimulants, more barbiturates. And now, authorities say, there's a new heroin epidemic coming.

Well, Fred says, people gonna do what people gonna do.

Wait a minute, I say. There's much more. The truth is, the prohibition of drugs creates more victims than the drugs themselves. Prohibition begets the black market, which begets huge profits -- \$150 billion a year some experts say -- which beget robbery, burglary, murder, drive-by shootings, the slaying of innocent bystanders. And I'm not even considering corruption. The arrest of three former federal prosecutors in Florida for their alleged involvement with the drug cartels says it all.

Are you another one of those legalization freaks?

I am, Fred, I say, I believe that soft drugs should be legalized and regulated -- just like alcohol, which is five times deadlier. I believe we should prohibit the sale of drugs to minors - just like alcohol. I believe we should tax drugs heavily -- just like alcohol. I believe we should control the dosage -- just like alcohol. I believe we should decriminalize the hard drugs and treat addicts as medical patients -just like alcohol. Fred says something unintelligible.

You know what I think. Fred? I think politicians like the war on drugs because it is a crowd-pleasing issue that lends itself to tub-thumping. It is a taxpayer-funded stump for jackasees to bray from. We need leaders: we get demagogues.

What are you, Fred says, some kind of communist?

Fred, I say, what is the most dangerous drug in America?

Ah, crack cocaine? he says.

Try tobacco, Fred. Illegal drugs kill 20,000 people a year. Tobacco kills 400,000. In 1988, the surgeon general said nicotine is as addictive as heroin and cocaine, and recent experiments confirm it. Last month, a top researcher for the National Institute on Drug Abuse said that "cigarettes will kill far more of today's children than all other drugs combined.*

They would be allowed only in parts of the city zoned M-2A, Industrial. City Planner Matt West said the only areas with that zoning are located west of Rinehart Road and Lake Emma Road.

Attorney William Reischman was on hand for the meeting. Having helped prepare a number of similar ordinances for Orlando and other cities. he is considered an expert in the adult entertainment ordinance field.

"I know Lake Mary already has adult entertainment codes," he said, "but they are always in need of continuous review."

He explained that the main role of the guidelines was to prevent a secondary effect caused by this type of establishment, such as crime, drug use, and prostitution. Reischman reported on a study of a mile and a half area of Orange Blossom Trail (OBT), where adult entertainment presently exists, against a similar area on Colonial Drive in Orlando where there are no such establishments. He said statistics show a drastic difference with the number of sex-related crimes on the OBT area almost 10 times higher during a certain time period, than on Colonial Drive.

'The Supreme Court says you cannot ban adult entertainment," Reischman said, "but your ordinance has a number of key provisions which

should make it almost impossible for any to become established."

Among them he said that the city has the right to place them in certain areas, and determine a separation distance from schools, churches, parks, playgrounds and residential areas.

He said the ordinances have strict licensing procedures and methods of enforcement of strict laws.

Another speaker during the discussion was Joe Cocherella, an Orange County state prosecutor. who is a Seminole County resident. Reischman said Cocherella was prominent in revising the Orange County and Osceola County adult entertainment ordinances, and helped create the ordinance to be used by Lake Mary.

"It is my understanding that you haven't been approached by any adult entertainment people at the present time," Cocherella said, "so I'm happy that you are adopting these guidelines in advance. This way, when someone comes knocking on your door, you will immediately show that this is a less-friendly environment for them, and they may go elsewhere.'

Both the ordinance pertaining to zoning requirements, and one establishing operational and safety codes, were approved with no objections from members of the commission or the audience.

When describing the incident to police. the Middle Eastern man claimed that overseas a legitimate massage could be obtaining in the same manner (outcall service dispatched to your home) without involving prostitution. He claimed he thought he arranged for the massage in an appropriate manner and that the women had no right to the "cancellation fee."

The man did not wish to prosecute the women for theft but believed the business was for prostitution not massages and felt their business practices should be investigated.

The owner of the outcall referral service which dispatches women to calls from Kissimmee to DeLand said sex is not for sale by his company nor are individuals dispatched if sex is requested. However, the women are independent contractors who are supposed to provide lingerie modeling and companionship or light body touch (fingernalls on skin), not massages because they are not licensed massage therapists. Any acts the women perform beyond agreed upon services, is between the two parties. The women have occupational licenses in the cities or countles where they work. claimed the man with a pro-







Waxes are also used on candies, pastries, and gum and come from natural sources. Wax sources generally are plants. food-grade petroleum products, or insects (similar to honey from bccs).

Some waxes can be made from dairy or animal sources, but we are not aware of any such coatings being used on fruits and vegetables in this country. This is particularly important for

Waxes are used only in tiny amounts. In fact, each piece of waxed fruit only as a drop or two of wax. Waxes may be mixed with water or other wetting agents to ensure they are applied thinly and evenly.

The government regulates wax coatings to ensure their safety. Coatings used on fruits and vegetables must meet the food additive regulations of the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. Extensive research by governmental and scientific authorities has shown that approved waxes are safe to eat. Waxes are indigestible, which means they go through the body without breaking down or being absorbed.

Waxes by themselves do not control decay: rather, they may

> Produce shippers and supermarkets are required byfederal law to label produce items that have been waxed so you will know whether the fruits and vegetables you buy are coated. Consumers will see signs in produce departments that say "Coated with food-grade vegetable-petroleum-beeswax-, and/or shellac based wax or resin, to maintain freshness." None of these coatings are animal-based. and they all come from natural sources.

> Consumers are unlikely to see any signs that say. "Coated with food-grade animal-based wax" as such coatings are rarely - if ever - used. Any consumers who have questions about wax coatings should talk to their grocers.

What is the danger of colon polyp?

please explain what a polyp of the colon is? What causes it? How long does it take to grow and how do we become aware of it? How is it removed? Is age or sex a factor? Is it a form of cancer? Does it grow back again after it is removed?

DEAR READER: I'll take your questions in order.

A polyp is a benign growth that arises from the lining of the colon. It can vary in size from a small bump (half the size of a pencil eraser) to a large area (more than an inch in length). The cause is unknown.

Polyps take years to grow: probably five to 10. People are usually unaware of

these growths, until the polyps bleed. There is no pain, and bowel functions are not im-

Most polyps can be removed through a flexible, fiber-optic tube called a sigmoidoscope (or colonoscope, which is longer).

Polyps are unusual in persons younger than 45 or 50; they are relatively common in older people Sex is not a factor.

Polyps are not cancerous but, as I'll mention in a moment. some are precancerous. Ordinarily, these growths don't return after they've been removed because the prudent doctor completely excises the polyps.

Nonetheless, once polyps have been discovered and removed, periodic surveillance is necessary every three to five years to detect any new growths. Now to the crucial issue. As I

said, some polyps are precancerous. They may look harmless to the naked eye, but under the microscope, the cells appear abnormal. We know from experience that, over time, such polyps can turn into colon cancer. Consequently, people over 50 should have at least a flexible sigmoidiscopy (a simple, office examination of the lower colon) every five years. followed by colonoscopy (full colon exam)

DEAR DR. GOTT: Would you If polyps are discovered during the less complicated procedure. Also, some families have a genetic tendency to colon polyps that are frequently premalignant; such individuals require closer monitoring and may need to have sections of colon removed if the growth of polyps is extensive.


