Wayne Lery, diversified cooperative training coordinator at Oviedo High, started a career program three years ago for the students in the ninth through 12th grades.

Six weeks ago a survey was held to learn which vocational areas interested the students, giving them a choice of 40 opportunities. The top vocations in this survey determined the 18 speakers for the day.

Basic psychology behind this program is to have students choose their careers early and give them a better opportunity to proceed. The program was prepared by the students, themselves.

All DCT students have to maintain a "C" average on their jobs. Every nine weeks a standard grade card is delivered to each employer to grade students on their work, personality, grooming and everything that will make them

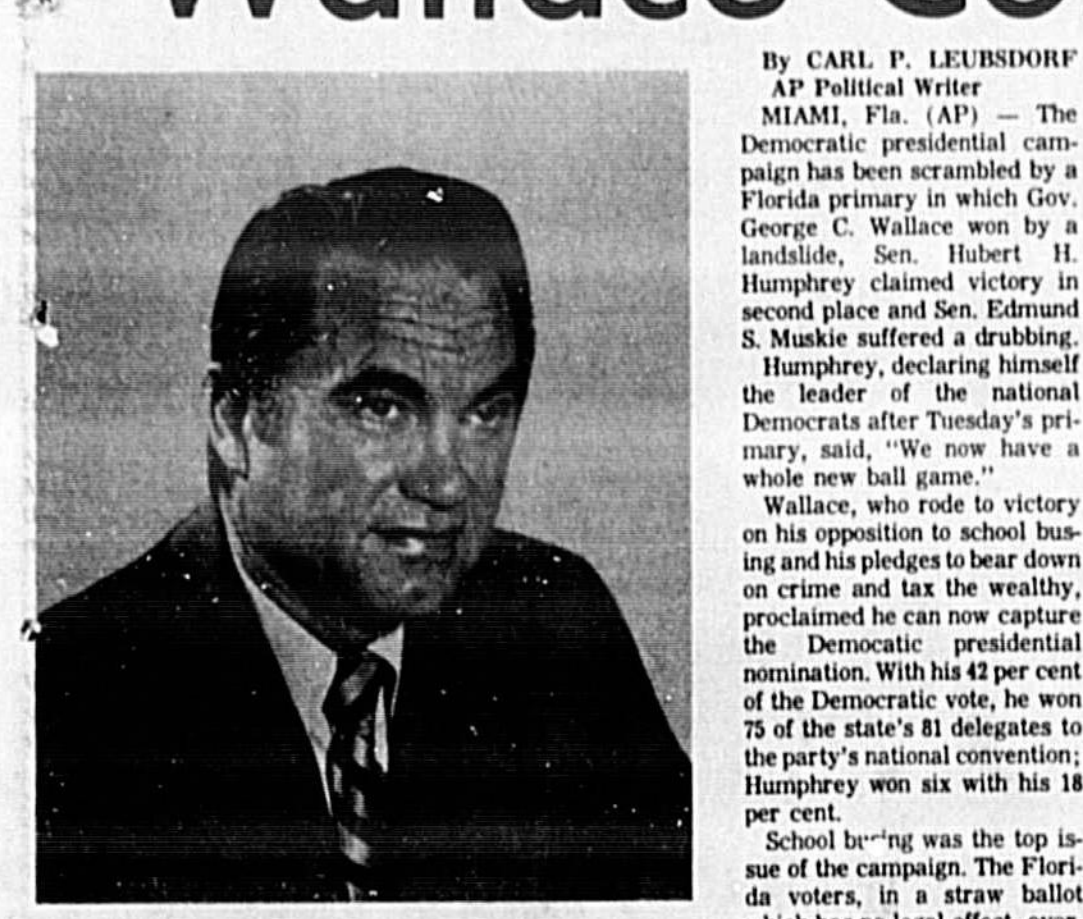

New York Mayor John V. Lindsay won 7 per cent—barely edging Sen. George S. McGovern for fifth place after a heavy investment in time and money. McGovern took 6 per cent of the Democratic votes.

Wallace, who rode to victory on his opposition to school busing and his pledges to bear down on crime and law, the wealthy, proclaimed he can now capture the Democratic presidential nomination. With his 42 per cent of the Democratic vote, he won 75 of the state's 41 delegates to the party's national convention.

Sen. Henry M. Jackson of Washington finished third with 13 per cent, ahead of Muskie with his 8 per cent, and voted to win the April 4 Wisconsin primary.

Voters Dunk Askew's Hopes With Anti-Busing Returns

By JOHN VAN GIESON Associated Press Writer MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Floridians have had their first falling out with Gov. Reubin Askew, dunking his vice presidential possibilities in a floodtide of anti-busing votes.

All the Democratic presidential candidates who said during the Florida primary campaign that Askew would make "a fine vice president," can hardly afford to pick a governor who could be in serious trouble in his home state and throughout his region.

And that's the position 43-year-old Askew is in after raising \$46,000 in two weeks and stumping the state against the anti-busing proposal that passed with 74 per cent of the vote Tuesday night.

Just four months ago, Florida's voters gave Askew a 7-3 margin on his corporate income tax. "I think that with the Florida primary being over that the talk about who will be the vice president will be shifting to Illinois, then on to Wisconsin and then on to California," Askew said.

He reiterated previous statements that he is not interested in being vice president. But Askew could be a factor in national politics in the future if he can mend his fences in Florida. House Speaker Richard Pritzgraw, D-Miami, said the public recognizes the governor's support of busing came from "great personal conviction."

"They have tremendous confidence in the governor and the fact they disagree with him on one issue is not going to hurt him," Pritzgraw said.

Florida Republicans followed New Hampshire GOP by giving a solid sweep to President Nixon in the state party preferential primary Tuesday. Nixon won handily over his only opponent, Ohio's U. S. Rep. John Ashbrook.

Wants Are Known Voters Speak Out

By ERIC SHARP Associated Press Writer MIAMI (AP) Florida voters who made Governor Wallace their presidential candidate also heeded his call to tell America loud and clear that they oppose busing children to desegregate schools.

The Alabama governor ran an anti-busing campaign in Florida's Democratic presidential primary election, and voters who gave him 41 per cent of their ballots Tuesday voted 3-0-1 for a straw vote referendum that proposed a constitutional amendment to ban busing for all children.

The voters also approved by a 4-0-1 margin another non-binding straw vote question which endorsed equal education for all children. And they voted by the same margin for allowing prayer in the public schools.

With 79 per cent of the vote tallied, 1,103,856 voted for a busing amendment while 386,724 voted against it, a ratio of 74 per cent to 26.

The equal education question, which also asked voters if they opposed a return to a dual school system, passed by a vote of 1,065,283 to 289,839, or 79 per cent to 21.

The call for prayer in public schools was approved by 1,133,079 voters with 294,948 rejecting it, also 79 per cent to 21.

Florida's Democratic campaigner, Reubin Askew, campaigned hard to turn the tide on the busing question and was disappointed that his constituents failed to heed his plea. But he said: "I am very happy and pleased that as a majority of Floridians registered opposition to busing, they also registered commitment to seek other alterna-

Senators Stage Celebration Bash

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Members of the Florida Senate, including the two authors of the school busing straw vote, learned the results of Tuesday's primary election huddled around a color television set at an exclusive, all-white Tallahassee country club.

"It just proves what I've said all along," said Sen. Richard Deeb, R-St. Petersburg, lifting a forkful of steak to his mouth. "The people said what they felt, just like I predicted they would."

Deeb was the prime author of the straw vote proposition asking voters if they favored a federal constitutional amendment to prohibit forced busing. The idea polled a healthy 74 per cent on Tuesday's ballot.

Sen. Charles Weber, R-Fort Lauderdale, said he was pleased with the vote but had hoped for a 75 per cent tally.

"I had a prepared statement I was going to read if the vote topped 75 per cent," commented Weber. "Now I can't read it. But I can tell you this vote has nationwide significance. It shows the people believe you don't have to have busing to have equality."

"This vote," as Sen. Beth Johnson, R-Cocoa Beach, commented over the clink of cocktail glasses, "will really drive the Democrats right up the wall."

Most of the senators at the private party thrown on election night by Senate President Jerry Thomas expressed surprise that there were no Negroes in the Killbuck Country Club as guests at the party.

"I didn't know that," said Weber. "But I ask you, where are there any mixed country clubs in Tallahassee?"

And Thomas said, "Well, it becomes a matter of where you hold these things. There aren't that many places in Tallahassee big enough to hold such a party."

Thomas said the outcome of the busing straw vote "shows that Florida is still to be considered a constitutionally conservative state."

Numerous senators at Tuesday night's gathering proclaimed the vote a disaster for Gov. Reubin Askew, who had campaigned against the straw busing vote. But Thomas said, "That isn't necessarily so. There are two years to go before he must run for vice president, it really doesn't matter because his position in favor of busing might help in the rest of the state."

Many senators expressed surprise at the strength of Gov. George Wallace, who polled 41 per cent of the Democratic vote. But the statements of surprise were mixed with statements of "I told you so."

And senators were ready to pronounce the end of Sen. Edmund Muskie of Maine, who polled a scant nine per cent of the vote.

Lindsay Vows To Continue

MIAMI BEACH (AP) — Florida voters gave us a choice between Richard Nixon and George Wallace," said New York Mayor John Lindsay, "and that is no choice at all."

Lindsay ran fifth among the Democrats in Tuesday's Florida presidential primary while Wallace won in a landslide and Nixon was heavily endorsed by Republicans.

"It is a choice entirely unacceptable to the voters of this nation," said the mayor, who drew 7 per cent of the vote and edged out Sen. George McGovern of South Dakota.

"Let's face it, the results Tuesday night were deeply disturbing."

Wallace, the governor of Alabama, carried 42 per cent of the votes and Nixon polled 38 per cent in the GOP balloting.

"The fact that Wallace and Nixon won makes it all the more necessary to carry on the fight," said the handsome Lindsay as a pep band at his headquarters struck up "On Wisconsin."

Missing Parcel? Could Be Here

By BOB ENGLE, Associated Press Writer BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — A boxcar full of parcel post packages has been found on an obscure Maryland siding and the railroad is adding more than two years ago.

The U.S. Postal Service and the Penn Central Railroad are blaming each other for the mix-up.

When the boxcar left Philadelphia in 1970 it was headed for the postal distribution center here with packages and third-class mail for Alabama, Louisiana and Mississippi.

It was found on a seldom used siding in Perryville, Md., with 318 mail sacks, 207 of which were filled with parcel post, including numerous shipments from three Philadelphia mail order houses.

And that's about all the Penn Central and the postal service agree on.

The Washington firm noted the boxcar had a wheel defect and, according to postal records, the contents were transferred to another boxcar. In September 1970, Hopkin said, the Washington firm returned the first boxcar and 58 similar ones to Penn Central for storage since that type of car was being phased out for postal work.

Greene said that when the loaded boxcar was found on the siding, its contents were taken to Baltimore where many of the parcels were rewrapped due to their deteriorated condition.

"Each was stamped: 'Delayed' due to circumstances beyond the control of the U.S. Postal Service."

They arrived here Monday.

The man is one of hundreds caught in a new craze—design your own check.

Advertising executive H. Samm Counts plugs his agency with checks that bear a photograph of him sitting on a sofa.

Elfi Shello, a bookkeeper, has checks illustrated with an elf drawing.

Sherry and Lynn Lynn's checks were designed by their young son, who drew a portrait of the Lynn family.

Customers may bring in a drawing or photograph of whatever they want on their checks, as long as it's not in questionable taste, Mrs. Jones said. The checks cost \$4.95 for 200.

Designs may be superimposed across the entire check or put in a corner so the name isn't crowded. Two colors are allowed on each check.

"People are phoning and writing from all over the countryside," Mrs. Jones said. "People are asking to open accounts by mail from Chicago."

Some people go for photographs of themselves, which give both the personal touch and insurance against someone else trying to cash the check illegally.

Others prefer drawings of their homes, pets and families. One man's checks show a picture of his favorite whisky.

Mrs. Jones said the man paying alimony with the photograph of his new wife refuses to let it be seen by the public.

Connally To Defend The Dollar

WASHINGTON (AP) — Treasury Secretary John B. Connally prepared today to address himself to European uncertainties over the dollar, probably with a defense of the international monetary settlement reached in December.

Connally scheduled a major speech in New York before the Council on Foreign Relations. The meeting was closed to the public, but the Treasury said copies of Connally's remarks would be released.

Connally's aides tried to play down speculation that the secretary would center his talk on the uncertainties of the dollar, but officials said privately that a lot of work has gone into turning the speech into a reply to uneasiness over the dollar.

The richest nations of the non-Communist world reached agreement last December on a new system of money-exchange rates built around the devaluation of the dollar and revaluation of several currencies.

Since then, there have been fears the agreement may fall apart because the realignment was not enough to reflect changing economic conditions.

Girl Scouts, Lions Aid Fate Unites Woman, Dog

An ecology project reported at a Girl Scout jamboree in Pennsylvania and the humanitarian efforts of a men's civic organization in Central Florida through the working of "fate" combined to give a blind Longwood woman a new measure of independence.

Miss Sonja Jean Meshell, an active woman in her early 30s, was a laboratory technician specializing in histology when she learned in August, 1969, that she was going blind. The doctor's diagnosis was acute and irreversible glaucoma, usually thought by the public to be an affliction associated with old age. The prognosis was not favorable and by December, 1969, Miss Meshell was sightless.

Meanwhile senior Girl Scout Meg Petroski, of Altamonte Springs Troop 152, while attending Discovery '70 was hearing that a monetarily profitable and ecologically rewarding project can be the collection of "pop top" tabs.

Meg mentioned the idea to her Girl Scout Troop, which in turn relayed the information to Citrus Council that comprises Seminole, Orange, Osceola, Volusia, Flagler and Brevard Counties. The Council decided to sponsor the ecology project.

Certain the hard-working and enthusiastic girls would make a success of the project, ways of spending the funds earned were looked into. Inquiry was made of the Lions Club of Downtown Orlando on the possibility of purchasing a "leader dog." The girls were told such animals are not for sale, but are given away. The girls could provide transportation expenses for a

person to travel round trip to Rochester, Mich., to the Leader Dog School to be trained along with a suitable animal.

Miss Meshell already had applied through the Lions Club for a Leader Dog. She was selected by the girls as the object of their project.

The young women motivated friends, family, neighbors and even strangers to help with the collection. Some 2,000 pop-top tabs and one year later, the money was in hand and Miss Meshell was on her way to Michigan.

Miss Meshell found that the dogs used in the program are raised in private homes for the affection associated with their lives and taught to love by being loved and cared for.

The recipient of the dog does not have the opportunity of selecting the dog they wish. Rather an animal is selected whose personality is most compatible with that of its master.

In this particular case, a coal-black Labrador Retriever named "Bosco" was chosen for Miss Meshell.

Following the training, Bosco and Sonja returned to her Longwood home. They are constant companions not only in the home, but also on walks through the city and on shopping tours. The dog is particularly fond of parks, and the dog's personality, according to Sonja, appears to change from play time to work time. During working periods when it is responsible for her mistress's life she refuses to be distracted by others. During periods of relaxation when her mistress is also relaxing, Bosco becomes playful with others and is extremely friendly, cavorting, despite her age of nearly two years, like a puppy.

Members of the Altamonte Springs Senior Troop 152, Junior Troop 837 and Brownie Troop 211 visited Miss Meshell and got the opportunity this past weekend to meet Bosco and see the results of their work.

They stamped the project an unqualified success.

National Health Insurance Congress Eyeing Issue

WASHINGTON — Some Democrats and Republicans want to have legislation establishing a national health insurance program passed by Congress before they face the voters in the November, 1972, elections.

Sickness has become a luxury that only the well-heeled can afford and this accounts for the growing public support for some sort of national health insurance.

Once widely condemned as "socialized medicine," the concept has gained respectability in the wake of soaring costs for health care delivery.

There are some fresh signs that Congress may get cracking on the issue.

On March 3, House Ways and Means Committee Chairman Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., revealed his ideas for a national health plan which include junking Medicaid in favor of a better plan and improving existing health insurance protection.

Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Elliot L. Richardson on March 5 hailed Mills' remarks as offering "real hope that the House will pass responsible health insurance legislation this year."

Richardson noted that Mills' concept, like the administration's, seeks to re-form and improve the existing system for the delivery of health care services. Both are based on private insurance.

The reason for the chumminess between administration official Richardson and sometimes obdurate Democrat Mills is that the White House recognizes it is Mills' Ways and Means Committee that must get the legislative ball rolling on a new health plan.

Easter Ham Dish

Ham is a favorite of many families for Easter or other special occasions. It comes with a touch of spring. Fruit marmalade is a colorful and tasty accompaniment to this tasty bit of pork. Especially good are orange-glazed pears filled with tiny mandarin orange segments. When serving, border a handsome baked ham with the pears for an eye treat. The glaze for the fruit is of orange marmalade, pear syrup, honey with lemon and spices and also is used to glaze the ham. The filled canned Bartlett pear halves cook quickly. Serve with scalloped potatoes and asparagus.

ORANGE GLAZED PEARS AND HAM

1 (28-ounce) can Bartlett pear halves
1/2 cup orange marmalade
1/2 cup honey
Juice of 1/2 lemon
Dash of salt
1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
1 (8 1/2-ounce) can mandarin oranges, drained
Drain pears, reserving 1/2 cup syrup. Combine syrup with marmalade, honey, lemon juice, salt, cloves and nutmeg. Fill pears with orange segments. Bake at 325 degrees 15 minutes, basting several times with marmalade glaze. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

BAKED HAM

Bake ham 15 minutes per pound in 325-degree oven. Thirty minutes before serving, remove from oven and discard drippings. Score ham in diamonds and stud with whole cloves. Continue baking 30 minutes, brushing several times with orange marmalade glaze. (NEWSPAPER ENTERPRISE ASSN.)

Spaghetti with Ripe Olive Oil Sauce

A variation on a favorite theme: 3/4 cup canned pitted ripe olives, 1 can (6 1/2 to 8 ounces) minced or chopped clams, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon onion powder, 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 2 teaspoons lemon juice, 2 drops Tabasco sauce, 1 tablespoon minced parsley. Drain olives and slice. Drain clams, to clam liquid and enough milk to make 1 1/4 cups. In a 1-quart saucepan over low heat melt butter, stir in flour, salt and onion powder, remove from heat, gradually stir in milk mixture, keeping smooth. Cook over moderately low heat, stirring constantly, until thickened and boiling. Stir in Worcestershire, lemon juice, Tabasco, clams, olives and parsley. Simmer about 1/4 hour. Add sauce, enough for 1/2 pound spaghetti, cooked - 4 servings.

MORNING COFFEE

Rugelach: Coffee, RUGELACH

These little pastries come from Jewish cuisine. 1 cup butter, soft, 1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, soft, 2 cups unsifted flour, stir to aerate before measuring, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 cup finely chopped walnuts, 1/2 cup raisins. In a medium mixing bowl, with a wooden spoon, blend butter and cheese, gradually blend in flour. Divide into 4 equal portions and shape each into a ball. Flatten each ball. Lightly cover each portion with transparent plastic wrap and refrigerate until firm enough to roll - overnight if you like. Work with 1 portion of dough at a time, keeping remaining refrigerated. On a floured pastry cloth with a floured stockinet-covered rolling pin, roll out 1 portion of dough to an 8-inch round. Mix 2 tablespoons sugar with 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon and 2 tablespoons nuts, sprinkle over round of dough, then strewn with 1 tablespoon raisins. Cut into 12 wedges; roll up each wedge from wide end and curve to form a crescent. Treat remaining portions of dough the same way. Place on greased cookie sheet, on a greased cookie sheet and bake in a preheated 375-degree oven until lightly browned, 20 to 25 minutes. With a wide spatula remove to wire racks to cool. Store in a lightly covered tin box. Makes 4 dozen.

Lamb Riblets Thrifty

Cooks on the lookout for a thrifty main dish should not overlook lamb riblets, cut-up breast of lamb.

One of the best ways to prepare the riblets is with an orange-flavored sauce as in the following recipe. When we tried it in our kitchen we found it was not only economical but well liked.

LAMB RIBLETS WITH ORANGE SAUCE
1 medium tomato, skinned and cubed
1/2 cup dark corn syrup
Grated rind of 2 medium or large oranges (3 or 4 table-spoons)
1/4 cup orange juice
1/4 cup cider vinegar
1 medium onion, peeled, sliced thin and separated into rings
2 teaspoons prepared mustard
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1 teaspoon celery seed
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 pounds (about) lamb riblets (lamb breast)
1 tablespoon cornstarch
2 tablespoons cold water

In a small saucepan stir together the tomato, corn syrup, orange rind, orange juice, vinegar, onion, mustard, Worcestershire, celery seed and salt. Over medium heat bring to a boil; reduce heat and simmer 10 minutes.
Meanwhile cut riblets into 1-rib pieces; if ribs are long, cut in half crosswise with a cleaver. Place riblets in a 4 or 5-quart Dutch oven or similar heavy casserole. Pour orange mixture over them. Cook tightly and bake in a preheated 350-degree oven until riblets are tender — 1 to 1 1/4 hours.

Transfer riblets to a broiler rack set over broiler pan or to rack over shallow roasting pan. Broil 6 inches from heat source, turning and basting several times with liquid in Dutch oven, until browned — 5 or 6 minutes.

Skim as much fat as you can from liquid in Dutch oven; there should be about 2 cups including a small amount of fat. Mix cornstarch and water until smooth and add to liquid. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly, and boil 1 minute. Serve ribs and sauce with hot cooked rice. Makes 4 servings.

Lime Pie
1 3/4-inch graham cracker or pastry pie shell, baked
3 egg yolks
1 can sweetened condensed milk (15-16 oz.)
1/2 cup Florida Key (or Persian) lime juice
Grated rind of one Florida lime
Meringue (see below)
Prepare pie shell, bake and allow to cool. Beat egg yolks until pale yellow. Blend in condensed milk. Slowly add lime juice and lime rind and blend until smooth. Pour this filling into pie shell. Top with meringue mixture (below).
3 egg whites
Scant 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
4 to 6 Tablespoons of sugar

Being certain that no egg yolk is present, add cream of tartar and beat whites until foamy. Add sugar, one table-spoon at a time, beating constantly. Beat until sugar is dissolved and whites are glossy and stand in soft peaks. Spread meringue on pie, starting with small amounts at the edges and taking it to the crust at every point. Allow no spaces to remain between meringue and crust. Cover pie with remaining meringue, spreading evenly in attractive swirls. Bake in a 350° F. oven for about 10 minutes, or until tops of irregular surface are lightly browned. Cool at room temperature. Chill until firm.

Potato Beef Kebabs
2 1/2 lbs. beef chuck
2 1/2 cups oil
1/2 cup wine or wine vinegar
1 clove garlic, crushed
1 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper
1/4 cup soy sauce
1 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
1 Tbsp. dry mustard
Cut chuck into 2-inch cubes. Combine all other ingredients; mix well. Pour marinade over meat cubes. Refrigerate several hours or overnight. One hour before preparing kebabs, place the following vegetables in the marinade:
24 small precooked Florida new potatoes
24 Florida cherry tomatoes
24 whole mushrooms
6 Florida green peppers, quartered
String beef and vegetables alternately on 12 "24" skewers. Leave space between tidbits on skewer, so heat reaches all. Exception: for raw beef, push skewer. Baste beef and vegetables with the marinade during cooking. Broil about 12 minutes for medium-rare; turn often. Serves 6.

Italian Pastry Tasty

European men occasionally like to dabble in the kitchen, too. And like most men who cook when the mood hits them, Edo Pella, a young Italian gourmet, has his specialties. Pella is continuing the tradition as head of a firm originating with Major Giuseppe Galliano, a late 19th Century military hero. Pella and one other person know the formula of Liqueur Galliano, a sweet tasting liqueur with more than 20 ingredients. As gourmet he enjoys modifying classic cookery to shorten work time but not scrapping the taste. Here is his modified version of a traditional deep-fried Italian pastry, "Cenci" explaining that "Cenci" originated in his native Tuscany. CENCI ALLA GALLIANO 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour

1 egg
2 tablespoons of Liqueur Galliano
1 cup confectioner's sugar
1/2 teaspoon of salt
1 cups vegetable oil
In a bowl place two cups of flour, two whole eggs, and the yolks of the other two eggs. Add the liqueur, a tablespoon of confectioner's sugar, and the salt. Mix the ingredients thoroughly and form a ball with the dough. Sprinkle the remaining flour over a sheet of waxed paper and knead the dough until the flour has been absorbed, and the dough is smooth and shiny about 10 minutes. Refrigerate for one hour. Heat the oil to 375 degrees in a heavy sauce pan or deep fryer. On a floured board roll out one-third of the dough at a time until paper thin. Cut into 5-inch by 5-inch strips. Pie the strips into loose knots and deep fry a few at a time, turning once until golden brown (about two minutes), removing to a paper towel to drain. Sprinkle generously with confectioner's sugar. Serve with fresh fruit and coffee. Makes 30 Cenci or about 8 frozen.

Pork Shoulder With Savory Florida Cabbage

1 3-lb. Smoked Pork Penis Shoulder
1/2 cup onion, chopped
1/2 cup Florida green pepper, chopped
2 tablespoons butter
2 cups fresh Florida tomatoes, chopped
1 1/2 cups tomato sauce
2 tablespoons Florida honey
2 teaspoons dry mustard
1/4 cup wine vinegar
1 medium head of Florida cabbage (about 2 lbs.) cut into 3 wedges
4 slices bacon, crisply fried and crumbled

Trim any excess fat from the shoulder. Place shoulder, fat side up, in roasting pan. Insert meat thermometer into meatiest portion, away from bone and fat. Roast at 325° F. until meat thermometer registers 185° F. (Allow about 30 minutes per pound for a bone-in roast.)
20 minutes before the meat is ready, sauté onion and green pepper in butter until tender. Add the next 5 ingredients and simmer 15 minutes.
Cook cabbage. Place wedges in boiling water and simmer about 12 minutes, or until tender.
When the roast is ready, place on serving platter. Place drained cabbage wedges around roast. Spoon tomato mixture over roast and cabbage wedges. Sprinkle with bacon.
Makes 8 to 9 servings.

DINNER FOR FOUR

Park Chips and Kraut
Fruit Compote Beverage
4 double pork chops
Bacon fat
1 1/4 cups thin strips onion
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
2 cups corned and pared (thinly sliced) apple
1 can (1 1/2 cups and 11 ounces) Swiss Kraut, drained
2 tablespoons minced parsley
1/4 cup dry white or rose wine
3 tablespoons dark brown sugar
Cut off any excess fat from around chops. In a large heavy skillet, in a little bacon fat, brown pork chops on both sides, remove chops. To drippings in skillet add onion, salt and pepper; cook gently, stirring until onion are golden. Add apples, kraut and parsley; cook gently, stirring often, until kraut is quite brown in color — about 20 minutes. If necessary, add more bacon fat to prevent sticking. Stir in wine and sugar. Add 1/2 cup hot soup or kraut. Cover and simmer, stirring kraut occasionally and turning chops once. Total time is cooked through — 30 to 40 minutes.

Crepe Uses Vary From Appetizer To Dessert

The French call them crepes but these thin, lacy pancakes are among the most international dishes in the world.

The Chinese stuff them with shrimp, pork and vegetables to make their famed egg roll; the Russians fill them with sour cream and caviar to create the blinshiki; the Hungarians cram them with various sweet fillings and call the result palacsint; and Jewish cooks fill them with sweetened cottage cheese and fruit for blintzes.

Tender crepes serve as the basis for a number of famed French dishes, from the savory to the sweet. Filled with cheese, meat, creamed chicken or seafood, these egg-enriched pancakes can be offered for luncheon or as a first course for dinner. Glazed and flamed with liquors, they become dessert.

But whatever form they take, crepes are looked on among the most elegant of dishes.

Some of the most delicious crepes I have sampled are produced in the kitchen of a friendly New York bistro run by an amiable Breton couple, Albert and Lisette Demie.

The Demies operate La Grille, a cozy little spot on New York's West Side. It is a simple, unpretentious place, but it has a fine cuisine that is truly French.

The fillings for Crepes Al La Albert Demie run the spectrum from shellfish to sugared fruit with whipped cream. Here is his recipe for the pancake with a mushroom filling.

Crepes
 1 1/4 cups flour
 1 egg
 1 cup milk
 1/4 cup water
 1/2 tsp salt
 2 tbsps melted butter
 3 tbsps softened butter
 1 tsp vegetable oil

Combine everything except softened butter and oil in a blender and mix at high speed for two minutes. Refrigerate two hours. Take 6-inch skillet, heat well and brush with butter and oil. Pour about two tbsps batter for each crepe. Tip pan to distribute evenly. Cook

Apricot Pineapple Butter Is Up-To-The Minute

Devotees of natural food should go for this recipe for a spread for bread or toast. It's great, too, used as a filling for layer cake.

This delightful preserve is made from apricots (preferably unsulphured), canned pineapple packed in its own juice, preserved the easy way — in the freezer.

NATURAL APRICOT PINEAPPLE BUTTER 2 cups water
 1 pound dried apricots, preferably unsulphured
 1 can (1 pound) crushed pineapple packed in its own juice
 3 oranges
 1 cup honey

Place apricots in a 1-quart saucepan; add water. Bring to a boil; reduce heat and cook gently until apricots are very soft — about 15 minutes. Turn apricots with any remaining cooking liquid into a food mill placed over a bowl. Add pineapple with its juice. Turn apricots and pineapple through mill. Return pureed mixture to 2-quart saucepan. Grate rind from oranges and lemon and add to apricot-pineapple mixture. Squeeze juice from fruit and add to mixture. Stir in honey.

Cook gently over medium-low heat, stirring often to prevent scorching, until very thick — about 30 minutes. (Mixture thickens more as it cools.) Because mixture tends to spatter as it cooks and thickens, partially cover. If desired, and stir often. Freeze following directions below. Makes five 1/2-pint jars.

To Freeze Apricot Pineapple Butter: Chill mixture, wash five 1/2-pint wide-mouth freezing jars in hot soapy water, rinse, drain and cool. Wash and rinse lids and bands. Place lids in a small bowl and pour boiling water over them; let stand until ready to use. Fill jars with apricot pineapple butter leaving 1 inch head space. Wipe sealing edges and threads of jars with a clean damp cloth. Put lids on jars, screw down very tight. Place jars upright in freezer until frozen, then arrange in any desired position.

In small bowl of electric mixer at high speed beat yolks until thick and ivory color. In medium or large bowl cream butter and sugar; add beaten yolks; beat gently to combine. Fold in flour 1/4 at a time. Spread a buttered square cake pan (8 by 8 by 2 inches). Bake in a preheated 375-degree oven for 20 minutes. While still warm, pour Walnut Lemon Topping over base and let set; cut into small bars.

Walnut Lemon Topping: Mix 1/2 cup coarsely chopped walnuts with 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind, 1 tablespoon lemon juice and 1 egg yolk. In a small saucepan boil 1/2 cup sugar with 2 tablespoons water to 20 degrees on a candy thermometer (firm ball stage); add to walnut mixture, stirring only enough to blend.

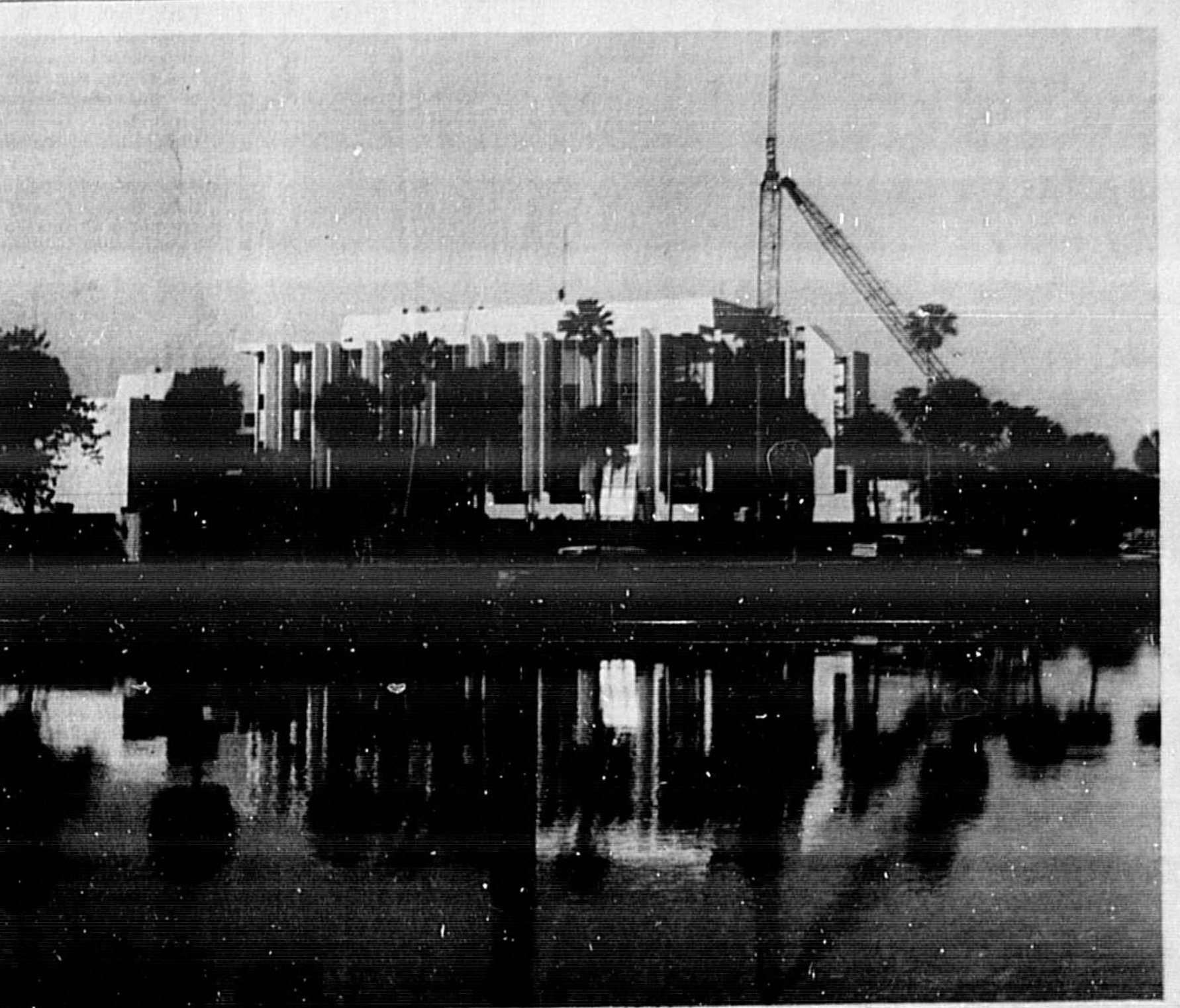
