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Southerners See Wallace Vote As Civil Rights Bill Protest

Won't Change *Summer Lineup, **Brewster Says**

Southern senators today hailed Alahama Gov. George C. Wallace's strong showing in the Maryland primary as a grass roots profest against the civil rights bill, but they were uncertain how it would affect Senate action on the measure.

Supporters of the bill brushed aside Wallace's feat. Senate Democratic Whip Hubert H. Humphrey, Minn., floor manager for the bill, said, "for a few days there will be a lot of talk about it, but senators are going to vote on the basis of their present judgments about the bill. Their minds are pretty well made

Before the Maryland ballotiffg Tuesday, Humphrey had predicted Wallace would get more than 35 per cent of the vote. Wallace got about 42 per cent of the vote in opposing President Johnson's stand-in. Sen. Daniel B. Brewster, D.

Brewster sald in Baltimore that Wallace's showing would have no effect on the Senate's civil rights battle. He predicted enactment of the bill by June 15.

Sen. Richard B. Russell, D-Ga., leader of the southern foes of the bill, said he hoped Wallace's showing would strengthen his hand, but he added: "The Senate is usual-If the last place in the government to get the drift of American public opinion."

Russell interpreted the primary results of evidence of Increasing popular sentiment against the bill, "It is finally seeping through to the people of this country just what the politicians are threatening to do to their form of government in their bid for minority-bloc votes," he said. Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr., D.

M. C., said he thought the Wallace showing would "have e tendency to prevent a stampede" for a Senate vote to halt the southern anti-civil rights talkathon "but to extent I don't know."

Ervin said Wallace's showing "clearly shows the tremendous opposition to the eivil rights bill in the country and to further centralization of government in Washing-

Sen. John J. Sparkman, D. Ala., also saw the Wallace Tote as a protest against the civil rights bill. He said the Alabama governor's showing "is bound to have some longgange effect."

The House-passed bill, now in its 59th day of debate in the Senate outlaws racial discrimination in voting, education, employment, public accommodations and in the use of federal funds.

### What Lies Ahead?

The recently announced cutback in nuclear production by both the U.S. and U.S.S.R. is not disarmament but, in the words of President Johnson, just "a step forward."

Limited as it is, it does raise anew the question of what will happen to the economy when full disarmament comes and defense spending can safely shrink to a minor item in the national budget.

Today, one out of 10 jobs is still connected with defense. Hundreds of small companies depend for their existence upon subcontracting for bits and pieces of multimillion-dollar defense contracts held by major

There will be no sudden drop in defense spending. World realities, if not ordinary economic prudence, prevent that. Farsighted business leaders, however, are planning for the day when the Pentagon dollar can no longer be counted on. Some manufacturers, and not just the little ones, are already being forced to hustle for new sources of income.

An obvious answer is to switch to civilian products. Instead of making hardware for missiles, make something for the shelf of the local hardware store.

Technically, this is not always as easy as it sounds. Another trouble is that there are already plenty of people making plowshares, and erstwhile swordmakers will find no vast.




