Two DeLand men indicted for Sanford murder

A Seminole County Grand Jury returned first-degree felony murder indictments Tuesday against two men in connection with the death of Patricia Contreras, of Wax Myrtle Drive, in Sanford.

The two men, James Pacheco, 31, and Luis Martinez, 19, both of DeLand, were also charged with armed burglary and robbery with a firearm.

The men, along with 28-year-old Daniel Maldonado, broke into Contreras' home and beat him in the head with a handgun in late July. Contreras later died as a result of his injuries.

Authorities arrested the three suspects in DeLand and held them at the Volusia County Jail. However, Maldonado was able to post bail of \$10,000 before the charges against him were upgraded from armed home invasion and aggravated battery to murder. He walked out of the Volusia County Jail on July 29 and is still missing. An investigation into the delay in upgrading the charges is ongoing.

Pacheco and Martinez are being held without bond in the Seminole County Jail. The jury heard from five witnesses including a medical examiner, a Sanford police officer and three lay witnesses.

Lessard: Put conference center on hold

SANFORD — Mayor Brady Lessard will ask city commissioners Monday to delay, possible for a year or more, plans to build a downtown conference center.

The move by Lessard comes as city officials search for revenue sources to fund the project after Seminole County Commissioners pulled their support for the project last month.

Sanford mayor says time is not right to move forward with downtown project

"I want to make sure that whatever product the city ends up with — and it will end up with a conference center eventually — is the best product it can be," he said. "By waiting, this will allow for the product to develop better."

The proposed project, which has been in the works for several

months, is a collaboration between the city of Sanford and the private developer, Suncor Properties Inc. It would include a multi-level, off-site hotel; renovations and additions to the existing Sanford Civic Center; retail space; an outdoor amphitheater; and a surface parking area.

"If putting it [conference center] on hold wasn't the best thing for the city we wouldn't be putting it on hold," said Lessard. "The citizens of Sanford, in a referendum several years ago and all the way to this point, have trusted the city commission and myself to do what is right. I think city commission will agree with me on Monday night to step back and take a breath."

According to Lessard, if the

Fighting more than just fires

Fire fighters across Florida campaign for Muscular Dystrophy

Pay attention driving through busy intersections during the week leading to Labor Day as there's a good chance a fire fighter will be waiting there for you.

Florida fire fighters collected more than \$1.3 million last year during an annual "Fill the Boot" drive benefiting the Muscular Dystrophy Association (MDA), and departments within Seminole County are gearing up once again for the campaign.

Started 49 years ago in South Boston, the fire fighter drive is one of the largest benefactors to MDA. In fact, the state's fire fighters drive last year — with more than 300 communities participating — was the largest source of funding to the association.

Each firefighter local union competes against each other they, but in the end, it's the cause that counts most, said Cindy Balton, a Seminole

Iraqi Diary: UN compound blasted

Editor's note: Staff Sergeant Charlie C. Carlson III has provided the Seminole Herald a daily journal of his experiences in Baghdad, Iraq as part of the 549th Military Police company attached to the 2nd Cavalry Regiment. Today's journal entry is from earlier this week just after the United Nations headquarters bombing. Because of the significance of this incident, the Herald is publishing this entry today. The newspaper will revert back to chronological order in Wednesday's issue.

20 AUG 2003 I guess you heard about the UN headquarters blowing up. I was laying on my cot in the machine shop of the cigarette factory where we live and all of the sudden it sounded like the whole world exploded. The whole place shook and there was a loud "BOOOM." It was about 1530 in the afternoon.

One of our day shift patrols was already out there, and we were notified by Enforcer-6 [the company commander] to immediately respond. I wasn't sure about what was going on, but was told to meet him over at the UN building

about five miles away. On the way we passed several M-1 Abrams tanks blocking off the highway.

Upon arriving I could see that the whole left side of the UN building was blown away. I had my trucks move on past to where Enforcer-6 was at. We immediately started moving people back. I was right next to the UN building, there was debris all over the place, people with blood all over them, some walking and some obviously dead or injured so bad they couldn't move. Rescue workers were talking to people still trapped inside.

I was busy keeping people back and one of them was Mr. Paul Bremer (U.S. civilian administrator of Iraq). I said "Sorry sir, let me get these people behind you out of here." He looked kinda stunned, but said "No, it's okay, let me get out of your way." I saw one of Bremer's security guys that was a friend of mine, we had gone to CID agents

school together. I got some photos of the scene.

The highway was blocked off in all directions. CNN and BBC were there filming footage. I was told to divert traffic off the highway about 200 yards from the scene. We set up our trucks [Armored Humvees] with two at one end and one at the other. We were there with the psychs [psychological operations] truck in case we needed to broadcast to the public that the area was closed.

Dust still filled the air, it was a mess, victims being hauled out on litters, some dead, body parts mixed with chunks of concrete tangled with wires and pipes. I heard a rumor that the Assistant Secretary General of the UN was killed. They were talking to him through the rubble, but they didn't hear anything further. It was a noisy, nasty sight that I do not wish

Economic impact felt from I-4 closures

Managers of tourism-based businesses along State Road 46 in Sanford say nightly lane closures on Interstate 4 are affecting their profits.

The lane closures, which took place from 10 p.m. until 6 a.m. Aug. 14 and 15 on the I-4 westbound exit ramp at State Road 46, were needed to relocate the exit's barrier walls and re-stripe the lanes. The upgrades are an effort to make

the exit safer for drivers. "It's two nights and I realize they have to do this," said Paul Temple, general manager of Comfort Inn & Suites, located on State Road 46 in Sanford. "We certainly

want the exit to be a better and more accessible one for our patrons and these improvements are needed to help make it safer. However, this makes it impossible for us to have walk-in traffic during those hours.

"This drastically affects how well we do financially," he added.

According to Temple, the hotel averages 15 walk-in guests per night. On Aug. 14 and 15, the franchise received only four and six walk-ins, respectively.

"We dropped way off and I thought it was strange and then I found out about the lane closures," Temple said. "We're being put at a competitive disadvantage. It's

In the past nine years, Calvin Hill has attended just one Christmas with his family in Sanford.

With last year's gifts awaiting him, the U.S. Army veteran returned to his parents' Goldsboro home last week after a six-month deployment in Operation Iraqi Freedom. With a little luck, Hill will be home for the upcoming holidays.

His mother, Emma Encarnacion, says it's good to finally see her son.

"He was supposed to get out in March and they sent him over there in February," she said.

Hill could be nearing the end of his nine-year military

career and that's just fine with him. He missed last year's Christmas as he was preparing for the war in Iraq and missed past holidays because of other tours in Bosnia, Germany, Egypt and California.

The latest assignment may have been the worst, he said, for two reasons: the heat and water. It helped that air conditioning was installed in the tents before his departure, but finding good drinking water was a problem. The water at the port town and basically everywhere was undrinkable and the bottled water provided tasted bad as they sat too long in the desert sun.

An E4 specialist stationed

Underwater band shell: Old time Sanford folks fondly recall the lakefront band shell that was situated on the small, man-made peninsula at the northern most end of Park Avenue. It was torn down in the 1960s.

Occasionally a citizen will suggest that city leaders rebuild a band shell on the same location. If the city does undertake such a project, maybe they could piece together the old band shell. They certainly would not have to go far to get it.

In replacing the seawall around the peninsula, city crews recently found large portions of the old band shell. Crews are fishing out some of the bigger pieces so the seawall work can be completed. Chris Smith, the city's project manager, said it appears that when the city fathers tore down the band shell, they did so by pushing it into Lake Monroe.

Maybe it's just me, but I find the whole thing peculiar. After all these years, the band shell that so many wistfully remember now sits just a few yards from its original site, albeit under water where only the mullet and the catfish can enjoy it.

Riverwalk update: Speaking of the seawall, most of it has been replaced. Smith said Friday crews have about 600 more feet of seawall to install around the Memorial Park peninsula. The project now moves into the above-ground improvements, better known as the Riverwalk.

Smith said the project is on schedule to finish in February 2004. Crews have already begun rebuilding Seminole Boulevard near Mellonville Avenue, and Smith said the improvements will become much more visible in the coming months.

Coffee buzz: Rumors have been circulating for a couple of weeks that the java giant Starbucks Coffee was eyeing downtown Sanford as its next spot for expansion. That's true, sort of.

The Sanford Planning and Zoning Commission approved a plan Thursday night for Suncor Properties Inc. to build a trailhead building on Seminole Boulevard at Palmetto Avenue. The facility would provide restrooms and shelter from the weather for those using the Riverwalk and was originally going to be built by the city. The cost of the overall Riverwalk project was more expensive than the city's budget and the trailhead building got the ax.

Suncor officials approached the city about building the trailhead facility at no cost to the taxpayers. In return the Suncor wants to lease space to two national tenants, one a coffee shop, the other an ice cream shop. Suncor's president, Bob Horian, said he's trying to secure either Starbucks, Barnie's Coffee & Tea Company or Seattle Coffee Co. for the 1,550-square-foot portion of the facility, and either Dairy Queen or a Nestle soft-serve ice cream shop for remaining 990-square-foot retail space.

Of course, there is already a coffee shop downtown, two actually. Our House Books and Coffee on Commercial Street, and Cool Beans at Magnolia Square. I've drank gallons of Starbucks coffee, but both of these local shops have two advantages. First, both are locally owned and as an employee of a community newspaper, I try to shop local first. Second, both Our House and Cool Beans sell coffee in small, medium and large cup sizes. At Starbucks it's tall, grande and venti. I'm not hip enough to determine which size is which and usually just point to the cup size I want.

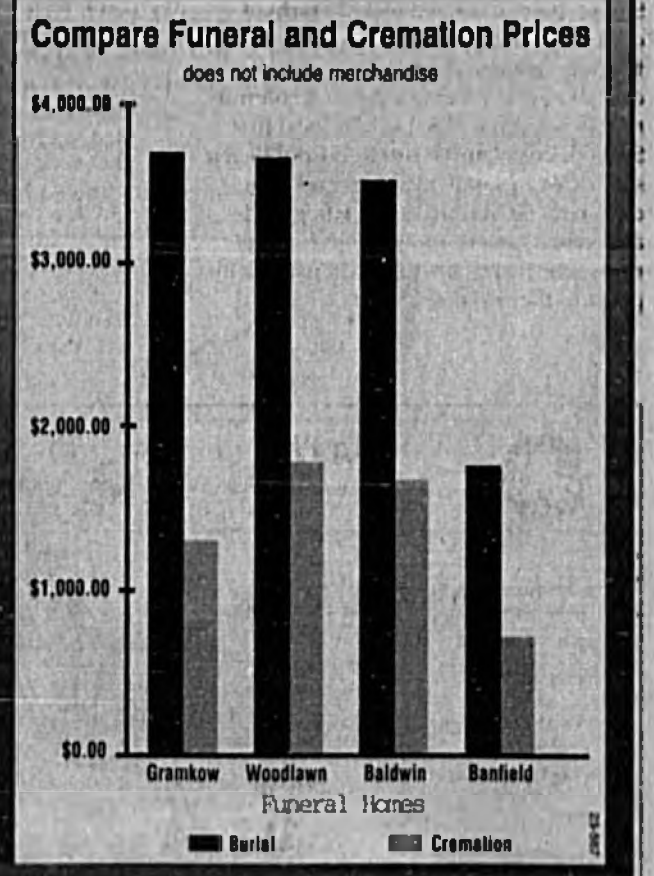

Visitors aren't always snowbirds Rainy season brings reptiles slithering into backyards

Depending on where you live, you may have some unwanted visitors these days. With the unusually heavy rain and flooding, you may find yourself in the same neighborhood as alligators and snakes.

There are two old-wives tales that go along with this concept. First of all, in high water periods (such as what we have now), they say the alligators and snakes will find more wetlands in which to exist and hunt for food. If a pond springs up in your back yard because of heavy rains, alligators may visit you, and perhaps make a meal out of your dog — something they would find difficult to do in normal habitats. Snakes, which like wetter territory, will have a bigger area in which to slither and may also find their way into your yard.

Then, there's the other side. Those who say alligators and snakes are more apt to come out into residential areas during times of unusually light rainfall or droughts. They are traveling the area looking for water, which is becoming difficult to find because of the drought.

So, no matter which way we look at it, you should tell yourself that you are possibly in danger. Alligators have been known to travel in drainage ditches, a wet alley behind houses, and at times, even down the middle of a street. Small dogs are one of their choice entrees, as are small children.

So, keep your children away from wet land on your property, keep your dog on a leash, and keep your eyes on both — ALL the time.

Day after day we hear about some area where a small child was attacked by an alligator. In most cases, we hear that no one thought there was a gator nearby or none was seen prior to the attack.

Standing down on the shore of Lake Monroe, (if it's possible these days with the construction underway), or any other lake in the area, you can easily see the gators swimming around, just skinning the surface. Tourists find them interesting and in order to bring the gators closer to shore for a better look, they'll toss out some food — a piece of bread or maybe leftover French fries or a burger.

Yes, that will generally bring the gator closer — but it will also tell the gator that man is a great food source, and whenever you see one, come running. That's why we have so many gator attacks along lakeshores.

Anyway — feeding a gator is illegal. If you see someone doing it — either warn them to stop immediately, or call the authorities.

Getting back to the main point, however, in this period of high water and water that may be standing where it normally is dry, be careful. There could be a gator or a snake nearby — and I don't know about you, but as for me — I don't want to get near either of them. I hope you feel the same.



Iraq war: A bait-and-switch con job

We were in North Carolina on Tuesday, delivering the last of our children to college. I left my wife at a Borders bookstore along the way to meet a friend for tea, then headed for Durham. I turned on the radio and heard that the United Nations' headquarters in Baghdad had been bombed and that Sergio Vieira de Mello, the U.N.'s special representative in Iraq, was dead along with at least a dozen more U.N. employees.

My wife's colleagues and friends. She works for the United Nations, is director of one of their principal offices. I returned around, went back to the bookstore and told her what had happened. "The U.N. will stay in Iraq," she said. "So will we," I thought, meaning the Americans.

"We," Americans, are victims of one of the great "bait-and-switch" con jobs in recent history, taken into harm's way by history-ignorant ideologues. We were told we were in imminent danger, that a truly evil regime in Baghdad had the means and will to do us immediate and mortal harm, that the fools in "Old Europe" and the rest of the world were just cowards when they disagreed with us or tried to warn us it would not be that simple.

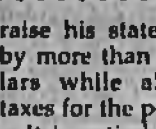
Vice President Richard Cheney and Deputy Defense Secretary Paul Wolfowitz, leaders of the zealots, told us how easy it would be, particularly after the initial fighting ended. War on the cheap (they refused to talk about costs) and then Iraqis would greet us with flowers. "Many other countries will want to be with us when that evil regime is removed from power," Wolfowitz said last October. "Some who now criticize us will want to be part of that very positive opportunity to build a more peaceful and just and representative nation in this critically important Arab and Muslim country. ... Unlike the Balkans, Iraq's recent history is not one of bloody ethnic conflict but rather one of bloody repression by the regime of all ethnic groups."

On the day after the U.N. bombing, The Financial Times quoted Wolfowitz saying it was a mistake for Defense Department to assume Iraqi troops and police would be in place to maintain law and order as crowds cheered American leaders. The paper introduced his quote by saying, "Wolfowitz, in an unusual moment of candor..." The zealots seemed capable of saying anything to "bait" us into war — and they have prevailed. Their dream, essentially a unilateralist, single-superpower dream, was of a Middle East controlled by the United States, with the rest of the world, led by the United Nations, cleaning up the mess and the details. Americans, deceived and conned, have woken up to find their magnificently trained, equipped and motivated young soldiers pinned down in a hostile environment, stalked by mujhadeen from other Islamic countries sneaking into the chaos of Iraq. It was not bad enough that terrorists were able to find ways to get into the United States and harm us greatly; we have now set ourselves up on their territory — as targets.

So what? The odds are that President Bush and his men will tough this out, at least politically. The irony of the moment is that the worse they do, the better off they are. On a strategic level, they will argue that any withdrawal now will only embolden terrorists and governments that secretly support them. That is almost certainly true, as argued in an editorial in Newsday, the Long Island newspaper, on Thursday. "In the past, Washington has set bad examples of its fortitude by pulling out from Beirut after the bombing of the Marine barracks and from Somalia after the Special Forces casualties in Mogadishu. The world must know this won't happen in Iraq, whatever it takes." Bush can get away with this because — like his coalition junior partner, Tony Blair in England — his opposition is too intimidated by patriotism to argue with him. Most of the Democrats chasing the chance to run against him next year are now criticizing the war, willing to be sure, but they voted for it when they had a chance to slow him down and ask what exactly he had in mind. They know, as the president knows, that now that our troops are in harm's way, most politicians must "support" them, whatever that means. That's the "switch."

Tax referendum gives Alabama a chance to change

If Arnold Schwarzenegger's moderate views are giving Republicans heartburn, the tax increase pushed by Alabama Gov. Bob Riley may cause a r d i s c a r r e s t. Riley, a conservative Republican who has long opposed tax hikes, is leading a revolutionary campaign to raise his state's total taxes by more than a billion dollars while also lowering taxes for the poor.

It is entirely unexpected, but it is also unequivocally good news. Perhaps Alabama could join the 21st century — or at least ease into the 20th — with money for good schools, prison reform and decent health care. The state's tax code is firmly rooted in the 19th century, when the canon of white supremacy governed politics and agrarian interests controlled the economy. Determined to protect the interests of wealthy property owners, Alabama lawmakers — many of whom were wealthy property owners — enshrined much of the tax code in the state constitution, written in 1901. As a result, taxes are not only among the lowest in

the nation, but the tax code is also among the least progressive, hoisting a staggering load onto the backs of the poor while sparing the wealthy much of a burden. A family of four earning as little as \$4,600 pays income tax, the lowest threshold among the 42 states that levy income taxes. But timber owners, who control much of the land, pay an average in property taxes of 95 cents per acre. By comparison, the average in Georgia is around \$5 an acre. With such a narrow tax base, critical services in Alabama remain chronically underfunded. Public schools are a wasteland. The only good news from national surveys of academic achievement is that Alabamians must learn how to count to 50 to find their state in the rankings. (As an Alabama native, I know something about its public schools.) Even the state's universities have begun to suffer. Crown jewels, such as the medical school at the University of Alabama at Birmingham, are losing their luster. The tax increase would plug the state's budget deficit while leaving \$600 million for math, science and reading initiatives and college scholarships, Riley says. For generations, progressive leaders have tried to reform the tax code, but they have met stiff resistance from major landown-

ers, including such influential groups as Alfa, the Alabama Farmers Federation (which includes timber owners). In 1990, The Birmingham News, the state's largest newspaper, wrote an excellent series of editorials advocating tax reform. The series won the Pulitzer Prize but failed to sway the Legislature. Tax reform may have remained a quixotic crusade of editorial writers but for the visionary strategy of Susan Pace Hamill, a University of Alabama tax law professor. Studying theology during a sabbatical, she wrote an essay criticizing the tax code — which imposes an effective tax rate of 12 percent on the poorest and 3 percent on the wealthiest taxpayers — as lacking Christian charity. In the buckle of the Bible Belt, her analysis received widespread attention. Riley, an evangelical Christian, endorsed it. The United Methodist Church, the Presbyterian Church (USA) and the Alabama Southern Baptist Convention, among others, joined with him. Even with that kind of support, passage of the Sept. 9 referendum to amend the constitution is not assured. For one thing, many Christian conservatives still take it as an article of faith that tax increases are unseemly, if not outright sinful. While national Christian Coalition president Roberta Combs has

praised Riley's tax reform plan, the Christian Coalition of Alabama opposes it. And several national conservative groups, including Grover Norquist's Americans for Tax Reform, have pledged to work against the proposal. Oddly, the proposal is also unpopular among blacks and Alabamians making less than \$30,000 a year, segments who would benefit. (While blacks account for only one-fourth of the state's population, they comprise half its poor.) Some influential blacks are fighting it because they resent Riley's stances on unrelated issues, according to state Rep. John Knight, a black Democrat who supports the proposal. "But this is not the issue to use to get back at him," Knight said. As its Southern neighbors have grown and prospered, Alabama has lagged behind, especially in educational achievement. Even now, this is a state whose bootstraps are almost out of reach. If Alabama blows this chance, another generation of its poor will pay hefty taxes to send their children to inferior schools.

New school will officially be named next

The school will accommodate a student population of 800, which will significantly cut down on the overpopulation problem at local schools in the surrounding areas.

"Subdivisions are going up all around that area," said Richard Wells, director of community involvement and public information and interim transportation director of Seminole County Public Schools. "We needed a new school to handle the number of students."

According to Wells, schools such as Stenstrom Elementary are currently serving 30 more students than it was built for. Other facilities such as Partin, Carillon and Evans elementary schools have 136, 188 and 200 more students, respectively, than intended.

The public is asked to submit, in writing, their suggestions for the school's official name to Seminole County Public Schools. According to a representative of Deputy Superintendent Dianne Kramer's office, the school board members will vote on the name during their September board meeting.

A groundbreaking ceremony for Elementary "J" School, which will receive its official name in September, was held Tuesday in Chuluota.

Construction on the facility, located at 3101 Snow Hill Road in Chuluota, began immediately following the ceremony. The \$8.4 million project is scheduled for completion in July 2004, just in time for the first day of school on Aug. 2.

The 114,000 square foot educational center will be identical to Highlands and Bentley elementary schools.

The two-story, brick building will feature 38 classrooms, several resource rooms, a computer lab, art and music suites, a media center with a television studio and a multipurpose cafeteria with a stage. The building, being constructed by Clancy and Theys Construction Company with architecture by SchenkelShultz Architecture, will also feature a covered, outdoor physical education pavilion.

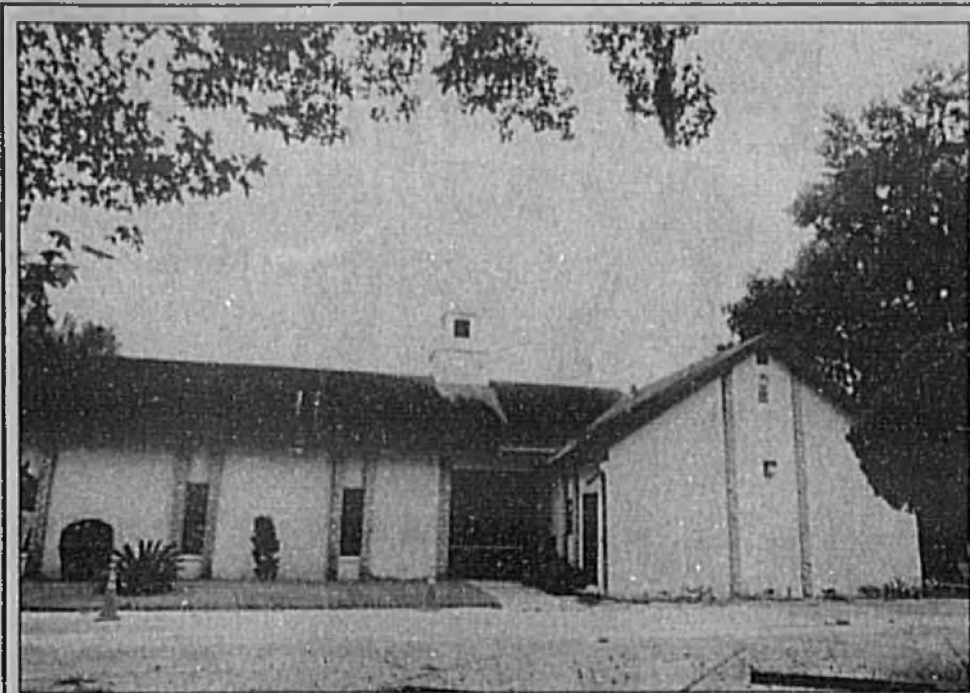

Nandina: The heavenly and sacred bamboo

Nandina, known as the Heavenly Bamboo or Sacred Bamboo, is an evergreen shrub from the Barberry plant family introduced to the United States as an ornamental plant in 1804.

Native to central China and Japan and west to India, it produces a bluish-green foliage which often turns red to reddish purple in fall and winter. In late spring or early summer, panicles of creamy flowers appear, followed by spectacular clusters of red berries that persist through the winter. It has become naturalized in some wooded areas in north Florida and is considered to be invasive.

The plant: Nandina is a multi-stemmed plant, with bamboo-like canes, growing about 2 to 8 feet tall. The evergreen, fernlike, horizontal, compound leaves, measure 12 to 20 inches long and have elliptic, leathery leaflets to 2 inches in length, reddish when young and turning red or purple in autumn.

Leaves have bulbous swellings present along rachis. In the spring, it produces small white flowers that are borne in upright, terminal panicles up to one foot long. Individual flowers are bisexual, petals pinkish white and with prominent yellow anthers. The fruits are round, bright red berries, contain two seeds per fruit and measure about quarter of an inch wide. Fruits are poisonous.

Culture: This plant grows best in the northerly part of the state on hardiness zones six-nine. This shrub has been grown in southern Florida but is short-lived there. It is not heat tolerant. Nandina grows best in moist acid loam soils, but it tolerates a wide range of other soil types and withstands drought.

Grows best in full sun but tolerates partial shade. Winter sun helps redden foliage. Nandina should be planted in groups to improve the formation of berries. If left unpruned, it becomes leggy. Remove old canes or cut canes to various lengths to create a dense plant.

To reduce height on a large plant, prune tallest one-third of stems back to 6 inches long each year. Canes cannot be forced to branch. Nandina is considered a plant with little or no pest problems. Scale insects may affect this plant occasionally and root rot induced by soil-inhabiting fungi can cause some damage in wet soils.

Propagation: Bird such as mockingbirds, cedar waxwings, cardinals and robins are attracted to the red fruits and help disperse the seeds.

Squirrels and opossums and raccoons also contribute to the dispersal of the seeds. Seeds may take many months or two seasons to germinate and are difficult to germinate under artificial conditions. The plant produces rhizomes that can be used to propagate this plant by division. Valuable specimens have been propagated using tissue-culture techniques.

Landscape uses: This plant with such beautiful colors and low maintenance requirements certainly has a place in any landscape. It can be used as a groundcover, shrub, hedge, screen, border, specimen, container or planter, for mass planting or accent. It is splendid as a foundation plant if kept below 5 feet.

Varieties: Alba has dull white berries; Compacta is a dwarf form growing about three feet high and producing little quantities of berries; Harbor Dwarf, another dwarf form under 2 feet, with a pinkish-bronze spring color and red-bronze fall color; Atropurpurea Nana, a dwarf form growing under 2 feet tall, with foliage tinged reddish purple year round and leaves somewhat cupped. Dwarf cultivars with some red fall color and little amounts of fruits are becoming popular. The varieties Harbor Dwarf and Firepower do not produce seeds in nursery environments.

Ecological problems: Nandina has invaded and become naturalized in woodlands of three counties in North Carolina. It has also invaded woodlands in northern Florida, Georgia and Alabama, displacing native vegetation. It has been found forming dense groves in habitats of Florida Caverns State Park affecting the native flora. It has been reported as an invasive plant in Jackson, Gadsden, Leon, Wakulla and Citrus counties.

Lake Mary officer on the prowl

The Lake Mary Police Department recently welcomed a new officer to the force. The rookie enjoys Scooby Snacks rather than doughnuts during his breaks, can run through the streets without being reprimanded and sometimes drools after a successful capture of a suspect.

The officer in question is a 2-year-old German Shepherd named Joker. The purebred is a full-service police dog, the first in 14 years for the Lake Mary Police Department.

"Joker is a wonderful addition to the police department," said Lake Mary Police Chief Richard M. Beary. "He has a great personality."

Once it was determined Joker had the personality to become a police dog — play and prey drives, social skills and courage — he was partnered with Officer Kevin Pratt of the Special Operations K9 Unit, who received a transfer from the investigations division. The two immediately began attending a K9 training academy hosted by the Apopka Police Department.

Since March, Pratt and Joker have logged more than 510 training hours, plus 140 hours of specialty training in drug sniffing. Joker, who was trained using positive reinforcements such as toys, treats and playtime, will continue a rigorous training schedule to maintain his level of accuracy.

"He is a wonderful partner,"

said Pratt. "We live together and go to work together. He's absolutely great. He is very balanced — he is a well-mannered dog at home, but knows the difference between his off time and work time."

As a member of the police department, Joker is responsible for several aspects of police work, including patrols. With his keen sense of smell, Joker is able to track lost people or suspects who have committed crimes, and conduct building and area searches.

"He can search a building more thoroughly with his nose to pick up human scents to help narrow our search down," said Pratt, who began his career as a police officer in Lake Mary nearly five years ago. "It would take several officers a long time to do what he can do in a few minutes."

"It's his senses and agility that make him invaluable," he added.

Joker is trained not only to track, but also to apprehend suspects, specifically those who aren't compliant. Joker is also trained to "sniff out" six types of drugs.

"Our role is to back up and assist other officers in high profile cases and drug calls," explained Pratt.

In order to help spread the word about the Lake Mary Police Department's K9 unit, Joker and Pratt will conduct demonstrations at community events throughout Lake Mary and Seminole County, including at the Lake Mary-Heathrow Art Festival, and various schools and churches.

Stetson's Corner: 'Send the kids to the woods'

Our recent trip to North Carolina found us in the Pisgah National Forest at the Cradle of Forestry — where forestry as a science began in America. If you are ever anywhere near this place, you need to visit. There is much of us can learn from those who love and care for the land.

Prior to that trip, I attended the Little Big-Econ State Forest Management Plan Advisory Group public hearing held at the Geneva Community Center. This meeting, a chance for the public to give input into the now 10-year plan for the 5,048 acres off Snowhill Road in Geneva, helped citizens understand what the Florida Division of Forestry (DOF) envisions for this parcel and how they interact with other agencies to ensure harmony in all areas of concern.

The St. Johns River Water Management District, the Florida Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission, the Division of Historical Resources, Conservation and Reserved Lands (CARL), Save Our Rivers (SOR), and a board of trustees all oversee the management of the forest resources, recreation, wildlife, water resources and historical and archaeological treasure found therein.

The plan laid out for attendees that night has now been sent to Tallahassee for review and finalization by the Acquisition and Restoration Council, where public comment will be welcomed as well. The goals of the

plan are close to those held by the men who attended the Billmore Forest School in 1898:

- To restore, maintain and protect in perpetuity all native ecosystems.

- To ensure the long term viability of populations and species considered rare, endangered, threatened or of special concern.

- To integrate human use through a total resource concept, not emphasizing any particular use over the others or over restoration, maintenance and protection of native ecosystems.

- To protect known archaeological and historical resources.

- To practice sustainable forest management utilizing sound silvicultural techniques. (The process by which a forest is tended, harvested and replaced is called a silvicultural system.)

Those attending the meeting that night had questions and requests of the advisory group including concerns about timber harvesting techniques, burning as a management tool, identification of historical sites and a presentation by Kent Wimmer of the Florida Trail Association asking for consideration of land purchases to provide connectiv-

ity for the 1,300-mile Florida National Scenic Trail. All left pleased with what they had seen and heard, as no major changes appeared to be in store for this multi-use state forest.

"The debris on the ground is a curse to the trees of the mountains by feeding fires; and a blessing to the waters of the mountains by preventing erosion..." (Dr. C.A. Schenck-Billmore Forest Fair Guidebook)

According to DOF's Will Kitchings, the major management priorities during the next 10 years include:

- Prescribed burning
- Restoration/reforestation of pastures
- Exotic species control
- Forest inventory
- Recreation (look for possible canoe trail signs in the future)
- Boundary marking and security
- Restoration of natural communities
- Fire lines and trails
- Roads
- Plan Development (silvicultural and hydrological)

- Mitigation projects (the restoration of wetlands by developers who build on other off-site wetlands)

anyone to ever have to see.

Later that night, about 2300, traffic had dwindled down and they had brought in portable lights and generators. We, the 2nd Cav, and CNN were the only ones left there, along with some workers. By midnight the only sound was the hum of generators running the lights. We stood guard while the workers continued working through the night.

A CNN guy, named Willie, from Scotland, gave us some cookies and sodas. There was a footbridge between my two locations, and we and CNN were the only ones in that area. The media cameramen used the footbridge to shoot their footage from. Willie let me and my soldiers use his satellite phone to call home,

I guess CNN picked up the tab. I cycled all my soldiers through using the phone, then I got to talk with my wife and my boys from the scene.

Joyce said she had been watching on CNN and she and some of the other wives had identified our vehicles on TV by the bumper numbers and some of their husbands.

Before I started using the phone, I had walked down to the CNN truck and heard shots ring out real close in the neighborhood on the other side of the highway. So I ran to get cover behind the CNN truck, so I was actually talking to Joyce while taking cover behind the truck. Later I stopped and checked a vehicle being driven by one of the ambassadors to the UN. It was

one hectic day, you might say it started with a blast, but it was one of the biggest events to happen.

They said it was a cement truck loaded with explosives that blew up in front of the UN. It really doesn't make logical sense to me for the enemy to do that to the UN because it will only bring down an international wrath on them that didn't exist before.

It would seem more logical for the enemy to have done this to the U.S. headquarters and not the UN that hasn't been in total agreement with the U.S. on Iraq. But that's the part that mystifies my detective nature, something doesn't fit the usual pattern on this one. I'm just always suspicious of such things.

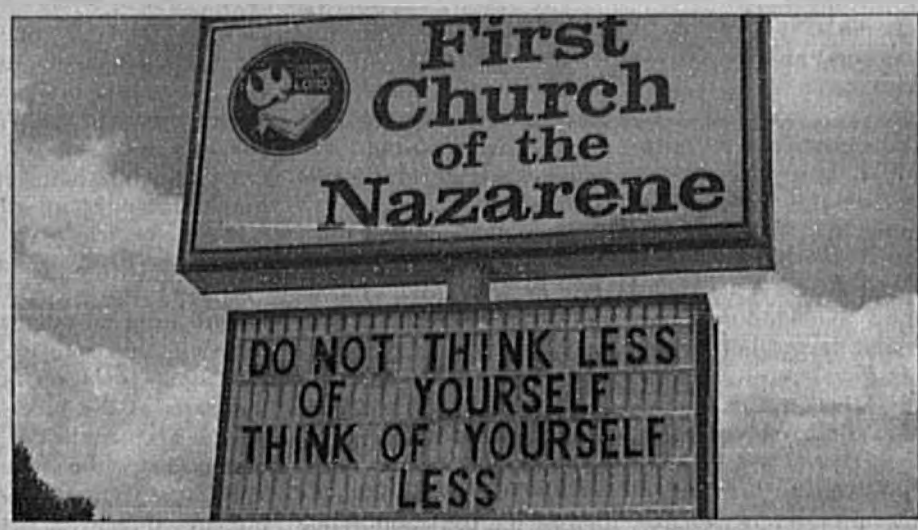



Handlebar hints: Area company teaches motorcycle safety

Is the freedom of the open road calling you?

If so, Ace Motorcycle Safety, Inc., a Seminole County-based company, can help get you on your way to feeling the wind in your hair and the thrill of adventure.

The school, which moved its 5-year-old company from Maitland to its new location on Ronald Reagan Boulevard just outside Lake Mary nearly two months ago, teaches its students to ride motorcycles and handle unforeseen obstacles that may arise while on a ride.

"This class has saved my life at least three times that I know of," said Laura Treadway, founder and owner of Ace. "It's all about the confidence level of the rider. The bike shouldn't intimidate its rider."

Treadway, who took the class in 1996 to prepare for a trip to the annual Sturgis Motorcycle Rally in Sturgis, Mich., decided to open her own company less than two years later in order to better prepare students for riding

a motorcycle.

The curriculum of the safety course is designed to create a mental attitude that fosters safe riding and enforces proper riding skills in the student.

"Since taking the class, I realize I didn't know what I didn't know," said 43-year-old Gerald Martin of Lake Mary, who has ridden a motorcycle in the past and owns a Harley Davidson. "The class has taught me to go from mechanical while on the bike to natural. It's helped me feel comfortable and safe."

According to Floyd Deffinger, the school's manager, more and more individuals — including women — are signing up to learn to ride a motorcycle. He says, as long as students can maintain balance on a bicycle, they can ride a motorcycle.

"It's the feeling of freedom you have when you're riding that attracts students," he said. "You can have a better view of the world because you don't have four walls around you like in a car."

"This class is good for women, too, especially if

they are tired of being on the back [of the motorcycle]," he continued. "If something happens to the bike or her husband, the woman can get the bike home or go for help. I taught my wife to ride a motorcycle."

The course is designed for beginner riders and is taught using an interactive learning process. In the classroom, students learn the parts of the bike, and how to keep control of and manipulate the clutch. Then, the range practice prepares students to actually ride the motorcycle.

"I've always wanted to ride — ever since I was 16 years old," said Joseph Jones, 21, an active duty Marine stationed in San Diego, Calif., on leave visiting family in Casselberry. "The hardest part of the class has been getting everything I knew about riding a bike out of my head and learning the right things."

The school furnishes students with a motorcycle from its fleet of Kawasaki Eliminator 125s, Honda Rebel 250s, Suzuki GZ 250s and Ninja 250s. The bikes are strictly for training pur-

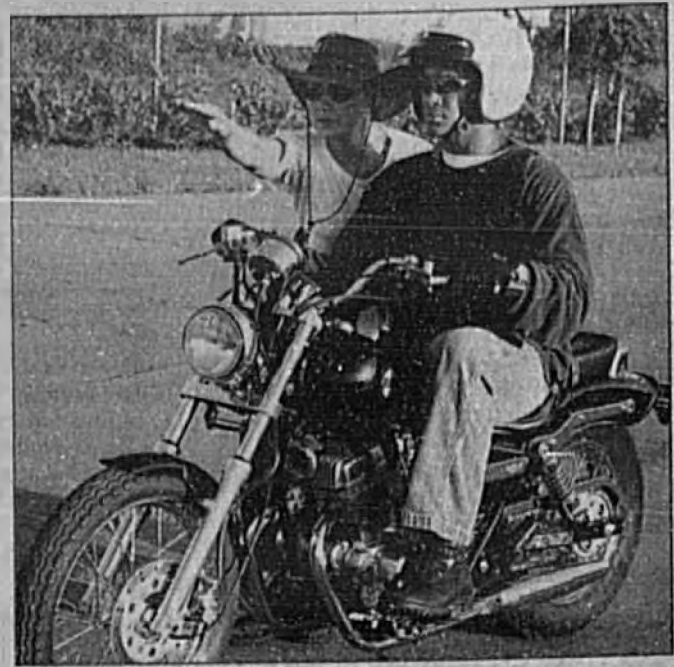
poses and are not street legal — they are missing turn signals and mirrors because students often drop the bikes, and break these items, during the learning process.

Students are also furnished with helmets and gloves, if they don't own these articles. The only gear students are required to wear are pants, long-sleeved shirts, ankle footwear (such as high top tennis shoes or boots) and eye protection (such as glasses, sunglasses, goggles or a face shield).

According to Deffinger, it is mandatory for riders under the age of 21 to complete a motorcycle safety course, but it's also highly recommended for older riders.

"Our priority is student safety and learning," Deffinger said. "My job is to stop things before they happen so if I see something the student is doing that is a safety hazard I can't pass them until they resolve the problem."

"We don't rush students, they can move at their own pace," he added. "We have things to do to help those who are struggling."

Upon successful completion of the written and riding tests, students are presented with a certificate of completion that will enable them to add the certification to their driver's license and receive discounts on insurance. Several motorcycle dealerships in the area also offer incentive packages to those individuals who have

successfully completed the course and purchase a bike six months before or after the class.

According to Treadway, who owns several acres surrounding Ace, the business will expand in the future to include safety instruction for street bikes, dirt bikes and all-terrain vehicles (ATVs).

not something that we're hypothesizing about, this is really hurting our business."

According to Temple, he and other businesspeople along the corridor are concerned that they were not informed of the Florida Department of Transportation's (FDOT) intent to close the lanes, making it impossible for them to plan ahead and

staff accordingly on those evenings.

According to Steve Homan, public information officer for the Central Florida district of the Department of Transportation, the exit ramp will be closed intermittently on Sunday as well.

"Most of the work occurs during the nighttime hours because that's

when you have less traffic and drivers are less likely to get killed," said Homan. "We try to maintain access to the businesses."

"It's difficult to maintain 80,000 cars daily on the road without having to have lane closures during construction periods," he added.

"I'm sorry for their inconvenience, but it minimizes the inconvenience

for the masses."

According to Temple, in order to help reduce the impact on tourism-based businesses, construction should have been scheduled in November and December when leisure and corporate travel nearly comes to a halt.

"Because of the extensive impact they have had on the corridor in last year, I'm hoping the intent [of

the FDOT] is to try to facilitate placing the blue ID logo signs [directional signs] on I-4," said Temple. "This would really help us out and give us the boost we need."

While traveling east and westbound on I-4 the only directional signs at the State Road 46 exit are for gas stations, there are no signs to direct people to exit for restaurants or

hotels.

Roger Eudy, DOT state administrator for the logo sign program, says that once construction is complete the department can make a decision on what logo signs to place on I-4.

conference center were to go through, which at this point is highly unlikely, the \$170,000 needed annually from the city to fund the project would be allocated from its general fund budget. The money, which is currently used to support the Sanford Civic Center, would instead be used to finance the conference center for 20 or 30 years, depending on the structure of the deal.

According to Kevin Smith, the city's finance director, the theory is that the money will no longer be needed for the civic center since it would become part of the privately run conference center. Therefore, the funds could be used for the conference center.

The Sanford Downtown Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA), the organization responsible for the redevelopment of downtown Sanford, would also be responsible for approximately the same amount, said Lessard.

"Although the conference center plan would definitely have worked monetarily with the current deal," said Lessard, "we would like to give the CRA revenues a

chance to increase and mature. We would like to base our calculations on the mature numbers instead of assumptions of what the numbers might be.

"I've always advocated any product we go with has to be a great deal, not just a good deal. I think this would make a great deal for the city, but not for the CRA because of operating on assumptions of what revenues will increase by."

The city's community development director, Andrew Van Gaale said the city is concerned about the loss of businesses in the downtown. The supervisor of elections office is being relocated to the airport, and the criminal division of the courthouse — along with the state attorney's office and the public defender — will move to the Five Points area on U.S. Highway 17-92 next to the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

"At this point we are again looking at what the CRA's goals and objectives are for downtown. We're asking them what the options are, if this isn't it," Van Gaale said.

Lessard says the CRA and

the city will turn its focus to the streetscape project on First Street and will evaluate the potential of the city's civic center.

"We're losing \$170,000 a year on the civic center and it's a drain on city resources," he said. "While it does provide services on a limited scope, with that building's location we should have someone in there every day."

According to Lessard, Suncor will continue to revisit the conference center plan to develop it further.

"They're keeping us in the dark," said Bob Horian, president of Suncor Properties, Inc., who says he will have to wait until commissioners vote on Monday night to have a final answer. "We're not sure if they want to nix the entire project, milk it down or put it on hold."

Ron Semans, vice president of Suncor Properties, Inc., who commends Lessard and the city staff for their efforts to bring a conference center to Sanford, agrees, saying, "We still believe in Sanford. We are optimistic about the other projects in Sanford."

The banged-up Anaheim Angels got more bad news after Tuesday night's loss to the White Sox when manager Mike Scioscia revealed that shortstop David Eckstein has been placed on the 15-day disabled list because of an inflamed nerve in his right hamstring.

Eckstein joins third baseman Troy Claus (out for season, torn rotator cuff), center fielder Darin Erstad (DL, right hamstring tendinitis) and designated hitter Brad Fullmer (out for season, torn knee ligament) as starters from the Angels' 2002 World Series championship team who are not playing right now.

The Angels got the result of the

MRI taken on Eckstein and it confirmed an inflamed nerve in the shortstop's right hamstring. Eckstein then met with team doctor Lewis Yocum, who advised that Eckstein be "shut down," until early next week, Scioscia said.

If Eckstein's condition improves, he will be allowed to resume baseball activities and can hope to get back in games after four or five days of workouts. The first day he is eligible to return is Sept. 2, when the Angels are in Minnesota.

Eckstein first felt pain in the area

last week and missed three games. He started the following three games, but was pulled from the Angels' win over Detroit last Sunday because the pain had reached his lower back.

Wednesday night, Anaheim lost its third straight game to get swept out of Chicago after winning six of seven on a homestand. The Angels, who fell to 60-67 on the year, are now tied for last place in the American League West Division with the Texas Rangers, who have won eight consecutive games.

Since division play began in 1969, the only team to have won a World Series one year and finished in last place in its division the following year is the Florida Marlins, who won it all in 1997, then had a fire sale of talent before the following campaign.

Unlike the Marlins, however, the Angels brought practically their entire roster back for a run at the title, but the crippling injuries to first-stringers Claus, Erstad, Fullmer and Eckstein have taken their toll.

They have called up 12 players from Triple-A Salt Lake since the beginning of the season, and six of them played in Wednesday night's game.

Upwelling gone with the wind

Finally after several weeks of very cold water temperatures along the East Coast the water is warming up.

Have you tried to swim or fish in the Atlantic Ocean in the past few weeks? If you have, you know exactly what I mean by cold water.

Daytona Beach had temperatures as low as 58 degrees just a couple of weeks ago. This phenomenon labeled "cold water upwelling" has finally moved out to sea.

The cold water upwelling is caused by constant wind from the southwest pushing the warm water out to sea and causing a tornado like action below the surface. During this time the cold water from the deep is pushed to the shallow waters.

It has had a major effect on the fish. Fish become lethargic when the temperatures get this low. Many of the fish will move to where the warm waters reside and it can make the fishing very tough for charter boats and commercial fishermen.

Many of the bottom fishing boats were basically out of luck during this time and the sport fishing boats had to travel twice as far for fishing action. Our most recent tropical depression changed the whole picture as it moved toward Florida.

The water temperatures around Port Canaveral went from the low 60's to the mid 70's within a day or two following the tropical depression. As the beach temperature rose the temperature at the 20 mile mark dropped 8 degrees.

Things have pretty much returned to normal and the fishing is much better. Luckily for us inshore guys it did not affect the fish in the Titusville area. The fishing See Outdoors, Page 13

During the second half of the season Johnson, from Baker County High School, came on strong with his outside shooting ability and became one of Cromartie's top reserves. He finished the season as the 13th best three-point shooter in the state, making 40-percent of his attempts from behind the stripe.

Johnson will be counted on heavily for sophomore leadership as he will be the only player around with college playing experience.

But if looks have anything to do with it, he will be the leader of a very talented group of players.

Among the new signees is Will Greene, a 6-foot-10-and-a-half center from Palo Duro High School in Amarillo, Texas and Kemanie Samuels, a 6-foot-10 forward/center from Kingston, Jamaica.

The other 'big man' is Darnel Miller, a 6-foot-8 forward from New Providence, Nassau, Bahamas.

Miller is the second player from the Bahamas to sign with SCC, joining Nassau's Adom Charlow, a 6-foot-5, 230-pound power forward from A.F. Adderley High School.

Cromartie was also pleased to announce the signing of Lake Howell High School's Joivan Forestier. The 6-foot-1 guard averaged 9 points, 4 rebounds, 5 assists, and 3 steals per game, during a senior season in which he helped the Silver Hawks set a school record for wins in a season and earn their first ever trip to the State Final Four.

The final new member to the team is Aaron Ball, a 6-

foot-1 combo guard from Vanguard High School in Ocala. During his senior year Ball averaged 14 points, 5 rebounds, 5 assists, and 5 steals per game on his way to being named First Team All Area and All-State Honorable Mention.

That sextet will join previous signees Vincent Mosley and Kevin Thomas from Dillard High School in Ft. Lauderdale, Thomas Williams from Kathleen High School in Lakeland, William Graham from Dixie County High School in Cross City and Travis Jones from Olympia High School.

Mosley, a 6-foot-4 guard/forward, and Thomas, a 5-foot-11 point guard, were starters on a Dillard team that went 32-1 this season and upset nationally-ranked Edgewater in the finals to win its fourth straight Class 6A State Championship.

Thomas averaged 13 points and eight assists per game this season and was named Second Team All State and Second Team All Area-South Region. He was also ranked by Breakdown.com as the 21st best senior in Florida.

Mosley, meanwhile, averaged 10 points and seven rebounds per game this season.

Williams, a 6-foot-4 small forward/guard, averaged 14 points, five rebounds and five assists per game as a senior and helped the Red Devils win the 2001 Class 4A State Championship as a junior.

This past season he was named, All Polk County by the Lakeland Ledger.

Graham, a 6-foot-7 forward, averaged 12 points, eight rebounds, 3.2 blocks, and 2 steals per game as a senior and was named a

Class 2A All-State Honorable Mention.

Jones, a 6-foot-2 guard, was ranked the 20th best senior in Florida by Breakdown.com, after averaging 23 points, four rebounds, three assists, and two steals per game as a senior and was named All State-Honorable Mention in Class 6A.

Cromartie also said that there is a very good possibility that the 6-foot-9 son of "Tree" Rollins, the ex-NBA star and former Orlando Magic assistant coach, will walk onto the team. Rollins, who played at Dr. Phillips High School, went to a college in Indiana last year, but did not play, leaving him with two years of eligibility.

With talent like this on paper, Cromartie and his staff can hardly wait for November to roll around.

In other Mid-Florida Conference news, Daytona Beach Community College (DBCC) has hired Brad Underwood as its new men's basketball coach to replace Frank Burnell, who resigned on June 9 to take a coaching position at the University of South Florida.

Underwood comes to DBCC from Western Illinois University where he has served as the first assistant coach and recruiting coordinator the past 10 years, and prior to that was the head coach for five years at Dodge City Community College in Dodge City, Kansas.

A native of Kansas, Underwood attended Independence Community College as a student-athlete where he played in the NJCAA National Championship game in 1984, and went on to be the starting point guard for two years at Kansas State University.

PERMITS STILL AVAILABLE TO STALK FLORIDA'S PREHISTORIC PREDATOR
 The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) has more than 300 permits remaining for hunters who want to take

on the challenge of bagging huge reptiles that can clamp down 80 teeth with a ton of pressure per square inch.
 Alligators look much like their reptilian ancestors looked 70 million years ago and are fair game for selected hunters in the FWC's September/October public waters alligator harvest.
 Participants say taking the powerful animals with harpoons, gigs or hooks may be the most extreme hunting experience in America. It is also one of the most tightly regulated.
 "Hunters should apply soon, because

we're issuing permits every day, and when they're gone, that's it for a whole year," said Harry Dutton, leader of FWC's Alligator Management Section. "There is no application deadline, however, you should submit your application at least two weeks prior to the start of your harvest period. It takes at least two weeks to process your application."
 The FWC expanded the alligator hunt this year to allow hunting in areas that were previously off-limits, Dutton said. Countywide alligator management units were established, which made 750 additional permits available.
 "Countywide permits should be especially appealing to private landowners who would like to harvest alligators on their property but who have not been able to qualify for the Private Lands Alligator Management Program," Dutton said.
 A person permitted for a countywide harvest unit will be allowed to take two alligators from any lands that they could legally access in the specified county, including public and private lands and waters, but excluding specific water bodies established as Alligator Management Units, private wet-

lands permitted for alligator management and other protected public properties.
 Alligator harvest permits enable hunters to take two alligators each. To be eligible for a permit, applicants must be at least 18 years old by Sept. 1 and must not have been convicted of violating wildlife laws relating to alligator trapping within the past five years nor laws relating to endangered crocodylians within the past 10 years.
 "At this date, if you would like to license agents to assist you with your hunt, you should submit the agent license applications with your harvest permit application," Dutton said.
 Alligator harvest applications and alligator trapping agent licenses are available at all FWC regional offices and on the Alligator section of the FWC Web site at <http://wild-florida.org/gators/>. The site also shows which areas still have permits available.
 Applicants can check their selection status daily after 5 p.m. on the Web site. People who do not receive a permit through the selection process will have their fees returned.
 "You won't find a hunting experience like this anywhere else," Dutton said

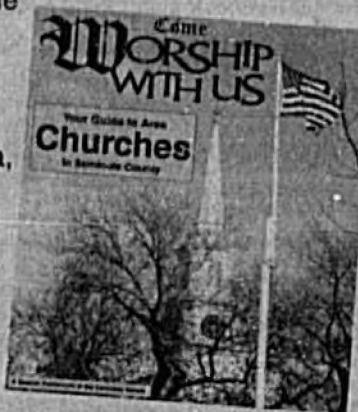
