Eisenhower-Macmillan Talks Resume In More Hopeful Mood

WASHINGTON (UP)—Talks between President Eisenhower and British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan resumed today in a possibly more hopeful mood due to a sudden burst of U.S. military achievements including a 1,000,000-mile rocket shot.

meanwhile, that the two leaders are considering asking other nations to join in pooling scientific military information as a truce card in the East-West race for nuclear and space superiority.

Eisenhower and Macmillan began talks Wednesday night on scientific unity. Their first conference began at 8 p.m., e.d.t., and concluded at 9:30 p.m. There was no announcement of what took place. Further talks were scheduled today.

Close attention is being paid to the war-torn Middle East and a careful review of Soviet intentions around the globe, as well as the issue of East-West military and scientific supremacy.

Force rocket to 1,000-4,000 miles over the Pacific was almost certain to create a new surge of optimism in the ability of the United States and the West to match or outstrip Russia in the race for space supremacy.

Added to this was other announcements of new U.S. strides in the modern weapons field. These included the successful testing of a 1,500-mile Jupiter missile.

Administration officials said Eisenhower is emphasizing two basic points concerning closer scientific cooperation:

clear matters with British and other nations. Both Eisenhower and Macmillan, diplomats said, attach high importance to exchanging views on possible Soviet diplomatic moves. This review was included in the program of the Soviet scientific achievement in launching Sputnik, the earth satellite, and the subsequent Soviet sabra-rattling in the Middle East.

Collins Says Assessors Must Up Property Values

ORLANDO (AP)—Gov. LeRoy Collins told tax assessors in no uncertain terms today that they must for neglecting their constitutional duty of reflecting their constituents' home counties or face the music for neglecting their constitutional duty.

"I do not say this in any spirit of antagonism," he added, but "I am examining what each of you has done this year, and I am anxiously watching your plans for next year."

The Constitution requires that property be assessed at full value, but recent surveys show that only about three counties are assessing at 100 per cent value and some are assessing at as little as 5 to 20 per cent.

Collins told the assessors that unless counties make a property contribute more to the tax coffers, particularly for schools, there is going to be pressure for state taxes in 1959 in addition to the 100 million dollars put on the books by the last session.

He said increased assessments will not mean an unnecessarily high burden on the property owner because it would be geared to "downward revisions of millages" to insure that no one is wrongly penalized.

As near as I can figure, it's a rare family around town that the "big" bag hasn't bitten! Everyone seems to have, or has had, some variety of it. Due to just such illnesses, so few couples showed up Monday night to square-dance, that they decided not to bother, and just had a splendid evening out.

I've been looking through the "Sanfity", and though I write this too late to give you the movies for the whole week, I can tell you what's playing tonight and tomorrow.

Thursday—"Untamed Youth" with John Russell and Mamie Van Doren.

Friday—"Courage of Black Beauty" with John Crawford and Mimi Gibson. (Good children's movie).

And for the benefit of those of you who don't get a chance to read the "Sanfity" the front page last week was devoted to the news about the new "proficiency pay" program. This applies to grades E-3 through E-4. This program has been designed to retain enlisted personnel in critical rate and will go into effect in 1958. These advancements will be restricted to approximately 15% of all enlisted personnel, and will be equivalent to a one or two pay-grade increase. It is expected that it will take up to four years to reach the 15% covered by this program. One other good thing about this is that these increases may be used to compute retirement, just as if you had advanced in the rate. No proficiency advancement will be made to retired members of the Armed Forces, or to Fleet Reservists. The following paragraph I will quote directly from the "Sanfity", which words it far better than I would be able to!

"Under the Defense order, enlisted personnel may be granted one or two pay-grade proficiency advances, including all allowances, without the commensurate higher military rank or strips, in recognition of their qualifications in occupational areas of control importance to their service, or for demonstrating outstanding effectiveness in an assigned specialty."

To qualify, a man must be in pay-grade E-4, or higher, or if in pay-grade E-3, must have completed twenty-four months service. You must have at least six months continuous active duty prior to an advancement, and must serve a minimum of six months in a grade, including those attained by proficiency promotion. The way it is now set up, those serving in pay-grade E-3 (chief), will not qualify for this type of advancement, while those in pay-grade E-4 (first class) will be limited to a one grade step-up. Allocations for this type of advancement will be reviewed every three months. Once again I will quote from the "Sanfity".

"According to the directive, the proficiency advances will be employed primarily in military occupational areas where the problem of retention of trained personnel is critical and the investment in training is high, and where, as a result, a significant shortage of qualified personnel exists or is anticipated."

Failure to maintain the necessary effectiveness to attain these advances will result in the loss of the advance. It may also be lost by conversion or reclassification to a different specialty, detail to a duty not requiring such skill, or promotion in rank.

That's about it, and it's good news for many at this particular base. Hope it applies to you!

I stated in one of my columns last week that the Chief's Club would be having its Halloween Dance on November 1, the same night as the E. M. Club will be having theirs. This was the original plan, but it has been changed to Saturday night, November 2. So if you are one of those efficient people who makes a note of all things you plan to do, run and change the date right now!

Editorials

Our Cold War "Sputnik" Enemies Could Do Us An Immense Favor!

Events moved fast after the Soviet launching of Sputnik, the "baby moon"—coming as it did, hard on the heels of a Soviet claim that they had perfected some form of intercontinental ballistic missile.

The initial reaction to the earth satellite, naturally enough, was generally one of surprise and shock. The ballistic missile claim could and has been discounted to some extent. But Sputnik was something else again. It was no communist propaganda trick. Scientists and others the world over saw and tracked the satellite—whizzing around the world at 14,000 miles an hour at a height of more than 500 miles—and recorded its radio transmissions.

The concern, of course, was not over the satellite itself. Sputnik was not a weapon, and there was no reason to fear it. The great danger—in Western eyes—is that Soviet science may have a big lead on the rest of the world, most particularly in the field of rocketry. The satellite, according to the scientists, must have been launched by a staged rocket—a device which is almost unbelievably complex and difficult to construct. Such rockets, once they are sufficiently developed, will be able to launch guided missiles of great accuracy and almost limitless range. And it is no secret that this country and the Soviet Union are in a grim race to produce practical intercontinental missiles with H-bomb warheads.

President Eisenhower, a few days after Sputnik's launching, went to considerable length to discount the military importance of the satellite, and to reassure this country as to where we stand. Soon, he said, we will send up a series of small test satellites,

and in March launch one scientifically superior to the Russian's. And he stressed that we are giving top priority to missile development.

However, there is no doubt that the satellite has given Washington a great deal to think about. The new Secretary of Defense, Neil H. McElroy, said at his first press conference that it may be necessary to speed the missile program. The satellite, he added, proves that Soviet science has made great progress with missiles.

That brings up a really big three-pronged question—are we lagging behind in the missile race; if so, why, and what can be done about it? Numerous experts think we may be lagging, and one reason is frequently given. One newspaper puts it in these words: "...the U. S. missile program is lagging chiefly because of jealousies and bickering among the three armed services competing in this field, and because the U. S. Defense Department has failed to force them to work together amicably." There is small doubt that the Army, the Navy, and the Air Force, have all tried to take the center of the spotlight—and to obtain the lion's share of the vast funds involved in missile research, testing and development. The result, say many observers, has been a waste of money, materials, manpower and what may be the most precious commodity of all—time.

The newspaper proposes a simple solution—that we "...ret all our brains in the same laboratory, and quit worrying about the color of the uniforms."

If the Soviet satellite helps to bring that about, our cold war enemies will obviously have done us a big favor.

No Fever Pitch Reached Yet!

Obviously, the United Fund Appeal—Sanford and Seminole County's very first all out appeal—has failed to reach fever pitch.

This can be observed by watching the thermometer at First St. and Park Ave., placed there so Sanford and Seminole County can watch the funds swell rapidly until they reach the goal.

For 20 days the drive has been pushing along with just a few hundred dollars reported each day—and as a result—with two-thirds of the campaign month gone by, only one-fifth of the goal has been raised.

Many people have devoted hours and hours of time to the project. The United Appeal's annual campaign was created because Sanford and Seminole County's citizens demanded it.

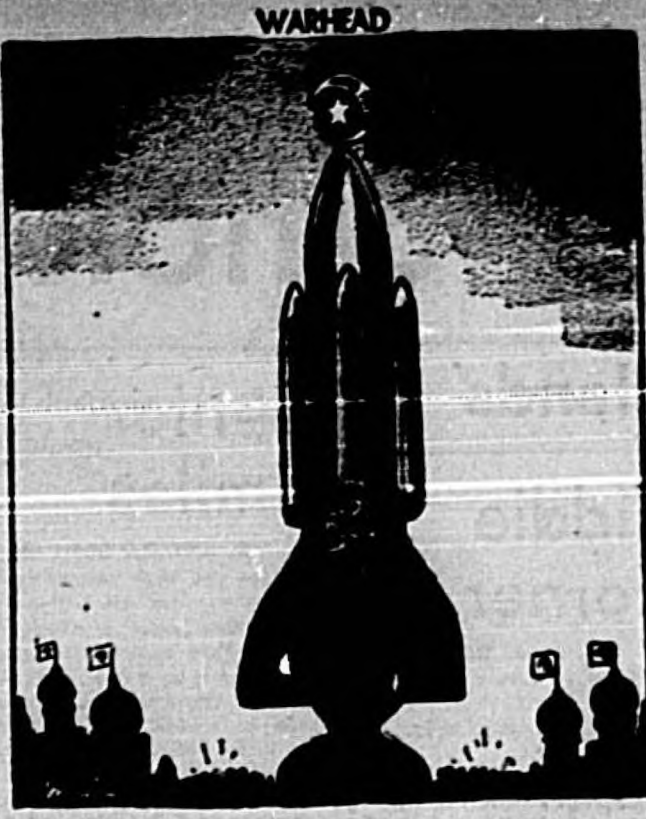

Foreign News Commentary

The Turkish-Syrian tension has strengthened King Saud's position as the chief moderating influence in the Arab world.
From the beginning of the dangerous situation which developed when Syria charged Turkey with plotting aggression, the Saudi Arabian monarch has worked untiringly to prevent an explosion. Saud has conferred with the leaders of Turkey and of Arab countries.
Finally, he offered personally to act as mediator between Turkey and Syria.
The big contribution of Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser, who likes to fancy himself as the No. 1 Arab leader, was to send Egyptian troops and warships to Syria at the most serious stage of the dispute.
Offered To Fight All
Syria's pro-Russian leaders have breathed fire and offered to take on all comers—presumably including the United States, which was supposed to be in the alleged plot—in event of war.
The pitiful record of both the Syrian and the Egyptian armies in the Arab-Israeli war, and in last year's Israeli invasion of Egypt, did not seem to make a fight to the death likely against Turkey's powerful, tough army of 500,000 men.
Soviet Russia, of course, was a prime contributor to the tension and helped build it up stage by stage with threats against Turkey.
King Saud was not able to do anything as regards Russia. What he did do was to work with Middle Eastern countries themselves, as an Arab and as a fellow Mos-



Bob Sikes Again—Congressman Bob Sikes and Lenz were in town last week. While serious business called the Congressman back to town, he and Lenz did take the opportunity to attend the reception at the British Embassy for Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip.
The serious business had to do with Sikes' work on the Defense Subcommittee of the House Appropriations Committee. Among other things he was briefing and at Vice-President Nixon for his statement on the inadvisability of tax cuts in view of the lagging missile program.
Sikes said the two were not related. He said Nixon's state-

ment completely ignored the deep cuts in the current military budget that were made arbitrarily by Secretary Charles E. Wilson. Sikes said that Nixon "is just trying to divert attention from the real facts in the defense picture."
"In the field of guided missiles and the satellite program," Sikes said, "Congress has approved every dollar the Administration permitted the services to say they could properly use. It is common knowledge in Washington that a number of our leading experts in this field have been disturbed about Russia's rapid progress and our own failure to push ahead with our full capability."

He said that the Administration's present about-face attitude looks like panic. "Proposals by Vice-President Nixon for greater spending next year indicate a return to the costly and wasteful peak-and-valley system of defense spending."
"Cuts inflicted by the Administration have weakened Western defenses at a very critical time and the loss of the Middle East is a real possibility," he said. "With full knowledge of her advantage in the missile race, Russia is pushing ahead there despite Mr. Dulles' talk of war." Sikes said he thought that the Russians had gained an unexpected propaganda advantage and are using it where it will do the most good.

"I feel there is still official unawareness of our serious status in the field of missiles worldwide and I hope the Administration will listen to people who know the score and have the knowledge to do something to improve our position rapidly."
Sikes indicated that he was greatly alarmed over the Russian's successful launching of the satellite. He said it was only a hint of Russian technological and scientific ability.
He has urged that all of the defense committees of the Congress be convened at once in Washington to study first-hand the lagging American Satellite and missile programs. The Florida "he-coot" said he was sure that we can out-produce the Russians, but that we can't do it by following the "stupid" policy of sitting on our hands while the Russians are

Saunders said he thought each bar contained a hard steel core which was supposed to turn when pressure was exerted with a hacksaw or file. But the bars were cut, and the three prisoners got out. They escaped using strings from a mop in lieu of a hacksaw or file. They coated the strings with cleaning powder to act as an abrasive.

at work 24 hours a day. He said the Administration should take every step to find the men and means to recapture the initiative—and hold it—in all of these important scientific fields.

New Drugs Increase Average Span Of Life

THE head of a large pharmaceutical firm made a speech a-while back in which he started many in his audience by saying: "It would be interesting to note that if this meeting were being held in 1857 rather than 1957, over half of the audience would not be present."
Then he went on to explain why.
Common Diseases
"About one of every five of those missing would have died in early infancy from whooping cough, colic, typhoid fever, or any of the host of other diseases common to infants in those days."
"About one out of 10 would have died before adolescence as victims of diphtheria, scarlet fever, smallpox, nutritional deficiencies or a number of infections classified—for lack of a more specific identification—as blood poisoning."
No Effective Treatment
"If we managed to survive to manhood, about one of every 12 would have died before the age of 30 from tetanus, diabetes, appendicitis or some other disease for which there was no effective treatment at the time."
"Finally about one of every six would have died before the age of 50 from pneumonia, tuberculosis, 'blood poisoning,' typhoid fever or some other disease which today has been practically conquered."
These statistics, more graphically than anything else I can think of, show the advance medicine has made in the past 100 years.
Harry J. Loynd made the speech in Detroit some months ago. He is one man who knows what he is talking about, since he is president of Parke-Davis, when Parke-Davis began making medicines some 90 years ago, they were concerned primarily with only a few basic ailments. Today, they make more than 600 therapeutic agents—anticonvulsants for treating epilepsy; antibiotics, vaccines to combat polio, tetanus, whooping cough and other diseases; vitamins, hormones and many other health aids.
Similar Pace
Other drug manufacturers, of course, have advanced at a similar pace. In fact, Loynd's company is only one of some 1,300 pharmaceutical firms in the United States.
With vigorous, far-reaching companies like these, is it any wonder that in the last 18 years alone, the average life span has increased from 47.7 years to 70.1 years?

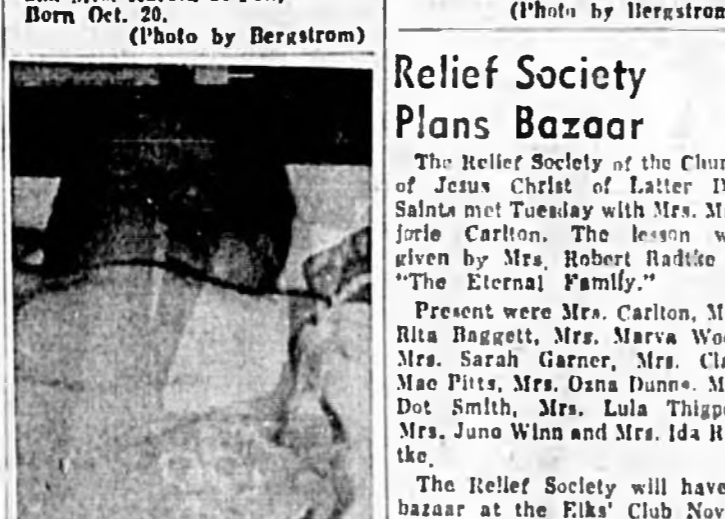

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Chin's Up Rally Looks Like GOP Congressional Election Opening

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Eisenhower's proposed "chins up" rally of public confidence looks from here very much like the opening of the 1952 Republican Congressional election campaign.

The President somewhat resists the notion of political matters being his activities as the elected chief of all the people. He is nevertheless, the leader and spokesman of the Republican Party to whom its candidates normally would look for a post talk ride to victory on election day.

The Republican Party, however, is not now noted for a state of normalcy. Abnormal is the word for the state of the Republican Party which in 1952 and 1953 elected a president by enormous margins but cannot wrest Congress from the Democrats.

Abnormal means markedly or strangely irregular, which makes it a good word for a little noted speech delivered last Saturday before a Republican audience in Alamogordo, N.M., by Rep. Richard M. Simpson (R-Pa.).

Key GOP Campaign Strategist Simpson is chairman of the Republican National Congressional Campaign Committee which will supervise next year's campaign to regain control of the House of Representatives. He is a big man in the House and in his party. If and when Rep. Joseph W. Martin Jr., (R-Mass.) decides to retire, Simpson is the man most likely to succeed him as Republican leader of the House and as speaker if the GOP ever again is able to win control.

In his capacity as GOP Congressional Campaign Committee chairman, Simpson told the New Mexico Republicans that there was no political future for their party's candidates in attempting to hitch a campaign ride on the Eisenhower coat tails. He suggested Republicans to endorse in their campaigns only those policies of the Eisenhower administration best suited to their localities.

"Not everything undertaken in Washington has met with general approval," Simpson said. "This is to be expected, and it is up to the candidates for Congress within the ranks of the Republican Party to make known their dissents and to work to change or to eliminate undesirable policies when elected."

Regular Republican Simpson is a regular Republican as distinguished from a modern Republican, and among administration policies to which he aggressively objects is big-time government spending. He helped kill the President's proposal for federal construction of public schools. Simpson has no use for "spenders in government" and evidently believes Republican congressional candidates should repudiate the Eisenhower spending program in next year's campaign.

Since the spending-tax budget is the foundation stone of all administration policy, Simpson would appear to be proposing a real bold. The congressman does not see it quite that way.

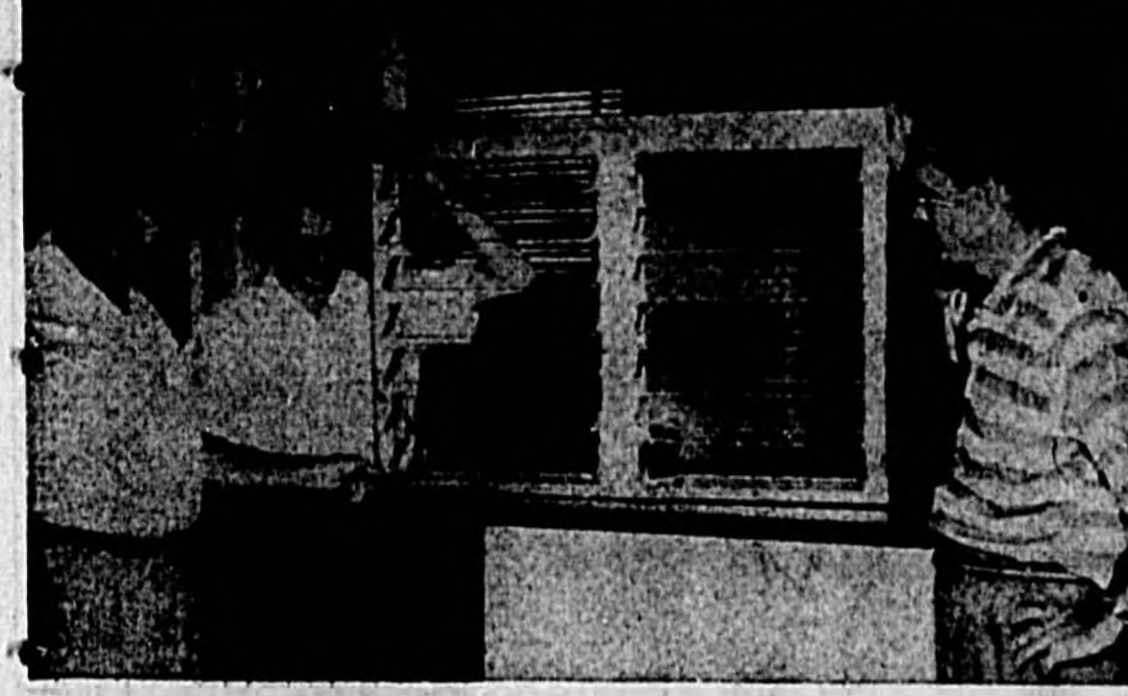

NEW YORK (UP)—Albert Anastasia, former hatchet man for Brooklyn's notorious Murder, Inc., was shot and killed today by two gunmen in the barbershop of a midtown hotel.

Anastasia was seated in a barber chair in the shop of the Park Sheraton Hotel. Two masked men walked in, drew their guns behind his chair and fired several shots into the back of his head, police said.

Anastasia pitched face forward to the floor.

The former mobster was pronounced dead at the scene by Dr. Robert Costello of St. Claire's Hospital. Police identified him from papers in his pocket.

Beat Murder Rape
Anastasia, known as the "lord high executioner" of Murder, Inc., beat four murder indictments in the late 1920s and early 1930s and one sentence to the electric chair. The federal government failed in an attempt to strip him of U. S. citizenship last year.
