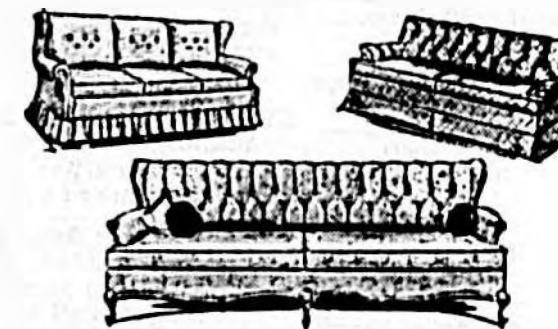

Further Area Flood Study Urged

Plan Aimed At Controlling Monroe Level

Expansion of Seminole County flood control study is being recommended by county, state and federal agencies, it was learned today.

As explained by County Engineer William Bush, prime purpose of any future action resulting from studies by the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers will be to eliminate any Lake Monroe flooding which may endanger Sanford.

The Central and Southern Florida Flood Control District (FCFD) reported today that the Army Corps of Engineers recommended a budget appropriation of \$28,000 for continuation and completion of a study of Econlockhatchee River (Econ) flood problems.

However, FCFD officials said, President Johnson has asked Congress for an appropriation of \$30,000 for the study during the fiscal year starting July 1.

Purpose of the larger request, it is said, is to permit the Army Engineers also to study flooding problems in the Little Econ and the possible use of Lake Jessup as a water storage area.

Thought is being given to the installation of a dam to hold excess water in Lake Jessup, for release at low water level. This would relieve a high water situation in Lake Monroe caused by the construction of outflow at the north end, brought on by highway and railway bridges.

James P. Avery Jr., chairman of the Seminole County Commission, said his group has conferred for a number of months with FCFD officials and Army Engineers officers relative to the flooding conditions in the Econ and Little Econ Rivers.

The governing board of FCFD, in a meeting last week at Fort Pierce, endorsed a resolution submitted by the Seminole County Commission asking for the enlargement of the current study program in the Econ River basin east and northeast of Orlando. Orange County also endorsed the expanded study.

The FCFD at this time does not extend its operation into this area but Executive Director Ed Dall commented "if the study program is enlarged and promises significant benefits for areas now outside the flood control district, I feel the governing board would probably not want to see the improvements made without enlarging the district's boundaries."

It has long been reported that the FCFD, following a study by the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council, concurs in improvement of the Upper St. Johns River as a recreational area, along with flood control.

Naples Arrests Two Burns Men

NAPLES (UPI) — Naples police arrested two Jacksonville city employees Tuesday—a detective and a building inspector—for operating a Hayden Burns campaign truck.

Fenway L. Cooney, a police detective, and William Fuller, the building inspector, were charged with operating the sound truck without a license. They were booked and released, but with summonses to return to face prosecution.

The men said they were on vacation from their Jacksonville jobs. Fuller had been charged earlier in the day by gubernatorial runoff opponent Robert King High of Miami with using policemen in his campaign, and the Jacksonville mayor issued a denial that any of the members of his entourage were city employees.

Jury Frees Man In Death Of Beaten Child

A six-man Circuit Court jury deliberated 70 minutes Tuesday night to reach an innocent verdict in a second degree murder case.

Freed of the charge was Alton Williams. He was arrested by sheriff's deputies on a charge of fatally beating a four-year-old boy at the Williams home last Nov. 5.

The child was pronounced dead at the Sanford Naval Air Station's dispensary where he was taken by Mr. and Mrs. Williams. Navy physicians attributed death to massive internal hemorrhages.

The jury was selected quickly Tuesday morning and heard testimony and summations and the judge's charge prior to receiving the case at 6:10 p.m.

The verdict was returned at 7:20 p.m. Serving on the jury were Homer G. Gleason, James E. Broadhead, William B. Shippy, Julian P. Wilson, Fred W. Pope and Jimmy L. Horton.

Williams had been tried last week on the same charge with that jury of six men reporting it was unable to agree. Circuit Court Judge Volie A. Williams declared that session a mistrial and rescheduled the second trial Tuesday.

The defendant was represented by Public Defender David Flaxer; the prosecution was conducted by assistant State Attorney A. J. Hoseman.

On Monday, another six-man jury freed a defendant of an armed robbery charge after deliberating 35 minutes. Released was Bernard Maxwell who was charged with taking \$286.34 from Charles Crispfield on Feb. 25.

Burns On Tour Of Panhandle

PANAMA CITY (UPI) — Hayden Burns took his campaign for governor to the Florida Panhandle today, blasting some newspapers along the way and defending limited use of Jacksonville city employees in the campaign.

Burns was met by a big mob of people when he landed in Panama City and was whisked immediately to a coffee meeting with supporters.

Meanwhile, peppy, red-haired Robert King High began a hectic four-city campaign tour by promising supporters he will seek legislation to control lobbyists if elected governor.

On the flight from Miami to Key West to Fort Myers to Orlando and Winter Park and Daytona Beach in the 1942 commissioned DC-3, High had campaign problems on his mind.

Admittedly running a "poor man's campaign," High said his workers will be scratching today for the very last nickel so he can pay the campaign expenses from now to the May 28 runoff.

Film Of Attack On Adlai Shown

DALLAS (UPI)—A film of a hostile crowd swarming around Ambassador Adlai Stevenson after a Dallas speech on the United Nations last Oct. 24 was shown in evidence Tuesday at the trial of a man accused of spitting at him.

Patrolman L. R. Larsen, 26, identified the defendant, Robert Edward Hatfield, 22, as the man who spat at him and Stevenson. Hatfield's trial on charges of aggravated assault on the attack on Larsen may go to a jury today.

U. S., Other Moscow Embassies 'Bugged'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Soviet listening devices have been discovered in other Allied embassies in Moscow in addition to the network of more than 40 microphones found in the U. S. Embassy recently, officials reported today.

They said the attempts to "bug" the other embassies had been made over the years but declined to identify the Allied countries, the types of devices or the dates of their discovery.

At the same time, the State Department sought to determine whether any sensitive or secret U. S. information had been significantly compromised by the carefully concealed Russian eavesdropping.

The 40 microphones were found buried deep in the U. S. Embassy, the department disclosed Tuesday.

Officials declined to clear up speculation whether a recent Soviet defector, Yuri I. Nosenko, provided information leading to the discovery of the 40 microphones.

Nosenko, identified as a Soviet secret police agent stationed in Geneva, defected Feb. 4 and was brought to Washington for questioning.

In February, the State Department recalled one of its security technicians from Moscow for conferences which led to a decision to completely demolish a room in the Moscow embassy in April. The microphones were found in the course of the demolition.

When asked about Nosenko, authorized U. S. officials would say only that it is routine practice to question defectors concerning possible attempts to penetrate U. S. security.

Bear Lake Road Near Completion

The controversial Bear Lake Road paving project is about 95 per cent completed and the finish is expected to be reached in about three weeks.

County Engineer William E. Bush Jr. said the road has been primed and an asphalt seal placed on it but the final black topping is yet to be placed.

Road crews are expected to be on the scene soon to complete the task, he added.

Residents along the roadway have been haying the county's handling of the project, claiming unnecessary delays, bad workmanship and voicing other similar complaints.

Adlai Called Home For Talks On Laos

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Thailand Ambassador Suleich Mimmahemhinda said today, after a talk with a state department official, the United States is considering sending troops to Thailand to help meet the threat of Pathet Lao Communists in neighboring Laos.

LONDON (UPI) — Adlai Stevenson, U. S. ambassador to the United Nations, cut short a visit to London today and flew back to New York for urgent talks on Southeast Asia.

He was recalled by Secretary of State Dean Rusk from a lecture tour.

U. S. APPLYING DIPLOMATIC PRESSURE
WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States today is clinging to hope that diplomatic pressure would halt the Communist offensive in Laos and remove any need for more drastic action by the Western powers.

American officials said, however, that Washington was prepared to take any measures necessary in the final analysis to preserve the independence and neutrality of the embattled kingdom if diplomatic efforts failed.

The United States was bringing increased pressure on Britain and Russia, co-chairmen of the Geneva conference which guarantees Laotian independence and neutrality, to issue a stiff declaration demanding an end to hostilities and East-West "consultation" to stabilize the situation.

NEUTRALIST FORCES IN LAST DITCH STAND
VIENTIANE, Laos (UPI) — Neutralist forces on the fringe of the Plain of Jars today were reported making a last-ditch stand against advancing Communist forces who blamed the United States for the new fighting in Laos.

Neutralist Gen. Keng Leu, who was forced to flee his headquarters at Muang Phanh to escape the Pathet Lao offensive, was reported rallying his troops six miles to the southwest at Ban Khong, on the edge of the strategic plain. The plain is the gateway to all of Laos.

The Pathet Lao offensive which gained control of the Plain of Jars since Saturday was reported to have left Muong Phanh surrounded by Communists, its supply lines cut and under steady artillery bombardment.

Three Sanford residents, active in the Seminole County school system, will be guest artists at the Seminole High School Band Concert this Friday at the school amphitheater. The concert begins at 8 p.m.

Mrs. Lucille Feater, school dietitian, will offer a solo with the band accompaniment. Also featured will be a vibraphone played by John Shirard. This will be the first use of a vibraphone at a local school band concert.

Peter Bakur, associate director of the Seminole High School band and director of the Sanford Junior High School band, will conduct "A Tribute to Glenn Miller."

The concert is free.

Broadcaster Reports Sabotage In Cuba

HAVANA (UPI) — The Cuban labor movement in eastern Oriente Province decried "total mobilization for defense and production" today in the wake of increasing tension over exile subversion threats.

Unconfirmed reports in Miami have hinted in recent days at exile guerrilla landings in both eastern and western Cuba for harassment purposes.

Although the 29-year-old Ray had to run a gamut of what may be the biggest muster of Castro's Soviet-controlled and equipped troops since the 1961 Bay of Pigs invasion, refugees "felt sure he has made it."

Clandestine anti-Castro radio broadcasts which apparently came from outside Cuba filled the airways during the night. They did not identify themselves with Ray or any group.

A short-wave broadcast about 9 a. m. (EIT) monitored in Miami reported sabotage in Havana and the sugar fields of Camaguey and called on the students of Cuba to rebel.

The five-minute broadcast was attributed to the Student Revolutionary Directorate (DRE). The broadcast was directed to the same frequency as Havana's television Channel 2.

The emotional broadcaster shouted that three taxis were burned at Havana, anti-Castro slogans were painted on walls, and hundreds of acres of sugar cane were burned at Camaguey.

The broadcaster urged the people to sabotage Cuba's shaky electrical power system by keeping the lights on as much as possible.

During the night, a woman did most of the broadcasting. The calls to arms were interspersed with the playing of Cuba's patriotic "invasion hymn" which dates back 70 years to the war of independence with Spain.

Suspect Treated
HONOLULU (UPI) — A prime suspect in the ax-slaying of Norwegian freighter captain Jacob Natvig was hospitalized today following a suicide attempt. He is chief steward Anker Baardsen, 42, also a Norwegian.

Southerners See Wallace Vote As Civil Rights Bill Protest

Won't Change Summer Lineup, Brewster Says

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Southern senators today hailed Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace's strong showing in the Maryland primary as a grass roots protest against the civil rights bill, but they were uncertain how it would affect Senate action on the measure.

Supporters of the bill brushed aside Wallace's feat. Senate Democratic Whip Hubert H. Humphrey, Minn., floor manager for the bill, said, "for a few days there will be a lot of talk about it, but senators are going to vote on the basis of their present judgments about the bill. Their minds are pretty well made up."

—Before the Maryland ballot Tuesday, Humphrey had predicted Wallace would get more than 35 per cent of the vote. Wallace got about 42 per cent of the vote in opposing President Johnson's stand-in, Sen. Daniel B. Brewster, D-Md.

Brewster said in Baltimore that Wallace's showing would have no effect on the Senate's civil rights battle. He predicted enactment of the bill by June 15.

Sen. Richard B. Russell, D-Ga., leader of the southern bloc of the bill, said he hoped Wallace's showing would strengthen his hand, but he added: "The Senate is usually the last place in the government to get the drift of American public opinion."

Russell interpreted the primary results as evidence of increasing popular sentiment against the bill. "It is finally seeping through to the people of this country just what the politicians are threatening to do to their form of government in their bid for minority-bloc votes," he said.

—Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr., D-N.C., said he thought the Wallace showing would "have a tendency to prevent a stampede" for a Senate vote to halt the southern anti-civil rights talkback "but to what extent I don't know."

Ervin said Wallace's showing "clearly shows the tremendous opposition to the civil rights bill in the country and to further centralization of government in Washington."

Sen. John J. Sparkman, D-Ala., also saw the Wallace vote as a protest against the civil rights bill. He said the Alabama governor's showing "is bound to have some long-range effect."

The House-passed bill, now in its 59th day of debate in the Senate outlaws racial discrimination in voting, education, employment, public accommodations and in the use of federal funds.

Castro Alert For Any Air, Sea Attacks

MIAMI (UPI)—Cuban Premier Fidel Castro, confronted with "war declarations" by two refugee groups, prepared today for possible air and sea attacks against his island stronghold.

Refugee sources interpreted Wednesday night's flight over Oriente Province by a mysterious B26—apparently refugee reconnaissance plane—as a "hint of things to come."

Castro's military radio network reported the presence of the twin-engine plane—a U. S.-made bomber of the type used in the 1961 Bay of Pigs invasion—near Ensenada de Mora, target of last week's exile sea raid by Manuel Artime's Revolutionary Recovery Movement (MRR).

Cuban broadcasts monitored here indicated that two Russian-made MIG jet fighters were dispatched to intercept the plane, but apparently too late.

The B26, gray with a red stripe on its fuselage and a Cuban flag painted on the tail, "buzzed" Cuban fishing boats twice and headed inland before the alarm was given.

Subsequently the Cuban marine radio network warned fishing boats to keep their running lights on because "we don't want to make any mistakes."

RVAH-5 To Go West For Duty In Pacific

The Navy's Heavy Attack Squadron Six, based on the Pacific Coast at Whittier Island, Wash., will move aboard the Atlantic Fleet Carrier USS Forrestal next week, executing inter-fleet deployment plans which include RVAH-5, of Sanford Naval Air Station.

RVAH-5 will fly its new RA-6C Vigilante reconnaissance bombers to Alameda, Calif., next month to board the carrier USS Ranger for sea operations preparatory to deploying to the Far East in August.

Heavy Attack Squadron Six (VAH-6) is slated for deployment to the Mediterranean aboard the Forrestal with its twin-jet A-3J Skywarrior attack bombers.

Thus the two squadrons will exchange places in their respective fleets while their home bases remain unchanged, emphasizing the growing mobility of U. S. carrier striking forces.

RVAH-5 (then VAH-5) ended five years of service with the Forrestal air group in mid-1963. Since that time the squadron has been transitioning to the RA-6C, with Sanford's VAH-11, Detachment 8, performing heavy attack duties on the Forrestal.

VAH-6 has been assigned to the Ranger air group since 1960. It has been home-ported on the West Coast since 1962, when it left Norfolk, Va., to become the first Pacific Fleet heavy attack unit.

The deployment of RVAH-5 westward next month means that NAS Sanford has become staging base for global operations. While RVAH-5 is operating in the Western Pacific, VAH-7 and VAH-11, also based locally, will be flying with the Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean on the carriers Enterprise and Roosevelt.

At the heart of this worldwide concept is the RA-6C, which incorporates within a single air frame the world's most advanced tactical reconnaissance and bombing systems.

The Vigilante's two 17,000-pound thrust engines drive the aircraft to velocities approaching twice the speed of sound.

RVAH-5 is the first squadron to operate at sea with the RA-6C.

He again stressed the urgency of action on the charter revisions "for we'll have to wait two more years" until the Legislature reconvenes.

Agent Charges He Was Framed

CHICAGO (UPI)—A U. S. Secret Service agent charged with trying to sell a government report said Wednesday he is being framed because he intended to reveal details of heavy drinking and "general laxity" among agents assigned to the late President Kennedy.

Abraham Bolden, 29, who in 1961 became the first Negro ever assigned to the Secret Service detail guarding the President's life, outlined his charges in a new conference at his South Side home.

He is charged with trying to sell a confidential government file to a man indicted for the alleged counterfeiting of a half-million dollars in bonds and checks.

Bolden said two weeks ago he told another agent, "I'm going before the Warren Commission and tell about the drinking and disappearance of the Secret Service agents from their posts while they were guarding President Kennedy in Hyannis Port."
